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LETTER I.

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New-York, Dec. 17. 1739. My dear Friend.



Cannot omit any convenient Opportunity that offers, to let you know I am yet (thro' Mercy) upon the Stage, and in Health. A Line from you would be very ac-

ceptable. When you do write, let me have a particular Account of the Seceding Brethren, viz. Meffieurs Erskines, &c. how it goes with them, what Progress they make._____We of New-York, have been lately favoured with a short Visit from that excellent young Evangelist, the Reverend and famous Mr. George Whitefield, in his Voyage to Georgia. Afloon as he arrived here, he applied himself to the Parlon of the English Church, (as his Manner is) for the Use of his Church, which was denied him: Application was alfo made to the Dutch, for their large Church, which being also denied him, he went out and preached in the Fields, to a very large Auditory ot all Professions, Jews and Gentiles; some of which, viz. the Rakes of the Town, came (as they afterwards told) with Whiftles in their Pockets, on Purpole to mock and difturb him: But, behold the Power of the Word, when backed by the Spirit, quickly catch'd them, and made them change their Mind, fo as ever afterwards they were constant and devout Hearers of him. Being denied the other Churches, and the Weather being exceffive cold, we offered him our Church. which he was pleafed to accept of, and lectured which

that Evening to above fifteen hundred People, and fo he continued to preach and lecture every Day, while he stayed in the Place, which was but four Days .--- I can freely fay, I never heard Man fpeak like him, his Matter and Doctrine entirely Apostolick; chiefly infifting upon, and preffing home, the abiolutely necessary funda-mental Points and Duties of Christianity, such as, Regeneration, Repentance, Faith in the Lord Jefus, denying of ourfelves, and all Dependence on our own Righteoufnets, and depending only on the Righteousnels of Christ for Justification, Ec. He is no Party-man; but makes it his conftant Bufiness to espouse, and gain Souls to the Lord Jefus Chrift in a Gospel-way, much like the Reverend Meffieurs Erskines in their Sonnets and Sermons, with whom he told me he keeps a Correspondence, and whose Works he heartily recommends .- My dear Friend, I would fain hope these are the Beginnings of glorious Times. I cannot but think they are the Dawnings of a happy reviving Day to the formal, drowly, drooping Churches of Chrift throughout the World this Day. I would fain believe a Day of Power is at Hand, tho' I may not live to fee it. Lord hasten it, hasten it; go forth with a preached Gotpel; let the Arrows of thy Word pierce and fink deep in the Hearts of Sinners, that they may fall proftrate at the Throne of thy Grace. Hasten the Day when Satan shall fall as Lightning to the Ground. Come, Lord Jesus, come quickly. With fincere and affectionate Respects to felf, Spoule, and all my good Friends with Your very bumble Servant, you, I am JOHN NICOL.

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LETTER. II.

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I Now fet my felf down, according to my Promife, and your Permission, to do that by the Hand of a Friend, which I was not able to do with my own; and which I had not Time to touch upon in my laft Letter; I mean, to give fome Account of the State of Religion Abroad, according to the Account I have got from Count Zinzindorff in a Letter, which I received from him about the Middle of December last. -----You may remember, that I told you formerly, that this holy Man had laid afide his fecular Employments and Dignities, and devoted himfelf to the Pastoral Care of a Church, confisting chiefly of a confiderable Number of pious Moravians, who had fled from their native Country on Account of Perfecution, and by his Encouragement fixed themfelves at Hermith. It is fomething more than a 'Twelve Month, perhaps, near two Years fince, by the Severity of the King of Poland, under the Infligation of the Jesuits, they were driven from thence, and the Count obliged to part with his Eftate there. But, God has been pleaffed, as in many former Inftances, to over-rule this Perfecution for the Good of his Church. For whereas, before they had fent out their Miffionaries into feveral Parts of the World; and whereas I think (I told you') 'fome'or other of them continually Night and Day prayed for their Suc-cels, and the Propagation of the Golpel in the World; fo they looked upon this Providence as a Call to abound more and more in this good Work. They have indeed fixed their Head-quarters at a Place called Hermaag, near Frankfort on the Rhing

Rhine Foot, from whence they have fent, and are fending many more into various Parts of the World; and the Accounts, which their Doctor and honoured Pastor sends me of their past Succefs and future Scheme, are as follow. He tells me, that he is intending a Journey into Switzerland, which (as I am informed in a Letter from the pious Mr. Thorold) he has fince performed, and I am ready to imagine, he is still there. He tells me, that Bern, Bafil, Stein, Malhau/en, and Scaffbausen, have all of them received the Gofpel in its Power and Purity, from the Moravian Brethren, who, wherever they come, are attempting a Work of Reformation, and a Revival of Religion amongst Protestants as well as Papists. And indeed the languide State of many of the Foreign Churches feems greatly to need fuch Attempts. The Count adds, That Geneva itfelf is imprest with their Labours ; tho' he fays, it has been for a long Time fo taken up with Philofophy, as hardly to be able to bear the Reproach of the Crois: He adds, that the Churches in Ecthonia and Swenia flourish; and that the barbarous Inhabitants of that Province do even pant after Chrift. Greenland refounds with the Goipel, and feveral of the idolatrous Inhabitants are baptized. But the Count adds, that he cannot approve of the Methods taken by fome of their Brethren there, who feem to be fo intent on fpreading Philosophical Knowledge there, that he fears, the Gospel of Chrift fuffers some Detri: ment by it. The most furprising Article of all is, that their Miffionaries to the Cape of good Hope meet with fome Encouragement, and that thirty. Hottontots have given up their Names to Chrift, and no lefs than a thoufand Negroes in the

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the Island of St. Thomas, who have been well instructed into that Religion, into which they were baptifed, and have embraced it as a Matter of free and reasonable Choice. Their Missionaries to Georgia, Carolina, Penfilvania, the Coast of Barbary in Africa, and that of Surinam in the West Indies, are as yet expecting the Fruit of their Labours. And Fifteen, who are now at Virginia, having, for fome Time, employed themfelves in learning the various Languages of the Indian Nations, are preparing to let out on a Progress amonght them, for the bleffed Purpole of carrying the News of Salvation to them. There are fome at Cerlon in the East-Indies; but the Count had received no Letter from them, when he wrote to me. He tells me alfo, That Lapland, Mufcovy, Wallachia, and Constantinople, are all visited by . fome of the Brethren, who preach among them, (fo far as I can learn) without Restraint, but, with what Succeis he does not mention, excepting, only, that, by their Means, an hundred Turkifo Prisoners (taken, I suppose, by the Russians in the late War) have embraced Christianity. The only News that he had lately received from Genoa was, That a converted Negroe, living there, was endeavouring to erect Schools in the neighbouring Parts, with a View to the Propagation of Christian Knowledge. The Brethren, who were lent to preach in the Northern Parts of 'Poland, have been for fome Time confined there, but . are now returned again, and are very follicitous to find out fome Way to profecute that good Work, which has been interrupted by the Perfecution of their Enemies. The Count informed me, that they intend quickly to vifit other Parts of the East Indies, the Savages of New-York, and the Magz

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Magi of Perfia: He concludes with telling me, That Churches, on their reformed Plan, are erected in Lusatia, Saxony, Brandenburg, Bruns-wick, Aljatia, Swabia, Franconia, Wirtenberg, the Palatinate, feveral imperial Cities, Holland, and the other States on the Rhine. What follows. is merely perfonal, but expressive of great Tendernefs and Humility : And the whole clotes with those emphatical Words, which I before transcribed, but which I do not think much to repeat : Farewell in Chrift our common Lord, our crucified, wounded, only healing Ranfom, by whom ave are redeemed from the Pit of everlasting De-Aruction, sho is to me the dearest of all Objects. I think, any Thing I could add, after this reviving and aftonishing Account of the Work of God upon, and by these his faithful Servants, would be but flat and infipid.

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P. S. Let Mount Zion rejoice, and let all the Daughters of Judah exult, that the glorious and renouned King is on his Way, to extend his vast and boundles Dominions, and, maugre all Opposition, will pull down the Man of Sin, and destroy him with the Breath of his Mouth, and Brightness of his coming. Religion shall flourish, in Spite of Helt and Earth; and the Gospel shall have a free Course, run and be glorified, and our exalted Immanuel shall see the Nations, like Drops of Dew from the Womb of the Morning, flowing to him. Even so come Lord Jefus. Amen.

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COPY of a LETTER from the Reverend Mr. Moorhead Minister of the Gospel at Bofton, to his Friend at Glafgow.

' Boston, New-England, Jan. 28. 1740. I Am exceeding uneasy, because that you have not written to me by any of the Vessels that came thither. I sent you a Packet last Year per Captain Montgomery, bound to Newport-Glasgow, who got fase there.

I want very much to hear how your religious Affairs fland, and whether these Men of God fucceed in their endeavoured Reformation. The Glory is departing from *Scotland*; when *Simonical* Practices are entred in, among her professed Instructors, who are returning to the Onions and Leeks of *Egypt*, when *Pagan* Divinity goes better than the Doctrines of the Son of God.

The Lord has raifed up the great and good Mr. Whitefield, to fcourge and awaken England and America. The Dead are made to live, and by him hear the Voice of the Son of God. The Face of Christianity here is covered over with Formality, and a cold Indifferency for Divine Things. I would gladly hope, that it is not fo bad with Strangers as it is with the Sectarians of this Country, who feem disposed, and do drink in Errors and Herefies of all Kinds. Let me hear from you. May the God of Israel be your God, and of his People, which is and shall be the Prayer of
