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## PREFACE.

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THE following pages are intended to furnish Teachers with a systematic series of exercises for pupils studying English orthography.

Spelling is understood in two very different senses, the first having reference to the art of *reading*, the second to that of *writing* a language. In the one case the pupil's eye seizes the *forms* of the characters, his tongue pronounces the *sounds* or *powers* which the letters represent; syllables are formed—then words—and thus he *reads*. In the other case, the process is reversed: the mind forms the notion of certain sounds, calls up the alphabetic marks with which they are associated, and then commits these marks to the hand, to be put down on paper in proper number, form, and order, to produce a combination expressive of the desired sound—and thus he *writes*.

It is with the latter process we have now to do. Experience having shown that the once common practice of repeating columns of words is utterly inadequate to the end in view, all schools taught on advanced principles have adopted the method long pursued on the Continent, of giving spelling lessons by dictation—a plan which seems to have

common sense on its side, for it is surely more natural to teach the eye and hand at school, what they will have to perform in the real business of life, than for years to employ the organs of speech in rotting over sounds in a manner never afterwards to be employed.

But though most Teachers will concede the superior advantage of *dictation*, many complain of the impossibility of finding in ordinary books sentences so gradually ascending, as to present no insuperable obstacles when dictated to pupils.

To meet this objection, the following treatise has been compiled—beginning with the most simple words and advancing by gentle degrees to such as are more difficult. The object throughout is utility: hence words in general use are given, and but few technicalities have been introduced. The quotations have been collected from our best writers; so that the usage of each word is duly confirmed by classical authority.

The plan suggested for using the book is this. Let each pupil read a certain portion very carefully; then shut his book, and take his slate. The teacher now *dictates* very slowly the part just read, and the pupils write it distinctly. This done, slates are exchanged—books opened—corrections made—errors marked—and places taken by the pupils according to the accuracy of the work.



## FIRST SERIES OF LESSONS.

He found himself in a sad *dilemma*. What is a *diphthong*? Preserve *discipline*. She was in *dishabille* with *disherelled* hair. You *disobeyed* and were *dismissed*. He was *dispossessed* of his power. Was he *dissatisfied*? I fear you are *dissipated*. Do not *dissuade* me from visiting the *distressed*. Never *domineer* over the weak. I was *oppressed* by *drowsiness*.

5. What *effrontery*! He lives on *eleemosynary* aid. The bankrupt, though honest, was much *embarrassed*. Is he an *emissary* of the *Jesuits*? The *engincer* was *encompassed* with *difficulties*, but his *enthusiasm* never failed. An *escutcheon* was put up. Lock your *escritoire*, especially at night. She *exaggerated* that breach of *etiquette*. An *excrescence* grew on the tree. He was *exhausted* by the *exhibition*. Had he much *experience* in *extinguishing* fires? What a *facetious* man! Do not indulge *fallacious* hopes. Man is *fallible*. I was *fascinated* by his manner. The walk was *fatiguing*. The *feathered* tribes begin to sing in *February*. Is this a *field-piece*? Neckar was chief *financier*. The *foreigner* followed him to the *forecastle*. He *forfeited* his master's confidence by *fraudulent* conduct. The soldier had a *furlough*. He *galloped* up the hill.

6. Have you seen the *Gazette*? Few *Gazetteers* are correct. He acted like a *gentleman*. The *gibbet* is not the same as the *gallows*. Tell the

*glazier* to lose no time. The *governess* is gratified. A *glutton* is detested for *greediness*. Lend him a *gridiron*. His air was *grotesque*. Shall I *guarantee* payment? Are you fond of *gymnastics*? He has a *halfpenny* in the *handkerchief*. Ho was *harassed* by a *highwayman*. It *heightened* his distress. This was a *heinous* fault. I read about the Saxon *Hep-tarchy*. Is he a *hosier*? He is in the tenth *hussars*. The boy died of *hydrophobia*. John is a sad *hypocrite*. Is he not a little *hypochondriacal*? He acts *illiberally*. Pay *immediately*. The bill is *inaccessible*.

7. Charles is *indefatigable*. This was an *ingenious* invention. It produced *instantaneous* light. This sum was *insufficient*. Is he a *Sandwich Islander*? The *jockey's* conduct was *unjustifiable*. The child was *kidnapped*. He received *knighthood*. Is he *lieutenant* in the 92d? I admire this piece of *lithography*. Come to *luncheon*. The *lynx* is fierce. The *maniac* was *unmanageable*. Jerome suffered *martyrdom*. The *Albigenses* were *massacred*. I do not approve of *masquerades*. The child has *measles*. What a *melancholy* story! The lion is in this *menagerie*. This is a *miniature* of the *missionary*. *Michaelmas* day is the 29th September. The *mischievous* boy was punished for his *misdemeanours*.

8. He spoke in *mysterious monosyllables*. *Naphtha* has a *nauseous* odour. *Relieve* your *necessitous* neighbour who is without the *necessaries* of life. The *noblesse* were *obliged* to emigrate. An *official* notice was sent. This state is *opaque*. He suffered from *ophthalmia*. Never use *opprobrious* language. Watch the *oscillations* of the *pendulum*. There were fifty *musicians* in the *orchestra*. Learn this *paraphrase*. He is fearfully *passionate*. The boy was in a *paroxysm* of terror. He admired the *peaceable*

*peasantry*. He sent a *peremptory* order. He is a member of the *philosophical* society. He died of *phthisis*. The two-horned *rhinoceros* lives in Sumatra.

9. There was a grand *pyrotechnic* display at Vauxhall. He was guilty of *pusillanimous* conduct. Was the meeting *quadrennial*? He is *quarrelsome*. The *rendezvous* was near the *reservoir*. The spotted *hyena* is *exceedingly* fierce and *mischievous*, enters the huts of *Hottentots* and carries off the children. *Lettuce*, *parsley*, *celery*, and *asparagus*, are well known as *agreeable* food. The two nations being of *congenial* habits, springing from a common origin, and speaking *cognate* tongues, readily *coalesced*. The *stratified* rocks are of a *crystalline* character. The *thermometer* is an *ingenious* instrument for ascertaining the *temperature* of the *atmosphere*. The *electric telegraph* is an *astounding* invention. The *phenomena* of *electricity* are produced by *friction*, by *heat*, by *magnets*, or by *chemical* action. The *extraction* of *carburetted hydrogen* gas from coal for the purpose of *illumination*, is a *splendid triumph* of modern science. The *potato*, *cabbage*, *carrot*, *beet-root*, *onion*, and *cassava*, are *esculent vegetables*. *Cabbage*, *cauliflower*, and *broccoli*, form a family of plants called *Brassica* by botanists.
