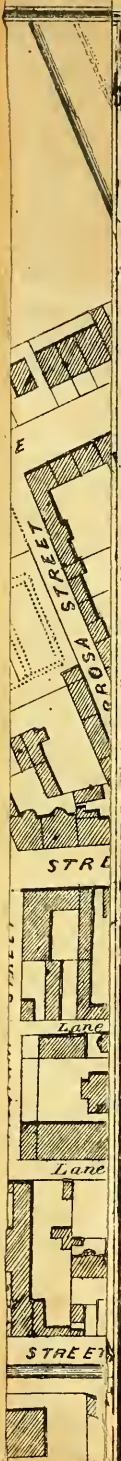

### A SYSTEM OF REGISTRATION

Has been adopted, and all letters, whether containing coin or not, can be *registered* on payment of a registration fee of one shilling, in addition to the ordinary rates of postage on Inland and Colonial as well as on Ship or Foreign letters, or letters passing through France. On those for delivery within France, the charges, besides the registration fee of one shilling, will be the English rate to France, in addition to double the French rate to the place to which the letter is addressed. A printed acknowledgement torn out of the receipt book, and stamped with the office stamp, will be given to any person registering a letter. Registered letters will be taken until within half-an-hour of the closing of the box for the particular mail by which they are to be despatched. Registered letters bearing a sufficient number of stamps, will be considered paid letters, but the registration fee of one shilling must always be paid in money.

In the case of Foreign, Colonial, or Ship Letters, it must be clearly understood that registration cannot extend beyond the port of despatch in the United Kingdom, though parties, if they wish it, may register such letters as far as the port of despatch. Letters, however, addressed to France, and letters passing through France are exceptions to this rule—the French Post-Office undertaking to provide for their security till they shall have been delivered, if addressed to France, and so long as they remain in the French territory, if passing through France.

The arrangements for carrying out the system of registration have been made with the view of insuring the punctual delivery of registered letters : on their delivery, the parties to whom they may have been addressed, will be required to acknowledge in writing their receipt.

### MONEY ORDERS.

MONEY ORDERS are issued and paid in Perth between the hours of nine A.M. and six P.M. except during the short intervals when the office is closed for making up and despatching mails, &c. The commission on orders for any sum not exceeding £2 is *threepence*, above £2, and not exceeding £5, *sixpence*.

In cases where personal attendance is inconvenient, if the order is receipted by the person to whom it is made payable, and the party presenting it for payment can afford full information as to the christian name, surname, address, and occupation of the person who originally obtained the order, payment will be made ; but unless these conditions are strictly complied with, it will be refused.



## PENNY POSTAGE.

The limit of weight to be conveyed by Post, is 16 oz., unless intended for the Foreign Delivery, or for any of the Public Departments, and unless the Packet consists of Parliamentary Proceeding, Petitions, or Addresses to the Queen, &c.

### RATES OF POSTAGE.

INLAND LETTERS not exceeding half an ounce, are charged 1d.

Exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding 1 ounce, 2d.

" 1 ounce, " 2 ounces, 4d.

" 2 ounces, " 3 ounces, 6d.

And so on, an additional 2d. for every additional ounce. With but few exceptions the weight is limited to 16 ounces. Unstamped letters are charged double postage on delivery. Those insufficiently stamped double the amount of such insufficiency.

### MODE OF PAYMENT.

Letters, &c. may be prepaid either by cash labels or covers.—That is to say there are 1d. and 2d. adhesive labels, which being stuck on the face of the letter, may be used to represent so much money there are, also 1½d. and 2¼d. envelopes subject to the same regulation except as to the farthing.

*Stamps* (provided they cover the whole postage), may also be used on Foreign, Colonial, and Ship Letters, &c., outwards. If any letter, however, addressed to places beyond sea to which prepayment is compulsory, shall bear an insufficient number of *stamps*, it will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, to be returned in all practical cases to the writer.

Adhesive Stamps should be placed on the right hand corner above the Address of the Letter, and the stamped half sheets should be so folded that the stamps should be in the same position; if this precaution is neglected, from the rapidity with which the duty must be performed, such Letters will probably be taxed, and the parties receiving them will be put to much trouble in obtaining a return of the Postage charged.

Non-Commissioned Officers, Captain's Stewards, Seamen, and Soldiers, to and from the East Indies by the Overland Mails, "*via* Southampton," can send and receive Letters, under the weight of half-an-ounce, on their own private concerns only, while they are employed in Her Majesty's Service, or the Service of the East India Company, for one penny.

And the Penny must be paid at the time it is put into the Post Office, and the direction must specify the class of person, and the Ship, Regiment, or Corps to which he belongs. And the officer having the command must sign his name, and specify the name of the Ship or Regiment, Corps or Detachment he commands.

SOLDIER'S and SEAMEN'S Letters are not liable to any addition postage upon Re-direction:

*Letters going to Seamen or Soldiers.*—The Penny must be paid at the time it is put into the Post Office, and the direction must specify the class of person, and the Ship, Regiment, or Corps; to which he belongs.

The postage upon Soldiers' and Seamen's Letters received from parts beyond sea, without the penny having been prepaid, is two-pence in addition to the Ship Letter gratuity, if received by Private Ship.

Threepence postage is charged on Letters addressed to Soldiers and Seamen to either of the following places:—River Gambia, Sierra Leone, Goree, Senegal, Cape Coast Castle, Fernando Po, Coast of Africa, Ascension (Isle), and China. To St Helena, the East Indies, and New South Wales, one Penny.

*Re-directed Letters* are subject to additional Rates of Postage, but whether the Letter has been originally prepaid or not, they are only liable to be charged at the prepaid rate for the additional Postages which is to be paid on delivery.

*Peers and Members of Parliament* no longer despatch or receive correspondence *Free*; but *Members* of either House are entitled to receive, Free of Charge, *Petitions to Parliament*, provided that each Petition is sent without a cover, or in covers open at the sides, and does not exceed the weight of thirty-two ounces.

*Addresses to her Majesty* pass free.

Printed Votes and Proceedings in Parliament, or of the Colonial Legislatures, are charged—

Under four ounces,.....1d.

Above four and under eight ounces,.....2d.

Above eight and under twelve ounces,.....3d.

And so on in proportion; no additional charge will be made upon them if the postage is not paid in advance.

Such Votes and Proceedings, whether paid or unpaid, pass at these rates between places in the United Kingdom, as well as the Colonies, by packet. To those places to which there are no packets, Van Dieman's land for instance, they may be forwarded "by Private Ships," at *double* the above rates. They are not, however, forwarded to the East Indies, *via* Southampton and Alexandria, nor to places through France under the full Rates of Letter Postage. The Postmaster-General is authorized (if he shall see fit) to delay the transmission of Printed Votes and Proceedings in Parliament, for any space not exceeding twenty-four hours from the time at which the same would otherwise have been forwarded.

**LETTERS NOT TO BE DELIVERED BACK.**—To prevent the possibility of Letters being surreptitiously obtained from the Offices where put in, office-keepers are strictly forbid returning, to any person whomsoever, letters that may be applied for, under whatever circumstances the recovery may be urged. This is moreover, forbid by the established principle, that the instant a letter is committed to the Post, it is no longer the property of the Sender.

#### **LETTERS NOT TO BE SEALED WITH WAX WHEN SENT TO WARM CLIMATES.**

The practice of Sealing Letters passing to and from the East and West Indies, and other warm climates, is attended with much inconvenience, and frequently with serious injury to the Letters.

in consequence of the melting of the wax, and adhesion of the Letters to each other.


In the case of mails received from India, considerable delay is occasioned; and notwithstanding the greatest care is taken in separating the letters, which, owing to the cause already mentioned, adhere closely together, many are much damaged and torn: the public are therefore recommended in all cases to use waters in preference to wax, in securing their letters sent to India, or other warm climates, and also to advise their correspondents in those countries to pursue the same course.



## SHIP LETTERS.

The single uniform rate on Letters between the United Kingdom and places beyond sea, when conveyed by Private Ship, is 8d. under half an ounce; 1s. 4d. under an ounce; 2s. 8d. under two ounces; and so on, in whatever part of the United Kingdom the letters may be posted or delivered. This is the rate now taken on letters between the United Kingdom and the East Indies, &c. when conveyed by Private Ship, the former distinction between these and other descriptions of Ship Letters having been abolished.

## RATES OF POSTAGE

On Letters and Newspapers to France, and to Countries passing through France from the United Kingdom, (the Channel Islands excepted), weighing  $\frac{1}{4}$  oz., and not exceeding  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz.

 On Letters addressed to those places (\*) the Postage must be pre-paid, or the Letters cannot be forwarded.

## NEWSPAPERS &amp; SUPPLEMENTS TO NEWSPAPERS.

It is not compulsory to send Newspapers, or Supplements to Newspapers, by the Post, but those that are intended to be so transmitted, are entitled to pass free. All Newspapers must be sent in covers, open at the sides, and no words or communication may be printed on such papers after the same shall have been published; nor must there be any writing or marks upon any newspapers, or the cover, other than the name and address of the person to whom it is sent; nor any paper or thing enclosed or concealed in, or with such Newspaper or the cover, nor any printed words or communication on the cover, except that Newsvenders ONLY may PRINT their names and addresses thereon. Newspapers may be examined by the officers of the Post Office; and if there be any breach of the above regulations, the packet is chargeable with treble the amount of postage to which a letter of the same weight would have been liable to. And any person who shall write or enclose any thing in any Newspaper or the cover thereof, or shall print any words or communication on a Newspaper, after it shall have been published, to be sent by the Post; or any person who shall knowingly send, or cause to be sent, by the Post, a newspaper, in respect of which any one of those offences has been committed, may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, be prosecuted as for a misdemeanour.

Newspapers pass free by the Local Posts, except in those cases where they shall be posted and delivered within the limits, for the time being of the Post Delivery, when the Postage is one penny on each Newspaper.

All Newspapers going abroad must be sent in covers open at the ends, and put into any *Post Office* within seven days after the date of Publication.

Newspapers to the *British Colonies* and *Possessions* are forwarded by *Packet, Free*; but if sent by *Private Ships* they are

charged one penny each, which must be paid at the time they are posted.

Newspapers for Canada, directed *via* Boston, are forwarded free but charged on delivery in Canada one penny each in addition to any United States postage that may be due on them.

Newspapers for the East Indies, Malta, and the Ionian Islands, when forwarded by British Packet *via* Marseilles, are charged threepence, which must be prepaid; those for Malta and the Ionian Islands may be forwarded by French Packets for twopence prepaid.

Newspapers for *Foreign Parts* not being *British Possessions*, are charged twopence each, whether sent by Packet or Private Ship, with the following exceptions—

Newspapers are sent by Packet free of Postage, and are charged one penny each by Private Ship.

To *Holland*, and countries through *Holland*, the postage is one penny each. To *Spain* through *France*, one half penny, and for *France* they are forwarded free of charge to the Sender, but are charged on delivery a rate of four centimes each, (equivalent to one half penny). To all other countries through *France* they are charged twopence each, except *Egypt*, by British steam packets, *via* *Marseilles*, which are charged threepence each.

Newspapers from the *British Colonies* and *Possessions*, (except *Upper and Lower Canada*) by Packet, are delivered, free of Postage, at any place within the *British Dominions*; and for one penny each if received by Private Ship. And Newspapers from *Foreign parts* not *British Possessions*, are under the same regulations as to Postage as those sent outwards. Those from *France* are charged one half penny, and from *Holland* one penny on delivery within the *United Kingdom*; all other places charged twopence, except such as are mentioned above as being sent Free of Postage, which are also delivered free.

All Newspapers from abroad must be printed in the language of the Country from which they are sent, unless in cases specially exempted by the Lords of the Treasury.

Those persons who have removed may have Newspapers re-directed to them at any place within the *United Kingdom*, free of Postage, provided they have not been opened at the place to which they were originally adressed, but if opened they are charge at the same rate as if they were a Letter.

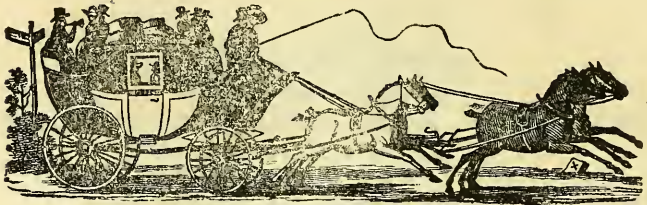

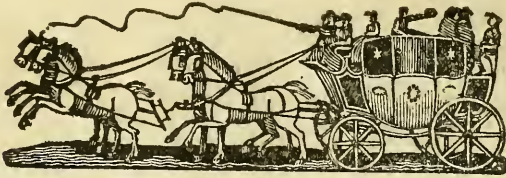

## DUTIES OF THE PORT AND HARBOUR OF PERTH.

## RATES AND DUTIES ACCORDING TO THE TONNAGE.

For every Vessel, Ship, Boat, Bark, or Lighter, for every time it comes to the Port or Harbour of Perth, and within the Limits set forth in the Act, to receive or discharge a cargo, or part of a cargo :—

If not Registered at any port of the United Kingdom, 4½d per Register Ton.

If Registered at any port of the United Kingdom, 3d. per Register Ton.

If only employed in carrying goods or other commodities to or from Dundee, or other ports or places in the River Tay, 3d. per Register Ton.

For every Steam Vessel employed in the River Tay in carrying passengers and their luggage exclusively, which shall enter or leave the said port or harbour within the limits set forth in the Act, ½d per ditto.

For every Vessel remaining at the harbour or quays of Perth more than six months, one third more of the above dues; so remaining one year, double the above dues; and the above rates for every six months it shall so remain beyond one year.

Boats employed solely in conveying salmon and grilises from fishings in the Tay to Perth to be exempted.

The British Plantation Tare is to be allowed on Sugar from St. Lucia, provided the casks are made of the same material as at present, but where any deviation may be observed from the usual package, the officers are to resort to taring one in a given number, and allowing the tare on the whole, according to that so ascertained.

Havannah Boxes, Tare 52lbs. each.—Brazil Boxes, Tare 18 per cent. ; except Bahia, which are tared at 13 per cent.

N.B.—No smaller weight is to be used in the weighing of hogsheads, tierces, and chests of Sugar than the 2lb. weight, but in weighing boxes, barrels, and bags, recourse must be had to the 1 lb. weight ; this practice is to be observed generally.—Min. C.C. 8 Jan. 1833.

## NEW LICENSING SYSTEM.

The granting of Licenses is now regulated by the Act 9 George IV. cap. 58, entitled “ An act to regulate the granting of Certificates by Justices of the Peace and Magistrates, authorising persons to keep common inns, ale-houses, and victualling houses, in Scotland, in which ale, beer, spirits, wine, and other exciseable liquors, may be sold by retail under Excise Licenses, and for the better regulation of such houses, and for the preventing of such houses being kept without such Certificates.” By this Act, the *Magistrates of Burghs* are required to meet on the last Tuesday of April and the last Tuesday of October, in each year, to consider the applications for License certificates within burgh ; and the *Justices of Peace* on the first Tuesday of May and last Tuesday of October, in the county, with power to adjourn for seven lawful days after each meeting. The applications must be lodged, and a fee of 2s. paid, ten days previous to such meeting ; and the Magistrates and Justices are restricted from granting Certificates except at these statutory periods. The Justices are also empowered to divide their counties into districts, for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of the act.—The following is the Perth District of the County, as appointed by the Quarter-Sessions on the 20th September, 1828, viz. Aberdalgie, Abernethy, Arngask, Dunbarny, Dron, Dunning, Forgandenny, Forteviot, Findogask, Kinnoull, Methven, Moneydie, Redgorton, Rhynd, Scone, Tippermuir, Perth.

## LICENSING COURTS.

First Tuesday of May and last Tuesday of October ; and Quarter Sessions for hearing appeals in Licensing cases, held at Perth on the last Friday of May and third Friday of November. Applications for Licenses must be lodged, according to a printed form (to be had of the booksellers), with the clerk ten days before the meeting, and appeals must be lodged within ten days before the court.
