PREFATORY NOTE

The bulk of the papers assembled here are the accounts of Sir Adam Hepburn, Lord Humbie, Commissary General of the Army of the Solemn League and Covenant, Colonel of one of its regiments, and a Senator of the College of Justice.

With the exception of the accounts for the period 23rd November 1644-24th December 1645, the originals of the papers are in the General Register House, where also are the Artillery accounts for 1644-1647, and William Livingstone's 'Compt of the charge of the money receaved for the use of the Erle of Callendar,' 1644-45.

Humbie's accounts for 23rd November 1644–24th December 1645, are in the possession of Alexander Thoms, Esq., of St. Andrews, into whose keeping the document passed from a descendant of the Hepburns of Humbie. The Society is indebted to him for permission to publish it, and to the Rev. A. H. Thoms for the use of the portrait which forms the frontispiece to the present volume.

The Articles and Ordinances of Warre, issued by Leven for the campaign of 1644, are printed from a copy of the original pamphlet in my possession. Its title-page bears that it was: 'Printed at Edinburg by Evan Tyler, Printer to the Kings most Excellent Majesty. And reprinted at London for Robert Bostocke, dwelling at the Signe of the Kings-Head in Pauls Church-yard. 1644.'

The Index has been compiled by Mr. A. Mill of the Signet Library.

INTRODUCTION

THE armies that encountered Charles the First and Cromwell revived an experience and organisation to which Scotland was a stranger. From the days of Balliol and Bruce her relations with England had been generally hostile, and Falkirk, Bannockburn, Halidon Hill, Neville's Cross, Flodden, Solway Moss and Pinkie punctuated generations of stormy conflict. But during the hundred years that intervened between Pinkie (1547) and Newburn (1640), excepting the English expedition to Leith in 1559, which preceded the Pacification of Edinburgh, no official hostilities disturbed the Borders from either side. The condition of unwonted peace was more firmly settled by the accession of James the Sixth to the Crown of England in 1603. 'The English and the Scots (that is, the Lowlanders of Scotland),' writes John Home,1 'at once laid down their arms. The untasted pleasures of peace were delicious to both nations. The militia was totally neglected.' Scotland, looking elsewhere for an outlet to her military activities, found it in the wars of religion which decimated Europe in the first half of the seventeenth century. Her sons fought in the armies of Holland, Sweden, Denmark, France, and distant Russia. The service of Gustavus Adolphus of Sweden alone is said to have invited ten thousand of them.2 nearly onethird of the strength of the strongest army Scotland put into the field during the Civil Wars. Robert Monro

enumerates upwards of one hundred Scottish officers who held Swedish commissions in 1632, besides 'diverse Captaines and inferiour Officers of the Nation,' whose names he does not mention.1

The experience of her Leslies, Turners, and Monros in the service of foreign princes was of the largest benefit to Scotland when she raised her armies for the defence of the Covenant. Almost every one of the lieutenantcolonels and majors of the Army of the Solemn League and Covenant had seen foreign service.

In the closing months of 1638, Scotland, impelled by the attacks of Charles the First and Archbishop Laud upon her Church, called out her long disused army, The command was entrusted to one who had gained distinction in the service of the most distinguished captain of the age. Alexander Leslie, born in 1582 of Aberdeenshire stock, entered the service of Sweden in 1608. Twenty years later, holding the rank of colonel, his defence of Stralsund against Wallenstein gave him a European reputation. He accompanied Gustavus Adolphus upon the campaign that ended with the king's death at Lützen in November 1632. Three vears later he attained the rank of Field-Marshal, and shared with Baner and Wrangel the direction of the Swedish armies. When he laid down his commission in Queen Christina's service in August 1638, he was approaching his sixtieth year, and had acquired wealth sufficient to tempt him to 'cum hame to his native countrie of Scotland and sattill him self.' 2 There is no direct evidence that he was drawn by the call of the Covenant, to which, upon his return to Scotland in October 1638, he

immediately responded.¹ But he brought to his task the knowledge and experience of a professional soldier, a convinced attachment to the cause for which he fought, and tact and shrewd common sense which overcame the jealousy of the nobles at the appointment of one whose parentage was not distinguished, his birth illegitimate, and himself a stranger to his own country. 'Such was the wisdome and authoritic of that old, little, crooked souldier,' writes Baillie, 'that all, with ane incredible submission, from the beginning to the end, gave over themselves to be guided by him, as if he had been Great Solyman.' ²

In May 1639 the Estates, in a comprehensive docu-The Bishops' ment, commissioned Leslie to command the Army of the Covenant. He was empowered to direct native and such foreign levies as might be raised; to appoint officers, clerks and secretaries; to call out the fencible men of the shires and to supervise their embodiment; to 'give ordour for battails, fights, skirmishes, keeping or taking of castills, toures, sconces, bridges, passes and others, and generally everie other thing to do that to the charge and comand of a generall of forces, hors and foote, rightly pertaines.' His commission was to remain in force so long as Scotland was 'necessitat to be in armes for the defence of the couenant, for religion, crowne and countrie, and av and whill the Lord send peace to this kingdome.' 3 But the crisis passed rapidly. On 27th May Charles and the English army arrived at Berwick. On 5th June Leslie concentrated at Duns, from whence, should the

English advance upon Edinburgh, Baillie remarks, he might rapidly 'have been on their backs.' ¹

On 11th June negotiations were opened between the two armies, and on the 18th the inconclusive Treaty of Berwick was concluded. A little later Leslie laid down a commission which had remained in force less than three months.

The service of the Scottish army in the first Bishops' War was brief. But as the prospect remained threatening, Leslie's experienced officers were retained in pay, and throughout the autumn and winter of 1639-40 were engaged in drilling the shire levies. On 17th April 1640. Leslie again received a commission as Commander-in-Chief, and on 20th August crossed the Tweed, accompanied by a body of Highlanders, 'the nakedest fellows that ever I saw,' an Englishman observed.2 The immediate goal was Newcastle and its coal district. On 28th August, after an unresisted march through Northumberland, Leslie crossed the Tyne at Newburn and routed Lord Conway's inferior force. Two days later, Newcastle capitulated. Within a week, Durham, Sunderland, Tynemouth, and Shields were occupied. The rapid success enabled concession after concession to be wrung from the king by the English Parliament, and in August 1641, a year since they crossed the Tweed, the Scots were permitted to withdraw from England. On 13th August Charles visited Newcastle, and met at close quarters the army which had helped to destroy Laud, Strafford, and their system. Professional pride prompted Leslie to display his forces. Drawn up in two divisions, his army received the king. 'In the first place,' says an old tract 3 describing the scene, 'stood Highlanders,

commonly called Redshankes, with their plaides cast ouer their shoulders, having every one his bowe and arrowes with a broad slycing sword by his syde,' Next to them were the infantry, supported by the light ordnance which Sir Alexander Hamilton had invented. On the wings were the cavalry, and midway between the two divisions of the army were stationed the artillery, which, as the king passed, 'gave such true fyre as it is beleeued since the invention of gunnes never better was seene or heard: they discharged wondrous swift, but with as good a method and order as your skilfullest Ringers observe with Bels, not suffering the novse of the one to drowne the other.' On the same day the king proceeded to Edinburgh, whither, on 21st August; the Scottish army followed him, 'taking their leaves [of Newcastle] in a most brotherly and friendly manner.' 1

On 27th August 1641, the eve of the anniversary of Newburn fight, the Scottish army was disbanded at Leith. Three regiments only, from among those which had remained in Scotland, were kept on foot. Two of them, under Monro and Cochrane, were quartered near Edinburgh. The third, consisting of six companies of the Orkney and Caithness under Lord Sinclair, was stationed at Aberdeen.² On 17th November, Leslie, now Earl of Leven, laid down his commission, and received the thanks of the Estates for the 'approvine fidelitic, worth, and abilitie' he had shown in his exercise of it.³

In the spring of 1642 the regiments of Monro, Sinclair, and Cochrane (now commanded by Lord Home) proceeded to Ireland to quell O'Neil's rebellion. On 7th

May, Leven received the command-in-chief,¹ and landed in Ireland on 4th August with fresh regiments, among them the Earl of Eglinton's and, seemingly, the Teviot-dale under Lord Lothian. The English Parliament had undertaken to pay the Scottish regiments in Ireland, but Sir James Turner, who was serving under Sinclair, complains that they 'fingered no pay the whole time I stayd in Ireland, except for three months.' 2 He refers probably to the three months which preceded Leven's arrival. For, less than three weeks after it, Charles raised the Standard at Nottingham, and the English Civil War commenced.

The Solemn League and The progress of the English Civil War demonstrated Parliament's military inefficiency. To bring the Scottish army across the Tweed for the subjugation of the royalist North would menace the king in the Midlands, deprive him of his chief ports of communication with the Continent, diminish the area from which he could draw recruits, and, it was anticipated, bring the war to a speedy conclusion. On 27th June 1648, Parliament invited the assistance of the Scottish Estates. On 29th November the military alliance was completed: Scotland undertook to take the field with an army of eighteen thousand foot, two thousand horse, one thousand dragoons, and a train of artillery; the English Parliament promised to furnish £30,000 sterling a month for its maintenance.

By the opening of 1644 Leven, who, on 26th August 1643, received the command-in-chief, had assembled twenty-one regiments of foot, nine bodies of horse, one

regiment of dragoons, and a powerful artillery-train.¹ On 19th January 1644, in bitter weather, he crossed the Tweed, and on 3rd February appeared before Newcastle, into which the Marquess of Newcastle had thrown himself a few hours before.² After lying for three weeks before the town, Leven marched up the north bank of the Tyne, masking Newcastle with the Mearns and Aberdeen, the Strathearn, Perthshire, Merse, Nithsdale and Annandale regiments, and so much of Sinclair's as had not already been left in garrison at Morpeth.³

On 28th February he crossed the Tyne, and occupied Sunderland on 4th March. The Marquess of Newcastle followed in cautious pursuit, and after inconclusive skirmishing at Boldon on 7th and 8th March withdrew to Durham, Leven followed him thither on 12th March, but, being unable to subsist his army in a district wasted by the enemy, fell back, and on the 16th captured South Shields fort, which guarded the mouth of the Tyne. Meanwhile, Montrose had joined the Marquess at Durham. and a more resolute effort was made to oppose the invader. On the 24th the Marquess offered battle at Hilton, or Boldon Hill, near Sunderland. After an indecisive engagement (24th-25th March), the Marquess again withdrew to Durham. There, on 12th April, he learnt of the fall of the royalist garrison at Selby, and threw himself into York on the 16th.4

Leven followed in hot but ineffectual pursuit. On 18th April he joined Sir Thomas Fairfax at Wetherby, and on the 22nd drew towards York. The city was closely besieged upon the arrival of Manchester, Cromwell, and

the army of the Eastern Association on 8rd June. But the advance of Prince Rupert compelled the besiegers to suspend operations. Early on the morning of 1st July, the allies moved out to Long Marston, and on the 2nd gave battle to Rupert and Newcastle, who joined the Prince from York. The Scottish infantry contributed materially to the victory. But England showed no disposition to share the honours, and her ungenerous action, as Scotland regarded it, inflamed the disagreements which ultimately wrecked the alliance. On 16th July York capitulated, and Leven withdrew to quarters round Leeds.

Meanwhile a supplementary army had been raised under the Earl of Callendar; for Montrose's activity in Northumberland imperilled Leven's communications. On 25th June Callendar marched from Scotland with a force of seven to ten thousand men.2 He recaptured Morpeth. and crossing the Tyne at Newburn, seized Hartlepool and Stockton. On 27th July he occupied Gateshead and awaited Leven's arrival to invest Newcastle-upon-Tyne. On 7th August Leven broke his camp about Leeds, and on the 15th established his headquarters at Elswick, to the west of Newcastle. The town was straitly encompassed, but the stout defence of its citizens, led by their Mayor, Sir John Marley, delayed its fall until 19th October. Tynemouth surrendered on the 27th. With that event the campaign of 1644 concluded, and the Scottish army went into winter quarters in Northumberland and Durham.3

The war already had lasted two years, and its conclu-

sion seemed indefinitely remote. Equally unsatisfactory to Scotland was her ally's failure to establish ecclesiastical uniformity. Four days after the fall of Newcastle the Committee of Both Kingdoms was urged 'to put that businesse to a period,' and attention was directed to 'the abundance and variety of Sectaries, Separatists, and Schismaticks,' whose existence was a 'great scandall of the Gospel and Professors thereof,' 1 It boded ill that the body of opinion against which Scotland protested controlled English politics, and in February 1645 achieved the creation of the New Model. Leven was requested to co-operate with Fairfax and the new army. But he was reluctant to leave the North of England, where he could watch Montrose. He was hampered also by lack of money, food, and transport. In June, however, he led his army southward. On the 12th he was at Doncaster, and had news of the victory at Naseby. Thence he proceeded to Nottingham and was invited to hold Charles in the West while the New Model operated below the Severn. The capitulation of Carlisle, on 28th June, enabled him to fulfil his orders with the less misgiving, now that the keys of the eastern and western routes into Scotland were in his hands.2

Leaving Nottingham on 2nd July 1645, the Scottish army crossed the Severn at Bewdley, took Canon Frome by assault, and on the 30th invested Hereford. But hardly had Leven drawn his lines round the city when Charles broke out of Wales. On 18th August he was at Doneaster. 'If the Scots give us any time,' wrote Lord Digby to Rupert from that place, 'we do then promise ourselves with confidence a good army suddenly.' a

On 15th August, also, Montrose's victory at Kilsyth destroyed Scotland's army for home defence. David Leslie and a strong force of cavalry proceeded in all haste to Scotland, while Leven, abandoning the siege of Hereford, 1 drew back to Yorkshire.

The withdrawal of the Scottish army was regarded with displeasure in England. 'They have lost affection here,' writes Sir Robert Honeywood to Vane on 9th September, 'and will do more unless their armies engage more truly for the future, and their counsels and ours be more united, whereby they may gain the hearts of the people again, which are not lost, but are in suspense,' 2 Scotland, on her side, was straining at the alliance. Hope of ecclesiastical uniformity had vanished. Her army was ill-paid, its wants were inadequately furnished, and her obligations to England placed her at the mercy of Montrose.3 Her anxiety was somewhat allayed by David Leslie's victory at Philiphaugh, on 13th September. But it was not until 28th November, having forced the Trent at Muskham Bridge on the previous day, that Leven sat down to the siege of Newark.

The siege of Newark was still in progress when, on 5th May 1646, Charles rode into the Scottish camp at South-well. In the desperate condition in which he stood, the king regarded Leven's army as a force which, judiciously humoured, might earry him back to his throne. The Scots on their part left him in no doubt of their willingness to act with him against the Sectaries, provided he could satisfy them regarding Presbyterian uniformity. At the king's bidding, Newark surrendered on 6th May.

On the following day the Scottish army withdrew northwards, and on the 18th entered Newcastle with Charles in its charge. Abortive negotiations with the king and tedious financial negotiations with the Parliament followed. The former led to no conclusion satisfactory to Scotland. In January 1647 the accounts between the allies were adjusted. On 8rd February Charles was surrendered to Commissioners of the English Parliament, and a week or so later Leven crossed the Border. Upon its arrival in Scotland the army was almost entirely disbanded, excepting a force of six thousand infantry, twelve hundred horse, and two hundred dragoons, which was kept on foot in accordance with a resolution of the Estates on 29th January 1647.¹

Detestation of Cromwell and the ecclesiastical polity he stood for, attachment to the Monarchy whose existence in England it threatened, and Charles's tardy acceptance of Scotland's ecclesiastical ideals, directed her military activity after 1647. Hamilton and Callendar were defeated at Preston in 1648, and Cromwell, following his victory by a visit to Edinburgh, secured the disbanding of the Scottish army, excepting a small force of fifteen hundred men under Leven's command. Upon the execution of Charles in January 1649, the Estates summoned an army on behalf of his son. At Dunbar on 3rd September 1650, Cromwell destroyed it. Thereafter, until the Restoration, a native territorial army gave place to an English army of occupation.

Such, in outline, is the record of Scotland's military experience from the concentration of her forces at Duns in 1639 to her defeat at Dunbar in 1650.

The documents assembled here exclusively relate to the

of the Solemn League and

campaigns of 1643-47, in other words, to the operations of the Army of the Solemn League and Covenant. To that organisation the remainder of this Introduction is devoted.

The first step towards creating the Army of the Solemn League and Covenant was made on 28th July 1643, when the Estates, 'considdering the danger imminent to the trew protestant religioun, his maiesties persoune, and peace of this Kingdome, be the multitude of papists in airmes in Ingland and the occasiounes thairby geven not only to publict enemies abroad Bot also to disaffected persounes within this kingdome to labour so far as in them lyes To interrupt this happie peace injoyed within the same,' ordered three troops of horse and five companies of foot, a force 780 strong, to be raised under officers whom the Estates should appoint.1 Three weeks later (18th August), a loan of £40,000 Scots (£3,333, 6s. 8d.) sterling was authorised for 'outreiking' the force.2 On 22nd August the Estates commissioned Sir John Brown of Fordel, Thomas Craig of Riccarton, and William Stewart to be Routmasters of the troops, with orders to rendezvous on the Links of Leith on the following 13th September, each Routmaster receiving £40 sterling 'in contentatione of thair levy money and furniture of horses and airmes,' 'pistolls of ane lairge boare,' steel caps, and broadswords.3 On 25th August Lord Sinclair received a commission as colonel of the five companies of foot. They were commissioned, like the troops of horse, for not less than five months from their rendezvous on the Links of Leith on 16th September, the Estates binding themselves to provide pikes, muskets, drums, colours, 'and all other necesseres.' 4

Other and more general machinery already had been

put in motion. Until the institution of a standing army after the Restoration, military service was exigible from the barons, freeholders, and royal burghs as a condition of their tenure. Upon receipt of the Crown's writ its vassals were bound to present themselves in arms at the appointed rendezvous with their retainers. In times of national peril, also, an obligation to military service rested upon the entire male population between the ages of sixteen and sixty. The period of service usually was restricted to forty days; the poorer lieges being exempt on occasion from serving beyond the Borders. Hence, on 18th August 1643, the Estates made order that fencible persons of all ranks and degrees between the ages of sixteen and sixty should present themselves, within forty-eight hours of publishing the proclamation, at the rendezvous of their several counties, equipped with forty days' provision, ammunition, arms, tents, and other warlike furniture, the horsemen with pistols, broadswords, and steel caps, or failing them, 'jackes or secreites,1 lances, and steill bonnettes'; the infantry with musket or pike and sword, or failing them, with halberds, Lochaber axes, or Jedburgh staves, and swords.2 A later Act (6th March 1645) imposed a penalty of £20 Scots (£1, 13s. 4d. sterling) upon every person who mustered without a musket, if possessed of the means to purchase one, and a fine of ten merks if negligently unprovided with a pike. In cases where 'nather yeoman nor servant' could purchase the prescribed arms, the Act ordered their 'maister or heritour' to provide them, under the same penalties. The local War Committees were bidden to store powder, match, and ball at the rate of 2 lb. of powder and 4 lb. of match and ball for every fencible person

in the shire, and to procure 'ane able and expert souldier' to drill the local levies.¹

On 26th August 1643 the Estates nominated unwards of seventy nobles and lairds throughout the shires, with power 'to choyse thair awin Colonelles and wnder officeres.' Shire Committees of War also were appointed, and were directed to meet at least once a week at the head burgh, to admit to their deliberations the local nobles and lairds nominated as colonels by the Estates, and other wellaffected persons; to make lists of all fencible persons between the ages sixteen and sixty, and to draft them into companies and regiments; to provide their local companies with arms, colours and drums, and the Routmasters with trumpeters and cornets; to see that every company drilled once a week and every regiment once a month; to appoint a secure place for a magazine of arms and ammunition; and to correspond with the Committee of Estates at Edinburgh, Royal Burghs were permitted to nominate the under officers of their levies, and to drill the latter independently until the summons came to active service.2 On the same date (26th August 1644) Parliament appointed a large body to act as a Committee for war, with power to nominate members to accompany the army and to correspond with the rest of the Committee at Edinburgh.3 On the same date, also, the Estates appointed Leven Lord General, and recommended the Committee to draft his commission.4

On 29th November 1643, therefore, the Committee was able to make a definitive treaty with the English Parliament regarding the composition and service of the Army of the Solemn League and Covenant. The agreement

stipulated that it should consist of 18,000 foot, 2000 horse, and 1000 dragoons, with a suitable train of artillery: that it should rendezvous upon the Border completely armed. equipped, and victualled for forty days; that the appointment of its commander should be in the hands of the Estates: that the cost of levving, arming, and bringing it together should be borne meantime by Scotland, and should be discharged by England upon the conclusion of peace: that a monthly sum of £30,000 sterling should be provided by England for its maintenance; that £100,000 sterling should be advanced forthwith, and that Scotland's credit should be pledged jointly for raising it; that the allies should not make a separate peace: and that the Scottish army should be employed in England only for purposes declared in the Solemn League and Covenant. The English Parliament pledged itself to detail eight men-of-war for the defence of the Scottish coast.1

In accordance with the treaty of 29th November 1643, The Regiments the Army of the Solemn League and Covenant entered $^{0.1643-47}$.

England under Leven in January 1644. In June 1644 the military situation demanded a supplementary force under the Earl of Callendar. Military events were confined to the years 1644 and 1645, the important operations being the campaign of 1644 in Northumberland and Durham (which included the capture of Hartlepool and Sunderland and the battle of Boldon Hill), the siege of York, the battle of Marston Moor, and the fall of Newcastle; and, in 1645, the sieges of Hereford, Newark, and Carlisle.

Leven's army in January 1644 consisted of twentyone territorial regiments of foot, nine bodies of horse, one regiment of dragoons, and the artillery train. Rushworth ² prints a list of the regiments and their principal officers, which is complete and generally accurate. Corrected and amplified it furnishes the following table:—

THE CAVALRY

The cavalry of Leven's army consisted of nine bodies, of which seven were raised in accordance with an order of the Estates on 26th November 1643. It directed troops already under levy in the shires, but as yet un-

formed and without colonels, to be formed into seven regiments, each of eight troops of sixty troopers, under the command of Leven, David Leslie, the Earl of Eglinton, the Earl of Dalhousie, George, Lord Gordon, Lord Kirk-cudbright, and the Earl of Balcarres.¹ An eighth regiment was commanded by Michael Weldon. The Marquess of Argyll was attended by a troop. A dragoon regiment under Colonel Hugh Fraser completed Leven's cavalry force.²

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from Linlithgow. Presumably the regiment returned to Scotland with David Leslie after the battle of Kilsyth.¹ It was present with him at Philiphaugh on 13th September 1645.² and was ordered to Aberdeenshire on 16th December 1645.² At a muster of the regiment on the Links of Leith on that date it was reduced to 324 troopers, 84 horses fit for service, and 69 pairs of pistols.⁴ Twenty-three troopers and four officers of the regiment were at the muster on 17th January 1646, at Newark, the rest of the regiment being then in Yorkshire.³ The regimental accounts show that part of the regiment was engaged at Hereford.

Northumberland in the early stages of the campaign of 1644. At the muster of 17th January 1646, at Newark, it numbered 170 rank and file.

While Montrose was at large in Northumberland and Leven's army was drawn round York, the reduction of the North of England was as far from accomplishment in the summer of 1644 as at the commencement of the year, when the Army of the Solemn League and Covenant crossed the Border. Already in the spring the Estates were arranging for the despatch of a supplementary army. On 5th June a Committee was appointed to superintend the raising of a new levy.2 A week later (11th June), the Earl of Callendar, who was to receive the command of it, set out from Edinburgh towards Kelso in readiness for an instant advance, and the officers of his force were bidden to present themselves at the rendezvous the following day.3 On the 18th, Callendar received his commission as Lieutenant-General, charging him in particular to capture Newcastle-upon-Tyne and other places in the enemy's hands in the North of England. On 25th June he began his march.4 The composition of his force is nowhere definitely stated, but the accounts of its Commissary, William Livingston, which are printed in volume ii., show that it included, in addition to Sinclair's and Marischal's infantry (regiments from Leven's command), nine regiments of foot, three regiments of cavalry, and nine troops of horse. Callendar's total strength was from ten to seven thousand men, and probably was near the smaller figure.5 The Staff consisted of Major-General Ramsav,6 Major-General

control the national levies. In 1638, when military force was appealed to to preserve the Kirk, a committee of the nobility, shires, and burghs was established at Edinburgh,¹ to which despatches from the seat of war and requests for reinforcements were addressed.² In the campaign of 1640-41 the committee's functions were extended. The prospect of the army's advance into England prompted the selection of members of the committee to accompany it, and to report to Edinburgh on all matters arising out of the campaign.

The alliance with England in November 1648 entailed dual military control. The army was placed under the immediate eye of the Committee of Both Kingdoms in London, which included representatives of the two allies. It kept in touch with the armies through Commissioners who accompanied them, and inter alia provided for their commissariat and transport. As representing the Committee, Argyll and Sir William Armyne attended the Scottish army into England in January 1644, issued orders for its billeting, and jointly summoned Newcastle to surrender in February 1644.³ To it Leven applied for ammunition,⁴ and from its Commissioners demanded provisions and transport to enable his army to fulfil its orders to march southward (May 1645).⁵

The powers conferred upon Leven as Commander-in-The Com-Chief were ample. His authority was upheld by stringent Chief, regulations, and clauses expressly exonerated him against the consequences of his orders and actions. His com-

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mission of 1639, which that of 1640 closely followed. states that 'the haill estaits foirsaid, conveined as said is. sweare and promise all dewtifull obedience to him in everie thing concernes his chairge of all the Scotis forces.' It proceeds: 'naither sall the punischment of any persoun. of whatsoever ranke, qualitie or degrie, who sall not do his dewty or give obedience when he is comanded, be esteemed be any, aither of his kin, freinds or acquaintance, but as the iust reward of his owne demerite, and never quarrelled at na tyme heirefter: and in caice any persone or persones (as God forbid) sall repyne or quarrell such punischment or deid to be done be the said generall or his said officers in executioun of their offices, conforme to the saidis articles, in that caise they sall be held as mutiners, and the rest of the countrey and everie persoun therein obleist to assist the said generall and his posterity against them, till they be punisched for their fault and brought to dew acknowledgment thairof.' In the Articles and Ordinances of Warre (1644) the soldier's oath includes a vow 'to honour and obey my Lord Generall and all my superiour Officers and Commanders, and by all meanes to hinder their dishonour and hurt.' Article V. ordains that whosoever shall 'use any words to the dishonour of the Lord Generall, he shall be punished with death': 'Whosoever shall be found to do violence against the Lord Generall, his Safe-guard, or Safe-conduct, shall dve for it ' 1

Councils of War. For the maintenance of camp discipline, and to decide all 'questions, debates and quarrellings' between officers and those under their command, two Courts of Justice were constituted, the higher with an appellate jurisdiction from the lower, both being subject to the Committee

of Estates. Severe regulations ensured the Courts' decorous procedure. Article II. of the Articles and Ordinances prescribed: 'If any man shall by word or gesture shew his contempt or mis-regard, or shall fall out in boasting or braving, while Courts are sitting, hee shall be punished by death.'

The army which entered England in 1644 on behalf of Financial the Solemn League and Covenant was, in terms of the Organisation. Treaty of 29th November 1643, to be supported by England at the rate of £30,000 sterling a month, a sum increased to £31,000 by a supplementary extra-Parliamentary agreement.1 Parliament's original intention was to provide the money out of the confiscated estates of 'Papists and other delinquents.' That source proving insufficient, an assessment was laid upon the northern counties.2 With the organisation of the New Model the financial agreement of November 1643 was revised. On 20th February 1645, the Lords concurred in a resolution of the Commons to raise £21,000 sterling a month 3 towards the support of the Scottish army, and assessment was made upon the following associated counties and towns for the purpose: London, Middlesex, Westminster, the Cinque Ports, Kent, Essex, Surrey, Southwark, Sussex, Hertford, Cambridge, Ely, Suffolk, Norfolk, Norwich, Huntingdon, Bedford, Lincoln county and city, Rutland, Nottingham county and city, Derby, York county and city, Kingston-upon-Hull, Lancaster, Leicester, Northampton, Cheshire, Stafford, Warwick, Coventry, Cumberland, Northumberland, Durham, Newcastle, Westmoreland,3 Beyond the provision of pay, Parliament made occasional grants for other purposes. Before the Scots

undertook the siege of Newcastle in 1644 they received $\pounds 10,000$ for clothes. Victuals and ammunition were also provided.

However adequate or inadequate the sum allotted to the army may have been, there is no doubt that it was raised with difficulty and paid with irregularity. On 10th June 1645 the responsible Committee reported that most of the counties named in the Ordinance of 20th February have 'not collected any money at all.' 2 Leven was able to march south as he was directed only by issuing promissory tickets for provisions,3 In September 1645 his army had received only one month's pay since the Ordinance of the previous February.4 In October 1645 a sum of £30,000 was promised on condition that the army appeared before Newark by 1st November.5 The city of London was approached for a loan, but did not agree to advance the amount until 6th December.6 By the end of the year only £15,000 had been raised.7 Indeed, so hopelessly was the army in arrears, that the prospect of a 'well-assured fund in Ireland,' from which her claims might be satisfied, was one of the baits held out by Charles early in 1646, when he was endeavouring to gain Scotland's help.8

As Sir Adam Hepburn's accounts reveal, the revenues which as Commissary-General he controlled for the army's use came from other than Parliamentary sources: Assessments upon the Scottish counties and burn's for

maintenance and provisions: monies borrowed upon the public security; fines imposed upon particular and 'malignant' persons in Scotland; assessments upon the northern English counties: assessments upon the associate English counties after February 1645; provision of victuals and clothing from England and Scotland, and the Customs and Excise dues of English northern ports. The settlement of accounts between the two countries in 1646-47 was considerably complicated by Leven's occupation and control of the northern seaports. In a detailed statement of their financial relations with their ally 1 the Houses, on 10th December 1645, debited Scotland with a sum of above £53,000 sterling in respect of the sale of coals at Newcastle and Sunderland.2 They set down an indefinite amount for 'free quarters and disorderly plunderings' in the districts through which the army had marched. They alleged that from one source or another their ally had received nearly £400,000 sterling between 6th October 1643 and 1st November 1645, that is in little more than two vears, at the rate of over £15,000 a month.3 A year later the financial relations of the two allies were represented in a comprehensive balance-shect. Parliament computed Scotland's gross receipts at £1,462,769, 5s. 3d. sterling. Scotland counter-claimed for £1,929,415. 6s. 8d. sterling, leaving a debit balance of £466,646, 1s. 5d. In the result she received £400,000 sterling, in full payment of her claim.4 Half the amount was paid in two instalments before the army evacuated

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England, and the receipts bear the dates 21st January and 3rd February 1647.¹

Transport and Commissariat,

Baillie declares that when Leslie encamped at Duns in 1639, if the necessity had arisen, his army was unable to advance into England, since he could provide neither 'carriage horses nor strong enough convoyes for it.' For the campaign of 1640 he was better equipped. Three thousand horses conveyed his baggage, and the heavier guns were provided with conveyances. In the campaigns of 1644, 1645, and 1646, the transport was put to heavier tasks, and with but partial success. Leven's letters in the early part of 1645 are filled with complaints upon the matter, the districts through which he passed being either unwilling or unable to provide him with the draught horses he required.

The commissariat constituted a particular difficulty to the armies of the seventeenth century, which in general subsisted upon the country through which they passed, or the locality in which they lay, paying or giving promissory tickets for what they consumed. In June 1640, beer, wine, biscuits and coals were stored at Duns. But by August the provisioning of Leslie's troops had become difficult, and Gordon of Rothiemay frankly admits a desire 'not to eate upp ther owne countrey' as a motive which determined them to cross the Border. When Leslie summoned Newcastle, nine days later, he demanded 'a relief of provisions, as bread, butter, cheese, and drink

for their money.' ¹ In September the maintenance of his army was laid upon Northumberland, Durham, and Newcastle, and an order was issued to Durham to provide 30,000 lbs. of bread, 20 tuns of beer, 40 oxen, and 100 sheep daily.²

For billeting and provisioning the army which entered England in 1644 the English Parliament was responsible. After the army crossed the Tweed, the following order was issued: ³—

A Declaration of the Committees for Billetting the Souldiers

Whereas the two Houses of the Parliament of England, considering the great and apparent danger of Religion and Liberty, in regard of the great Forees of Papists and others employed for the destruction thereof; have by their Commissioners desired the assistance of the Kingdom of Scotland to joyn with them in the just and honourable endeavours of preserving and reforming Religion, procuring the honour and happinesse of the King now engaged in Councell prejudicial to himselfe and his Kingdomes, and of setling and maintaining the peace and liberty of his Dominions. And whereas the Kingdome of Scotland have readily yeelded the reunto, andraised an Army, for the ends above expressed, which is to be ordered by the Committees and Commissioners of both Kingdomes.

We the said Commissioners and Committees, being desirous to take the most orderly and reasonable way for the Provision of the said Army, have thought fit by this short Declaration to acquaint you with what is expected from you the Inhabitants of those parts through which this Army shall passe, that so you may not be oppressed with arbitrary Taxes and unreasonable spoyles, which you have suffered from those who have lived amongst you and upon you.

This is a cause and time wherein the endeavours of every one who loves his Religion, King or Countrey, ought to be exprest to the utmost, and that which is required at your

hands, is to provide and furnish to your best ability, those Souldiers that shall be quartered with you with such provisions as shall bee necessary, not exceeding the allowances and rates mentioned in a schedule hereafter written, hereunto annexed.'1

And for the better keeping of accounts of what is delivered by you to the Officers and Souldiers according to the Rates of the said schedule; We desire that two sufficient men in every Town, Hamblet or Parish, the one for the horse, and the other for the foot, may exactly take and keep Notes of the Billities of every particular, and of what shall be delivered to every one of them, particular horsman and footman, that so allowance and saifsaction may bee made to every Inhabitant accordingly, which wee will take care shall bee speedily done either out of the Estates of Papists and other Delinquents against the Parliament, or otherwise as wee shall bee enabled thereunto.

Nor have you any reason to distrust us in this behalf, if you call to minde the equall proceedings you have heretofore found from the Scottish Army at their former entrance. And in so doing, you shall, besides the service which you doe to the publike, free your selves from any irregular carriages of the Souldiers, and be the better enabled to require a just satisfaction for any injury done you against or beyond this Order, of which we hereby assure you.

Leven's orders for billeting and provisioning are detailed in a later Order, dated November, 1644:2-

The quartermasters are instructed to quarter the troops with the advice of the local committees, constables, and officers.

The officers are directed to take all possible care that soldiers do not straggle from their allotted quarters.

The houses of local committee-men are exempt from the burden of quartering soldiers, the necessary occasions of the country requiring their absence from home.

The quartermaster is responsible for arranging the safe

convoy of provisions brought to the quarters, and for giving receipts for what is brought in.

Officers and soldiers are forbidden to lay a tax or imposition upon the country people; or to deface the houses in which they are quartered, or to take away books, eattle, or goods from them.

Officers and soldiers are enjoined to take all possible care to prevent differences arising between themselves and the subjects of England, and in the event of their arising, to make them known to the Committee of Both Kingdoms.

In the same spirit Article X. of the Articles and Ordinances (1644) ordains: 'No man on his march, or at his lodging, within or without the Countrey upon whatsoever pretext, shall take by violence, either horse, cattell, goods, money, or any other thing lesse or more, but shall paythe usuall prices for his meat and drinke, or be furnished in an orderly way upon count, at the sight of the Commissar, according to the order given by the Committee upon paine of death, without mercy.' Article XII. lays down: 'No man shall presume to doe the smallest injury to any that bring necessaries to the Leager, whether by stealing from them, or deceiving them, or by violence in taking their Horse or goods, under the paine to be accounted and punished as enemies. No Victuallers shall sell rotten victuals, upon paine of imprisonment and confiscation. and further as they shall be judged to deserve.

'No Souldier shall provide and sell Victuals, unlesse he be authorized, nor shall any that selleth Victuals keep in his Tent or Hutte any Souldier at unseasonable houres and forbidden times, under paine at discretion; Like as all the prices thereof shall be set downe by the generall Commisser, and be given to the Quarter-Master of the severall Regiments.'

Still, in spite of official arrangements, the commissariat from 1644 to 1647 was in a chronic state of difficulty. A letter in March 1644 complains: 1 'Our Army hath been in very great straits for want of victuall and provisions. The enemy hath wasted and spoyled all the Countrey and driven all away before them. And five Barques sent from Scotland to us with provisions are lost, three of them perished, and two of them were driven into Tyne by extremity of Weather and seised on by the enemy; so that sometimes the whole Army hath been ready to starve, having neither Meat nor Drink: We never have above twenty and four hours provisions for them.' The commissariat broke down entirely after Marston Moor. 'Very few of the Common Souldiers,' writes Simeon Ash, 'did eat above the quantity of a penny loafe from Tuesday till Saturday morning, and had no beere at all.' 2 In the following September, a royalist news-sheet 3 heartened its readers with the picture of 'the hungry Scots' before Newcastle

When the Army left the North of England in 1645 to undertake long marches through the Midlands, its difficulties were enhanced. Before setting out from Appleby in May 1645, Leven wrote to the Commissioners at York, to represent 'the great impediment we find through the want of draught and provisions.' 4 He was compelled to issue promissory tickets for the provisions he obtained, and the inhabitants were little disposed to furnish food with the indefinite prospect of repayment. During the siege of Hereford, in August 1645, the army for ten days was almost entirely without bread and subsisted upon

beans, 'green corn,' and fruit.' In February 1646, before Newark, it was represented that for two weeks the infantry had not received eighteen pennyworth of provisions weekly, and that there was not £10 worth of food in their magazines.² Consequently, Leven resorted to what his ally condemned as 'free quarters and disorderly plunderings,' a in other words, took upon credit the provisions he was unable to pay for.

For the campaign in England a scale of pay was insti-Pay. tuted which was more generous than that of the normal 'Scots establishment.' The Scottish, or home service scale is set out in an Act of 27th February 1645; 4—

In addition to their pay all ranks received billet-money or 'allowance.' Upon the army's entrance into England (in January 1644), the Committee of Both Kingdoms proclaimed its desire 'to take the most orderly and reasonable way' for provisioning the army.\(^1\) The districts through which it passed were ordered to furnish 'such provisions as shall be necessary' to the officers and

men billeted upon them, the daily rates and allowances for all ranks, i.e. the maximum daily provisioning which could be demanded for them, or could be charged for their maintenance, being set out in a 'Schedule of Allowances' appended to the proclamation. In sterling money the daily rates were as follows:—

CAVALRY

Major, 6/; Routmaster or Captain, 6/; Lieutenant, 4/; Cornet, 2/6; Corporal, Quartermaster, or Trumpeter, 1/6; Trooper, 1/; for the horses of officers and troopers, five sheaves of straw or one stone of hay, and three gallons of oats, at a total cost of 10 pence.

INFANTRY

Lt.-Colonel, 5/; Major, 4/; Captain, 8/; Licutenant, 2/; Quartermaster, 2/; Ensign, 1/6; Sergeant, 1/; Corporal and Drummer, 8 pence; Private, 6 pence.

DRAGOONS

Lt.-Colonel, 6/; Major, 5/; Captain, 4/; Licutenant, 3/; Ensign, 2/6; Sergeant, 1/4; Corporal and Drummer, 10 pence; Private, 8 pence, with an extra allowance of sevenpence for his horse.¹

The billeting rates allowed to the officers appear to have been adhered to fairly closely in Humbie's accounts. But the infantry rank and file do not seem ever to have drawn more than fourpence a day, making with their pay a total of eightpence a day, or £1 sterling a month. The same scale (8d. a day) obtained in the English New

Model, and was only a penny more than the daily wage of an English agricultural labourer.¹ Still, Bowles declared in answer to Buchanan's Truth Its Manifest, 'though the [Scottish] foote souldier doth not abound, for he is kept to his foure pence a day in provision, yet the officers and horsemen have not felt any want this long time, as appeares by their very liberall expences in clothes, and drinkings, which every Market-Towne neare their Quarters can witness.' 2

Provided officers and men were in regular receipt of their pay and billet money, the system of billeting caused no complications between the army and the inhabitants of the countryside, or between the Commissary General and the English treasury; the army paid its way as it marched. But if money was not forthcoming-and the accounts in these volumes show large blanks in the regimental payments-the army was compelled to resort to what were termed 'free quarters': in other words, pavment was deferred, if indeed it was ever made at all. In such cases it was customary to deduct something from the pay of all ranks, as a set-off to the unpaid-for food consumed by them in quarters, for which eventually the Commissary was responsible. The regimental accounts show that the rank and file frequently were reduced both in pay and billet money to the half of what was legally due to them, namely, to twopence for pay and twopence for allowance.

On the Staff, Leven was allowed £24 sterling for his weekly maintenance, and his quartermaster received £20 sterling.

An idea of the relation between the cost of provisions and the soldier's pay is gained from the following tariff extracted from Humbie's accounts:—

Leslie had learnt from Gustavus Adolphus the scientific Artillery, use of artillery, and had the help of Sir Alexander Hamilton, 'Dear Sandy,' his contemporaries called him, whose experience had been gained in the service of Sweden. In 1630 Robert Monro mentions him at Orebro 'employed in making of Cannon and fireworkes.' He appears to have been among the first to follow Leslie to Scotland, 'vpone hope,' Spalding expresses it, 'of bloodie war,'

and set about building 'Cannon and fireworkes' in the Potter Row at Edinburgh.² To him was due the army's

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artillery strength in the campaign of 1639, when Leslie's camp at Duns was protected by nearly forty cannon 'great and small.' 1 For the campaign of 1640 he was still better equipped. Sir John Convers informed Lord Conway at Newcastle within a few hours of Leslie's crossing the Tweed, that his train consisted of ten half-culvering, six drakes, and nearly thirty of 'Sandy Hamilton's little guns.' A few days later he reported: 'They have 11 pieces of cannon, 54 field-pieces, little drakes, and 80 frams.' 2 Hamilton's light guns, according to Burnet, were 'of white iron tinned and done about [i.e. covered] with leather; and were carried by horses.3 At Newburn, the single opportunity Leslie obtained for employing his train, some of them were placed upon Newburn Church.4 their position and the rapidity of their fire causing so much alarm that Sir Thomas Fairfax, commander of the New Model five years later, 'did not stick to own that till he pass'd the Tees his legs trembled under him,' 5 In August 1641, when Charles reviewed the army at Newcastle, its train numbered about sixty guns, which, 'as the King passed along, gave such true fyre as it is believed since the inevention of gunnes never better was seene or heard: they discharged wondrous swift, but with as good a method and order as your skilfullest Ringers observe with Bels, not suffering the noyse of the one to drowne the other.' 6 The heavier guns were carried in 'great close waggons bigger than horse litters,' the guncarriage wheels being pushed along by men detailed for the duty.7

For the campaign of 1644 the army was equipped with a particularly powerful artillery train. The principal towns of the North of England were in the hands of the Royalists, and their reduction was looked for at Scotland's hands. Excepting the skirmishes at Boldon and Hilton and the battle of Marston Moor, her army's principal activities were a succession of sieges—York, Neweastle, Carlisle, Hereford, Newark. Demi-culverins (nine pounders) had been Leven's heaviest guns in 1640.¹ In 1644 his ordnance ranged from three to twenty-four pounders.² The heavy 'murthering pieces' were sent by sea to Blythe, and the difficulty of transporting them hampered Leven's movements in the campaign.³

Sir Alexander Hamilton's ingenuity had devised an effective and mobile weapon. Presumably it was an improvement upon the guns of the 1640 pattern, possessing the same quality of lightness and mobility, but of greater range and calibre. It varied from three-quarters of a yard to a yard in length, and was so light that a single horse could carry it.

Leven's artillery equipment in 1644-47 is detailed in the unique artillery accounts here printed.

He carried :-

- 8 brass demicannons, or 24 lb.-ers, heavy siege guns, which required a team of ten or twelve horses to draw them.
- 1 brass culverin, or 16 lb.-er, firing about ten shots an hour, at an extreme range of about 2100 paces, and requiring eight horses for its transport.
- 3 brass quarter-cannons, 12 lb,-er field pieces.
- 6 iron demiculverins, 9-12 lb.-ers, having a range of from 320-380 paces point blank.
- 48 brass field pieces, or demiculverins, 9-12 lb.-ers.
- 3 iron field pieces of the same calibre.

8 petards.

88 frames, which, presumably, were the light guns of Sir Alexander Hamilton's invention.¹

Of these weapons all but eleven brass fieldpieces and two petards accompanied the army into England in January-February 1644, a large total which confirms the estimate of a contemporary pamphlet in January 1644, giving Leven 120 guns.²

Humbie's accounts enumerate the materials brought from Scotland for the artillery train: 45,000 lbs. of powder, 44,200 lbs. of match, 4000 rounds of musket balls, 3080 'new and fixt' muskets, 3300 pairs of bandoliers for carrying the musketeers' charges of powder, 1498 whole pikes, 120 half pikes, 800 lances, 10,600 Swedish feathers, 8640 swords in four chests, 2937 spades, 1209 mattocks, 1268 horse shoes, 58 axes, 328 24 lb. ball, 170 18 lb. ball, 336 12 lb. ball, 360 9 lb. ball, 121 ball above 24 lbs., 120 7, 8, or 9 lb. ball, 1476 3 lb. ball, 20 wheel barrows, 23 musket rests, 20 baskets, 31 spare axle trees, 48 handspikes, rammers, sponges, tarred and white tows, 5 stone of nails, 240 luntstanes or portfires, flax, wax, sheep skins for the ramrods, 48 quires of Lombard paper for the cartridges, and other materials.

Powerful as Leven's artillery-train was, little is recorded of its actions in the campaigns of 1644, 1645 and 1646. In the operations at Boldon in March 1644 it played little part.⁴ At Hilton on 24th March 1644 it was in action: 'Our cannon,' says a despatch from the army, ⁵ 'were at

Sunderland our head quarter, but by the help of the Sea-men lying in the haven, we conveyed one great peece over the water [Wear], who themselves drew itt up to the field where it was to be planted; the tide failed for carrying the rest at that time. Some small field peeces wee had. After the Armies had faced each other most part of that day, toward five aclock the Cannon began to play, which they bestowed freely though to little purpose.'

During the siege of York, in the following June, mining operations rather than artillery were relied on to effect breaches. Leven, however, raised a battery about a hundred and sixty yards from Skelders Gate postern on the south-west of the city.1 At Marston Moor the artillery, probably Manchester's, fired four shots upon Rupert's right wing as it was being drawn up, and thereupon, writes Sir Henry Slingsby, 'in Marston cornfields [they] fall to singing psalms.' 2 About six o'clock in the afternoon, the batteries were advanced 'for our best advantage,' writes Simeon Ash, Manchester's chaplain,3 Fairfax's infantry in their first advance 4 captured a demi-culverin and two drakes, and a charge of Cromwell's cavalry forced Rupert's right to abandon guns and ammunition.5 Probably the Scottish artillery was in the centre. Humbie's accounts show that one fieldpiece was lost.

Throughout the siege of Newcastle, from July to October 1644, the Scottish artillery persistently bombarded the town, though not with great effect. Callendar, upon his arrival in July, erected five batteries opposite the town upon the south bank of the Tyne, whose 'frequent

shooting of Pot-pieces and other fireworkes of great importance . . . daily annoved the Inhabitants.' 1

Upon Leven's arrival in August, batteries were placed upon every commanding eminence, 'Our pioners,' says a letter from the army, 'are as busic at worke under ground as our Canons are playing above it. The endeayours on both sides are indefatigable, and in the thick clouds of smoke the thunder of the Canon perpetually disputing,' 2 In September two hundred rounds of 24 lb., 12 lb., and 9 lb. ball, and two hundred barrels of powder were despatched by the Committee at London to replenish the Scottish magazines,3 and on the 23rd, when the newly elected Mayor of Newcastle was proceeding through the streets, a 'thundering shot,' Wishart calls it, nearly destroyed the city fathers.4 At the final assault, upon 19th October, the batteries succeeded in making three breaches in the walls.5 Neither at Hereford nor at Newark did circumstances permit the success against Newcastle to be repeated. To the siege of Carlisle Leven's army contributed three guns, Bowles states. He adds that two of them were captured by the beleaguered garrison during a sortie.6 From the conclusion of the siege of Newark until the end of the war, the guns of the army had no occasion for service.7

Uniform and Equipment.

Professor Firth has shown that in 1644 the English armies. Royalist and Roundhead, were uniformed, and that from the formation of the New Model in 1645 the

words 'redcoat' and 'soldier' were synonymous.\! There is no evidence that permits a similar conclusion in regard to the armies of Scotland. The Act of 18th August 1643, which prescribed the weapons of every branch, only required that troopers should wear 'jackes or secreites' and steel caps or bonnets. The troopers who rode with Leslie and Montrose to Aberdeen in March 1639 wore 'buffill coatis' or 'jacks,' a close-fitting body garment with short sleeves, laced tightly across the chest.\!^2 No reference is made to the uniform of the infantry in the Act, nor do the instructions issued to the Committees of War indicate that the provision of one was within their province.

The distinguishing characteristic of the armies that faced the king in 1639 and 1640 was a blue ribbon or cap. 'It is to be nottit,' writes Spalding,3' that few or none of this haill army wantit ane blew ribbin hung about his crag doun wnder his left arme, quhilk they call it the covenanter's ribbin, becaus the Lord Gordon and sum vtheris of the Marques barnes and famelie had ane ribbin . . . of ane reid flesche cullour, which they weir in thair hattis, and callit it the royal ribbin.' In 1640, Patrick Gordon, speaking of the Scottish army in England, calls it collectively 'the blew ribbons and blew cappes.' ⁴ The device was not adopted in the campaign of 1644.

Humbie's accounts, unfortunately, throw no light upon the question of uniform. His entries record periodical purchases and distribution of cloth, shoes, and boots. In July 1644, £6000 sterling was expended upon 26,4184 yards of 'Yorksyr cloth, being of broad cloath,' and 19,455½ yards of 'Kersayis.' A further £7661 sterling was spent at the same time upon 54 'packs of cloth'

and 28 'fardills.' In August 1644 two sums of £1250 sterling and £609, 12s, 4d, sterling were expended upon 15,000 pairs of shoes. In November 1644 another £8000 sterling were spent upon cloth, and a little later £7,661 15s. 7d. sterling upon 'cloth and lining.' In 1645 there are similar entries. In 1646 40,000 vards of cloth were bought for £2000 sterling, and a further sum of £761-7 sterling was spent chiefly on shoes, boots, and clothes. The cloth was distributed among the regiments. If the English practice was followed, as probably was the case,1 the men paid for the cloth supplied to them by deduction from their wages, a fact which would explain the diminished rate of pay which the accounts so frequently reveal. In February 1645 Colonel William Stewart's regiment received 3/4 a head 'in full contentatione' for 'half-vards' of cloth which they 'wanted,' an entry which may be otherwise interpreted, but suggests that pay had been stopped for material not supplied. In 1640, certainly, gray was the colour of the cloth worn by the army. In the autumn of that year, Spalding writes,2 the Committee 'took exact tryell what gray claith . . . the marchandis had,' and despatched to the army 20,000 suits and socks.

Regarding the officers, a tailor's account delivered to Captain Keith, of the Mearns and Aberdeen Regiment, on 27th May 1644, throws some light upon the uniform worn by them: ³

The Spanish cloth, presumably, was used for the breeches and was of grey or buff colour. The scarlet cloth, satin material, and buttons made up a skirted red coat with white facings. The demibeaver was the new style of lowcrowned, broad-brimmed beaver or felt hat, familiar in Restoration pictures, a reaction from the steeple hats of the earlier part of the century.

Like other armies of the period, the infantry were armed with muskets and swords, or pikes and swords, Spalding, in 1639,1 speaks of 'the pikmen in thair rankis [with] pik and suord; the muskiteiris in thair rankis with muscat staffrestl, bandileir, suord, pulder, ball and matche.' Every regiment contained musketeers and pikemen in varying proportions. Earlier in the seventeenth century, both in English and Continental armies, pikemen were to musketeers in the proportion of 2 to 1. In the second decade of the century the proportion was 1 to 1. During the war of 1644-47 the muskets outnumbered the pikes by 2 to 1, a fact which was due to the greater lightness and efficiency of the musket as

the century proceeded.¹ In the Scottish army, in 1644, the proportion of muskets to pikes was as 3 to 2.² At the muster of Tullibardine's Perthshire Regiment in January 1646 there were present 68 ranks of musketeers and 49 ranks of pikemen; or, in individual units, 272 musketeers to 198 pikemen, four men forming a 'rank' or file. In an account of the assault upon the South Shields fort in March 1644, the use of the various arms in open attack is distinguished: '140 of our souldiers without any other Armes but their swords... gave the first assault, then a party of Musquetiers, and after them a party of Pikes, all marching up till they entred the ditch, where they disputed the matter above an houre.' §

The Act of 18th August 1643 enjoins those unprovided with pike, musket, or sword, to present themselves with halberds (long-handled battle-axes or bills), Lochaber axes, or Jedburgh staves. It was observed in 1640 that the Scottish infantrymen wore 'not so much as a gorget or corslet.'

The Highland troops with the army in 1644 were armed with bow and arrows and sword. An account of them in 1641 describes their equipment and appearance: 'In the first place stood Highlanders, commonly called Redshankes, with their plaides cast ouer their shoulders, hauing euery one his bowe and arrowes with a broad slycing sword by his syde; these are so good markesmen that they will kill a deere in his speed, it being the cheifest part of their liuing, selling the skinns by great quantities and feeding on the flesh.'5 Their bare limbs caused astonishment to English beholders.6

The regular equipment of the cavalry elsewhere than in Scotland consisted of pistols and broadswords. A buff or 'buffill' coat was worn under or instead of the light cuirass or 'back and breast,' which had superseded the body armour of the sixteenth century. The head was protected by a light metal helmet, known to the English trooper as a 'pot,' and referred to in the Scottish Act of 18th August 1643 as a 'steel cap.' 1 The Scottish cavalry clung to equipment elsewhere discarded. Spalding says that every trooper in 1639 carried 'fyve schot at the least, quhairof he had ane carrabin in his hand, tuo pistollis be his sydis, and uther tua at his sadill torr.' 2 Lances also were carried. 'Whether ye have pistells or not, let as many lances . . . as may be had be brought out,' the Committee of Estates enjoined in 1639.3 In 1640 the Scottish cavalry is described as armed with lances or pike-staves, swords, pistols, and a few petronels or large horse-pistols.4 At Boldon, in March 1644, mounted lancers pursued the Royalist retreat.5 At Marston Moor a squadron of Leven's regiment 'charged a regiment of the enemies foot, and put them wholly to the rout,' 6 At Dunbar, in 1650, two troops of lancers contested Cromwell's effort to cross the Brocksburn.7 Against the Irish also the lance proved itself a most effective weapon. But both it and the carbine were foreign to the equipment of the English New Model, and had fallen into general disuse throughout Europe.8 In England the carbine became the distinctive weapon of the mounted infantry or dragoons.

Religion in the Army.

To the subject of religion and Kirk discipline, as might be expected, the Articles and Ordinances of Warre (1644) pay particular attention. Article I. ordered the formation of a Kirk Session in every regiment, constituted 'as useth to be done in every Parish in the time of Peace.' To ensure 'uniformitie thorowout the whole Army in all matters Ecclesiasticall,' the institution of 'a generall Eldership, or common Ecclesiastick Judicatory,' was also enjoined, consisting of all the ministers and one elder from every regiment, the Court having appellate jurisdiction over the 'particular Sessions or Elderships,' and being itself subordinate to the General Assembly. To the regimental Kirk Session the care of the sick was remitted. Morning and evening prayers (Article III.) and Sunday morning and afternoon sermons, to which the camp was summoned by sound of trumpet or drum. were occasions which might not be neglected, under penalty of censure by the eldership and punishment by imprisonment or otherwise, as the fault deserved. After the summons by drum or trumpet 'no Market, nor selling of Commodities whatsoever' was permitted until prayers or preaching were ended, under penalty of forfeiture of the goods sold and the imprisonment of the offenders. 'Common and ordinary swearing and cursing' (Article IV.), 'open prophaning of the Lord's Day, wronging of his Ministers, and other Acts of that kind,' were punishable by loss of pay and imprisonment, with the further obligation upon the offender to make 'publike repentance in the midst of the Congregation' of the regiment. 'If they will not be reclaimed,' the Article enjoins sternly, 'they shall with disgrace be openly casseered and discharged, as unworthy of the meanest place in the Army.'

In the same spirit officers are enjoined (Article VI.) to procure, 'by their authority and example,' that their

men 'live in godlinesse, sobernesse, and righteousnesse.'
Officers themselves, if they are 'common swearers, cursers,
drunkards, or any of them at any time shall come drunke
to his Guard,' or 'by quarrelling, or any other way shall
commit any notable disorder,' are liable to be dismissed
the service, with such further sentence as a court martial
may determine.

Article VIII. exhibits a determination to repress the passions incidental to war: 'Murther is no lesse unlawfull and intollerable in the time of War then in the time of Peace,' and is punishable with death. Any man, officer or private, guilty of rape, 'shall die for it without mercy.' Adultery and fornication are punishable 'no lesse severely then in the time of Peace.' Married prostitutes attending the army 'shall be put to death without mercy.' Single women of that class 'shall be first married by the hangman, and thereafter by him scourged out of the Army.' Thieves and robbers are dealt with summarily: 'If any shall spoile or take any part of their goods that die in the Army, or are killed in service, he shall restore the double, and be further punished at discretion,' Soldiers are enjoined to 'live together as friends and brethren, abstaining from words of disgrace, contempt, reproach, giving of lies, and all provocation by word or gesture.' Imprisonment follows the first fault: an incorrigible offender 'shall be with shame punished, and put out of the Army.'

Writing in April 1644, Robert Baillie deplores the lack of ministers in the army.\(^1\) Undoubtedly there was less enthusiasm among the clergy than during the Bishops' Wars, when Leslie's camp was thronged by them. But the accounts here printed do not lend support to Baillie's assertion that in the campaigns of 1644-46 they were

indifferent. In only three of Leven's regiments are the chaplains' names unknown, and though the minister was a visitor rather than a permanent member of the regimental staff, Humbie's accounts prove, and conclusively, that the army was not so completely without ecclesiastical guidance as Baillie suggests.

Upon the invitation of the Commissioners of the Kirk. the Estates, on 7th July 1644, instructed their Committee to take into consideration the provision of an 'allowance to ministeres sent to the Armie in England And for advance of some proportione thereof for ther bettir outreiking,' 1 Humbie's accounts reveal the Committee's conclusion. The regular sum provided to ministers for their 'outrik to the army 'was £5 sterling. The standard rate of pay was £7 10s. sterling per mensem, and the accounts convey an impression-it is no more than an impression—that the period of service was normally three months. The large majority of entries are monthly or half-monthly payments to chaplains at the £7, 10s. rate. There also are a number of entries of £11, 5s. sterling 'in full of his 3 moneths attendance.' In one case the amount is £12, 2s. 6d., and in another £3, 15s. There is no case of £22, 10s, sterling, the amount at the standard rate, being paid for three months' service. The varying rate perhaps is explained on the assumption that it differed according to the distance traversed by the minister between his parish and the army.

Chaplains were also attached to the Staff. Their rate of pay was £10 sterling per mensem, and their period of service varied. Robert Douglas, 'minister to the Generall and Staffe,' received £30 sterling 'for 3 moneths attendance on the army,' 2 and a further £27, 15s. 6‡d. sterling.

'for defraying his charges to the army at Hereford.' Frederick Carmichael received £50 sterling for five months' attendance; Robert Kerr £30 sterling for three months; John Moncreiff £40 for four months. In 1646 the Staff Chaplains were Patrick Gillespie, James Guthrie, Mungo Law, John Cruickshank, James Simpson, Robert Douglas, Andrew Cant, Robert Blair, Robert Bennett. The Army's accessibility at Newcastle, Charles's presence there, and the hope of converting him, invited the leaders of the Kirk.'

The following entries in the accounts relate to the Army's residence at Newcastle in 1646: 2—

Paid £ 3 10 0 ' for clothis to the comunion tables.'

" £ 1 16 4 for raparing of the comunion tables and washing the table clothis."

,, £ 6 8 0 for 48 gallons of clarett wyne for the use of the comunion tables.'

,, £ 0 6 0 'for bread for the comunion tables.'

,, £11 19 4 'for elements to the comunion.'

,, £ 4 5 0 for 3 quarters of a hundred dealls and 6 double tries for making the comunion tables at Newcastle.'

The general spirit inculcated in the Army is suggested by Article X. of the Articles and Ordinances: 'No man on his march, or at his lodging, within or without the Countrey, upon whatsoever pretext, shall take by violence, either horse, cattell, goods, money, or any other thing lesse or more. . . . If any man shall presume to pull downe or set on fire any dwelling house, though a Cottage, or hew downe any Fruit-trees; or to waste or deface any part of the beauty of the Countrey, he shall be punished most severely, according to the importance of the fault.'

Humbie's accounts are not singular in their omission $\tau_{he~Sick}$ to elucidate the army's medical organisation. Article I.

of the Articles and Ordinances of Warre briefly enjoins that the sick shall be 'cared for in every Regiment by the particular Eldership or Kirk-Session 'appointed to control its ecclesiastical discipline. A single Act of the Estates on the subject, dated 27th January 1644, appoints David Kennedy, James Kerr, Thomas Kincaid, and Nehemiah Tough to act as chirurgeons in the army, each of them taking charge of two regiments 'joyned in one Brigad.' 1 In every case a sum of £15 sterling was provided to furnish the doctor's medical 'kist' and two 'mates' were allowed him. Besides their pay, daily sums of five shillings and two shillings were allotted to doctor and mate respectively for billet money, with a further allowance for saddle and baggage horses. The sum of £15 (£180 Scots) was the normal amount allotted to furnishing the medical kist or 'chest of droggs': it occurs several times in the accounts.2 In the leaner year, 1646, it appears to have been reduced to £10.

Surgeons were shared between at least two regiments: in 1644 Walter Rose was attached to the Clydesdale and East Lothian Regiments; John Buchanan (1645) to the Ministers' and Stirlingshire; Nehemiah Tough (1645-46) to the Mearns and Aberdeen and Tweeddale. Their pay was at the rate of £11, 17s. 6d. sterling per mensem, or, roughly, eight shillings a day, a sum which was in excess of English rates in the period. A physician, surgeon, and apothecary also were attached to the Staff. The Staff surgeon received £34 sterling per mensem, with a billeting allowance of £12 sterling per mensem; the staff physician £30 sterling per mensem, and the staff apothecary £21, 15s. per mensem. Special payments appear to have been

made for particular services: William Metcalfe received £2 in February 1646 'for curinge of severiall hurt people of severall regiments left at Newcastle.' Frequent entries occur of small payments made to lame and sick soldiers, and of money expended on their billets. Their mainteance allowance in sick quarters was 4d, a day. In addition to the three Staff doctors. William Anderson was attached to the Staff as 'Quartermaster to the sicke of the army,' and drew a meagre £43, 6s, sterling between 23rd November 1644 and 5th July 1645. Otherwise the accounts reveal nothing regarding the organisation of the medical service of the Army of the Solemn League and Covenant. The official record of the contemporary English New Model is hardly less bare.

An Act of 5th February 1647 ordered a general dis-The 'new modelled banding of the regiments on foot in England and Scotland, forces, 1647. the infantry on 9th February 1647, and the cavalry on the following day (10th February).1 The 'new modelled forces' which it was proposed to keep on foot, in accordance with an Order of the Estates on 29th January 1647.2 consisted of the following establishment :-

Infantry: 7 Regiments=6000 men, Cavalry: 15 unregimented troops=1200 men, Dragoons: 2 Companies=200 men,

a total of 7400 rank and file. Leven was appointed Lord General, David Leslie Lieut,-General, and John Middleton Major-General. The 'new model' regiments were formed as follows .-

Infantry: Of the seven regiments, 2 Highland and 1 Lowland regiments were to be formed exclusively from units in Scotland. The remaining four regiments (all of six companies and 800 rank and file) were to be formed

of drafts from regiments returning from England, from all of which a captain, lieutenant, and ensign were to be taken, along with such a proportion of their rank and file as the General and Committee should appoint.¹

Cavalry: The 1200 troopers were to be drawn, as to 560 from Scottish units, as to 460 from regiments returning from England.

Dragoons: The two companies, each 100 strong, were to be taken entirely from units in Scotland.

The 'new modelled' army of 1647, under commanders named in the Act of 29th January 1647, was thus constituted:—

ARTICLES AND ORDINANCES OF WAR, ETC.

THAT no man pretend ignorance, and that everie one may The publishknow the dutie of his place, that he may do it; The Articles and Articles and and Ordinances following, are to be published at the Ordinances of generall Rendezvous in everie Regiment apart, by the Majors of the severall Regiments, and in the presence of all the Officers. The same shall afterward be openly read to every Company of Horse and Foot, and at such times as shall be thought most convenient by the Lord Generall: and in like manner shall be made knowne to so many as joyne themselves to be professed Souldiers in the Army. For this end, everie Colonell and Captaine shall provide one of those Books, that hee may have it in readinesse at all occasions, and every Souldier shall solemnly sweare this following Oath:

I, N. N., promise and sweare to be true and faithfull in The Souldiers this Service, according to the heads sworn by me in the Solemne League and Covenant of the three Kingdomes: To honour and obey my Lord Generall, and all my superiour Officers and Commandrs, and by all meanes to hinder their dishonour and hurt: To observe carefully all the Articles

of War and Camp-Discipline: never to leave the defence of this Cause, nor flee from my Colours so long as I can follow them: To be ready to watching, warding, and working, so farre as I have strength: To endure and suffer all distresses, and to fight manfully to the uttermost, as I shall answer to God, and as God shall help me.

Kirk Discipline shall be exercised, and the sick cared for Kirk in every Regiment, by the particular Eldership, or Kirk-Discipline

Session to be appointed, even as useth to be done in every Parish in the time of Peace: And that there may be an uniformitic thorowout the whole Army in all matters Ecclesiasticall, there shall be a generall Eldership, or common Ecclesiastick Judicatory, made up of all the Ministers of the Camp, and of one Elder direct from every particular Regiment, who shall also judge of Appellations made unto them from the particular Sessions or Elderships.

TT

ouncels of ar. For deciding of all questions, debates and quarrellings that shall arise betwixt Captains and their Souldiers, or any others of the Army, and for the better observing of Camp-Discipline, two Courts of justice, the one higher, and the other lower, are appoynted, wherein all Judges are sworne to do justice equally: The higher also to judge of Appellations to be made from the lower Court. And if any man shall by word or gesture shew his contempt or mis-regard, or shall fall out in boasting or braving, while Courts are sitting, hee shall be punished by death. And both these Judicatories, as well of the Kirk matters, as of War, shall be subject to the Generall Assembly, and Committee of Estates respective.

III

Duties to God.

Whosoever shall wilfully or carelesly absent himselfe from morning and evening Prayers, or from preaching before and after-noon on the Lords Day, or other extra-ordinarie times appoynted for the worship of God, when the signe is given by sound of Trumpet or Drum, hee shall be censured and punished for his neglect or contempt, by penaltie, imprisonment, or other punishment, as his fault descript.

After the warning given, there shall be no Market, nor selling of Commodities whatsoever, till the Prayers or Preaching be ended, upon the paine of forfeiting the things so sold, and of the imprisoning of the offenders.

Common and ordinary swearing and cursing, open prophaning of the Lords Day, wronging of his Ministers, and other Acts of that kind, shall not only be punished with losse of pay and imprisonmene [sic], but the Transgressors shall make their publike repentance in the midst of the Congregation, and if they will not be reelaimed, they shall with disgrace be openly easseered and discharged, as unworthy of the meanest place in the Army.

V

If any shall speak irreverently against the Kings Majestic Duttes to the & his authoritie, or shall presume to offer violence to his Country, Majesties Person, he shall be punished as a Traytor. Hee Generall. that shall speak evill of the Cause which wee defend, or of the Kingdomes, the Parliaments, Convention of Estates, or their Committees in the defence therof, or shall use any words to the dishonour of the Lord Generall, he shall be punished with death.

No man shall at his own hand, without warrant of the Committee, or of my Lord Generall, have, or keep intelligence with the enemy, by speech, letters, signes, or any other way, under the pain to be punished as a Traytour. No man shall give over any Strength, Magazin, Victuall, &e. Or make any such motion, but upon extremitie, under the same paine. No man shall give supply, or furnish money, victuall, or any commodities to the enemy, upon pain of death.

Whosoever shall be found to do violence against the Lord Generall, his Safe-guard, or Safe-conduct, shall dye for it.

Whosoever shall be found guiltie of carelesnesse and negligence in his service, although he be free of treachery and double-dealing, shall beare his owne punishment.

VI

All Commanders and Officers shall be carefull, both by Dulies of their authority and example, that all under their charge, Superiours.

live in godlinesse, sobernesse, and righteousnesse: And if they themselves shall be common swearers, cursers, drunkards, or any of them at any time shall come drunke to his Guard, or by guarrelling, or any other way shall commit any notable disorder in this quarter, losse of place shall be his punishment: And further, according to the sentence of the Court of War.

The Captaines that shall be negligent in training their Companies, or that shall be found to withhold from their souldiers any part of their pay, shall be discharged of their place, and further eensured by the Court of War.

No Commander or Officer shall conceale dangerous and discontented humours, inclined to mutinies, or grudging at the orders given them, but shall make them knowne to the prime Leaders of the Army, upon the paine to be accounted guilty of mutiny.

No Commander or Officer shall authorize, or wittingly permit any Souldier to goe forth to a singular combate, under paine of death: But on the contrary, all Officers shall be carefull by all meanes to part quarrellings amongst Souldiers, although they be of other Regiments or Companies, and shall have power to command them to prison, which if the Souldiers shall disobey or resist by using any weapon, they shall die for it.

No Captaine shall presume at his owne hand, without warrant of the Lord Generall, to casseer or give a Passe to any enrolled Souldier or Officer, who hath appeared at the place of the generall Rendezvous, nor shall any Commander, Officer, or Souldier depart without a Passe, or stave behind the time appointed him in his Passe: and whosoever transgresseth the one way or the other, shall be punished at the discretion of the Court of War.

VII

Duties of Souldiers.

All Souldiers shall remember that it is their part to honour and obey their Commanders, and therefore shall receive their commands with reverence, and shall make no noise, but be silent, when the Officers are commanded, or giving their directions, that they may be heard by all, and the better obeyed: he that faileth against this, shall be imprisoned.

No Souldier shall leave his Captaine, nor servant forsake his Master, whether he abide in the Army or not, but upon

licence granted, and in an orderly way.

Whoseever shall presume to discredit any of the great Officers of the Army, by Writ, Word, or any other way, and be not able to make it good; & whoseever shall lift his weapon against any of them; shall be punished by death; and whoseever shall lift his hand against any of them, shall lose his hand.

No Souldier, nor inferiour Officer, shall quarrel with, or offer any injury to his superiour, nor refuse any duty commanded him, upon paine of casseering, and to be further censured by the Court of War. And if any shall presume to strike his Superiour, he shall be punished with death. But if it shall happen, that any Officer shall command any thing to the evident and knowne prejudice of the publicke, then shall he who is commanded, modestly refuse to obey, and presently give notice thereof to the Lord Generall.

If any man shall use any words or wayes, tending to mutiny or sedition, whether for demanding his pay, or upon any other cause; or if any man shall be privy to such mutinous speeches or wayes, & shall conceal them, both shall be punished with death.

All must shew their valour against the Enemy, and not by revenging their private injuries, which upon their complaints to their superiour Officers, shall be repaired to the full. And if any man presume to take his owne satisfaction, or challenge a combate, he shall be imprisoned, and have his punishment decerned by the Marshall Court.

The Provost-Marshall must not be resisted or hindered, in apprehending or putting Delinquents in prison, and all Officers must assist him to this end; and if any man shall resist or breake prison, he shall be censured by the Court of War.

VIII

Duties to others.

Murther is no lesse unlawfull and intollerable in the time of War, then in the time of Peace, & is to be punished with death.

Whosoever shall be found to have forced any woman, whether he be Commander or Souldier, shall die for it without mercy. And whosoever shall be found guilty of adultery or fornication, shall be no lesse severely censured and punished then in the time of Peace.

If any common whores shall be found following the Army, if they be married women, and run away from their husbands, they shall be put to death without mercy; and if they be unmarried, they shall be first married by the hangman, and thereafter by him scourged out of the Army.

Theeves and Robbers shall be punished with the like severity. If any shall spoile or take any part of their goods that die in the Army, or are killed in service, he shall restore the double, and be further punished at discretion. It is provided, that all their goods be forth-comming, and be disposed of according to their Testament and Will, declared by word or writ before witnesses; or if they have made no Testament, to rheir [sie] Wives, Children, or nearest Kindred, according to the Lawes of the Kingdome.

All shall live together as friends and brethren, abstaining from words of disgrace, contempt, reproach, giving of lies, and all provocation by word or gesture: He that faileth, shall be imprisoned for the first fault; and if he be incorrigible, he shall be with shame punished, and put out of

the Army.

IX

Concerning Armes. All Souldiers shall come to their Colours, to watch, to be exercised, or to muster, with their owne Armes: And if any Souldier shall come with another mans Armes, he shall be punished with rigour, and the lender shall lose his Armes. All shall come also with compleate and tight Armes in a decent manner, otherwise to be severely punished.

If any man shall sell or give in pawne his horse, his Armes, or any part of the Ammunition committed to him: or any Instruments: as Spades, Shovels, Pickes, used in the Field, he shall for the first and second time be beaten through the quarter, and for the third time be punished as for other theft: And he that buyeth them, or taketh them to pawne, be he Souldier or Vietualler, shall pay the double of the Money, beside the want of the things bought or impawned, and be further punished at discretion.

Whosoever in a debawched and lewd manner by Cards or Dice, or by sloath and unexcusable neglect, shall lose his Horse and Armes, in whole, or in part, to the hinderance of the service: And whosoever shall wilfully spoile, or breake his Armes, or any Instrument of War committed to him, by eutting downe of Trees, or any other way, he shall serve as a Pioner, till the losse be made up, and he furnished upon his owne charges.

X

No man on his march, or at his lodging, within or with- Concerning out the Countrey upon whatsoever pretext, shall take by marching. violence, either horse, cattell, goods, money, or any other thing lesse or more, but shall pay the usuall prices for his meat and drinke, or be furnished in an orderly way upon eount, at the sight of the Commissar, according to the order given by the Committee upon [sic] paine of death. without mercy.

If any man shall presume to pull downe, or set on fire any dwelling house, though a Cottage, or hew downe any Fruit-trees: or to waste or deface any part of the beauty of the Countrey, he shall be punished most severely, according to the importance of the fault.

In marching, no man shall stay behinde without leave: No man shall straggle from his Troop or Company: No man shall march out of his ranke, and put others out of

order, under all highest paine.

XI

Of musters.

If any Colonell of Horse or Foot shall keep backe his Souldiers from the appointed musters, or shall lend his Souldiers to make a false muster, upon triall in the Court Marshall, he shall be punished as a deceiver. And if any Muster-master shall use any false Rols, shall have any land in false Musters, or by connivence, or any other way be tryed to be accessary to them, he shall suffer the like punishment.

IIX

Victuallers.

No man shall presume to doe the smallest injury to any that bring necessaries to the Leager, whether by stealing from them, or deceiving them, or by violence in taking their Horse or goods, under the paine to be accounted and punished as enemies. No Victuallers shall sell rotten victuals, upon paine of imprisonment and confiscation, and further as they shall be judged to deserve.

No Souldier shall provide and sell Vietuals, unlesse he be authorized, nor shall any that selleth Vietuals, keep in his Tent or Hutte any Souldier at unseasonable houres, and forbidden times, under paine at discretion; Like as all the prices thereof shall be set downe by the generall Commisser, and be given to the Quarter-Master of the severall Regiments.

XIII

Duties in the Camp.

No man enrolled professing himselfe or pretending to be a Souldier, shall abide in the Army, unlesse hee enter in some Company, nor shall he that hath entred depart without licence, upon paine of death. No man having licence shall stay beyond the time appoynted him, upon paine of the losse of his pay during the time of his absence, and further punishment at discretion. If any man in a mutinous way, shew himselfe discontent with the quarter assigned him, hee shall be punished as a mutiner. And if any man shall stay out of his quarter, or go without shot

of Cannon being intrenched, but one night, without leave of his superiour Officer, he shall be casseered.

All that shall be absent from the watch after the signe is given for the setting thereof, shall be severely punished. Hee that revealeth, or falsifieth the watch-word given by the Officer, within the Trenches, or before the Colours: He that is taken sleeping, or drunk upon his watch: Hee that commeth off the watch before the time, every one of those shall bee punished with death.

Whosoever shall assemble themselves together for taking mutinous counsell, upon whatsoever pretext; they all, whether Officers or Souldiers, shall suffer death.

XIV

Every man when the Alarme is given, shall repaire Daties in speedly to his Colours; no man shall forsake or flee from Battell. his Colours.

No man in the Countrey shall reset them that flee.

No man in the battell shall throw away his Musket, Pike, or Bandilier, all under the paine of death.

Whatsoever Regiment of Horse or Foot, having charged the enemy, shall draw back or flee before they come to stroke of sword, shall answer for it before a Councell of war; and whosoever Officer or Souldier shall be found to bee in the default, they shall be punished by death or some shamefull punishment, as the Councell of war shall find their cowardise to deserve.

ΧV

If it shall come to passe, that the enemy shall force us Dutice after to battell, and the Lord shall give us victorie, none shall battell. Still a yeelding enemy, nor save him that still pursueth upon paine of death. Neither shall there be any ransoming of persones, spoyling, pillaging, parting of the prey, or wasting and burning by fire, or disbanding from their

order upon the same paine of death.

XVI

Rewards for the welldeserving. Every mans carriage shall be diligently observed, and he according to his merit rewarded or punished: And whatsoever Officer or Souldier shall take Commanders, or the Colours of the enemy, or in the siege of Townes shall first enter a breach, or scale the wals, and shall carry himselfe dutifully in his station, and doth his part valiantly, in skirmish or battell, shall after the laudable example of the wisest, and worthiest Kingdomes and Estates, have his honour and reward according to his worth and deserving, whether hereafter we have peace or war.

Matters that are cleare by the light and law of nature are presupposed: Things unnecessary, are past over in silence: and other things may be judged by the common customes and constitutions of war, or may upon new emergents, be expressed afterward.
