To Our trufty and welbeloved high thieriffe of Our County of York.



Rufty and Well beloved, Wee greet you well: Whereas we underftand, That Sir *lobn* Hotham takes upon him (without any legall Authority or Power) to iffue warrants to Conftables, and other Our Officers, to raife diverse of our Trained bands of this Our County, and requires them to match with their Armes, and to come into Our Towne of *Hull*, where he bath difarmed diverse of them, keepes their Armes, and difcharges the men : And whereas Wee are credibly informed, that diverse persons, Who were lately Colonels, Livetenant-Colonels, Captaines and Officers of the trained Bands of this Our County, intend flortly to fummon, and indeavour to muster the forces of this Our County : For as much as by the Law of the Land, none of Our trained Bands are to be raifed or mustered, upon any pretence or authotity whatfoever, but by special warrant under Our owne hand, or by a legall Writ directed to the Sheriffe of the County,

or by warrant from the Lord Lievtenant, or Deputy-Lievtenants of the County, appointed and authorized by Commilsion ander Our Great Seale. And whereas at prefent there is no Lord Lievetenant or Deputy Lievetenant legally authorized to command the Forces and trained Bands of this Our County of Yorke, and the Commilsions, to Command, and Power of all Colonells, Lievetenant-Colonels, Captaines and Officers of Our trained Bands, (which were derived from the Commilsion and Power of the Lord Lievetenant onely) are now actually voyd, and of no force and Authority. Our will and Command therefore is, that you forthwith iffue Warrants under your Hand, to all the late Colonels, Lievetenant-Colonels, Captaines and Officers, who (whiles the Lord Lievtenants Commilsion was in force) had the command of the trained Bands of this Our County : And alfo to all High and Petty Conftables, and other our Officers, in this Our County, whom it may concerne, charging and commanding them, and every of them, in Our Name, and upon their Allegiance, and as they tender the Peace of this Our Kingdome, not to Mufter, Leaviê; or Raife, or to Summon, or Warne (upon any pretence or Directions whatfoever) any of Our trained Bands to Rife, Mufter, or March, without expreffe Warrant under Our Hand, or Warrant from you Our Sheriffe grounded upon a particular writ to that purpofe; Which we alfo command you, not to put in Execution without Our Privity and Allowance, whiles we fhall refide in this Our County.

And in cafe any of Our trained Bands shall rife, or gather together, contrary to this Our command, Then Wee will and command you to charge and require them, to disolve, and retire to their dwellings. And if upon due Summons from you, they shall not lay downe their Arms, and depart to their dwellings, We will and command you upon your Allegiance, and as you tender the peace and quiet of his Our Kingdome, to raife the power of the County, and suppressed to the peace and given you Power to doe. And too the end that this Our expressed to the peace of Subjects in this Our County, fo as nonemaypretend hereafter to have been missed through ignorance; We require you to cause these Our Letters to be forthwith read, and publiss of penly in all Churches and Parisses in this Our County. Herein you may not faile, as you tender the fafety and honour of Our Person, the good and peace of this Our Kingdome, and will answer the contrary at your peril. For which this shall be your fufficient Warrant.
