companyed with Privy Councel
of the lower House to the number
at Her Majestys Feet for y^e so graci-
ously to her Subjects desires by
monopolies she took that Opportu-
nity as follows.

M^r. Speaker, We perceive your coming is to present thanks unto Us. Know I accept them with no less Joy then your Lovels can have desire to offer such a Present, and do more Esteem it than any Treasure, or Riches, for those we know how to Prize, but Loyalty, Love and Thanks I account them invaluable: and though God hath raised Me high, yet this I account the Glory of my Crown, that I have Reigned with your Lovels. This makes that I do not so much Rejoyce that God hath made Me to be a Queen, as to be a Queen over so thankfull a People. & to be y^e mean under God to Conserve you in Safety, and Preserve you from Danger, yea to be y^e Instrument to Deliver you from Dishonour, from shame, from Infamy, to keep you from out of Servitude, and from Slavery under our Enemies, & cruel Tyranny, & vile Oppression intended against Us: for y^e better withstanding whereof, We take very acceptably y^e intended Help, & chiefly in y^e mani-
festing your Lovels & largeness of Heart to your Sovereign. Of Myself I must say this, I never was any greedy scraping grasper, nor a strict fast-holding Prince, nor yet a waster, My Heart was never set upon any worldly goods, but only for my Subjects good. What you do Bestow on Me I will not Hoard up, but receive it to Bestow on you again: yea Mine own Properties I account yours to be Expended for your good. Of your Eyes shall see the Bestowing of it for your Welfare.

M^r. Speaker: I would wish you & the rest to stand up, for I fear I shall yet trouble you with longer Speech*

M^r. Speaker: you give Me Thanks, but I am more to Thank you, & I Charge you Thank y^m of y^e Lower House from Me, for had I not received Knowledge from you, I might a fallen into y^e Lapse of an Error, only for want of true Information.

Since I was Queen yet did I never put my Pen to any Grant but upon pretext & Semblance made Me, if it was for y^e good & Avail of my Subjects generally, though a private profit to some of my ancient Servants who have deserved well: But that my Grants shall be made Grievances to my People, & Oppressions, to be Priviledged under colour of Our Patents. Our Princely Dignity shall not suffer it. When I heard it, I could give no Rest unto my Thoughts until I had Reformed it, & those Vartlets, lewd Persons, abusers of my Bounty shall know I will not suffer it. And M^r. Speaker tell the House from Me, I take it exceeding Graffull, that if knowledge of these things are come unto Me from them. And tho amongst them y^e Principal Members are such as are not touched in Private, & therfore need not speak from any feeling of y^e Grief, yet We have heard of other Gentlemen also of the

House, who stand as free, have spoken as freely in it; n^o gives Us to know y^e no respects or intrists have moved them other than y^e minds they bear to suffer no diminution of our Honour & our Subjects Love unto Us. The Zeal of which Affection tending to ease my People, & knit their Hearts unto Us, I Embrace with a Princely care far above all earthly Treasures. I esteem my Peoples love, more then all I desire not to merit. And God y^e gave me here to sit, & placed Me over you, knowes y^e I never respected myself, but as your Good was conserv'd in Me; yet what dangers, what practices, & Perills I have pass'd, some if not all of you know, but none of these things do move Me, or ever made Me fear, but its God y^e hath delivered Me.

And in my Governing this Land, I have ever set y^e last Judgement Day before mine Eyes, & so to Rule, as I shall be Judged & Answer before a higher Judge, to whose Judgement Seat I doe Appeal in that never thought was cherished in my Heart that tended not to my Peoples good.

And if my Princely Bounty have been Abused, and my Grants turn'd to the hurt of my People contrary to my will & meaning, or if any in Authority under Me have Neglected, or Convicted what I have committed unto them, I hope God will not lay their Culps to my charge.

To be a King, & wear a Crown is a thing more Glorious to them that see it than its pleasant to them that bear it. For my self, I never was so much interested with y^e Glorious name of a King, or the Royal Authority of a Queen as delighted y^e God hath made Me His Instrument to Maintain His Truth & Glory, and to defend this Kingdom from Dishonour, Dammeage, Tyranny & Oppression. But should I ascribe any of these things to Myself or my Schedly Weaknes, I were not worthy to live, and of all most unworthy of the Mercies I have received at Gods Hands, but to God only & wholly all is given & ascribed.

The Care & Troubles of a Crown I cannot more fitly resemble than to y^e Druggs of a learned Physician, perfum'd with some Aromaticall Savour, or to bitter Piss Gilded over, by y^e they are made more acceptable or less offensive, which indeed are bitter & unpleasant to take: and for My own part, were it not for Conscience sake to discharge the Duty that God hath lay'd upon Me, and to maintain His Glory, and keep you in Safety, in mine own Disposition I should be willing to resign y^e Place I hold to any other, & glad to be freed of y^e Glory with y^e Labours, for it is not My desire to live nor to Reign, longer than my Life & Reign shall be for your Good. And though you have had & may have many mightier & wiser Princes sitting in this Seat, yet you never had nor shall have any that will Love you better: Thus, M^r. Speaker I command Me to your loyal Lovels, and yours to My best Care & your further Counsels, and I pray you M^r. Comptroller and M^r. Secretary and you of My Council, that before these Gentlemen depart into their Countries you bring them all to kiss my Hand.

*Complaint was made to the Parliament against Monopolies Whereupon her Majestie issued a Proclamation declaring many of those Licences and Patents void, upon which the Commons were now come to return her their hearty thanks.
