An uiridh thugadh iomradh air atharraichean a rinneadh air Bonn-stéidh agus Riaghailtean a' Chomuinn agus rinneadh tuilleadh atharraichean aig a' choinneamh bhliadhnail mu dheireadh. Chuir na Meuran an cèill nach robh iad leagte gum biodh cìs am buill co-ionann ri cìs buill bhliadhnail a' Chomuinn (10/-) agus b'e bhuil gun do dh'aontaicheadh gum faodadh gach Meur a' chìs ionadall a shocrachadh mar a chitheadh iad lomchuidh agus gum paidheadh gach ball a bha titheach a bhith 'na bhall de'n Chomunn mhàthaireil crùn air a' chuid bu lugha. Riaraich an rùn seo na Meuran agus a nis tha móran de bhuill Mheuran 'nam buill de'n Chomunn troimh am Meur ionadail. Tuilleadh ris an àireamh! Dh'àrdaicheadh cìs Buill Beatha Chomuinn bho £3 3/- gu £5 5/-. Ghabhadh ri riaghailt ùr a chum agus gum biodh Mòdan Ionadail is Dùthchail air an stéidheachadh air a' Mhòd Naiseanta. Chliùthaicheadh aig coinneamhan a chumadh ri riochdairean bho Mheuran agus Comhairlean Ionadail gun dèante gach oidhirp a chum agus nach biodh Mòdan a bha 'san aon roinn de'n dùthaich air an cumail air an aon latha.

Bha e 'na bhristeadh-dùil do 'n Chomunn nach do ghabh Comhairle Foghlum Siorrachd Inbhirnis ris a' Chomhairle Riaghlaidh, le riochdairean bho'n Chomunn, a chuireadh air chois le Comhairle Rannsachaidh Comunn na h-Oigridh. Aig coinneamh àraidh de'n Ard Chomhairle rùnaicheadh Fear-stiùiridh a thaghadh mar phrìomh Fhear-dreuchd a' Chomuinn mar a mhol a' Chomhairle Rannsachaidh agus chuireadh an rùn fa chomhair buill a' Chomuinn aig Coinneamh Araidh. Cha b'urrainn de'n Choinneamh Araidh gabhail ris an rùn agus b'e bhuil gun do chuireadh Comhairle Araidh air chois a bheachdaicheadh gu mionaideach air obair agus dleasnasan Fear-stiùiridh, a dhàimh ris an Ard Chomhairle agus seirbhisich eile a' Chomuinn, agus na dòighean a chleachdadh gu airgead a thional a sheasadh a' chosgais. Cuirear co-dhunaidhean na Comhairle Araidh fa chomhair na h-Ard Chomhairle agus an dèidh sin beachdaichear air a' chùis aig a' Choinneamh Bhliadhnail am bliadhna.

Bha am Mòd am Peairt glé shoirbheachail anns gach dòigh agus thatar an comain na Comhairle Ionadail a shaothraich gu dìcheallach a' cruinneachadh airgid agus a rinn ullachadh iomchuidh fa chomhair a' Mhòid. As leth a' Chomuinn thatar a' toirt taing do mhaithean agus luchdriaghlaidh a' bhaile air son na h-aoigheachd a nochd iad do

luchd-dreuchd is buill a' Chomuinn.

Ré na bliadhna dh'fhàg am bàs móran bheàrn am measg buill a' Chomuinn. 'Nam measg bha Eideard MacSporan a chrùnadh mar bhàrd agus a chuir gu mór ri litreachas na Gàidhlig, gu h-àraidh òrain. #### ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Seven meetings of the Committee were held since the last Annual Meeting. At these meetings the Committee considered matters relating to the work of An Comunn which required speedy attention and consideration. On the recommendation of the Advisory Committee, a meeting, attended by representatives from the Scottish Vigilantes' Association, Branches and Affiliated Societies in the Southern Area, was held to protest in the strongest possible terms at the proposed closure of Highland railways until adequate roads and transport are available, and following the meeting written protests were sent to the Prime Minister, the Minister of Transport, the Secretary of State for Scotland, and Members of Parliament for the Highland Counties. The Committee note with

pleasure that railways in the North, scheduled to be closed, are to remain open at least for the time being. Through the good offices of An Comunn, a Branch of the Vigilantes' Association has been established in Glasgow, with past President, Mr. Hugh Macphee, as Chairman.

A deputation from An Comunn which met officers of the Scottish Education Department regarding a grant for the Gaelic Dictionary were bitterly disappointed to learn that under present legislation the Department cannot give a grant in aid of the project.

A proposal made to the Scottish Education Department concerning a separate Higher Grade paper for Gaelic Learners is being referred to the newly constituted Examination Board for their consideration.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE

REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED 31st MARCH, 1964

The Finance Committee met six times during the year, and they present Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 1964, Statement of Income and Expenditure for year ended that date, and Account for Perth Mod, 1963. The expenditure for the year is almost the same as last and, with income somewhat higher, the surplus on the year's workings has been more than maintained. The Mod is again the main contributor to An Comunn's income, and sincere gratitude is expressed to the Local Committees who work so enthusiastically year by year.

The cost to An Comunn in refunding the Travelling and Personal Expenses of Members of the Executive Council attending Meetings of the Association is a greatly increased charge on last year due to the fact that rates allowable were altered, and the effect of this is now evident in the Accounts.

The Gaelic Lessons produced for use in Gaelic Evening Classes were responsible for expense of approximately f too, but it is outlay well worth while, as has been acknowledged by those teachers who have made use of the series.

While the Capital Loss on the sale of Cnoc nan Ros, in which Comunn na h-Oigridh met for the Annual Camps, is

regretted, the hope is that the Youth work of An Comunn will

continue unimpaired.

Gratitude is again offered to Mr. Graham, Mr. Hume and Mr. Mill who assist so willingly in guiding the affairs of the Association.

#### PUBLICATION AND EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

The Committee met on three occasions during the year.

The demand continues for the series of illustrated Gaelic readers and it is causing concern that although a substantial order was placed last year for reprints of three of the five readers, delivery has not been received so far, the reason given by the printers being that they can only print the Scottish Gaelic books when they are printing their Irish Gaelic counterparts. As a result of the holdup, a substantial number of orders from County Education Committees cannot be met.

The series of twenty stencilled Gaelic lessons prepared by a special committee of teachers for use in Adult Evening Classes proved very popular and most useful. The demand—close on five hundred copies were distributed—was most encouraging and many appreciative letters were received from teachers.

During the year, Mr. Donald Grant relinquished the editorship of An Gaidheal and the Committee have pleasure in reporting that a worthy successor has been obtained in the person of Mr. Roderick Mackinnon. The Committee wish to record its appreciation of the work done by Mr. Grant during his term as Editor, and members hope that all interested in the cause of Gaelic will support the new Editor by sending literary contributions to him to "Corarder," 139 Glasgow Road, Perth. An effort is being made by Mr. Mackinnon to obtain advertisements for the magazine, the revenue from which will help to decrease the annual deficit on the publication. Mr. Mackinnon's initiative has met with a good response in a matter of a few weeks. An earnest appeal is made to all members of An Comunn to place a regular order for An Gaidheal, the annual subscription being 6/-, also to interest their friends in buying the monthly magazine.

The Special Dictionary Committee held one meeting and members were informed of the result of the meeting of the deputation from An Comunn with officers of the Scottish Education Department, when members were informed that the Department had no power to give financial assistance to the project. The Committee decided that it would be necessary to find someone in the first instance willing to undertake the work and the President was asked to make further investigation in this direction.

#### MOD AND MUSIC COMMITTEE

The Committee held eight meetings during the year when the main business was arrangements for the National Mod in Aberdeen and the selection of songs for next year's

Mod in Largs.

Last year's Mod in Perth was successful financially and otherwise, and the Committee wish to express sincere thanks to the Local Committee who shouldered the burden of ingathering the Mod Fund and for the arrangements its members made locally. The Committee are deeply indebted to Affiliated Societies, Branches, members and friends who contributed so generously to the Fund. An Comunn owe a deep debt of gratitude to the B.B.C. for extensive coverage of the Mod both by Sound and Television. The increased coverage on Television was particularly appreciated by the many who were unable to attend.

The Mod Local Committee in Aberdeen is working very hard to reach its target and local arrangements with regard to halls and hotel accommodation have been satisfactorily handled. Next year the Mod returns to Large for the second

time in its history.

This year sees the introduction of piping and violin competitions for Juniors and the Committee hope that these competitions will draw competitors from all over the country.

During the year provision was made whereby senior competitors could present themselves for the Gaelic Test at selected centres. The response was very gratifying and a large number of native and fluent speakers have been issued with permanent certificates and others with certificates to allow them to compete in solo and choral competitions at

this year's Mod. Those who were unable to take advantage of the preliminary tests will be tested during Mod week, as will any who failed the test or wish to attain a higher category.

The Committee held two meetings, one in Glasgow and the other in Inverness, with representatives from Local and Provincial Mod Committees, the object of the meetings being to avoid holding Mods in the same area on the same date and to recommend that these Mods should be run on the same lines as the National Mod. General agreement was reached on both points.

#### ART AND INDUSTRY

The Committee met on two occasions during the year.

At the first meeting, a report was given on the exhibition staged at last year's Mod in Perth. The accommodation was centrally situated but not altogether suitable for the purpose due to a large glass frontage. The Committee are indebted to all who helped locally in setting up the exhibition, those who sent articles for exhibition and sale and gave a

discount to An Comunn, and last but not least to the competitors. The exhibition attracted a good attendance.

At the second meeting, the Committee selected the

competitions for next year's Mod in Largs.

Contact has been established with persons in the islands who are interested in handcraft, and a number have promised to help in securing articles for the forthcoming exhibition at this year's Mod in Aberdeen. These exhibits, together with competition material, should make a varied and attractive show, and visitors to the Mod are cordially invited to visit the exhibition in the Y.M.C.A.

#### NORTHERN COMMITTEE

The Committee met on three occasions and also attended the area Conference. The main theme of the Conference was drama. Mr. A. Fraser, on behalf of the Committee, translated or had translated suitable one-act plays which are and will be available to drama groups. A large selection of plays suitable for children has been obtained from Ireland. some of which have been transcriped into Scottish Gaelic. The Committee will continue to collect suitable plays in Gaelic or to translate others and to make them available to those interested. Once again contributions were called for from the Branches to the School Libraries Scheme and, as a result, schools in the Gaelic-speaking areas will benefit. The Committee have appointed one of their number to promote selling agencies of An Gaidheal, and the results have been very encouraging to date, and the Magazine is now being sold from shops all over the counties of Inverness, Ross and Sutherland and in the Inner and Outer Hebrides. There is every reason to anticipate further developments in this field.

### SOUTHERN COMMITTEE

The Committee held four meetings during the year. The main event of the session was the second Southern Area Conference held in Glasgow last October, which was attended by members of the Executive Council and representatives from nineteen Branches and twenty Affiliated Societies. Mr. David Baxter, Convener, Advisory Services, S.C.D.A.,

gave an interesting talk on Gaelic Drama, and he appealed to An Comunn to give Gaelic Drama a place at the National Mod. As a result, the Executive Council has agreed to provide a hall for the purpose in Aberdeen, and the Glasgow Gaelic Drama Association are arranging to present three one-act plays on Wednesday evening of Mod week. Another speaker, Mr. Dugie Stewart, Publicity Officer, B.B.C., gave some constructive criticism on the National Mod, his comment ranging over the Children's day, Mod song publications, and methods of ingathering finance. Mr. Finlay McNeill and Miss Catherine A. MacNiven spoke on how to attract young people—a topic which covered a large field—and each speaker gave a wide range of useful suggestions which they commended to An Comunn for consideration.

An approach was made by the Committee to the Director of Education, and as a result a scheme for teaching Gaelic in certain Primary schools in Glasgow was introduced this year.

The Committee welcome the decision of Glasgow Education Committee and wish the experiment every success. The response in the three schools selected is very satisfactory, and it is hoped that next session it will be possible to teach the subject within school hours.

For the third year in succession, An Comunn is having a stall at the Highland Show, and on this occasion all arrangements have been entrusted to the Edinburgh Branch.

During the year, a Branch of An Comunn was formed in Arran. A number of Branches and Affiliated Societies were visited by the President, members of the Executive

Council, and the Secretary.

The Committee, along with the Special Gaelic Lessons' Committee, a Committee formed on the recommendation of the Southern Area Committee, are arranging to hold a Conference of teachers of Gaelic in Adult Evening Classes in Glasgow on 27th June, 1964. Arrangements are also being made to hold a Southern Area Conference in Glasgow on 12th September, to which prominent speakers are being invited.
