N.B.—The Office shuts immediately after the arrival of the Mails, and continues so about half-an-hour, during which time no paid letters are taken in.

MONEY ORDERS.

MONEY ORDERS are issued and paid in Perth from 9 to 1, and from 2 to 6 o'clock every lawful day. The commission on orders for any sum not exceeding £2, is *threepence*; above £2, and not exceeding £5, *sixpence*.

In cases where personal attendance is inconvenient, if the order is received by the person to whom it is made payable, and the party presenting it for payment can afford full information as to the christian name, surname, address, and occupation of the person who originally obtained the Order, payment will be made; but unless these conditions are strictly complied with, it will be refused.

RATES OF POSTAGE.

INLAND LETTERS not exceeding half an ounce, are charged 1d.

Exceeding half an ounce, but not exceeding 1 ounce, . . 2d.

„ 1 ounce, „ 2 ounces, . 4d.

„ 2 ounces, „ 3 ounces, . 6d.

And so on, an additional 2d. for every additional ounce. Unstamped letters are charged double postage on delivery. Those insufficiently stamped, double the amount of such insufficiency. Addresses to Her Majesty, and Petitions to Parliament, pass free, if under thirty-two ounces, and in covers open at the ends.

MODE OF PAYMENT.

LETTERS, &c., may be prepaid either by cash labels or covers.—That is to say, there are 1d. and 2d. adhesive labels, which being stuck on the face of the letter, may be used to represent so much money. There are also 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ d. and 2 $\frac{1}{4}$ d. envelopes subject to the same regulation except as to the farthing.

Stamps (provided they cover the whole postage), may also be used on Foreign, Colonial, and Ship Letters, &c., outwards. If any letter, however, addressed to places beyond sea to which prepayment is compulsory, shall bear an insufficient number of *stamps*, it will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, to be returned in all practicable cases to the writer.

ADHESIVE STAMPS AND ENVELOPES.

Stamps may be used to pay Foreign or Colonial Letters *outwards*, but care must be taken that, by the addition of such Stamps, the Letters do not exceed the weight intended to be paid for. In those cases in which the value of stamps on the letters is less than the amount of postage chargeable, they will be treated as unpaid letters and the stamps become forfeited; and where they cannot be forwarded as unpaid letters, and the stamps become forfeited, they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, and opened and returned to the writer for the proper postage.

These regulations will be applicable to newspapers in those cases where they are liable to postage.

REGISTERED LETTERS.

All letters, whether containing coin or not, can be *registered* on payment of a registration fee of sixpence. A printed acknowledgment torn out of the receipt book, and stamped with the office stamp, will be given to any person registering a letter. Registered letters will be taken until within half-an-hour of the closing of the box for the particular mail with which they are to be despatched.

In the case of Foreign, Colonial, or Ship Letters, it must be clearly understood that registration cannot extend beyond the port of despatch in the United Kingdom, and the office does not engage for the security of any registered foreign, colonial, or ship letters, longer than while the contents of the mail shall be in the custody of the British Post Office. Letters, however, addressed to France, and letters passing through France, are exceptions to this rule—the French Post-Office undertaking to provide for their security till they shall have been delivered, if addressed to France, and so long as they remain in the French territory, if passing through France

N.B.—Postage of registered letters must in all cases be paid in stamps.

SHIP LETTERS.

The single uniform rate on Letters between the United Kingdom and places beyond sea, when conveyed by Private ship, is 8d. under half-an-ounce, and so on, in whatever part of the United Kingdom the letter may be posted or delivered. Letters intended to be conveyed by 'Private Ship,' should be so addressed.

NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS, SEAMEN, AND SOLDIERS, IN HER MAJESTY'S SERVICE ABROAD.

Letters to seaman and soldiers may be forwarded by post at the rate of one penny each, under the following regulations:—1. The penny must be paid at the time the letter is put into the Post-Office. 2. The direction must signify the class of seaman or soldier. 3. The name of the ship, regiment, or corps to which he belongs. 4. The letter must not exceed half-an-ounce, and be upon their private concerns only.

Letters for seamen and soldiers, whether in her Majesty's or in the East India Company's military or naval service (while on actual service), may be forwarded under the foregoing regulations to India, China, &c., *via* Southampton:—They can now be sent to India, *via* Marseilles, on payment of the British rate of 1d. besides the French rate of 5d. if under one-fourth of an ounce, or 10d. exceeding that weight, or to any foreign country on payment of the foreign rate of postage, in addition to the British rate of 1d. as above.

Letters for seamen and soldiers forwarded by private ships (with the following exceptions:—St. Helena, East Indies, New South Wales, Cape of Good Hope, and Mauritius), are charged 3d. each. Soldiers' and seamen's letters are not liable to any additional postage upon re-direction.

NEWSPAPERS AND SUPPLEMENTS TO NEWSPAPERS.

It is not compulsory to send Newspapers, or Supplements to Newspapers, by the Post; but those that are intended to be so transmitted are entitled to pass free. All Newspapers must be sent in covers, open at the sides, and no words or communication may be printed on such papers after the same shall have been published; nor must there be any writing or marks upon any newspapers, or the cover, other than the name and address of the person to whom it is sent; nor any paper or thing enclosed or concealed in, or with such Newspaper or the cover, nor any printed words or communication on the cover, except that Newsvenders ONLY may PRINT their names and addresses thereon. Newspapers may be examined by the officers of the Post-Office; and if there be any breach of the above regulations, the packet is chargeable with the amount of postage to which a letter of the same weight would have been liable to.

Newspapers pass free by the Local Posts, except in those cases where they shall be posted and delivered within the limits, for the time being, of the Post Delivery, when the Postage is one penny on each Newspaper.

All Newspapers going abroad must be sent in covers, open at the ends, and put into any *Post-Office* within seven days after the day of publication.

Hereafter, any writing or marks will be allowed on a Newspaper passing by post, between one part of the United Kingdom and another, provided that a Postage of one penny be prepaid, by means of a stamp, conspicuously outside the cover or folded Newspaper, it being understood that, in those cases where the Newspaper may be liable to Postage irrespective of such writing or marks (as when it is both posted and delivered in the same town), the Penny Stamp shall cover the writing and the postage also. But this privilege is to be confined to writing or marks on the Newspaper itself, and is not to extend to the cover, which, as heretofore, must contain nothing but the address.

Any writing or marks, other than the address on the cover, or (if the Postage be not prepaid as above) on the Newspaper itself, will subject the Newspaper to the same rate of Postage as that to which an Unpaid Letter of the same weight is liable.

Newspapers to or from the Colonies and parts abroad will continue liable to a treble rate of Postage when written upon, or when containing enclosures.

LETTERS NOT TO BE SEALED WITH WAX WHEN SENT TO WARM CLIMATES.

The practice of sealing letters which pass to and from the East Indies, and other warm climates, with wax, leads to much inconvenience and delay, as well as injury to the letters, notwithstanding the greatest care is taken to separate them, in consequence of the melting of the wax, and adhesion of letters to each other. The public, therefore, are recommended, in all such cases, to use wafers instead of wax, and to advise their correspondents to do the same.

LETTERS NOT TO BE DELIVERED BACK.

To prevent the possibility of Letters being surreptitiously obtained from the Offices where put in, office-keepers are strictly forbid returning, to any person whomsoever, letters that may be applied for, under whatever circumstances the recovery may be urged. This is, moreover, forbid by the established principle, that the instant a letter is committed to the Post-Office, it is no longer the property of the sender.

NEW LICENSING SYSTEM.

The granting of Licenses is now regulated by the Act 9 George IV., cap 58, entitled "An act to regulate the granting of Certificates by Justices of the Peace and Magistrates, authorising persons to keep common inns, ale-houses, and victualling houses, in Scotland, in which ale, beer, spirits, wine, and other exciseable liquors, may be sold by retail under Excise Licenses, and for the better regulation of such houses, and for the preventing of such houses being kept without such Certificates." By this Act, the *Magistrates of Burghs* are required to meet on the last Tuesday of April and the last Tuesday of October, in each year, to consider the applications for License certificates within burgh; and the *Justices of Peace* on the first Tuesday of May and last Tuesday of October, in the county, with power to adjourn for seven lawful days after each meeting. The applications must be lodged, and a fee of 2s. paid, ten days previous to such meeting; and the Magistrates and Justices are restricted from granting Certificates except at these statutory periods. The Justices are also empowered to divide their counties into districts, for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of the act.—The following is the Perth District of the County, as appointed by the Quarter-Sessions on the 20th September 1828, viz. Aberdalgie, Abernethy, Arngask, Dunbarny, Dron, Dunning, Forgandenny, Forteviot, Findogask, Kinnoull, Methven, Moneydie, Redgorton, Rhynd, Scone, Tippermuir, Perth.

LICENSING COURTS.

First Tuesday of May and last Tuesday of October; and Quarter Sessions for hearing appeals in Licensing cases, held at Perth on the last Friday of May and third Friday of November. Applications for Licenses must be lodged, according to a printed form (to be had of the booksellers), with the clerk ten days before the meeting, and appeals must be lodged within ten days before the court.

DUTIES OF THE PORT AND HARBOUR OF PERTH.

RATES AND DUTIES ACCORDING TO THE TONNAGE.

For every Vessel, Ship, Boat, Bark, or Lighter, for every time it comes to the Port or Harbour of Perth, and within the Limits set forth in the Act, to receive or discharge a cargo, or part of a cargo :—

If not registered at any port of the United Kingdom, 4½d. per Register ton.

If Registered at any port of the United Kingdom, 3d. per Register Ton.

If only employed in carrying goods or other commodities to or from Dundee, or other ports or places in the River Tay, 3d. per Register ton.

For every Steam Vessel employed in the River Tay in carrying passengers and their luggage exclusively, which shall enter or leave the said port or harbour within the limits set forth in the Act, ½d. per ditto.

For every vessel remaining at the harbour or quays of Perth more than six months, one third more of the above dues ; so remaining one year, double the above dues ; and the above rates for every six months it shall so remain beyond one year.

Boats employed solely in conveying salmon and grilse from fishings in the Tay to Perth to be exempted.

One Boll of Coals, weighing 40 stones, Dutch weight, carried from the Coal Shore to the Meal Vennel end, South Street, to any part of the Watergate, to the High Street below the Cross, to the Kirkgate, Kirkside, George Street, and Bridge Lane, inclusive, or to the Vennels or Houses within these bounds, shall pay of Carriage $2\frac{1}{2}$ d., or $4\frac{1}{2}$ d. for two Bolls.

One Boll of Coals, to, and within the Meal Vennel, above the Meal Vennel to the South Street Port, above the Cross to the north end of the Meal Vennel on both sides of the Street, exclusive of the Hammerman's Land, to the Skinnergate, Castle Gable, and Charlotte Street, 3d. of Carriage, or $5\frac{1}{2}$ d. for two Bolls.

One Boll of Coals, to any place within the liberties of the Town, beyond the limits mentioned, to pay $3\frac{1}{2}$ d., or 6d. for two Bolls; and if Coals are carried from the New Shore, or Lime Shore, to any of the above-mentioned places, one penny per Boll more.

Chew, or Small Coals, shall pay the same rate of Carriage as Great Coals: $2\frac{1}{2}$ Mets of English to be reckoned equal to 1 Boll of Great Coals; and 3 Bolls of Small Coals or Smithy Scots Coals, equal to 2 Bolls of Great Coals.

The Lords of Her Majesty's Treasury, after a very careful examination into the constitution of the Association, the nature and extent of its guarantee, and the responsibility of its Shareholders, issued a Minute dated 16th February, 1847, "giving their sanction to the Security of the Association being taken for the future, in lieu of bond or deposit of stock, &c., in all cases where the Officer is desirous of availing himself of the same, instead of giving security by bond or deposit, until further directions from this Board. Let letters be written, therefore, to the following Revenue Departments, namely, Customs, Excise, Stamps and Taxes, and Post-Office, conveying the sanction of this Board accordingly, and transmitting to each Department a copy of the printed form of Policy of Guarantee which has been settled and approved of by the Law Officers of the Crown, and which should be made use of in every case where any Officer should be desirous of availing himself of the security of the Association." That Minute has been printed by order of the House of Commons.

The Forms of Policy for the various Departments under the Crown have been settled and approved of by the Law Officers of the Crown.

The Act of Parliament also specially authorises the security of the Association to be taken for the Treasurers, Actuaries, Cashiers, and other officers in Savings' Banks, Poor-Law Commission, Friendly Societies, Loan, Benefit, Government Annuity, and other such Societies, &c., in all which cases the Policies are exempted from Stamp Duty.
