## FINANCE COMMITTEE.

REPORT for year ended 31st March, 1960.

The Finance Committee met four times during the year. The Sub-Committee, consisting of Mr. Donald Grant (Convener), Mrs. Edgar, Miss May Margaret Macmillan and Mr. Calum Robertson, met regularly to scrutinise accounts before payment.

The necessary change in the means of heating the office premises in order to comply with the requirements of the Clean Air Act, 1956, which came into force in the Glasgow Central Area on 15th October, 1959, engaged the attention and consideration of the Committee during the year. After the fullest enquiries had been made the Nightstor system of heating by electricity was decided upon as the best investment for the expenditure. In the short time that the system has been in use it is regarded as entirely satisfactory.

The Committee present herewith Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 1960, and Statement of Income and Expenditure for the year ended on that date. As will be seen, there is a deficit of  $\pounds$ 103, and because of the exceptionally large Surplus last year this comes as rather a disappointment. It should be

noted, however, that while Membership Subscriptions are down by £103, Interest on Investments are up by £177, which is the result of An Comunn having repaid its indebtedness of £3,100 to M. & T. Fund and having acquired Investments made by Glasgow and Dundee Mod Local Committees and handed over as part of their surplus. Examination of the Income and Expenditure Account shows that the deficit has come about in the following manner:—

It is gratifying to note that the M. & T. Fund has met its expenditure for the year with  $\pounds_{32}$  over. In accordance with existing arrangements, a further  $\pounds_{100}$  has been set aside in the Special Fund as Provision for the Treasurer's Superannuation.

Thanks are once again expressed to all those willing helpers whose labours culminate in the Mod Surplus each year and we would record our indebtedness to the Mod Local Committee of Dundee who provided the substantial surplus of  $f_{3,702}$  7s. 9d. Mr. Moffatt-Pender's exceeding kindness in continuing to defray the Grants towards Expenses of Junior Choirs is greatly appreciated.

Mr. James T. Graham, Mr. William Hume and Mr. Mill of the Clydesdale and North of Scotland Bank, have given willing guidance and the Committee tender them grateful thanks.

## EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

The Committee held two meetings during the year.

GAELIC IN PRIMARY SCHOOLS.—As mentioned in last year's report the Committee are anxious to ascertain the time devoted per week to the teaching of Gaelic to each class, also the number of teachers classified under each heading. It is understood that the Department will provide the Committee with this information in due course.

GAELIC IN SUTHERLAND SCHOOLS.—The policy of Sutherland Education Committee in resolving not to take steps to introduce formal instruction in Gaelic in schools in the County is deplored by the Committee and a letter voicing the Committee's disapproval was sent to the Director of Education.

ROSG GAIDHLIG.—The Committee is co-operating with the Central Gaelic Committee in selecting prose recommended for inclusion in this book.

GAELIC BROADCASTS TO SCHOOLS.—The B.B.C. received a deputation to discuss the proposal to introduce Gaelic broadcasts to Primary schools. As a result it was learned that the Council anticipates that in the next phase of the B.B.C.'s programme of transmitter development, the Government will agree to V.H.F. transmitters servicing the Highlands and Islands, and there is a possibility that these transmitters might be used for specialised school programmes.

COURSE IN CELTIC STUDIES.—Two meetings were held with representatives of the Workers' Educational Association as a result of which agreement was reached on a course in Celtic Studies. If there is a reasonable response the course will be held in St. Andrews from 9th-16th July, 1960.

NORTHERN AREA EDUCATION SUB-COMMITTEE.

Since the last report was submitted, three meetings of the Northern Area Education Sub-Committee have been held, and, although the attendance has not been as fully representative as one would wish, much useful discussion took place, covering the Comunn na h-Oigridh movement, with its activities at Cnoc-nan-Ros, the new deal for Gaelic in the Schools, the impact upon the area of the introduction of the new Fourth Year Certificate into Schools, and the possibility of more useful propaganda through educational facilities. The possibility of a syllabus for the teaching of Gaelic in Evening Classes was discussed, and suitable suggestions were made. It was agreed that one of the most useful functions that the Sub-Committee could serve, would be for representatives to watch the situation in their own particular areas, and to bring up for action anything which was felt to be not in the interests of the area or the children.

The Convener was re-elected for another year.

## PUBLICATION COMMITTEE.

The Committee held two meetings during the year.

Prior to the last Annual General Meeting, Mr. Angus MacLeod intimated his desire to resign the Convenership, and he was succeeded in that office by Mr. James Thomson, Editor of An Gaidheal.

During the year the Committee, and An Comunn in general, suffered a grievous loss in the passing of Mr. Angus MacLeod, who had been a very able Convener since 1954. We shall miss his genial personality, his advice and co-operation and his whole-hearted interest in the work of the Association. Mr. MacLeod headed the team which revised and prepared the third edition of *Bardachd Ghaidhlig* and for many years he edited the various song books published in connection with the National Mod.

The Committee is engaged in reprinting and publishing a number of varied and useful books. There is a good and steady demand for Reid's Elementary Course of Gaelic. In the hope that part two of "An Approach to Gaelic " will be provided by the author the Committee decided to bind a further supply of part one. The stock of the first two in the series of illustrated Gaelic readers has been exhausted and an order has been placed for a reprint. There is a very good demand for the third reader and delivery of the fourth in the series is expected in the near future. The Committee agreed that An Comunn should bear the cost of a book of poems for interpretation and it is expected that the material will be shortly sent to the printers. The Committee is indebted to the McCaig Trust for granting assistance towards the cost of publication.

Now when there is such a promising revival in the stage production of Gaelic plays we recommend, not only to teams, but to the Gaelic public in general, An Comunn's selection of one-act plays of which twenty-one titles are available. To parents and schools we recommend the collection of songs in An Lon Dubh, parts one and two, surely a bargain at sixpence per copy.

The Committee hope that there will be widespread interest in the proposed Gaelic comic. Drawings and the text of the first quarterly issue have been completed and provided that there is a sufficient response the first number will be published in September. The publication promises to be of good educational value and it is hoped that all those concerned with keeping Gaelic to the forefront among youth will show a practical interest in this publication.

An Gaidheal appears regularly each month. Due to the lack of suitable material it was agreed to discontinue the children's page, An Gaidheal Og. This publication is well worth buying and reading and we commend it to all interested in our language. We would further stress that it is the duty of all members of An Comunn to place regular orders for it and moreover to recommend it to their friends. An Comunn are grateful to those who are regular supporters of the magazine but at the same time it is well known that there are hundreds more who should show a practical interest.

Consideration has been given to the need for a comprehensive Gaelic/English and English/Gaelic dictionary. An approach is to be made to Gaelic teachers in Secondary Schools and to Universities for their co-operation if it is decided to proceed with such a publication.

PROPAGANDA COMMITTEE.

Three meetings were held during the year.

During the session new Branches were formed in Dunkeld, Larbert, and Glenrothes and arrangements have been made to reform a Branch in Rothesay during the autumn. On 9th November the Largs Branch celebrated its twenty-first anniversary.

The President, Council and Committee members, and the Secretary visited a number of Branches and Affiliated Societies during the year. In many areas Branch ceilidhs are well supported but in several places, particularly in industrial areas, attendances have been falling off due to the attraction of new forms of entertainment. It is to be hoped that this phase will pass and that lovers of our language and heritage will renew their support to Branch activities.

Successful Mods were held in the usual venues during last summer and once again An Comunn expresses its gratitude to the organisers, competitors, and supporters who made it possible to hold these Mods. For a number of years there has been a decline in the numbers of adult competitors at Provincial Mods and we appeal to all those who can to participate and by so doing show a good example to the younger generation.

This year the Committee were successful in receiving a number of applications for part-time posts as teachers of Gaelic singing. The Committee are very disappointed however that only one area has officially taken advantage of this scheme which provides an excellent opportunity for old and young to receive tuition in Gaelic singing.

A further approach is to be made to the B.B.C. to consider the question of introducing Gaelic programmes on television.

It is pleasing to note that more Branches have submitted their Annual Reports and Balance Sheets during the year and it is hoped that those who have failed to do so will co-operate in the future so that the Committee will have a complete list.

The Association tie is now on sale to members and may be purchased direct from Messrs. Rowans, Ltd., 70 Buchanan Street, Glasgow, or from An Comunn office, the price being 17s. 6d., postage 6d.

Up till this year badges could only be purchased by Life, Ordinary, and Branch Representative Members and it was decided that the same privilege should be extended to Junior Members.

A drive to recruit members through the good offices of members of the Executive Council was initiated during the year. Recruitment is a duty of all members of An Comunn and we hope that members will interest their friends in joining the Association.

## NORTHERN PROPAGANDA SUB-COMMITTEE.

## Convener—I. MACKAY.

The Committee met three times during the year. Regular Branch visits have been carried out by the Organiser.

There are twenty-six branches functioning in the area and of these Strathconon is a new branch and Portree and Kingussie are reconstituted.

Several members of the sub-committee attended meetings of branches with the Organiser.

A meeting was held in Ullapool and it is hoped that the branch may be reformed.

Provincial Mods were held in Badenoch and Strathspey, Portree, Stornoway, Sutherland, South-West Ross and North-West Ross and this coming Season there will be a Mod again in Lochaber.

The continued success of these Mods is entirely due to the enthusiasm and hard work of the local committees.

The committee was glad to have Mrs. Bannerman present on several occasions and to benefit from her advice and experience.

## MOD AND MUSIC COMMITTEE.

Seven meetings of Committee were held during the year and the Music Sub-Committee met on three occasions to select songs for competitions.

Last year's National Mod in Dundee was very successful despite the fact that entries were smaller and the numbers attending fewer. It was, nevertheless, a very happy Mod and a high standard was attained in competitions. The Committee would like to thank the City of Dundee and the Mod Local Committee for the warm and cordial way in which everyone was received. It was disappointing to the Committee and audience alike that a large number of entrants failed to compete in several of the senior solo competitions and gave no prior indication of withdrawal. The Committee hope that in future competitors will give timely notice if they are unable to compete.

The Committee offer sincere thanks to the Mod Local Committee, under the Convenership of Mr. John A. Macleod, for working so assiduously, not only during the preparatory period, but also during Mod week itself. An Comunn is also indebted to Branches, Affiliated Societies, and numerous individuals for contributing so generously to the Mod Fund. The fine surplus reflects great credit on everyone concerned.

We look forward to a successful Mod in Edinburgh at the end of this session. The Local Committee are working energetically raising funds and making general preparations.

After an absence of fifty years the Mod returns to Stirling in 1961.

For the forthcoming Mod deerskin articles have been promised for exhibition and sale and more entries are expected from schools. An attractive exhibition is being arranged and it will be well worth a visit.

Competitions for next years' Mod in Stirling have been chosen and as these offer a wide choice it is hoped that they will prove of interest to young and old.
