




Score CURLING ITEM



On looking through the records of our Club I have thought a few notes might be of interest to my brother members and might recall happy memories of old friends and good games as they do to me after being one of the Club Skips for thirty years.

WHATEVER the origin of Curling, we may hope that it was not, as some assert, "made in Germany." When first practised in Scotland it appears to have been a sort of quoiting on ice. The stones had no handles, but merely a niche for the finger and thumb of the player, and they were evidently thrown. They appear to have varied in weight from five to twenty-five pounds. The earliest is the "Stirling stone," bearing date 1511. The next development was rough blocks, weighing up to eighty pounds, with iron handles. From this there was evolved the circular stone, at first single soled and quite recently double soled as we know it to-day.

The earliest Club records are those of Muthill in 1739.

The oldest type of foothold was the "cramp" or "tramp," a piece of iron with prongs on the under side, which was bound to the foot with straps. The "tramp" now in use was invented by Dr. Cairnie, a noted curler and first President of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club, who settled at Largs in 1813 and wrote an "Essay on Curling," published in 1833.

The most modern and most comprehensive book on Curling was published in 1890, under the auspices of the Royal Club—"The History of Curling," by the Rev. John Kerr, minister of Dirleton.

There are no records of the Ayr and Alloway Agricultural Curling Club before the annual meeting held at the Star Hotel on Tuesday, 14th November, 1882. Of the seventeen members present, the only survivor is Colonel J. M. M. Morton, the present Provost of Ayr. The Club consisted of sixty-one members. Mr. David White was Secretary, Mr. C. G. Shaw was President, and Mr. James Hutchison Vice-President.

It is certain that the Club and pond existed and that there was constant curling many years before this date.

By the courtesy of the Secretary of the Ayr Club I have been allowed to search their records, but there is little information to be gained except the fact that the Agricultural Club existed and joined in the making of the Rozelle Pond in 1853.

The Ayr Club was founded in 1820, and curled at first on the Ayr Dam and later on at "the pond near Burns Monument," a pond at the Racecourse, a pond at the Old Toll, a pond at Glengall, and a pond at Burnton.

At a meeting of the Ayr Club on 28th October, 1853, the idea of a new pond at Slaphouse took shape, and we find the first reference to the Agricultural Club. A joint arrangement was made, and the lease was signed in November, 1854.

It is unfortunate that the Ayr Club records are chiefly concerned with the annual meetings, and the records of games are few and far between.

Though Lady Jane Hamilton was elected Patroness of the Club in 1853, there is no record of her giving a medal to be played for between the Ayr Club and Agricultural Club, and the first mention of it is a game on 28th December, 1870, when the Ayr Club "regained" the medal.

I should imagine that the pond near Burns Monument referred to above was a flush where the mill stream to the Dutch mill leaves the river.



During the season 1882-83 there were only four days' curling. The Lady Jane Hamilton medal was played for on 14th December by the A. and A.A.C.C. and the Ayr Club on Castlehill Pond and won by the former with 86 shots against 73. The Club medal was played for on 15th December, Mr. J. M. M. Morton's rink defeating Mr. James Hutchison's by one shot.

1883-84.—There was no curling.

1884-85.—Six rinks competed for the Club medal on 17th January, Mr. Hart's rink beating Mr. Dickie's in the final. A match was played against Dalrymple (six rinks) at Hollybush Pond on 23rd January, Dalrymple winning by four shots.

1885-86.—There was curling on 18th and 19th November. On 10th December the Club medal was won by Mr. James Hutchison's rink, beating Mr. Stewart's by 15 to 9. On 5th February Mr. Hutchison's rink also won the McCreath medal, beating Mr. J. Hannah's by 14 to 5.

1886-87.—On 6th February the Ayr Club won the Lady Jane Hamilton medal by 25 shots. Six rinks played for the Club medal, the final tie being played on 15th January, when Mr. Hutchison beat Mr. Inglis by 17 to 6. On 10th January five rinks beat Dalrymple

by four shots. On 15th January the McCreath medal was won by Mr. J. Steel's rink ; and on the 17th the Club was beaten (seven rinks) by King Coil (Coylton) by sixty shots.

1887-88.—This was a red-letter year in the annals of the Club, as for the first and only time they won the Eglington County Jug. On December 26th the first ties were played on Barneil Pond, Kirkmichael, when Mr. Hutchison's rink beat Patua and Kirkmichael, and thus became champion rink of the district. In the final ties between the four district champion rinks, played at Craufurdland Loch on February 18th, Mr. Hutchison's rink beat Kilwinning by five shots, and in the final beat Auchinleck by two shots and won the Jug. Mr Hutchison's rink was:—Skip and lead, James Hutchison ; 2, J. B. Fergusson ; 3, John Steel ; 4, David White. On 29th December five rinks played Dalrymple and were beaten by 18 shots. The Club medal was won on 30th December by Mr. Inglis's rink. On 16th February Mr. Hart's rink won the McCreath medal. The A. and A.A.C.C. beat the Ayr Club by 37 shots on 20th February ; on 24th were beaten by the Fairywell Club by 14 ; and on the 25th five rinks beat King Coil by 18 shots on Martnaham Loch.

1888-89.—Mr. C. G. Shaw, President ; Mr. J. B. Fergusson, Vice-President. Very little frost ; three days' play, but no matches.

1889-90.—Again only three days' play and no matches.

1890-91.—December 27th, Mr. D. Reid's rink in the final beat Mr. J. Steel's rink and won the Club medal ; December 29th, beat the Ayr Club by 24 shots ; January 1st, Mr. Hart's rink won the McCreath medal. On January 8th the Club (five rinks) was beaten by King Coil by 6 shots, and on January 10th beat Dalrymple Club by 50 shots.

1891-92.—Mr. J. B. Fergusson, President ; Provost Shankland, Vice-President. On January 11th seven rinks played for the Club medal, the winners being the Newark rink, skipped by Mr. D. Reid ; 13th January, Mr. W. C. Inglis's rink won the McCreath medal ; 14th. four rinks playing the Ayr Club won by 33 shots ; 22nd February, five rinks beat Ayr Victoria by 21 shots ; 23rd February, five rinks beat Fairywell by 59 shots. There was some play this year as late as 14th March.

1892-93.—26th December, six rinks for Club medal, won by Mr. D. Reid ; 28th December, four rinks lost one shot to Dalrymple ; 31st December, four rinks beat Ayr Club by 43 shots ; 3rd January,

McCreath medal won by Mr. C. L. Orr Ewing's rink ; 4th January, six rinks beat Ailsa by 23 shots ; 6th January, six rinks beat Victoria Albert by 27 shots ; 7th January, Mr. D. Reid's won Mrs. J. B. Fergusson's Prize ; 12th January, four rinks beat Fairywell by 40 ; 13th January, six rinks lost 14 shots to Stair.

1893-94.—8th January, lost 14 shots to Ayr Club.

1894-95.—Mr. J. B. Fergusson, President ; Mr. R. Niven, Vice-President. 10th January, six rinks beat Ayr by 12 ; 11th January, five rinks lost 11 shots to Dalrymple. 12th January—Six rinks beat Victoria Albert by 3 ; the Club medal and four silk umbrellas presented by Mr. Niven were won by his rink ; McCreath medal and four pairs of sleeve links presented by Mrs. Fergusson, won by Mr. Niven's rink ; a carriage clock, presented by Col. Williamson, won by Mr. Fergusson's rink. 26th January, four rinks beat Patna by 27 ; 28th January, six rinks beat Stair by 56 shots ; 29th January, six rinks lost 28 shots to Prestwick ; 30th January, seven rinks beat Ailsa by 28 ; 31st January, a match against Maybole with six rinks ended in a draw—120 shots each ; 2nd February, six rinks lost 41 shots to Coylton ; 4th February, five rinks lost 4 shots to Dalnellington ; 6th February, six rinks beat Dailly by 6 shots ; 9th February, lost 2 shots to six rinks from Monkton ; 13th February, beat Fairywell, six rinks, by 46. On 14th February a match for a silver cup, presented by Mr. Orr Ewing, to be played for by the four Ayr clubs, resulted in Victoria Albert beating Ayr by 15 shots, and Ayr and Alloway beating Ailsa by 13. In the final Victoria Albert beat Ayr and Alloway by 4 shots. On 20th February six rinks from Crosshill won by 8 shots.

In 1895 the Club joined the Royal Caledonian Curling Club.

1895-96.—No ice.

1896-97.—On 21st December five rinks playing for the Lady Jane Hamilton medal won by 4 shots. The Orr Ewing Cup was played for on 18th January. Ayr and Alloway beat Victoria Albert by 18, and Ailsa beat Ayr by 22. In the final Ayr and Alloway tied with Ailsa at 49 shots each. On playing off the tie, seven ends, on 21st January, Ailsa won by 2 shots. On the same day seven rinks of the two clubs played a match, when Ayr and Alloway won by 106 shots to 97. On 22nd January six Prestwick rinks won by 18 shots ; 23rd January, Mr. John Hutchison's rink won the Club medal ; 26th January, five rinks were beaten 21 shots by Dalrymple. The match against Monkton on 27th January and against Patna on the day following are worth

recording. They were played on Rozelle ice, and it is noted that the ice was very bad, which evidently did not suit the Ayr and Alloway players, who did not score a single victory in eleven games. Against Monkton:—

giving Patna a majority of 84 shots. On 29th January five King Coil rinks won by 5 shots on Martnaham Loch, and on 3rd February three rinks on Sauchrie ice beat Culroy by 11 shots.

1897-98.—No play.

1898-99.—28th January, the club won the Lady Jane Hamilton medal by 64 shots; 30th January, McCreath medal won by Mr. Imrie's rink; 1st February, Club medal won by Mr. Fergusson's rink. On 2nd February, playing for the Orr Ewing Cup, Victoria Albert beat Ayr and Alloway by 4, and Ailsa beat Ayr by 20. In the final Ailsa beat Victoria Albert by 5 and won. On 3rd February five rinks beat Ailsa Club by 9 shots.

1899-1900.—On the retiral this year from active play, owing to failing health, the "grand old man" of our club, Mr. James Hutchison, Blairston, was, at a dinner held in the King's Arms Hotel, presented with a silver salver and a purse of fifty sovereigns. Mr. J. B. Fergusson was in the chair and made the presentation. A very good portrait of "Blairston" and a note of his bowling and curling records will be found in the Royal Caledonian Club Annual of 1904-05. On 7th February, for the Orr Ewing Cup, Ayr and Alloway beat Victoria Albert by 31 shots and Ailsa by 1, and won the trophy. The McCreath medal was won by Mr. Wm. Imrie. 9th February, Victoria Albert, six rinks, won by 19 shots; 10th February, five rinks, for Lady Jane Hamilton medal, beat Ayr Club by 54 shots; 12th February, five rinks

from Dalrymple won by 23 shots; 13th February, Dalmellington, six rinks, won by 27 shots. Mrs. Fergusson presented a cup, to be held by the rink making the best record in the season's club matches, and this was won by Mr. Orr Ewing's rink, skipped by Mr. D. Reid.

1900-01.—On 16th February eight rinks played for Club medal, which was won by Mr. D. White.

1901-02.—Mr. Niven, President; Mr. W. Neilson, Vice-President. On 22nd December ten rinks competed for the Club medal. In the final tie Mr. D. White beat Mr. G. Steel. 1st February, five rinks of Ayr and Alloway beat Ayr Club by 41 shots for the Lady Jane Hamilton medal; 12th and 13th February—Orr Ewing Cup—Ayr and Alloway beat Ailsa by 19 shots, and were beaten by 19 shots by Victoria Albert, who won; 14th February, five rinks from Maybole won by 8 shots; 17th February, a Royal Caledonian Club medal was played for on Rozelle ice, when three Ayr and Alloway rinks were beaten 23 shots by a Dalry rink. On 18th February nine rinks played down for "Blairston's" prize, which was won by Mr. White's rink. The members of the rink competed at points, when Mr. J. F. McGill won. Mr. White's rink also won Mrs. Fergusson's prize.

1902-03.—At the annual meeting on 14th October Mr. David White resigned the office of Secretary and Treasurer. The Chairman, Mr. Fergusson, expressed the great regret of the members, and a very hearty vote of thanks was passed to Mr. White, who had discharged the duties of his office with great efficiency for twenty years. Mr. James Wilkinson was appointed Secretary and Treasurer, and Mr. Peter Murdoch, Deputy. An addition was made to the Club-house at a cost of £27 10s. On 10th December the Club medal was won by Mr. Steel's rink; 12th December, five rinks were 43 shots down to Dalrymple; 15th January, Lady Jane Hamilton medal won by Ayr Club by 15. The Orr Ewing Trophy was won by Ayr Club, who beat Ailsa by 12 shots and Victoria Albert by 5. Ayr and Alloway were 33 shots down to Victoria Albert. On 16th January nineteen members played at points for a prize given by Mr. R. A. King, and Mr. W. Imrie won. The McCreath medal was won on the same day by Mr. T. P. Wilson's rink. At Maybole, on 17th January, Ayr and Alloway were down six shots on five rinks. On 19th January five rinks beat Monkton by eight shots. Mr. Gilbert Steel's rink won Mrs. Fergusson's Cup.

1903-04.—No play.

1904-05.—Mr. W. Neilson, President; Mr. Niven, Vice-President. The Chairman made feeling reference to the death of Mr. James

Hutchison, Blairston. The Club medal, won by Mr. King's rink on 26th November, was the only game this season.

1905-06.—Mr. George Coats, President; Mr. Niven, Vice-President. No ice.

1906-07.—Mr. Niven, President; Mr. R. A. King, Vice-President. On 6th February the Club medal was won by Mr. John Hutchison's rink, and on the 7th the Club won the Lady Jane Hamilton medal by 14 shots.

1907-08.—At the annual meeting Mr. Wilkinson was thanked on retiring from the office of Secretary and Treasurer, and Mr. Matthew Miller was appointed. On 13th January the Club medal was won by Mr. J. B. Fergusson's rink, beating Mr Gilbert Steel by one shot.

1908-09.—Mr. Niven, President; Mr. Johnstone, Vice-President. No ice.

A team of Canadian Curlers visited Scotland in February, 1909, and came to Ayr. Unfortunately there was no ice. They were entertained by local curlers at the Burns Monument Hotel on 22nd February.

1909-1910.—Mr. Miller resigned the office of Secretary and Treasurer, and Mr. Arbuckle was appointed. 18th November, McCreath medal won by Mr. Peter Murdoch's rink; 19th November, Club medal won by Mr. Steel's rink, beating Mr. Fergusson's rink in the final by 2 shots; 22nd November, Orr Ewing Trophy—Ayr and Alloway beat Victoria Albert by 14, Ayr beat Ailsa by 26, and in the final Ayr and Alloway beat Ayr by 10; 26th January, points game for Mr. Coats's Curling Stones won by Mr. G. Steel; 28th January, Lady Jane Hamilton medal won by 56 shots; 29th January, beat five Monkton rinks by 18. Mrs. Fergusson's Cup was won by Mr D. Cellars' rink.

1910-11.—Mr. Niven, President; Mr. J. B. Fergusson, Vice-President. No play.

1911-12.—Mr. Neilson, President; Mr. J. B. Fergusson, Vice-President. 3rd February, Club medal—Mr. D. Cellars beat Mr. Fergusson by 40 to 39 shots; 5th February, beat Kirkmichael by 5 shots; 7th February, McCreath medal won by Mr. Wallace's rink.

1912-13.—Mr. J. B. Fergusson, President; Mr. J. G. Walker, Vice-President; Mr. J. F. McGill, Secretary and Treasurer. The meeting expressed regret at the death of their Secretary, Mr. Wm. Arbuckle. There was no curling this season.

1913-14.—21st January, Club medal won by Mr. Fergusson, beating Mr. T. Macnaughton by 1 shot; 22nd January, McCreath medal won by Mr. J. G. Walker's rink.

1914-15.—Mr. J. G. Walker, President; Mr. J. Kennedy, Vice-President. No curling.

1915-16.—Mr. McGill was thanked on resigning office of Secretary and Treasurer, and Mr. J. W. Carnegie was appointed. 18th November, Club medal won by Mr. J. Wilson; 19th November, McCreath medal won by Mr. J. Carnegie; 20th November, four rinks beat Dalrymple 4 shots; 22nd November, five rinks beat Coylton 2 shots; 24th November, five rinks beat Fairywell 26 shots; 25th November, four rinks lost 26 shots to Dalruellington; 27th November, four rinks beat Stair by 18 shots.

1916-17.—Mr. J. G. Walker, President; Mr. Niven, Vice-President. 24th January, Club medal won by Mr. A. Cameron; 25th January, McCreath medal won by Mr. Cellars; 31st January, Red Cross Game made £5 11s. for Carrick House Hospital; 7th February, three rinks lost 19 shots to Dalrymple; 8th February, four rinks were 43 up on Maybole; 17th February, three rinks were one shot down to Dalrymple when thaw came on, and two rinks could not finish.

1917-18.—No curling.

1918-19.—Mr. J. G. Walker, President; Mr. Cellars, Vice-President. On 14th February nine rinks competed for Club medal, which was won by Mr. Cellars' rink.
