

# PUBLIUS LENTULUS.HIS

News to the Senate of Rome, concerning

Jesus Christ

*In the daies of TIBERIUS CÆSAR the Emperour as the Gouvernor  
of sundry Provinces, under the Senate and people of Rome, used to aduertise  
the Senate of such newes as chanced in diuers Countries. Publius Lentulus being  
at that tyme resident in Iudea, wrate an epistle to the Senate and people of Rome, the words  
whereof were these.*

Here appeared in these our  
daies a man of greate vertue,  
named IESUS CHRIST, who is  
yet liuing amongst vs, and  
the Gentiles is accepted for a Prophet of  
true religion; but his owne Disciples call him the  
God. He raiseth the dead and cureth all man-  
ner of diseases, a man of stature somewhat  
tall and comly, with a very reuerend cou-  
ntenance, such as the beholders may both  
loue & feare, his haier of the colour of a  
Philbert full ripe, and plaine allmost down  
to his eares; but from the eares down toward  
somwhat curled, and more orient of colour  
wauing about his Shoulders. In the mid-  
est of his head goeth a seame or partition  
haier, after the manner of the Nazarites; his forehead very p-  
roperly shapen, his face without spot or wrinkle, beautified with a comely red,  
and mouth soe formed, as nothing can be reprehended: his beard som-  
thicke, agreeable in colour to the haier of his head, not of any greate  
but forked in the midst, of an innocent and mature looke. his eies gray  
cleere and quick. in reproouing he is terrible, in admonishing curteous, and  
faier spoken; pleasant in speech, mixed with grauity. it cannot be remembred  
that any haue seene him laugh, but many haue seene him weepe: in propor-  
tion of body well shaped and straight; his hands & armes right delectable to  
hold; in speaking very temperate, modest, and wise, a man for his singular  
beauty, surpassing the children of men.
