Note that my Lord Ruffel was Tried the 13th of July 1683. at the Old Baily, Sir William Pritchard was then Lord Mayor, Sir Dudley North and Sir Peter Rich Sheriffs, and Sir George Treby Recorder, Sir Francis Pemberton Chief Justice of the King's Bench, and the rest of the Judges sate upon his Trial, and Over-ruled his Plea, which was argued by Mr. Pollixfen, Mr. Holt, and Mr. Ward: The Council against him were Sir Robert Sawyer Attorney-General, Mr. Finch Solicitor-General, Sir George Jefferies, and Mr. North. The Evidence against him were Lord Howard of Eserick, commonly called Lambs-wool, Colonel Rumsey, and one Mr. Thomas Shepherd. I need not give a Character of the Persons concerned in his Murther, for the Preamble to the Duke of Bedford's Patent is sufficient, being preceded by an Act of Parliament, which took off the Attainder.

The Preamble to the Patent Granted by Their Majesties to the Earl of Bedford to be Duke of Bedford, and Transmitted the 16th of May, 1694.

And whereas to a Person of a plentiful Estate, who has lived all along in great Esteem, and with general Applause, and is now hastening to the end of his Race, We can give no other Reward than an Addition of Honour, (the desire whereof in Generous Minds uses to increase proportionably to the measure of it they have Enjoyed already) it is Our Free Will and Pleasure that such an Honorary Addition be Conferred (and that as Due) upon Our most Trusty and Well-beloved Cousin and Counsellor, William Earl of Bedford, Our Lieutenant of Middlesex, Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire, and Knight of Our most Noble Order of the Garter, and upon his Posterity, who having with so much Reputation, and for so many Years kept up the Post and Splendor of that Ancient Family, as truly deserved to be the Spring-head of some new and more Illustrious Title, that shall be Hereditary therein, and bear date from himself, for the Honour of whom, among the many things that might be justly said, this one must in no wise be here omitted, viz. That from his Loins issued that Ornament of our Age, William Late Lord Ruffel, whose Superlative Merits we think it not sufficient should be Transmitted to all Future Generations upon the Credit of Publick Annals, but will have them inserted in these Our Royal Letters Patents as a Monument Consecrated to the most Accomplished and Consummate Vertue in the said Family, nor shall his Name ever perish while there are Persons Alive disposed to pay due Honour to one of so Vertuous a Conversation, so Great a Soul, and so Publick a Spirit, as to prefer the Love he had to his Country before that of his own Life. Now then to Comfort One of the Best of Fathers, after so Unspeakable a Loss; to Solemnize the Memory of that Excellent Son of His, and Excite the Emulation of a very Worthy Grand-child Born to so great Hopes, that he may the more Vigoreously tread in the Steps of his Truly Great Father, We do Give Our Commands for these Marks of Honour to be Born by them: Know ye therefore, &c.
