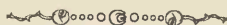

The Objects of the Bazaar.



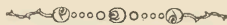
THE MEMBERS OF THE BRECHIN CRICKET CLUB cordially invite the interest and co-operation of their friends in the BAZAAR which they propose to hold in SEPTEMBER, 1927—the actual date to be announced later.

The Bazaar is being promoted for the purpose of raising the necessary funds for laying out and equipping Guthrie Park as a cricket field for the Club. During the War the Club's former ground was sacrificed for national purposes, being put under cultivation, and the opportunity of again acquiring a private ground has only now arisen.

The BRECHIN CRICKET CLUB has a long and honourable history, and for many years was one of the leading Clubs in Scotland. It is the oldest recreational club in the City, and has given pleasure to several generations of Brechin people. Since its revival two years ago, the Membership has increased rapidly, and a large and enthusiastic body of players has been gathered together. With an up-to-date enclosure, properly equipped, the Committee are confident that the Club will, in a very short time, again take its place amongst the leading Clubs in Scotland.

To carry out the scheme properly a sum of approximately £2000 will be required, and the Committee appeal to all interested to support them in this effort, which will not only provide a Ground and adequate Pavilion Accommodation for the Club, but will also substantially add to the amenities of the City. It will be seen that a number of local Ladies and Gentlemen have agreed to act as Stallholders, and Contributions in money or Goods will be gratefully received and acknowledged by any of them or by the undersigned

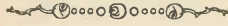

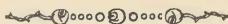

Letters to the Editor

Annals of Brechin Cricket

Sir,—Many of the readers of the "Annals of Brechin Cricket," which appeared in your esteemed paper during the course of last year must have been delighted to read the announcement in your "Side lights" column a few weeks ago that they were to be published by subscription in book form, provided subscribers come forward in sufficient numbers to cover the cost of the undertaking. I have been making inquiries and find that the book will be in many ways more interesting than the original annals, as Mr O'Neil is still gathering information from all quarters, especially of the Cricket played in Forfarshire in the '60s and '70s of last century. The articles which appeared in your columns are to be re-cast, and will be in a sense a history of cricket in the county, and also touch upon cricket and cricketers further afield. Portraits of outstanding players and group illustrations will be an outstanding feature, and the tables of statistics will be a never ending source of information for years to come—the final arbiter in every argument, and clearing-house for hazy recollections. I think it is well that your readers should know all this.

The Earl of Strathmore, who has always shown a warm regard for Brechin Cricket, has taken a deep interest in the "Annals," and written an introduction which in itself is sure to be valuable. I learn that the names of Brechin subscribers are so far only coming in slowly, whereas there is a considerable demand from people in other towns, old cricketers and others. Might I remind those who received copies of the prospectus and laid it aside with the intention to order the book when it appeared in print, that the only way to ENSURE publication is by ordering their copies NOW. It is nearly 30 years ago since a book appeared on Scottish Cricket (mostly treating of Glasgow and District Clubs) and it will be a credit to the City to produce a companion volume which will embrace the leading Forfarshire and North Eastern Clubs. It is undoubtedly an honour to our City to have had such a notable Cricket Club, and it is not surprising to find that the "Annals" are attracting prospective purchasers from all classes in other towns. It is surely "up to" all who are proud of their city, and of an effort such as this, who can spare the price of a couple of theatre or dance tickets, to hasten the publication of the "Annals of Brechin Cricket" by filling up the subscription forms at once. The volume will make a splendid gift book, and I amongst others have ordered several copies for that purpose.
