Concerning Pronunciation, and Spelling in General.

AS we have two ways of expressing our selves; to wit by word of Mouth and writing ; So there are two things required for that purpose, true *Pronunciation* and *Spelling* which are mainly requisite in *Speaking* and *Writing* a Language well. For what *Pronunciation* is to the Speaker, the same is *Spelling* to the Writer.

True *Pronunciation* is nothing else but giving to each Syllable, by one Motion of the Tongue, a sound agreeable to the Genius of the Language : There are four sorts chiefly of *Pronunciation*, viz. *National*, *Provincial*, *Grave* and *Familiar*.

National is the most universal, and as a standard to the Nation. *Provincial* recedes somewhat from the general use, and is particular to some Counties, which are remote from the Court Metropolis or Center of the Nation.

Grave is properly used in Grave and serious Discourses, and comes nearest the regular way of, *Spelling*.

Familiar is used in common Discourses by the vulgar, who generally speak swift or slow, and so are apt to start aside from the regular way, by giving those sounds to vowels which are not altogether proper and agreeable : Seing the *Pronunciation* of the English is scarcely attainable by us without frequent converse with those who understand it well. I shal not set down any Rules or Directions for acquiring the same but come to treat a little about *Spelling*.

True *SPELLING*, otherways called *Orthography*, is nothing else but an Image of the *Pronunciation* and consists in expres-

every Motion of the voice, with a certain concurrency of letters, such as is established by use. For since the way happily found out by the Invention of Letters, speak to the Eyes, as well as to the Ears, all Nations, have a share in this so beneficial and usefull a Discovery, & adopted the Letters of their Pronunciation, every one to their own way.

Though there have been many Attempts made to reform the English way of Spelling, and purge it from superfluous & excremental Letters, yet there has been but little progress in it, however these following Observations may be useful to young Beginners.

Obs. 1. That *i e* in the end of a Subst: in the singular number is torn out of use, and is reduced to *y*, but in the plural we add an *e* to *e* as *liberty, liberties*, and so in these few words, *easy, reply*. &c.

Obs. 2. That the final *e* is now expunged from a multitude of words, where it was superfluous: as; *goe owe, cilde, blindnesse*.

Obs. 3. That we now spell with a single consonant in the end of a word, as *war, hot, big*, &c.

Obs. 4. That these words of old, *Summe, brutish, monethly, honey, burthen, murther, fathom, Spight*, are now spelled, *Sum, brutish, month, money, hony, burden, murder, fadom*.

Obs. 5. That these words are spelled eitherwise, *courteson, cousin, dozen, douzen, onely, only, Something, somewhat, fomwhat. Sutt, sute: example, exemple. Straight, strait, munday: monday. college, colledge, cattel, cattle: battel, battle. show, rend: rent: indict, indite, gray, grey. penny, peny: gard, garden, though tho. compleat, complete. extream, extreme; supream, supreme. smoak, smoke: cloak, cloke.*

Obs. 6. That some words are indifferently spelt with *y*, or *u* or *u* or *w*, as, *perswade, baud, law, venous*: with *s* or *z* as *prise, brasier, cisars*, with *em* or *im*, as, *viden, employment*. with *en*, or *in*, as *encrease, enqui y*. with *o*: as *author, sollicitour*, &c.

Obs. 7. *Cum grano salis*, that English words derived from the Latine may be best spelt, as the Latine, if the sound can any way be kept of the same as *antient empire*, &c.

Obs. 8. Some few words are Syllabicated one way in the

singular number, and another way in the plural, as *life, lives, himself, themselves, knife, knives, thief, thieves, &c.*

A Discourse concerning the English Tongue.

SEING, by our frequent and advantagious converse and traffick with our neighbouring Nation, we now generally use the *English* Tongue, I thought it fit to speak something concerning the ORIGINAL and EXCELLENCY thereof according to one of their own Writers.

The ORIGINAL of the English Nation and Language fetched from the *Saxons*, a people of the *Lower-Germany*, who having invaded *Britan*, and forced the antient Natives of that part of the Island to retire beyond the *Severn* into *Wales*, and divided the same into seven Kingdoms, called the *Saxons Heptarchy*. Which at last was reduced into a Monarchical state by *Egbert*, King of the *West-Saxons*, by whom the whole united body (in a Parliament held at *Winchester* anno 819.) was named *Engellond*; since termed *England*, from whence the Nation Language came to be called *English*. Its thought that King *Egbert* gave it this name because he was descended from the *Angles*, an antient People, which joyned with their Neighbour the *Saxons*, and went under their name in the conquest of *Britan*. They lived in that part of the *Cimbrian Chersonese*, which now goes by the name of the Dukedome of *Sleswick*; there being still a small Town called *Angolen*, which preserves the Memory to this Day. The English Tongue hath been extraordinarily improv'd by the continual Accession of other Languages, especially the *Latine* and *French*: The first brought in by the learned part of the Nation, the other by the *Norman* conquest, as yet, and formerly by Courtiers and Travellers. The *Danes* by their long Conquest made little Alteration in the Language, because they used the *German* Dialect. By which we may understand that the English is a compound of *Saxon*, *Latine*, and *French*, The first because of its predominancy may be justly called the stock into which the other two are ingrafted. And this much to the Original of the English Nation and Tongue.

The EXCELLENCY of the Language consists in *Facility*, *Clarity*, *Significancy*, and *Sweetness*.

Its FACILITY is easily demonstrable, by its Exemption from

flexions, and the other Accidences of Words (making an y Concordance) which some call the *Emblems of Babels curse Confusion*. What Difficulty is in the French Pronouns, In- tives and Reciprocal Verbs is well known to all who learn

COPIOUSNESS needs not to be demonstrat, for besides Treasures of the antient *Dutch*, which the English retains in *Saxon* Monosyllables, the choicer wits of this Nation have hitherto the very quintessence of some forreign Language, which breeds Admiration in Strangers to see their own translated Words thrive better in the English than in their native Soil, and whereas the French is stinted and become barren through its exceeding nicety, the English on the contrary grows mighty copious; by its innate Liberty of making such compounds & derivatives, as are proper and futable to abridge Expression, (almost equalizing the *Greek* & even exceeding the *Greek* in this) which is one of the greatest beauties can be in a Language. Nor does it aboundancy ly here only, for there is Court and Country English, Northern and Southern Dialect, which differ not only in pronunciation, but also in Words & Terms, upon all which Accounts, its clear, that no vulgar Language can deliver a matter, with more variety, either plain- ly by *Synonima's*, or by Circumlocution with Metaphores.

The SIGNIFICANCY of the English most clearly appears in the matchless and incomparable pieces of Eloquence published of late; in which more sense cannot be seen in fewer words than in any other Language. What Poetry has more Majesty, & conveys a greater sense than the English, when it flows from a great Poet, as is evident by Mr. *Sandys* Translation of the *Æneid*, which might be thought done by peerless *Maro* himself. It is not the prose classics done to the life, and so far from losing any luster of the Original, that in many places, they seem to excel it. Has not the renowned Lord *Bacon* taught us to speak the terms of Art, in our own Language, a thing judged impossible till we saw it.

The surpassing SWEETNESS of the English appears, if compared with the *Italian*, swarming with vowels, and so passes away smoothly like a silent Water, though it be an excellent concely and pleasant Language, next with the *Dutch*, abounding with Consonants, by which it becomes harsh, tho' manly. With the truly delicate, but too affected *French*. 4ly. With the Majestical *Spanish*, but terrible and boisterous. Now

the *English* hath the advantage of the first two, by a happy mixture of vowels and consonants, in giving strength of Consonant to the Italian, and dissolving the stiffness of the Dutch, by addition of some soft vowels, Yea the English gives a full sound of Syllables to the *French*, and a variety of Terminations, with milder Accents to the Spanish, and all this by borrowing from each of them, what may contribute to SWEETNESS.

Now, these things being thus stated, in such a happy mixture how easily will one frame his Discourse Majestick, Pleasant, Delicate or manly, according to his Subject, seing in the English Language, Substance combines with delight, Plenty with Delicacy, Beauty with Majesty, and Expedition with Gravity. Of all which Advantages, inherent to the English, Forreigners are become so great Admirers, that they, as frequently, learn it as we do the French, and though formerly they slighted it, as an Insular speech, not worth their notice.

If any pretend to degrade the English, from the worth of a Language because of its *Mixture* and *Mutability*, I would have them consider, that the first is very natural to all Languages, that none are free of it, scarce the HEBREW, the LALINE itself hath a great mixture of *Greek* and *Gothish*: The FRENCH consists of *Latine*, *Dutch* and *Gallique*, the SPANISH of *Latine*, *Gothish* and *Morisco*; The GERMAN, as original as it is pretended to be, has a taste of the Roman Empire, and the bordering Neighbours. As for its *Mutability*, all men know, that Languages, as states, have their infancy and age, wax and wane.

But to conclude, seing the English is come to so great a perfection, and become so very copious and significant, by the Accession of the Quintessence and Life of other Tongues, its to be wished, that a stop were put to this unbounded way of naturalizing forreign words, and that none hereafter should be admitted but with judgement and Authority, were this Island content to improve what grain they have already, without over stocking themselves from other parts, and putting their Language on a perpetual motion, it would be much for the credit of it; For the truth is, there is as much in it, as is needfull, and perhapps more than the English soil is able to bear.

Comicolon; is a note of somewhat longer breathing, and hath a
middle space betwixt a **Comma**, and a **Colon**.

Colon: is a note of suspending the voice yet longer, and not-
ing the perfect part of a Sentence, the whole sense being not yet
finished.

Periodum. is a note of longest breathing, which we use, when the
sense is completed, whether in one or many Clauses.

Interrogation ? is used when a question is asked.

Exclamation ! when we express any thing with wonder.

Enthesis () is when a sentence is put within another. A
sentence lying betwixt any two of these stops, must be expres-
sed in few words, that the Speaker or Reader may have a con-
venient time to breath after he hath read or repeated the peri-
or sentence, and not breath in the midst thereof.

Words, before the least of these seven interjections, are cal-
led a Grammatical sentence, as 1 Cor: 3 2: *Though I have the gift
of prophecy, and understand all mysteries, and all knowledge: and
though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains; and I have
charity, I am nothing.*

Hyphen - is used, either when two whole words are united, as
half-face, or when we divide a word into syllables, leaving one
in the end of the first line, and bringing the other part to
the beginning of the next line.

Diæresis or *Diæresis* . . is when a Diphthong is parted into two
syllables as *pic-ta-i*, or when two syllables are made one as *evol-vi-ssè*
or *evol-vi-ssè*.

Interlineation Δ is when we bring in a word interlined.

Apostrophus ' is when a letter is cast out as *dix'tin'* for *dixistin'*.
And we often use it to denote the Genitive case, as *my Brochers*
Book.

Quotation ' ' we use in the Margine, when we quote a sentence out of an Author.

Accute tone ' is used to distinguish doubtful quantities, as *Cecidi* from *cedo*. *cecidi* from *cedo*

Grave tone ` above the last *Vowel* of a word tells the Reader the word to be an Adverb, which mark of *Grave tone*, if the word wanted, it would be a Noun or someother part of speech as *stultum*, *serò*, *quàm* than, *cùm* seing.

Circumflex tone ^ is used over *Ablatives* in *à* and *Genitives* in *as* *Musà* *Manùs*. 2 Over syllables long by nature, as *legerè* in the perfect and future passive 3 Over words contracted by *Syncopè* as *amâsti*, *tibicèn aliàs* in the *Genit.* for *alius*. 4 Over *ergò* when it is taken for *causà*.
