PREFACE.

As a result of a decision adopted by the Council of the League of Nations on September 1st, 1931, and approved by the Twelfth Assembly, the draft Customs nomenclature was, on November 2nd, 1932, forwarded to States Members and non-members of the League of Nations for examination.

The Governments of the following countries have sent their observations upon the work of the Sub-Committee of Experts to the Secretariat: Belgium, United Kingdom, Bulgaria, Chile, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, Germany, Italy, Mexico, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Sweden, Switzerland, Union of South Africa, United States of America, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics.

Some of these observations are of a general character, and refer to the framework of the draft and the standards adopted in classifying goods within that framework. Most, however, go into the details of that classification and deal with items and sub-items figuring in the draft.

The German Government, in addition, has forwarded two memoranda concerning, one the classification of detached parts appertaining to the engineering industry, the other the classification of goods composed of several materials. The Swedish Government has also forwarded a memorandum on the latter subject.

The Sub-Committee of Experts—increased by one new member in the person of M. Sandquist (Sweden)—has examined these observations and suggestions; as a result of this scrutiny it felt the desirability, and indeed the necessity, of introducing a number of amendments and modifications in the draft.

The present edition contains the draft Customs nomenclature in its new and final form.

INTRODUCTION.

The present volume contains the draft common Customs nomenclature prepared by the special Sub-Committee of Experts set up in 1927. It is followed by a second volume, in which the classification of goods for tariff purposes as proposed by the experts is fully explained and annotated.

The history of the draft common Customs nomenclature was given in the introduction to the "Draft Framework for a Customs Tariff Nomenclature" published in 1928, which is, as it were, the logical and necessary antecedent to the work now issued. It will suffice here to recall briefly that, following on a recommendation by the World Economic Conference in May 1927, the Council of the League of Nations referred the problem of establishing a systematic Customs nomenclature to the Economic Committee.

In making its recommendation, the World Economic Conference had in view the introduction of order, clearness and, above all, simplicity and uniformity into the nomenclature of Customs tariffs. All those who at present have occasion, in the course of business or study, to refer to these tariffs know from experience how difficult they are to consult and compare.

The great difference between the nomenclatures of the various Customs tariffs arises from two facts: on the one hand, the particular economic structure of each country, which must naturally be reflected in its tariff; on the other hand, the diversity of the formal and systematic criteria on the basis of which products are arranged in categories and items. Thus the items of the present Customs tariffs rarely coincide; even when they are similar in form their contents are hardly ever identical, especially in the case of collective items. Even the definitions of products frequently differ: for example, what constitutes cardboard or special steel or lace in one tariff does not do so in another. It is not surprising, therefore, that the consultation of the tariffs should lead to perpetual misunderstanding and uncertainty, that their application frequently involves disputes between Customs authorities and traders, and that those who desire to compare the duty payable on the same commodity in different countries are often totally unable to obtain satisfactory results: a commodity is mentioned specially in one tariff, appears under a collective heading in another, is divided among several headings in a third, and so on.

The Economic Committee requested a special Sub-Committee of Experts to study the means of removing all these difficulties and to make suitable proposals and suggestions for giving effect to the recommendation of the World Economic Conference.

This Sub-Committee was composed first of five and later of seven members: M. Fighiera (Chairman) (France), M. Flach (Germany), M. Magnette (Belgium), M. Ferenczi (Hungary), M. Paci (Italy), M. Comte (Switzerland), and M. Fafl (Czechoslovakia).

The Sub-Committee first prepared a draft framework for a Customs nomenclature, which was submitted to competent persons in the various countries for examination; after being revised and modified as a result of their observations, this draft became the "Draft Framework for a Customs Tariff Nomenclature" referred to above.

Once this draft was established, the Sub-Committee turned its attention to the more difficult aspect of its task: the distribution, within the framework, of such goods as might form the subject of international trade. The results of this work will be found in the present volume.

The principles which the experts had in mind in distributing the goods within the sections and chapters of the framework and the standards which should govern the practical application of the unified Customs nomenclature are clearly and succinctly explained in the following passage from the report which the Sub-Committee of Experts presented to the Economic Committee in June 1931:

"The draft Customs nomenclature proposed by the Sub-Committee of Experts classifies goods under eighty-six chapters, grouped in twenty-one sections. As regards the distribution of goods within the chapters, origin, processes of manufacture,

degree of workmanship, and economic importance are each taken into account either separately or together. In some cases, the experts have taken into consideration the nature of the packing (for instance, for the subdivision for preserved vegetables, meat, fish, etc.) and, in exceptional cases, destination: thus the chapter relating to 'fertilisers' includes products which may be put to other uses, but are principally or normally used as fertilisers.

"The draft nomenclature contains main or basic items, secondary items and sometimes tertiary or quaternary items.

"In the opinion of the experts, the principal items should be *compulsory*—in other words, the countries which adopt the standard nomenclature *would not be allowed to abolish any of these headings* (about 1,000 in number), which, as a rule, are sufficiently comprehensive to include a whole group of well-defined articles which play an important part in international trade.

"The sub-items, on the other hand, would not, in principle, be compulsory, but any country which desired to subdivide the basic items would be required to accept the subdivisions provided for in the draft, though it would be at liberty to reduce their number by grouping two or more together, if it considered it expedient to do so.

"Countries might also establish fresh distinctions in addition to those provided for in the draft.

"By this means, all tariffs would have a *minimum* of elaboration, thus eliminating the danger of excessive simplicity which, in the circumstances, is as much a defect and as dangerous as over-detailed discrimination. Greater discrimination would always be possible, but it would have to be carried out within the framework constructed by the experts. Moreover, the experts fixed the main rules governing discrimination between the more important headings in the explanatory notes relating to those headings."

This passage shows that in applying the common Customs nomenclature a country would still—and this is essential—be free and in a position to draw up a tariff suited to its particular economic and fiscal requirements. But such an adjustment of the League of Nations draft to the special requirements of the different States, which would be effected by expanding and contracting the sub-items, would in no way alter the structure of the standard nomenclature. Goods would everywhere be classified in accordance with the same principles, the contents of each heading would always be defined in a precise and identical manner, and the same terms would be used everywhere for the same products. The unification of Customs nomenclatures would, in fact, mean the unification of Customs language and terminology; it would thus remove any grounds for uncertainty and ambiguity in interpreting tariffs. The position of each commodity—that is to say, the basic item under which it was classified would be exactly the same in all tariffs. A trader or manufacturer who exported a given product familiar with his own country's tariff, and knowing in what category and item and in what terms this product was there classified, would also know in advance where it would be classified in the tariff of the country of destination. Rapid investigation of the same category and item in this tariff would be facilitated, as the categories and items would bear the same number in all tariffs; the duty payable on the product on importation into the country in question could immediately be ascertained. In the same way, a comparison of the Customs tariffs and the degree of protection accorded to a particular commodity would

All the above considerations relate to the business world and the interests of individuals. The advantages of the unification of Customs nomenclature would be just as great, however, in the sphere of commercial policy. Negotiators of commercial agreements would speak the same language; they would be sure, without any danger of misunderstanding or of subsequent disputes, of the meaning of the tariff items under discussion. Further, the objective principles on which the specifications within the items in the nomenclature were based would undoubtedly influence contractual discrimination, too often based, in commercial treaties, on standards that are irrelevant or are of only minor importance.

Finally, the common nomenclature would, where necessary, provide the indispensable basis for all collective tariff negotiations.

A word should be added on one important point: the structure and fundamental lines of the proposed common Customs nomenclature, as it appears in this volume, should be regarded as final and *ne varietur*; its details, on the other hand, are open to adjustment and modification. On the proposal of the Sub-Committee of Experts, the competent organs of the League have decided to give the Governments ample time to examine the nomenclature thoroughly and to place their criticisms and observations before the Sub-Committee through the Secretariat. The Sub-Committee will duly bear these observations and criticisms in mind in putting the draft into the final form, in which it should be adopted by the greatest possible number of countries if it is to produce its full beneficial effects.

PRELIMINARY PROVISIONS.

I. Articles composed of several materials and not specially classified as such shall follow the classification appertaining to the material of that part which gives the article its predominating character in respect of appearance and use.

In applying this provision to composite articles, component materials which are present only in a negligible amount, and which do not essentially affect the nature or character of the

goods, shall not be taken into account.

- 2. Articles, the parts of which are not intended together to constitute a whole but are merely placed one upon, or within, the other, *i.e.*, which are combined together only for the purpose of being used, shall not be deemed composite articles in the sense of paragraph I above. The parts of such articles must be classified separately, according to the material of which they are composed.
- 3. Subject to the exceptions specified, detached parts of articles normally built up of several portions, which parts are intended to be assembled permanently, must be enumerated under the item corresponding to the complete article if imported together, even in separate packings. The absence of non-essential parts shall not prevent the application of the present provision.
- 4. The articles composed of several materials which, by reason of the general or special rules contained in the nomenclature, fall under the chapter or group appertaining to articles composed of a single material shall be classified under the same item as the latter articles composed of a single specified material, even if the description of that item does not provide, or only provides in part, for combination with other materials.
- 5. In the classification of manufactured products, no account shall be taken of trade marks, names of the manufacturer or seller, indications of the country of origin, or similar indications not having the character of ornaments.
- 6. The foregoing provisions Nos. 1 to 5 are to be applied generally, subject to the special provisions appearing in the different sections of the nomenclature.

Section I.

CHAPTER 1.

LIVE ANIMALS.

(except fish, crustaceans and molluscs).

 - 2-Frozen.
- c. Pork, excluding bacon.

Note.—Item 13 also includes slaughtered animals and edible internal organs separately imported.

14.—DEAD POULTRY.

Note.—Fresh poultry liver is included under this item.

- 16.—OTHER FRESH, CHILLED OR FROZEN MEAT, EXCLUDING BACON.

17.—BACON:

- b. Salted, dried, smoked, or otherwise simply prepared.

 - a. Ham.
 - b. Other.

Note.—Meat imported in tins, terrines, crusts, or in hermetically sealed receptacles is not included under Item 18.

CHAPTER 3.

- 19.—Fish, fresh (dead or alive) or preserved fresh by a frigorific or other process:
 - a. Fresh-water fish.
 - b. Sea fish.
- 20.—FISH, SIMPLY SALTED, DRIED OR SMOKED:

- Note.—Fish imported in sheet-metal, glass or earthenware containers, or in hermetically sealed receptacles, is not included under Item 20.

- 21.—CRUSTACEANS AND MOLLUSCS, FRESH, WHETHER OR NOT SIMPLY COOKED OR SALTED:
 - a. Lobsters, spiny lobsters, crabs, crayfish, shrimps and other crustaceans.
 - b. Oysters, mussels, snails and other molluscs.

CHAPTER 4.

MILK AND DAIRY PRODUCTS; EGGS AND HONEY.

22.—Fresh milk, full-cream or skimmed; buttermilk (whey), curdled milk, fermented milk.

Note.—Item 22 also includes pasteurised, sterilised or peptonised milk.

Note.—This term covers unhardened, unpasted cardboard of natural colour, manufactured either from old paper (grey and similar cardboard), or from straw or coarse vegetable fibre, or from mechanical pulp.

 - Note.—This description includes paper of natural colour or dyed in the mass, other than white, rough on at least one side. Paper made from straw, from old paper or from coarse vegetable fibre of natural colour, or dyed in the mass in a single colour, and paper made from brown pulp of natural colour is included under this Sub-Item even if glazed on both sides.
 - b. Felted paper, whether dyed in the mass or not.
 - c. Paper formed of several layers of pulp of different qualities, simply compressed together.
 - d. Paper formed of several sheets of paper pasted upon one another such as Bristol and similar card.
 - e. Newsprint.
- Note.—This description includes non-satined paper in rolls weighing from 45 to 55 gr. per sq.m., and containing at least 60 per cent of mechanical wood pulp.
- f. Other paper of natural colour, white or dyed in the mass, not elsewhere specified or included.
- 420.—Paper in rolls or sheets, not made up or worked, weighing up to 30 gr. per sq.m.:
 - a. Cigarette paper.
 - b. Other, not elsewhere specified or included.

421.—Paper in rolls or sheets made up:

- a. Glazed (lustré).
- b. Ruled, lined or checkered.
- c. Surface-coated or enamelled.
- d. Oiled, waxed, coated with stearin or paraffin wax.
- e. Indigo paper, carbon paper or similar paper.
- f. Vegetable parchment and imitations thereof.
- g. Gummed, coloured, varnished, gilt, silvered, coated with metal, micaceous, velveted, marbled, printed (indienné), with printed designs, etc.
- h. Diaphanous papers and transfers.
- i. Paper stiffened or strengthened with textile thread or tissue, whether tarred or not.
- k. Crêpe paper; corrugated, crinkled, perforated, or goffered paper, or paper shaped by stamping.
- l. Other, not elsewhere specified or included.

422.—WALLPAPER.

- 423.—Sheets of paper pulp for filtering and for building purposes.
- 424.—BLOTTING BOARD AND PAPER; FILTER PAPER AND CARDBOARD, WHETHER CUT, PLEATED OR NOT.
- 425.—Special Cardboard and Paper, in rolls, sheets or boards:
 - a. Vulcanised.

Note. — Item 425a also includes cardboard and paper, vulcanised, in rods or tubes.

- b. Covered or impregnated with artificial resins or similar materials.

 - a. Perforated cardboard or paper for Jacquard and similar machines.
 - b. Paper lace and embroidery.
 - c. Paper table-cloths and serviettes.
 - d. Other.
- Notes.—I. Where a distinction is made between wares of cardboard or paper not combined with other materials, and those combined with other materials, the following should be disregarded: clasps, fastenings, corner-pieces, eyelets, textile threads, strings, and other small accessories necessary for making the article or for facilitating its use, and not having the character of ornaments.
 - 2. Items 427 to 435 also include articles bearing printed matter or designs, in black, colours or dry printing, of whatever kind or nature.

Section XI.

GENERAL NOTES RELATING TO SECTION XI.

- 1. In the absence of any special provisions to the contrary, the items in Section XI (yarns, fabrics, etc.) have been classified without regard for any non-textile materials which may enter into their composition.
- Yarns consisting of two or more different textile materials have been classified according to the following rules:

The yarn must accordingly be classified under that Item (relating to mixed yarns) which corresponds to the component textile material appearing first in the above list.

 - Fabrics the whole of the warp or weft (including additional threads, if any) of which is composed of one or other of the textile materials indicated in the first column of the following table are classified under the items relating to these materials, whatever the respective proportions of the textiles of which the fabric is composed.

Velvets or plushes made of mixed materials, the cut or uncut pile ("right" facing) of which covers—entirely or for the greater part—one surface of the fabric and at the same time consists of one only of the mixed materials, fall under the chapter to which that material belongs, unless the cut or uncut pile of such velvet or plush is of wool, cotton, etc., and the plain side of silk, silk floss, artificial silk or artificial textile fibre.
- Carpets with a cut or uncut pile on the right side are classified according to the material of which such pile is made.
- Tulles and net fabrics, lace and trimmings are classified under Chapter 46 when they contain any proportion of silk, artificial silk or artificial textile fibre.

 Articles of this kind containing wool or fine hair in any proportion, but without any admixture of the textile materials included under Chapter 46, are

classified under Chapter 47.

- In classifying embroidered work, the ground material only shall be taken into account; the type of thread used for embroidering shall not affect such classification. Chemical embroideries, and those in which the ground is not visible, shall nevertheless be excepted from this rule; in such cases the type of thread used for embroidering shall determine the classification.
- Subject to the foregoing provisions and to the exceptions specified in the nomenclature, fabrics composed of two or more textile materials will be classified in accordance with the following table:

CHAPTER 61.

REAL PEARLS, PRECIOUS STONES, PRECIOUS METALS AND WARES MADE THEREOF.

GENERAL NOTES.

- I. All metals of the platinum group (osmium, rhodium, ruthenium, palladium and iridium) are included with platinum.
- 2. The category of precious metals includes not only pure gold, silver and platinum, but also metal alloys containing those metals in whatever proportion.

Alloys of gold and silver, with or without the addition of base metals, are included under "gold", whatever the proportions of the two precious metals.

Alloys containing platinum or metals of the platinum group are assimilated to platinum;

alloys of gold and palladium, however, are assimilated to gold.

- 3. Jewellery consisting of precious metals combined with precious or semi-precious stones, imitation or artificial stones, real or artificial pearls, coral, jet, etc., must be placed under *jewellery* (*joaillerie*), regardless of the respective proportions of the metals and other components.
- 4. Subject to the exceptions expressly provided for elsewhere, the present chapter also covers wares other than jewellery (joaillerie)—such as goldsmiths' wares, jewelled ornaments (bijouterie), etc.—composed in part of precious metals, provided such metals enter into the composition of the articles otherwise than as mere settings or accessories.
- 5. The articles included under Chapter 61, and made up of pieces or parts of different precious metals, are classified as platinum articles if they contain platinum, and as gold articles if they contain gold but no platinum.

682.—Real pearls, including cultured pearls:

- a. Unworked.
- b. Worked.

683.—Precious and semi-precious stones, natural or synthetic:

- a Unworked
- b. Cut or otherwise worked, but not mounted.
- c. Articles not elsewhere specified or included.

Section XV.

BASE METALS AND ARTICLES MADE THEREOF.

GENERAL NOTES ON SECTION XV.

An alloy of two base metals is classified under the metal which predominates by weight in the mixture; an alloy of several base metals is classified under the metal which predominates by weight over any of the other components.

This rule, however, does not apply to crude ferro-alloys and cupro-alloys, or to copper

or tin solders.

Alloys of copper with nickel, with zinc and nickel, etc., are treated as nickel, when the proportion of nickel exceeds 10 per cent.

2. Failing an express stipulation to the contrary, articles composed of combinations of base metals or of base metals combined with any material other than precious metals, are classified according to the following rules:

A.—Combinations of base metals, without other materials:

Articles in which the total weight of iron, cast iron and steel exceeds the total weight of the metals classified under Chapters 64 to 71 of Section XV are classified under Chapter 63 (Iron, Cast Iron and Steel).

Where there is no preponderance of iron, cast iron and steel in the composition of the articles, or when non-ferrous metals exclusively are involved, the articles are

classified under the non-ferrous metal which preponderates in the mixture.

B.—Base metals combined with any material other than precious metals:

Articles of base metals combined with non-metallic substances, not specially classified as such, shall be classified under Section XV provided the metals entering into their composition confer upon them predominatingly the character of articles of metal, whatever the actual proportions of the component materials.

Such articles shall, in such case, be classified in accordance with the rules laid

down under A above.

3. Articles belonging to Section XV and classified under separate headings or subheadings, according as they are *unworked* or *worked*, shall, where the process undergone is not exactly defined, and in the absence of special provisions to the contrary, be deemed to be:

A.—Unworked, in the case of crude products of casting, forging, rolling,

drawing, stamping or pressing, not having undergone further processing.

The following processes will not cause the articles to be regarded as worked: removal by rough paring, or grinding, or with a hammer, chisel or file, of burrs, fins, seams, or other casting or stamping flaws; cutting-off of dead-heads or defective ends; dipping in acid to remove scale; ordinary cleaning by sand blast; coarse roughingdown, scraping or pickling, solely to ascertain the absence of defects in the article; the presence of rough coats of graphite, oil, tar, red lead, asphalte and the like, obviously intended to protect the articles from rust or other oxidation, or the presence of ordinary inscriptions, trade or other marks, whether cast, stamped, punched, printed, etc.

B.—Worked, in the case of all articles which, in addition to undergoing processes still permitting them to be considered as unworked, have been further treated on the

surface, or on any part thereof, changed in shape or improved in appearance.

The following articles in particular are regarded as worked: articles curved, bent, bored, milled, drilled, threaded, shaped, riveted, screwed, or consisting of parts assembled in any way; filed, turned, planed, smoothed on the wheel or with emery, polished, blued, bronzed, painted, varnished, lacquered, enamelled, oxidised, coated with base metals or alloys thereof, plated, gilt, silvered, platinum-coated, engraved, nickel-plated, chrome-plated, painted or made rustless by any process other than the rough coating referred to in A above.

Where a special distinction is made for articles simply worked, these will be considered as including all articles curved, bent, bored, milled, drilled, threaded, riveted, screwed or composed of parts, even of different materials, assembled in any way whatever, as well as articles polished, filed, turned, planed, smoothed on the wheel or with emery, with patterns obtained by rolling or stamping, but not including articles having undergone further processing.

GENERAL NOTES ON SECTION XVI.

I. Complete machines also include machines in which some parts (such as fly-wheels, sole-plates, bearings, pillow-blocks, etc.) are missing, provided that the various mechanical parts present together constitute the main bulk of the machine, and that they together exhibit the characteristics of the machine, although in an incomplete state.

The importation of machines in an unassembled state, even if forwarded in several

consignments, shall not affect their classification.

- As regards machines, components and parts of machines specified in the nomenclature, unless other wise stipulated no distinction is to be made on account of the materials of which they are made. Nevertheless, where sub-items are provided for different component materials, the classification shall be governed by the provisions of No. 2 of the General Notes on Section XV, or by those contained in paragraph I of the Preliminary Provisions of this Nomenclature.
- 3. Except where the contrary is expressly stipulated, detached parts of machines, unworked, are classified under those chapters corresponding to articles made of the materials of which such detached parts are composed. With the same reservation, components and parts of machines, worked, come under Section XVI, whatever the material of which they are

Detached parts, worked, not specified under a particular item in the nomenclature, belong to the same item as the machine for which they are intended, if this can be clearly established. If this cannot be done, such parts are classified under "detached parts of machines not elsewhere specified or included".

The distinction between unworked and worked parts, made of base metals, is made according to the rule laid down in No. 3 of the General Notes on Section XV.

4. Driving machines of every kind accompanying working machines, when separable or presented separately, shall be classed apart under the item to which they belong; if necessary, the weight of the sole-plate common to both machines shall be divided in proportion to the respective weights of the driving machine and of the working machine.

Driving machines coupled to working machines by means of one or more essential parts common to both shall not be considered as separable; the same applies to electric motors

incorporated in working machines, in a position specially designed for that purpose.

Subject to the exceptions expressly provided for, the two non-separable machines together shall be classed as the working machine.

- 5. Subject to the exceptions provided for, machines of different kinds intended to function together shall be classed independently of one another when they are separable. If necessary, the weight of the common constituent parts of the separable machines shall be divided in proportion to the respective weights of the machines. If, on the contrary, they constitute a single body, they shall be classed as a working machine performing the chief function characterising the whole.
- Transmission and transport belts and straps of non-metallic material shall be classed independently of the machines to which they belong, even when presented at the same time as the machine.
- N.B.—For the purposes of the foregoing notes, the designation machines applies also to the various appliances and apparatus in Section XVI.
