CORONATION DAY AT STORNOWAY.

At Stornoway the children's fête and dinner to the poor had been carried through in June, and as only the postponed portion of the programme had to be dispensed of, it was considered advisable to hold only a partial holiday.

At the outset Provost Anderson read a telegram received by him that morning intimating that the King was well and able to stand the strain of the ceremony. The news was received with loud applause.

The first part of the proceedings took the form of a religious service, at which Rev. J. Hunter, James Street U.F. Church, presided. After the singing of the Hundredth Psalm Rev. D. Mackinnon, E.C., engaged in prayer. Thereafter the first ten verses of the 72nd Psalm were sung, and Rev. Mr. Hunter read portions of Scripture.

The King himself, on the eve of his Coronation, was brought down into the very valley of the shadow of death. A great wave of sympathy swept over the land—I may even say over the world—and the prayers of an Empire went up to God for his recovery.

Break not, O woman's heart, but still endure, Break not, for thou art Royal, but endure, Remember all the beauty of that star—Which shone so close beside thee, that ye made One light together, but has passed, and left The Crown and lonely splendour. Immediately after the religious services in the Post Office Square a number of the officers-bearers and members of the Lodge Fortrose, No. 103, and merchants of the town and commercial gentlemen assembled in the Lewis Hotel, where the toast of His Majesty the King was duly honored.

I will now read the telegram which it is proposed to send to His Majesty the King, and ask you to approve by acclamation—"The inhabitants of Stornoway, in public meeting assembled, thank Almighty God for the recovery of His Majesty King Edward, and send loyal congratulations to their Majesties the King and Queen on their Coronation"—(loud applause).

Ex-Provost Smith seconded, and the resolution was enthusiastically agreed to. The National Anthem was then sung, and the gathering broke up with hearty cheers for the King and Queen.

Immediately after the religious services in the Post Office Square a number of the officers-bearers and members of the Lodge Fortrose, No. 103, and merchants of the town and commercial gentlemen assembled in the Lewis Hotel, where the toast of His Majesty the King was duly honored, as was also that of the Queen, the Army, Navy, and Colonial Forces, the Town and Trade of Stornoway. The company sang "God Save the King," "Rule Britannia," "The Red, White, and Blue," and closed the meeting with "Auld Lang Syne." A telegram was despatched in the following terms—"To General Knollys, Buckingham Palace. The Masonic brethren, merchants, and commercial gentlemen, assembled in the Lewis Hotel, Stornoway, offer fraternal greetings to His Majesty on his Coronation, and drink to the health and happiness of the King and his illustrious Queen. In name of the company—Robert Hogg." Mr Hogg has received the following reply—"Am commanded by the King and Queen to thank you for your kind telegram of loyal congratulation and good wishes.—Knollys."

The Coronation celebration was fittingly terminated with a very successful concert held on Monday in the Drill Hall, where the auspices of the General Coronation Committee, Provost Anderson presiding, and the hall was well filled with a representative and appreciative audience. The interior of the building was gaily decorated with flags, the platform in particular being very tastefully done up.

As will be seen from the programme appended, the Committee submitted a varied and high-class entertainment. There was not a dull item on the programme, and all passed off without a hitch. Mrs. M. Mackenzie acting as accompanist.—National Anthem, company and audience; selections, string band; "When the Heart is Young," Miss Smith; duet, from "Il Travatore," Mrs Anderson and Mr

At the close of the programme Major Matheson proposed a vote of thanks to the entertainers and accompanist, and Bailie Mackenzie moved a similar vote to the Chairman. Provost Anderson, in acknowledging, took the opportunity to thank the conveners of the various sub-committees, making special mention of Mrs. Annas M. Mackenzie and Mrs. Wm. J. Mackenzie for their services in connection with the dinner to the poor. He also took the opportunity to thank the ratepayers for voluntarily agreeing to assess themselves to the extent of 1d in the £1 to defray the expenses of the Coronation celebrations locally. Their action relieved the Town Council of much trouble, and he was safe in saying that there were few towns of the same size where matters were carried through so satisfactorily, harmoniously, and efficiently as at Stornoway—(applause).

The proceeds of the concert were devoted to the Building Fund of the proposed Town Hall and Public Library, and over £22 were realised. The audience broke up after enthusiastically singing "God save the King."

In reply to the telegram forwarded from Saturday's public meeting, Provost Anderson has received the following—"The King commands me to thank you for your kind telegram of congratulation.—KNOLLYS."
