News Letter No. 17

The First Edinburgh Re-union Meeting and Dinner was held at the Epicure Restaurant, Shandwick Street, Edinburgh, on Saturday, 23rd August, 1969. The Chief was able to be present, and because of the success of this first occasion it is hoped another may be held in August next year, especially if there is likely to be a larger attendance. Fourteen persons attended this first meeting, but there were a number of last minute cancellations. Organisation is now in hand to facilitate accompodation on a date to coincide with the Commonwealth Games next year. This will be during the first week of the Games, and notice of the clan re-union will be advertised in the press. We would appreciate any advice or assistance, especially from anyone associated with the newspaper industry. Members should make their own bookings for the Games, but we would arrange for accommodation, for those who wish it, at a moderately priced, conveniently situated hotel, with excellent amenities, and those so requiring should apply to the Secretary.

The Annual General Meeting and Dinner was held in London on 18th October, 28 persons attended, and it was generally acclaimed as being one of our most enjoyable functions. Amongst those present was The Lady Elizabeth Matheson. Major Sir Torquhil Matheson gave a most interesting account of a recent visit to Scotland this year, and the members of the clan he had met there. He expressed the necessity of individual families bringing their family records up to date as far as possible, by tracing the dates of grandparents, etc., for dates of birth, marriages, deaths, etc. (Details should be sent to the Secretary.) Notes which he has kindly sent to us are attached to this Newsletter.

The Secretary visited Brahan Castle on Tuesday, 26th August, 1969, the home of Captain and Mrs. Alick Matheson. Mrs. Matheson related some interesting historical aspects regarding the site, which would interest others able to visit Brahan Castle. A bus service runs to Maryburgh, from where a pleasant 2-3 miles walk or a short drive along a picturesque road brings one to the site.

He was also able to make a visit to see the life-size portrait of our Chief, painted about 40 years ago. This is in the residence of Colonel Baird, Palmer's Cross, Elgin. The house lies on the outskirts of Elgin on the road to the left of, and just past, Dr. Gray's Hospital. Col. The principal source of information on Clan Matheson history is "The History of the Mathesons" by Alex Mackenzie and Alex Macbain, published by Mackay of Stirling in 1900. This was still obtainable at Soutar's Bookshop in Dingwall in 1945 but is, unfortunately, out of print.

At the Clan Society Dinner on 18th October it was apparent that there is great interest in the history of the clan and where members fit into the historical structure. I know that overseas Mathesons are also keen to trace their ancestry.

The Clan Historians are William Matheson of Edinburgh and Iain Matheson of Plockton.

I have always been very interested in the clan history and hope that one day the "History of the Mathesons" can be brought up to date and reprinted, but, before this can be possible, a great deal of information will be required which can only be supplied by members of the clan.

During last August I re-visited the churchyard at Kirkton of Lochalsh and I made the notes which follow from a few of the Matheson gravestones that I saw. The references are to pages of the "History of the Mathesons".

"A man of great kindness of heart and much renowned for his hospitality, who departed this life on the 28th day of December, 1810, aged 90 years. Also his spouse Magaret MacRae."

"Died 22nd October, 1868, also his wife Janet died 5th January, 1896."

I would be interested to know the lineage of (1) Lauchlan Matheson, born 1823 and who died at Conchra 10th August, 1899. (2) Hector Matheson, died Plockton 1872.

I hope that from time to time I shall be able to add a few notes to the Newsletter from more information that I have been able to get together and that other members will also contribute, telling the Secretary all they can about their families and antecedents with, where possible, dates and places of birth. This will help the Clan Historians and we of the present day will be able to see in the Newsletter progress as it takes place. If members will co-operate I am sure that it can be done.

News Letter No. 18

The Annual General Meeting and Dinner will again be held at Amandini's Grill, 3 Southampton Row, London, W.C.1, opposite Holborn Underground Station, on Saturday, 24th October, 1970, at 6.30 p.m. for 7 p.m. Dinner will be approximately 27s. 6d. with a choice of two main and three desert menus, and may be paid at the time, but please let the Secretary know in good time if you will be able to attend, so that numbers may be finalised before the date.

The present Officers and Committee will resign at this meeting and nominations for the new Officers and Committee should be received not later than at the time of the Annual General Meeting.

The month of July has not proved generally suitable for a further re-union again this year in Edinburgh, to coincide with the Commonwealth Games there, but it has been decided that in future, further re-unions will be held in Scotland, preferably during the month of August. These may be held anywhere in Scotland depending on preference and suitability, and not necessarily in Edinburgh. Suggestions from members will be welcomed. If, however, any overseas members are visiting the Commonwealth Games in Edinburgh this year, Major Sir Torqhuil Matheson would be pleased to meet them at his home (Standerwick Court, Frome, Somerset) if they are at any time in the vicinity. Dr. George Matheson

We are indebted to Dr. R. L. Mackay of Wolverhampton, for notes on the life of Dr. George Matheson, D.D., LL.D., F.R.S.E., who wrote the well known hymn "O love that wilt not let me go", perhaps one of the most inspiring and at the same time most sympathetic hymns ever written. Indeed it is possible to read it simply as poetry and to admire its construction, choice of words and restraint in their use.

Dr. Matheson was born in 1842, in Glasgow, of middle class parents. His father, also George Matheson, was born in Dornoch and later was a founder of the business of Wilson and Matheson in Glassford Street, Glasgow.

Dr. Matheson was one of eight children and became a student at Glasgow University, attaining an honours distinction in Philosophy.

His eyesight was never good and latterly he saw only shadows, but he was always cheerful and dictated his essays to his eldest sister, Jane. He wrote many articles and a number of books using Braille and a typewriter.

He was at first Assistant Minister at Sandyford Church, Inellan, and his name became a household word throughout Scotland.

"O love that wilt not let me go" was written in 1882. Apparently he wrote it in little more than five minutes and it did not require any "re-touching", although the hymn committee asked him to change his original line "I climbed the rainbow through the rain", to the version we now know: "I trace the rainbow through the rain". Whatever the reason, one likes to know how he himself saw it and some may prefer the original.

He was called to St. Bernard's Church in Edinburgh in 1886, retired in 1897 and died in 1906. He was buried in the family vault at Glasgow Necropolis and this information may be helpful to those wishing to enquire further. Dr. Mackay has also given us rather more information that it has been possible to reproduce. in this Newsletter and the Secretary will be pleased to send a copy to any member who cares to send a stamped and addressed envelope. His biography The Life of George Matheson, D.D., LL.D., F.R.S.E., by D. McMillan, was published by Hodder and Stoughton in 1907.

CONVENER.

MAJOR PATRICK GRANT MATHESON (Father of the 12th Chief)

He was the 2nd son of Colin Matheson of Bennetsfield, tenth chief, and his wife Grace, 4th daughter of Patrick Grant of Glenmoriston.

A short biography of him appears on pages 47 and 48 of the clan history by Mackenzie and Machain (2nd edition), but it is not detailed and there would appear to be an inaccuracy concerning his wife's family and of the date of his death. To quote "He married in India, Hannah Mills Butler, daughter of James Major Orde, an officer of the Commissariat Department. . . ." And again ". . . at Delhi, where he died in 1835. His death is referred to in the obiluary of the Bengal 'Englishman' of January the 17th, in that year; and in the Delhi 'Gazette' as follows:—on Wednesday 15th, inst., Captain P.G.M., Comissary of Ordnance. . . ."

Recently, I came across a book "List of Officers of the Honourable East India Company's Bengal Army, 1758-1834", by Mr. V. Hodson (published in London, 1927). In it there is considerable detail of P.G.M.'s service and of his marriage, which I give below in an edited form.

"P.G.M. (1789-1834) was baptised at Knockbain, Co. Ross, on 8th August, 1789, and was the 2nd son of Colin Matheson of Bennetsfield, a Lieutenant in the Gordon Fencibles, and Grace his wife, 4th daughter of Patrick Grant of Glenmoriston. P.G.M. married, in Dinapore, India, on 10th July, 1813, Hannah Mills Butler, daughter of Alexander Aird, a Conductor of Ordnance and sister of Robert Abercrombie Aird (to whom there is a reference in the Appendices of the book. There is no reference to children, though his eldest son J. B. Y. Matheson has an entry in his own right as a distinguished officer in H.E.I.C. service).

P.G.M.'s promotions and services, together with the references, are summarised as follows:—

Born: 28th July, 1789.

Cadet: 1808.

Fireworker: 24th September, 1808 (an artillery officer, who has to do with explosives in War.)

Arrived in India: 16th November, 1808.

Lieutenant: 23rd October, 1811.

Captain: 12th December, 1821.

Died at Delhi: 15th October, 1834.

- Nepal War, 1814-1815: Pursa; Lieutenant 6th Company, 2nd Battalion Foot Artillery with the 4th Division.
- Third Maheratta War, 1817-1818: Lieutenant, 2nd Troop Horse Artillery. At Jawad (blew open the gate).
- Appointed to charge of Ordnance Commissariat at P.W.I., 27th February, 1819.

Commissary of Ordnance: 25th September, 1819.

Returned to India: February, 1821.

Appointed to charge of Delhi Magazine: 2nd March, 1821 and to Allahabad: 5th November, 1823.

Returned to Delhi Magazine, 1833.

References: History of the Mathesons, Alex Mackenzie, p. 30. (Note: this must be the 1st Edition.) Burkes Landed Gentry: s.n. Grant of Glenmoriston. Stubbs ii, 27-8. A.J.N.S. XVI. 272. Will dated 9th May, 1816; proved 10th January, 1835.

In conclusion it would appear that Mackenzie and Macbain made a mistake over P.G.M.'s wife's maiden name, and that P.G.M. did in fact die on 15th October, 1834 and not 15th January, 1835. Neither the month nor year of the Delhi Gazette is mentioned only 15th inst., which is a figure agreed within the H.E.I.C. officers' book. Coupling the Delhi Gazette date with the Bengal "Englishman" of 17th January, 1835, was unfortunate. Finally, wills are not normally proved before death.

To complete the story for those not fortunate enough to have a copy of the clan history, P.G.M. pre-deceased his elder brother John who was the eleventh chief and who was married to Ann, daughter of the Rev. Robert Arthur, minister of Resolis in the Black Isle. John died without issue in May, 1843.

P.G.M. had 3 sons and 3 daughters.

- 1. James Brooks Young, already referred to and who succeeded as chief on the death of his Uncle John in 1843.
- 2. Thomas Theophilus Metcalf, a Lieutenant in H.M.'s 39th Regt., who died in India in 1839.
- 3. Ian Grant, a Colonel in H.E.I.C. Service. His story is somewhat of a mystery at the moment, and I hope to unravel it.
- 4. Susan Eleanor, died in infancy.
- 5. Isabella Maria Grant, who married Major James Charles Claud Hamilton of H.E.I.C.'s Bengal European Light Infantry.
- 6. Hannah Grace, who married Lieutenant Colonel H. King, of H.E.I.C.'s 13th Bengal Native Infantry.

The early history of some clans is often obscure through lack of written records, but perhaps the poems of Ossian may afford some clue as to our own clan's early origins, in which it is related how one Colmar MacMahon of Ireland assisted in the Scottish and Irish battles of the Gaelic foke lore hero Fingal. Some mention is said to have been made of this in the Iomaire Manuscript of Roderick Matheson.

It is known that at some time in the 11th and 13th Centuries AD certain Irish personnages sailed North from Ireland to seek the assistance of the Norwegian ships, mainly in repelling influxes of peoples from the Southern parts of Scotland into Ireland, and a MacMahon is thought to have sailed into Loch Alsh to have offered his assistance to the Scotlish King, mainly in repelling Norwegian incursions on this part of the coast, and for this was awarded with lands in the Loch Alsh district. This may have been during the time of the Norwegian raids of Magnus Barefoot (ccAD1098) or a period between the reigns of Kings MacAlpin and Alexander I (843-1124 AD). Could somewhat similar incidents have occurred twice within 3 centuries?

Perhaps early Irish history may help to throw some light on these early events, for it begins to be fairly well recorded in many respects from about the time of Cormac MacAirt (AD275 - 300), somewhere at about which time the Fionna was founded and from which came the celebrated Fingal, (Finn), of whom there is such scanty historical evidence, and whose son Ossian related the many tales of war and valour of the various tribes of Ireland and Scotland.

The Irish clan system began to emerge historically in the 11th Century AD, and Clan MacMahon, along with other Irish clans, can be traced back to earlier origins than this period.

The spelling of names from these early times often differed considerably, before they were Anglicised from the Gaelic (and even since in some cases), but perhaps somewhere among these obscure facts and names and dates there may lie some approximate indication of our own clan origins in Scotland.
