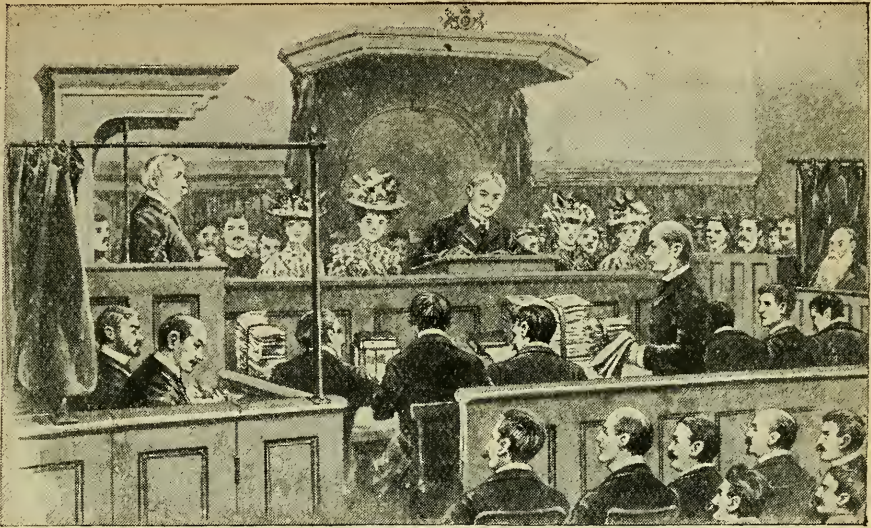
GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

THE DRUCE CASE.

THE Druce case will long remain in the public mind as one of the most remarkable inheritance cases since the great Tichborne trial. The object of the claimants was to prove that the fifth Duke of Portland was one and the same as Druce. The incident here depicted is the cross-examination of Robert Caldwell, one of the most important of the claimant's witnesses. It was alleged that T. C. Druce had not been buried in the Druce grave and that the coffin had been weighted with lead.

After dragging on for years, the case was settled once for all by the opening of the grave and the examination of the remains in the coffin. In it was found the body of an aged man, so dispelling the story that there had been a mock funeral.

NATIONAL NICKNAMES.

NATIONAL nicknames and emblems differ considerably according to the countries in which they are used. Our term for the typical German is, for instance, "Hans" or "Fritz," but in Germany and some other European countries he is "Cousin Michael."

THE G.P.O., LONDON.

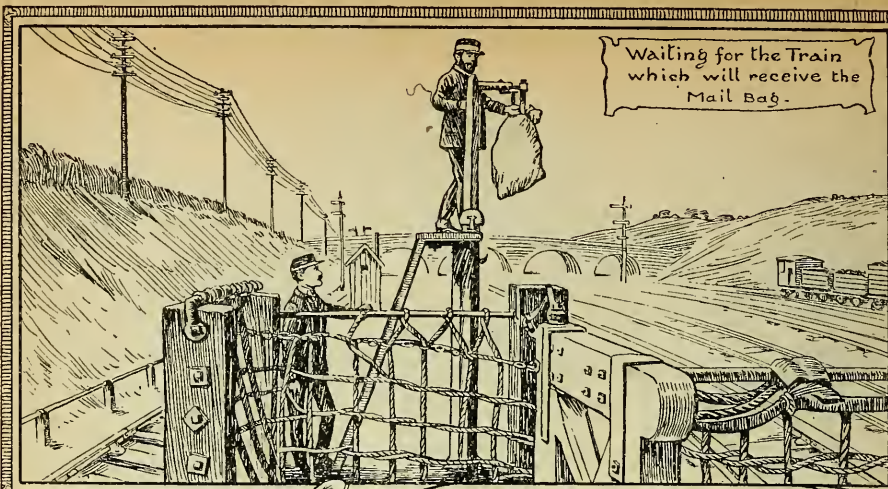
Most wonderful is the Sorting Room of the G.P.O. A row of desks marked off into compartments three feet wide occupies the length of the room where the sorters work. It is their duty to sort the letters out into the various districts for which they are intended, and the rapidity with which they work is extraordinary. Working under pressure, a sorter can deal with over 3,000 letters an hour.

FRENCH AND ENGLISH LIVING.

THE English, on the average, have one-third more to spend than the French, and, all things being equal, more money is earned in England than in France. Sow salad seed, plant potatoes, early cabbages, shallots, leeks, onions, asparagus and celery. Attend to cauliflowers, lettuce, etc., in frames for planting out. Prune and nail up wall fruit trees. Strawberries may be planted about the end of month. Remove suckers from filberts. Lawns and grass-plots should be renovated. Red cabbages and savoys may be sown in the last week.

WAITING FOR THE TRAIN.

HERE are two Post Office servants fixing a bag of letters to the mail post on the North Western Railway Company's line. In the distance is heard the hum of the racing train, and from the side of the mail van a net is let down which strikes the bag from its supports and swallows it through a door. A few moments later, after an exciting struggle with the intruding bag, which flies in and rebounds erratically with tremendous velocity, the sorters will have emptied it of its contents and will be sorting the letters *en route*. A great deal of skill is required on the part of the man who lowers the net. A minute too early, and it may strike an obstruction or be lowered in a tunnel, in which case the side of the van would be torn out; a moment too late, and the bag is gone past recall. At night he depends almost entirely upon his ear, and can tell by sound with his eyes closed almost to a yard the position of the train.

SAVES TIME AND LABOUR.

SUCCESSFUL experiments have been made in various forests of France in cutting trees by means of electricity. A platinum wire is made white-hot by an electric current, and used like a saw. In this manner the tree is felled much easier and quicker than in the old way. No sawdust is produced, and the slight charring caused by the wire acts as a preservative of the wood and prevents the decay at the ends which so often takes place after felling.

HAMPTON COURT.

HAMPTON COURT, once the country palace of Cardinal Wolsey, is now almost a suburb of London, connected with the Metropolis as it is by electric cars. There is something appropriate in approaching it from the river, as did the great cardinal when he lived there with his thousand retainers; as did Henry VIII. with one or other of his wives; or as did Mary when she returned for her honeymoon there with Philip of evil memory. The palace within is full of works of art, and the gardens are of surpassing beauty. Adjoining it is Bushey Park, surely the prettiest of all the suburban parks.

A LONG-LIVED CLOCK.

DOES anyone wish a clock to run as long as 30,000 years without being wound up? There is one which is the work of a distinguished inventor in matters electrical.

He calls it a radium clock, and asserts that it will run for 300 centuries if it is not interfered with. It consists of a tube containing a small quantity of radium, supported on a quartz rod in an exhausted glass vessel. To the lower end of the tube is attached an electro-scope, consisting of two long strips of silver.

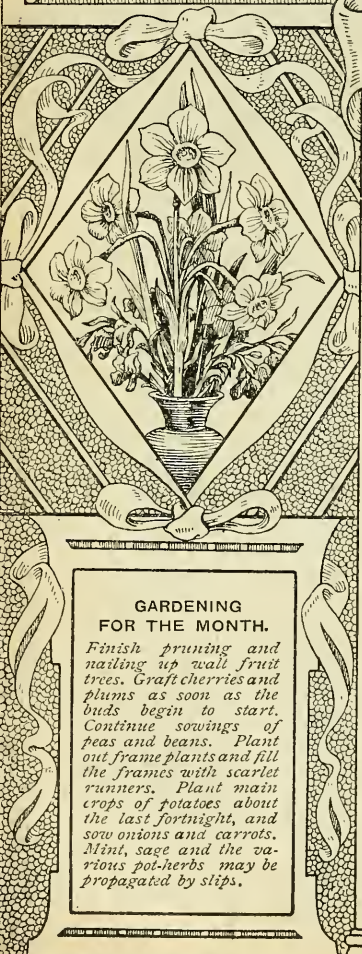
The natural action of the radium sends an electric charge into the strips, causing them to separate until they touch the sides of the vessel, whereupon they are instantly discharged and fall together again. This operation is repeated automatically every two minutes, so that each beat of this singular timekeeper may be said to be two minutes long.

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

Finish pruning and nailing up wall fruit trees. Graft cherries and plums as soon as the buds begin to start. Continue sowings of peas and beans. Plant out frame plants and fill the frames with scarlet runners. Plant main crops of potatoes about the last fortnight, and sow onions and carrots. Mint, sage and the various pot-herbs may be propagated by slips.

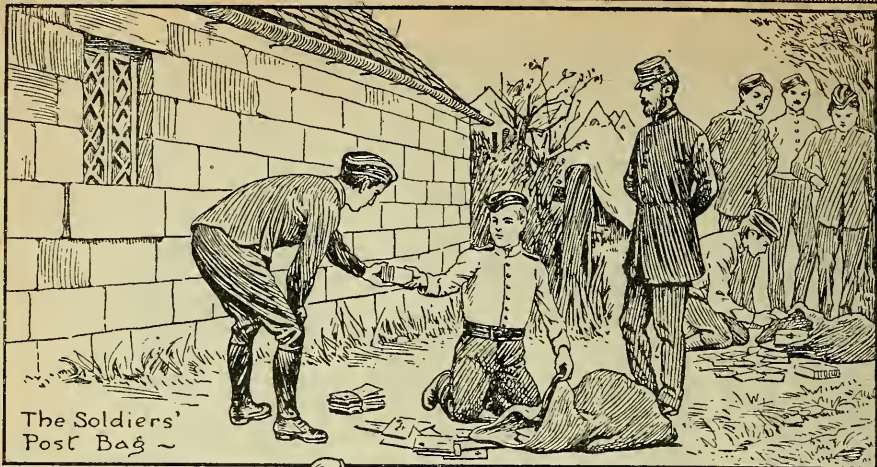

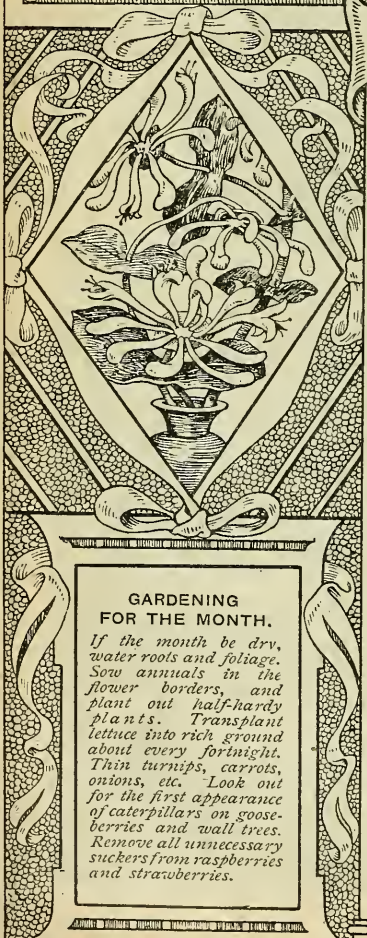

THE SOLDIERS' POST BAG.

WHEREVER the army goes, in peace or in war, it must have its post office with it. Surely the service man fights better when he receives daily or weekly, or even occasionally, word from the girl at home. Whether his General welcomes equally whole-heartedly the correspondence, instructions, and inquiries from headquarters is to be questioned. The incident here pictured shows the scene in the army manœuvres in the south of England on the arrival of the mails. It would never do, of course, to allow the whole army to gather round the unfortunate letter-carriers, so orderly postmen are sent from each regiment who gather up their own regiments' letters and distribute them.

ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

GUARDED by stalwart Guardsmen, the red brick gateway of St. James's Palace is the most picturesque of all the palaces, dating back as it does to the days of Henry VIII. It faces the broad St. James's Street, and under the arch leads to Colour Court. Changing guard at St. James's Palace used to take place just inside this gateway every morning, but now the place has been altered to the open court behind. It is a very pretty ceremony, during which the Guards' band plays; and it vies with the Horse Guards as a popular show.

THE "TIGER" DISASTER.

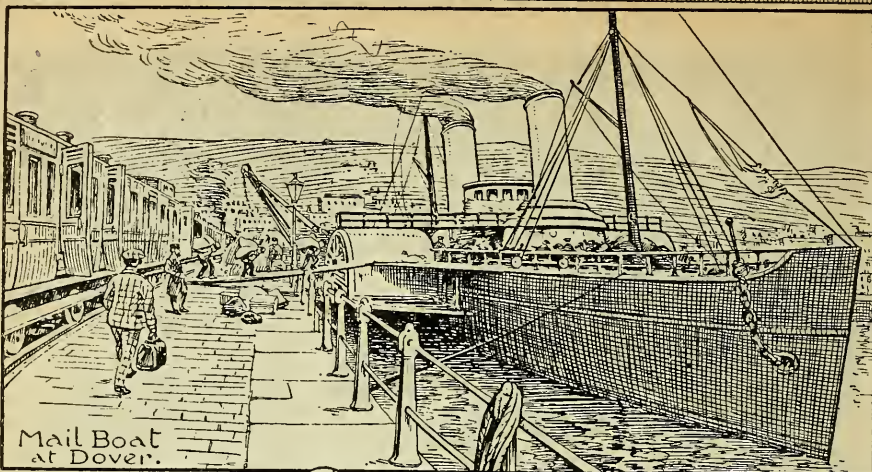
THE loss of the *Tiger* on April 2nd, 1908, was the worst disaster that has befallen the British torpedo flotilla for many years. It was a dark moonless night, and with lights out the destroyers were practising an attack on a line of cruisers. The *Recruit* and the *Tiger*, flying at full speed through the murky seas, fired their dummy torpedoes; but for some unexplained reason the *Tiger* turned in her course and ran straight on the ram of the *Berwick* and was cut clean in half. Of the men in the forepart not one escaped, and the total loss, including the gallant commander, was thirty-five lives.

A SHETLAND POST OFFICE.

THERE is always a fascination about a most northerly or most southerly post office. The one illustrated on the calendar page for April is in the Shetland Isles and is "farthest north," so far as the British Isles are concerned. It is just a tin shanty and nothing more, built on a piece of barren rocky land. All the appliances are of the roughest description, and, as may be imagined from the size of the office, the volume of business is not very great.

FALSE PHILOSOPHY OF ECONOMY.

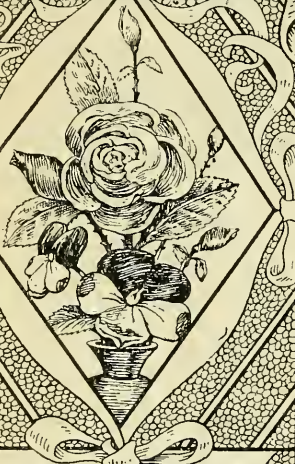

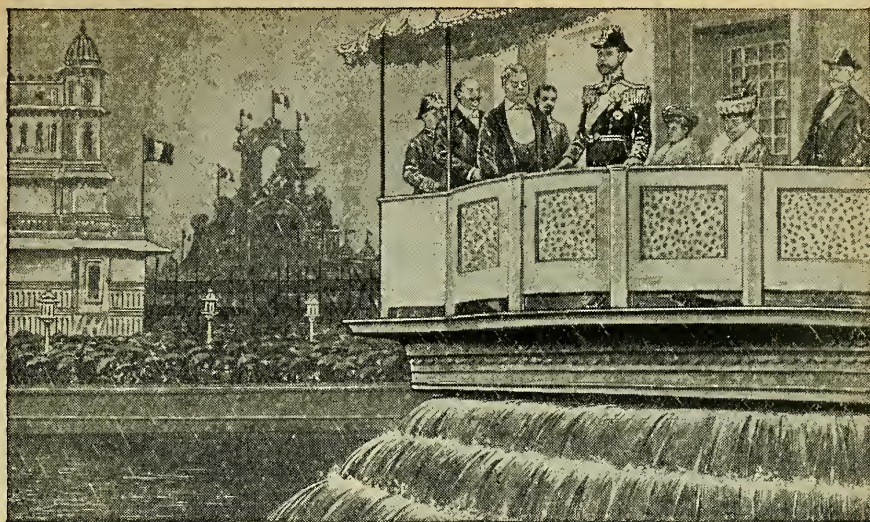
GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

FRANCO-BRITISH EXHIBITION.

The London event of 1908 was the Franco-British Exhibition, or the White City as it was named. The finest productions in manufacture, art, and science from the two countries were exhibited in the score of temporary palaces, which during the summer were visited by millions of the two nations. The exhibition was opened in state by the Prince of Wales on May 14th; it covered over 150 acres of ground, and though not as large as the World's Fair of Chicago it compared most favourably in beauty and excellence of exhibits with that colossal fair. The buildings were built of steel and concrete, and were strong enough to stand several years' wear. The exhibition gave employment to something like 30,000 persons engaged as attendants to exhibits, catering staff, etc.

AVOID THE LAST WORD.

"THE greatest menace to the happiness of married life is the 'last word,'" observed a feminine counsellor of her sex.

"It is a perfect bombshell in its ability to wreck domestic peace. It is not easy, as a rule, to trace who had the first word in a matrimonial dispute, but there is generally a competition for the last. And, as a rule, the woman has it.

"Quarrels begin so insidiously that one is drawn into them imperceptibly. But they would soon die away if it were not for this unworthy contest for the last word. So if you cannot avoid an occasional dispute with your husband (and, after all, a quarrel, if it is not too bitter, is a sort of safety-valve) let your husband have the last word sometimes. It will please him and do you no harm."

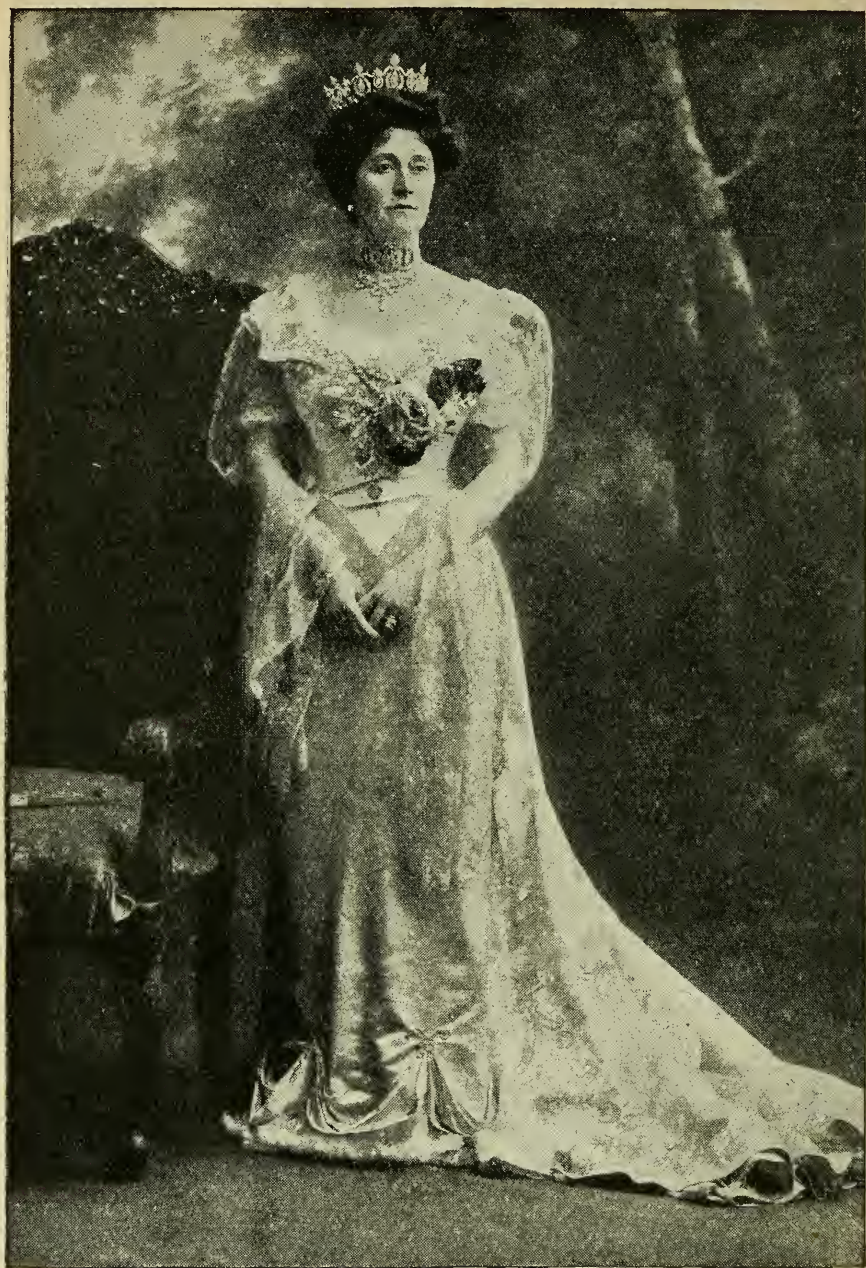
THE MAIL BOAT AT DOVER.

TIME was when the passage from Dover to Calais or Ostend in blustery weather was a thing to fear, a matter of hours penned below in a little ship whose sole recommendation was that she was as fast as could be built, and fairly seaworthy. Run by smart skippers, whose idea was to create a record without a thought of the passengers' comfort, the Packets made quick time but very dirty weather of it in the fairest breeze. Compare these with the fast boats of to-day which carry the mails from Dover to Calais in less than an hour. It must be very heavy weather to make the Calais boat half an hour late; yet, however she labours against wind and tide, her passengers in their airy quarters need have no fear such as had the travellers of olden time.

THE RISKS OF RADIUM.

ANYBODY who knows enough of radium to make him covet it would as soon think of popping a red-hot coal into his pocket. When the late M. Curie brought to London the first radium seen in England he was unaware of its evil propensities, and was terribly burned about the ribs through carrying a phial of it in his waistcoat pocket. Others, like Mr. Edison and a Birmingham sufferer, who have suffered agonies from the effects of the mineral, have borne testimony to the mysterious horrors associated with its eternal radiance. The X-rays used for curative purposes have the same dangerous propensity. It is curious that radium and X-rays, which are both of great use in curing superficial cancer, should have the property of actually causing a cancerous growth by long exposure.

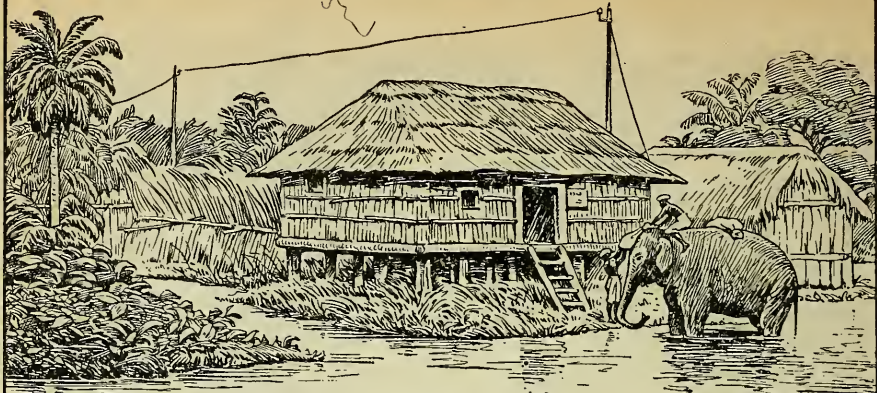

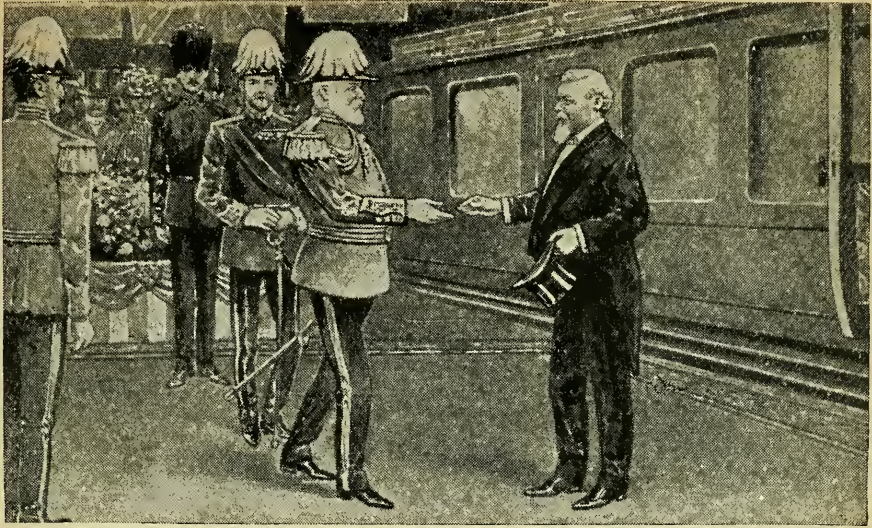
GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

Continue to sow kidney beans, early cabbage, lettuce, early and late peas, radishes, etc. Pull and dry the earliest onions. Plant celery for main crop. Stick peas, scarlet runners, etc., and tie up lettuce. Gather and dry medicinal and pot herbs. Prune and train wall trees, and syringe to protect from mildew and insects. Plant strawberries in pots for forcing. This is the best month for budding roses.

THE VISIT OF THE FRENCH PRESIDENT TO LONDON.

THE visit of M. Fallières to London in 1908 marked the full recognition of the *entente cordiale* between England and France. For some reason hard to explain, France had been looked upon as England's national enemy, and ten years ago the cry of "Fashoda" was ringing like a war alarm through France. King Edward, however, has always realised that the two nations should be friendly and has striven earnestly towards that end. The warmth of the President's reception must have convinced the most warlike patriot that the hatchet is buried for good.

LORD AND LADY MINTO.

THE fourth Earl of Minto, who since 1905 has been Viceroy of India, has had a varied and adventurous career. Educated at Eton and Cambridge, he passed into the Scots Guards as an ensign. He served with the Turkish army in 1877. He was in the Afghan war two years later. In 1881 we find him private secretary to Lord Roberts at the Cape, but in 1882 he is off to the war in Egypt as a volunteer. He has served as military secretary to the Marquis of Lansdowne in Canada, and went through the great North-West Rebellion of 1885. Between 1898 and 1904 he held the Governor-Generalship of Canada. Both he and his wife have that elusive quality known as "charm of manner" in the highest degree, and they are justly celebrated for their hospitality. Since they have been in India Lord Minto has displayed the greatest tact in dealing with the turbulence of the Indian "reformers."

THE POST OFFICE IN AN INDIAN TEA DISTRICT.

THE life at a post office of the Indian tea district is easy-going, if a little dull. Mails come with wide intervals between, and the whole surroundings cry out for slow movement and long consideration. The little office is built on the bank of a sluggish stream, where life moves as easily as the stream; yet the telegraph pole at the side of the building gives pause for thought. Enter the office, work a lever, and in a few minutes you may bridge the thousands of miles which separate you from London. Distance is only a comparative term, after all.

FORGIVEN AFTER 200 YEARS.

A FAMILY of Sengar Rajputs was excommunicated by their brotherhood for some lapse in the ante-Hindu days of the Emperor Aurungzebe. For two centuries the family tried to get back into caste, but without success. Recently the family applied for readmission again, in the august presence of 2,500 influential delegates of the caste. By a majority of votes it was decided to receive the family back.

BRUMMELL'S SNUFF-BOX.

BEAU BRUMMELL'S snuff-box, being as exquisite as himself, was once handed round at a Portman Square dinner-party to be admired by the guests. One gentleman, not content with admiring it, attempted to open it, and, failing to force it with his fingers, proceeded coolly to prize it open with a dessert knife. Brummell looked on in agony for a moment, and then turned to say to his host, "Will you be so kind as to tell your friend that my snuff-box is not an oyster?"

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

Sow winter crops of early cauliflower, carrots, lettuce and turnips; also early carrots for spring use. Where the ground is cultivated round roots of fruit trees, spread grass or straw to protect falling fruit. Attend to watering and hoeing. Sow winter and spring spinach in the beginning and about the end of the month. Protect ripening fruit from insects.

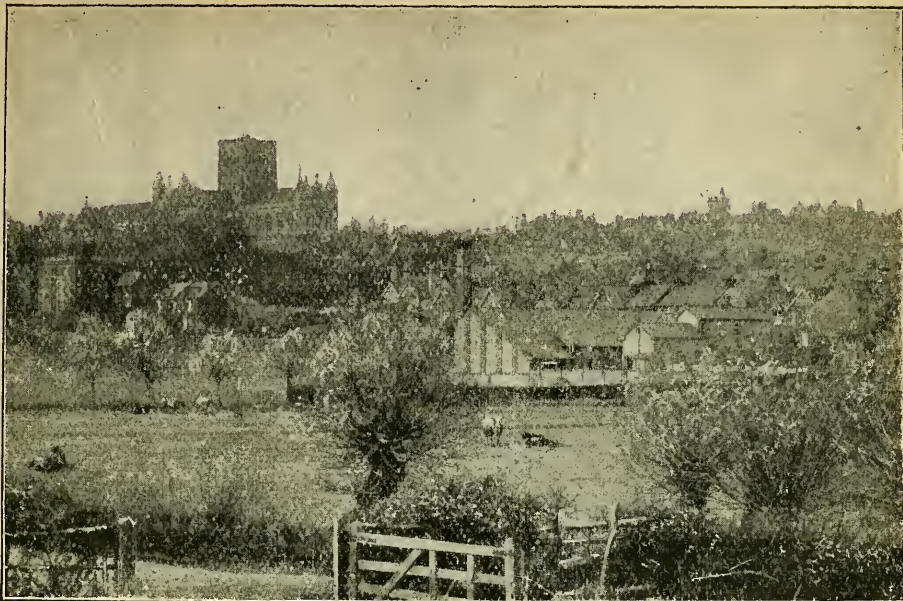

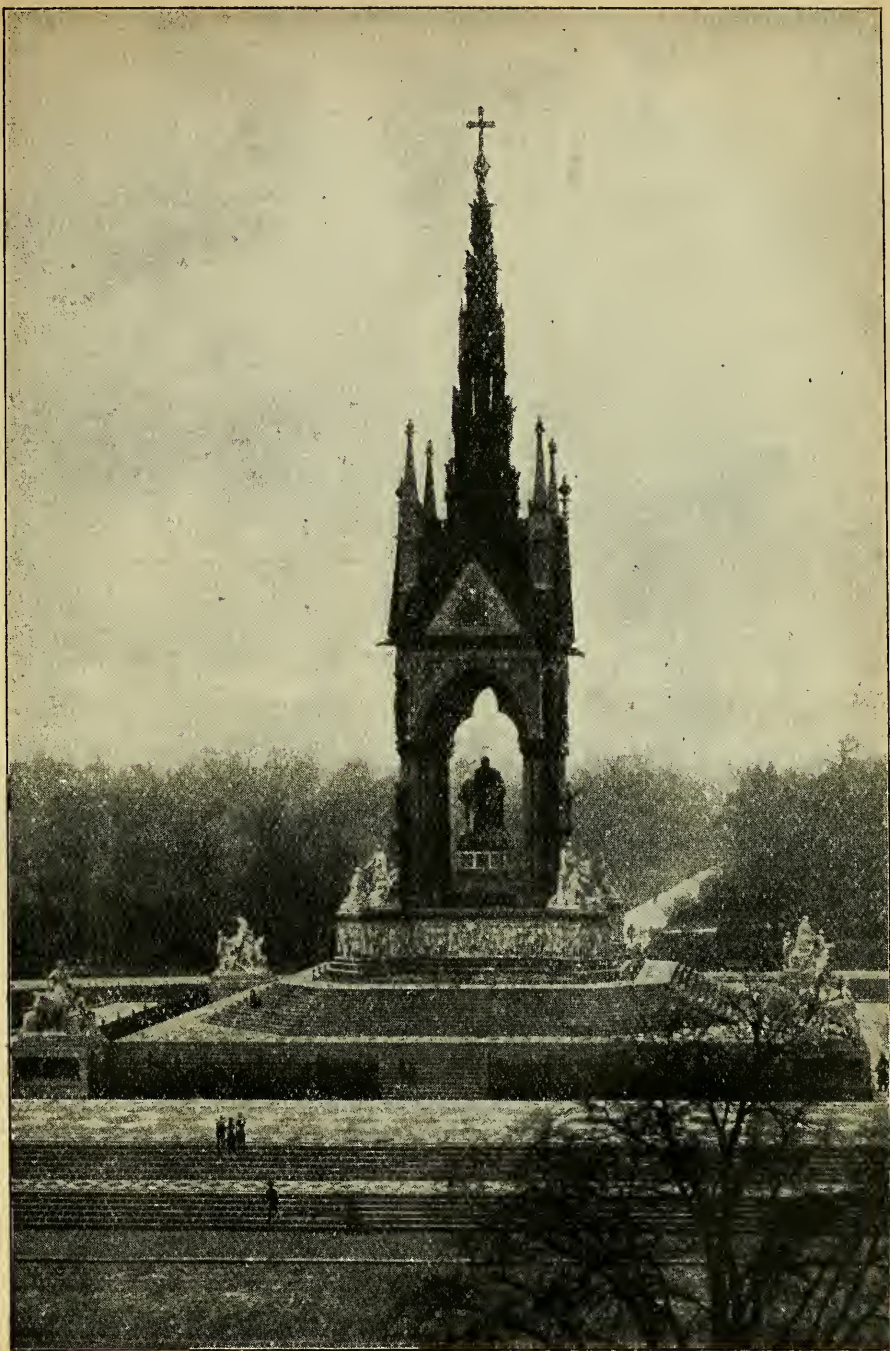

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

Finish the summer pruning and training of fruit trees, and gather and store pears and apples as they ripen. Plant and water strawberry runners. Conclude sowing of outdoor crops and planting of hardy ones. Harvest spring onions and potatoes. Prepare the ground for early potatoes and earth up celery. Sow a few small salads for late crops. Plant endive and lettuce.

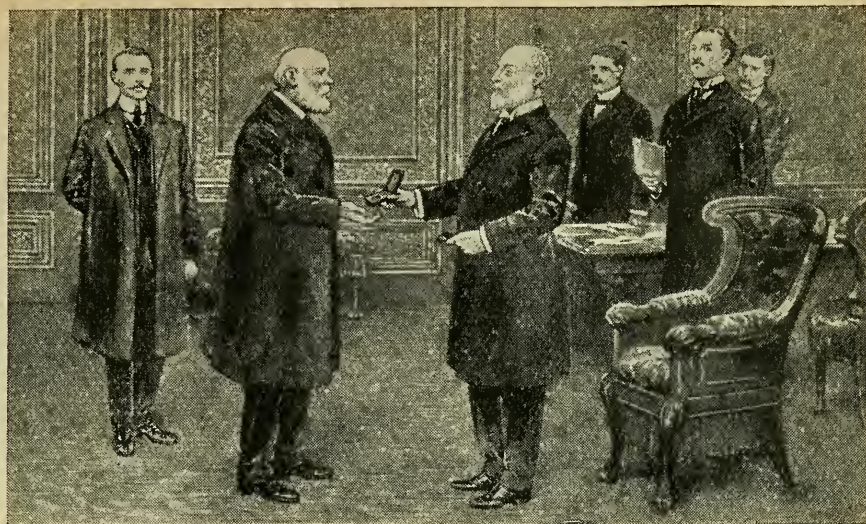

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

Early frame peas may be sown on the chance of a mild winter. Store potatoes, beet, carrots, parsnips, etc., and, as summer crops are removed, manure, dig and plant collards and greens early in the month. This is the best time for transplanting fruit trees. Gather and store apples and pears, leaving the longest-keeping ones till the end of the month.

THE MINERS' V.C.

IN 1908 a new order of merit was instituted, called the Albert Medal, for gallantry in mines—but more popularly known as the Miners' V.C. The two first recipients of the honour were Francis Chandler and Henry Evesham, who were presented to the King at Buckingham Palace and there decorated. Chandler had been working with a gang of five men on an underground boiler when a fall of rock had buried them in debris and scalded them with steam from the crushed boiler. Though badly injured, he succeeded in extricating himself and took an active part in the rescue of his mates. Evesham was decorated for his perilous feat of sliding down a vertical pipe in pitch darkness to the rescue of two men who had been precipitated down the shaft.

A POSTMAN ON SKIS.

AUSTRALIA in the British mind is connected mainly with sheep and drought. It will be a surprise to many to see on the opposite page the New South Wales postman performing his round in a desert of snow. Kiandra, once an important goldfield, lies 4,500 feet above sea-level, and at certain times the postman must needs adopt the fashionable ski of Sweden in order to make his way over the deep snow.

THE ALBERT MEMORIAL.

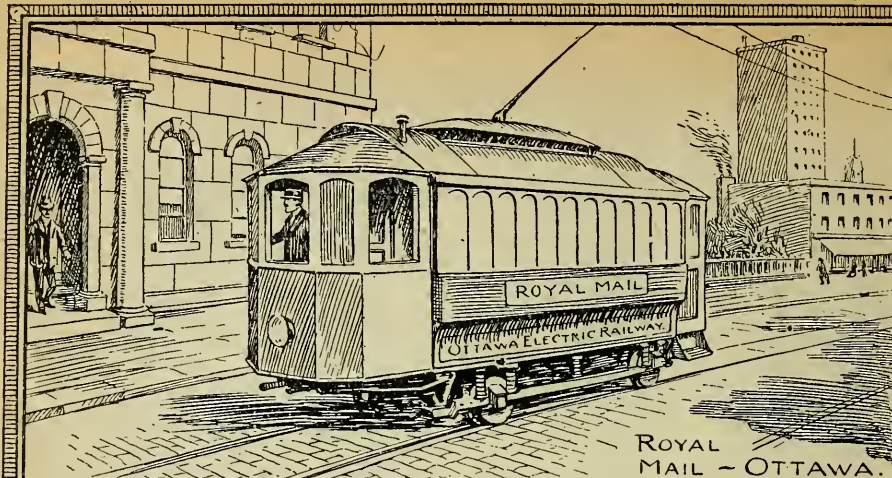
IT was the Queen's own wish that some marked token of regard should exist in memory of the Consort who had so loyally helped her through the most difficult years of her reign. The great bronze figure of Prince Albert under the Gothic canopy is by Foley the sculptor, but the whole scheme was designed by Sir Gilbert Scott. The Memorial stands in Kensington Gardens opposite the Albert Hall. It is 175 feet high, and is rich in mosaics, in gilding, and in coloured stone. Great statues of Agriculture, Manufacture, Commerce, and Engineering adorn the four corners, and in marble relief on the base are sculptured no fewer than 169 figures of poets, painters, and artists.

THE POSTMAN OF INDIA.

THE Indian postman is a most precise personage. Dressed in nondescript uniform, half military half native, he bears his responsibilities and his official leather bag with the deepest gravity. In these hot climates, when the true native is taking his ease in the shade, the turbaned postman goes his rounds, steadily upheld by a sense of his own importance in the scheme of things, and relaxing only from his gravity when some wee white toddler holds up her hand for the anxiously awaited mail from England.

4d.-IN-SLOT UMBRELLAS.

AUTOMATIC umbrella distributors are installed on many Berlin railway stations, which will deliver umbrellas to travellers at 2s. a time. If the umbrella is returned in two days' time the borrower gets 1s. 8d.

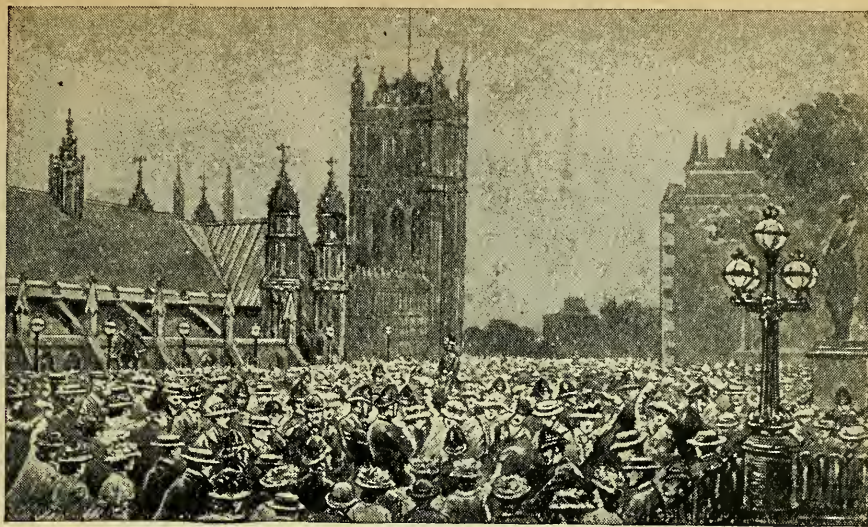
GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

Earth up cauliflowers, Brussels sprouts, broccoli, etc., where they are liable to suffer from frost. Plant dry tubers of border flowers, except the finer sorts, which can be delayed till the spring. Protect celery, artichoke and sea-kale, also half-hardy plants, from the frost. Prune gooseberries, currants and raspberries. Plant or move roses, plant liliums. Trench and dig vacant ground.

OTTAWA'S MAIL TRAMS.

OTTAWA, one of the most progressive cities of the Empire, has made use of the existing tram lines, with their store of overhead electricity, for the quicker transport of her mails; and the little mail-cars scudding about the streets at a tremendous pace are very smart and serviceable. They are, of course, obliged to keep to the lines of rails, but since these lines lead past every important post-office in the place, and there are many sidings, this is no disadvantage.

ALL BY MACHINERY.

PEN nibs are made by machines which seem almost to think. The steel is cut into ribbons as wide as the length of one pen, and these are fed to machines which cut out the blanks, then shape them, split the points and place the maker's name on the backs. The pens are now complete, save the annealing, which is a process of heating the metal almost to the melting point, and then cooling it suddenly to render it tough. After being annealed, the pens are counted and placed in boxes. A machine has been invented for performing both the latter operations.

SUFFRAGETTES' RAID ON THE HOUSE.

On the night of June 30th, 1908, the suffragettes made a determined raid on the House while Parliament was sitting. Over 50,000 people were gathered in Parliament Square to witness the demonstration. One daring advocate took a boat, and reaching the Terrace shouted "Votes for Women" through a megaphone. On the Embankment 500 women resisted the efforts of the police to disperse them, many hanging on to the railings till they were arrested. Two others were arrested for breaking the Premier's windows in Downing Street. Altogether 29 arrests were made, and 27 were committed to gaol.

LAND AT £3,500,000 AN ACRE.

THE recent partition of a small estate bought seventy years ago by Mr. John Jacob Astor for £4,600 and now valued at £650,000, draws attention to the remarkable growth in value of New York real estate, which is said to double itself every eight years. When we consider that Manhattan Island, on which the great part of New York City stands, was originally bought for sixteen dollars, the prices now demanded for portions of it are simply amazing. A good many years ago a small plot of 717 square feet was sold at the rate of £3,000,000 an acre; while for a neighbouring plot £80 a square foot, or nearly 3½ million pounds an acre, was refused. In Piccadilly land has been sold within recent years for £34 3s. 4d. a square foot, or £1,488,300 per acre; and some of the land in the City around Lombard Street is still more valuable.

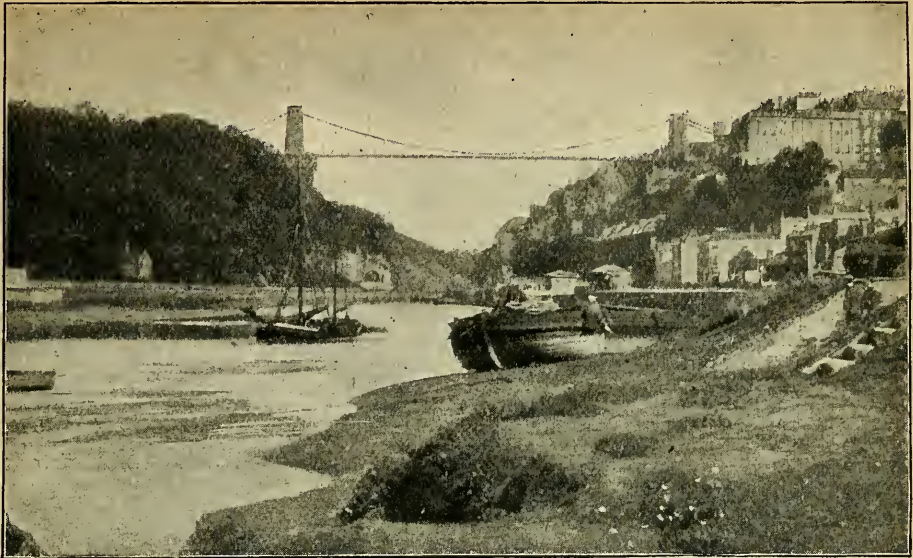

THE MAILS IN A TIGHT PLACE.

THERE are some corners of the earth where his Majesty's mails find themselves blocked, and one of the most awkward of these is the strait between Prince Edward Island and the mainland of Canada. With certain winds the narrow strait becomes blocked with piled-up ice, with wicked, treacherous patches of water in between. In these circumstances, the passengers are turned out of the boats, and the boats themselves are dragged over the hummocky ice with ropes. Even so, the task often proves impossible, and there is nothing for it but to sit down and wait till the wind subsides or the piled-up ice gives a chance of doing the journey on foot.

WHY LIGHT ATTRACTS MOTHS.

THE attraction which draws a moth to a flame is proverbial. But what is it that lures the insect to singe its wings?

A naturalist who has considered the problem asserts that a moth (and, for that matter, many other insects) will fly towards a flame for the same reason that a plant seeks the light.

Insects, it seems, move in the direction of the light-rays that fall upon them. But the light must be of considerable intensity to produce a marked result. Towards a feeble glare the insect would move but leisurely, but in the case of a concentrated light, like the flame of a candle or lamp, the insect travels with great rapidity to its death.

CLIFTON SUSPENSION BRIDGE.

THE Clifton Suspension Bridge—our English "Bridge of Sighs" for suicides—admits to a magnificent view of the Avon where it flows through the romantic defile of St. Vincent's Rocks. As the story runs, St. Vincent, a rival, caught the giant Goram asleep, and once and for ever determined the course of the river by cleaving the ravine through which the Avon now runs to the sea. Brunel's Bridge, after a remarkably chequered history—its construction being actually suspended for a period of nearly thirty years!—was completed for the visit of the British Association in 1864. The foundations had been laid in 1836. The chains of Hungerford Suspension Bridge at Charing Cross were taken down and here re-hung. The centre span—one of the longest in the world—is 702 feet in extent, and the entire length of the bridge is 1,352 feet. Fifteen hundred tons in weight, the stupendous structure is a wonderful combination of strength and grace.

LET WATCHES LIE.

A GOOD watch should lie flat at night. The variation of rate between hanging and lying is very small, and the difference is practically constant, so that the mean rate is constant. In the hanging position all the parts are running on the side bearings, where there is the greatest friction and wear. By letting the watch lie flat at night and run on the end bearings, where there is less friction, the wear is distributed and the watch made more durable.

Foreign Postage Rate is 2½d. for the first oz. and 1½d. for each additional oz., except to the U.S.A. and British post offices in Morocco, where the postage is 1d. per oz.

Imperial Penny Postage.

A letter postage of 1d. per oz. is now established between the United Kingdom and nearly all British Possessions and Egypt. No letter for a Colony or Foreign Country may exceed 2 ft. in length or 1 foot in width or depth.

Halfpenny Post (Inland).

This post is limited to packets not exceeding 2 oz. in weight and covers books, drawings, documents of which particulars are given in the Post Office Guide, &c. Beyond 2 oz. the letter post rate must be paid.

Every Halfpenny Packet must be posted either without a cover or in an unfastened envelope, or in an easily removable cover. No Halfpenny Packet may exceed 2 feet in length or 1 foot in breadth or depth.

Parcel Post.

Parcels not exceeding 11 lb. in weight are received at any post office for transmission between places in the United Kingdom. The rates of postage are:—Not exceeding 1 lb., 3d.; 2 lb., 4d.; 3 lb., 5d.; 5 lb., 6d.; 7 lb., 7d.; 8 lb., 8d.; 9 lb., 9d.; 10 lb., 10d.; 11 lb., 11d.

The dimensions allowed for an inland postal parcel are:—Greatest length, 3 ft. 6 in.; Greatest length and girth combined, 6 ft.

A Parcel Post has also been established between this country and many foreign countries and the British Colonies and possessions generally. The maximum weight for parcels to the U.S.A. has recently been raised to 11 lb., and the charge reduced. For rates and regulations, see the Post Office Guide.

Postage on Inland Registered Newspapers.

Prepaid Rate.—On each Registered Newspaper, whether posted singly or in a packet, the postage when prepaid is one halfpenny; but a packet containing two or more Registered Newspapers is not chargeable with a higher rate of postage than would be chargeable on a Halfpenny Packet or a Letter of the same weight.

Post and Letter Cards.

Post Cards, bearing a halfpenny impressed stamp, are available for transmission between places in the United Kingdom only. They are sold at 11 for 6d. They can also be had in smaller numbers or singly. Reply Cards are also sold.

Letter Cards are sold at 8 for 9d. Smaller numbers in proportion.
Foreign Post Cards, 1d.; reply, 2d.

Money Orders for the United Kingdom.

Money may be sent by Telegraph Money Order at the same rates as for ordinary Inland Money Order, plus supplementary fee of 2d. and cost of official telegram of advice.

Money Orders Abroad.

Money Orders, payable abroad, are to be had at all Money Order offices; see the Post Office Guide.

Collection on Delivery.

For a fee of 2d. on goods despatched to certain foreign countries, the Post Office will collect payment on delivery. The sum must not exceed £20. This arrangement applies at present only to Egypt, Malta, Cyprus, and the British Post Offices of Constantinople, Smyrna, Beyrout, Salonika and Tangier.

Postal Orders.

Postal Orders are now issued for every 6d. up to 20s., and also for 21s., the charge being ½d. for orders from 6d. to 2s. 6d.; 1d. for orders from 3s. to 15s.; and 1½d. for orders above that sum.

Registration.

By the prepayment of a fee of twopence any postal packet (parcels included) may be registered to any place in the United Kingdom. Every packet to be registered must be given to an agent of the Post Office, and a receipt obtained for it. The Postmaster-General will give compensation up to a maximum limit of £400 for the loss and damage of Inland Registered Postal Packets of all kinds. The ordinary fee of 2d. secures £5; the payment of 3d. £20; 4d. £40; 5d. £60; 6d. £80; 7d. £100; 8d. £120; 9d. £140; 10d. £160; and so on.

Post Office Savings Banks.

No deposit of less than a shilling is received, nor any pence, and not more than £50 in one year. No further deposit is allowed when the amount standing in depositor's name amounts to £200 inclusive of interest. Interest is allowed at the rate of 2½ per cent. (or sixpence in the pound) per annum—that is, at the rate of one halfpenny per pound per month.

Any sum not exceeding £1 can be withdrawn without notice at any Post Office transacting Savings Bank business.

At every Post Office in the United Kingdom forms for making small deposits are issued gratuitously. Each form has twelve divisions, in each of which a penny postage stamp can be placed; when the twelve are filled in, it is received at any Post Office Savings Bank as a shilling.

Any person can invest, at any Post Office Savings Bank, small sums in Government Stock. Not more than £200 can be invested in any one year. The amount held by the investor must not exceed £500.

REGISTERS OF BIRTHS, MARRIAGES, AND DEATHS.

Copies of these are kept at Somerset House, and may be searched on payment of a fee of one shilling. If a certified copy of any entry be required, the charge for that, in addition to the shilling for the search, is two shillings and sevenpence, which includes a penny for stamp duty. The registers contain an entry of births, deaths, and marriages since 1st July, 1837. Copies can always be obtained from the Registrar for the district, or the Superintendent Registrar who has the custody of the registers (including those of persons married at the churches) when filled.

MARRIAGES.

In the case of marriage by banns, if the contracting parties reside in different parishes the publication must be made in the churches of each parish for three consecutive Sundays. If three months be permitted to elapse after the third time of publication, the banns become useless, and the parties must either obtain a licence or submit to the republication of the banns. Civil marriages can be performed before a duly licensed Registrar.

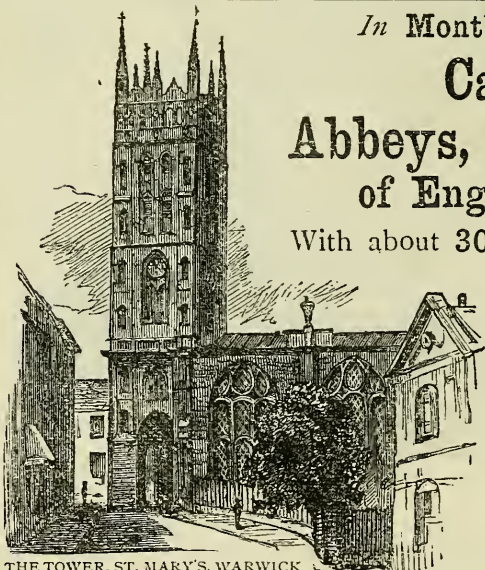
