

Restorative means, if apparently Drowned.

Send for Medical assistance; but do not delay the following means:—

I. Convey the body carefully, with the head and shoulders supported in a raised position, to the nearest house.

II. Strip the body, and rub it dry; then wrap it in hot blankets, and place it in a warm bed in a warm chamber.

III. Wipe and cleanse the mouth and nostrils.

IV. In order to restore the natural warmth of the body,

1. Move a heated covered warming-pan over the back and spine.—2. Put bladders or bottles of hot water, or heated bricks, to the pit of the stomach, the arm-pits, between the thighs, and to the soles of the feet.—3. Foment the body with hot flannels; but if possible.—4. Immerse the body in a warm bath, as hot as the hand can bear without pain; as this is preferable to the other means for restoring warmth.—5. Rub the body briskly with the hand; do not, however, suspend the use of the other means at the same time.

V. In order to restore breathing, introduce the pipe of a common bellows (where the apparatus of the Society is not at hand,) into one nostril, carefully closing the other and the mouth; at the same time drawing downwards, and pushing gently backwards, the upper part of the windpipe, to allow a more free admission of air: blow the bellows gently, in order to inflate the lungs, till the breast be a little raised; the mouth and nostrils should then be set free, and a moderate pressure made with the hand upon the chest. Repeat this process till life appears.

VI. Electricity to be employed early by a Medical Assistant.

VII. Inject into the stomach, by means of an elastic tube and syringe, half a pint of warm brandy-and-water, or wine-and-water.

VIII. Apply sal-volatile or hartshorn to the nostrils.

If apparently Dead from Intense Cold.

Rub the body with snow, ice, or cold water. Restore warmth by slow degrees: and after some time, if necessary, employ the means recommended for the drowned. In these accidents, it is highly dangerous to apply heat too early.

If apparently Dead from Hanging.

In addition to the means recommended for the Drowned, bleeding should early be employed by a Medical Assistant.

If apparently Dead from Noxious Vapours, Lightnings, &c.

1. Remove the body into a cool fresh air.—2. Dash cold water on the neck, face, and breast, frequently.—3. If the body be cold, apply warmth, as for the drowned.—4. Use the means recommended in Direction V.—5. Let Electricity (particularly in accidents from lightning,) be early employed by a Medical Assistant.

If apparently Dead from Intoxication.

Lay the body on a bed, with the head raised; remove the neckcloth, and loosen the clothes. Obtain instantly Medical assistance, as the treatment must be regulated by the state of the patient; but, in the meantime, apply cloths soaked in cold water to the head, and bottles of hot water to the calves of the legs and to the feet.

If apparently Dead from Apoplexy.

The patient should be placed in cool air, and the clothes loosened, particularly about the neck and breast. Bleeding must be early employed by a Medical Assistant. All stimulants should be avoided. In cases of coup-de-soleil, or strokes of the sun, the same means to be used as in apoplexy.

To prevent Death from Loss of Blood.

If from a wound, apply firm pressure to the wound by the finger, or a small pad, till Medical assistance can be procured.—If from a limb, twist a handkerchief tightly round the limb, nearer to the heart than the wound. If fainting has taken place, lay the patient in the recumbent position, and apply hartshorn to the nostrils.—If the bleeding is from an internal part, apply cold wet cloths, and avoid all stimulants.

The Post-Boy conveys passengers from Glasgow, to the Majestic and City of Glasgow, to and from Greenock; and the Sovereign conveys passengers, also, to the James Watt, and Henry Bell, which vessels are adapted for carrying goods as well as passengers.—The Maid of Islay (140 tons), is employed as a packet between West Loch-Tarbert and Port-Askaig in Islay.—All the Steam Vessels which sail from Glasgow, call at Port-Glasgow and Greenock.—In calculating the rates of tonnage, an average allowance of one-third has been deducted for the machinery.

TIDE TABLE,

Showing the Time of High Water at Glasgow, for 1826.

OBSERVATIONS.

This Table is carefully computed, from the latest formula of La Place, for *mean* time at Glasgow.

At spring tides the ordinary depth of water, at the time of high water, at the Broomielaw, is about 10 feet; at low water, about 3 feet. During neap tides, the depth at high water is about 8 feet, and at low water about 4 feet. However, when there is a continued fall of rain, the depth of water will be greater.

From the local situation of Glasgow, the height and time of the tide are influenced in a considerable degree by strong winds. And, as the Table is calculated on the supposition that the winds have no influence, it will be necessary to keep in mind the subjoined remarks.

When the wind blows strongly from the North-West, North, or North-East, it will be high water about half an hour sooner than the time specified in the Table, and the tide will not rise so high as usual, by a foot, or a foot and a half.

With the wind from the South-East, South, or South-West, the time of high water will be from 20 to 30 minutes later, and the tide from 12 to 15 inches higher.

The tide usually flows for 5 hours, and ebbs for 7 hours. This, likewise, is modified by the winds. A strong gale from the East, although it scarcely alters the time or height of the tide, causes it to take off very quickly; so much, sometimes, as $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 feet in the course of an hour.

If, to the time of high water, we apply the time opposite to the places in the following columns, either by adding or subtracting it as directed, we will then have the time of high water at those places.
