Chumadh cóig coinneamhan de'n Ard Chomhairle an Glaschu ré na bliadhna—a' Choinneamh Thùs-ghnothaich agus ceithir eile. Choinnich Comhairle an Earail aon uair agus rùnaicheadh leasachadh a dhèanamh air Riaghailt 36 'sa' Bhonn-Stéidh agus thugadh aire do chùisean riatanach eile. Dh'obraich na Comhairlean Seasmhach glé chruaidh fad na bliadhna agus tha sinn 'nan comain air son a bhith ag adhartachadh rùintean a' Chomuinn.

Bha am Mòd Nàiseanta a chumadh an Glaschu air leth soirbheachail. Rinn iad uile deagh sheirbhis do'n Chomunn, gach aon 'na dhòigh fhéin. Aig an am seo tha sinn a' cur an céill ar co-fhaireachdainn ris na dàimhnich a dh'fhàg iad 'nan déidh.

FINANCE COMMITTEE.

REPORT for year ended 31st March, 1959.

The Finance Committee met four times during the year, and the Sub-Committee also met regularly to scrutinise and

pass accounts.

It is satisfactory to record that pension schemes are now in operation for all members of the office Staff. The Secretary and the Northern Organiser are both included in the superannuation provisions of the Scottish Education Department, and modest annuities on favourable terms have been arranged for Miss Turner and Miss MacLeod. This year the first instalment has been allocated to the special fund which guarantees a modified pension for Miss Young, the Treasurer. We are glad to be able in this way to give a measure of security to diligent and loyal officials and staff.

Thanks to the magnificent surplus from the Glasgow Mod of 1958, the year has ended with a record balance of £4,394. An Comunn's annual expenditure is now in the region of £5,000. Of this amount only about £2,000 comes from ordinary revenue. For the balance of £3,000 An Comunn has to depend on each

year's National Mod surplus.

The position this year, therefore, gives cause for lively satisfaction. It will be seen, too, that the surplus from the previous year's National Mod at Inverness exceeded the estimate made a year ago by \pounds_{419} . An Comunn, however, as its individual members and affiliated societies will realise, has to make allowance for the ever-increasing costs involved in office admin-

istration and travelling and other expenses.

The opportunity has been taken to repa

The opportunity has been taken to repay the loan of £3,100 which was borrowed from the War Memorial and Thanksgiving Fund when the present offices were acquired. This will allow An Comunn to devote this Fund more exclusively to the activities of Comunn na h-Oigridh, the work for which it was intended. It may be mentioned, that for the year under consideration, a deficit of £175 was incurred on the Fund.

We have again to record our indebtedness to Mr. Moffatt-

Pender who last year repeated the grant of 25 per cent. of the Junior Choir expenses at the National Mod. No one has done more for An Comunn by both precept and example. Our thanks are also due to the co-opted Members of the Committee, Mr. James T. Graham and Mr. William Hume and to Mr. Mill of the Clydesdale and North of Scotland Bank, Ltd., all of whom gave valuable guidance regarding the investment of Capital. We have been glad to be able to act on their advice.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

The Committee held two meetings during the year.

GAELIC IN PRIMARY SCHOOLS.—A deputation from An Comunn was cordially received by the Scottish Education Department. Members were given a report and figures based on the investigation carried out by the Department concerning the position of Gaelic in Primary Schools. The report showed that in the 200 schools where Gaelic is professed or taught in the Counties of Argyll, Inverness, Ross and Cromarty and Sutherland 62 per cent. of the primary children and 49 per cent. of the secondary children were either native speakers or were being taught the language. Most primary departments devote either one or two hours per week to formal instruction in Gaelic. The Committee are anxious to ascertain the time devoted per week to the teaching of Gaelic to each class, a point not made clear in the Report. Twenty-three departments make no provision. Gaelic as a teaching medium is used mainly with infant classes and its use decreases considerably as the pupils become older.

STAFFING.—68 per cent. of the schools in which Gaelic is professed or taught have one or more teachers well qualified in the language. Only in 12 schools is there no teacher with a

knowledge of Gaelic.

Approximately half of the schools completing the questionnaire are stated to make adequate provision. Many of the remaining schools refer to the competing demands of other subjects, especially those required for the promotion examination; to the difficult conditions in small schools; to the lack of suitable textbooks; and to the fact that children are increasingly English speaking.

In many cases it is claimed that the attitude of the parents is helping to defeat the efforts of the teacher to encourage the use of Gaelic. Although the parents themselves may be fluent Gaelic speakers, the language spoken in the home is English,

and the children come to school with little knowledge of, or interest in, Gaelic.

The experiment introduced in Inverness-shire and Ross-shire to teach children through the medium of Gaelic is welcomed by the Committee, and some time ago An Comunn offered to co-operate with any Committee which may be set up in Inverness-shire to study the provision of suitable text-books.

GAELIC IN SUTHERLAND SCHOOLS.—Sutherland Education Committee kindly received a deputation from An Comunn which recommended that Gaelic should be offered as a subject in schools. The policy of Sutherland Education Committee not to offer Gaelic in schools, leaving the matter to the discretion of headmasters, does not accord with the views of this Committee.

Rosg Gaidhlig.—Members of Committee are co-operating in the preparation of a new prose reader suitable for classes V.

and VI. in Secondary Schools.

BROADCAST LESSONS IN GAELIC.—The B.B.C. have agreed to meet representatives of the Committee to discuss the introduction of Gaelic broadcasts to Primary Schools.

PUBLICATION COMMITTEE.

I. The Committee have pleasure in reporting that the third edition of $B\`{a}rdachd~Gh\`{a}idhlig$ is now available.

2. It is hoped that the third volume of Illustrated School

Readers will be ready for session 1959-60.

- 3. Mr. John A. MacDonald has completed a Gaelic Course for Schools supplementary to the Elementary Course. The Committee agreed to examine this book with a view to publication.
- 4. The editor of An Gàidheal reported that he is doubtful if An Gàidheal Og is available to or read by many children, and was of opinion that the four pages devoted to this section could be otherwise utilised. After discussion the Committee agreed to consider a proposal that a separate four-page booklet with illustrations or a comic strip might be issued instead of An Gàidheal Og. Mr. Roderick Mackinnon undertook to submit a draft specimen of such a booklet.

5. The Committee agreed to collect and examine Gaelic translations of nursery rhymes already printed in An Gàidheal,

possibly supplemented from other sources.

6. In view of the interest in Gaelic Drama, the Committee agreed to consider the publication of a play written by Mr.

Roderick Mackinnon, and requested Mr. Alexander Nicolson to

submit a report on this play as soon as possible.

7. It was agreed that Rev. T. M. Murchison should continue his work on the translation into Gaelic of *Treasure Island* for which a sum of money had been bequeathed to An Comunn.

8. It was decided to bind 250 copies of *Approach to Gaelic*, Part I, from the stock which had been held by the printers to be bound with Part II. It was regretted that Part II has not been supplied.

9. Having regard to their present commitments, the Committee decided to consider the preparation of other school

books at a later date.

PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE.

Five Committee meetings were held during the year.

During the session the Committee were concerned with visiting existing Branches and establishing new Branches. The President, Convener, Members of Committee, and the Secretary collaborated in visiting Branches in the Southern Area, and we are pleased to record that representatives called on the following Branches:—Amulree, Ayr, Bowmore, Campbeltown, Cruachan, Dumbarton, Dumfries, Dunoon, Govan, Inveraray, Killin, Kilmeny, Kinross, Largs, Lochtayside, Manchester, Port Charlotte, Port Ellen, Vale of Leven. An Comunn would like to thank Branch officials and members for the good reception

given to its representatives.

Last year saw the beginning of new Branches being formed in Perthshire, and we are glad that the number has since increased, Branches having been formed in Logierait, Lochearnhead and Blair Atholl. Much credit is due to Committee member, Mr. Roderick Mackinnon, for his exploratory work in Perthshire which made it possible for these Branches to be formed. In the Northern Area we are appreciative of the fine work carried on by Miss Kay Matheson in Wester Ross. Branches were formed in Forres, Portree, Inverasdale, Gairloch and Aultbea. A new Branch was formed in Easdale and we are glad to report that the Branch in Fort William is active once more. The Committee would like to express grateful thanks to artistes and others who gave their services free of charge at

ceilidhs, particularly at ceilidhs where Branches were formed. Provincial and Local Mods were held in the following

Provincial and Local Mods were held in the following places in the Southern Area last summer:—Aberfeldy, Bowmore, Campbeltown, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Lochgilphead, Strontian and Tobermory. At these Mods competition was keen and without exception, were well supported, and we take this opportunity to thank office-bearers of Branches and Mod Committees for their excellent work in organising these Mods. Due to lack of Senior competitors it is regretted that the Oban Mod had to be cancelled.

The Committee are grateful to Mrs. J. J. Crawford and Miss Margaret A. Mackinnon for their work in Ardnamurchan and Sutherland respectively, teaching individuals and choirs prior to the Mods in these areas. For the forthcoming Mods teachers were again requested by these areas, and it is regretted that no one was available to undertake the work in Sutherland. Mrs. Crawford will be teaching in the Ardnamurchan area where her services were much appreciated last summer. A day school teacher has been released to prepare competitors for a Mod to be held in Aultbea, and we record our appreciation of the Education Committee's gesture in releasing a teacher for this work.

Arrangements are being made for representatives from the Committee to meet the B.B.C. to discuss the question of more time being given to Sound broadcasts in Gaelic and introducing

Gaelic programmes on television.

It has been decided that the names of Branch Presidents and Secretaries should appear in the Annual Report from this year onwards. In many cases, while we have the names and addresses of Secretaries, there is no record of the names of Branch Presidents. Branches were circularised and requested to forward this information, together with their Annual Reports and Financial Statements. We regret to say that many Branches failed to reply. Consequently full information is only available for eight Branches in the Northern Area and twenty-seven Branches in the Southern Area, whereas it is known that there are twenty-seven active Branches in the North and thirty-seven in the South. We appeal to Branch Secretaries to send their Annual Report and Financial Statement to Headquarters as soon as possible after their Annual General Meeting.

NORTHERN PROPAGANDA SUB-COMMITTEE.

Convener-I. Mackay.

The Committee met three times during the year. It is gratifying to report that there has been a considerable improvement in the area during the past year. Branch activity has been sustained, and better still, new branches have been formed in areas where there has been little or no apparent interest in An Comunn before, or for a very long time. Again in other areas branches have been reformed.

Thanks to the hard work of the Committees, the Provincial Mods were most successful. Plans are well in hand for the Badenoch Strathspey Mod to be held again in the coming season. The following new branches were formed during the year:—Broadford, Forres, Gairloch, Inverasdale, Aultbea. The following were reformed:—Elgin, Portree, Fort William. The Organiser visited the following branches:—Broadford, Brora, Lairg, Aberdeen, Cromarty, Forres, Elgin, Dingwall, Grantown, Gairloch, Inverasdale, Aultbea, Lochinver, Beauly and Portree. He also attended Provincial Mod Committee meetings in Ullapool, Aviemore, Aultbea, Kyle and Lairg.

Every effort will be made during the coming year to reform

branches which have lapsed in the past.

MOD AND MUSIC COMMITTEE.

Five meetings of Committee were held during the year. The Music Sub-Committee met on several occasions to select

songs suitable for the 1959 and 1960 Mods.

As was anticipated, the Mod in Glasgow in 1958 was an outstanding success, and we owe a great debt of gratitude to the efforts of the Local Committee under the convenership of Mrs. J. M. Bannerman. Mrs. Bannerman was ably supported by the energetic and enthusiastic members of the various Sub-Committees who spared neither time nor effort in their preparations prior to, and during the Mod. The Committee are indebted to members of the Mod Local Committee and their friends who organised functions, and the numerous artistes who gave their services free in aid of the Mod Fund. Many Branches of An Comunn contributed large sums, and we would like to express our gratitude to Affiliated Societies for their generous contributions. On the previous occasion of a Glasgow Mod in 1948 a report stated that "the surplus from the Mod was the highest

ever attained." We congratulate the Local Mod Committee and their supporters that the Mod Fund in 1958 broke all

previous records.

The stewarding during Mod week was most effective, and we take this opportunity of recording our appreciation of the splendid work done by Mr. Calum Beaton and his assistants. We would thank also the programme-sellers and the band of enthusiastic ladies who enrolled members and sold badges.

At the close of this session we look forward to a good Mod in Dundee, where the Local Committee and their friends are busily engaged in raising money, and thanks to their efforts the

Mod Fund is steadily increasing.

Next year's Mod will be held in Edinburgh. The Local Committee is well organised under the convenership of Miss Madge Campbell Brown. Competitors will remember that a Standard Mod Syllabus was introduced in 1957. Since then a number of changes has been made in competitions. A revised standard syllabus has been prepared and will be available this year for the 1960 and subsequent Mods.

Two meetings were held during the year.

The exhibition staged in St. Andrew's Halls during Mod week was varied and interesting, and the Committee are grateful

The material received for competitions completed the exhibition. Despite the fact that the hall was near the entrance to the Main Hall it is regretted that the number of visitors to the exhibition was comparatively small. Once again we would like to remind members and others that the Art and Industry section deserves more support and that visitors would be rewarded by seeing a display of goods on which much time and patience had been spent. Many would discover that they, too, could have entered for some of the competitions as a wide choice is offered.
