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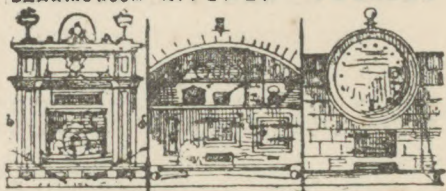
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COMPILERS' NOTE.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES.

WILLIAM ADAM.

Deceased was one of the fast-diminishing brotherhood who, as Chartists, bred dismay in the land at one time, but who had lived to be looked upon as, in most instances, the embodiment of integrity and truth. And William Adam was one of the best of his class. In early life he was bred to the calling of a rope-spinner, but being somewhat affected with asthma, he was unable to bear the dust generated in that occupation, and finally gave it up. For the past fifteen years or so he has



been timekeeper with Messrs. Ogston & Sons, soap manufacturers. He was a man of much more than ordinary intelligence. By dint of hard, persevering study in his younger days, he amassed a large store of information which he turned to good account in the days of the Chartist propaganda—a movement that he early joined, and in which he took an enthusiastic part. As the Chartist movement faded, William gradually ceased to mix in public matters, but, as a life-long total abstainer, he continued to

show an interest in temperance and Rechabite work, and gave many an intelligent lecture and paper to help on the good work. For nearly thirty years he was a member of St. Nicholas U.P. Church.—*Daily Free Press*.

JOHN AIRTH, *late Assessor*.

A native of Brechin, deceased was educated at the Grammar School and University here, after which he joined the Inland Revenue service in Edinburgh in 1858. Having served there for some time, he returned to Aberdeen as assistant assessor, and subsequently served in Kirkwall and elsewhere in a like capacity. In March, 1880, Mr. Airth was appointed surveyor and assessor for Aberdeenshire, and that position he occupied till May, 1890, when he left for Glasgow, when, from his conspicuous ability, he was raised from a 3rd rate to a 1st rate grade in the service. Deceased was an English Churchman, and when in Aberdeen was a member of St. John's. Although he did not take any active part in politics, he was a staunch Conservative, and watched with interest the course of political events in the country. He was a man of most genial temperament, and was of a kind, obliging, and generous disposition. In business life he was fair-minded and judicious, and won the respect of all those with whom he came in contact throughout the county. Mr. Airth was about 56 years of age, and was a widower, his wife having predeceased him about eight years. He leaves no family.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

WM. SMITH ANDERSON, M.A.

A native of Aberchirder, the deceased received the greater part of his education at the Old Town

Grammar School. Thereafter he entered King's College, and graduated in 1887. Adopting the profession of teaching, he acted for two years with much success as one of the masters in Gordon's College. From there he went to Fordyce Public School, but his health giving way, he was forced to retire.—*Northern Daily News*.

Mrs. BAIN, *Ferryhill Lodge*.

The deceased was a lady of good family in Wales, who early in life devoted herself to the improvement of the education of women; and, settling in London, became the head of one of the large higher-class educational institutions in the West-End to which many of the upper-class families sent their daughters to receive a culture entirely unknown to a past generation. On the list of governors were some of the most prominent educationists of the day, in Parliament and out of it. Among the ladies with whom she thus became acquainted were Mrs. John Stuart Mill, Jane Welsh Carlyle, and George Eliot. The interests of her early life survived her marriage with Dr. Bain, and during her long residence in Aberdeen she was intimately connected with the different ladies' clubs and associations that have had for their object the elevation of the education of women. She has also taken the deepest interest in the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, and some years ago formed a juvenile band, among whom she circulated literature having for its aim the early cultivation of kindness to dumb animals. She was long a member of the Executive of the parent Society, and took an active share in committee work. Mrs. Bain was a lady of wide reading and quick intelligence, and during her husband's tenure of office, first as professor and afterwards as Lord Rector, delighted to gather around her the most promising and intelligent of art students, whose

after careers she followed with the liveliest interest. The deceased lady was a woman of markedly distinctive character. She had written several articles on domestic subjects, and had also contributed to encyclopædical literature.—*Daily Free Press*.

A. C. BARKER.

The deceased, who was 73 years of age, was a native of Woodside. In early life he proceeded to America, where for some years he was engaged in business with an uncle. Returning home he, about 1843, became a partner of the firm of John Barker and Sons, who for about ten years carried on the business of woollen manufacturers at Gordon's Mills, formerly occupied by Messrs. William Pirie and Co. The firm, it may be mentioned, was the first to introduce the power-loom into the manufacture of winceys, and fancy coloured merino worsted in imitation of Berlin worsted. On leaving Gordon's Mills, Mr. Barker, along with his eldest brother James, carried on a commercial and commission business for some years. He took a great interest in a large number of benevolent institutions in Aberdeen. He was a director under the old *regime* of the Aberdeen Industrial Schools Association, and latterly continued to manifest a deep interest in the management of these institutions under the new order for their administration. He was a *connoisseur* in art, and occasionally wrote on the subject. In musical matters he also took a special interest; and in 1880 he showed the poetical bent of his mind by the publication of a volume of poems, entitled "Fifty Years' Rhymes and Reminiscences." He was a keen disciple of Izaak Walton, and seldom missed the opportunity of whipping the waters. He was for many years a leading member of the Baptist Church, formerly in John Street and now in Crown

Terrace, and wrote from time to time in defence of the views of the Baptist denomination. Mr. Barker married a daughter of Dr. Souter, Old Aberdeen, by whom he was predeceased several years ago.—*Daily Free Press*.

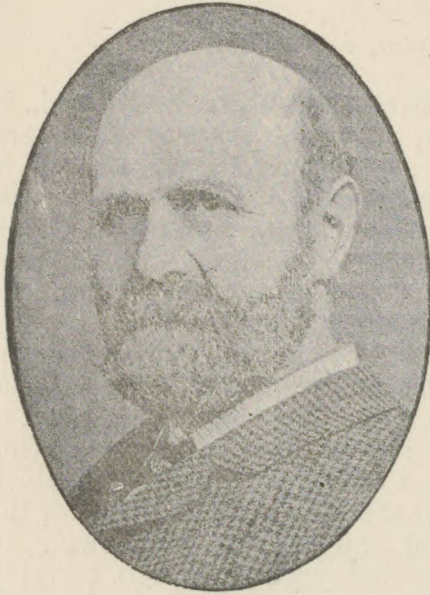
JOHN BEATON, *late of Balmoral.*

A native of Mortlach, Banffshire, he entered, in the Disruption year, into the service of Messrs. Macdonald & Leslie, granite merchants, as agent in their London house—that firm having just introduced the Aberdeen granite to the Metropolis. He remained in that position for ten years, when he came to the north to superintend the erection of Balmoral Castle. On the completion of that work, Mr. Beaton was retained by the late Prince Consort as inspector of works and architect. Houses from his plans are now scattered over the three estates of Balmoral, Abergeldie, and Birkhall, two of them being the celebrated Glassalt Shiel and the Dantzic Shiel. He continued to fulfil the duties of this office for the long period of about thirty years, but owing to advancing years he retired some years ago, carrying with him a lively recollection of Her Majesty's unvarying kindness—a circumstance that he often spoke of in his retirement with great feeling. Being of a very quiet and retiring disposition, Mr. Beaton's warm affectionate nature was known to but a few. He was a man of unquestionable ability, but his humility always kept him from putting himself prominently forward. In addition to a thorough knowledge of his own profession, he had an extensive acquaintance with engineering, land surveying, and mathematics. As indicating his persevering character it may be noted that he learned to read French in middle age. He is survived by a son and daughter, the former being in the surveying department of the Inland Revenue, Perth.—*Daily Free Press*.

JAMES H. BISSET, *Builder.*

The deceased gentleman was a son of the late Mr. Peter Bisset, who founded the firm which has

carried out some of the largest building contracts in the north for many years past. When a comparatively young man Mr. James entered into partnership with his father, a connection which was broken only by a short absence in New Zealand. After his return to this country Mr. Bisset practically took charge of the business, and among the more important work in which the



firm engaged was the building of Gilcomston Free Church, Rosemount Parish Church, Aberdeen Jute Works, and Rosemount Provision Works. They also constructed several harbours, including those at Port Erroll and Garmouth; and when the late Miss Duthie gifted Duthie Park to the city, the firm was entrusted with the laying out of the extensive grounds—a task which they performed with excellent taste. In concrete work, Messrs. Bisset & Son did a large business. A man of literary and artistic tastes, and passionately fond of music, Mr. Bisset was an excellent companion in social life, and among a wide circle of friends he was held in high esteem. A Liberal in politics, he took a keen

interest in the fortunes of the great parties in the State, and although he never sought to enter any of the local governing bodies, he closely followed everything pertaining to the welfare of the city. Mr. Bisset was an office-bearer of Free John Knox Church, and took an active and intelligent concern in the affairs of the congregation. Some years ago he purchased the estates of Burnside and Rosehill, and also the remaining portion of the lands of Ruthrieston. Mr. Bisset was a director of the Scottish Employers' Liability Company and of Wm. Bain, Limited. Mr. Bisset was twice married, his second wife being a daughter of Mr. Murray, Springbank Terrace. He had six sons and four daughters, by whom he is survived.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

ALEXANDER CAMPBELL, *late Farmer*.

Mr. Campbell was a native of Aberdeenshire, having been born on the farm of Collonach, in the parish of Drumoak. He began life, after his brief apprenticeship at home, by starting business as a grain merchant in Aberdeen. He did not care for the business, however, and was for a few years at Tillyeve in Udny; and subsequently on the farm of Westertown of Cults. He then entered into a lease of the farm of Blairton, which he held for the full period of 19 years, rearing for a portion of the time a herd of shorthorns, and also keeping a good head of ordinary commercial stock. While he was deeply interested in breeding and in agriculture generally, he had time to devote attention to other matters, and in Belhelvie, so long as he was connected with it, he took a share in conducting the educational affairs of the parish, being a member of the first School Board, and continuing his connection with it until he left Belhelvie, about fifteen years ago. Since that time he has resided in Aberdeen, but he never

lost his deep interest in agricultural affairs. He was one of the most active members of the Royal Northern Agricultural Society, and for many years officiated as Convener of the Gate Committee, his services in this capacity being very highly valued. He devoted himself with all his energy to this particular work, and it will be very difficult to fill his place. In political matters he held advanced Liberal views, and on questions affecting the land he had very strong opinions, which he was able twenty years ago to express with some vigour on public platforms. While on the farm of Tillyeve he met with an accident by being thrown out of a cart, which lamed him for life, but, being naturally of active habits, he continued to move about a good deal until the last. He was much respected by all who knew him. He married a daughter of Mr. Rennie, Mill of Coullie, Udney, who still survives. His only daughter was married to Mr. William Davidson, grain merchant, Inverurie, but she died in 1863. His only son, Dr. Alexander Campbell, is a medical practitioner in Dundee.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

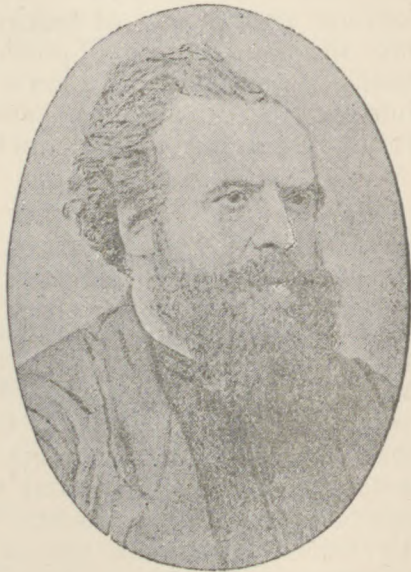
ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL, *Solicitor*.

Deceased was a native of Inveraray, where his father was governor of the prison. After receiving his education he entered the office of the firm of solicitors in Glasgow now known as Messrs. Macgregor, Donald, and Co. Here he was trained in legal business, and after passing his examinations, he continued in that firm up to 1860, when he came to Aberdeen as manager of the firm of Messrs. J. & R. Ligertwood, advocates. On the dissolution of this firm in 1884, Mr. Campbell started business on his own account, and, being a shrewd man of business, he soon acquired a good practice. Mr. Campbell was a widower, and is survived by two sons and a

daughter. His eldest son is agent for the Caledonian Bank at Blantyre, while his second son is Mr. D. Harlinge Campbell, the well-known local elocutionist. Deceased was a man of genial disposition, and possessed a rich fund of humour, which made him a general favourite with a large circle of friends.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

ALEXANDER CLERIH EW.

Deceased was an assistant in the clothiery establishment of Messrs. Blackhall & Co., Union Street, and being a member of the West Church choir, under Mr. Alexander Colston, when the Disruption occurred in 1843, that gentleman sent him to fill the vacancy in the precentorship of the South Church, then held with distinction by Mr. William Anderson, who, to use the familiar phrase, "went out" with the South congregation. Clerihew, at that date, was quite a youthful looking lad; the possessor of a remarkably fine tenor voice—full and bright in tone, and of much compass; while he could read music at sight with ready aptitude. Indeed, so competent was Sandy Clerihew as a "part singer," that when he let the strength of his voice prevail—say, at flattening passages—he could



actually give colour to the whole harmony of the choir seat, and so bring wanderers from tune into healthy form. It is possible these lines may engage the eye of a good many who still have pleasant remembrances of the manly, telling manner in which Mr. Clerihew used to declaim the noble solo "Great God, what do I see and hear," from the front gallery of the East Church in connection with the performances of the choir of 160 voices, who, conducted by Mr. William Carnie, were the pioneers of the Aberdeen Psalmody improvement crusade away back in the sixties. Though not coming for a considerable period prominently into public view, Mr. Clerihew continued till very recently his musical labours in the line of teaching classes, for to the last he retained no small portion of his hey-day vocal skill. 'Twas ever and anon a welcome treat to hear him warble Tom Moore's beautiful song, "This earth is the planet for you, love, and me."—*Daily Free Press*.

WILLIAM COOPER.

Mr. Cooper commenced business in 1832, having as partners at the time Mr. William Philip, Jun., and Mr. James Robertson. In 1834, however, the firm became known as Philip & Cooper, and ever since then has carried on business under that title. He never, during his long and worthy citizenship of Aberdeen, came prominently before the public, but his firm was one of the best known and most respected in the city. Mr. Cooper is survived by two daughters—his wife, who was a Miss Moir, daughter of the tenant of Knockhill, Foveran, having predeceased him some years ago. Mr. Cooper is also survived by his aged partner, Mr. Philip. Both gentlemen have borne no little share in the commercial prosperity of Aberdeen, and were, on

the attainment of their business jubilee, presented by their friends with gifts commemorative of the interesting occasion. Mr. Cooper was a member of the Free East Church.—*Daily Free Press*.

Dr. JAMES CORBET.

Deceased, who was a son of the late Mr. William Corbet, of Beildside, graduated in medicine at the University of Aberdeen. When only about 21 years of age he received an appointment in the service of the Hon. the East India Company, and at once proceeded to Bengal. He remained on the staff for the full period, a considerable portion of his life having been thus spent in the service of the company at a time when it took a prominent part in making history. During his residence in India, Dr. Corbet was appointed a political resident by the Government, and had control of an opium manufactory at Patma. He returned to this country in 1849, after an absence of 23 years, and took up his residence at Bieldside. For a number of years he was a justice of the peace for the county, and regularly attended the Quarter Sessions. He was also a director of the Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, but otherwise took no prominent part in public life. Dr. Corbet married Miss Gibb, by whom he was predeceased, and had a son and four daughters. His son, who was a minister of the Church of Scotland, died at a comparatively early age. Of the daughters, one is married to the Rev. Gavin Lang, Inverness; another to Mr. Elliot, a gentleman who was in the service of the East India Company; while another, who died some time ago, was married to Mr. John Whyte, advocate, Aberdeen. Dr. Corbet, who was a brother of the late Rev. Adam Corbet, Drumoak, was 87 years of age.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

JAMES CRAN.

Mr. Cran was a native of the parish of Inverkeithny, Banffshire, and was born in the early years



of the century, having attained the ripe age of eighty. He entered the Aberdeenshire police force in the year 1843. The force—which at first was organised as a mounted constabulary—had then been in existence for little over a couple of years; and when the deceased joined it, the two last of the mounted men were just being disbanded, and the number in the force then stood at 24 men on foot. As Mr. Cran himself once

stated—"It was no sinecure in those days being a police constable. The community had been all along accustomed to 'use and wont,' and when the police began to take cognisance of brawls at markets and putting in force the Road Acts, &c., they were declared not only by the 'rag-tag,' but by the general public to be more trouble than they were worth, and what with old drunken dragoons as policemen—and disappointed sheriff-officers—it was really uphill work for the new police. The tables, however, shortly turned by the farmers' opinions being asked about the police, and this was the first grand step towards popularity. At last the county gentlemen and the villagers began to vie with each other which of them would be successful in obtaining a resident policeman, until, before the new Act came into operation, the force had increased to 42." During ten or twelve years of his time—to recur again to his own statement—"the principal duties of the police were to rid the county of vagrants and tinkers, who were at that time very numerous, and in great bands of twenty to thirty in a crew. In the beginning of my time, the 'spengie' switch by day and the oaken staff by night (well shod) were the two principal supports of the police force—indeed, if a policeman was not pretty swift, and could not use these instruments very freely, he could not hold his own at all." The Act referred to by Mr. Cran was passed, we think, in 1858, and since that time the force—which now numbers nearly a hundred men—has immensely improved, both in physique and in capacity, having been for many years a sort of nursery for police forces in all parts of the country.

Mr. Cran rose steadily in the profession till he became Superintendent and Deputy Chief Constable. On the occasion of his completing forty years' service—in April, 1883—he was presented with a testimonial (a gold watch and chain, &c.) by the members of the force, as a token of the high esteem

entertained for him. The presentation was made by Major Ross, the Chief Constable, who appropriately referred to the deceased as the "father of the police in the county," he being its oldest member. Mr. Cran retired from the force a little over a year ago. It may be said of him that, while he was by a good many years the oldest, he was beyond all question one of the most faithful and most capable public servants ever in the employment of the county of Aberdeen. Always watchful, always at the post of duty, a singularly modest, yet perfectly firm-willed, straightforward, and even-tempered man, he had for many a day been a father to the men who were under him, and not a few of whom have had occasion to regard him with gratitude for the shrewd and judicious counsels by which he sought to improve their efficiency as constables or promote their advancement to higher positions.

Mr. P. M. Cran, the City Chamberlain, is his son.

Rev. Dr. DAVIDSON, *Inverurie.*

A native of Aberdeen, Dr. Davidson was educated in that city, and graduated at the University. After completing his divinity course he was for some time engaged in teaching, and was ordained in 1844 as assistant and successor to the Rev. Robert Lessel, Inverurie, who died in 1853 at the patriarchal age of 95. During the long period of his ministry he proved himself to be an able and faithful parish minister; but his mind being of a philosophical cast his qualities appeared to greater advantage in connection with historical and literary research than they did in the pulpit. At a comparatively early period of his ministry, he published a work entitled, "Belief: what is it?" which showed philosophical insight and considerable literary power, and was very favourably

reviewed at the time of its appearance. Dr. Davidson's great work, however, was his history of "Inverurie and the Earldom of the Garioch," which, appearing first in an ephemeral and serial shape, was consolidated and presented in the form of a portly volume in 1878. Antiquarian and scientific subjects had a special charm for the doctor, and in 1885 he read a most interesting paper before the British Association on that peculiar mound known as the "Bass of Urie." The result of his investigations was to show that this curious conical mound was of alluvial origin, and mainly caused by successive deposits of sand brought down by the Don and the Urie.

In the burgh and parish of Inverurie, Dr. Davidson naturally took the deepest interest, and he was particularly skilled in its history, as his learned work on the earldom abundantly showed, and with reference to which, it may be further noted, Mr. Leslie Stephen has said that, if the work erred at all, it erred on the lines of the school of "infinitesimal research."

On the 2nd of March, 1869, he received the distinction of being made an honorary burgess of the burgh as a mark of the council's respect, and of appreciation of the eminent services rendered by him in connection with the delineation of the Royalty boundaries on the Ordnance Survey plans. Still later, a further honour was paid to him by the presentation, in November, 1889, of his portrait, to be retained in the Council Room of the burgh. It bears the inscription—"Rev. John Davidson, D.D., minister of Inverurie, from 1844 to ——. Author of 'Inverurie and the Earldom of the Garioch.'" In 1877 the degree of D.D. was conferred upon him by the University of Aberdeen in recognition of his treatise on "Belief," and in consideration of his general services to the Church.

For many years Dr. Davidson officiated as chaplain to the 4th Volunteer Battalion Gordon

Highlanders, only retiring from the post a few years ago. In general parish work he took a warm interest, and on the death of the late Mr. Gordon of Manar, in 1874, he became chairman of the Parochial Board. He was the first chairman of the School Board of Inverurie, and held that position till his death. In the capacity of president of the Savings Bank he acted for a good many years, and indeed it may be said that in everything pertaining to the good of the burgh he was always to the front. It may not be out of place to mention that he was a very enthusiastic Free Mason. He was a Past Master of St. Anthony's Lodge, and was, in recognition of his services, presented with his portrait, which hangs in the Lodge. In politics he was a staunch Conservative, although he never obtruded his views at political meetings.

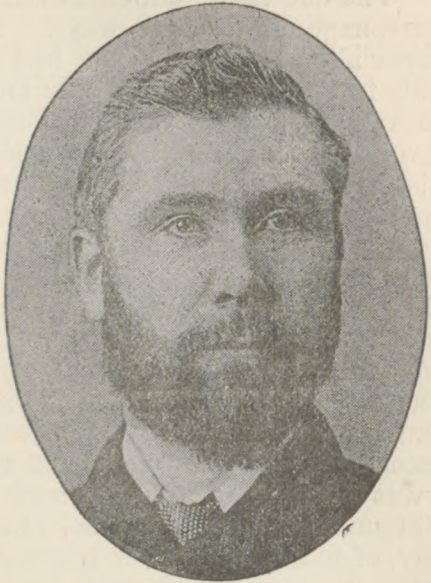
In 1857 Dr. Davidson married the eldest daughter of the late Rev. Dr. Bisset of Bourtie, and granddaughter of the Rev. Mr. Lessel, whom he succeeded; and by his wife and by three sons and five daughters he is survived. His eldest son is Mr. Andrew Davidson, advocate and C.A., Aberdeen, a partner of the firm of Messrs. James Meston & Co. The second son, Mr. James Davidson, is a journalist in Glasgow; and the youngest son, William, holds an engineering appointment in Bombay.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

THOMAS DUNCAN, *Civil Engineer*.

Mr. Duncan was the eldest son of the late Mr. J. Duncan, law stationer in Aberdeen, a well-known citizen in his day. He received his early education at the Grammar School, and afterwards entered for the Arts course at King's College. Possessed of a keen and active intellect, and of untiring energy, he promised to take a high place in his classes, but the

career of the civil engineer had for him a specially strong attraction, and claimed him ere he had fulfilled the usual academic course.

He served his apprenticeship in the office of the late Mr. James Forbes Beattie, land surveyor. Subsequently he became principal assistant in the office—now of the firm of Messrs. Walker & Beattie. Some five years ago, he became a partner in the firm of Messrs. Duncan & Ironside, engineers & surveyors, Bridge Street, which carried



on business for four years, and in April last was merged in the firm of Messrs. Walker & Duncan. Even at his early age, Mr. Duncan had achieved a name and reputation in his profession. In addition to being a member of the Institute of Civil Engineers, he was a Fellow of the Institute of Surveyors. He had an extensive practice in engineering, particularly in agricultural work, all over the north of Scotland, and in connection with the firm of Walker & Beattie, he carried out a very great deal of work in the Hebrides for the Crofter Commission. Nine months ago Mr. Duncan married the youngest daughter of the late Dr. Moir, Union Place, by whom he is survived.—*Daily Free Press*.

Rev. DAVID DURWARD, *Maryculter.*

The deceased gentleman was rather a remarkable personage in several ways. As a scholar, and especially as a linguist, he had a reputation second only to that of the late Rabbi Duncan, he being able to talk fluently in seven different languages. His favourite study, however, was French literature and history, and he made frequent trips to Paris, his last visit to the French capital being undertaken when he was in his 84th year. As a preacher, his services were often in demand, although his style was of the old school. He possessed an extensive library, which includes a collection of volumes of French memoirs. Deceased was of a brusque manner, but was kind-hearted, and won many friends. Mr. Durward was an untiring pedestrian, and until the occurrence of a paralytic stroke about two years ago, it was his constant habit to walk into Aberdeen from Maryculter for the purpose, after his old-fashioned way, of making his own purchases. He was never married.—*Aberdeen Journal.*

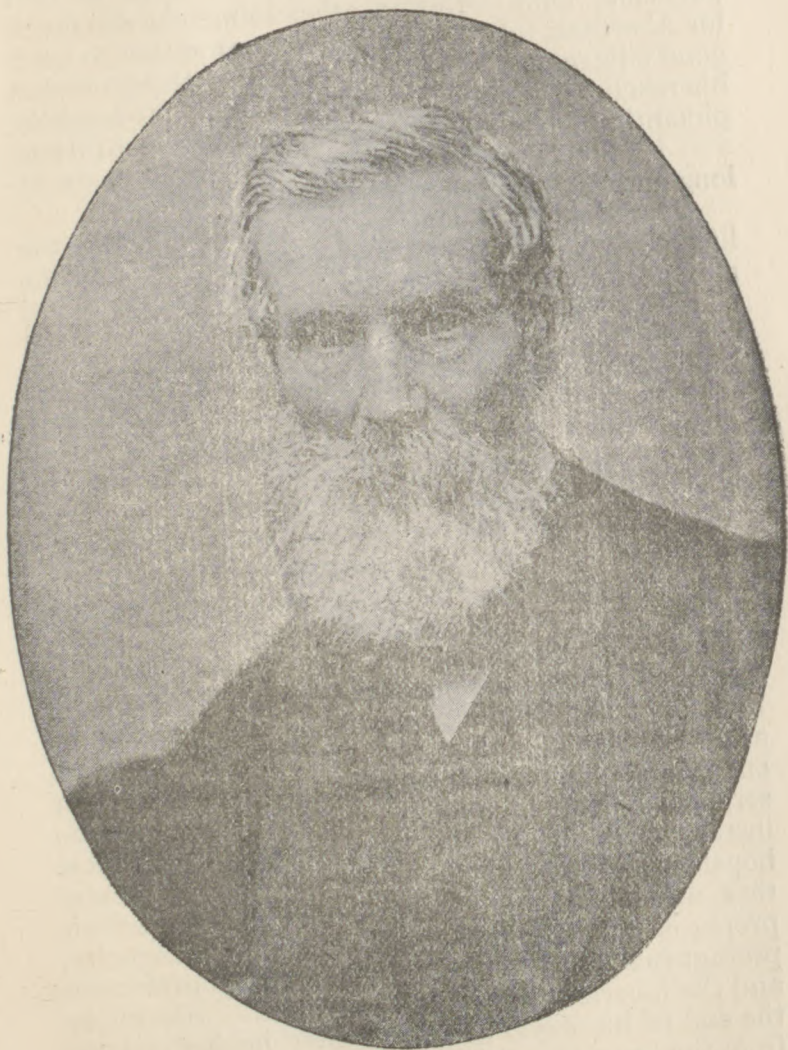
Dr. EDMOND, *of Kingswells.*

Francis Edmond was born in Aberdeen on the 12th November, 1805. His father was a cartwright, whose place of business was in West North Street. His mother was a sister of William Paul, Professor of Natural Philosophy in King's College, and an aunt of the late Dr. William Paul, of Banchory-Devenick. Francis was educated in his native city, his long and honourable career was spent in it, his strongest personal interests were connected with it. He took great pride in Aberdeen, and was eager to forward its prosperity. He never saw his way, indeed, to enter the Town Council, nor did he

undertake any civic office. He had neither the inclination nor the time for public work of that particular kind. But in other things he did much for Aberdeen. It was his life-long ambition to be a good citizen, and to serve the town in things within his reach. By good counsel and by a far-reaching philanthropy he put his mark upon its institutions and its life in forms which will make his name be long and gratefully remembered.

The events of his life are soon told. It was the life of a strenuous man of business, a lover of his native town, and a friend of every charitable and Christian cause. On the completion of the usual course of general education, he gave himself to the study of law. The mental acuteness and force of character for which he was remarkable appeared at a very early period, and he discovered a great aptitude for the profession which he had chosen. In 1829 he was admitted a member of the Society of Advocates, and soon secured an influential position among the lawyers and writers of this part of the land. His clear head, his rare precision, his unrelenting industry, his unflinching punctuality, won him a foremost place, and speedily made him the head of one of the largest legal businesses in the North of Scotland. His advice and help were sought by many at a distance from Aberdeen, and his services were engaged for cases of the greatest difficulty and most serious issue. It would be easy to mention instances in which the disentangling of almost hopeless complications and the recovery of monies that were in danger of being alienated from their proper destination, were mainly due to his sagacity, promptitude, and insistence. He loved his profession and the laborious life which it involved. Almost to the end of his days, and long after he had retired from the important firm of which he was so long the head, he retained his interest in it, and continued his work to such extent as was possible.

Devoted as he was to his business, however, he did not allow it to usurp all his attention or become an excuse for neglecting other claims. He gave much of his time and care to charitable works. The benevolent institutions of the city found in him an active and generous friend. The Royal Infirmary and the Hospital for the Relief of Persons suffering from Incurable Diseases lay specially near his heart. He helped them largely by his means, and took a close personal interest in them. As long as his physical ability made it possible, he was a visitor of the latter Hospital. Other charitable institutions of the city enjoyed his liberal support. And not these alone, but institutions of another kind—the University, the Public Library, and many others, had in him a wise and generous benefactor. He had at all times a high sense of public duty in the matter of liberality. As a man of deep and earnest piety he strove to be a good steward of his means. He was one of the most princely givers that Aberdeen has had in recent times, and it was characteristic of the man that one of the things which most largely occupied him during the last year or two of his life was the investing of sums of money sufficient to secure in perpetuity for many charitable and religious objects the contributions which he had been accustomed to make to them from year to year.

In his religious faith Dr. Edmond was a decided Evangelical, and a munificent friend of the Free Church. Previous to 1843 he was an active elder in the West Church. During the ten years' conflict his sympathies went entirely with Dr. Chalmers and the evangelical clergy of the Church of Scotland. When the Disruption came he left the Established Church along with his pastor and life-long friend, Dr. Alexander Davidson, and at once gave his valuable help to those who had to look out sites and face the erection of new churches. The three Free Churches which were built in Belmont Street were to a large

extent the results of his prompt and decisive action. A cotton factory, belonging to Gordon, Barron, & Co., occupied the site. It had been stopped for some years, and was for sale. On the 17th April, 1843, Dr. Edmond, foreseeing the inevitable result of the Assembly that was to meet a month later, purchased the property, and reported the fact that same day to the Local Committee that had been appointed to attend to matters of the kind. The purchase was confirmed and the buildings were speedily erected in accordance with Archibald Simpson's tasteful designs. Dr. Edmond remained in the Free West Church under the ministry of Dr. Davidson, taking an active part in the eldership and in the work of the congregation, and contributing largely of his means. When the congregation left the old building in Belmont Street, on the occasion of the purchase of the three Free Churches by the Railway Company, and moved westwards, Dr. Edmond went with it. He was the largest subscriber to the fund for building the handsome Church in Union Street, which is now occupied by the congregation of the Free West Church. Some time after Dr. Davidson's death he connected himself with the Free Gilcomston Church, for which congregation he also did great and liberal things.

Dr. Edmond was also one of the first promoters and most generous supporters of the Free Church College in Aberdeen. It may be said, indeed, that but for him it probably would not have existed, or at best would have existed only in a truncated form. The proposal to have a Divinity Hall in Aberdeen found general favour, and Dr. Maclagan was appointed the first professor in 1846, the learned and beloved Marcus Sachs being conjoined with him afterwards as Hebrew tutor. But an unhappy controversy arose over the proposal to make the Hall a fully-equipped college providing a complete curriculum. Dr. Candlish supported the completion of the college. Dr. Cunningham opposed it. The

views of the former triumphed, and by Dr. Edmond's extraordinary energy and rapidity of action and the help of congenial friends the building was erected even before the case was finally settled. The college has been rich in friends, some of whom still live to see the results of their generous efforts and benefactions. But it has had no more constant or open-handed friend than Dr. Edmond. To him it is indebted for a large proportion of its endowments and its bursaries. To him it owes its handsome library hall, its mission house, and much else. In him both students and professors have had all through his life one of the wisest, truest, and most helpful friends.

Dr. Edmond's liberality expended itself on many other things. He was the chief promoter and erector of the Free Church of Kingswells. He built the Denburn Mission Church which was connected with Dr. Davidson's congregation. He helped many of the local congregations in their different enterprises and needs, and he considerably met appeals which came to him week after week from all ends of Scotland. To the Sustentation Fund, the Education Fund, and the great Mission schemes of the Free Church he was one of the largest contributors.

As a general rule he did not take an active part in the business of the Assemblies. But on certain occasions he departed from his usual practice. He did so in the College Controversy, and in some later discussions of importance. He did so in the Robertson Smith case, throwing himself with all the energy of his strong nature into the defence of the impeached professor and the cause of liberty. In other respects, as in the matter of instrumental music, that of changes of posture in worship, and the like, his instincts were conservative.

For many years he acted as Factor for Marischal College. On the union of the Colleges he became legal adviser to the University of Aberdeen, and his

services to his *Alma Mater* were recognised by the conferring of the degree of LL.D., in 1881.

In the latter portion of his life he resided part of the year at Kingswells. This interesting property, lying some four miles west of Aberdeen, was acquired by him in 1854. It belonged to the famous Quaker family of the Jaffrays. This family produced some remarkable members. Among these may be specially named Alexander Jaffray, the author of the "Diary," a notable man, who was Provost of Aberdeen in 1649 and again in 1651. This Alexander Jaffray figured on some important historical occasions. He attended the Coronation of Charles I. at Edinburgh, thereafter journeying to London with Jameson, the painter. He was sent twice to Holland to confer with Charles II., and was among those who got the King to subscribe the Covenant. He was wounded in the battle of Dunbar, and sat as member of the Rump. He inclined to Independency rather than to Presbyterianism, and ultimately became a Quaker, for which he was sentenced by Archbishop Sharp to confinement within his own house at Kingswells. For the crime of allowing religious meetings in his house he was dragged sick to Banff and imprisoned for nine months. He was buried at Kingswells in 1673. A house with such associations as those connected with the Jaffray family had an unusual value for Dr. Edmond. He had a great liking for the estate, and a great pride in the old mansion, its gardens, and its grounds.

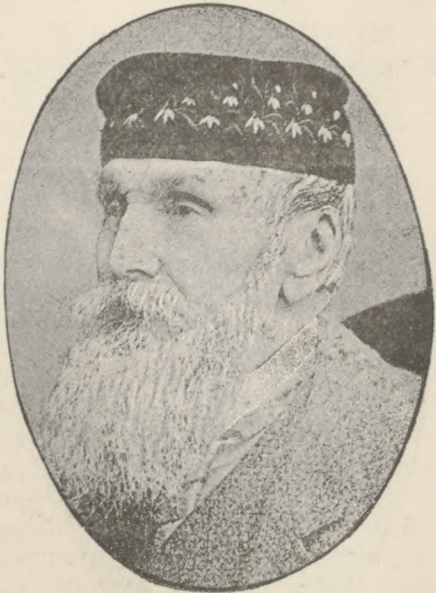
Dr. Edmond was twice married. His first wife died many years ago. His second wife, the widow of Professor Marcus Sachs, survives him. He had heavy afflictions in his family, which consisted of three daughters and five sons. His eldest daughter died long since. His second daughter, the wife of the late Professor Dyce Davidson, also died some years ago. Three of the sons, Alexander, Francis, and John were advocates in Aberdeen. Two sons,

George and Frank, were cut off one after the other. More recently his eldest son, Alexander Edmond of Garthdee, one of the best of our citizens, and one who was looked to for distinguished service to his native town, was sadly unexpectedly lost to us by influenza. There remains only the youngest son, now the head of the business.—*Northern Evening News*.

WILLIAM ESPLIN.

Mr. Esplin, who had reached the advanced age of 84, belonged to Forfarshire, and it was in

connection with the Arbroath and Forfar Railway that he began his career. When the Aberdeen Railway was formed he came north as goods manager, and then on the retirement of Mr. George Reith as general manager, when he was called away to the management of the Grand Trunk Railway in Canada, Mr. Esplin succeeded him as general manager, holding this office

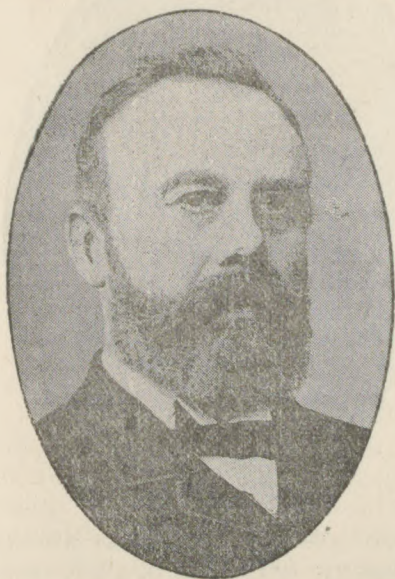


until the amalgamation of the Scottish North-Eastern Railway Company with the Caledonian. Since he ceased his connection with the railway service Mr. Esplin had lived a comparatively retired life, retaining his faculties unimpaired to

the very last. He is survived by his wife and four daughters. One, his eldest daughter, is married to Mr. George Christie Leslie, Abbotsville, Cults. The second daughter is married to Mr. R. C. Gray, S.S.C., Edinburgh; the third is the widow of the late Mr. Peter Clark, advocate; while the fourth is the wife of Mr. John Stewart, Louisville.—*Daily Free Press.*

JOHN FLORENCE, *Granite Merchant.*

Mr. Florence served his apprenticeship as a stonemason in Aberdeen, and also acquired a



knowledge of building work. He was a man of considerable energy and tact, and when with Mr. Bower he commenced the large stonemasonry business in King's Crescent, it was not long ere it came to be one of the foremost in the north. Deceased was a keen politician, and a strong supporter of the Conservative cause, but took no prominent part in public affairs. He was married, and

is survived by Mrs. Florence, but had no family. Mr. Florence was 55 years of age.—*Aberdeen Journal.*

ROBERT C. FULLERTON, *Railway Guard.*

For the long period of 37 years Mr. Fullerton discharged the duties of guard on Deeside, and his stalwart figure was

a familiar one on the route. He was a native of Peterhead, but spent the most of his early years in Laurencekirk. Ultimately he came to Aberdeen, where he served for some time in the city police force. On the opening of the Deeside line he entered the service of the company, then under the management of the late Mr. Ferguson.



On the Great North of Scotland Company taking over the Deeside section, deceased continued to discharge his duties as formerly until four years ago, when he was appointed to the less arduous post of platform inspector. During all the time Mr. Fullerton acted as guard he never met with an accident, and he was regarded as a most careful and painstaking official; and it was no small boast for him to have to say that he was guard of the train which conveyed Her Majesty the Queen and the Prince Consort on their first visit to their Highland home. On many occasions afterwards Mr. Fullerton was selected for duty on the Royal train. Deceased was a man of obliging disposition, well liked, and highly esteemed by the public. He had a high sense of duty, and

was a faithful servant. He leaves a widow and a grown-up family of six.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

Rev. JAMES GAGE, *Glasgow*.

Mr. Gage was a native of Aberdeen, and for a number of years was pastor of the Free Church of Dyce. Mr. Gage, who was about 48 years of age, was a graduate of Aberdeen University, and was ordained at Dyce Free Church in 1871. After labouring in this charge for a number of years, he accepted a call to Great Hamilton Free Church, Glasgow, in 1884. In 1871, during his ministry at Dyce, Mr. Gage married a daughter of the late Rev. Samuel Grant, who was for a number of years minister in Bon-Accord Free Church. Mr. Gage leaves a widow but no family.—*Daily Free Press*.

GENERAL GELLIE.

The General was the second surviving son of the late Mr. Stuart Gellie, Gorrachie, King-Edward. He was born at Gorrachie on 6th November, 1834, and obtained his early education at the schools of King-Edward and Macduff, and the Banff Academy, and after being some time at the Grammar School of Aberdeen, attended King's College, where he graduated in 1856. The late Colonel Sykes, who subsequently became M.P. for the city, presented King's and Marischal Colleges each with a cadetship in the honourable the East India Company's service, the Colonel at the time being Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Company. Mr. Francis Gellie was the successful competitor for the cadetship open to that year's graduates of King's College.

He subsequently passed the necessary test examination of the Company, and sailed for India that year. First an ensign, he very soon rose to the rank of lieutenant, and after some twelve years' service was promoted to a captaincy, and about eight years thereafter became major. He served during the Mutiny at Allyghur, in the actions at Agra, and the operations in Bundelcund. He was also in the Bhootan expedition, and was with the Kyber Brigade and Cabul



Field Force in the Afghan War of 1879. For these he was awarded medals with clasps, and as one of the commanding officers when Her Majesty was proclaimed Empress of India he received a medal. After thirty years' service, and having attained the rank of Colonel, he retired on a thirty years' service pension, with the honorary rank of Major-General. General Gellie on his retirement took up his residence in Banff, and made Banff his headquarters until 1890, when he bought the residence at 46 Carden Place, which he occupied until his death. The General had a wide circle of friends, by whom he was held in the highest esteem, and his generosity to the poor in Banff, and his native district, King-Edward, is still fresh in the minds of the communities there. He was particularly fond of and kind to children of all classes, and his

leaving Banff was much regretted by the inhabitants of the burgh. During his residence in Aberdeen, all too short, he made many friends, and his death is much regretted by a wide circle in Banffshire and Aberdeenshire.—*Northern Daily News*.

Surgeon Captain H. C. GORDON.

Surgeon Captain H. C. Gordon recently took part in the operations against Tambi, on the Scarcies River, a short distance from Sierra Leone. Captain Gordon, who was stationed at Sierra Leone at the time the news was received of the defeat of a British force at Tambi, and the killing of Captain Robinson, went up with the avenging party of the West India troops, who captured the place and killed numbers of the enemy. The deceased was about 35 years of age. He belonged to Aberdeen, and had been some time in the service.—*Daily Free Press*.

Lieut.-Colonel J. M. GORDON.

Deceased was a retired officer of the British army, son of the late Mr. Wm. Gordon, stock-broker, Aberdeen, and brother of Mr. William Gordon, Town Clerk of Aberdeen. Mr. Gordon was born on 16th February, 1845, and joining the Royal Fusiliers, he obtained an ensign's commission in July, 1864. The rank of major was conferred on him in 1885, and he finally retired in March, 1890, with the rank of lieutenant-colonel. In 1879 he took part in the operations against Sekukuni, in Africa, and in that engagement was slightly wounded. He served in the Zulu campaign, and fought in the battle of Ulundi, receiving favourable mention in the despatches of January, 1888. For his services on that memorable occasion deceased was presented with a medal and clasp. During the Zulu campaign, Mr. Gordon

acted as assistant Adjutant-General of the Royal Scotch Fusiliers.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

WILLIAM GORDON, *Cattle Dealer*.

Mr. Gordon was one of the most extensive dealers in the district, and had been a familiar figure at the markets and leading agricultural sales in the north for many years. He dealt largely with the provincial markets in England, and was the largest importer of English cows to Aberdeenshire. He was closely connected in his dealings with the counties of Moray, Banff, Kincardine, and Aberdeen, and was, as has been indicated, one of the most extensive cattle dealers in Aberdeen and the north. Of a genial disposition, Mr. Gordon was exceedingly popular in all his business relations. He was a man who had done much to keep up the reputation of Aberdeenshire as regards its beef, and his death will cause a distinct loss to the agricultural community.—*Daily Free Press*.

CHARLES GARSTON GRAINGER.

Mr. Grainger, who joined the Society of Advocates in 1837, was for some years in partnership with the late Mr. Stronach of Drumallan, advocate, the firm being carried on under the name of Stronach & Grainger. The firm founded the Scottish Australian Investment Company, and Mr. Grainger, when the headquarters of that important concern were removed from Aberdeen to London, left the city, and became the agent and secretary of the Company, holding the post for a long period of years, his resignation, on account of advancing age, being of recent date. The deceased was a son of a former incumbent of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Aberdeen.—*Daily Free Press*.

ADAM M. GRAY, *late Merchant.*

A native of Oldmeldrum, Mr. Gray was educated at the Grammar School and University in this city.



Choosing for himself a mercantile career, he soon became widely known in commercial circles, and was well known as a member of the firm of A. R. Gray, Market Street. Afterwards he commenced business along with his brother in Exchange Street. A good many years ago he retired from business, and devoted his time to literary pursuits,

being a diligent student. Of a retiring nature, Mr. Gray did not take any active interest in public affairs, but his society was courted for his genial nature, and he will be missed by a wide circle of friends.—*Northern Daily News.*

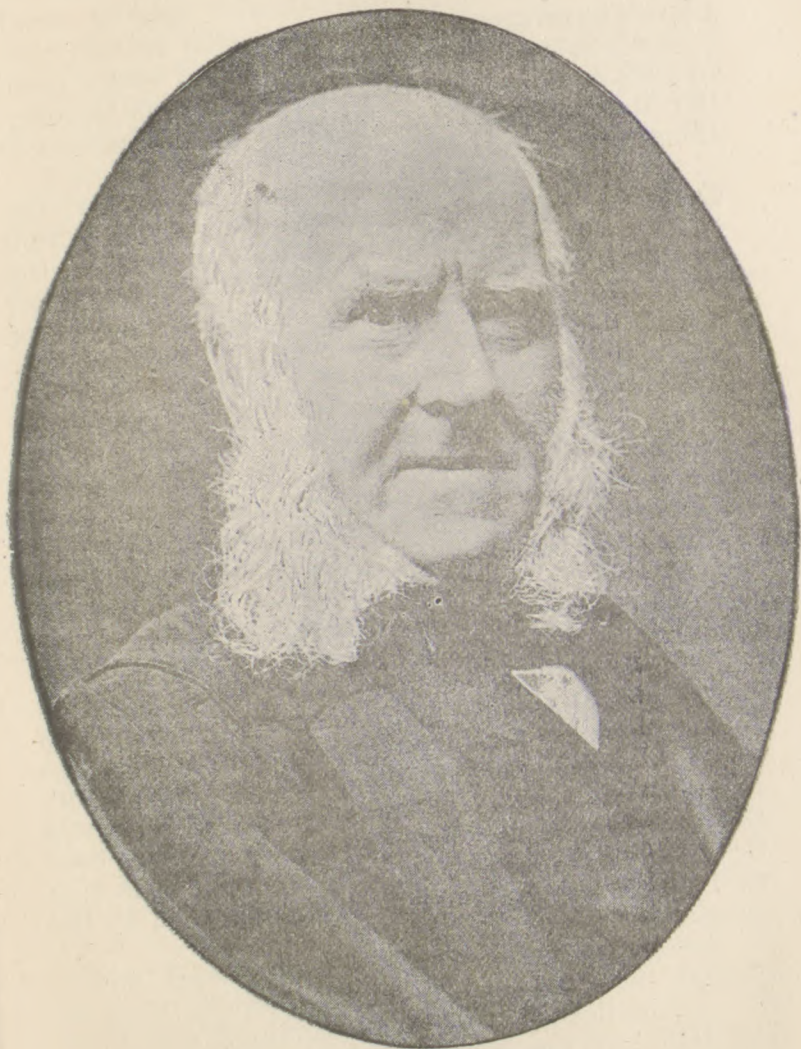
 DR. GEORGE GRUB.

George Grub was a native of Old Aberdeen. He was born, as he would have said, under the shadow of King's College, on St. Ambrose Day (April 4th), 1812. His father—also George Grub—was a well-known citizen, and took an active interest in the municipal affairs of the ancient burgh. An Episcopalian in the days when his Church was proscribed

and persecuted by the legislature, and when its members could meet for worship only in small parties in private houses, George Grub the elder was a staunch and loyal churchman. He was present in 1784 at the consecration of Dr. Samuel Seabury, the first American bishop, in an upper chamber in Longacre.

Dr. Grub received his early education at the Grammar School, Old Aberdeen, under the tuition of the Rev. Adam Mitchell, who was then the esteemed Rector. He afterwards passed through King's College, and took his degree as Master of Arts in 1829, when only seventeen years of age. Choosing law as his profession, he entered the office of Mr. Alexander Allan, advocate, under whom he served the apprenticeship required by the Society of Advocates in Aberdeen. In 1836 he was admitted a member of that body, and commenced the practice of his profession. In 1841 he was appointed librarian to the society. The library had been a source of trouble to the members for many years, and it greatly stood in need of competent supervision. From the time of Mr. Grub's appointment it speedily improved in character and increased in usefulness. His antiquarian and literary tastes admirably fitted him for the office, and to him no more congenial employment could have been given. For the long period of over half-a-century he held the office, and the minutes of the society bear frequent testimony to the unqualified satisfaction with which his work as librarian was viewed by the members.

Recognising his abilities as a lawyer and a student, the society, on the 10th February, 1843, on the resignation of Mr. James Edmond, appointed Dr. Grub to the lectureship in Scots Law and Conveyancing in Marischal College. This lectureship was instituted by the society in 1819, and was practically the only School of Law in the city. There

was an endowed chair of Civil Law in King's College, but it was virtually a sinecure. To this chair Dr. Patrick Davidson had been appointed in 1833. On the union of the colleges, in 1860, it was ordained by Ordinance VI. of the Universities Commission that the "Professorship of Civil Law in King's College shall be the Professorship of Law in the University of Aberdeen, and shall be held by Patrick Davidson, Doctor of Laws, now Professor of Civil Law in King's College." This change, however, made no alteration in the actual teaching of law. As Professor-Substitute the whole duties of the chair were discharged by Mr. Grub. On the death of Dr. Davidson in 1881, Dr. Grub was appointed Professor of Law, and he continued to occupy that position until the autumn of 1891. Thus, for close on half-a-century Dr. Grub was "the sole teacher of Scots Law and Conveyancing, first in Marischal College and University, and subsequently in the United University of Aberdeen." A few years ago he was obliged from failing health to give up the arduous task of lecturing, and, with the sanction of the Senatus, he procured the services of Mr. D. M. M. Milligan, advocate, as reader of his lectures. On his resignation, the Senatus recommended to the Queen in Council and to the Universities Commission that the highest possible rate of retiring allowance should be given to Dr. Grub, and to this recommendation effect was given. Great and manifold changes, both in subjects and methods of instruction, have taken place since Dr. Grub began his academical career, but no department of learning has undergone more variation than the science of law. Nevertheless the doctor's lectures were always "up to date" in every particular, and more than one generation of lawyers bear testimony to his faithfulness and ability as a teacher.

But it was not in the arena of jurisprudence that Dr. Grub achieved his highest distinction. In the

field of historical research he gained a name which will rank with those of the greatest annalists of the past. To no one does the student of Scottish ecclesiastical history owe more than to Dr. Grub. As recently remarked by Principal Geddes, "Dr. Grub has always been recognised as one of the most learned men in Scottish history and antiquities belonging to this community, and his 'Ecclesiastical History of Scotland' is looked upon as a memorial of learned research which does honour to our age and to our city." This work — his *magnum opus* — published in 1861, extends to four volumes, and contains a complete account of the vicissitudes of the Scottish Church from the introduction of Christianity to the time of publication. The late Dr. John Stuart, in the "Notices of the Spalding Club," referred to Dr. Grub's History as "a work which has already taken its place in the literature of Scotland as one of which it is hard to say whether its learning or impartiality be greatest." Mr. W. E. Gladstone, writing to Dr. Grub, spoke of "the excellent work which you have published, and which so well deserves the lofty title of a history." The late Lord President Inglis, in giving judgment in a case in the Court of Session, made reference to Professor Grub's "careful and accurate historical work." He was frequently urged to supplement his book by bringing it down to a more recent date, but advancing years obliged him to decline such an undertaking.

In the formation of the Spalding Club in 1839, Dr. Grub had an active part. Again quoting from Principal Geddes, he "belonged to the circle of young antiquaries, who shed such fame and lustre on Aberdeen about the period of the forties, resulting in the formation of the well-known Spalding Club, which has been such a centre of light and leading in these northern parts." He was a member of the council of the club from the outset, and along with Joseph Robertson, John Stuart, Cosmo Innes, John

Dunn, and David Laing, he acted as an editor of its publications. In these capacities he did valuable services. Dr. Robertson and he edited "Gordon's History of Scots Affairs," the first publication of the Club—a work, in three volumes, which entailed no small labour at the hands of the editors. In 1853, the Club issued "Innes's History of Scotland Civil and Ecclesiastical," edited by Dr. Grub. A life of Father Innes, written by Dr. Grub, was included in the volume, and with his permission it was printed in the edition of "Innes's Critical Essay," published in the "Historians of Scotland" series. The first volume (last in order of issue) of the "Illustrations of the Antiquities of Aberdeen and Banff," was also prepared by Dr. Grub.

Dr. Grub was an honorary member of the Aberdeen Philosophical Society, and for some years a vice-president. Papers on the following subjects were read by him at meetings of that body:—"The Life of Bishop Elphinstone;" "The Life of Bishop Burnet and his Character as a Historian and a Biographer;" "Dr. James Beattie and his Friends;" "The Antiquities of Dunkeld;" "Froude's History, and Mary Queen of Scots;" "Elgin Cathedral;" "Review of the Evidence as to the Complicity of Queen Mary in the Murder of Darnley." In concert with his life-long friend and companion, the late Mr. Norval Clyne, he contributed a paper on "The Ecclesiastical and Baronial Antiquities of the Cathedral of Brechin and Castle of Edzell."

For a long period of his life Dr. Grub was intimately connected with his native city, and was closely identified with many of its public bodies. He held the office of Town Clerk for over thirty years; he was clerk to the Convener Court, and to the Merchant Society of Old Aberdeen. He was long factor for Bishop Dunbar's Hospital Trust, and from 1861 he was treasurer of the Royal Arch Chapter. During the last few years he gradually relinquished

all these offices as well as factorships of a private character which he held.

In politics Dr. Grub was a Conservative, but latterly for many years he refrained from taking any active part in political affairs. At one time he was secretary of a Conservative Association which existed in Aberdeen, and until recently he had in his possession a volume containing signatures of the members. On more than one occasion the doctor smilingly pointed out to some advanced Liberal his name on this catalogue of Conservatives.

Dr. Grub was an ardent Episcopalian. In his earlier years he was connected with St. Andrew's congregation, but during the greater part of his life he was a member of St. John's Church, Crown Terrace. He took a warm interest in all congregational matters, and held various offices in connection with the church. He was for a long period a churchwarden, and latterly canonical lay representative of St. John's. At the annual congregational social gatherings Dr. Grub's speech was invariably one of the events, and his remarks were always most pleasant and instructive. In the councils of the church his was a well-known figure, and when he took part in their discussions, his words were words of wisdom. Several years ago when it was proposed in the Representative Church Council to introduce the system of popular election of the clergy, Dr. Grub led the van in opposition to the motion. The thought of "preaching matches" was abhorrent to him, and so effectually did he denounce the proposal that it was rejected by a large majority. In *causes celebres* (now almost forgotten) Dr. Grub performed a conspicuous part. He acted in defence of the Rev. Patrick Cheyne and of Bishop Forbes of Brechin in their respective cases—the legal answers having been prepared by him. In several other ecclesiastical cases his "legal acumen and accurate knowledge of Church Law were greatly utilised."

On Dr. Grub's retirement from active life it was the spontaneous wish of a large circle of legal and other friends to present him with a tangible expression of their esteem and regard for him. It was agreed that the testimonial should take the form of a portrait, painted by Sir George Reid, P.R.S.A., and a committee, of whom Mr. C. B. Davidson was president, and Messrs. David Littlejohn and William Smith were secretaries, set to work to carry out the proposal. The result was that a picture, admirable as a work of art, and perfect as a likeness, now hangs in the library over which Dr. Grub so long presided.

It would require a Sir George Reid in literature to portray with justice the stainless, the beautiful character of the venerable man who has just been called to his rest. He was a man of sterling principle, of perfect integrity, a man in whom there was no guile. He was possessed of qualities which commanded the admiration and respect of all who came in contact with him. No one who had the privilege of being intimately acquainted with him could regard him otherwise than with most affectionable feeling; his constant kindness, his uniform courtesy won the esteem of all. Rarely do we meet a man of such knowledge and power, combined with such gentleness and modesty. His was a truly noble character, his a most upright life. In all his professional work to the smallest detail he was most regular and accurate. Perfect order was his second nature, he was intensely methodical. In social life he was always noted for his cheerfulness and geniality.

Mr. Grub was among the first to receive the degree of Doctor of Laws from the United University of Aberdeen. This honour was conferred upon him in 1864, along with several others, of whom the only survivor is Professor Masson, of Edinburgh.

Dr. Grub was a widower, his wife having predeceased him about 17 years. He is survived by

two sons—the elder, the Rev. George Grub, rector of Holy Trinity Church, Ayr, formerly incumbent of St. James's Church, Stonehaven; the younger, the Rev. Charles Grub, holds a curacy in Southport, Lancashire.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

HERBERT W. HOLLAND, *Broadford Works*.

Deceased was managing partner in Aberdeen of Messrs. Richards & Co., Broadford Works. He

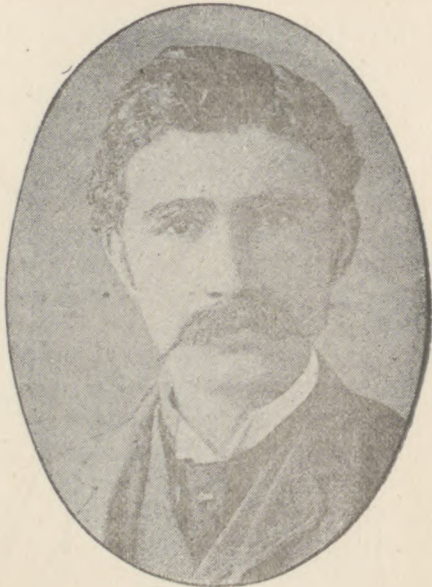


was only 28 years of age, but had endeared himself not only to a very large circle of private friends, but to the whole of the employees at the works and the general public, by the integrity and solidity of his private character, and the geniality and genuine worth of his disposition. Mr. Holland was a Conservative in politics, and, while never obtruding

his views upon anyone, took a keen interest in the management of the Conservative Club, of whose committee he was an active member. Mr. Holland was educated at Eton, and came to Aberdeen about ten years ago. His sad demise has cast a gloom over the works, where he was deservedly respected by all.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

Dr. HUTCHEON.

Dr. Hutcheon was a native of the city, and was a son of Mrs. Hutcheon, of the Temperance Hotel in Union Street, which bears her name, his father having died a number of years ago. He received his professional education in the local university, and took there the degree of M.B., C.M., and afterwards that of D. Ph., carrying off the medal of his year in the latter department. Starting practice in Alford, he remained there for some

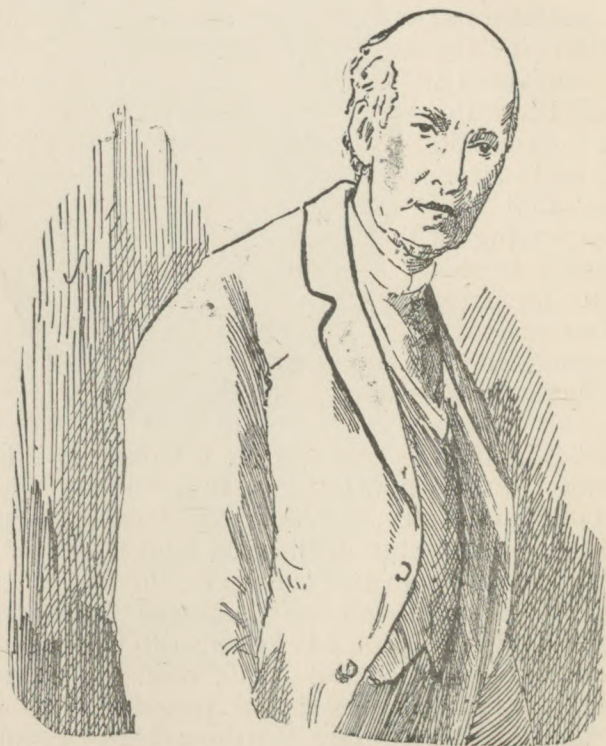


time, till, about two years ago, he removed to Aberdeen and opened a new business in Schoolhill, where he has remained since. In May last he was appointed one of the medical staff of the Parochial Board of St. Nicholas, and later in the same year he was elected one of the physicians of the Aberdeen Dispensary. Dr. Hutcheon was also medical officer to the Holburn Lodge Caledonian Order of Oddfellows. In addition to this, he engaged in general practice, and also acted as assistant to Dr. Matthew Hay in public health work, doing duty in the absence of the latter as medical officer for the city. Modest and retiring in his disposition, he was nevertheless a straightforward and a kind-hearted man, and was known as a skilful physician and a favourite with his patients.

He is survived by a widow, but leaves no family.—
Aberdeen Journal.

ALEXANDER FORBES IRVINE, of *Drum*.

Mr. Irvine of Drum was a descendant of one of the oldest and best-known families in Scotland, and has a genealogical record almost unique. He was a descendant of William de Irwyn, who was



secretary and armour-bearer to King Robert the Bruce, and who was granted by that monarch in 1323 the Royal Forest of Drum, which was created a free barony the following year by a charter still

preserved in Drum Castle. Since that remote period the estates have been held by the family with scarcely a break in the direct succession from father to son. There were three branches of the family. The original family, descended from William de Irwyn of Bonshaw, in Dumfriesshire, became extinct; and the second branch, or what is known as the Murtle family, succeeded to Drum, but also became extinct in 1737. By decision of the Sheriff of Aberdeenshire the titles, however, fell to John Irvine of Artamford, eldest son of Alexander Irvine of Crimond. The present estate of Drum and Schivas extends to 7689 Imperial acres, of which 4018 are on Drum, and 3671 on Schivas. The lands of Schivas were acquired through the marriage of Alexander Irvine who married Jean, only daughter of Hugh Forbes of Schivas, in 1775. Schivas was in Tarves, but by an Act of Parliament the entail was, about 1850, transferred to the lands of Culter, which had been at a remote period in the hands of the Irvines. The estate in Tarves was acquired by the Earl of Aberdeen; and at the same time the lands of Culter or Schivas were added by purchase to those of Drum.

Mr. A. F. Irvine was born in Edinburgh on 18th February, 1818, and was thus in his 75th year. He was educated at Aberdeen University, and subsequently he proceeded to Edinburgh in order to study the law. For this purpose he served diligently for some years in the office of a Writer to the Signet, and in the year 1843 he was called to the bar. More of a student than a pleader, Mr. Irvine, although he practised for a number of years with success as Chamber counsel, devoted a large amount of attention to law cases. His intense devotion to that particular form of work resulted in the production of several volumes of "Irvine's Reports of Cases before the High Court and Circuit Courts of Justiciary." These show a thorough acquaintance with the subject

of which they treat, and are recognised as standard and authoritative works. But besides bestowing a large amount of time and steady industry on their production, he also found leisure to prepare a historical work on the Game Laws, a hand-book exhibiting a minute acquaintance with the law, which was at once, and has ever since been, recognised as a standard book on the subject. The industry and erudition he displayed in connection with these laborious efforts did not go unnoticed, for in 1867 he was appointed Clerk to the Court of Justiciary, and in 1874 he received from Her Majesty the responsible appointment of Sheriff of Argyll; while the esteem of his brethren of the bar called him to the honourable post of Vice-Dean of the Faculty of Advocates. Many other positions, in which he rendered valuable service to the general community, the deceased gentleman held. He was, for example, a Deputy Lieutenant of the County, a Justice of Peace, convener of the Commissioners of Supply, chairman of the County Valuation Committee, a member, along with the vice-convener, of the Prison Visiting Committee, and a member of the District Board of Lunacy, elected by the County Council. Apart from his local functions, he discharged the duties of a Commissioner of Northern Lighthouses, was a member of the Fishery Board of Scotland, was for 35 years chairman of the Publication Committee of the Highland and Agricultural Society, and vice-president of the Royal Society of Edinburgh. In 1891, in consequence of advancing age and failing health, Mr. Irvine resigned the Sheriffship of Argyleshire. In 1861, on the death of his father, Mr. Irvine succeeded to the estate of Drum. Prior to this time the deceased gentleman had taken the keenest interest in the business of the County of Aberdeen; and in 1862, when the Convenership of the County became vacant by the death of Sir Andrew Leith-Hay, Mr. Irvine was selected to fill the office,

being deemed the most suitable man for the post. From that time till the passing of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, in 1891, when the County Councils were created, he held the appointment and filled it with acceptance to all concerned. As Convener of the County at the time of the passing of the Act, Mr Irvine held a seat on the County Council. Mr. Irvine discharged the duties of his office of Convener with singular quietness, dignity, and grace, and he was eminently fair-minded and impartial in the conduct of the business. He had the true idea of the functions of a chairman, seldom allowing his own voice to be heard, but all the while skilfully guiding the deliberations of the commissioners. In recognition of his services as Convener of the county of Aberdeen the deceased gentleman was, on 28th August last, presented with his portrait painted by Sir George Reid, President of the Royal Scottish Academy. His capacity as chairman of the Commissioners of Supply doubtless led to his selection as chairman at the annual meetings of the Royal Northern Agricultural Society, over which he presided for many years.

While Mr. Irvine was thus an able man of business he enjoyed, as already indicated, the high distinction not only of being a sound lawyer, but an accomplished scholar. Of classical and Italian literature he was an enthusiastic student, and indeed there was scarcely any department of literature in which he did not take an interest. As an evidence also of the direction of his tastes, it may be noted that he was not only a member of the original Spalding Club, but was vice-president of the New Spalding Club. He had a wide general knowledge of archæology, and in particular in relation to the county of Aberdeen, his interest in the subject was of the keenest possible description. In mathematical and physical science he was deeply versed, and the pursuit of art afforded him the keenest pleasure.

In 1887, Mr. Irvine received the honorary degree of LL.D. from the University of Edinburgh.

In politics Mr. Irvine was a Conservative, but his natural reserve prevented him from taking part in public political discussions. His interest in all matters affecting the welfare of the nation and county, however, was none the less deep, and his aid, in any cause, was ungrudgingly given when the occasion required. As patron of the Drum bursaries, which are numerous and valuable, Mr. Irvine delighted in opportunities of assisting deserving young men; and many a one owes his first start in life to the generous consideration of the laird of Drum.

Mr. Irvine married in 1849 a daughter of Colonel Jonathan Forbes Leslie of Rothienorman, younger sister of the present Mrs. Crawford of Rothienorman, by whom he is survived. There were three children of the marriage, Alexander, who died unmarried in 1856; Charles, afterwards Alexander Charles Quentin, who also died unmarried in September, 1875; and Francis Hugh, who is a barrister in London, and is attached to the staff of the "Times" in the legal department. Mr. Irvine now succeeds to the estate of Drum and Schivas. Mr. Irvine, it will be recollected, unsuccessfully contested West Aberdeenshire in 1886 against Dr. Farquharson, the sitting member.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

JAMES JAMIESON, *Merchant*.

A native of Tarves, the deceased gentleman came to Aberdeen early in life and served his apprenticeship with the late Mr. James Fraser of Heathcot, with whom he afterwards entered into partnership, ultimately succeeding to the business on the death of Mr. Fraser. Mr. Jamieson possessed a racy, pawky vein of humour which made him a general

favourite with his numerous customers and many friends, by whom he was held in high esteem. For the long period of sixty-one years he had been connected with the establishment at the corner of Dee Street. A considerable number of years ago Mr. Jamieson purchased the estate of Prospect Hill, near Aberdeen, where he has since resided. He leaves a widow (a daughter of the late Mr. John Fraser, watchmaker, Aberdeen) and a son.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

Rev. J. S. KEMP, *Dyce*.

Deceased was a native of Trinity, Gask, Perthshire, of which his younger brother, who was at one time schoolmaster at Dyce, is now minister. He studied and graduated M.A. in St. Andrews University, at which ancient seat of learning he was fortunate in having as his Professor of Moral Philosophy the late Dr Chalmers. Mr. Kemp also went through the divinity course at St. Andrews, and, on qualifying, was licensed a preacher of the Gospel. After finishing his studies, however, he was engaged as a teacher, and ultimately became rector of Forres Academy. From Forres he went



to Dyce, where he remained until his death. Mr. Kemp was a good specimen of the old-style parish minister, and cherished a high estimate of the responsibilities of his vocation. Of a somewhat reserved manner, he was yet warm-hearted and hospitable to a degree, and his "hame-ower" talk indulged in when visiting won the appreciation of his parishioners. He did not occupy himself much with public affairs, nor was he very frequent in his attendance at Synod or Presbytery meetings. Frequently, however, he attended the General Assembly of the Church, although he took little or no part in the debates, his visits to the principal Church Court being undertaken chiefly for the purpose of keeping himself well informed on current questions concerning the Church of which he was a devoted minister, and for the purpose of meeting and reviving acquaintance with old friends. Mr. Kemp was possessed of a rich vein of humour, and had no mean poetical gifts, which he occasionally used in fugitive pieces. Being so near the Don he was able to gratify his tastes in the piscatorial art. He was also an expert swimmer, a good horseman, and an enthusiastic golfer. In his younger days he carried off a large number of prizes at golf which were carefully preserved and pointed out with pride to the visitors at the Manse. He devoted a great deal of time to his pulpit work, and his sermons always bore the mark of careful preparation. In 1888, feeling the infirmities of advancing age, he applied for an assistant-successor, and his crave was not only readily granted, but the members of the church were ready to contribute substantial pecuniary assistance for an arrangement being affected. Rev. James T. Cox, B.D., was appointed assistant and successor in the year mentioned. He was unmarried. His niece, Miss Amelia Greig, resided with him.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

Colonel KIRBY.

A native of England, Colonel Kirby was the last surviving son of the late Lieutenant-General Stephen Kirby, and served for 30 years in India.

After his retirement from active service he settled in Aberdeen, whither he was led by family ties.

A man of sterling worth, although unostentatious in the highest degree,

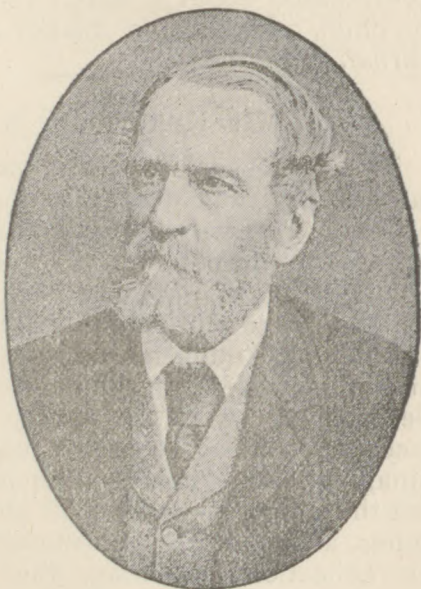
he soon found in the city scope for his energies in connection with almost every religious and philanthropic work.

Naturally, from his residence abroad, he had special sympathy with foreign missionary effort, and it was not unusual for meetings to be held in his house in favour of such work as the Zenana Mission.

Colonel Kirby was treasurer of the Free Church Missions to Women in Heathen Lands, secretary and treasurer of the Anglo-Indian Evangelisation Society, secretary and treasurer of the Aberdeen Auxiliary of the British Society for the Propagation of the Gospel among the Jews, and treasurer and general secretary of the Aberdeenshire Ladies' Association for the Rescue of Fallen Females.

He was a valued member and office-bearer of the Free High Church, and took a deep interest and active part in congregational work, having been especially useful in connection with finance.

Careful,



methodical, and kindly, he made for himself a host of warm friends, by whom he was greatly beloved. Colonel Kirby married a sister of Major Ross, chief constable of Aberdeenshire, by whom he was pre-deceased about a dozen years ago. They had one child, who died in infancy in India.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

Mrs. KNIGHT, *late of Alford*.

The deceased lady, who was in her 75th year, was a remarkable woman in many respects. At a very early age she acquired an antiquarian taste, and during her lifetime she got together a large and valuable collection of curiosities, such as is not often possessed by any private individual. She was also a student of numismatics and geology, and the various specimens of this descriptions were well selected, and were of a very interesting nature. Deceased had also secured a costly selection of old china, and these, along with her other relics, she took the greatest pleasure in showing to her many friends, and to those who showed any desire to view her collection. Among the numerous articles belonging to the deceased lady is a large walking stick, which was at one time used by the Shah of Persia. Some years ago she presented a beautiful tortoiseshell comb to the Princess of Wales, and the Royal acknowledgment which she received for the gift was cherished along with her other articles. Mrs. Knight, by her special knowledge as an antiquary, and other personal amiable qualities, attracted to herself a large circle of friends in the city.—*Daily Free Press*.

Miss LAMOND LESLIE, *of Powis*.

For many years past the deceased lady lived in strict seclusion at Powis House, Old Aberdeen, and to the present generation at least was practically

unknown. She belonged to a family, however, which in its time, was one of the best known in the county of Aberdeen. Her father, Hugh Fraser Leslie, who died on 8th April, 1812, married Miss Agnes Anne Lamond, and by that lady had a large family of sons and daughters, of whom nearly all succeeded to the estate. On his death he was succeeded by his eldest son, John, and afterwards by Hugh Fraser—brother of the lady now deceased—a gentleman who was widely esteemed in Aberdeenshire. In early life he had been in the West Indies, where he became a member of the Legislature, and prominently identified himself with the cause of the enslaved negroes. On leaving he was made a member of the “Institut d’Afrique,” in recognition of his services in the cause of liberty and humanity. At his death in 1873, he was succeeded by his sisters as co-heiresses, two of whom only now survive, Miss Isabella Jane Leslie and Miss Helen Leslie. Born in Dec., 1799, “when George III. was King,” Miss Lamond Leslie had thus lived through the most stirring periods of the national history. She was the contemporary of many whose names have long passed into song and story—of the greatest warriors and statesmen of that or any other age in the world’s history.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

Lieutenant-Colonel M'DONALD.

Colonel M'Donald joined the East India Company's service at an early age, and was for many years an officer in the 66th (old) Regiment of Goorkhas. By his daring promptitude and decision of character at Umritzir, he quelled the first movements of a Sepoy revolt, and saved the Europeans from a general massacre. For this service Sir Charles Napier gave him the command of a

regiment of irregular cavalry, and, in promoting him, wrote:—"You have won it, if ever a man deserved well of his chief. But for your decision we should have had the devil to pay at Umritzir." During the Mutiny his regiment, which was very much attached to its officers, of whom the only Europeans were M'Donald, commander; Sir Norman Leslie, adjutant; and Dr. Grant, refused to mutiny. Three miscreants, however, of the regiment, having determined to kill their officers, and thus compel the rest to mutiny in self-defence, crept upon the three Europeans when taking tea in the front of their tents. Sir Norman was instantly cut to pieces, the Doctor was severely wounded in the body, and M'Donald received several wounds on the head, his scalp being shaved off. He defended himself with his chair, and the murderers took to flight. Although the murderers were at first unrecognised, a close inquiry resulted in their discovery. A court-martial was held, at which M'Donald alone was able to attend. They were tried and condemned to be hanged. The ringleader protested that there was not proper legal jurisdiction to convict. "Never mind," replied M'Donald, "I'll get leave afterwards." The same individual then made a violent speech to his comrades on the scaffold, which for the occasion was an elephant's back, calling upon them to cut down the Feringhee; but Colonel M'Donald, clapping a revolver to his head, swore he would blow his brains out, if he did not allow himself to be hanged "like a Christian." He lost his presence of mind, and before he recovered himself the elephant was driven off, and he was left dangling from a tree to which a rope was being attached. Colonel M'Donald used to say himself that he never for a moment expected to leave the place of execution alive. It was said at the time that if other officers had acted with the same daring promptitude, the story of the Indian Mutiny might have been a

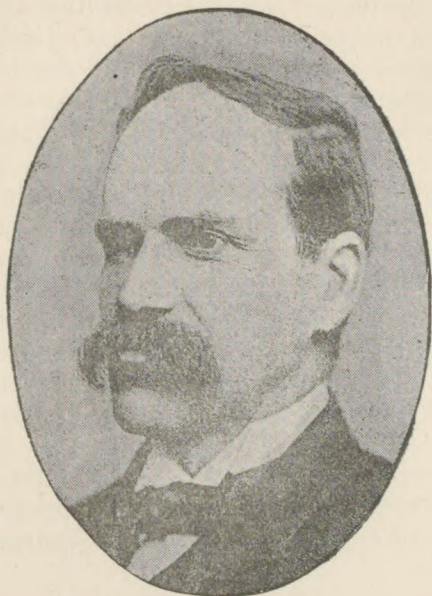
different one. After recovering somewhat from his wounds, he led his regiment to the nearest European depot to be disbanded. They obeyed his every word until evil counsels prevailed, and they bolted one morning and joined their countrymen at Delhi. Colonel M'Donald used to say that he could not but be proud of his regiment, for they were the only natives before whom an equal force of Europeans turned their backs.

He retired on half pay shortly after the Mutiny. He married a Miss Morgan, daughter of the late Mr. E. Morgan, by whom he had two daughters—one of whom is dead, and the other is a nun in Ireland. His wife died in India. For fifteen years of his life he lived with his nephew, the Rev. Æneas Chisholm, Catholic clergyman at Banff, and his niece, Miss Sarah Chisholm. On the removal of Mr. Chisholm to Blairs College, Colonel M'Donald came to Aberdeen with his niece—who died shortly after—to be near his two nephews, the other of whom is the Catholic Bishop of Aberdeen.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

CHARLES M'DONALD, *Granite Merchant*.

A native of Dyce, Charles M'Donald was in many respects a remarkable man. He came of a granite-working family. His father, though latterly a farmer, or rather a big crofter, was a mason by trade, and two brothers, who survive, are also connected with the stonecutting industry—one in Aberdeen and the other in America. The deceased, after serving his apprenticeship with the late Mr. George Donaldson—well-known as the contractor for the Municipal Buildings—worked for some time as a journeyman. Subsequently he emigrated to the United States, in what are rapidly becoming known in the trade as “the good days,” when Scotch masons were more a rarity in America than they

are now, and their remuneration was considerably higher. Being a skilful workman, and a man of exceptionally fine taste, Mr. M'Donald prospered in



America even above many of his fellows. Returning to Aberdeen, he set up in business on his own account, now about fifteen years ago, in a humble way in a small yard in Gerrard Street. But Mr. M'Donald was a man of marked intelligence, and of large business capacity, and he soon built from this humble commencement one of the largest businesses of the kind in Aber-

deen. His business outgrew the limited accommodation in Gerrard Street, and it was removed to more extensive premises in Nelson Street—only, however, to be transferred a few years later to Jute Street, where, under his enterprising guidance, the Froghall Granite Works have become a feature in the industrial life of the city. Mr. M'Donald was of an inventive turn, and in connection with the machinery used in his works he introduced not a few important improvements. His large trade—he had 150 men in his employment—was mostly with the English market and with the Australian colonies, where his products were greatly in demand. He secured many large orders for shipment abroad, the most important perhaps being a massive granite front, costing several thousands

of pounds, for a bank in Melbourne. In developing the granite industry, and thereby, of course, the trade of the town, the deceased was not loth to try experiments even though they involved financial loss. He opened a greystone quarry in Shetland about four miles from Scalloway, and worked it with a persistence and perseverance that at least deserved success. The venture did not, however, yield satisfactory results from a monetary point of view, and Mr. M'Donald was reluctantly compelled to abandon the undertaking. His inventive faculty was not infrequently exercised in devising more comfortable surroundings for his workmen, as well as in devising more efficient methods of work. About eighteen months ago he erected, at considerable cost, a building for his stonecutters that was, and still is, an entirely new departure in the stonecutting line in this part of the country. It was a large wooden structure, with slated roof, capable of accommodating about 120 workmen, and while so constructed as to allow abundant air space, it afforded complete shelter for the workmen in all kinds of weather. Mr. M'Donald signalled the opening of this new building in June last year by a change in the hours of labour at the Froghall Works that was probably still more acceptable than the improved housing to his workmen. Previously his employees worked the usual 51 hours per week—nine hours on the first five days of the week and six hours on Saturday. By the new system, however, the men worked, as formerly, nine hours on the first five days of the week, but ceased work on Saturdays at ten in the forenoon in place of one in the afternoon. Although now working 49 hours per week, the workmen continued to receive the 51 hours' pay. By his introduction of this method of work Mr. M'Donald suffered somewhat at the hands of his professional brethren in the city. The matter was taken up in the Employers' Association and Mr.

M'Donald was urged to return to the old hours of labour. He resolutely declined to do so, and as a result his name was struck off the roll of membership. Subsequently, however, a more satisfactory arrangement was come to—Mr. M'Donald, returning to the councils of his brethren, and his men continuing to enjoy the concession he had made. With hardly any early educational advantages Mr. M'Donald, despite an active and busy life, found time for self-improvement. He read systematically, and his general information was wide and accurate. Nowhere will his loss be more deeply felt or more sincerely regretted than by his own workmen, for between himself and his men there existed not the bonds of service, but the links of affection. Though holding advanced "Labour" views, he was not accustomed publicly to parade them, but, as indicated, his concessions to his employees were many and liberal. He made over, as was noted at the time, a cottage at Culter as a convalescent home for sick children, and that gift was only characteristic of the man. He was large-hearted, open-handed, in sympathy with everything that was good and true. He gave ungrudgingly of his means to every worthy object—he was perhaps charitable to a fault—and though no public records commemorate him, his good deeds will be a lasting memorial. Mr. M'Donald was a Free Churchman, and an attached member and office-bearer in Free Melville Church. He was twice married and is survived by a widow and children.—*Daily Free Press.*

A. R. MACKENZIE.

Mr. Mackenzie, who was only in his thirty-sixth year, was for many years in the employment of Mr. Ewing, Crown Street. At one time he opened a business of his own in the city, but the business did

not prosper, and Mr. Mackenzie returned to Mr. Ewing's employment. It was, however, from his musical connection that deceased was best known. He had a baritone voice of very high quality, which with training would have undoubtedly placed Mr. Mackenzie in a good place in the musical profession. As it was he was a welcome singer at many a concert in Aberdeen and the north — often willingly giving his services freely to further some charitable scheme. He



was a member of the West Parish Church choir for a long time. In the north he frequently organised concerts, and it was while engaged at one of these that he contracted the pulmonary complaint that ultimately led to his death. It was remarkable that, though held in high esteem as a musician, Mr. Mackenzie could not read a note of music. He had, however, a phenomenally quick ear, and having once acquired a piece of music was as true as an instrument.—*Daily Free Press.*

HORACE E. MACKWORTH, *Buxburn.*

The deceased gentleman was a native of Monmouthshire, a son of General Mackworth of that county, and a graduate of Oxford University.

At the close of his college career Mr. Mackworth went to Ireland, where he engaged in farming, but a physical weakness from which he suffered incapacitated him from following out that pursuit. A considerable number of years ago he came to the north of Scotland, and finding the Vale of Alford a district congenial to his tastes, he took up his abode there. Being a staunch Free Churchman, Mr. Mackworth took a great interest in the affairs of that body, and was one of those who took a leading part in the building of the Free Churches of Alford and Kemnay. About eighteen years ago he married Miss Sangster, teacher at Tullynessle, and afterwards came to Buxburn, where he built Noel House. He is survived by his wife, and a family of one son and three daughters. Deceased was a keen politician, and a Unionist. Although he took no active part in politics he followed public affairs with close attention. He was a gentleman of genial disposition and high character.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

JAMES MESTON, C.A.

Born at Kintore on 25th February, 1821, Mr. Meston has thus reached his 72nd year. Coming to the city when a youth, he was engaged for a time in the mercantile establishment of the late Baillie Fraser. Setting himself to supplement his school training, he devoted his evenings to study, and it was characteristic of his forceful character that he surmounted the many difficulties that then lay in the path of young men who sought to improve their education, for in those days there were few of the facilities that are now so plentifully placed within the reach of all. He had a strong aptitude for figures, and this talent he sedulously cultivated. Subsequently he applied for and obtained a situation in the office

of Messrs. Blaikie & Smith, where he in time became confidential clerk to the late Mr. John Smith, president of the Society of Advocates, with whom this connection, lasting until the dissolution of the firm, was the commencement of a life-long friendship. For the next three years he was in London, whence he returned in 1857 to Aberdeen, and commenced business as an accountant. His fame rapidly spread. The late Sir Alexander Anderson, than whom there were few better judges of character, soon discovered his ability, and employed him in the actuarial work of many of the important public schemes with which the firm of Adam & Anderson were connected. Though never a public man in the sense of seeking municipal honours, Mr. Meston was largely identified with public work, and in the questions regarding the Guildry, the erection of new Corporation buildings, the purchase of Torry Farm, and in railway undertakings in the south, he took a prominent part in his capacity of accountant. In the movement that resulted in the erection of the new Grammar School, he acted as secretary. He was also largely instrumental in founding the Chartered Accountants' Society of Aberdeen, of which he was elected secretary and treasurer. He held the office of treasurer of the Aberdeen Reformatory and Industrial Schools for many years, and had also been agent for Her Majesty's Inspectors of these institutions. To enumerate the many auditorships of public bodies which he held would be tedious, but prominent amongst these appointments may be mentioned the North of Scotland Bank (in conjunction formerly with the late Mr. John Young, of Young, Turquands, & Co., C.A., London, and more recently with the Hon. Mr. Moncreiff, of Edinburgh), the Northern Assurance Company, and the great firm of leather merchants in Leeds, of which Mr. Jackson, the chief secretary for Ireland, is a member. The County Councils of Aberdeen

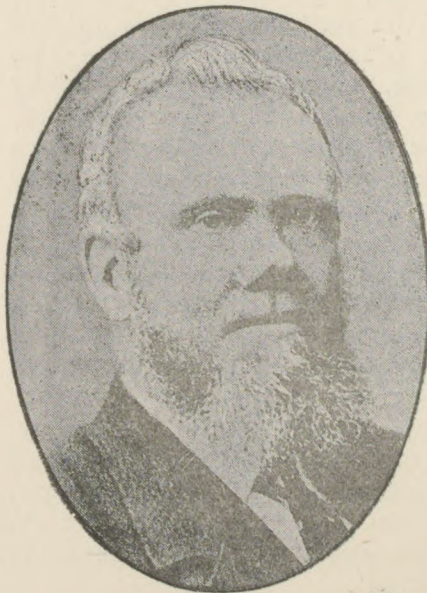
and Kincardine elected him as their auditor, and his standing in the actuarial world was recognised by his appointment as inspector of National Security Savings Banks for the northern district of Scotland, and his selection as the auditor of the accounts of the University of Aberdeen. Several important factorships were held by him, and the previous generation of citizens will remember the successful fight he made in the succession case that resulted in an heir being found for the estate of Pitfodels in the person of Mr. Barnett, an old soldier, a native of Oldmeldrum.

Continental travel formed his favourite means of enjoying a holiday, and one of his forms of relaxation was acquiring a knowledge of modern languages. Chess was at one time a favourite game, and he was one of the original members of that private circle who, about 30 years ago, met at stated periods for the enjoyment of the pastime in each other's houses. Amongst the other members were:--The late Rev. Dr. Barrack, rector of the Grammar School; Dr. Alexander Beverley; Rev. Dr. Fraser, of Footdee; ex-Baillie Walker; the Rev. Charles Macdonald (now a professor in Halifax); and the late William Forsyth, editor of the "Aberdeen Journal." Mr. Meston was a staunch member of the Church of Scotland. For many years he was an office-bearer in the East Parish, but latterly has been connected with the West Church. Mr. Meston is survived by Mrs. Meston and three daughters, one of whom is the wife of the Rev. Dr. Stewart, Professor of Systematic Theology in Aberdeen University. Two sons were cut off in early manhood in 1872 and 1874. Recently, to assist him in his large business, Mr. Meston assumed as partners Mr. Walter A. Reid, C.A., and Mr. Andrew Davidson, advocate and C.A.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

C. J. B. MILNE, *School Inspector.*

Mr. Milne was a B.A. of Cambridge, and after finishing his course there was appointed a lecturer in one of the Edinburgh colleges. About five years ago he was appointed one of the inspectors of schools in Aberdeenshire, a position which he filled with credit. Deceased was elected an elder of the East Parish Church, Aberdeen, in 1889, and in the affairs of the congregation, and more particularly in Sunday school work, he took a deep interest. He was a young man of amiable disposition, and his death, at the early age of 28 years, will be heard of with sincere regret by a wide circle of friends.—*Aberdeen Journal.*

WILLIAM MILNE, *Advocate.*



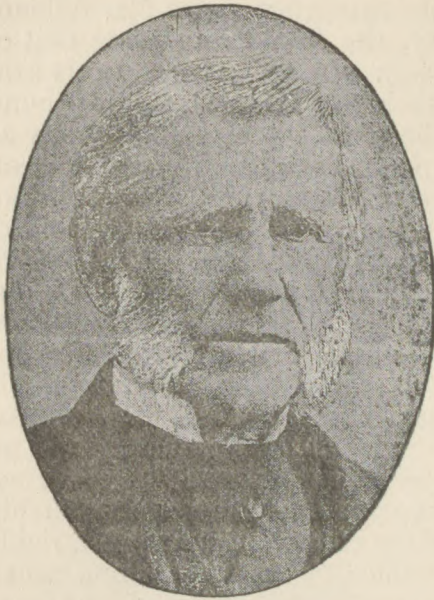
The deceased, who was born in 1833, and was thus about fifty-eight years of age, was a native of the parish of Banchory-Devenick, and received his early education at the parish school there. As a boy he entered the office of the late Mr. John Watt, advocate, whose office was in Correction Wynd. In the same building was the office then occupied by the late Mr. Robert F. Spottiswood of Muiresk, advocate, the two businesses being connected. On Mr. Spottiswood

moving to another office, Mr. Milne went with him ; and in 1864 he joined the Society of Advocates. Mr. Spottiswood went into partnership with Mr. William Yeats of Auquharney, the firm name being that of Yeats and Spottiswood. In the service of this firm Mr. Milne gradually took a leading position, his sound judgment, excellent business capacity, and ability as a conveyancer, in particular gaining for him an excellent reputation as a lawyer. After the death of Mr. Spottiswood, the firm was changed into that of Yeats, Milne, & M'Donald. Mr. Archibald M'Donald, advocate, being assumed as a partner along with Mr. Milne. In the carrying on of the business of the firm, which includes several important factorships for landed proprietors, Mr. Milne had for a considerable time taken a prominent part. For the management of public affairs the deceased had no liking. As an attached and much-respected member of the East Church he had been repeatedly elected to the eldership by large majorities of the congregation, but invariably declined to accept office. At same time when questions requiring consideration emerged his advice was not more readily given when asked than it was confidently relied upon ; and he would have spared no pains to do a service to his fellow churchmen, or to a private friend. It is much to say, yet we venture to believe that Mr. Milne's professional brethren will bear us out in the averment that he could never, under any circumstances, have been tempted into benefiting his cause by even the slightest bit of sharp practice ; and he would on all occasions have sooner sacrificed his own personal interests than have consciously allowed those of a client to suffer. Mr. Milne was never married.—*Daily Free Press.*

GEORGE MITCHELL, *St. John's Wells.*

Mr. Mitchell was a native of Ellon, having been born at Mill of Fortrie, where his father was farmer.

He was the only surviving brother of the late Mr. Alexander Mitchell, President of the Chicago, Milwaukee, and St. Paul Railway Company, a man of remarkable energy and high character, who died in April, 1887. On the death of his father, Mr. John Mitchell, who, as an auctioneer and valuator, was widely known as a man of sterling integrity of character, which earned for him the name of "Honest John." Mr. George Mitchell continued at Mill of Fortrie for a



number of years. While there he married Miss Schivas, Mains of Arnage, and about 29 years ago he took the farm of St. John's Wells, which is one of the largest possessions on the Aberdeen Estates, the rental amounting to £539. Mr. Mitchell was known as a man of great business capacity, full of energy and public spirit, and during his occupation of his land did much to improve it. About forty years ago he added to his other duties those of valuator and auctioneer, and in both capacities his services were highly prized. His business as auctioneer he gave up about ten or twelve years ago, but he continued to officiate in his capacity of valuator until a comparatively recent date. Mr. Mitchell, while at St. John's Wells, mainly confined himself to keeping a commercial stock of cattle, never caring to undertake the risks

of a pure-bred herd. He had, however, a liking for sheep, and he maintained a large flock on the farm. In his own district Mr. Mitchell was held in the very highest esteem and respect for the probity and uprightness of his character, as well as that capacity for business which was a distinguishing feature of the family. Mr. Mitchell was a Liberal in politics, and was a member of the Free Church of Methlick. By his wife, by whom he is survived, he had a family of fourteen, eleven of whom survive. Four of the sons are in this country, one of them, James, being tenant of the farm of Dubbiestyles, Foveran. Two sons are in America, and one is attending the University of Edinburgh. One of the daughters is married to Mr. Robert Moir, Tarty, Ellon, and the eldest is married to Dr. Mackie, Milwaukee.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

Monsignor MUNRO, *Glasgow*.

The deceased—Alexander Munro by name—was a native of Aberdeen, having been born in the year 1820, and in his early years he was a printer in the employment of the “Aberdeen Herald” Company. He was born of Protestant parents, but he became converted to the Roman Catholic Church when he was about twenty years of age. He afterwards studied for the priesthood at Blairs College, Aberdeen, and from thence proceeded to the Scotch Church at Valladolid, in Spain, where, on the completion of his studies, he was ordained, being then about thirty years of age. Returning to Scotland and attaching himself to what was then called the western district of the Roman Catholic Church, he served as priest in the neighbourhood of Glasgow for about three years. He afterwards returned to Valladolid, and acted for some years as a Professor at the Scotch College. Upwards of a quarter of a century ago, he was appointed to the

Church of St. Andrew's (the Pro-Cathedral) in Glasgow; and since then he has been a leading dignitary in his Church and a prominent citizen of Glasgow. The Holy See conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity; he became Provost of the Chapter of Canons in the diocese of Glasgow; and recently he received the title of Monsignor. He had been a member of the Glasgow School Board since the passing of the Education Act. Monsignor Munro has left his mark on the ecclesiastical literature of his time by the publication, in 1856, of a work on "Calvinism in its Relations to Scripture and Reason"—a work that created a great deal of discussion at the time of its publication.—*Daily Free Press*.

GEORGE NEILSON.

The deceased, who was a son of Mr. Neilson,



boatbuilder, received his education in Gordon's Hospital; and, having taken an excellent position as a pupil there, was under the then existing arrangement put forward for two sessions at the University. He then served an apprenticeship in the office of Messrs. J. & A. Blaikie, advocates, and after the dissolution of that firm went into the Great North Railway Office, where he for a considerable

period acted as private secretary under the

late Mr. W. B. Fergusson, who was appointed General Secretary after the amalgamation of the Great North and Deeside lines; the length of his railway service extending to about twenty years. Since he left it in 1880, Mr. Neilson had been in business successively in Liverpool, London, and Bristol. Just a little over three years ago he returned to Aberdeen, considerably broken down in health. Mr. Neilson, who had reached the age of 52, was a man of an exceedingly amiable and gentle character. He leaves a widow and several of a family.—*Daily Free Press*.

WILLIAM NESS.

Deceased, who was a native of Kirkcaldy, came to Aberdeen about seven years ago as principal assistant to the late

Mr. John Muill, advocate. On the demise of Mr. Muill, Mr. Ness was appointed secretary of the Heritable Investment Company, a post which he has filled with much acceptance to the directors of the Company, and to their numerous customers. Although Mr. Ness

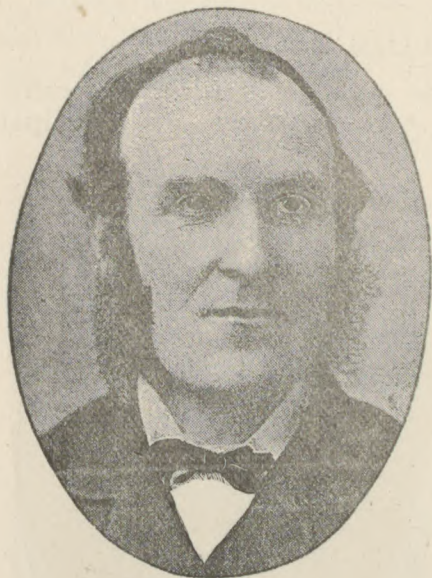
has been cut off at a comparatively early age, he had made for himself an excellent reputation as a well-informed and judicious man of business, and his opinion on financial matters was considered of much value. In private life, Mr.



Ness was of a most unassuming and gentle character, and was greatly esteemed by a wide circle of friends. Deceased, who was a member of the Free West Church, was only 32 years of age, and was unmarried.

ALEXANDER NICOLSON, *Baker*.

Mr. Nicolson was, if we mistake not, a native of Pittenweem, and was born on 18th February, 1836.



He came early to Aberdeen, where he started business as a baker 29 years ago, succeeding to the business of the late James Inglis. Always a hard worker, both in the bakehouse and in superintending his large business, it is to be feared that he overtaxed his strength & brought on the trouble which terminated his life so suddenly. Disease of the heart was the cause of

death. Deceased was a well-known figure in Trinity Hall. He joined the Baker Incorporation in 1865, and after filling the offices of Boxmaster and Deacon he was elected in 1884 Factor of the General Trades Widows' Fund, one of the most important positions of trust in connection with the Incorporated Trades. From that post he retired a few years ago, and was succeeded by Mr. Peter

Beveridge. He was subsequently appointed, on the death of Baillie Berry, Factor of the Supplementary Widows' Fund. Mr. Nicolson was a man of singularly pleasant disposition. He could talk freely on all public questions, and had a keen sense of humour that made acquaintance with him very agreeable indeed. He will be missed by a large circle of friends. A widow and grown-up family are left to mourn his loss.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

EX-BAILLIE OGILVIE.

The deceased, who was a native of the county of Aberdeen, carried on business for a good many years as a bookseller in Upperkirkgate. It

was in 1869 that he first unsuccessfully offered himself as a candidate for the Town Council; and in 1871 he was returned unopposed as one of the representatives of the new Third Ward, created under the Improvements Act of that date. When his three years' term had expired, he, in 1874, offered himself for re-election; and also in 1876, but it

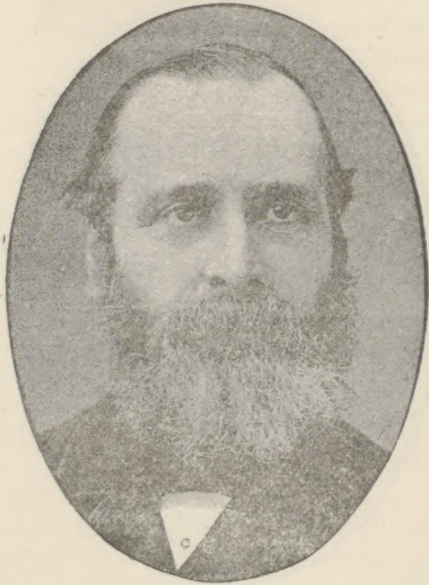


was not until 1877 that he found a seat again for the Third Ward, along with the late Mr. Robert Urquhart. In 1880 he was once more returned for the Third Ward unopposed, along with Mr. Esslemont, now M.P. for East Aberdeenshire. And in 1883, when the

Rosemount Improvements Bill, promoted by Mr. Esslemont, had been made the subject of a strenuous and rather embittered opposition, he was returned for the Rosemount Ward as an Improvements candidate, along with Mr. James Kinghorn and Mr. Charles Gordon. Next year he was made Sixth Baillie. Returning to the Council in 1887, after a contest for "the honours" between "the new party," as they were then styled, and what, we suppose, may be styled "the old gang," which led to a division over five of the six Baillieships, Mr. Ogilvie was elected Third Baillie. In 1889 he resigned office on account of failing health. The deceased was for a good many years a member of the City Parochial Board. He was also a director of the Reformatory, and in that capacity, as well as in his capacity of Magistrate, he took a special interest in the reclamation and proper training of neglected children, and those who had lapsed, or were in danger of lapsing, into crime. Of the deceased it may be said that, whilst essentially on the side of progress in matters affecting the city, he was never a blind partisan, but strove to weigh every question conscientiously, according to his lights. On all occasions opposed to extravagant expenditure, he never hesitated to give his support to what he believed to be for the benefit of the town. Strongly interested in questions affecting the social and moral condition of the people, he was prepared to give his hearty concurrence to the avowed policy of the "New Party" of 1888 in regard to the restriction of licences; and certainly no one could have shown a more earnest desire to act in consistency with his principles. A Wesleyan Methodist by religious connection, Mr. Ogilvie took a warm interest in the general work of his Church, and we believe had for many years acted as local missionary treasurer. Mr. Ogilvie leaves a widow, but no family.—*Daily Free Press*.

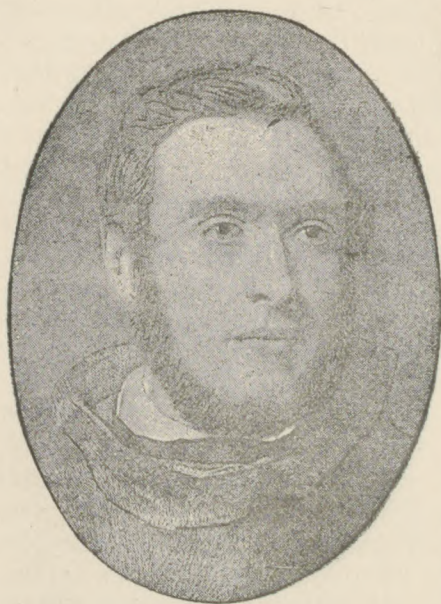
SAMUEL PATERSON, *Accountant.*

Mr. Paterson, who was 62 years of age, was a native of New Deer, and son of the late Rev. Mr. Paterson, New Deer U.P. Church. In 1849 deceased entered the office of Messrs. Adam & Anderson, advocates Aberdeen, as cashier, where he remained till 1852, when he was appointed accountant to the Great North of Scotland Railway Company, and from that time till now he occupied the position and filled it with conspicuous success. A capital business man, and kindly and genial to all, he was respected by the company and held in high esteem by all his fellow-employees. For many years Mr. Paterson had been connected with Charlotte Street U.P. Church, of which he was an elder. He is survived by a widow.—*Aberdeen Journal.*

WILLIAM PENNY, *late Shipmaster.*

The deceased was a native of Peterhead, where he was born on 12th July, 1809. His father was a whale "skipper," and young Penny, not unnaturally, took to the whale fishing, and became a "skipper" in turn. He was sent to sea (or he went to sea) when

he was twelve years of age, and he led a seafaring life for well on to forty-six years, retiring about five-and-twenty years ago, and settling down in



Aberdeen, where he had established his home when quite a young man. Many a cruise did Penny make to the Arctic regions — profitable cruises, we daresay, for those were the days when big—positively huge—cargoes of whale-oil were obtained; and experience and observation had made Penny acquainted with valuable fishing ground. Captain Penny was among the earliest advocates of the adoption

of steam vessels for the prosecution of the whale fishery; and a Mr. Stephen, of Dundee, having taken up the idea and constructed a steamer, Captain Penny took command of it—the first steam whaler. The men who ordinarily formed the crews of the whalers were greatly incensed at this new departure, and threatened to “tar and feather” Penny; but the threat was not executed, and steam whalers soon became the order of the day.

As has been already indicated, Captain Penny played a not unimportant part in the search for Sir John Franklin and the ill-fated crews of the “Erebus” and “Terror.” He was assigned the command of two brigs, the “Lady Franklin” and “Sophia” (so named after Lady Franklin’s daughter, we presume), having

thus control of an expedition separate from but subordinate or supplementary to one conducted by Captain Austin in vessels of the Royal Navy. He sailed from this country in May, 1850, and in the course of the summer he discovered at Beechy Island, in Wellington Channel, distinct traces of Sir John Franklin's winter quarters for the year 1845-6—the year that Sir John Franklin left England. Small stores of different kinds were found; and three graves were also found, the head-boards showing them to be those of three seamen who died in the spring of 1846. The place at Beechy Island was examined by H.M. ships after it had been discovered by Captain Penny; but nothing further was found, and the vessels had to abandon all hope of finding the lost expedition, and returned home. Captain Penny returned in September, 1851. His vessel the "Lady Franklin" was fallen in with about twenty miles north of the Orkneys by H.M.S. "Tartarus," under the command of Lieutenant R. Risk, R.N., then engaged in fishing inspection, the Secretary of the Board of Fisheries being on board. Lieutenant Risk immediately embarked Captain Penny, with the despatches for the Admiralty from Captain Austin's squadron, and sailed direct for Aberdeen, so as to enable Captain Penny to proceed to London by express train.

Captain Penny married, in 1840, a Miss Irvine, of Aberdeen, who died eight months ago; and he is survived by a son, a tea planter in India, and a daughter.—*Daily Free Press*.

Quarter-Master PHYN.

Mr. Phyn enlisted into what was then called the Fusilier Guards when he was 16 years of age, and served a period of 18 years in that regiment. On leaving the Guards, he joined the 3rd Battalion

Gordon Highlanders as sergeant-major in 1857, and was promoted to the rank of quarter-master in 1878—a position which he held until his resignation some time ago. Mr. Phyn was very upright and diligent in his duty as a soldier, and was greatly respected both in military and civil circles. He was deeply imbued with soldierly instinct, and in accordance with his own desire was buried in full uniform.—*Daily Free Press.*

JOHN B. PIRIE, *Architect.*

Deceased who was a little over forty years of age, was a native of Aberdeen, his father having been for



many years a sailing captain in the service of Messrs. George Thompson & Company. After being educated at a once well-known local institution—Ledingham's Academy—Mr. Pirie was apprenticed to Mr. Alexander Ellis, architect, Aberdeen. He was afterwards for a short time in the office of Mr. David Bryce, architect, Edinburgh; and then for about ten years he was leading

draughtsman to Mr. James Matthews, architect, Aberdeen. He set up business as an architect on his own account about fifteen years ago, and a year or two later he entered into partnership

with Mr. Arthur Clyne, the firm name being Pirie & Clyne. A number of prominent buildings in the city and county have been designed by the firm, notably the Anderson Library at Woodside, the new Academy at Peterhead, the Victoria Hall (Colonel Farquharson's) in Castleton, Braemar; while outside Aberdeenshire mention may be made of the Macduff Town Hall, and Craiglockhart Laundry. The firm also submitted designs for numerous works decided by competition, including particularly what was admittedly an artistic and quite unique design for the Aberdeen Public Library, and designs for the Aberdeen Art Gallery, the Glasgow Municipal Buildings, and St. Leonard's Free Church, Perth. Of Mr. Pirie's individual work before he entered into partnership with Mr. Clyne, the most conspicuous memorial, probably, is the Queen's Cross Free Church. As most readers must be aware, this is a building of very graceful design, though marred somewhat in its proportions, its length hardly corresponding to the spaciousness of its façade or its high-pitched roof and elegant tower; but the façade alone, with its handsome entrance and large surmounting window, with carved mullions of granite, has always been a feature of general admiration. Sometime before he designed this church, Mr. Pirie designed a new Free Church for Fraserburgh—a building in some respects not unlike that at Queen's Cross. In the opinion of many of his friends, however, Mr. Pirie's most original work—certainly the one on which he expended most time—was his last—the design for the elaborate monument to the late Mr. James Saint, jun., in Allenvale Cemetery; its execution relieved many an hour of illness, and not improbably the deceased architect may have felt it to be his last work, and so made it his best. Enough has been said to show that Mr. Pirie was an architect of distinctive originality, whose work was characterised by great individuality

in design and treatment. Most of his architectural work was of the Gothic order—the impetus to which was probably based on an intimate acquaintance with and close study of the works of Ruskin. He was otherwise well-read in the literature of his profession, and at one time prepared material for a paper on “Beauty in Art,” to be read to the Philosophical Society, but his illness prevented the full development of this purpose. Mr. Pirie was married, and is survived by his widow and five of a family.—*Daily Free Press*.

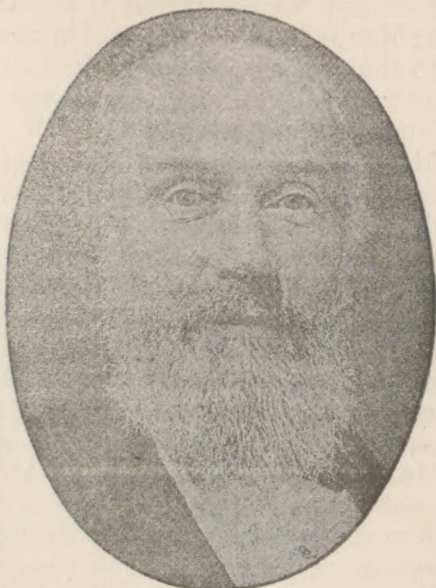
Dr. POLSON, *Garmond*.

Deceased was a native of Aberdeen, and was educated at King’s College. He came to Garmond about 60 years ago, and entered upon what proved to be a very successful career as a medical practitioner. For many years he was medical officer to the Parochial Board. After the passing of the Education Act he served as a member of the School Board for some time, and always took a great interest in all public matters relating to the parish. He was a member of the Established Church, and in politics a staunch Conservative. He was greatly interested in agricultural pursuits, and during two leases held the occupancy of the farm of Waulkmill. Although he had practically retired from the profession for some time back his services were often sought for. He leaves a widow and grown-up family.—*Daily Free Press*.

PETER RAEBURN, *Baker*.

Deceased was born at Tomintoul, in Banffshire, and came to the city in 1848, and worked for a period of four or five years as a journeyman at his trade.

He then started business on his own account, which he conducted successfully for some ten years, when he joined in partnership with Mr. George Garden; the firm being known as Garden & Raeburn. He took a prominent interest in the affairs of the Incorporated Trades, with which he became connected in 1864, having passed through the various offices in his own trade, and held the position of convener of the Seven Incorporated Trades. He acted as Factor for the



Kincorth estate and the Trinity Cemetery, which belong to the Bakers' Incorporation. As a token of the appreciation in which he was held by the other members of Trinity Hall, it will be remembered that they recently caused Mr. Raeburn's portrait to be painted by Mr. Sheriffs that it might hang on their walls as a fitting tribute to a gentleman who had given so much of his time to the interests of the Incorporated Trades. He took an active part in all matters relating to St. Mary's Cathedral, Huntly Street, and, though never aspiring to municipal honours, cherished a keen interest in the welfare of the city.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

JOHN REID, *Advocate*.

Mr. Reid was a native of Aberdeen, having been born in the Green on 3rd March, 1822, and was thus

in his seventy-first year. His father was Mr. James Reid, a merchant and shipbuilder. Mr. Reid received his education at the Grammar School and at Marischal College; and in 1836 he was apprenticed to the firm with which he had been so long connected, and which at that time was represented by Mr. Thomas Burnett and his son, Mr. Newell Burnett. Mr. Reid became a member of the Society of Advocates in 1854, and in the same year, on the death of Mr. Thomas Burnett, he was taken into partnership by Mr. Newell Burnett, the firm becoming Burnett & Reid. The firm had a good county connection, among the factorships possessed by it being that for the Earl of Erroll; and it also did a large general business. The deceased gentleman was comparatively little known, however, outside the legal profession and business circles. He never at any time took any prominent part in public life; indeed, it was a characteristic of the man that he rather shrank from anything of the nature of publicity. He was, on the death of Mr. Newell Burnett in 1878, appointed interim Clerk of Supply and County Road Clerk, and was requested to stand for the appointment, but his aversion to public office already indicated kept him from acceding to the request. For a considerable number of years, however, Mr. Reid discharged the duties of Clerk to the County and Municipal Buildings Commissioners. He was also a director of the Northern Assurance Company and of the City of Aberdeen Land Association. Latterly, he had assumed into partnership Mr. W. Woodman Smith and his nephew, Mr. John R. Dean, S.S.C.

Although he took no active part in public life, Mr. Reid was keenly interested in local and Imperial affairs. In politics he was a Conservative. He took a great interest in agricultural matters, and for nineteen years was tenant of the farm of Auchtielair, in the neighbourhood of Old Deer. On the expiry

of the lease of that farm in 1880, Mr. Reid purchased the property of Shannaburn, where during a large part of the year he used to reside. He was never married.—*Daily Free Press.*

DR. WILLIAM REID.

Dr. Reid, who was 56 years of age, was born at Backhill, Crimond, where his father was a farmer. He was educated at the Old Town Grammar School and at King's and Marischal Colleges. At King's College he went through the whole of the Arts classes, and also the classes at Marischal College, where, in 1862, he took the degrees of M.B. and C.M. In his medical classes he took a high place, being first prizeman in Botany and Natural History. Leaving college he became clinical assistant to Dr. Kilgour at the Royal Infirmary. Afterwards he went to Orkney, where he practised for three years. He then came to Aberdeen, and, taking up his residence in Crown Street, established a practice which gradually grew to be one of great magnitude. He also conducted a large laboratory in Crown Street. By gentlemen in his profession he was held in high respect. Of all medical matters, especially midwifery, he had an extensive knowledge. He had also a profound knowledge of scientific subjects, including natural history and astronomy. Dr. Reid was a man of refined literary tastes, and was possessed of a splendid library, on the shelves of his bookcases being many rare antiquarian treasures. Dr. Reid, who was pre-deceased by his wife, leaves no family.—*Northern Daily News.*

JOHN ROBB, *Builder.*

A native of Fraserburgh, Mr. Robb served his apprenticeship there to the joiner trade with his

father. While still a young man he moved to Aberdeen, and entered the employment of the late

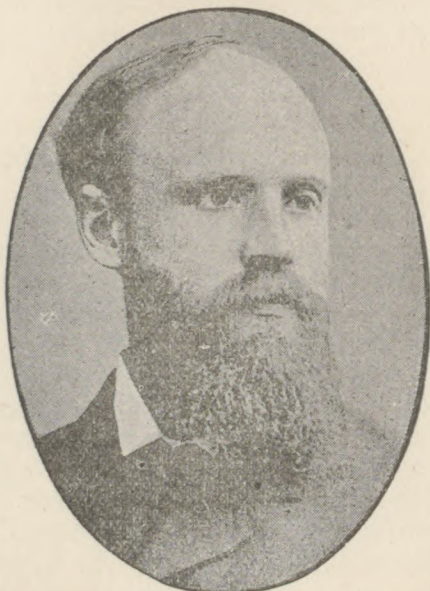


Baillie Watson. He became, in course of time, foreman to the latter, and was ultimately assumed as a partner in the firm. As an inspector of works, Mr. Robb superintended the erection of many large and important buildings in the north of Scotland—notably Balmoral Castle—and latterly he acquired an extensive practice as a valuator of house property. In this capacity he was

employed by the Northern Assurance Company, the Scottish Provincial Assurance Company, for the Town Council, the School Board, and, in cases of reference, in the Sheriff Court. As a thoroughly competent valuator, Mr. Robb enjoyed a wide reputation, and as a business man generally he was regarded as sound and capable in the highest degree. Personally, he was of a retiring disposition; he never took any prominent part in public affairs, but he was held by all who knew him in very high regard. He was a Free Churchman, a member of Free Trinity, and it may be noted that he gifted to that church one of the ornamental windows inserted in the course of the recent restorations. Mr. Robb was unmarried.—*Daily Free Press.*

Professor CROOM ROBERTSON.

The late Professor was an Aberdonian. Born in March, 1842, Professor Croom Robertson was educated at the Grammar School and University of his native place, and had a brilliant College career. He graduated in 1861, and later in the same year he became the Ferguson ethical scholar, and continued his studies until the end of 1863 at University College, London, and the Universities of Berlin, Gottingen, and Paris. He then returned to Aber-



deen in 1864 as Assistant-Professor of Greek to Professor Geddes, and held this appointment until December, 1866, when he went to London to fill the Chair of Mental Philosophy and Logic in the University College. From 1868 to 1873 and again from 1883, he held the position of Examiner in Philosophy in the University of London; in a similar capacity his services were taken advantage of by the Aberdeen University (1869 to 1872 and 1878 to 1881); and in the University of Cambridge he was Examiner in the Moral Science Tripos, 1877-78. In collaboration with Dr. Alexander Bain, Professor Robertson was editor of Grote's posthumous work on Aristotle, published in 1872; he was editor of and a frequent contributor to the quarterly review of

Psychology and Philosophy called "Mind" from its commencement in 1872; for Blackwood's Philosophical Classic series he wrote the treatise on "Hobbes" (1886), and he was also the author of several philosophical articles in the ninth edition of the *Encyclopædia Britannica*.—*Northern Evening News*.

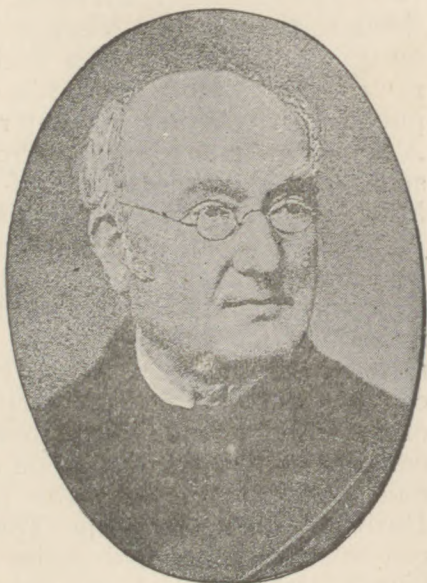
Rev. DONALDSON ROSE, *Brechin*.

Mr. Rose, who was a son of the late Mr. Donaldson Rose, shipowner, Aberdeen, was born in the year 1818. He studied at Aberdeen University, and after finishing his Arts and Divinity studies, was, in 1843, ordained to the ministry of Kennethmont Free Church, in the Presbytery of Alford. Mr. Rose remained in his first charge for about seventeen years, labouring with much acceptance and success, but in 1860 he accepted a call to the East Free Church, Brechin, as successor to Rev. Mr. Carlisle, who had demitted the charge for the purpose of proceeding to India. At Kennethmont, Mr. Rose was succeeded by Rev. Dr. Emslie, now minister of St. Paul's, Christchurch, New Zealand. Mr. Rose was a man of sterling principles and a sound and able preacher, and was held in the very highest esteem and respect by the community amongst whom he had spent thirty-two years of his ministerial life. In 1878, Rev. T. L. Ritchie was appointed assistant to Mr. Rose, and two years later was elected his colleague and successor. For the last five or six years Mr. Rose had taken little active part in the work of the congregation. Deceased is survived by four sons and two daughters, one of whom is the wife of Mr. Ritchie, who now succeeds to the full charge of the East Free Church, Brechin; and the other is married to Rev. Mr. Forgan, Rothesay.—*Daily Free Press*.

Ex-Baillie JAMES ROSS.

Deceased was the son of Charles Ross, a weaver, and was born at Gordon's Mills in the year 1817; he had thus attained the advanced age of 75. He was entirely a self-made man; he received little or no education; but he overcame this and other short-comings of his early days by indomitable perseverance and energy.

At the early age of nine, he entered the spinning department of Gordon's Mills, and continued working there (latterly as overseer) for about twelve years. At the expiry of that period Mr. Ross left the mills and commenced business as a clothier in George Street. He, as already indicated, developed a successful business, conducting it on what perhaps would now be termed quiet and unpretentious lines, but nevertheless securing a large and profitable connection. In March, 1891, Mr. Ross retired from business, after having conducted it for the long period of fifty-three years.



Keenly interested in all public and political affairs, and residing in a Ward (the Second) which contained a large number of public-spirited men by whom the discussion of civic matters was actively kept up, Mr. Ross gradually won his way to the front as "a public man." He stood as a candidate for the Second

Ward in conjunction with the late Mr. Robert Urquhart in 1865, and was returned along with Mr. Urquhart, the defeated candidate being the late Mr. James Clark. He continuously represented the ward (with the exception of a break of four years, 1873-7) down to the "general election" of 1883 consequent on the extension of the municipal area and the re-arrangement of the wards, when he retired from public life. When he entered the Council, Sir Alexander Anderson was Provost, and Mr. Ross subsequently served under four other Provosts—Mr. Alexander Nicol, Mr. William Leslie, Mr. George Jamieson (twice), and Mr. Peter Esslemont. He was elected a Baillie in 1878 (during Mr. Jamieson's Provostship), and remained in the Magistracy till his retirement from the Council. He was a prominent member of the "Party of Progress," and as such espoused the purchase of Torry Farm, the devolution of the Guildry funds to the more general use of the community, the amalgamation of the Town Council and the Police Board, the continued control of Harbour affairs by the Town Council, and, in general, the municipal policy identified with the names, first, of Mr. J. W. Barclay and Mr. William Leslie, and, afterwards, with the names of Mr. Robert Urquhart and Mr. Esslemont. Besides taking an active interest in the large and varied business of the Town Council, Mr. Ross also entered heartily into the work connected with the management of Gordon's College, the Royal Infirmary, and many other local institutions.

In general politics, Mr. Ross was an advanced Radical; and, being a keen Dissenter, he was a warm advocate of disestablishment and of civil and religious liberty generally. He took a leading part in all Town Council debates on questions affecting Disestablishment politics, such, for instance, as the (once) annual contest over the election of an Assembly representative. He was what may be termed, without

offence, a "lively" debater, always vigorous and voluble, and often pointed and forcible. His style of speech had a very marked disposition towards the jocular treatment of a subject; hence, his rising was generally looked forward to as likely to add zest to a debate, and the reports of his speeches were frequently interlarded with "laughter." These qualities of his oratory made him in great request at public meetings; and in the erstwhile vivacious ward meetings, particularly those in the Second Ward, he often played a conspicuous part; certainly, he was not the least popular speaker of his time. He took part in the formation of the Aberdeen Liberal Association; but on the "split" occurring in the Liberal party six years ago, he declined to endorse the Home Rule policy and identified himself with the Unionist section of the party.

Mr. Ross who was an attached member of the U.P. Church was never married, and his nearest relatives are two sisters, one of whom is married to Mr. Cameron, late carpenter, the other residing with him at Cults.—*Daily Free Press*.

Major ROSS, *Chief Constable of Aberdeenshire.*

Major Ross was appointed head of the Aberdeenshire police force in March, 1863, in succession to Mr. T. W. Barnes, retired. Prior to that time, he had completed a service of twenty years in the Indian army, Bengal establishment. Nine of these years he passed on the general staff of the army as brigade-major, and two on the regimental staff as adjutant of the 71st regiment of Native infantry. He served in the second Punjaub campaign, and obtained a medal for these services.

On the introduction of the English system of police into India in the early part of 1861, Major (then

Captain) Ross was selected by Sir R. Montgomery, Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab, to organise the new system as District-Superintendent of Police at Sealkote. In view of a necessary return to England within a couple of years or so, Captain Ross had to vacate this appointment, which, however, he held sufficiently long to become well acquainted with his new duties, and the district entrusted to his care was for some time distinguished as the one in which the new system worked well and smoothly, and as such it received the commendation of the Lieutenant-Governor. In contemplation of returning to India, deceased had it directly in view to devote himself to the acquisition of a thorough and personal acquaintance with the police and detective systems of England and Scotland in order to perfect his fitness for police service there. His appointment, however, as Chief Constable of Aberdeenshire at the time stated led to his purpose in that respect being, so far, interfered with; and he had to acquire the knowledge he wished in a more directly practical way. But with the support of an admirable and experienced second in the person of the late Mr. James Cran, with whom his relations were always of the most cordial and satisfactory sort, he had no difficulty from the very outset in retaining the full confidence of the Committee under whom he acted, while securing the entire respect of the men who acted under him.

During the whole time of his service as Chief Constable of the County, Major Ross, who, as proprietor of the estate of Tillycorthie, was directly interested in county business, took a lively interest in public affairs in so far as his official position permitted. An attached Free Churchman, he was for a good many years an elder in the Free High Church congregation, and was repeatedly a member of the General Assembly. Latterly he had been a member of Queen's Cross Free Church.

The deceased, whose father was a West India planter, was, we believe, born in Grenada. He married Miss Flora Ann, daughter of Dr. Kenneth Mackinnon, of the Bengal Medical Service, who survives him, and by whom he leaves a family of four sons and two daughters. His oldest son, Mr. J. K. Ross, holds a Government appointment in Fiji; his second son, Mr. A. Carnegie Ross, is British Consul at Quilimaine in South Africa; and the two younger sons, Mr. C. Ross and Mr. R. Ross, are ranche farmers in the far west of Canada.—*Daily Free Press.*

WILLIAM ROUGH, *Teacher.*

Deceased was a native of Kintore, where he served his apprenticeship as a pupil teacher in the Free Church School, then under the headmastership of Mr. J. A. Phillips, now of Northfield Public School, Aberdeen. He afterwards attended the classes at King's College, with a view to qualifying for the ministry; but before he finished his course he changed his mind as to a profession, and did not graduate. He then went to England, where he was for some time engaged as a teacher. Subsequently he was employed as a teacher at Dundee, and a little over four years ago he entered the service of the Aberdeen School Board. He was held in high respect by the rector of the Grammar School and by his employers, having won their esteem by his efficient work as a teacher. Mr. Rough possessed an affable manner, and being of a genial disposition, was a great favourite with a large circle of friends.—*Aberdeen Journal.*

G. D. RUTHERFORD, *Advocate.*

Mr. Rutherford, who was about 64 years of age, was a native of Roxburghshire, his father having been

a distinguished officer of the 94th Scotch Brigade, who at one time held the staff appointment of



barrack-master at Aberdeen. But, though not an Aberdonian, Mr. Rutherford closely identified himself with the affairs of his adopted city during the many years he lived in it. Educated at Edinburgh, he came to Aberdeen, where he entered the office of Messrs. J. & A. Blaikie, advocates, to study the law, and after serving his apprenticeship with that firm he started

business on his own account in 1864. A Conservative in politics, he frequently discharged the duties of election agent in both city and county. Amongst other engagements of this kind he acted for Mr. James Shaw, and also for Sir Thomas Gladstone of Fasque. In 1883 he was appointed auditor of Aberdeen Sheriff Court. An excellent man of business, Mr. Rutherford was also a gentleman of courteous manners and kindly disposition, and was popular with all classes. Belonging to a military family, it goes without saying that the volunteer movement found in him one of its earliest and most enthusiastic supporters, and the 1st V.B.G.H., from which he retired some ten years ago with the rank of major, owed much to his efforts. All outdoor exercises, indeed, claimed his support, but he was specially devoted to the game of curling, and was a

member of the Aberdeen club. A member of the Church of Scotland, he was devoted to her interests, and took much concern in the affairs of Cults Church, of which he was a manager. Several years ago he purchased the property of Upper Deebank, Murtle, part of which he feued, but retained the portion on which he built his residence, Lynnwood, where he has since lived. Mr. Rutherford married Miss Jessie Macdonald, a sister of the late Mr. Alexander Macdonald of Kepplestone, by whom, as also by their family—three daughters and a son—he is survived. The son, Mr. Allaster M. Rutherford, holds an appointment at Stoneywood Paper Works. —*Aberdeen Journal*.

Major-General RUTHERFORD.

John Wellwood Rutherford, who was in his 66th year, was a native of Roxburghshire. His father, an officer who went through all the Peninsular War with the 94th Scotch Brigade, was at one time barrack-master at Aberdeen. John, the eldest of a family of three sons and three daughters, naturally adopted his father's profession, and in 1841, at the early age of sixteen, he joined the 47th Madras Native Infantry. The thirty years he served in India covered what are now historical events in the annals of the British army, and among other notable incidents in his career, the young officer went through the whole of the Mutiny, undergoing

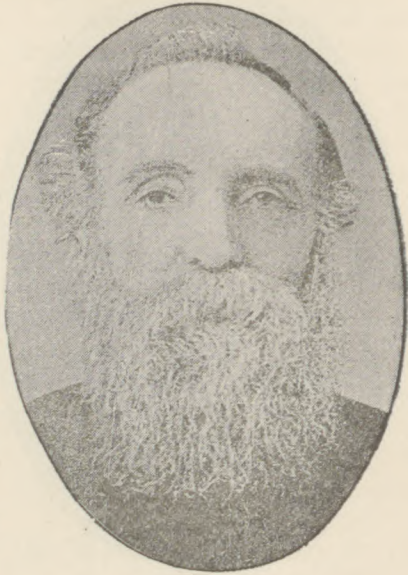


much hardship and doing good service, which was rewarded with a medal. After thirty-five years service, he retired with the rank of major-general sixteen years ago, and settled in Aberdeenshire, taking up his residence first at Altries (Deeside), next at Johnston (near Kepplestone), and latterly at 38 Albyn Place. That affection of the heart which has ultimately carried him away caused him to avoid all violent exercise, and the recreations of these latter days had to be carefully selected. Angling, golfing, and curling were therefore his favourite pastimes, and all who were thrown in contact with him in these sports know how kindly, courteous, and obliging was his disposition. Besides being a member of the Aberdeen Golf Club, General Rutherford acted as president of the Aberdeen Curling Club, by the members of which he was held in high respect, both for his skill at that game and for his amiable and genial manner. He also took a keen interest in fishing, and was considered by all as an expert angler. He was a Justice of the Peace of the County, and an elder in Craigiebuckler Parish Church. Deceased (who was never married) and Mr. George D. Rutherford, advocate, were brothers.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

Rev. GEORGE SAUNDERS, *Woodside*.

Mr. Saunders, who was 61 years of age, was a native of Peterhead, and was in his early years a member of the Congregational Church there. He was originally a tradesman, but, always having a strong leaning to evangelistic work and Sunday school teaching, he was induced to study for the ministry. He became a student and city missionary in Glasgow in 1853, and completed his curriculum in Edinburgh, where he studied under Dr. Wardlaw and Dr. Lindsay Alexander. In 1857 he was ordained to the pastorate

of the Congregational Church, Millseat, in succession to Rev. Joseph Morrison. He remained at Millseat till 1879, when he came to Woodside, in succession to Rev. James' Rae, now of New Deer. He was a zealous Christian worker, and many beyond his own congregation had experienced tokens of his sympathy and kindly dealings with them in times of affliction. He was a man who had many friends and no enemies. In politics, Mr. Saunders was a strong Gladstonian. He served two terms

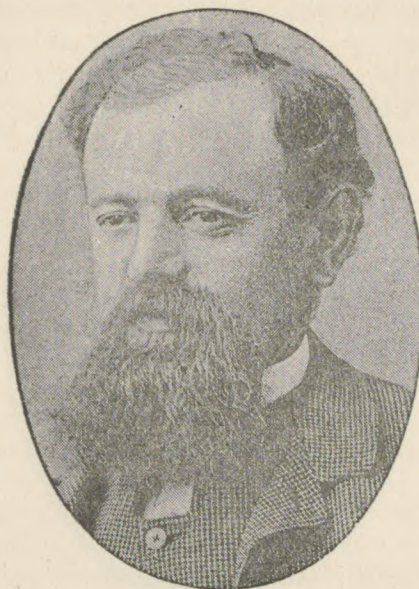


on the Oldmachar School Board, and in all local matters he played an active and useful part. He was a staunch teetotaller. He married a daughter of Rev. Joseph Morrison, his predecessor at Millseat, and is survived by his widow and six of a family. Two daughters are in London in the Postal Department of the Civil Service, and one is married to Mr. Farquhar, schoolmaster, Craigton, Peterculter. The oldest son is a doctor at Dounby, Orkney, and a boy and a girl are at home.—*Daily Free Press*.

GEORGE SHARP, *Shipmaster*.

Captain Sharp was a native of Aberdeen, and from a boy at the ropework succeeded in raising himself to a highly creditable position. He served

for 21 years in the Royal Naval Reserve, and his training in that service was of value to him when he



took command of vessels for himself. He served for a time on sailing ships belonging to the port, one of these being "The Messenger."

He was for a year in command of the s.s. "Hayle," belonging to Messrs. Adam & Co., and for the last six years he has been master of the "Spray," belonging to Messrs. Ellis and M'Hardy, Aberdeen, trading in coal. He was an experienced and careful officer,

and was very much respected by the seafaring population of the port, and held in the highest esteem by his personal friends, who deeply regret his demise at the comparatively early age of fifty. He leaves a widow and three sons and two daughters.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

WILLIAM SHIVAS, *Shoemaker*.

Born at Stuartfield, Old Deer, in 1819, deceased came to this city about fifty years ago, and settled down to his trade. But, although an excellent workman, he "never went into business for himself," as the phrase goes. He became a "pupil-master"—that is, one who took in young men from the country

in order to finish their time. He was, perhaps, the last of this old school, and certainly one of the best, his reputation as a bootmaker being wide-extended throughout the county. Like many other members of his craft, he was a Radical, and in his young days identified himself with the Chartist movement, but he never obtruded his views in public. Indeed, he was of a particularly retiring disposition, but still a man whose opinion was much sought after and esteemed in his own class. He was a keen sportsman, both with rod and gun, at a time when indulgence in such pastimes could be had almost by any who chose. As a draughts player, too, he was pretty well known, on one occasion having got a draw from the Herd Laddie himself. Mr. Shivas was a member of the Evangelical Union body, and was pre-deceased by his wife about six years ago.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

WILLIAM SIMPSON.

Mr. William Simpson was a son of Mr. Alexander Simpson, partner of a long-established firm in Union Buildings, and began business life as a clerk in the North of Scotland Bank. Young Simpson displayed a sensitive appreciation of music, and being a relative of the late Mr. William Smith, still held in deserved honour for his admirable "People's Tune Book," he laboured earnestly to promote the success of that, in its time, very popular collection. He was an early and zealous member of the once favourite "Harmonic Choir," and while in a quiet way he did good, and always free, service in helping forward the psalmody of city churches—particularly the humbler churches of every Presbyterian denomination—he invariably devoted his holidays to similar voluntary work in various districts of the country. There are not a few dwellers by the Dee, the Don, and the Feugh, who,

loving music for its own pure sake, will read with regret of the departure, after many years of retirement,



of gentle, kindly William Simpson. Mr. Simpson, it may be added, was in some sense a fore-runner of the local pedestrianism that is now so much the vogue. For years he was a very vigorous "tramp," and his acquaintance with Aberdeenshire hills and Aberdeenshire scenery was as extensive as that of almost any man's. To a knowledge of topography he added no mean knowledge

of geology and botany, and the accounts of his excursions contributed to the columns of the "Free Press" were fully as graphic and interesting as any we have published since.—*Daily Free Press.*

REV. JOHN SKENE.

Deceased was a native of Aberdeen, and was born in 1819. He was educated at the Grammar School, under the distinguished Dr. James Melvin; and after leaving that institution, he attended the usual University and divinity course, graduating M.A. before leaving King's College. In 1847 Rev. Mr. Skene was ordained to the charge of the Wallace-town Free Church, Dundee, which charge he resigned

in 1877, after a ministry of thirty years. At the time of his ordination, worship was conducted in the old Parish Church, and this was continued till 1852, when the congregation removed to the present church, which was opened by the late Dr. Guthrie. The deceased, who carried on his labours among the working-class community in one of the worst parts of Dundee, was greatly respected by every one with whom he came in contact, and his earnest and untiring efforts in caring for the spiritual wants of the many members of his congregation were appreciated not only by the members themselves, but also by his fellow-workers in the Presbytery. Deceased resigned his charge in 1877, and removed to his native city to spend his closing days in quiet and comfort. He was in his 73rd year, and leaves a widow and two of a family—a son and daughter. His son is Rev. Alexander Leslie Skene, M.A., who is at present in charge of the Free Church Mission Station at Sandhaven.—*Daily Free Press*.

WILLIAM SMART, *Merchant*.

Deceased, who was 76 years of age, was a native of Glassel, and came to Aberdeen about sixty years ago. A short time afterwards, he went to the firm of Farquharsen & Co. as a clerk, where, by his energy and ability, he rose rapidly, and in a few years entered the firm as a partner. Upright and conscientious in his dealings, Mr. Smart was held in high esteem by all with whom he came in contact. He became a member of the Aberdeen Chamber of Commerce on its formation, and discharged with much acceptance to the members the duties of treasurer of that body. Of a quiet and reserved disposition, Mr. Smart never took a prominent part in public affairs, but for many years he was an

office-bearer in the South Free Church and the Free Church of Cults. Mr. Arthur A. Smart, now sole partner in the firm of Farquharson & Co., is the only surviving member of the family.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

ROBERT SMITH, of *Glenmillan*.

Mr. Smith was the eldest surviving son of Mr. Alexander Smith of Glenmillan, an advocate in Aberdeen, and was born in the year 1819. He was educated at Marischal College, where he graduated before he was twenty-one, taking a high place. In this connection it may be mentioned that Mr. Smith entertained a warm regard for his *alma mater*, in proof of which he recently gave a handsome donation to the extension scheme of the University. Mr. Smith, who joined his father in business, under the designation of A. & R. Smith, shortly after graduating, became a member of the Society of Advocates in 1839, and subsequently held the post of president for a year, discharging the duties in a most satisfactory manner. The business of the firm was afterwards carried on under the title of Smith & Cochran, when the late Mr. Cochran of Balfour became a member. The firm continued under this name until 1874, in which year Mr. Smith retired from the partnership, when the firm became Cochran & Anderson, and more recently Cochran & Macpherson. On the death of his father in 1847, Mr. Smith succeeded to the estate of Glenmillan. Four years previously—in 1843—Mr. Smith had been appointed to the factorship of Finzean, and for the long period of forty years he discharged the duties of this important stewardship with a conscientious devotion and loyalty to the interests of both proprietor and tenants. In August, 1884, when he retired from the factorship, the tenantry presented Mr. Smith with a half-length portrait of himself in oils, painted by Mr. Joseph

Farquharson, brother of Dr. Farquharson of Finzean, M.P. for West Aberdeenshire, as a mark of the affectionate regard in which he was held by them. He was also factor for a number of other estates. Mr. Smith for some years was clerk to the Aberdeen District Road Trustees, fulfilling successfully and acceptably the manifold duties pertaining to that office. The deceased gentleman did not take any prominent part in public life beyond his official duties. He was a Conservative in politics, and gave loyal and hearty support to the principles of his party; and he was also a staunch member of the Church of Scotland. He was an elder in the East Church for many years till he retired from business, and went to reside on the family property at Glenmillan, when he became an elder in Lumphanan Church. Generous to a degree, Mr. Smith contributed largely, but unostentatiously, to all religious and philanthropic schemes, not only of a local, but of a much wider character. He was honourable and upright in his dealings with all, and uniting to an unbending rectitude a courteous and urbane demeanour, was regarded, alike in public and private circles, with feelings of universal respect. In 1855, Mr. Smith married Miss Glennie, Maybank, Aberdeen, by whom he had two sons and several daughters. The elder son died in 1872, and the younger is now a farmer on a large estate in Iowa, United States. Mr. Smith is also survived by two brothers in Canada, and one an advocate in Edinburgh—Mr. Harry Smith, ex-sheriff-substitute of Greenock, and now M.P. for the Falkirk Burghs.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

FRANK ROBERT STORIE, C.E.

Mr. Storie, who was born in Aberdeen in 1844, received his practical training as an engineer at the Royal Arsenal, Woolwich, under Sir John Anderson,

also an Aberdonian. After serving his apprenticeship, Mr. Storie, in 1866, received the appointment of superintendent of the Turkish Government Arsenal at Constantinople. He occupied this post for several years with conspicuous success, having on one occasion had the honour of forming one of a deputation selected by the Sultan of Turkey to inspect various factories throughout Europe for the purpose of purchasing a new armament for the Turkish army. After the purchase of a new armament had been effected, Mr. Storie, in recognition of his services, received the distinction of Bey from the Sultan. A few years afterwards he returned to this country, and took a course of study at the Edinburgh University in higher mechanics and scientific engineering, under Professor Jenkins, and succeeded in carrying off the highest honours. He then went for a short time to the works of Messrs. Armstrong, Mitchell, & Co., Newcastle, where he received an insight into the manufacture of the heavier class of ordnance. In 1874 he was appointed superintendent of the Imperial Government Dockyards at Nagasaki, Japan, an appointment which he fulfilled until 1884. On leaving, Mr. Storie had the honour of having the Order of the Rising Sun conferred upon him by the Emperor of Japan. On his way home from Japan, Mr. Storie purchased a fruit-growing ranche in Fresno County, California, where, after a brief visit to this country, he returned, and has since resided. Mr. Storie was well known in the East as a straightforward man of business, as well as a practical engineer of the highest class, and one who could be relied upon in an emergency to do the best that practical knowledge and science combined could devise. Personally he was of an unassuming and loveable nature. His relations with the workmen under him wherever he went were always of the most cordial kind, as is shown by the testimonials which he received on leaving

Constantinople and Japan. Mr. Storie, who was eldest son of the late Rev. Archibald Storie, Inch, was married, in 1880, to Miss Gordon, daughter of the late Mr. George Gordon, Carden Terrace, by whom, and a family of four, he is survived.—*Daily Free Press*.

JOHN TAYLOR, *Ropemaker*.

Mr. Taylor was a native of Aberdeen, and was trained in his father's business, which he entered about 40 years ago, and ultimately he acquired the complete management of it. A man of extraordinary energy of character, and withal of remarkable



geniality, he was able to greatly extend the limits of the business, travelling almost constantly over a wide district of country, and making friends wherever he went. There was, in fact, no town or district in the north of Scotland where his figure has not been familiar for many years past. He was full of humour and had a kindly word and smile for all. Of late, in consequence of failing health, a change took place in the management of the business, which has for some time been carried on under the style of John Taylor and Co., by his son-in-law Mr. Watt. Mr. Taylor was

often urged to enter public life, but he invariably declined, devoting the whole of his time to his business, which demanded all his energies. His name, therefore, does not appear in connection with the management of any public boards, although he interested himself in public affairs generally. He was a man of great individuality of character, and conducted his business in a way peculiar to himself. In politics he was a Conservative, and was a member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church. He was married to Miss Pegler, a daughter of Mr. Pegler, fruit merchant, who pre-deceased him. He leaves four sons and two daughters.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

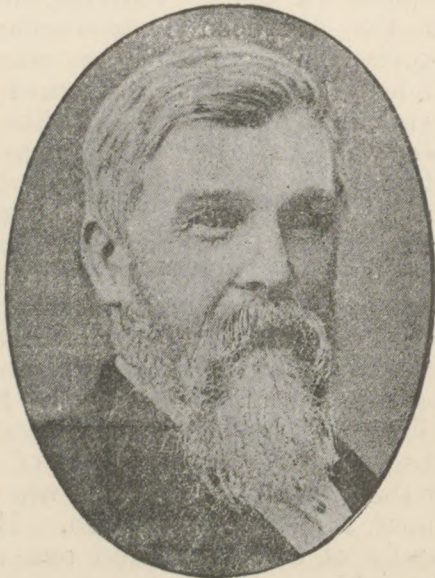
GEORGE M. URQUHART, *Indian Civil Service*.

Mr. Urquhart, who was a son of the late Captain Alexander Urquhart, received his early education at what was formerly Gordon's Hospital, leaving that institution in 1879. He was one of the six young men who first represented the institution at the University, and had the honour of gaining the highest bursary of the six—the Moir Bursary of £15—which was afterwards increased by the Governors, on the recommendation of Dr. Ogilvie, in respect of the distinguished merit of the holder. In his first session at college Mr. Urquhart was ninth prizeman in junior Greek. The following year he carried off the fifth prize in senior Greek and the fourth in junior mathematics. As a third year's student he came out seventh prizeman in natural philosophy. At this period—1881-82—he displayed considerable literary faculty, more especially in Greek verse. The circumstance of his combining classical facility with mathematical ability determined his friends to advise him to enter the arena of the Indian Civil Service competition; and July, 1882, saw him emerge successfully from his examination in that department.

Subsequently he returned to Aberdeen to complete his studies, and took his degree in 1884. On receiving his appointment he was, at the age of twenty-one, sent out to the Bombay Presidency, where he held the position of collector, being afterwards promoted to what is called a first-class Magistrate, on passing the necessary examinations. At the time of his death he was discharging the important duties of Deputy Commissioner. During his stay in India Mr. Urquhart found time to master several of the tribal languages. His career was as brilliant as it was unhappily brief. It was distinguished by high principle, nobility of character, and scholarly attainments which reflected credit on his *alma mater*. Mr. Urquhart is survived by a widow.—*Aberdeen Journal*.

Dr. JOHN URQUHART.

Dr. Urquhart, who was in his sixty-sixth year, was a native of Aberdeen, being a son of the late Baillie John Urquhart, and nephew of the late Baillie Robert Urquhart. He studied medicine in Aberdeen and Edinburgh, and took his degree of M.D. in the Scottish capital in 1847. Very shortly after graduating he went to India, where he practised for about twenty-two years, acting during that period as coroner of Madras, professor of medical jurisprudence and



lecturer in medicine in Madras College. Returning to Aberdeen about nineteen years ago, the doctor commenced practice, and became well known all over the city, particularly among the poor, who greatly appreciated his kindly and humane treatment. Soon after coming to the city, Dr. Urquhart was appointed physician to the Hospital for Incurables, and for a short time he acted as examiner in medicine in the University of Aberdeen. From the time he returned he took a great deal of interest in the management of the Royal Infirmary and Lunatic Asylum, and during the last few years he had devoted his attention chiefly to the Asylum. He was a member and for a time joint hon. secretary of the Aberdeen, Banff, and Kincardine branch of the British Medical Association and of the Medico-Chirurgical Society, and had been president of both in his rotation. He took a considerable interest in public business, and was a director of the Aberdeen Dairy Company. Among his professional brethren he was much respected, and by all he was esteemed for his agreeable, gentlemanly manner and his kindly disposition. He was an ardent temperance reformer, and often gave the results of his observation in India in favour of the benefits of abstinence. His services to the cause of music will not soon be forgotten in Aberdeen, and his presidency of the Choral Union is still remembered with satisfaction by the members. For a number of years Dr. Urquhart was an elder in the Free South Church, but latterly he was connected with the Free West congregation. He married Miss Humphrey, daughter of one of the East India Company's officers, who pre-deceased him about sixteen months ago. He is survived by a family of three sons and one daughter.—*Aberdeen Journal.*

ALEXANDER WALKER, *late Grain Merchant.*

Deceased belonged to a family long well known in the Garioch. His father, Mr. John Walker, was tenant of the farm of Gunhill, on the estate of Inveramsay—as his grandfather had also been. He died early in 1836, leaving a family of five sons. Of these Alexander Walker was the eldest, a younger brother being Dr. William Walker, of the Parsonage, Monymusk, so well known by his “Lives of the Scottish Bishops,” and other publications, who is now the only survivor of the brothers. After spending some five or six years in farm life after his father’s death, deceased entered the office of the late Mr. Robert Kemp, miller and grain merchant. In the course of years he became a partner with Mr. Kemp, and, after his decease, carried on the business himself under the firm name of Kemp & Walker, until his retirement some two or three years ago through failing health. Quiet and unobtrusive, almost to shyness, Mr. Walker was a man of much intelligence, having in early life, when the advantages were much fewer than they are now, developed a keen taste for reading, along with a distinct liking for mechanics, and had considerable faculty in that way. In common with other members of the family to which he belonged, he was a loyal and devoted member of the Scottish Episcopal Church; a member of St. Andrew’s congregation, and also a member of the vestry.—*Daily Free Press.*

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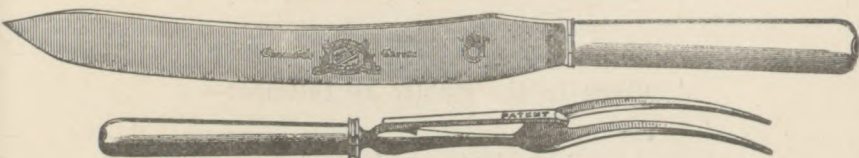
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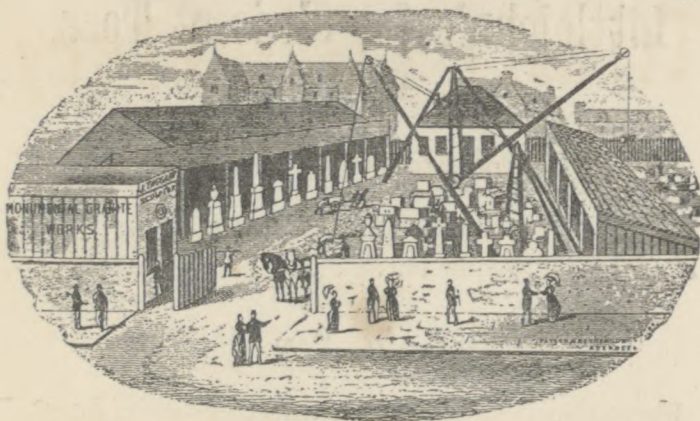
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
