Arrived a French Mail.

Venice, March 8.

His Serenity the Doge Signior Pietro Grimani, died on the 6th Instant, of an Inflammation in his Head and Breast, in the 75th Year of his Age. He filled this high Office eleven Years with great Honour and Dignity, and is universally lamented by all Ranks of People for his many great and amiable Qualities.

Vienna, March 4. The Court is come to a Resolution to form two Camps in Bohemia this Summer, one in Hungary, and one at Neustadt near this City, in order to improve the Troops in military Discipline. The Army has not been for many Years in a better Condition than it is at present, being well clothed, well disciplined, and well paid, and consisting of one hundred ninety three thousand Men, exclusive of irregular Troops, and the Hungarian Militia.

Ratisbon, March 9. The Baron de Bahr, Minister from the King of Great Britain as Elector of Hanover has delivered a Memorial to the Diet, to reserve not only all the Rights of the House of Hanover to the Principality of East Friesland, but also to demand, that the King of Prussia, as Elector of Brandenburg, shall refer for the Decision of that Affair to the Judgment of the Emperor and the Aulick Council of the Empire, notwithstanding the Declaration of his Prussian Majesty, that, in the Case in Question, he would not be confined to the Judgment of that Tribunal. It is presumed that the Decision of this Affair may be attended with a great many Difficulties.

Paris, March 10. The King's regular Troops actually amount to 130,000 Foot, and about 70,000 Horse, all in excellent Order and more than sufficient Time of Peace; notwithstanding which a large Draught is ordered to be made from the Militia, to form several new Regiments, and to augment others.

Leipsich, in Germany, Feb. 16. We hear from the Village of Volkmandorff, which belongs to Baron Kez, that a Widow aged 75, pretends to be pregnant, and that the Schoolmaster of a neighbouring Village owns himself to be the Father of the Child.

Paris A la main, March 17.

The Indisposition of the Dauphiness has had no bad Consequences, and her Highness got up Yesterday for the first Time since her Accident.

Extract of a private Letter from Boulogne, March 8. 1752.

"The Jesuits have been for some Time past attempting to settle themselves in this City; being a Situation very convenient for obtaining Youth from England, for Education under those Fathers. They had gone so far as to procure a piece of Ground here, in order to erect a House for that purpose, by means of one of our Aldermen, much devoted to them. The Citizens, who know all the Tricks of these Reverend Priests, look'd upon their Establishment among them as what would be of Prejudice, and that it was their Interest by all means to oppose; and accordingly ad-

ressed his Majesty for an Arret, to prohibit the Jesuits from settling either in this City or any part of the Province: Which Arret they have obtained, to the general Joy of the Inhabitants."

L O N D O N.

The foreign Gazettes inform us, that Lord Tyrwley is charged to represent to the Court of Lisbon, That as the Products of Portugal are not sufficient to answer the Value of the Goods sent thither from the British Dominions, it is but just and natural that the Balance of Trade should be made good by the Portuguese in Gold and Silver: That the good Understanding which has so long subsisted between the 2 Nations, to their mutual Advantage, ought not to be impaired or destroyed on such Accounts: That the King of Great Britain does not doubt but his most Faithful Majesty, when informed of the true Circumstances of the Affair, will readily agree to whatever may set Things to Rights; and that if any Officers or Subjects of Great Britain have been guilty of illegal Practices, in regard to the Exportation of Specie, it is a Matter to be discussed separately, without any consequence to the general Commerce between the two Nations.

We learn from Berlin, that his Prussian Majesty intends to send a Person of Distinction with a publick Character to the Hague, who it is said will be charged with a Commission of very high Importance; and it is also whispered that we are on the very point of seeing some very surprizing Strokes of Negotiation brought to Light, but of what Kind is not proper for us to mention.

We hear that the Parliament will certainly be prorogued the 26th Instant; and that his Majesty will set out for his German Dominions on Easter Monday.

The Merchants of Amsterdam have lately received Letters from Curacoa, with an Account that Major General Sporck had been obliged to proclaim Martial Law at Surinam, and after putting the whole Colony in Arms, took such prudent Measures for reducing the revolted Negroes, that all who are not dead or Prisoners have been obliged to quit the Country, into which, by posting proper Guards, he will render it impracticable for them to return.

We hear that his Grace the Duke of Hamilton and his Dutchess will be introduced to his Majesty at St. James's on Monday next.

Yesterday Morning, at Six o'Clock, came on at Chelmsford, before the Hon. Sir Martin Wright, one of the Lords Judges of the Home Circuit, the Trial of Elizabeth Jeffreys and John Swan, for the Murder of her late Uncle Mr. Joseph Jeffreys, late of Waltham in Essex. The Trial lasted nineteen Hours, when, after the clearest circumstantial Evidence, and the Jury had been locked up an Hour, they were both found guilty, and Sentence of Death will be passed upon them with the other Prisoners. There was an amazing Concourse of People in Court, who expressed great Satisfaction at the Justice of the Verdict.

It is said that a Clause will be inserted in the Bill, to prevent the horrid Crime of Murder, whereby Parricide, and some other Species of Murder, will be made Petit Treason.

We are informed from good Authority, that upon a Report of Capt. Cranston's taking Shelter in Holland, a Courier has been dispatched to that State, soliciting them to cause him to be apprehended and delivered up to the Justice of our Laws; and it is to be hoped, that should he get from thence, the same laudable Endeavours will be used to secure him in whatsoever State or Kingdom he may fix his Residence.

It is reported, that towards the latter End of last Month he was seen at Bologn in France, going farther up the Country.

Yesterday the Knights Companions of the ancient Order of the Thistle held a Chapter at St. James's, when the Right Honourable the Earl of Dumfries was created by his Majesty a Knight of that Order, in the Room of the Duke of Buccleugh, deceased.

Yesterday came the agreeable News, that the Royal Duke, Capt. Comyns, bound to India, which ran ashore 7 Miles below Sheerness on Sunday last, was got off on Monday without any Damage.

We hear that Dunlop the Highwayman, who gave himself out to be a natural Son of the late Earl of Kilmarnock, proves to be a Son of one Thomas Dunlop, a Carpenter. He served that unfortunate Nobleman two Years in the quality of Whipper in.

We hear that the Right Hon. Lord George Hay will have the Command of the Regiment of Foot late Col. Winyard's now in Ireland.

We hear that Sampson Gideon, Esq; has purchased all the Pictures at Houghton hall, late Lord Oxford's to furnish his new-purchased Seat, late Lord Baltimore, in Kent.

No Foreign Mails since our last.

From the London Gazette, March 14.

Lisbon, Feb. 15.

'TIS confidently reported, that the Queen is again with Child. They continue to augment the Naval Force of this Kingdom, several Men of War being now actually on the Stocks, one of which, a 70 Gun Ship, is almost ready for launching. A few Days ago the Number of Workmen employed in erecting the Palace of Corte Real was considerably augmented, so that there are now no less than 1500 men employed on that Occasion.

Genoa, Feb. 26. A few Days ago some Disturbances happened in the Suburbs of Bisagno, that had like



to have been attended with fatal Consequences; to prevent which, the Government sent thither a Party of Soldiers, in order to bring the Inhabitants, who were then in Arms, to Reason; but finding that impossible, and being informed they had got a great Number of Country People to join them, the Government was obliged to give Orders for acting more rigorously against them; and accordingly several pieces of Cannon were pointed against said Suburbs, which so intimidated its mutinous Inhabitants, that they immediately laid down their Arms, and submitted to all the Demands of the Government.

Vienna, March 7. The Officers appointed for raising Recruits in the several Circles of the Empire during the Winter, have been so successful, that most of the Imperial Regiments, both Horse and Foot are already complete; and they talk of forming divers Camps during the Summer, in order to their being reviewed, and to compleat them in their new Exercise.

Hambourg, March 13. The last Advices received here from Persia, by the Way of Astracan, inform us, that the Army of Prince Heraclius, of Georgia was incamped upon a plain within a League and a half of Ispahan; and that Schach Doub had at his Approach, abandoned that City, and was retired to the Mountains on the Side of Erivan.

Paris, March 15. There has lately been more Robberies in the Streets of this City than perhaps ever were known; and, although several Persons are in Prison on that Account, yet there is scarcely a Night passes that we do not hear of some Robberies being committed, which makes it unsafe for People, even upon Business, to be out after 'tis dark.

L O N D O N.

The Courts of Madrid and Lisbon act in perfect Concert, in regard to the Protection of their Commerce, from whence great Advantages are like to arise to both Nations, and the Corsairs of Barbary begin to be under the utmost Apprehensions; more especially since their last Applications at the Porte have produced no other Answer, than that it was Time enough to expect Assistance when they were attacked in quality of Subjects to the Grand Signor, for that he never meant to protect Pyrates.

We hear that his Royal Highness Prince Edward will soon be created a Duke of this Kingdom by an ancient Title.

A few Days since a Jew Merchant was taken up on Suspicion of being concerned in, or privy to the sinking of the Ship of which Mr. Mifson was Master, in order to defraud the Insurers.

Yesterday his Majesty held a Chapter of the Garter at St. James's, when Prince Edward and the Earls Lincoln and Winchelsea were intaled in Person; and the Prince of Orange, and the Earl of Cardigan, who were abroad, by Proxies.

By a Letter from Fort St. David's, brought in the Dragon, Capt. Kent, we are informed that the Nabob in the Interest of the English Company, who is said to be a near Relation of the late Nabob of Golconda, had called upon the company for twenty thousand Rupees, towards paying his Troops, which with some of our Forces lay incamped and intrenched under Fort St. David's, not being strong enough to meet the French and the Army of their new Ally. We also hear that M. Dupleix, the French Governor General, had sent Notice to the Dutch in a little Settlement or Factory situate within the Territories ceded to the French by the new King of Golconda, that they had no Right to remain there, and desired they would depart: In consequence of which Summons many of the Dutch packed up their Effects, and embarked in a large Vessel, which unfortunately foundered at Sea, and all the People in her perished.

E D I N B U R G H, March 16.

Extract of a private Letter from London, March 10.

"Saturday last the Bill for the better preventing the horrid Crime of Murder was read a second Time in the House of Commons, and committed. Yesterday they passed the engrossed Bill for annexing certain forfeited Estates in Scotland to the Crown unalienably; as also the Bill for granting to his Majesty a certain Sum out of the Sinking Fund, and for enabling him to raise another Sum by Exchequer Bills to be charged on said Fund, for the Service of the current Year; and put off the taking into Consideration the Committee on the Bill for reducing and ascertaining the Rates for travelling in hired Post Chaises, for six Weeks.

By private Letters from the Hague, we are informed, that the Reduction and incorporating some Dutch Regiments is agreed on by the States General, but not to take Place till March 1753.

The Commission of the General Assembly met last Week. The principal Cause before them was the Settlement of Inverkeithing. The Commission in November last had appointed the Presbytery of Dumfermline to admit Mr. Andrew Richardson Minister at Inverkeithing, with Certification to the Presbytery, that if they did not execute this Sentence, the Commission would, at their next ordinary Meeting in March, proceed to very high Censures against them. The Presbytery, notwithstanding this express Appointment and Certification, did not obey. And in this State the Affair came before the Commission, by a Petition and Complaint of the Patron, Heretors and Elders of Inverkeithing, against the Presbytery. After Parties were heard, and a very long Debate among the Members, it carried by a Majority of seven Votes, to inflict no Censure on the Presbytery for their foresaid Disobedience. Against which Decision 17 Ministers and Elders dissented, and protested for Liberty to complain of it to the next General Assembly, as being contrary to the Sentence of the last Commission in November; and tending to the Subversion of all Order and Government in the Church. Thereafter the Commission appointed the Synod of Fife to execute what the Presbytery of Dumfermline had refused to do.

Edinburgh, March 17.

Extract of a private Letter from London, March 12.

"Wednesday last the House of Commons passed the Bill for the Importation of Gum Senega from any Part of Europe, on Payment of a Duty; and for Relief of James Guthrie with respect to the Duties paid & secured on a Quantity of Tobacco burnt at the Port of Kirkcudbright, and for giving further Time for the Payment of Duties omitted to be paid for the Indentures of Clerks and Apprentices. Passed the Bill to obviate Doubts that may arise on an Act of the 11th and 12th of William III. to enable his Majesty's natural born Subjects to inherit the Estates of their Ancestors, notwithstanding their Father or Mother were Aliens. That Day was presented to the House a Petition of the Merchants of London, in Name of themselves, and all other Merchants of Great Britain, praying that the Benefit of Naturalization to Foreigners be restrained for the future to the Time only that they shall reside within this Realm."

Arrived at Leith, the Britannia, Balfour, from London, with Merchant Goods.

Edinburgh, March 18.

Extract of a private Letter from London, March 14.

"Thursday last the Hon. House of Commons passed the Bill to restrain making Insurances on Foreign Ships to or from the East Indies. Yesterday they passed the Bill for the Application of a Sum therein mentioned, granted to his Majesty, for making Compensation to the Royal African Company of England,

for their Charter, Lands, Forts, &c. and to vest them and all other their Effects, in the Company of Merchants trading to Africa. Ordered to be ingrossed the Bill to prevent the spreading the Dissemper among the Horned Cattle, and passed the Bill to enable Lord Blantyre, and the Heirs of Entail for the Time being to alienate, by way of Excambion, certain Lands in the Constabulary of Haddington and Shire of Edinburgh. The Lords have agreed, without any Amendment to the Bill for repairing the Post Road from Edinburgh, through Linlithgow and Stirling, &c.

Yesterday Jean Waldie and Helen Torrence, were executed in the Grass Market, pursuant to their Sentence; Waldie acknowledged the Justice thereof, and died very penitent.

From the Aberdeen Journal, March 17.

On Tuesday, a Boat belonging to Gemry, a small Fishing-town on the Buchan coast, was lost, whereby six Men unfortunately perished.

The same Day another Fishing-boat was dashed to pieces on the Rocks of Down, near Banff, but the Crew were providentially saved.

On Thursday last John Wilkie Carrier in this Place was, by Order of the Magistrates, incarcerated for wearing Private Arms, and being suspected an Accomplice with George Gordon, now in Prison.

With great Pleasure we can inform the Publick, that last Night, in Company of some few of the Merchants of this City, it was accidentally proposed to subscribe for a Whale Fishery, and the Motion was so acceptable, that immediately, upwards of One Thousand Pounds Sterling was signed for; and it is not doubted that howsoon this is known, there will be Subscriptions from the Town and Country, and this Project have general Encouragement.

The Montrose, Graham, and the Sufannah, Lang, are safe arrived at the West Indies.

Extract of a Letter from Barrowdon in the County of Rutland, March 11.

"Mr. Edward Munton, Farmer and Graiser in this Parish, went to Market, and bought some Physick for his Children, and at the same Time some Ratsbane to make Sheep-Water; and though cautioned by the Apothecary to keep them separate, yet inadvertently gave them his Wife, without rightly apprising her of the different Papers, who locked them up, and on Sunday following, the eight infant, beats the Ratsbane, and put it into Treacle, and gives it her Children instead of the Physick: The Effects of it soon appeared, and it was not in the Power of Medicine to relieve them; two fine Girls and a Boy died by Eleven o'Clock, and the two eldest Boys only survived till about Three in the Afternoon, and on the Monday following were all buried in the same Grave, to the inexpressible Grief of the unhappy Parents."

Richard Francis Talbot, Earl of Tyrconnel, Peer of Ireland, Major General of the French King's Armies, Knight of the Royal and Military Order of St. Lewis, and Minister Plenipotentiary of his Most Christian Majesty at the Prussian Court, died at Berlin of a lingering Disease, the 12th Instant, N. S. in the 42d Year of his Age.

Sunday in the violent Storm of Wind, several Stacks of Chimneys were blown down, and in some Places the Roofs beat in, whereby many People have been terribly bruised, and some have lost their Lives; great Quantities of Lead were blown off Chelsea Hospital, the Houses on London Bridge, &c. the Head of Levi and the Feet of Abraham in the fine Window in Westminster Abby were blown out, as were the Windows in many Places: in St. James's Park, and the Villages about this Metropolis, great Numbers of Trees were demolish'd. On the River, Ships were drove from their Moorings, Lighters and Boats sunk, and several Lives lost.

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
