Fifty Jeans Play at Philiphaugh

FOR the long period of 72 years the game of Cricket has flourished in the Royal Burgh of Selkirk, and for the past fifty years the game has been played on the present beautifully situated, and historic field at Philiphaugh. To nearly every "Souter" the game of cricket, and the Selkirk Cricket Club has been a very real thing, and the game in all its aspects has been taken very seriously, and except for the annual Common-Riding Festival, there is nothing that has for so many years enjoyed the whole-hearted support of the Souter community to the same extent as the well-known Selkirk Cricket Club. What tales are still told of the Cricket Tours to the North, South, East and West, and of the old-fashioned Four-in-hand Coach drives to Langholm, Moffat, Kelso, Peebles, Monteviot, Hawick and Abbotsford.

Like other clubs the Selkirk Cricket Club has had its Ups and Downs, and lean years, but there has been no break; and few clubs in Scotland have enjoyed so many years of victorious prosperity right up to the "Great War" of 1914. Since the War lean years have been experienced, as the Souters gave their very best of everything to their King and Country, and four of our leading cricketers made the supreme sacrifice, so that even in our recent defeats there is a thread of Glory, as there is little doubt that but for this great sacrifice Selkirk would since the war have had one of the strongest sides that ever represented the Club. These cricket heroes played the game in the piping times of peace, and when the call came they were ready and willing to play for their country the more serious game of War-even unto Death. We miss them sair, but rejoice to know that they died fighting-their's was a hero's, a sportman's death. As I stood beside the small wooden cross in Bailleu Cemetary where Willie Grieve lies peacefully at rest my thoughts flew back to two other graves in Brierylaw where James and George Grieve lie, cut off in the bloom of youth, without even a "fighting chance": and I could not help thinking that, had it come to a choice, both James and George would have preferred the battlefield death of Willie and Walter. We regret and mourn the loss of such stalwarts as Morris Lumgair, James Milligan, Willie and Walter Grieve, but we must also obey the orders of nature and 'carry on,' and in due course there is no doubt a new generation will arise able and willing to bring back some of the old-time prosperity to our famous club.

When Cricket was first introduced to Selkirk the game was played on public ground down by the side of the river Ettrick, but in 1872 the Club moved to their present ground at Philiphaugh, and the new field was formally opened on June by a visit of Scotland's premier club the "Grange." Selkirk delighted their supporters by scoring a fine opening victory the scores being—Grange 76 runs, Selkirk IOI runs.

Gradually the club got into a better list of fixtures, and regular matches were played against the Grange, Dalkeith, Loretto, Lasswade, Leith Caledonian, Kelso, Craigmount, Bowhill, Gala, and Hawick. The Souters proved themselves quite worthy opponents for all these clubs, and they kept winning more matches than they lost. Mr R. Lees, an old player and club secretary wrote a fine descriptive article on the early doings of Selkirk Cricket Club in the "Jubilee Book," and I will refrain from touching on those early years at Philiphaugh, as they were so ably treated by one with a personal knowledge of the players at that time. I may say however that Mr Lees himself headed the bowling averages on more occasions than any other player, and this is one thing he did not tell us.

In 1886 the New Pavilion was opened by the Edinburgh Academicals, and again the Souters rose to the occasion and scored a good victory, the scores being—Academicals 62, Selkirk 156 (G. T. Scott 44 not out). This year also saw the record score for the ground made against Hexham. Selkirk's huge total was 355 for 9 wickets. Parratt, one of the best allround professionals Selkirk ever had, scored 124 runs. This was the first century scored on the new ground, although the same player had scored 106 not out against Edinburgh Academicals at Edinburgh the previous year.

In 1888 Tom McBain headed the Scottish bowling averages with 69 wickets, at an average of 4.7 per wicket. The new rule allowing a club to close their innings was first adopted at Philiphaugh by Edinburgh University, who closed their innings with 200 runs for 2 wickets. This was in 1889.

In the two seasons 1888 and 1889 Selkirk played 37 matches, and only four teams registered a hundred runs against them. Hawick had one of the finest sides they ever put on the field in 1888, and up to July 14 had never been defeated; but the Souters broke their record at Philiphaugh, the scores being— Hawick 67, Selkirk 69 for 8 wickets. The following were the names of players in each team :—Selkirk —W. Robertson, J. Nicholson, J. Anderson, A. Dryden, W. Heron, T. McBain, A. Mahone, A. McBain, J. Macaulay and R. Harvey with Burrows (Prof.); Hawick—T. Pride, J. Montgomerie, W. Young, A. Leyden, J. Marchbank, J. Pender, A. Turnbull, W. Beattie, R. Oliver, W. Pender and Hutsby (Prof.)

In 1891 Selkirk made another bit of history by bundling the whole Hawick eleven out for only 12 runs—a record for the ground. Cartwright, the Selkirk Prof. had 5 wickets for 5 runs, and Tom McBain 5 wickets for 6 runs. Except Leyden, who was caught, all the Hawick players were clean bowled. The Selkirk score was 72 runs. Alex Dryden made a record this year for the highest number of runs scored in a season, his total being 445, and his highest score 124. His average for the season was 28. The field at that time was not cut except the square, and runs were difficult to get.

In '92 Edinburgh Australasians paid their first visit to Selkirk, and a grand match resulted in a Colonial victory by two runs. In this year the Clydesdale club were carrying everything before them and came to Selkirk on July 15 undefeated. But the "Souters" smashed their record, and put the whole side out for only 33 runs, T. McBain having 6 wickets for 17 runs. The Selkirk score was 65 runs.

In 1893 Selkirk went through the whole season without being defeated. Their record was—Played 19, won 11, lost o, drawn 8.

In 1894-95-96-97 William Ingles, four years in succession, was at the head of the bowling averages, with 48 wickets at 5.5, 53 wickets at 6.6, 48 wickets at 8.16, and 44 wickets at 5.63. His finest performance was at Edinburgh in '96, when he had 8 wickets for 6 runs against Carlton, whose whole side were out for 21 runs. In the same year he had 7 wickets for 13 runs against Hawick.

In 1895 the Border League was formed, and Selkirk won the first year: also in 1897-98-99,—1903-5-6 -8,—1913-14, 1919 and 1922. Their league record of the three successive years 97, 98 99 and 22 may never again be equalled.

The year 1898 was one of the most successful, probably being better than the undefeated year, and Bob Anderson, the popular Captain, was decidedly unlucky to loss the Grange match—the only defeat of the year. It was played at Edinburgh on the Common-Riding day, when the team were anything but fit after the morning's Festivities. The club's record this season was-Played 21, won 14, lost 1 and Amongst the victories was one over a 6 draws. strong Forfarshire side who that season paid their first and only visit to Philiphaugh. The scores were -Forfarshire 154, Selkirk 160 for 8 wickets. lim Sanderson was the hero of this match, and a wit has said this was the reason Jim ultimately married a Forfarshire lady. The last League match of this season was against Hawick at Buccleuch Park. The "Souters" had won all the other seven League matches, and by defeating the Teries by 127 to 63 they not only won the League but established a record that could not be beaten.

That was a great night in "Souterdom." Practically every man woman and child were up the Hawick Road awaiting the return of the victorious "Souters." The town's band were also ready to play the "conquering heroes" home. When the fine four-in-hand coach appeared the enthusiasm was unbounded. The horses were taken out of the famous 'Ettrick Shepherd' coach and drawn by willing hands down Tower Street, along the High Street to the Market Place, with the Brass Band in front. Hundreds of spectators lined the streets, and the scene will not readily be forgotten. In the Market Place the Captain was carried shoulderhigh and the band played "Up wi' the Souters" That was "some night" in Selkirk. The following was the Selkirk team—R. Anderson, A. Dryden, A. Linton, W. Robertson, J. Davidson, W. Scott, J. Sanderson, J. Mathieson, T. McBain, R. Harvey and Firth (Prof.)

Season 1899 was more of a lean year, the fixture card being rather poor. What the first eleven lacked however the second eleven more than made up for, as this was undoubtedly one of the best elevens that ever played for Selkirk. The team went through the whole season with only one defeat. In a successful north tour the Selkirk youths inflicted a severe defeat upon Perthshire 2nd on the North Inch. Ten out of the eleven players had an average of double figures at the end of the season—George Linton heading the batting and James Grieve the bowling. I was proud to captain such a fine side.

1900, the Jubilee year of the club was an important landmark in the history of the club. The tit bit of the season was the Jubilee match on September 22, when there was not only some fine cricket, but one of the largest crowds ever seen at a sporting event in Selkirk. The match was fully dealt with in the Jubilee Book, but it is again worth while stating that besides the cream of Border cricketers four famous Yorkshire County players—Rhodes, Haigh, Denton and Tunniecliffe took part in the match. In this season young James Grieve was the Champion Amateur bowler of Scotland with an average of 65 wickets for 5.24 per wicket.

The following year the chief events were a tour in the West and a visit to Selkirk of several Leicestershire County players who played for Mr S. Strang-Steel's xI. These were Knight, Whitehead, and Brown. In this match Selkirk put up a great stand for one wicket, scoring 212 runs-Blacklock having 105 not out to his credit. In the West tour against Paisley Kelburne the Souters gave one of the finest batting exhibitions ever seen in the Cotton Thread town. The Selkirk score was 259 runs for 4 wickets. Adam Linton kept driving them along the carpet in his best style, making 105 not out, while Willie Robertson, the Selkirk "swiper" kept sending them out of the field on to the house tops, and he had 97 runs nearly all boundary hits. It was hard luck to be bowled three runs short of his century. This season Andrew Blacklock scored 656 runs for the season in club matches, and had an average of 43-73 which were both club records.

In 1902 I greatly extended the fixture list from the previous seasons and included Carlisle, Cupar, Uddingston, Drumpellier, Brechin, Aberdeenshire, Perth-

shire, Stenhousemuir, Kirkcaldy and Paisley Fergusle; also the tit bit of the season Kirkheaton (Yorkshire) with Rhodes and Hirst, who both came out of the Kirkheaton club. The match was a grand financial success, as after paying the £25 guarantee, about £15 was left over. At Aberdeen the team were all out for 9 runs; but there was some excuse for the players after having a long night journey to the Granite City they were hardly fit to face Webster, the fastest and best bowler in Scotland at the time.

1903 was another important season, the great event being a visit of Lancashire County to Philiphaugh to play a South of Scotland side. The County brought north their strongest available side, and the Borderers came through the match with great credit. The full scores and details of this important event are given in this book. Another important match this season was South of Scotland v. North of Ireland Cricket Union. This match is also given later on. It was most unfortunate that both these big events were badly favoured as regards weather. The Selkirk club were taking all the responsibility for these matches in an endeavour to improve Border cricket, but luck was against them. Had good weather favoured these matches there is no doubt the club would have been able to repeat the fixtures in succeeding years.

Season 1904 was one of the worst in the history of the club, only five matches being won and twelve lost, which was a record; and yet the few victories were over good clubs-Hawick, Stewart's F. P., Uddingston and St. Boswells (twice). The most important event of the season was a visit from the M.C.C. captained by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, the famous author and fine cricketer. Young Willie Grieve, fresh from the second eleven, bowled magnificently, taking 5 wickets for 26 runs. The full details of this match are given in another part. The following year saw the club regain some of its lost glory, eleven matches being won and only three lost. In the list of victories were the Grange and Drumpellier, also Gala twice, while a third match with the "Braw Braw Lads" ended in a tie-109 runs each.

1906 was another good year, with eleven victories and only four losses. In this season Hawick was out for 19 runs, and Edinburgh University for 21 runs. The year following was scarcely so good—won nine and lost six. St. Boswells was dismissed for 15 runs and 32 runs, Leith Caledonian 33 runs, Melrose 35 and Hawick 39; but the next year was one of the best, only two matches being lost and ten won During the season three individual centuries were scored—Walter Grieve 138 not out against Greencck, Willie Grieve 133 not out against Gala, and Palmer (Prof.) 110 against Mr Laidlaw's x1.

In 1909 the Souters won ten and lost nine matches. Kelso were all out for 17 runs, and the famous Drumpellier club for 36 runs. Against Wholley—a famous Lancashire League Club—Selkirk's total was 260 for 4 wickets. Fine victories were recorded over the Grange, Edinburgh University and Drumpellier. The following year was just a reverse of the above, nine wins and ten losses. The most noteworthy thing accomplished was by Lane, the professional, equalling Buchanan's record of 80 wickets for the season. His average, however, was not so good as the old Drumpellier man's average was—4.8 against 10.00.

Season 1911 was also quite a creditable one, only three matches being lost and seven won. Selkirk for the third year in succession defeated the Grange, a feat that has seldom if ever been accomplished by any other Scottish club. Several big scores were recorded this year;—against St. Boswells 295 for 9, against Gala 256 for 8, against Poloc 214 for 6, against Motherwell 218 for 8, and 211 against the Grange. The Selkirk totals in exactly half the 16 matches played was over 200 runs, and again three individual centuries was recorded—Walter Grieve 127 against Hawick, G. Linton 117 against the Grange, and Ward (prof.) 100 not out against the Pentland. One of the best matches of the season was against Perthshire, whose team included Benskin a famous English County bowler; but Walter Grieve showed no fears for the County man, and had a magnificent 65 runs to his credit. With 185 runs for 7 wickets Selkirk closed their innings leaving Perthshire two hours to bat. The North County went out to win taking risks, and just before time had won the match scoring 192 for 5 wickets, J. A. Ferguson, the Scottish International player having 31 not out.

1912 was pretty equal for runs, losses and drawn games, the highest Selkirk total of the season being made against Edinburgh University 254 for 4 wickets. The following season was pretty similar, the best event being a narrow and exciting victory over the Grange by one run, the scores being 98 and 97. Against Gala a record score was put up at Mossilee for this match, the Souters total being 305 for 8. This was Willie Grieve's best year. He scored in club matches 610 runs with an average of 35.88.

In 1914 the Great War permaturely brought the cricket season to a close, and the last match before the war was played at Berwick-on-Tweed when Selkirk won, the score being—Selkirk 203, Berwick 113. Willie Grieve for the fourth time headed the batting averages, with Walter Grieve second. This was destined to be the last season of these two famous cricketers, as along with Mouris Lumgair and James Milligan they were bowled out in the Great European Tragedy of 1914-19.

During the war a few games were played to raise funds for war purposes, but cricket for cricket's sake was dead during those long dark years. After the Armistice in 1919 the Selkirk Cricket Club was able to resume in a moderate way through the generosity of friends, who cleared the club of accumulated liabilities, and gave the summer game a fresh start. But even yet after four years the club has not recovered from the effects of the war, as cricketers are not made in a day. In 1920 John Grieve, the famous Selkirk-Gala-Poloc and Scottish cricketer, came home on holiday, and created a record for Border cricket by scoring 1011 runs for the season. In 1921 the veteran Adam Linton brought out another record for the club by scoring 746 for the season. This was not a Border record, however, for club cricket, as Jim Mercer, Gala, still holds that with 808 in season 1897. The present season 1922 has so far been uneventful, quite a number of matches having been abandoned owing to rain. The club however has won the Border Championship for the twelfth time. Selkirk Cricket Club are honoured in having in their team W. E. Bryce. the Scottish International Scrum-half as Captain, and if good weather favours the "Jubilee Match" at Philiphaugh on Saturday, September 9th, when a Border xI will oppose Major S. Strang-Steel's XI, cricket may get the necessary tonic to revive the game, and bring back some of the old-time glory and honour to the Selkirk Cricket Club, and the beautiful historic ground at Philiphaugh, so picturesquely situated amidst the verdant surroundings of the old Ettrick Forest, and on which the club has now played for fifty years.

SELKIRK INTERNATIONAL CRICKETERS.

T. W. LANG-

Probably the finest all-round cricketer Selkirk ever produced. He played for Selkirk, Grange, Scotland, Clifton College, Oxford and Gloucestershire.

A. BLACKLOCK-

WM. GRIEVE-

JOHN GRIEVE-

Developed into a real good batsman, and besides being a good change bowler was Scotland's Wicket-keeper for several years. He held the record average for Selkirk C. C. before the war. Played for Selkirk, Jedburgh, Motherwell and Scotland.

Undoubtly the finest all-round player of this famous family, five brothers of whom played for Selkirk. On four occasions he headed the batting averages. Played for Selkirk and Scotland.

A very fine forcing batsman, good change bowler and safe fielder. In 1921 he made a record in Border cricket by scoring over 1000 runs for the season. He played for Selkirk, Gala, Poloc and Scotland

WALTER G. GRIEVE—The third brother to represent his country. Was a strong forcing bat and a useful bowler. He played for Selkirk and Scotland.

Besides those who played for Scotland, there have been many outstanding players. Tom McBain as an all-rounder must be classed along with T. W. Lang and Willie Grieve. Alexander Dryden was the most polished and stylish batsman the club ever produced. William Ingles, Walter Heron, Robert Harvey and Richard Lees were all at different times at the top, not only of their club bowling averages, but leaders in the Scottish Amateur averages. The brothers Leithead were for many years the back-bone of the club along with the two Lintons, Willie and Walter, and the mantle of the latter has fallen upon his three sons, still at the height of their fame. Adam Linton has served the club well for over 26 years, scoring seven centuries and more half centuries than any other cricketer playing regular in border cricket. His brother George is also a fine player, and the best all-round Linton of the lot. Walter the youngest brother now plays for Poloc, and is considered one of the best batsmen in the West. W. Robertson, John and Robert Anderson were great hitters and could always be relied upon to put several balls out of the field every season. Walter Scott was a pretty bat, and Dr Dixon the best left-hand batsman the club ever had. George Emond is a good

wicket keeper and fine bat and still as good as ever. C. H. Alexander was a very fast bowler, while John Mathison and T. H. Scott were good medium pace bowlers. It would take up several pages to name all those really worthy of notice, but space is limited.

Of Professionals Selkirk have had some really fine men. Owen Firth was undoubtly the best bowler, and Dan Boddy the finest bat, while Parratt and Buchannan were the best all-round professionals.

The Selkirk C. C. has always had some Liberal Patrons, energetic Office-bearers, and keen enthusiastic followers. Amongst these may be mentioned—The Duke of Buccleuch, Sir John Murray, W. Strang-Steel, Major S. Strang-Steel, A. F. Roberts, T. Craig-Brown, D. C. Alexander, G. Dryden, R. Lees, R. C. Dunn, James Macauley, John Roberts, Provost Crichton, James Lewis, G. T. Scott, Geo. Crichton, W. Mathison, T. Dickson, W. Ballantyne, J. B. Hope, Wm. Lawrie, John McBain, W. Brown, A. Douglas, James Grieve, Sen., C. Gibson, G. Anderson, &c.

JUBILEE MATCH

Played at Selkirk, 9th September, 1922, to celebrate the fifty years tenure of Selkirk Cricket Club on their beautiful ground at Philiphaugh. The match was between Major S. Strang Steel's Team and a Border Counties' Team Captained by W. E. Bryce, Selkirk, the Scottish International Rugby player. Several English County players took part, and all the leading Border Cricketers. The weather was fine, but cold, and the attendance numbered about 3000, while a collection at the gate yielded nearly £72. Amongst the spectators were the Earl and Countess of Home, Earl and Countess of Minto, Countess of Dalkeith. Lady Sybil Mpps, General Babington, Major and Mrs C. H. Scott Plummer, Mrs Strang Steel, Mrs F. S. W. Cornwallis and Miss Cornwallis, Mr and Mrs Laidlaw, Sir Joseph and Lady Dobbie, A. F. Roberts, Esq., and many other well known Border gentry. There was also present many old cricketers including G. Leithead, W. Anderson, and G. T. Scott, who had played in the opening match fifty years previous, while R. Linton, who was scorer on that occasion also

scored the first few overs of this match. Unfortunately R. Lees the only other surviving player of fifty years ago was unable to make the long journey from London. Amongst old Border cricketers present were W. Heron, James Hay, A. M. Grieve, Adam Turnbull, James Leithead, James Watson, John Anderson, senior and junior, and many other old local players. The Jubilee Match was in every respect one of the most successful functions ever held at Philiphaugh. Major Steel entertained both teams and the Veterans to luncheon. SOUTH OF SCOTLAND TEAM & NORTHERN CRICKET UNION OF IRELAND. Played at Selkirk 1903.






