



The Chronicle of Perth has been printed from a Manuscript purchased by the Faculty of Advocates at a sale of books which had belonged to the late Rev. James Scott, author of the Lives of the Scottish Reformers, and of a valuable Differtation upon the Gowrie Conspiracy. Although usually designated as "Mercer's Chronicle," there seems no fufficient authority for its being so denominated, as, from internal evidence, the MS. must have been written at different intervals, and by different persons.


John Mercer, who, for a confiderable time, was Town-Clerk of Perth, unquestionably appears to have been the possession of the volume containing this Chronicle, as towards the end of it a few entries, principally of deaths, occur in his hand-writing; but beyond this portion, he seems to have had no further title to the authorship.

Part of the volume has apparently been used as a register of burials. This portion, however, has been mutilated; a circumstance to be less regretted, as the names still preserved are of no particular interest.

In printing the Chronicle, the Editor has carefully adhered to the text; and the only extent to which he deemed it expedient to interfere, was in removing the contractions, and altering the arrangement; and as the chronological order had been entirely difregarded, the writers having evidently noted down their information without any regard to dates, the latter change appeared to be indifpenfably necessary. It is also proper to mention, that in one or two inflances fome mistakes have crept into the MS.; but as the Editor had no means of correcting them beyond conjectural emendation, he thought it most prudent to leave them as they were.

Mr Scott's transcripts of the Kirk Session Records of Perth having also been purchased by the Faculty of Advocates, a few extracts have been printed in the Appendix, as illustrative of the habits and customs of the citizens of Perth, and as furnishing a fair estimate of the state of society during the period to which they refer. The Editor has also added an Examination of the supposed Royal descent of John Earl of Gowrie, from Queen Margaret, the widow of James the IV. and sister of Henry the VIII., which, he ventures to think, will, from the documents referred to, be deemed conclusive. As the execution of Lord Sanquhar, whose principal residence was in Perth, is referred to in the Chronicle, perhaps the Notice relative to it may not be devoid of interests.









THE CHRONICLE OF PERTH.

King William wes the lxxxiij King of Scottis: quha fowndit the burgh of perth, in the zeir of God 1210 zeiris, and gaiff findrie previleges to the famen. He rang xlix zeiris, deceiffit at striviling, in the zeir of God 1214 zeiris, buried in aberbrothok.

Vpoun 12 day of May 1363 zeiris, Alexander abercrumbie off murthlie fet ane tak to Jhone merier, burgefs of perth, of the lands of vbny within the baronie of murthlie, cum heriotis, marchetis, et merchiamentis, for the fpace of aucht zeiris, for the foume of ffourtie punds Sterling money, for releiff of the baronie of murthlie, payit ad fabricationem pontis de perthe.

The foundation of the Charterhouse beside perth, be King James the first in anno 1430 zeiris, quha deceissit in anno 1436, on the xx day of stebruar, and his quene Joanna foundatrix thereof, deceissit in July 1445 zeiris.

fflowden vas in September, on the lettir lady day in anno 1513 zeiris. The duik of albanie was governor to King James the first, in anno 1314 zeiris.

Concord maid at perth betuix hwntlie and erroll, the fifth day of December 1519 zeiris.

Roflyne more in September 1523 zeiris.

The deir Symmer 1525 zeiris quhen the bow of maill gaiff 26 shillings 8 pennies, Alexander blair than provest of perth.

The Seage of Tamtallown the xi of October 1528 zeiris.

The execution of andro Cars be ane affyfe in perth, the tent day of februar 1528 zeiris.

Mallochis peft in perth in September 1537 zeiris, Jhone denyng than proveft.

Quene Margaret mother to King James the fyft, deceifit on Sanct munokis day in Methwen 1541 zeiris, buriet in the Charter hous befyde perth, the kingis majestie, nobilitie, and barronis being present.

Gilbert moncreiffis execution 1542 zeiris.

Faulay at hallowmes 1541 zeiris.

King James the fyft deceiffit on the 25 day of November 1542 zeiris, on San&t Katharenis day.

Solen Mos at andersmes 1542 zeiris.

Quene Marie dochter to James the fyft, borne in Striviling the 8 day of [december] in anno 1542 Zeiris.

The execution of James hunter, Robert lambe, James ronaldfone, and his fpouse, at perth in Januar in Sanct pawlis day, 1543 zeiris.

The conflict, or battell of the brig of tay, on the magdalene day the 22 day of Julij 1544.

David beattoun, cardinall, flane in his chieff hous in San& Andrews the 29 day of Maij 1546.

Pinkie on the lattir lady day the 3 of September 1547 zeiris.

Quene Marie past to france in august 1548 zeiris: in july preceding come to Scotland six thousand frenche men of wear.

The reformation of the Charter hous & freiris befide perth, the 10 day of May 1560 geiris.

The bwrnyng of Scone, on twyfday efter midfomer day the 27 of Junii 1560 zeiris.

The queens marriage, with our Soverane King James the Saxt father 1565 zeiris.

King James the Saxtis happie birth, the 19th day of Junij 1566 zeiris and coranatioun at Striviling 1567.

The Katt harrow in perth the 22 day of maij 1567.

The down falling of the bridge of almond, the 23 day of November 1567 zeiris.

The Queenis passing furth of lochlewin, on Sonday the [2] of Maij 1568 zeiris.

The read of langfyde belyde Glafquhow, on the [13] day of Maij 1568 zeiris.

The read at beger, the 16th day of Junij 1568 zeiris.

The gude Regent is flauchtered at lynlythgow the 23 day of Jannuar 1569 [70].

The vynnyng of dumbarton, wn the day of merche 1570 zeiris.

The parliament haldin in the Cannogeit, the 14 day of Maij 1571 zeiris. Regent the erle of lennox, and his flauchter at Striviling the feird day of September 1571 zeiris.

The departure of the erle of mar regent [October] 1572 zeiris.

The election of the erle of mortoun regent at Edinburgh in November 1572 zeiris. The execution of the Archbishop of Sanct Androis.

The randering of the caftell of edinburgh, grange being capitane thereof on the 28 day of Maij 1573 zeiris. His executioun, his brotheris, mofman, cokie on the thrid day of August 1573 eiris.

The first down falling of twa bowis of the brig of tay, and off lewis wark, be innundation of Water, on the 20 day of december 1573 zeiris at midnyght.

The departour of the erle off athoil in apryle 1579 zeiris.

The randering of hamilton & draffin, in apryle 1579 zeiris.

The marriage betwixt the erle of athoil and the erle of gouries dochter [24 Januar] 1579.

The entrie of the Worthie and nobill King James the Saxt within perth the 28 day of Maij 1580.

Mr John row departed, minister at perth in the [15]80 zeir of God [October 16.]

Mr Patrick galloway minister, admitted thairto 25 of apryle 1581 geiris; he tuik his woyage to be minister to his maiestie the 11 of sebruar 1589 geiris.

The erle of Morton regent, beheadit at edinburgh.

The dounfalling of fyve bows of the brig of tay, on the 14 day of Januar 1582 zeiris.

The Juffice air halden at perth, be King James the Saxt the 6 of Julij 1582 zeiris.

Peft in perth the 24 day of September 1584 zeiris, continewit to August 1585 zeiris quharin at the plesore of God, departed this lyff, fourteen hundred and twenty seven persons zoung and auld therby.

The entrie of the erllis of Mar and Angus in Striviling, against his maiestie, at palm Sondie 1585.

His Sacred maiefties marriage in denmark be my lord marifchall, ambaffador, the 20 day of August 1589.

Thair arryval at leithe the first of May 1590 and crownit Quene the 17th of the same monethe. Her entrie to perth the 23 of Junii 1591.*

A plague among the bestiall 1590.

The admissione of Mr Johne malcolme to be minister at perth, be impositione of the handis of Mr William rynde, Mr Archibald moncrieff,

Mr Alexander Joung and Mr John abercrombie, and there after tuik the bailies counfall and elders be the hand. Mr Patrick Galloway preachit that day. He deceiflit minister of perth wpone the Sext day of October in anno 1634 zeiris, sua he was minister , buried the 8 day thereafter. He taucht on Sonday befoir none the 28 of September preceding in eodem anno, his executouris cravit ane an, bot gott nane, he was ane nakit stipendiar.

June 1592. The read of faulkland be the erll of bothwall quha affaileit the King. The toun of perth went down for his defence in feir of weir.

Wpoun the 16th of August 1592 zeiris, the laird of clackmannan tuik william inglis, decone of the hammermen, and Jhone bastlie, decone of the wrechtis, comyng from dundie, captives into his hows of gaskenhall. The town of perth mair raischelie na vyslie, onvilling to abyde the indignitie, that samen nicht with all diligence past to the said gaskenhall in armes, releivit thair nechbours, and brocht the lard with thame to perth. They vair therefter agreit vpoun the townis large cherges. The lard remainit, not being a frie man in [15] 93 zeiris.

The clerk of perth, fir henrie elder, departit this lyfe being eighty two zeiris of age the first of November 1592.

Henrie frederik prince of Scotland borne in Streviling, the [19] day of [februar] 1593 [-4] zeiris.

Jhone erle of athoil, deceifit in perth, on the penult day of August 1594 zeiris. Conwoyit honorablie to dunkeld and buried there the 11 of September therefter. The Quenes maiestie being in perth, in william hallis chamber, beneath the croce, behalding the convoy of the corps.

Mr Williame couper admittit minister at perth the fyst of October 1585, be imposition of the handis of Mr william rynd, Archibald moncrief, and James herring. Mr Patrick galloway preachit. [His] stipend onlie first four hundred merks and twenty pounds with his hous maill. And

wpone the fourt day of October 1612 zeiris he wes maid and confecrat bishop of galloway at Glasgow. The first of November 1615, he wes transported fra perth to the chappel royal efter he had been 30 zeiris minister at perth, and upon the 25th of februar 1618, he departit this Lysse, and it was thocht for greiff that the wysses of edinburgh com in to him, and schewe to him his awin bukis aganes frieris buikis.

Elizabeth princess off Scotland borne in dunfermling, the 10 of august 1596 zeiris.

Ane great number of withes brint, through all the partis of this realme in June 1597 Zeiris.

Ane earthquak the 23 of Julij 1597 zeiris.

The pest in leithe and edinburgh in August 1597.

Ane truble betuix certaine of the Servands of the drummonds, and Oliver Young, than ane of the bailgies of perth within the hie gait of the faid burgh, quhan the greatest number of the persewaris leap the tounis valls, and so few number of them as remainit come to the tolbuith on setterday the 27 August 1597 zeiris. The agreement was made in the south inch, on wedensday the first day off September therefter following.

December 17. 1597. The uproar betuix the King and the kirk.

The eclips of the fone on fetterday, callit the mirk fetterday 25. februar 1597 [—8] at half hour to 10 in the morning.

March 21. 1597 [—8.] The countes of montrois, dame Jeane drummond, convoyed through perth to aberuthven.

Apryll 5. 1598. The duck of holftein, brother to the quene, come to perth, and receivit a banquet fra the toun be his majefties direction, and conwoyit be 100 hors men of the town, to aberuthen, and receavit be Tullibardin.

April 16. Being gude fryday, Henrie adamfone dene of gilde flaine be Thomas peblis and wes buried on peax [pafch?] day. The execution of Thomas peblis for the flauchter of the faid unquhile henrie, on tuyfday the penult of May 1598 at the mercat croce.

____ 17. The erllis of huntlie and hamilton wer maid marquefifs.

Sept. 9. The Witches brunt in the fouthe inche betuix the buttis, callit Jonet Robertsone, Marioun M'Cauvs and bessie Irland.

The fische mercat wes remowit fra ye schoar hed, to the fouth yait port be act of counfall.

The quhyte blaftit in anno 1598.

Nov. The toun began to repair the new kirk in wallis and wandows. Jan. 9. 1598 [—9]. The toune begane thair voluntar contributioun, for reparation of the brige of perth, and left in august 1600.

Feb.16. The flauchter of william hey, fone to the gudeman of gourdie, in andro gibis hous in the kirkgait, be the laird of craighall rettray, and his complices, Thomas Lafreis chyrurgione wes thair guha fufferit for it.

1599. Mr Patrick flewart brother to my lord Innermay, wes excommunicat for papiffrae and defectioun fra the fayth.

Nov. 21. The zoung laird of balthiok, and mr william Row, minister at Kynnoull, and Laurence blair, wer tane captive by my lord sanquhar at kinros, [quho] careit thame to sanquhar, and detenit thame thair syxtene dayis.

Dec. — The new calculation and change of the zeir of god, wes published to begin on the first of Januar, and not on the xxv day of marche, as it wes of befoir.

Ane great dead amongis the pepill in anno 1599.

May 20. 1600. The erll of gowrie come to perth, efter fewin zeiris peregrenation in other cuntreis.

June 28. The execution of david drummond, for the flauchter of george ramfayis man, the first justice court that ewer John erll of gowrie held efter his returne.

Aug. 5. The flauchter of John erll of gowrie, and mr Alexander his

brother, in the erllis awin ludgeing in perth, be John ramfay and dochter herreis, his majesties feruandis. Praisit be god ye king wes saiff fra yair intendit treasone aganes his facred persone. The toun knew nothing till the comoun bell rang.

The toun of dundie being aduerteifit, come all wp in arms to have fpoilgeit the burgh of perth, bot praifit be god, the king knew the toun of perthis part to be fure.

Mr Thomas cranstoun, george craigingelt and John barron, feruantis to the erll of gowrie, wes hangit at the croce of perth for airt and pairt of the conspiracie.

Sep. 30. Ther wes bonefyres fett furth in perth, and all partis of the cuntrie, for his maiesties deliuerance from that treasone, and preiching appointit euerie Tuysday, in euerie burgh.

Oct. 31. The corpis of the erll of gowrie, and his brother, wer transportit to edinburgh, to the parliament to be hauldin the first of november, and war forfaltit the xi of november.

John Ramfay wes knychtit of west barnes, and hew hereis of cowsland. Sir Thomas erskyne maid lord dirltoun.

Andro henderfone fett to libertie and receiwit his office of chalmerlaine.

Nov. 19. The Duk charlis borne at dumfermling 1600 and baptigat in the chappell royall the 22 December in eodem anno.

April 15. 1601. The Kingis majestic come to perth, and wes maid burges at the mercat croce. Thair was ane punscheone of wyne fett thair and all drucken out. He restavit the banquet fra the toun, and subscrivit the gilde buik with his awin hand, Jacobus rex, parcere subjectis, et debellare superbos.

The execution of mr william balfour, John Johnstoun, couper in perth, james murray, henry cook, for theft committit be thame in duncane robertiones hous.

They wer hangit at the croce 22 apryll 1601.

Sep. 22. Thair fell a reik of the tymer bridge of Tay with tua men, ane horfs, and ane lead. On of the men wes gottin faiff agane with the horfs and the lead. Bot the other man callit Lamb, drownit in the water.

Nov. 1. 1602. Henrie balneavis, and william Jak, maid thair repentance in thair awn feattis on fabbath eftir fermone, for making lybell againes mr william couper, minister, and henrie elder, clerk, "as King David wes ane fair fanct to the croun, so is mr william cowper and the clerk to this poore toun." Ane act of countal aganes thame, that nane of them fould beare office or gett honourable place in the toun thaireftir.

Dec. 29. 1603 [1602?] Oliver Joung bailgie deceiffit.

Thurfday 24 March 1603. The quene of Ingland departit, and king James the fext proclaimit King therefter. Ane bone fyre fett furth in all Scotland.

Tuyfday April 5. The kings majestie tuik Jornay to Ingland to receive ze croun.

9. Proclamatioun fummoning all the Megregors to compere and underly the law, for the flauchter of the laird of luffe, and the men of dumbartane.

Wednefday June 1. The quene, prince, and princes, tak journey to Ingland.

July 12. The laird of Ballandene quha wes flaine in dundie, wes bureit in the kirk of Perth, be eift the counfal hous door under a blew flone of the Ryne.

—— 26. His majeftie wes crownit King of Ingland, france, and Ireland at Westminster, bone fyres sett furth heir in all partis.

Great pestilence in England, and specialie in london and the sowth of Scotland, from June to februar.

Dec. 26. The execution of Andro Jacksone for the flauchter of Thomas hey in clashbeny.

Jan. 24. 1604. The ftepill of ftone fell.

—— 20. The Laird of Megregor was hangit at Edinburgh, and eleven of his onhappie kin. They hang all night upon the gallous.

March 27. The touns burrow mure wes fawin with eattis.

April —. A mefs faid in george bofwallis ludgeing. My lord Inchaffray duelling thair. The ladie oliphant prefent, [&] her twa fifters. Alexander mebrak burgefs of perth prefent. The Prieft wes abercrombie To his name.

June 15. The men of black ruthven and huntingtower, cwift turffis on our burrow muir, at command of the comptroller, Sir David murray, Capitane of his Maiesties guaird, and our provest for the tyme. The toun raifs aucht hundred men in armis, and putt thame off. Angus Cairdney deit of the appoplexie thair. No ma harme, be great apearence of skayth.

July 3. Ane parliament hauldin at perth, be John erll of montrois, wiceroy. The haill nobilitie wer prefent. The town muftart fourteen hundred men in armes and gude ecupadge. At this parliament the comptroller, Sir david murray, wes made Lord of Scone. His Knightis [were] Sir Andro balfour, and Sir Johne monerieff of Kynmonthe.

Morton bure the fuord, Argyle the fepter, Angus the crown, and the Great feall be the mafter of montrois.

—— 17. A great intestine discention in Dundee. The principale parties opposeitis, mr alexander wedderburn clerk, and Robert sleicher baillie.

March 4. 1605. My Lord Drummond maid erll of perth, aganes the quhilk, perthe proteftit, and wer mifcontent. My lord home, erll of Jedevart. My lord fywie, erll of dunfermeling.

This zeir great pestilence in Leith, edinburgh, and fundrie places.

- July 17. John myln and his men enterit to the bridge work.
- Aug. 9. The Laird of auldies ludgeing, beneath the croce, fell on ane Setterday at nycht.
- Nov. 5. The powder treasone done at london wes mercifullie detectit, and his maistie and his bairnis, with the haill estates of the land, by gods preventing mercie faisfit. This was done aganes his maistie be the papistis in Ingland for the religioun.
- July 1. 1606. Ane parliament haldin at perth be John erll of montrois viceroy. Kathanes buir the fuord, Argyle the fepter, Angus the crown. My lord flemying maid erll of Wigton. Glames erll of Kinghorne. Tullibardin maid erll. My lord new bottell maid erll of Luthiane.

This parliament was riddin be the nobilitie, all in robbis of read fearlet, and facit with quhyte furris, and the bilhoppis in blak.

At this tyme thair fell ane pley betuix the erll of eglinton and the erll of glencairn. It laftit fra fewin, till ten houris at nycht, with great skayth. Ane man of glencairnis wes slaine. The toun rais in arms, and patt [down?] the affaulters to thair great commendation.

Aug. 9. The foirland of andro Ray, next to James drummondis land tuik fyre, and brunt all ane.

The fame nycht there wes blude fyre, and the pest come in, quhilk continewit till May thereaster.

- Feb. 21. 1607. The trie bridge wes tane away, betuix twelve and ane on ane Sunday in tyme of denner.
- March 2. Thair rais ane great extraordinarie winde, that blew the lead of the fteipill, to mr John malcolmes back zett, callit the bischope murrayes hous.
- April 8. Ane Synodall affemblie hauldin in the new kirk of perth. My lord of Scone come in and dischairgit thame, and threw ower the tabils amongis thame, and pat thame furth of the kirk, quha git held

yair affemblie at the kirk door, with ioy that the peopill wer fo weill affectit to thame. Mr hary lewingstone was moderator.

Sept. 28. The read of carpow, quher the haill inhabitants of newburgh came out in armes aganes our bailleis and counfall that wer fingill on our part. Thair wes fundrie hurt on both fydes. Thomas Cobraithe wes flaine to tham in the newburgh.

Dec. 1. There were an continual froft from that day foresaid till the 21st of marche, and passage upone the yee over Tay all the tyme, and passage ower and ower at the mil of Errol.

April 8. 1608. Patrick eviot, brother germane to the laird of balhouflie, wes murtherit in blelok, be his wyfe Janet Rofs, quha wes air to the lairdfchip of craigie and of Kynfawnis both. He wes fchote with ane gun in his bed fleiping be James Mair. Thairefter they wer both Taikin and execute, and brint efter they wer hangit, in the playfield of perth the 17th may 1608. His head and arm patt wp on the Caffell gaivill port.

Aug. 29. 1608. The peft come to perth, and continewit till may therefter 1609, quherin deit zoung and auld 500 persones.

Oct. 24. William erll of angus, and frances erll of erroll, excommunicat for papiftrie.

Nov. 8. Ane earth quak at 9 hours at ewin that schoak the tolboth the battell end, that thair fell many ftonis aff it.

June 5. 1609. The great wind blew down the flanes of the mantil wall of the kirk, in tyme of Sermone, and terrifeit the peopell.

Oct. 2. In ane parliament haldin at edinburgh, It was ordenit that ilk burgh fould have proveftes within thaimfelfis, actual tradifinen.—So the burgh of perth chufit James adamfone proveft, and was continewit 3 zeiris.

Feb. 20. 1610. Being Fastingis ewin, mr william rynde, master of

the grammar fchool, departit this life when putting on his cloathes in the morning.

June 1611. My lord oliphant biggit and dame to bring in water to ane miln at Dupline wpon erne, And quhen it wes perfyted, the erll of Tullibardin with his friendis in the nycht dang all down.

July 2. 1611. Mr william Cowper minifter, marreit with grizzell andersone, dochter to Robert andersone.

May 19. 1612. Ane missine [came to the Lord of Scone] from Edinburt concerning ane most vile fact comittit be the Lord Sanquhair and his men.

"After our verie harttie commendationis to zour gud Lordship, the Kings Maiestie having verie iust caus of offence at this vyld and deteftable fact, committit be the Lord Sanguhair, and his tua men, in ther murther of the Master of the fense schoole by whom he formarlie Lost his awin eie, It hes pleafet his maiestie to give command and direction, that inventorie be mad of all and quhateuer belongeth unto him in this kingdome, and that the famin be put wnder arreftment, to be furthcome and to his Maieflie, and it is his maieflies pleafure that your Lordshipe salbe burdenit with the execution of this direction within the fhirefdome of Perth, Therefor these are to request you, that immediatlie after the refett heiroff, you address yowrfelf to the burgh of Perth, and therr call unto you the Proweift and Baylzeis, and goe altogidder to the faidis Lordis Ludging in Perth, caufe the doris thairoff be mad patent and oppin, and thair tak ane perfit and exact count and inventorie of the haill gudis, geir, plenishing, hingings, filuer-work, and quhat elfe is within the faid house, or in anie vther part of the burgh perteining to the faid Lord, and put the fame in Lockfast hours, and Rowmes, wnder verie fure custodie and keiping, sua that the same may be furthcumand to his maieftie at all occasions as accordis. As also that ye tak not of all and quhatfumeuer fermes and dewties deu unto the faid

Lord in that flyre, commanding the perfons in whose hands the samin ar, To keip and reteine the samin for his maiesties wie, and that you report unto his Maiesties Councill a not of all that yow fall find heirin, And recommending this to yowre care and diligence, as a poynt highlic touching his Maiestie, and recommending yowr gud Lordship to godis protection. We rest,

May 22. 1612. My lord of Scone tuik Inuentar of my lord Sanquharis hous, for flauchter of ane Inglis fencer.

June 80. My lord Sanquhar with twa gentillmen with him, hangit at londone for the faid flauchter.

Nov. 7. Prince henrie depairtit this lyfe at Londoun of ane mychtie fewer, thocht to be poyfonit, to the great greefe of all trew fubjectis.

1612. Fra mychaelmes to that tyme great dearth. The wictuall at 10 lib. the boll.

Feb. 14. 1613. The princess of britane wes married to the compt palatine.

Dec. 12. The four commoun mylnes, the south and north Inches, and haill fishing belanging to the toun of perthe, fet to takifmen, merchantis, and craftismen, for xix zeiris to the 1631 zeir of god, for the defraying the 40,000 merk of debt.

Jan. 1. 1614. Her grace [the princes palatine] wes happilie deliwered to her husband of ane man chyld. God fend him his grace. Bone fyris, ringing of the bellis, with other pastyme. Efter, hearing of gods vord, and thanks geving therfor, within perth the 18 day of Januar instant.

- My lord maxwell wes execute in edinburgh, for flauchter of the laird of Johnstoun and breking waird.
- Vpone fetterday the xxij day of Januar 1614, the north weft pend and bow of the brige of erne fell down, being eveill biggit fra the begynning, fillit onlie with clay and zeard, and but ony blind pend as the brig of tay hes bene in the famen manner foundeit. The burgh and febyr with all diligence causit david Jak, and dauid Millie, craftimen, put up the famen with tymber vark.

Vpoun twyfday the first day of merche 1614 zeiris, be half hour to fax in the mornyng, ane earthquhak haid in divers places.

Vpon thursday therefter, the 3 of Merche 1614, and other earth-quhak at xii houris in the nicht haid baith in land brwch.

April 25. 1614. Ane millive [came] from San&t Androis concerning the ministerie of perth, [viz.]

"Richt honorable and louing brethren, After remembrance of my dewtie to yow all, Ze ar not ignorant that the place of your ministerie formarlie possessed be my Lord Bishop of Galloway is now vacand, and the care of the prouision therof lyeth chiefly vpon me. And thairfore, being bound in conscience and straited with loue and affection towards yow, I have thoucht gud to request yow, that Ze wald tak that matter to heart, and aduise wpon the man whom Ze wald have to supplie his rowme; for I have conferred with his Lordship, and I find be him that he is indifferentlie disposed to see his rowme stacked with some godlie learned man that best may serve you. I have no vther intention but to admitt to that ministerie, the man, whom efter aduice Ze find

fittest for yow, and think not be anie tergiuersation to escape the planting of ane other man, and that with all diligence; affure yourfelfe that neither the Kings Maiestie, (who must have his royall consent in your planting,) neither I, your ordinar, nor my Lord of Galloway, ane confcience and reuerend prelat, will fuffer you longer to be defolate of ane paftour. Thus I both request and requyre you, that ze fend your commissionars to our Synod, quhilke is to be holden heir vpon twefday and Wednefday nixt, that ordour may be tane of your prouision. Inioye your priviledge in gods name, as the fecond burgh both of the kingdome and diocy: and ze fall find me to affift you be my Councill and autoritie to my vttermost, to obtaine aither ane, vpon whom ge fall fett your eye, and to have ane tyk of March, of quhilke ze may mak choice. Loue maks me to writt thus, and the confcience of my calling maks me to be thus peremptorie. I fend my harttie falutations to yow all, and to the gud communitie. The grace of our Lord Jefus chrift be with you all. Amen. I reft

your very louing and Kynd Brother,

Sanctandrois."

" Sanctandrois Caftle, 26 Apryl 1614."

Vpon the —— day of Januar 1615 zeiris, being thurldey, the Vatter of tay, be veittis and fleit, vaxit fo great, that it coverit haill our north inche, the mortoun haugh, and almaift all the fouth inche. [It] continewit fra thurldey in the morning, to the morne therefter. Men rowing with boats in the fame northe inche, taking forth scheip that war in perrell of drowning.

Vpoun twyfdy the x of januar 1615. adame fchoir, wretour to our lowerane lords fignet, departit this lyff, and vas bureit the famen day.

Feb. 21. This zeir preceding, the frost was lang luikit for before it came. Quhen it came, it continewit sa lang, that the vater of tay being all frosin about and beneath the brig, that thair vas daylie passage about the brig next the north inche bayth for hors and men, and beneith the brig fornent the erle of arrols ludging and the schoir, for men. [It] continewit sa quhill the twentie syve day of sebruar, that the cobellaris quha rowit on the vater being therby prejudgit of their comoditie, in the nicht tyme brak the ice at the entrie, and stayd the passage. Vpoun satting is ewin being the xxj of sebruar, ther was tua puncheonis of burdeous vyne careit, sting on ling, on mennis schoulderis on the vater of tay on the ice, at the mideis of the north inche, the veight of the puncheon, and the beraris estimat to three scoir twelve stane veight.

The erle of Orknay convicted for treason deit in edinburgh, beheaded at the marcat croce vpoun ye [6] day of [februar.]

Vpon monandey at nicht the vj day of merche, ane vehement finaw came on. [It] leftit all the nicht, and continewit to vedensiday therefter, al quhilk tyme, be xij houris in the day it begowth of new, and continewit fo vehement, nicht and day, to the —— of merche, that during the haill tyme, mixtit with frostis, na travell or litill passage vas ther aither for hors or men; on the quhilk wedensiday, diveris hors and men perischit and deit.

Vpoun the fevint day of Maij, great fnaw and frost, quhairby na traveil for hors nor men.

The archbischope of fanct androis, called mr george gladstanes, departit this lyff within the citie of fanctandrois, upon the [2] day of [May], and vas honerablic bureit in the aulde colledge kirke, vpoun the —— day of ——— therefter: at the quhilk buriall the bischope of galloway, mr william cowper, maid the funerall sermone.

Vpoun the fext day of maij 1615, williame moncreiff of that ilk, at his awin hands, but confent or knawledge of the burgh of perth, and alledging richt to ane fisching of the freirtoun, callit helloch hoill belyde the fisching of perth, callit the veill off waift, pat in some staiks of trie, in the litill inche, fornent the lands of freirtown, quhilks staiks the counfall and magistrats of perth, immediately as it came to ther knawledge, pullit vp, hewit in peices, and toist down the water of tay, quharupoun the town and the laird rasit law sourcetie aganes vtheris.

Vpoun the —— day of ——— 1615, Alexander Jackfone of vatterie bwittis, haveing flane ane nychtbour of his, and being apprehendit therfor be the laird of inchmertene, [he] was, upoun the morne therefter, brocht to perth, deliverit to the fheriff deput, and committit to the irones within the tolbuith of perth. The faid alexanders friends purcheft ane letter frome the councill, charging the provoft and bailgeis of perth, upoun his awin charges to transport him to edinburgh, to fuffer tryell for the faid factis befoir the juffice. Quha being transportit ther, [he wes] convictit be ane affyle and headit.

The corps of fir harrie lyndefay, zounger of carriftoun, brocht fra striveling to perth in ane coishe, within ane caik of leid. [It] remainit all nicht within the fouth porche door of the kirk; quhilk vas the xv day of June 1615. The magistratis of perth, counsall, [and] communitie, met thame on fute at pathewlis, and convoyit thame to the town. The morne therefter, the magistrates of perth, and ane guid nowmer off the inhabitants of the town on hors, convoyit the corps to cowper in angus. My lord of scone, than provost, with quhome they raid. The corps was convoyit in the coishe throw the vater of tay at the haid of the northe inche.

1616. Great povertie of touns, and great dearth.

Feb. 21. 1617. Mr John Guthrie admitted minister at perth, be the bifchopis of fanct androis and glafgow, within the kirk of perth. Doc-

tor william barclay preachit: and wes transportit thairfra to be minister of edinburgh in anno 16[21], and thairefter confectat bishope of Murray.

May 16. 1617. The Kingis maiefty returnit from Ingland, to wifite his kynde and natiwe kingdome of Scotland, and come to edinburgh, with great folemnitie, reffauit be the toun at the west port, be the prouest, baillies, and council, being all in blak gownes, and ane speiche deliuerit to him. He red down the hie streit to the abbay, with great plouss. He ressawit propynes from the burgh. He wes ressaut vith——men in the toun in gude fort, with partizen stalssis, to serve as his maiesties guaird. Thus he wes wfit in all burrowis quher he came, as perth, Dundie, striwiling, brecheue, glasgow, linlythgow, drumsfries, couper of syss. He road north to mure rowmond, and stayit in Kynnard x days at his sport in hunting.

April 15, 1618. Elizabeth ruthuen, countes of montroifs, wes buried at aberruthuen.

June 20. Vpoun midfomer day, the xx of June 1618 zeiris, at tua efternone, — Toschoch of monivaird zounger, slaine in the south geit of perth, be laurence bruce zounger of cultemalundis, his brother, and divers thair associatis. The tua that was with monyvaird, the ane deidlie hurt, bot deit not, the uther his richt hand clene struken fra him. This done in an moment of tyme, all the committaris therof eschewit out of the town befoir any of the tounis men hard of ony suche thing.

Aug. 25. Thair wes ane generall affemblie haldin at perthe, anent the facrament of the fupper, and kneilling, and the fywe articles, that wes aggreit to.

Aug. 29. Mr John guthrie, on ane fonday efter the efternones fermone, mareit the mafter of Sanquhar with Sir Robert Swiftis dochter, ane Inglis knycht in zorkschyre. Nather of the parteis exceidit 13 zeiris of age.

Sep. 2. Mr Thomas rofs, minister at cargill, went to court, and thair for fum infamous writting and railling aganes the scottis natioun, werie onnaturallie, he being on of the sones of the hous of craigie, quherof he was not wyfs, he wes headit in edinburgh, quarterit, and put wpon the portis.*

Vpoun tuyfday at ix houris in the morning, the —— day of feptember 1618 zeiris, in the kirk of Glammis, ane nobill lord, my lord hey, eldeft fone to the potent lord, frances erle of errol, was married with lady anna Lyoun, onlie dochter to the lait deceiflit erle of Kinghorne. [They] returnit fra the kirk, to the place of glamis with their nobill freinds on ather fyde. The feift continewit ane gude fpace, with great cheir, and all forts of paftyme and merrenes.

Nov. A great blazeing flar fene in the east 14 dayis.

Dec. 25. Zule approwit, and command gewin to hold it holie; quhilk day mr John guthrie at perth preachit thair, being fryday.

[March 2. 1619.] The quenes maieftie departit this lyfe, and wes buried the 29 of apryle. [May 13.]

—— 28. The facrament of the fupper gewin on peace day by Mr Johne guthrie, minister, out of his awin hand, to all the peopill, and thay reslaivit it on thair kneis.

Aug. 2. The brig of almond biggit, and compleit over.

Oct. 2. Thair wes ane lugeing all brunt in the fouth fyde of the hie gait of perth, pertening to conftantene Malice. The fyre crewell to behold.

Maj 9. 1621. [Mr John Guthrie receivit] and miffive from edinburgh, viz.

* The following entry relative to the same matter, occurs a few pages farther on:
"In September 1618, Mr thomas ros, sone to the lard of craigie, wes for vreting at oxfuird in Ingland againes the scottis natioun, being sent to scotland be schip, convicted be ane assyse, his richt hand first struken aff, and thirefter beheadit."

" Richt honorable Sir,

The loue and affection that we did euer cary towards you, and comfort which we hoped to enioie be your ministrie amongst ws, were the first motives that mooned ws to mak chois of yow to be our pastor; and nocht onlie these, quha wer magistratis for the tyme, but the whole people wer caried with the lyk affectioun and hope. That expectation is fo fixed in our mynd, that we are flill refolued to become fuittoris at your handis, that ye micht be pleafed accept upon yow that our calling, which we are perfwaded hes proceidit onlie off god, and off the inftinct off his holie spirit, for neuer was ther anie called by a people with more uniformitie of mynd, nor with fo great applaufe, as ye haue beene by ws. Nether hes greater expectation of comfort beene imprinted into the hartis of people, then that quhilke is expected by the people be your ministrie. Since then our haill hopes does depend upon yow, let we not find yow in this our ftrait, refractarie to godis calling; bot as we all as it were with ane mynd, hes mad choife of yow to be our paftor, fo it wald pleife yow to meet ws with the lyk fympathie off affectioun, and to embrace this our calling that we may be once mad happie be yow in injoying our long looked for delyres. We doe not think it fitting to contend with him quhom we wald have our paftor, and by whose ministrie we expect so great comfort, but we will rather flee to your awin bountie and charitie, most earnestlie entreating yow, that ye wald be pleifed to accept wpon yow that burden quhilk our necefitie nor ws to ceafe from our farder importunities; affuring yow, that quhat kindness or contentment can be expected or defyred of ane gud people towardis ther paftour, yow shall neuer find inlaiking in ws towardis yow. We also wnderstand by the Archbishop of Sanctandrois, that ye had offered to him to come hither, but that ye wald not bring with yow your familie; we hop for better at your handis, and that ye will tak vp ane vther course, seing it fall be vnpleasant both to vow

and ws: but to the end we might knaw your mynd, we have directed John byiris, our dean of guild, and william nemo, two of our number, to entreat with yow thiranent, whom ye may be pleafed to truft in our behalfe: And we hope that netheir ye nor nane of your familie shall have inflictuate to repent thair change. So expecting your answer be writ with these our commissionaris, and hoping to mett with the lyk loue and affection as that which you fall find in ws, We commit yow to god, and restis,

Oct. 14. 1621. Their wes fuche ane inundatione of vater, as the lyke in no manes remembrance wes fene, both in regular of the hicheryfing in the west side, as also of the sudane coming of it, being setterday all day wating efter.

Befoir xii of the cloke [of] the nycht, all the peopill in the caftell gavill and weft port, wer wat in thair beddis, and wakened with water to the waift in their floores. It femit the windowis of heavin and fountaines of the deep wer opponit. It carried away the ellewin bow brig of Tay. It wes within ane fute in hicht from the croce of perth. It tuike down the gawill of the tolbuith. It carried away all louis-work, being of admirabill ftrength and ftructur. This it did to the common ftreit of the toun by diuers and many particular menes loffes. The peopill of the Caftel gawill had died, about iij hundred foules, gif a boatt hed not bene borne be men from the fpey tour to it.

God lett we newir fie the ellik of it againe. It contynwit funday all day. The wind and weit incraflit. No paffage be any port, git we being humblit all that week with fafting and prayer. Tuy's preaching everie day. God hard we that the water decreaflit, glorie be to his majeffie. Many maid wowes for thair saiftie, xii * abstinance and thankfulnes.

This zeir [1621] a great skairstie of cornes wes throw all the kingdome, and that be the ewill harwest and inwndatioun that happnit, and [would] have bene greater, [if] abondance of eforane wictuall hed not cum in, zit it gaiff 12 lib, 20 merk, the bow bear, and peass meall, 16 merks.

March 3. 1622. Mr John Robertfone admittit minister at perth, be impositioun of handis of Alexander bischope of dunkell. Ministris, Johne malcolme, Niniane drumond, Robert murray and Alexander bannewis, and deposit on the 25 maij 1655.

June. Thair come in ane great dunkirk schip to Leith, chassit be the hollande vachteris, quher in the road of leithe, they hed ane great feeht and many men slaine, fra xij at nicht till sour in the morning, and this schip wes burnit be the hollanderis a zeir thairester, quha stayit and keipit her in.

June 22. Alexander erll of dumfermeling, chancellar of Scotland, departit this lyfe in Pinkey, with the lowe of all the kingdome, ane honeft testimony of all nobillis and wtheris, buried in dalgeatie on the nynt of July thairefter.

July 18. George the thrid fone to the baillie of erroll, being clerk register, wes maid chanceller of Scotland be his maiesties gift winder the great faill.

In this zeir [1622] about the haruest and efter, Thair was fuche and wniverfall seiknes in all the cuntrie as the ellyke has not bene hard of.

Bot fpeciallie in this burgh, that no familie in all the citie wes frie of this vilitatioun. Thair wes also great mortalitie amongs the poore.

Feb. 23. 1623. Prince Charlis tuik his jorney from londoun to Spane throw france. He past with fyve allanerlie in his companie, and in october thairefter, he returnit from Spayne, to the great contentmentis of all the kingdome, and bone fyres wer sett furth throch out all the cuntrie.

In zeir [1623] deit within fextene weekis, james adamfone, quha wes proveft, mr henrie anderfone, quha wes bailzie, david fibbald, william williamfone, James bannewis, quha hed bene baillies, Andro anderfone, quha wes bailzie that fame zeir.

Thair wes this harvest tyme ane great mortalitie and dearthe that x or xij deit ordinarlie euerie day, from midsomer to mychaelmas, within this burgh.

- Lowfwark wes boundit in stone, for bwilding quherof, the kingis majestie payit 2000 merks. This burgh payit 1000 lib. The laird of Balhoussie fould have payit iij hundred merks, as git restand.
- Sep. 21. This zeir the counfall being met in the counfall hous, we fand the toun to be 20,000 merkis in debt, and ten zeir of the tak of the mylnes, Inches, and fischingis to run.
- Oct. 5. henrie elder clerk depairtit this lyfe and wes buried on fonday thairefter, and on mononday the day of october, being the election day, John merfer admittit clerk but ony oppositioun.
- 1623-4. This zeir wes fuche ane froft, that the ellyke hes not bene fene in our dayis, for from mertymes to the 30 of Januar, thair wes paffage over the Tay wpone the ice. And thaireftir diffolvit and freiffit agane to the 23d of february, that ellewin cairtis with 21 puncheonis of wyne came over wpon the yee from dundie heir.

Jan. 24. 1624. Thair wes ane great fyre in dumfermling, that brunt almaift the haill toun in four houris space. Thairefter whom thair

lipplication voluntar contribution wes grantit thame throchout the kingdome. Thair wes collectit [in Perth?] aboue lxx merkis.

May 10. 1624. Their wes are justice court haldin at perth, be fir george hey, chancellor, fir alexander colwill, justice deput, The erll of murray, The erll of perth, [lord] wyems, quherin many comperit and wer clengit be affyfe, onlie 3 hangit, M'gregoris.

Sept. 18. Ane millive direct from Edinburgh concerning the Conferwatorie.

" Richt honorabill and loving nichtbouris,

Efter owr hairtie and maift affectionat commendationne, fforfamekill as we wnderstand, be ane letter direct from Mr Patrik Hamiltoun, of his maieflies gracious acceptance of the laft letter written to his Maiefly be the commissioners of the Burrowis, convenitt heir in August last, Anent the mater of confernatorie, and withall, that his Maiestie hes fignified his pleafure anent him, Which is, that in respect of James Dowglas aige and his maieftie many feruices, that he will nocht fpair him, and thairfore defiring yat he micht with ane guid leave returne, We have thocht fitt to giff Zow notice heirof, and becaus the mater doth fo concerne the haill burrowis in publict and ilk man in private, and that thaire remaines good hopes that his maieftie will not altogidder resett the suit of sa monie his guid subjectis; leist anie neglect be imputed to us in the carriage of the business, if we fuld fuffer the same to defert, the advantagis being great to the pretendantis, the prefent titulars estate with the seasone of the zeir considderit, We have ordaned ane particular conventioun of burrowis to be halden heir, upon the last of September instant, Of the quhilk number, ze are to be ane ;--To confidder upon the best expedient to prosequut that essaire to the guid of the burrowis, and to take fuch course thairin as may tend to the fettling of that place to thair contentment; We ar thairfore earnestlie to entreat zow to fend zour commissioners fullie instructed to vote, reasone, and contende, anent all things concerning ye same, or whiche salbe thocht fittest for the guid thairof, and swa expecting thame, we rest your loving brethren, the provest, and baillies of Edinburgh, subscrived be Mr Johne Hay our comoun clerk at our command, Edinburgh the 18 of September 1624.

To the richt honorabill our loving freindis and nichtbouris, the Proveft, baillies, and Counfall of the burgh of Perth, Thefe."

Oct. 26. Robert abroche, ane makgregor, ane grait lymer, quha haid been ains or twyfs forgewen and remittit be his maieftie for his oppression who have of amendment, but he continewit still in his knaueries. And after thair wes mekill fearching maid for him in the hielandis, and all his freindis chargit to apprehend, come to perth this day, being twyfday, ane preaching day, efter fermone, and fell down on his kneis, and ane tow about his neck, and offerit his suord be the point to the chancellar of Scotland, quha resulfit to accept of it, and commanded the bailleis to ward him, lyke as they instantly wardit him, and patt baith his feit on the gade quher he remanit.

Nov. 30. The peft come to edinburgh be ane paull, and wes *

and death of tua of his childerene,

and ane ftranger ludgit in his hous callit Paull, quha hed brocht money with the infectioun from danfkyne; wpone the quhilk the fessione raifs, and the chancellar and his familie come to perthe, thrie dayis thairefter.

Dec. 14. Sir andro murray of baluaird departit this lyfe in edinburgh, his corpis brocht to faulkland, and buried in arngoik.

Feb. 11. 1625. Ane missive direct from Edinburgh, concerning the confervatorie and factourie in Flanders.

" Richt honorabill and loveing nichtbouris,

After our maift hartlie commendationnes, Wheras the commissioners of burowis convened at this our burgh the 13 day of July last, anent the

commissioun giwin to thame be the commissioners of burrowis, in thair last generall conventioun haldin at Lynlithgow, for taking order with the factouris in Flanders, they then continewed this dyet to the fyftene day of Merche nixt, and gaiwe order for warning of the faid factouris for compeirance heir the faid day; and feing that your burghe was one of the faid number to quhome the faid mater was concredeit, we thairfore, be thir prefentis, hes thocht guid to put yow in rememberance of the faid appointment, and to require yow to fend your commissioners fufficientlie inftructed for decyding of quhat complainte falbe giwin in against the saids factors, and for prewenting of all farder misordour amangs theme, and all wther greaweances the merchantis may fuffeine in thair defalt; and if anie of your nichtbouris hes susteined anie hurt or wrong be thame, that ye bring theme with yow instructed for preiving of the same. And lyikwayes we doe intreat yow, to instruct yowr commissioners with the best reassounes yow haue, for insisting with the lordis of his maiefties most honorabill priwie counsall, in the mater of importatioun of Wictuall wpon the ald accustomit dewties. And laftlie, fince that it hes pleafit his maieftie to confer wpon Mr Patrick Drummond, the rewerfloun of the place of the conferwatorie, efter the present titulars deceis, we, efter report maid be Mr Johnne hay, quhome we imployed to deale with his maiestie in the said mater of the proceidings therin, and wnderstanding his maiesties will be his letters anent the faid Maifter Patrick, enterit in conditiones with him, and fand him plaufible to all we could reafonablie craiwe of him in your names; we will thairfor requyre yow, as on quhome that mater does much concerne, to fend your commissioners sufficientlie instructed, to meitt at this owr burghe the faid fyftene day of marche nixt, for finall fatling with him, and fetting downe fuch wther conditiones as yow fall think fitteft for the weale of your effait. So not troubling yow farther, bot committing the premiffes to yowr care and diligence, we bid yow

hairtlie fareweill, (fic fubscribitur,) yowr lowing freindis and nichbouris, the prowest, baillies, and counsall of Edinburgh, subscribed be Mr Alexander guthrie, owr commoun clerk, at our command.

To the richt honorabill, our lowing freinds and nichtbouris, the proweft, baillies, and counfall of the burgh of Perth, Thefe."

27th March. Being fonday, King James the fext departit this lyfe, in Ingland, at Londoun, being 59 zeir of his age and regne of Scotland, and 22 of Ingland, france, and Irland; he wes ane learned, and religious, wyfs prince.

7th May. He wes bureit at westminster with great pomp, and the funeraillis celebrat with 5000 mwrneris in blak, the Inglis and scottis nobilitie mairching all according to thair qualitie and degrie. The erll of mortoun buir the scottis pinsill. The zoung king wes cheiff mourner. The Duck of lennox, and marquis of hamiltoun, wer nixt the coffin. Charles the first, sone to king James the fext, wes proclaimit king at Londone the 27 day of marche, and in edinburgh the last day of the said moneth, in the said zeir of god 1625.

June 12. The queene come to Ingland from france to dower, and wes perfonallie maried to king charles; and thairefter, the packit cuming to edinburgh the 21 of the faid moneth, bone fyres wer fet furth, and great mirth and fchoteing from the caftell. Thomas Crombie, burges of perthe, being fummonit to wnderly the law for allegit flauchter of ane william blair, ane wellland gentilman, quha notwithflanding hed done the famyn negligentlie to him felfe, being of intention to have flrucken the faid Thomas with ane qubinger, he burt himfelfe in the arme, quherof he died within 20 dayis thairefter. And the faid Thomas compeirit with 80 burgeffes of perth, befydes 5 erlls, 6 lordis,

and 26 barones, wpone the burgh of perthis defyre to bak him, wes clengit and freid thairfra.

July. Thair wes this zeir ane great peft at london, fo that thair deit within the citie 12,000 in a weik.

Dec. 28. Ane wapoun schaweing in perth: upon this tyme tua new ensengeis maid be the toun. Adame patersone, thesaurer.

Robert arnot and Patrick Pitcarne, capitanis, beararis of the enfenzeis, John andersone.

Feb. 8. 1626. John crychtoun of kinwed, wes buried at the kirk of kinclewin.

Aug. 7. 1626. [Here follows a miffive] To the richt honorabill our loveing friendis and nichtbouris, the proueft, bailgies, and counfell of the burghe of perth:—

"Richt honorabill and loveing freindis, our commendationnes rememberit, forfamekill as the lordis of his maiefties counfell of warre, be thair letter direct to me of the daitt the fecund day of August instant, hes fignified to me that they being conflitut be his maiestie, to forsie that this, his ancient kingdome, be weill and fubftantiouslie provydit and furnefchit, with fufficient guid airmis, and that the home bringing of airmis properly concernis the borrowis of his Realme, and that thairfor they thocht meit to mak the first offer thairof to the faidis burrowis, and thairfor willit ws to conveine the commissionaris of the faid burrowis, wpon the Tuentie tua day of this inftant, to confult gif they wald wndertak that chairge, and wpoun quhat termes and conditiounis, and quhat prices and Rate they wald furneis the fubjectis, and ficlyk to deliberate wpon all wther expediencis in the faid feruice, We have thairfor conform to the faid letter, thocht fitt to appoynt ane generall conwentioun of borrowis to meitt at this burgh the twentie ane day of this inflant, to the effect above specifit, and thairfor we will and require gow to fend gour commissioner sufficientlie instructed, to ressoun, vote, and conclude thairanent; and further forfamekill as thair is ane late proclamatioun maid anent the grievance, quhairin thair is fum particulars, neirlie concernyng the whole borrowis of this Realme, and als that fince the agent of the borrowis at Court hes demittit his plaice, and that thair public effaires doe require that thay have ane agent refident at Court, quhome they may intrust with thair effairis, and to guhome thay may direct thair letters, to negotiat fuch buffiness as thay fall have with his maieftic at anie tyme thairefter, we have thocht guid to recommend the fame to zour wyfe confideratioune, and accordinglie that zow wald fend zour commissioners sufficientlie instructed to vote, reffoun, and conclude theranent. We intreat gow that ge wald wyflie think wpon these effaires, and tak fuch course as may be for the publict guid; for our awin pairtis, we fall contribute owr best endewoires to that which may procure the fame; gif wther wayis zow neglect thefe ordinar courfes which may tend to the publict guid, and which hes beine fo refolvit wpone by zour predeceffouris, we feare the event fall prove that things ar not fo providentlie caryed as the publict necessitie requireth. We have resoluit not to be wanting to zow, nor our selffis, nather in our adwysse, nor anie wther thing within the compass of our powar, quherof as we have ever gewin evident demonstratioun in all thir publict adoes, fo do we intend to keip the fame tennor in all time cuming, affuring ourfelffis that ze will gif ws the lyk retribution, wtherwayis necessitie will enforce everie man to prowyd for his awin private interest: fwa remitting these particulars to zour wyse consideration, and willing zow wald fend zowr commissioner sufficientlie inftructed for keiping of the faid conventioun, as 30w tender the weill of the borrowis, wnder the paine of xx punds ilk burrow, in caice of failure, we bid zow haftily fareweill, and reftis zour loveing freindis and nichtbouris, the Provest and baillies of Edinburgh, subscrybeing be Mr John Hay, our commoun Clerk at our command. Sic fubscribitur J. HAY."

1626. Sir George hay chancellor wes hardlie accufit befoir the king at londone, one diueris poyntis be my lord merfeaill, and his confideratis, bot wes freed at laft, efter thrie quarteris of ane zeir remaining at court.

John erll of montrois departit at kincardin, and wes buriet at aberuthuen the 3 of Januar 1627.

1627. Thair wes ane warrand from the kingis majeftie, and his counfall, for lifting in Scotland 9000 men to go to ferwe wnder the king of denmark, in the germane warres for renewing of the palatinat and bohemia, quher thair wes many forcit, as beggaris, idill men, and but competent meanes to leiwe wpon, wnder the conduct of the erll of nidifdaill, my lord fpynny, and the laird of murthill Sincklar, as colonellis.

Thair wes this same zeir, 2000 gentilmen, landit men, baronis, lordis, and wtheris of gude sorte, leawentit from Scotland, wnder the erll of mortoun, for helping to take the Ile of [Rhee] or sanctmertenes in france. They sailled from leith the 17 october 1627. Bot the Ille wes recoverit be the frensche fra the Inglis.

Oct. 6. 1628. Thair wes ane justice court, or air, hauldin heir at perth, be william erll of monteithe as justice general, quherto wer 25 fcott indytit and panellit. They wer gentlie wiet and dimissit wpone caution to compeir the next court. Thair wer certane of our nychbouris burgesses citat. Our Prowest being crownar producit our gift, and releiwit thame, and Tuk protestatioun quhilk wes extractit.

The fame tyme andro wilfone being deane of gilde, wer enterit my lord Kilcruich the Justice, fir John hay, and his brother, and wtheris burgeslis.

Oct. 6. 1629. Ane inflice air haulden at perth be Sir george auchinlek of balmano, and mr [Alexander Seton] of kilcruich, justices deput. Sir Thomas houp the kingis advocat being prefent, quherto wer fumonit

and compeirit about 200 men, fum fynit, and fum fet frie, according as probatioun aith of the partie. Thair wes 97 perfones of this burgh inditit, quha wer referrit to our awin cenfure wpone productioun and tycht of our charter quhilk wes producit, and documentis tane thair-upone, and fand we crownearis within our felffis. As also the lordis acknawlegit the fynes to pertene to we, and tuk the provest, baillies, and dene of gilde, oblift to wplift the same and applie [them] to sum gude ws.

Thair wer dineris foirstallaris within the sheristdome, callit and convenit besoir the justices, and our charter gewen be king Robert the thrid, being producit anent the punishing of foirstallaris, quhilk being sene, and considerit, (and finding that Androu wilsone dene of gilde in ane gilde court, hauldin the fext of may preceiding hed conwict) [They] sufferit thame to pas frie from the censure, acknowledging that we be our gift haid power so to do, and that the onlawes of all foirstalleris within the sherisdome, did appertene to this burgh quhersoeuir, or be quhatsumewir judge they sould be conwict, as at this tyme they did. Quhervpone, instrumentis wer taikin and extractit, extant among the tounes wreittis.

May 1630. The quenes maiestie delyverit of ane man chyld, quha wes baptigit at loundoun, charlis, the 27 of June. In this may wer v fetterdays, v moundayis, Tua changes of the mone, tua eclipses of the fone, ane wther of the mone, all in our horizone. Thair wer no ambaffadors present at the baptisme of the prince, nor forraners except our awin cuntrie nobillis, such as the duk of Lennox, the marques of hamiltoun, the maior of londoun.

July 1630. The fynes that wer gottin fra our nychbouris at the preceding justice air, wer bestowit on the redding of the rwynes of the fallen brig of Tay, bigging of croyis for faiftie of the toun and inches from the wiolence of the water; and on the bigging of the from

of fyne ftone, aiflair wark, at mounkis tour, on the tounes expenses, and for casting of the dok for crewis and boattis, in the winter tyme from danger.

In this fame zeir george hey chancellar of Scotland, wicount of dupline, did big ane twriet, or fomerhous wpone the head of the rome of monkis tour on the tounes comoun wall, for his plefure, with ouerfycht of the toun, and tollerance, zit I think they gaue no tollerance be writ.

July 1631. Thair wes ane great counfall day hauldin at perth with ane conventioune of the burrowis, Andro wilfone commissioner.

Sep. David wicount of flormont departed this lyfe at Scone, and wes bureit in his awin buriall [place] thair, with great folempnitie.

June 1632. Mr John row wes admittit mafter of the gramer fcole, be the proveft, baillies, and counfall, without confent or woatt of ony wtheris; quha affixit ane edict and declaration in latine, ane oration de linqua, de fermone. The ministeris and presbyterie prest to have tryd him, but we would not admit it, for the quhilk thair wes much outcrying in the pulpett.

[15] King charlis come to edinburgh, his entrie wes with great folemnitie and diveris brawe fchawis: he wes crownit in halyrudhous the 18 day of June, and [went] thairto from the caftell, with great pomp, accompanyt with the whole nobilitie in thair robis. The 20 day, the parliament red. Andro Wilfon wes commissionar, both to the burrowis and the parliament. At this parliament mr John guthrie bischop of murray preichit before his majestie in fanct Jeillis kirk, with the surples on him, and the englishe service red at the Latrone be Inglismen.

Therefter wpone the 8 of July his majefty come to perth, and wes weill receasit with Ten fcoir of men for guard, all in quhyte doublattis, and red breikis, with partiganes. Mr william bell deliuerit him a

speeche. Mr william wischart minister at leithe preichit in our kirk to his maiestie.

Thair wes are fuord dance dancit to his majestie the morne efter his cumyng, who are iland maid of Tymer, who the water of Tay, and certaine wersis spokin to his maiestie be and boy, representing the persone of the Riwer of Tay, and sum conference in his maiesties praise betuin Tay and another representing perth, made be Andro wilsone baillie.

Oct. 4. 1634. Auld mr william row minister at forgond depairtit.

Oct. 31. Mr Josephe Lawrie admittit minister of perth, be imposition of handis of ministris, niniane Drummond and John robertsone, and be the prowest, baillies, and counsall of perthe,—mr niniane Drummond preachit. His stipend agreit on xiij hundred lx merks.

In Januar 1685 from the 26 day thairof, till the 16 day of februar, thair fell furth fuche ane hudge snow, That men nor women could not walke wpone our ftreitis. It was ten quarter or Tua ellis heiche, throw all the toun. Tay was 30 dayis frozen ower. Thair was ane fast appointed and thair came a gentill thow, blessed be God. Thair was great skairstie of wictuall, and elding mylnis gaed not, and thair was no passage nor travelling to bring only in. At that tyme aill was waid skant. They knokit malt in knoking stones.

Aug. 19. Chancellor Hay buried in kirk of kinnoul, Mr James foullar maid fermon.

July 22. 1636. Andro gray, proneft, departit this lyfe of ane fewar of fywe dayis fpace, and wes buried the faboth thirefter with great grieff of all, both toun and cuntrie. The bellis of the fleipill rang all the tyme fra the corpis wes liftit till the moulis wer turnit on him in his grawe. [He] leiwit not ane full yeir proueft.

Andro Wilfone baillie departit this lyfe on fonday, the 3 day of September 1637 zeiris, of ane heiche fywer about nyne hours at nycht, and

wes buried on Tuyfday thairefter. At the lifting of the corpis, the bellis of the ftepill rang quhill he wes putt in his grawe. He wes 14 zeiris baillie and deane of gilde, but intromiffioun. He deit with greit grieff of the toun and countray. Mr John Robertsone maid his funerall fermone.

— 5. Mr Robert lawrie admittit reader and wptaker of the pfalmes, be the proueft, baillies, and counfall, without confent of the ministeris and elderis. Mr Johne robertione, minister, being present differit thairfra, and depairtit, and wald have hed the full confent not onlie of the ministeris and elderis, but also of the Archbishop of Sanctandrois. George biffet differit to his admission as elder, and efter confentit as councellor. Mr Josephe lawrie his father compeirit not, becaus his collige mr John refusit, 5it willing.

Therefter the proueft, alexander peblis, past with the counsall to the latrone, and patt mr robert in possession of bayth the places, and deliuerit to him the bybell and psalme buk in his hands.

Dec. 27. John drummond, deacone of the fkynners, departit this lyfe, inteffat, fuddanelie, and buried on fryday the 29 of december.

Wpone fonday the 31 of Januar 1638, — butter of gournok mareit with — blair, fecond dochter to fir Thomas blair of balthyok, knycht, in the kirk of Kynnoul, be Mr Thomas halyburtoun, minister at kynnoul, being anes proclaimit that same day. The feast held in charles Rollokis hous in the vater gait: the laird duelt thair for the tyme.

Wpone fonday the fourt day of februar 1638, in the kirk of glamis, ane nobill lord, [Henry] Lord car, onlie fone to the erll of roxburghe, wes mareit with dame margaret hay, onlie dochter to umquhill williame erll of erroll: [they] returnit fra the kirk of glameis with thair nobill freinds on ather fyde. The feaft continewit ane gude fpace, with great folempnitie, and paftyme and mirrines.

Wpone the fext of februar, being faftingis ewin, on ane Tuysday,

1638, the mafter of madertie, callit [David] drumond, wes mareit with —— creichtoun, eldeft dochter of unquhill Johne crychtoun of Kinved, in the kirk of perth, be fewin houris in the morning, but proclamatioun or warrant from the bifchopis, be mr Josephe lawrie, minifter at perth. The marriage held in the erll of errollis ludgeing in the water gait of perthe.

In februar 1638, the 8 or nynt day thairof, the fession fat down at striviling, and continewit till the —— day of ——. Se may gess gif the toun of edinburgh wes angrie or not.

Thair wes ane proclamation maid be found of trumpets at the croce of ftriviling, for reflauing of the feruice buik, and proteftation tane be the erll of home and my lord lyndefay, at the croce of ftriuiling and at the counfell tabill. And lykwais proclamation maid be the lyon horrellis for reflaving the fame on the 22 of februar, at the croce of edinburgh; quhilk wes impedit be fewin erlls and nyne lordis.

Feb. 23. —— fauconer, fpouse to alexander lindsay of ewelyke, depairtit this lyf, and wes bureit at the kirk of kilspindie the first day of marche 1638.

March 11, 12, 13. The confession of the fayth and band of the cowenant, wes subscrivit be the prouest, baillies, counsall, deaconis, and haill inhabitantis of perth, and gentric resident thairin, by sindric nobillmen, barrones, commissionaris of burrowis, and wtheris, that subscrivit at edinburgh.

—— 25. This wes publicklie red befoir none on peax day, being the xxv day of marche 1638, be mr Robert lawrie reader. Mr Johne robertfone preachit, being ane faft, and the haill kirk and congregatioun tarie fuorne thairto, be wphaulding of thair hands. Item.—On fonday thereftir, being the first of Apryll 1638, the communion wes given be the ministers in the auld maner, be the minister and elderis: the minister at the litill tabell, and the elderis at the tua, burdis, being

peopill at both fydes therof, euerie ane tuk the bread first off the plait with ther awin hand, and fine the coup. Nota.—george biffett and I bure the bread, gregor johnstoun, and patrick dundie, the coupis, this zeir.

Nov. 21. Ane generall affemblie halden at glafgow. The Marquess of hamiltoun commissioner for the king, quha depairtit befoir the affemblie raifs.

Thomas durhame commissioner for perth.

In merche 1639, ane great conflict on the fea betuix the fpanis nawie, contening in number fourtie shipis, going for affishance of the toun of Aberdene and the north partis, and the hollanders being bot in number ——. The Spanish nawie wes altogidder defeatt, at the pleifoure of god.

Aug. 12. A new frie generall affemblie indictit be his majeftie, and hauldin this fame day at edinburgh; my lord Traquair, thefaurer, principall commissionar for his majestie; quherin the episcopall government is abiurit,—the sywe articles of perth, and sundrie wtheris novations. Patrick dundie commissionar for this toun.

Parliament riddin at edinburgh wpon the last day of august 1639: Traquair, the commissionar for the king, continewit. Robert anderson commissioner for this burgh of perth.

Oct. 1639. In october 1639, thair come in to the vaftis of Ingland ane greatt nawie, the ellyke hath not bene fene in thir partis past memorie [of] man, about the number of ane hundreth schippis, callit the holie lige, confisting of the Spanish Galeons and from the pope. Ther intention, god knawis, na question to have landit wpone this kingdome. Sit, at the plesour of god, they wer defeatt be the hollanders, quherin ther wer greatt skayth done be ather of the parteis, 3it nothing done to the hollanders, in reguaird of the defeatt gewin be thame to the holie lige.*

^{*} No entries appear for several years.

Wpon the third day of februar 1648, being about four houris in the morning, Iffobell wentoun, relict of winquhill Johne creichtoun of kinved, depairtit this lyfe, and wes buried in the kirk of perth, winder the feollaris feat, nixt auddies buriall. Wpone the 8 of februar, payit thair foir one hundred pounds, quilk wes ordainit be the counfall and feffioun to by ane coup to the communion.

Laurence oliphant of condie depairtit this lyff in edinburgh, and bureit in the kirk of fortewiot, wpone the 16 day of februar 1643.

Wpone the —— day of februar 1643, my lord Car, quha mareit the erll of errollis onlie dochter, depairtit in edinburgh in nycht tyme, efter ane great drink, leawing behind him onlie Tua dochteris, and his Ladie great with chylde.

- Oct. 12. —— pattoun, fone to eduard pattoun, maried with —— beattoun.
- Nov. 5. The new counenant, read, fworne, and fubfcryvit be the toun of perthe, be flanding wp, and euerie man wphalding thair hands. The women also wer mowit to flande and fueir.
- July 4. 1644. Ane great battell ftruckin on marfloun mwre, in Ingland, neir the citie of 3 ork, betuix prince Rupert, fifter fone to king charlis, affifit be his majefties forcefs on the [one] part, and be my lord generall fairfalk for the parliament of Ingland, and my lord manchefter, and be generall leflie for fcotland; quherin it wes thocht that the parliament, and fcotis forcefs and armes, prewaillit mychtilie, and pat prince Rupert to the flicht: quhat number wes killit I knawe not.

It was thocht thair was threttie thowfand and ewerie fyde.

—— 16. Jork wes randerit be the erll of newcastell and generall king, quha wer for the king, wpone suir quarteris, and vairie gude conditiones, to fairfolk and generall Leslie: bot fairfolk and manchester gat the keeping thairof; and the scotis gat nane, except ane monethes pay, or thairby.

Thairefter my lord almond, lewetenent generall of fcotland, and generall leflie, laid fedge to newcastell for intaking thairof.

_____25. Murdoche, fervitour to James finyth, headit at the croce, for the flauchter of _____ muckrobie, fewitour to James grahame in drumfyde.

Wpone the first of September 1644, being sonday, thair was ane great conflict, betuix James marques of montroifs, for the scotis forces wnder his auctoritie, befyde Tibbermuir, on the mures therof, and befyde landerran and the burrow mure, being assist be the athoill men of fir John drumond, lord perthis second sone, and some of the marques awind friendis, and be ane Mr Alexander makconell, brother to the erll of antrim, with xij hundred men of eirshes, expert souldiours, estimat in number all to Thrie Thousand men on the ane part; and be the haill theristidomes of perth, syst, and wtheris and haill burrowes of syste, nobill men and gentrie thairoff, estimat to the number of Sex thousand, weill armit, [and] by Thrie hundreth excellent hors, my lord elcho wes crownear. They were foir, to on with montroifs.

The battell begane about Tuelff houris, or ane, efternone, and leftit not half ane hour, quhen the fyff people, both fute and hors, fled beaftlie, did nawer difcharge all togidder ance, zea, not ane Third therof. Thair wer killed in fleing, aboue viij hundred men of gude account and gentill men, and fex peice of cannon of the fyff men tane.

The fpeciall gentillmen that wer killit, namit* . . .

This fame nycht, about nyne hours at ewin, The toun wes renderit to the marquis wpone quarteris, bot prejudice of the couenantis, To be frie of plundering, and to leawe as the kingis loyall fubjectis: his cumpanie quarterit here frie, fra fonday at nycht, mononday, and Tuyf-

day, many, woddenfay, and Thurfday; he himfelf remainit qubill woddenfay.

It was an dear quartering to this burgh, and to the countrie about. He tuke with him about viij hundred fyffe men, that came into this toun on fonday at nycht: they wer wardit in the kirk.

- Sep. 10. The erll of Lauthianeis regiment cam to this burgh, and quarterit frelie two dayis; himself came with thame.
- —— 11. The marqueis of Argyll come to this burgh, with great armeis with him, flayit quhill fetterday thairefter, the xiiij thairof. The toun wes greatlie damnefeit in thair meanes, and the cuntrie about.

Thair come * _____ furth of dumbartane and the lennox, and remainit heir.

- Sep. 13. Fryday. The Toun of aberdene tane in be montrois, great blude fkeild on both fydes. God help it, and mend it, in his awin gude tyme.
- —— 19. Megregour and his companey went furth of this burgh to * ————
- Sep. 28. Setterday. My lord maitlands regiment come to perth for kepeing of the toun, and flayit qubill the xx of marche 1643, both they and craufurds regiment.

Dec. 16. monday at night. My Lord Lindfayis regiment came to Perth being in number aucht hunder, and stayit quhill monday the 23 of december, and we quarterit [thame] in the fouthgait, and west side of the watergait; at quhilk tyme both this regiment and my lord Maitlands regiment went furth of perth, and left behind tham tua hundreth men, viz. ane hundreth of my lord Lindsayis, quhairof C— Moncreif wes

Capitane, and the other hundreth of my lord maitlandis quhair of C—Cunninghame wes Capitane.

Jan. 8. 1645. Maitlandis regiment come bak to perthe agane.

— 9. Lyndefayis regiment come to perthe agane. The foiouris begane to gett tua peckis of maill ilk ane of thame weiklie.

Fra the 28 of September 1644 ane foiour of maitlandis regiment, John persone his name, wes quarterit with me, Till the viij of Januar 1645.

The regiment forywener wes quarterit with me, callit David Staker, fra the fecund of December 1644, Till the nynt of Januar 1645.

Capitane frances wauchop and his man wes quarterit with me fra the viij of Januar 1645, Till the 22 of marche in eodem anno 1645 gratis.

- Feb. 11. Capitane wachope went to couper with a hundred men.
- March 15. Setterday at night. He come bak with his man to my hous.

EXTRACTS FROM THE KIRK SESSION RECORDS OF PERTH.

May 1577. Compeared Marion Whyte, and confesses her Fornication with John Swenton, and the fecond fault, and submits herself to the discipline of the kirk, and civil punishment.

Compeared John Swentoun, alleged father to the bairn, who being demanded gif he has had carnall deall with Marion Whyte, within 9 months bygone or thereby; he denied that he had any carnall deall with her within this 2 years bygone; and therefore the faid Marion referred to his confcience to fwear gif he had carnall deall with her or no by the [fpace] forefaid. The affembly [Seffion] affigns to the faid John, monday next, to give forth his aith thereupon, either negative or affirmative.

May 27. 1577. Compeared John Swentown, and refused to give his oath upon the contents of the last act, and therefore the affembly ordains the kirk to proceed against him by admonitions: under the pain of censures of the kirk to depone his aith, either negative or affirmative, conform to the last act concerning the fornication, confest by Marjory Whyte committed with him, to whom she is with bairn, as she has confessed and alledges presently.

June 20. 1577. Compeared John Swentown, and confesses his fornication with Marion Whyte, and the fecond fault, and submits himself to the discipline of the kirk, and the civil punishment, conform to the order; and is ordained to compear before the affembly on Monday the 7th of July, to receive his directions for his fecond fault of fornication.

July 1. 1577. Because certain inhabitants of this town, as well against the express command of the civil magistrate, as against the ministers prohibitions in the pulpit, have played Corpus Christi's play,* upon Thursday the Sixth day of June last, whilk day was wont to be called Corpus Christi's day, to the great slander of the church of God, and dishonour to this haill town; and because the said Play is idolatrous, superstitious, and also slanderous, as well by reason of the fixth day, * * * * * * * * * * * *

December 9. 1577. Because that Thomas Paterson and Katherine Culbert contracted marriage, and the said Katherine will not accomplish the same; therefore (the Sessioun) desires the baillies to puind John Wood who was cautioner for the said Katherine for ten pounds, according to the act.

December 16. 1578. Gilbert Robertson, William Morton, Thomas Rollock, Thomas Jack, John M'Baith, confess that they have transgressed an act made in the affembly of ministers and elders, and ratified by the provost and baillies, in that they superstitiously passed about the town on St Oberts† Even, disguised, in piping and dancing, and torches

bearing: for the whilk they fubmit themselves to the discipline of the kirk.

January 11. 1578-[1579.] It is also thought meet that the affembly make their supplication also to the Council upon Thursday, touching the walkars, that no walkar perk their webbs as in times past upon Gray Friars Walls.

The whilk day John Swentown mafter of the Sang School of this town, exponed to the affembly of the minister and elders, that he had great travel in teaching the youth of this town in mulic, and in taking up of the Pfalms, and that the council of the town had made him title of gift to the annuals of the Gray Fraternity altars within this town: yet notwithflanding he was contented to fubmit himfelf to the affembly of the kirk herein, and receive of benevolence what they pleafed to beftow upon him induring his travel and good fervice,—and because the affembly was willing to gratify the faid John for his good fervice; therefore they willed him to discharge any right he had or pretended to the faid altarage, and to receive of benevolence as they would bestow upon him. In respect whereof, the faid John willingly by thir presents has renuded, and prefently renudes and overgives, all right title of gift he has, or may have, to the faid alterage of the Gray Fraternity, given to him by the council of this town, or any other ways, with all letters or executorialls raifed thereupon. In respect whereof, the faid affembly

of the elders is content, that the faid John Swentown intromit with their annuals of their faid altarage, induring the fpace of the year to come, and fame also induring their wills, and according to his good service: providing always that he make no assignees to the uplifting of the faid annuals, but only to take them up by himself; and to this effect the assembly ordains the master of the hospitality to assist in the uplisting of the same as said is.

May 25. 1579. The Affembly ordains the Baillies to put Helen—upon the Crofs Head for the fpace of an hour, and to pay half ane mark to the poor before the come down, and that for the flandering of Thomas Brown.

Thomas Malcom is convicted before the affembly, to have called Thomas Brown "loun carll," for the whilk the affembly ordains him to be put in the Tolbooth, there to remain two hours, and to pay 6s. 8d. to the poor.

2. 1580. Ordains an act to be made by the Minister, concerning discharging of all passing to the Draggon Hole, superstitiously, and the same to be published on Thursday next out of the Pulpit, and thereaster to be given to the Baillies, and proclaimed at the Mercat cross.

Becaule that the Affembly of Minister and Elders understand, that the resorting to the Draggon Hole, as well by young men as women, with their piping, and drums striking before them, through the Town, has raised no small slander to this Congregation, not without suspicion of filthiness after to follow thereupon; for avoiding whereof in times coming, the said Assembly, with consent of the Magistrates of this Town, has statute and ordained, that no person hereaster of this Congregation, neither man nor woman, resort nor repair hereaster, to the said Drag-

gon Hole, * as they have done in times bygone, namely, in the month of May; neither pass through the Town, with piping and striking of drums, as heretofore they have done, under the pain of twenty shillings to the poor to every person, as well man as woman that [contravene] hereof; and also to make their public repentance upon ane Sabbath Day in presence of the people: and this ordinance to be published at the Mercat cross upon Saturday next, as also in the Pulpit by the Minister, on Thursday and Sunday next to come, that none hereafter pretend ignorance hereof.

The faid act was published the fixth day of May at the Mercat cross, as also from the Pulpit.

March 8. 1580. [1581.] Ordains Conflantine Malis and Ifobell Elder, to make their public repentance upon Sunday next, and further pay four pounds to the poor; because that in time of their public humiliation and fasting, they passed up at once to their feasting and solemnizing of marriage, contrary to all good order.

May 8. 1581. It is ordained, that who over joins carnally together, betwixt the giving up of their banns before the kirk, and accompliftment of their marriage, shall pay forty shillings to the poor, and make their public humiliation before the Pulpit, upon the Sunday before marriage.

July 31. It is ordained by the haill Affembly, that every flyter convicted flyting, shall pay half mark to the poor, stand upon the Cross Head, and make public repentance for satisfaction of the kirk and party.

Nov. 20. 1581. Ordains all poffeffors of altarages to put up their lights in the kirk, and to put up on the Sunday, ane two penny candle, and the baillies to cause this to be done by found of bell through the town, under the pain of not answering of their annuals.

Upon the 21st day of this instant of February anno 1581-[1582,] Maige Mertyne being put in the Tower aboon the north kirk door, for concealing and hiding of the truth, in the action of M'Walter being adulterer with Maige Paterson, as was alleged before Duncan M'Gregor, elder for the prefent, Andrew Blythman, kirkmafter, and John Ronaldfon, officer, the depones that Maige Paterion fent her about MeWalter to his own house, defiring her to bring him to her mothers house, that the faid Maige Paterion and he might forgadder there; but she would not, but brought him to the faid Maiges fathers house, and he being brought there, after that they had drunken out the ale that was left over Maiges fathers supper, they fent her [Maige Mertyne] about another pint of ale; and the being gone to the door, Maige Paterson being naked, her father fleeping, M'Walter with her put out the light; and in the meantime, the heard the faid Maige Paterfon fay to M'Walter, that "the morn they would tholle miekle shame for the thing they were "doing;" and she said, "that they should tholle miekle shame for it "on the morne." In the meantime M'Walters wife came [in,] and when Maige Paterson saw her, she put M'Walter up a trap to a lost, and his wife perceiving that, trailled him down the trap, and fell to the faid Maige [Paterson,] and raive her face and her luggs, and so there was fic tumult amongst them, that Alexander Maiges wife came furth with her maiden, and Henry with a cruife in his hand to fee the matter.

April 16. 1582. Ordains James Sym to give the witch in the tolbooth 8 doits in the day.

May 19. 1582. Compears Ifabell Paterfon, and confesses her fornication with Walter Chalmer, dwelling with the Prior of the Charter-House; she is ordained to be put in the ward of the fornicators, above the North Kirk door.

November 20. 1582. Ordains James Sym to make three locks to the Crofs Head. Ordains John Ronaldson having fornicators, to put every one of them in ane fundry house in time coming, to give them but bread and simall drink; to let none of them come to the nether window, and when they come to the Cross Head, that they be fast locked in the irons two hours, their curchies off, their heads and their faces bare, without an plaid or any other covering, under the pain of tinsel of his office.

December 3. 1582. Whilk day the friends of William Farn, who drowned himfelf at the head of the South Inch, in the water of Tay, coming to the minister and elders, convened together for the time in their Revestry, and desiring licence at the affembly, to bury the said William in the Gray Friars, which is the burial appointed for the faithfull that depart in the fear of God; the affembly answered with one voice, that they would not suffer him to be brought through the town in day light, neither yet to be buried amongst the faithful, in the place appointed for their burial; but ordains that he be buried in the Little Inch that is within the water, and this to have the strength of an act, to all such like persons in all time coming, and affuring all, that gif any contravene the same, the dead shall be taken up again, and the contraveners hereof shall make their repentance in the seat, and thereafter shall pay £ 10 to one of the deacons, that they may distribute it to the poor.

February 15. 1584 [1585]. Compeared Robert Anderson, alias Card, and confessed his incest with Margaret Black, his wife's daughter, who is ordained to make his repentance therefor, and find caution for an hundred [possibly merks,] that he shall continue therein, who found William Anderson and Chryslie Whyte cautioners, to obey whatsoever punishment the kirk should enjoin to him.

May 24. 1585. It was flatute and ordained, that hereafter induring the time of the plague, no banquets should be at marriages, and no persons should refort to bridals under the pain of ten pounds, to be paid by ilk one that contravenes the fame; and 40 pounds to be paid by them that call more than four on the fide to the banquet, or bridal, induring the peft.

July 5. 1585. Forafmeikle as Thomas Smith confessed his triple fornication with three fundry women, and now having the last woman with bairn again, it is ordained that he shall be warded, shaven, and doukit [in a puddle of water], according to the act of Parliament.

Oct. 11. 1585. Forafmeikle as George — and Elfpeth Cudbert were both apprehended in naked bed together, in filthy fornication, upon the tenth of this inftant, being the first Sunday of the holy communion, and of public fast and humiliation, appointed by the kirk to be holily observed, that God of his mercy might remove this miserable plague from this town, and all other towns within this country; and likewife that the forefaid persons have been both put forth in the lodges, as sufpected of the fame fickness, from the whilk God has preferved them to this hour: nevertheless they have, without fear of God, filthily committed the forefaid vice of fornication; therefore the haill feffioun ordains the forenamed perfons shall be carted backward through the town, from the faid Elfpeth's house, where they were apprehended, having paper hats on their heads, on Saturday next, at ten hours before noon, and thereafter that they be locked fast in the front on the Cross Head, and there ftand till three afternoon; and thereafter to be warded till Sunday, at what time the officers shall convoy them with their paper hats, to the public feat of repentance, that there they may confess their offence, and ask God and the congregation forgiveness for the flander they gave, and evil example to others to commit the like: and this act to ftrike upon all fuch perfors whom the watch apprehends in fornication in time of the common humiliation, or any other time in time coming, that vice may be rooted out of this town, and God may blefs it.

November 7. 1587. Appoints an fast to begin on Saturday next,

and to continue while Sunday eight days thereafter at even, with great humiliation and prayer to God, that it would pleafe him to remove the plague of the peft from the towns of Edinburgh, Leith, &c. and to preferve us therefrom; as also to preserve us from the peft of the foul, whilk is Papistry ignorance, maintained presently by these Jesuites and Papists now come in, who presses to bring men under the thraldom of idolatry and ignorance, and from the true knowledge of Christ our Saviour, revealed to us in his word, and to embrace their superstitious rites and ceremonies, from the whilk the Lord preserve us! And ordains this to be notified from the pulpit on Thursday next, that none incur ignorance hereof, that every one may address them to fasting, to prayer, and humiliation at the time appointed.

December 11. 1587. Ordains these baxters that on Saturday last at even, played St Oberts play, to be warded wherever they be apprehended, ay and while, they give their obedience for satisfaction of the kirk and congregation.

February 26. 1587 [1588.] Ordains the mafter of the Hospital to make an book of ten quair of paper, to contain and hold the compts of the Hospital yearly.

March 4. 1587 [1588.] Whilk day William Fleming being called before the Affembly, for refetting, giving lodging, entertainment, and convoying of the Laird of Fentrie,* an enemy to God and religion, an avowed papift and Jefuite, excommunicate for the fame, and common trafficker for the fubverfion of the true religion, whilk was againft the command of God, and exprelly againft the rule of his word, and likewife againft the acts made by the Kings Majefty, and affemblies general and particular, especially againft the act of our affembly published from the pulpit and cross of this burgh: Being herefore accused, answered,

that neither for contempt of God, nor no good rule or act made by the King or kirk, he did the fame, but rather of negligence, because he was in company of the Earl of Huntly, and was received under his connivance; confessing the same to have been an fault, promises never to do the like in time coming,—and in case he be found to contravene in time coming, the penalty in the act contained to strike on him, all excuse being put aside; whilk sault the minister and elders oversees at present, in hopes of amendment.

Nov. 11. 1588. For as meikle confidering the great flander that arifes of young women taking up houses, and dwelling together as codrois, and common receivers of honest mens servants and their gear; it is ordained, that no honest man shall set them an house, without the advice of one of the baillies and elders publicly to be allowed, under the pain of the house maill to be given to the poor. The persons as codrois taking up house, to be holden and repute as fornicators and entertainers of bordels, and punished as such.

December 7. 1588. Ordains Andrew Anderson, webster, to pay ten shillings, because the Sabbath day was broken in his house, by his wife, in warping an web thereon; and his wife to put herself in the repentance seat on Sunday next for the same.

June 3. 1589. The minister and elders gave licence to play the play,* with condition that neither swearing, banning, nor no scurrility be in it, to the offence of the religion which we profess, and an evil example to others:—and in case any be in the same, or any person add any of the same, by the Register of Play itself, ordains him to be warded, and make his public repentance.

August 11. 1589. Whilk day Nichol [Ronaldson,] belman, being called and accused for not ringing the curfew and workman bells, at eight hours at even and four hours in the morning, according to the

cuftom and use; answered, that David Mar had taken away the tow to the brig of Earn. Therefore ordains Robert Anderson and James Adamson, to intimate the same to the council, to cause the said David hing up the bell tows againe, as good and sufficient as they were, when he took them down.

Oct. 21. 1589. For as meikle as Jean Thornton is an excommunicate person, and should not be holden in the company of good Christians that sear God, much less to be entertained in bed and board within any honest godly man's house, to the great slander of God, his word, kirk, and this congregation. It is ordained that all the baillies, Robert Anderson, Oliver Young, Henry Balneaves, and Andrew Mercer, with Adam Anderson, and Constantine Malice, two of the Elders, pass to Thomas Monipenny presently, and intimate to him the kirks will, that is to say, that he separate and put out of his house the said Jean Thornton, under the pain of excommunication, and the said baillies and elders to report the diligence on Monday next, and no other to receive [her] under the pain of excommunication. *

Nov. 2. 1589. Forafmeikle as this day was affigned to certain honeft neighbours of Tirfappie to be prefent, and of their confcience to declare whether it was true, that ———— Guddal, fpoufe to Richard Watfon, was a witch, as John Watfon there alleged, or what evil likely-hood they faw in her. Walter Watfon, John ———, George Scott,

^{*} Jean Thornton was wife to Oliver Peebles, who was a useful elder in the church, and much esteemed in his time. Some years before she had accused the Dean of Guild, Henry Adamson, as having been guilty with her of the sin of adultery. He denied the charge, nor was it proven by the witnesses brought by Oliver Peebles. She was punished according to her own confession, and becoming afterwards more abandoned, was at last excommunicated. Henry Adamson, Dean of Guild, was some years after this stabbed by Thomas Peebles; who perhaps was a son of Oliver Peebles by his wife Jean Thornton.—(Scott.)

James Scott, being enquired feverally as they would answer to God, what they kend,—altogether agreed in one, but [without] contradiction, that they faw never fuch things into her whereby they might fulpect her of the fame,—but that she was an honest poor woman, who wrought honestly for her living, without whose help her husband Richard Watfon would have been dead, who was an old aged man. Therefore the minister and elders ordain the act of slander to be put in execution against the said John Watson, and Helen Watson, his daughter. *

April 27. 1590. David Billy promifed to make an ladder to the prayer-tolling, for an merk.

July 20. 1590. Ordains Patrick Fleming, David Billy, and Alexander Puller, to buy timber to make an fubftantial ladder to the cockflool.

June 21. 1591. Ordains for keeping order in the kirk at the Queens Majestys entry, Robert Mathew, Walter Gray, John Pitcairn, James Mercer, Andrew Wilson, elders, to have the overfight and keeping of the door, that no tumult be made.

June 28. 1591. This day the haill town being occupied in their preparations for the Queens Majestys entry in the town, the affembly was not holden.

December 20. 1591. Compears Walter Murray in Craigie, and confesses his incest with Isobel Gibson, oye to Isobel Anderson his first wife, and submits him to the will of the kirk. Ordains him to be present himself, before the presbytery on Wednesday next. Ewin Rynd cautioner of his presence before the Presbytery, under the pain of ten pounds.

Compears Thomas Harlow and Janet Grant his wife, and being

accufed as fpecial refetters, entertainers, and receivers of idle beggars, thieves, and fuch other unlawful persons; but especially now of new, besides placing and putting together in beds, unmarried and unlawful persons: they consessed the same,—therefore the session ordains him and his said wife on Sunday next, to make their repentance; and in case they be sound hereaster to receive such persons in lodging, then to be banished the town.

December 27. 1591. For as meikle as it is ungodly and unhonest to abuse the kirkwalls and kirk yard, by pissing on the walls thereof, and otherwise against godliness and honesty using the same, seeing it is a place wherein the defunct corpse lies below and is buried: Ordains that none abuse the same in manner foresaid, under the pain [of] two pennies whenever they be apprehended; and this to be intimated on Sunday next from the pulpit.

February 21. 1591 [1592.] This day compeared John Pitscottie, apparent [heir] of Loncarty, Finlay Errol, servitor to the Laird of Balhousie, [with several other persons named in the Register,] and confessed that on the Sunday of the fast, in the time of preaching in the afternoon, they were playing at the stoot ball in the meadow inch of the muirtoun, and that the same was an offence. Therefore they were ordained on Sunday next to make their repentance for breach of the sabbath.

April 17. 1592. Ordains Adam Adamfon and Patrick Blair baillies, that on Monday next they speak the council, that an musician be had for uptaking of the Psalms in the kirk.

January 29. 1592-1593. The Lady Endernytie being called, and accused for absenting herself, and the rest of her samily from the hearing of the word on the Sabbath, compears and confesses, that she does it not, neither in contempt of the word, or of the minister, but only by reason

of her fickness, and promises when she shall be well in health, to repair more frequently to the kirk, and hearing of the word.

Compears Henry Adamson, and being enquired if he knew any thing concerning the conspiracy made by the Earl of Angus, confesses he knew nothing; and being accused for riding on the Sabbath day, confesses the same, and promises not to do the like hereafter.

March 19. 1593. Compear Mr George Ruthven, Andrew Brown, Thomas Lathreels, and John Meling, chirurgions, and being enquired if they or any one of them had any perfons under cure for the prefent who had the goir, answered all in one voice they had none; and further, at the request and command of the minister and elders, promifed that if they shall have any such perfons under their cure in time coming, they should reveal it to the minister and elders for avoiding of contamination, which must ensue unto others by their company with persons in such a disease.

December 24. [marked September in the Register by mistake] 1593. Ordains to count and reckon with John Pitcairns wife for the entertainment of an German scholar,* and they to be answerable to her for his expences and entertainment; and likewise ordains at his departure two crowns of gold to be given him, the one to be advanced by Mr George Ruthven, the other by John Jack.

January 7. 1593-[1594]. Because that the scholars in time of preaching, by their tumults and running through the kirk, and likewise by their clattering and fighting, do trouble both the teacher and the hearers, therefore Oliver Peebles and Patrick Blair, elders, are ordained to propone to the baillies and council the next day of their convention, that an feat and place may be biggit for the scholars in some commodious place of the kirk, where they may hear and learn without troubling either the minister in teaching, or the auditory in hearing.

* He is afterwards said to have been a minister sometime in Denmark. (Scott.)

February 24. 1593 [1594]. Forafmeikle as fundry, both men and women, in time of preaching on the Sunday in the forenoon, rife up at the chap of eleven hours, and depart away without the bleffing, or giving of thanks unto God; therefore for flaying and reprelling of this great enormity in all time coming, which is very flanderous, the minister and elders ordain the visitors, both baillies and elders, to keep both the kirk doors, and suffer none to depart out of the kirk, before the bleffing, except they be fick and evil at ease.

September 22. 1595. The Seffion ordains the mafters of the hofpital to give an poor boy, called Alexander Martine, ten merks, to help him to an pack for winning of his living.

December 29.1595. Compears John Spence, who broke the Sabbath by absenting himself from the hearing of the word; as also [accused for] his unreverent behaviour to the minister and baillies being visiting the families, and therefore ordains him to be committed to ward, while he be humbled, and find caution to do his duty.

Mr George Ruthven, chirurgeon, gives in a bill of complaint upon Archibald Steidman, declaring that the faid Archibald had profaned the Sabbath fundry and diverfe times, by fhaving and polling, gentlemen and ftrangers on the Lord's day, as James Stewart of Achmadoes, the Laird of Reidhall, and John Windiegates, hatour to his Majefty. The faid Archibald being accufed and tryed, is found guilty of the breach of the Lord's Sabbath; and therefore the Seffion ordains him the next Sabbath, to compear in the place of public repentance, and to declare his repentance for the forefaid offence.

November 21. 1597. Compeared Mr William Rynd, mafter of the fchool, and complained that he and his tenants were molefted by daily reek and fmoke coming furth of that house, fometimes possessed by James Stewart; and farther declared, that his own lodging and tenement was in danger of burning, because that the nether house under

his land wanted an chimney; and therefore craves, that the Selfion would ftay and inhibit any fire to be in the faid house in time coming; and that the door that is in the midft, may be fluken up, that the chimney which is in the fouth house may serve for both the houses. The Selfion agreed to his desire, and ordains the master of the hospital with all diligence, to cause steek up the door that is in the midft of the said house, and there be no fire kindled again in the north house in time coming.

Nov. 23. The Seffion ordains the magistrates to travel with his Majesty, to obtain a commission to execute James Robertson, forcerer, who long had been detained in ward.

Jan. 9. 1597-[8]. The Laird of Lawers compeared the laft Sabbath, pro quarto, in the place of public repentance [for adultery].

December 25. The Selfion ordanes a book to be made, into the which the haill rental of the hospital shall be written.

Jan. 22. 1598 [9.] William Blyth being enquired why Gilbert Car reforted to his house, answered, that he was a common host and entertainer of strangers who resided there; and that Gilbert came to his house as other strangers to get lodgings and entertainment upon his reasonable expences. Being enquired why he suffered Janet Kelt his servant to lie in the booth with Gilbert Car, [or shop in which were two beds, in one of which Janet Kelt lay with a young lass of her masters, and in the other Gilbert Car,] answered it was of no evil intention, but because he had no room in his house, and he caused his daughter to lie nightly with his own fervant. The session

daughter to lie nightly with his own fervant. The feffion thinks this doeing to be fuspicious, and that he has not done the duty of a Chriftian master to his fervant, but has done so far as in him lay to make her a harlot; therefore ordains him next Sabbath to declare his repentance publicly, in presence of the haill congregation.

April 9. 1599. Compeared James Young, [town] officer, being warned to this [day;] who being accused for profaning of the holy Sabbath, by abfenting himfelf from the hearing of the word, both before and after noon, and being beaftly drunk, persuing George M'Gregor through the streets publicly with an drawn fword, to the great difhonour of God, and flander of this congregation,—[he] confesses the fame. George Horn's wife declares, that on the Sabbath was eight days, James Young, with John Murray, came to her house and craved drink, and when she refused, he drew out his sword and said he should thew her another guife, except the gave him drink; and fo being boafted, and knowing the disposition of the man, she furnished drink to him while twelve hours; and when he was defired to go home to his own house, he went into a cellar, against her will, and drank while the fermon afternoon was ended, and was fo beaftly drunken, that he knew not what he did. The Seffion ordains him to come the next Sabbath to the kirk door, barefoot, and in linen clothes, and ftand from the fecond unto the third bell, and thereafter come to the place of public repentance, and there declare his repentance publicly, in prefence of this congregation.

Because that George Horn's wife, furnished drink to James Young and his companion, as she alleged against her will, and that the cause of her being at home in time of sermon was sickness, and a dilease in her dad, the Sessionn desired her to declare on her conscience that it was so indeed; which she did.

July 2. 1599. Thomas Ritchie confesses that he was drunken, for

the which he was forry, and promifes to be more temperate in time coming; and in case he shall be found drunken at any time hereafter, he is content to pay five pounds, to be employed to the use of the poor.

November 19. Compears James Maxton, being warned to this day; and being accufed for profaning of the Sabbath, by abfenting himfelf from the hearing of the word, and telling of filver at home with certain Highland men; confesses that he being in the kirk, was fent for by fome Highlandmen, who delivered to him a certain fum of money, to be kept by him while their returning back. The Session finds him by this his doing to be a profaner of the Sabbath himself, and also an occasion of profaning the Sabbath to others, whom he should have taught; and therefore ordains him to pay the penalty, according to the A& of Parliament.

John Gardner, James Barman, Laurence Chalmer, and Laurence Cudbert, young boys, confess that they were playing at the golf in the North Inch, in time of the preaching afternoon on the Sabbath. The Session rebuke them, and admonish them to resort to the hearing of the word diligently on the Sabbath in time coming, which they promised to do.

December 10. Compears Donald Thomson, with Grizel Robertson, and confessed promise of marriage one to another. They were admonished to accomplish their marriage within forty days, and to keep their bodies clean while the day of their marriage, which they promised to do. Further, because the said Grizel is in the house with the said Donald, the Session ordains them to separate themselves, and remain in sundry houses while the day of their marriage. For sulfilling of the premisses they have sound caution, viz. Patrick Bruce for the man, and John Elder for the woman, under the penalty of ten pounds, to be employed to the use of the poor.

May 12. 1600. Patrick Gall, Finlay Eviott, John Bennet, Laurence

Robertson, and Patrick Auchinleck, consesses that their fervants spread muck on the Sabbath was eight days, after the afternoon preaching. The Session thinks them to be profaners of the Lord's sabbath, and their doeing slanderous; and therefore ordains them to declare their repentance privily, and pay a penalty, to be employed to the use of the poor.

Dec. 1. The vifitors report that the Sabbath was profaned by all the taverners, except John Pitcairn and Henry Balneaves, and that strangers and mercat folks were found drinking in all the taverns. The Session ordains them to be summoned and censured, for their profanation of the Lord's day.

April 13. 1601. George Murray, accufed for fuffering of ale to be fold in time of preaching on the Sabbath in his house, answered that he was in the kirk himself, and his wife also; but his fervant came, and brought his wife out of the kirk to an daughter of Tullibardines, to give her some cloths which she had of hers in custody, and in the mean time caused fill drink to the said gentlewoman, and her fervants with her.* The Session understanding the like offence has not sallen out of before in his time, admonished him to keep good order in time coming, and not to suffer either ale or wine to be fold in his house, in time of preaching on the Sabbath hereafter, which he promised to do.

January 11. 1602. The vifitors report that good order was kept the last Sabbath, except that they found some young boys playing at the foot ball in the Inch, who were corrected by the magistrate.

Janet Syme confesses her fin of fornication, committed with John Barrie, a cripple, at Midsummer last, in John McDuffs house, whose fervant she was for the time: and being strictly urged, if any other had carnal dealing with her, or was her bairns father, declared on her con-

fcience, that none other was the father of her bairn, but the faid John Barrie: and likewife, the faid John Barrie confesses he had carnal dealing with the faid woman at the time aforesaid. The Session understanding that they are both poor bodies, having nothing either to pay in penalty, or to entertain themselves in ward, neither yet counted of public repentance, [not counted objects of church discipline] therefore ordains them to be put in ward, while Saturday, on their expences, and then to be taken out by Archibald Steidman, and John Jack, officiars, and presented to the magistrates, that they may be carted about the town together, and thereafter to be banished.

November 2. The Seffion ordains the Mafter of the Holpital, with all diligence to cause make an common mort kift, whereby the dead corpses of the poor ones may be honestly carried unto the burial.

August 1. 1603. Because that Elspit Grant dwells by herself, keeping an house for whoredom, and has fallen before in the fin of adultery, and lately in fornication, and that, after she had declared her repentance, has received harlots into her house, making her house as it were a Bordel, and a common receptacle of loose and debauched persons, therefore the Session ordains her presently to be put in ward, there to remain while she find caution to remove out of the town.

January 2. 1604. The vifitors report that good order was keeped the last Sabbath, except that they found some young boys playing at the gowf in the North Inch, in the time of preaching afternoon, who were warned then by the officiars, to compear before the Session this day.

Compears Robert Robertson, William Stenis, Andrew Donaldson, Alexander Niving, Adam Paul, Robert Meling: all warned to this day, who were convicted of profaning the Lord's Sabbath, by absenting themselves from hearing of the word, and playing at the gows, in time of preaching; and therefore the Session ordained, first, Robert Robert-

fon, who was ringleader to the reft, to pay an merk to the poor, and fecondly, ordains him and the reft to compear the next Sabbath, into the place of public repentance, in presence of the whole congregation.

April 23. The Seffion ordains intimation to be made by the ministers the next Sabbath publicly out of the pulpit, for a contribution to be made, for the support of the town of Geneva.

May 7. Alifon Henderson was convicted of absenting herself, this year from the examinations, and communion, and therefore was rebuked.

David Chapman was convicted of profaning the Sabbath by going to Ruthven, to fee profane and lascivious dancing, and absenting himself from the hearing of the word, and therefore was rebuked.

July 16. Whilk day anent the complaint given in by an noble lady, Dame Mary Ruthven, Countefs of Athol, upon Mr William Cowper minister at Perth, touching the contracting by him of Mrs Dorothie Stewart her eldest danghter, with William Murray, master of Tullibardine without the advice and consent of the faid noble lady, and her honourable friends, as the complaint given in thereupon at length bears, which being read and the faid Mr William Cowper made answer thereto, and removed; the Session all in one voice finds the faid Mr William's proceedings orderly done, and has allowed and approven the same.

September 3. It was reported that there was a number of young women and laffes, after supper in the evening, [of the Sabbath] found under stairs, dancing, singing, and knocking upon doors, who were warned to this day.

Compeared Agnes Anderson, Agnes Murray, Elspeth Ross, Kirstian Paterson, Janet Low, Beatrice Clink, Helen Blyth, all warned to this day, and confessed that they profaned the Lords Sabbath, by lascivious singing, and dancing, at even, under stairs, for the which they were

forry, and promifed never to commit the like. The Seffion sha ply rebuked them, and defired the magistrates to put them in ward.

October 3. Whilk day, in prefence of the baillies, ministers, and elders of the burgh of Perth convened within the reveftry of the faid burgh, William Hay, littler, burgefs of Perth, being accufed upon the uttering by him yesternight, in John Stewarts fore chamber, of certain vile, flanderous, and abominable fpeeches, againft Mr William Cowper minister of Christs Evangell, at the faid burgh, to wit, "That " the faid Mr William was an falfe common thief, and that he should " [have] been hanged, and were it not the faid William Hay, he had been " hanged, and yet he should have him hanged; who would not? and " who would take his part? and that he should improve him in the " Scriptures." Thir flanderous fpeeches uttered before Patrick Fleming, merchant, William Robertson, notar, John Robertson, merchant, Thomas Fleming, fon to the faid Patrick, John Gall, and James Marshall, merchants; whereto the faid William Robertson answered, " Mowis [jeft] or earnest," whereto the faid William replied, "earnest," and bad the faid William Robertson take it as he thought it. To the which, he [William Robertson] replied again that "he lied like a knave." Thereafter the faid William Hay drew an whingar and preffed to have ftricken the faid William Robertson, and called him an common thief. Farther, being accused, if he faid "Mr William Cowper was passing to " England to London, and ere he came home, would wear an furplice " and an four nooket bonnet." All thir particular heads above written the faid William Hay being accused upon, but granted, that it was in mowis that he fpake anent Mr Williams hanging; and farther denied that he called him common thief, and also denied that he faid, he should improve him in the Scriptures: But only faid, that Mr William shewed no pity to the poor man that was in ward; and the faid Patrick Fleming, John Robertson, John Gall, and James Marshall, being called, fworn and admitted in presence of the said William Hay, to testify the verity in the said matter, nothing being objected against them; and each one of them being severally examined, deponed that they heard the former slanderous and abominable speeches uttered by the said William Hay against the said Mr William [Cowper] and William Robertson. Farther, the said baillies declared that this day in the morning, before eight hours, when this matter came to their knowledge, they took purpose to take and apprehend the said William and put him in ward: and having apprehended him within his own dwelling house, and accused him upon the said slanderous speeches, they heard him answer and say, that he spake such speeches, but in mowis. The Session [resolves] to be advised upon the premisses with the presbetry.*

October 29. Because that Mr John Weims, sometime musician, was very faithful and diligent in his services, during the time of his life, and now being taken away by death, has left behind him an poor widow, and an young infant. Therefore the Session has ordained, and by thir presents ordains Patrick Fleming, master of the hospital, to give to his wife and bairn, sour score of pounds, of the first and readiest duties appertaining to the hospital, which shall be thankful allowed to him in his accompts of the hospital.

November 5. The Sellion ordains the mafters of the hospital to furnish an new gown of black cloth, to Mr Patrick Johnston, teacher of the youth in the grammar school.

September 23. 1605. Because that the fins of fornication and adultery, do encrease more and more among us, to the great offence and dishonour of God, and slander of this congregation; therefore, for repressing of thir fins, the Session ordains a more public place of repentance to be biggit, with all diligence, and in it certain degrees, that

therein fornicators and adulterers may be diffinguished, and better difcerned, both by their place and habit.

October 21. Mr James Young, mufician, declared in prefence of the Seffion, that he was contented to accept the office of taking up of the pfalm, publickly into the kirk at preaching and prayers, and infructing of the youth in the art of mufic. The Seffion promifed to him yearly, induring his fervice in the faid office, the fum of four fcore pounds, with his chalmer meall, and this to be paid by the mafters of the hospital, termly or quarterly, as the faid Mr James shall require it.

January 12. 1607. This day being affigned to Mr William Cowper, to prove by witneffes the flanderous fpeeches uttered by Robert Keir againft his preaching. Compeared Robert Fleming, warned to this day; and Robert Keir being enquired if he had any thing to fay againft Robert Fleming, why he fhould not be witnefs in the matter and caufe forefaid? anfwered he had nothing. Robert Fleming being admitted and fworn, declared, that when he came to Robert Weir, as treafurer, and defired him to pay for the minister's coals, he answered, "Mr Wil-" liam preached againft me the laft day. Let him preach againft me the "next day. The devil a penny I will pay for coals." The Session called the faid Robert, and defired him to confess his offence, which he refused to do; and therefore the Session remitted him to the Presbytery.

March 28. 1608. The vifitors report, that good order was keeped the last Sabbath, except that some craftsmen were playing at the foot ball in the South Inch, after the afternoon's preaching, who were warned to compear before the Session.

[The Seflion remitted them to the magistrates, to be punished according to the act of Parliament.]

May 9. Because that Patrick Fleming has departed this life, therefore the whole Session, with one consent, has nominated and chosen John Brown to succeed him.

February 13. 1609. Compeared Andrew Johnston, and Janet Cunningham, his spouse, James Jackson, and - Stobie, his spouse, David Jackson, and Helen Hynd, all warned to this day; and being enquired, why they went out difguifed about the town on Tuefday laft Ives, at ten and eleven hours at even, with fwords and flaves, troubling and molefling their neighbours on the ffreet whom they met? answered, that after they had all supped together, they had resolved to go about the town, of no evil purpose or intention, but of merriness; and denied that they molefted any. They being removed, it was certainly found that they were difguifed, namely, Andrew Johnston's wife having her hair hanging down, and a black hat upon her head. Her hufband, Andrew Johnston, with a fword into his hand. David Jackson having a mutch upon his head, and a woman's gown, as Conftantine Malice, Baillie, and fundry others declared,—and that they hurted and molefted fundry perions. The Session finds their doings to be slanderous, and that because the pestilence yet continues amongst us: and all thir pertions lately come in from the fields, where the botch and boyll was on their person: and has ordained them to be condignly punished; first, to be put in ward prefently, there to remain alltogether while the Sabbath; and next, because their fault is public and notorious, to come all together the next Sabbath, in linen cloaths, to the place of public repentance, their to confess their heinous offence, and to be rebuked as diffolute and licentious perfons, in presence of the whole congregation.

June 18. 1610. Compeared Alexander Crighton, who was convicted by his own confession, of haunting and frequenting the company of Robert Crighton, excommunicate Papist, eating and drinking with him in taverns, and walking on the street: therefore the Session ordained him to declare his repentance publickly the next Sabbath, in his own seat.

October 20. 1611. Because Janet Lockhart has taken upon her the office of a midwife at her own hand, without tryall upon her skill, and

without licence, and has confpired with others to conceal the fin of adultery, and other wickedness, therefore the Session ordained her to be rebuked publicly by the minister the next Sabbath, and to be inhibit from medling with the office of an midwife in time coming.*

November 4. 1611. Compeared Margaret Rutherford and Elfpeth Gloag, midwives, who gave their oath of fidelity, to be faithful and honeft in their calling: and farther, it was enjoined to them, under the pain of difcharging them their office, that they should not help any woman suspected of whoredom, and who was not married to an hufband, except that first they got their confession, with a solemn oath, to whom the bairn appertained, and who was the bairn's father. Which they promised to do, with a solemn oath and extension of the hand, in presence of the whole Session.

Nov. 11. Compeared James Ferguson, who declared that he was out of the kirk on Sunday was a fifteen days, in time of preaching before noon; and was in Walter Youngs house, where he saw John Firskine, and Hugh Firskine playing at dice, and the said John Firskine won sourteen merks from the other, and that they drank an quart of wine at the dinner, where Walter Young, goodman of the house, was present.

Compeared Walter Young [who was a baker,] and being enquired how he, being a deacon of the kirk, fuffered fuch enormities and profaneness to be in his house, as dicing and drinking, in time of

* She had privately delivered a gentlewoman of a bastard child, and concealed it. The woman in whose house the child was born, laid her hand upon the child's mouth, with a purpose to smother it: But Janet Lockhart made her desist, by saying that she would go instantly, and awaken the whole town, if she were to do such an action. The woman in whose house the gentlewoman had gone to be delivered, gave the child afterwards in a private manner to a nurse, and received money for the nurse privately from the father, who was a married man. Janet Lockhart made the gentlewoman declare who was the child's father, before she would give her assistance in her labour. (Scott.)

preaching on the Lord's day? Answered he knew no fuch thing, because he was into the kirk himself, and his wife remained at home. He was desired to present his wife before the Session. He answered he would answer for her himself, and so menaced the beadle of the kirk; and therefore the Session requested the magistrates to put him in ward, there to remain while he should be better humbled.

July 6. 1612. The vifitors report that good order was keeped the laft Sabbath, except that they found Ifobell Murdoch drinking with an Highland man in time of preaching, for which the was committed at the command of the magistrates to ward.

April 10. 1615. Peter Simpson and Margaret Liddel ratified before the Seffion their promife of marriage, to be folemnized conform to the ordinance of the kirk, and thereupon configned two cups of gold.

February 1. 1616. Patrick Crombie, conform to citation having compeared, and being accufed, that he usurping authority and command over the common beggars, they resorted to him from all parts to this parish, to the planting of many beggars of other parishes, to have their abiding here within this congregation, who denied the same simpliciter, and is ordained to compear the next Monday for farther tryal to be taken thereanent.

— 5. Compeared the forefaid Patrick Crombie, and being examined anent his forefaid usurpation, denied the same simpliciter, yet was verified by honest reporters, the great resort of common beggars to the Muirtown to him. The Session ordain request to be made to the Laird of Muirton, to remove the said Patrick surth of his ground, and that he have no residence within this parish.

June 24. John Tenender, [feffion] officer, is ordained to have his red flaff in the kirk on the Sabbath days, therewith to waken fleepers, and to remove greeting bairns furth of the kirk.

February 20. 1617. The Seffion has appointed David Sibbald to

be master of work to the reparation of decayed parts of the steeple, and to receive furth of an chest containing the Hospital writs, the sum of twenty pounds, lest over the last collection, listed for reparation of the kirk, and help to repair the said steeple therewith.

March 3. The Seffion thinks it very expedient, that the council and they concur, for providing an mufician, for taking up of the plalms in the kirk, and for teaching of an mufic fchool.

—— 14. Forafmeikle as Mr Thomas Garvie, mufician, this long time bygone has not been apt nor habill to difcharge his office, in taking up of the pfalms in the kirk at preaching and prayers, whofe place Mr Henry Adamfon * has fupplied, and is very well thought of by the Seffion; they request him to continue therein, while further deliberation be taken thereanent.

April 7. Ordains an chair of flone to be bigged in an public part by the mafters of Hospitals, for setting of flyters and flanderers therein, and the same to be paid of the first casualties occurs.

Forafmeikle as Mr John Guthry, minifter, having produced before the Session, an testificate of the Lords of Council, shewing that John Mortoun, skipper in Leith, and twenty-seven persons of his kippage, with his ship and goods, were taken personse by the Turks gallies; and in the combat betwixt them seven of his kippage were slain, and the remaining twenty-one were taken to Argier in Barbary, and were relieved by finding William Phrisilla, factor for Englishmen in Argier, cautioner for them, to pay an certain great sum of money for their ranfom, extending to one thousand three hundred and twenty-nine pounds Sterling money, containing also an supplication directed to all Assemblies, Sessions, &c. to extend their charity, to help to pay the said ran-

fom for the relief of the faid cautioner, because he has been very favourable to fundry Scottishmen in the like case of before, in due consideration thereof, the Session ordains an voluntary contribution, the next convenient Sabbath as shall be appointed by them for that effect.

April 21. Ordains admonition to be made the next Sabbath, that none of the congregation pass to the well of Huntingtower on the Sabbath days, and likeways that no dancing be under stairs on the Sabbath day.

May 12. Conform to citation, compeared James Blyth, and was admonifhed to abflain from excefs of drinking, wherewith he has been found oftimes fpotted, and from night walking. Promifed fo to do under the pain of ten pounds, totics quoties, he contravenes.

Forafineikle as Mr Henry Adamfon having moved him to the Seffion, that he has fupplied the place of Mr Thomas Garvie, in taking up of the pfalms a long time bygone; and that Mr John Adamfon, his brother, had written for him fome matter tending to his behoof, therefore defires the Seffion either to appoint him to the faid cure, feeing that the faid Mr Thomas is not habill therefore; and that otherwife he will not ferve longer in his ftead. The Seffion finding the faid Mr Henry's propolitions reasonable, and that he is qualified for ferving the faid cure, for their part are willing he be provided thereto; and have requested John Anderson and William Williamson, baillies, to expone the same to the Council, and to report their answer thereanent the next Monday, wherethro' the faid Mr Henry may be orderly placed in the faid fervice both by Council and Session.

May 26. In respect of the literature and qualifications of Mr Henry Adamson, for taking up the plalms at preaching and prayers, at the kirk of Perth, and his lawful admission thereto, and to hold an music school, the Session provides and ordains him to have yearly therefor, from Whitsunday next, in name of his stipend, the sum of

two hundred merks money of this realm, to be payed by the mafters of the hospital, present and to come, yearly, at two terms in the year, Whitsunday and Martinmas, by equal proportions.

August 25. Forasmeikle as delation being made of James Stewart, hangman, his vicious life, and of the cruelty and oppression used by him against poor weak persons, therefore it is ordained that the same be intimated to the Council, that they and the Session may take order thereanent.

October 30. It being reported to the Sellion, that —— Henderson supposed to be bereft of her wits, is but counterfeit and seigned therein; and that under colour thereof, she makes vantage, and abuses her body in harlotry; therefore the Session has concluded that she be expelled of the town; and for that effect, John Tenender, officer, has received command of Robert Lethem, baillie.

May 4. 1618. Conform to citation, compeared Ifobel Garvey, fervitrix to Margaret Alexander, widow, and Margaret Lamb, daughter-in-law to George Thomson, who being asked if they were at the well in bank of Huntingtour the last Sabbath, and if they drank thereof, and what they lest at it? answered, that they drank thereof; and that each of them lost an prin [pin] thereat. Whilk was found an point of idolatry, in putting the well in God's room. The form of their censure continued while the rest, whom they have given were present with them, compear.*

December 28. Thomas [Baxter] being asked if he be now refolved to confess the truth, if he had carnal deall with Agnes Black, which she has already confessed,—he constantly denied as of before. Being humbled on his knees, and being taught to pray in this manner, viz. "Lord be merciful to me, and inspire me with thy grace, where-

"through I may be moved to confefs the truth in the faid matter of "flander, to the glory of God, and my own falvation:" thereafter having rifen on his feet, and being required to confefs the truth as he wisheth the falvation of his own foul; yet for all that, he stood at an obstinate denyal. And being asked if he would, by his great oath upon the falvation and condemnation of his foul, purge himself thereanent? He faid he would, and thereupon a book being holden to him, to try if he would lay his hand thereon; as he was extending furth his hand thereto, the minister withdrew the book from him, and would not suffer him to swear. The Session knowing him by all good appearance, to be guilty of said crime, notwithstanding of his denyal, ordain him to be committed to ward induring their will, to know if that will bring him to confession, and ordains Patrick Murray and his wife, his dilaters, to be warned to the morn to declare so far as they know of the said slander.

December 28. Forafineikle as dilation being made, that Katherine Graham, an coddroch huffy, keeped an house by herself, and that an highland fallow resorted to her when he pleased, and thereupon, conform to citation, having compeared and brought with her two young children. Being asked who is the father of them? answered Donald McChallan, highlander, and that the eldest of them was procreate betwixt them six years since, within this parish, and that she had satisfied the kirk therefore, and the other was procreate betwixt them in the highlands. Denies that he had to do with her at Perth at no time since the birth of her youngest child; and because she is a stranger and an coddroch, she is ordained to dispatch herself out of the town, betwixt this and Candlemas, under such pains as they will enjoin to her.

August 23. 1619. Forasmeikle as William Marshall, an auld doyted man, has confessed his adultery with Janet Ramsay, and because that his compearance publickly in fackcloth at the kirk door and repentance stool, would be an reproach to the town; therefore it is thought expe-

dient that he be put in ward, and detained therein, ay and while, he willingly confent to be banished this town for ever.

September 13. 1619. Forafmeikle as Mr John Guthry, minister, having made an great regret of Thomas Young, in that he has not only uttered speeches against him and his ministry, but also that he has met him divers times since on the causay, and would not discharge that civil duty of salutation, as becomes him to his pastor; and also that immediately heretofore, as he was coming to the Session, meeting him in the northmost of the kirk vennels, that the said Thomas, in manner of provocation, to tempt his pastor by his want of particular duty, passed by him without using any kind of reverence; wherewith the Session were highly offended, that he should have so far misregarded his pastor, and provoked him to ire, and therefore ordains him to be cited to compear before them the morrow after the fermon, to underly condign censure for his said offences.

September 14. Conform to citation, compeared Thomas Young, who being accused for uttering speeches, and his mishehaviour against Mr John Guthry, his pastor; and being asked what speeches he spake to John Guthry, the pastor's son? answered, that he said to him, "that it was not the duty of the pastor, to charge his people with "witchcraft, forcery, turning of the riddell, and to utter calumnies against his slock." This he had spoken in general, and no ways mentioned the said Mr John his name, which John Guthry had taken very highly, as he had since found no courteous dealing of him; and having yesterday entered unawares the minister's way, meaning no ways to offend him, but he suddenly past by. Being enquired, if he had any opinion that the minister had at any time grieved or offended him in word or deed? answered negatively. Declared that he is forry for that in any fort he had said or done, which may offend the minister in word or deed. The said Mr John, in presence of the Session, having admo-

nished the said Thomas Young, earnestly dealt with the Magistrates and Session present, to inslict no punishment on the said Thomas, but to pass by his offence, in hope of his honest and Christian behaviour hereaster, which, at his earnest entreaty, was granted.

June 5. Forafmeikle as delation being made that John Brown, gardner, permits men to play at the alye bowlls in my Lord Sanquhars yard the time of the fermons on the Sabbath days, therefore he is warned to compear the morrow, for taking convenient order with him thereanent.

June 12. Whilk day Thomas Crombie, baillie, prefented Alexander Wilson in Muirton, who is accused for his great insolency and misself and misself at his present insolency and misself at his present and eleven hours, pressed to misuse Giles Laing, in her returning from convoying of Thomas Leisks wise home to her house; terrifieng Robert Robertson's daughter; struggling with Mathew Cheap's servant in the kirk yard; and that having entered within the kirk he rung the common bell, thereby putting the haill town under fear either of sire or sword. His offences being so great, he is committed while the morrow, that after the fermon, both Council and Session deliberate upon his punishment.

July 5. Compeared Janet Mar, fpouse of John Patoun, sometime in Pitmurthly, and now in Balnebreich, and confessed the sin of adultery, committed by her with Harry Schaw of Pitmurthly, and that he ravished her, against her will in his barn, when she was getting straw to fill her bairns cradle. He steeked the door, and wrestling with her, she got a grip of his durk, almost drew out the same; and he thrusting it in again, bled her hand, and made a great wound into it. This was committed seven years since, or thereby. She being demanded by the brethren, how was the slander raised, now lying so long hid? she answered that the said Harry himself revealed it to one Catharine Weymes, his harlot, who bore him two bairns in fornication; the said Catherine

Weymes told the fame to Grizzel Saunders, the fpoufe of John Gregor in Pitmurthly, and the faid Grizzel Saunders revealed the fame to her hufband, who will have her to make her repentance for the fame. She promifes to obey in making her repentance, for removing of the flander.

12. July. Harry Schaw ordained to be fummoned.

19. — Mr William Young, minister at Rogorton, reports that John Bennet, beadle of Rogorton, summoned Harry Schaw, but he declined appearing, upon the ground that being in debt within burgh he durst not compear. Commission was then granted to Mr John Straquhan, minister at St Martins, and Mr David Weymes, minister at Sone, to try him, and to report.

Thefe two clergymen repeatedly reported there inability to get Schaw before them.

13. day of September. Mr William Young complains, that upon Thursday the 7th September instant, being among the stouks of his own glebe, in an folitary and quiet place, called the How of the Park, at his meditations in quiet and fober manner, looking for no evil to have been done or faid to him by any perfon or perfons, but to have lived under God's peace, and our fovereign Lord's,—in the mean time, the faid Harry Schaw of Pitmurthly, having conceived an deadly hatred against him for reporting the adultery, of set purpose, provision, and forethought felony, violently invaded and purfued him of his life, having in his hand a rung, with a long dirk, or elfe a dagger; and the faid Mr William Young feeing him in a rage, and threatning of his life, ran away, the faid Harry following him a great space, and crying, "Theif, thy feet shall not bear thee from me." The faid Mr William Young being an aged man, and fearing he should have felled him with the rung, cried many times, "God's mercy." The faid Harry overtaking him, called him "traitor," and afked him what he faid of him to the Prefbytery? And when Mr William answered he might speir at Mr John Straquhan his good friend, the faid Harry Schaw commanded him to fwear, that he should never speak of him again to the Presbytery, or by the blood of Jesus he should presently die. He with great difficulty was stayed from farther troubling of him, by some poor men that came from shearing of their corns. Immediately thereafter, the faid Harry made vaunt of his doing to his own shearers, and openly declared, that he had caused the minister swear, and cry many times, "God's mercy."

The Prefbytery ordain information to be fent to the Archbishop of St Androis, to raise a summons against Schaw before the High Commission.

- Oct. 18. Schaw appeared, and confessed the affault; upon which he was ordained to make his public repentance in the kirk of Rogorton, one day in linen cloaths, and there openly confess he did the minister wrong, and that on Sunday next. Mr John Guthry was instructed to ride to Rogorton, teach there on the Sunday, receive the said repentance, and confront Schaw with Janet Mar as to the alledged adultery.
- 25. Mr John Guthry reports, that Schaw obeyed the ordinance enjoined; but upon the charge of adultery he would not confefs, but denied, and offered his oath.
- Nov. 1. He failed to compear, upon the ground of fickness; but upon the 8th of that month, in linen cloaths, and humbly on his knees, he confessed the adultery, and promised to satisfy the kirk.
- Nov. 21. Andrew Rofs,* in name of Mr Robert Rofs, fometime of Craigie, his brother, produced the latter's fupplication, shewing his present misery, and divers diseases wherewith he is vexed, and craving support. Three pounds were taken out of the thesaury, and delivered to the said Andrew to give his brother.
 - Dec. 5. Compeared John Lamb, and is accufed for profaning the

Sabbath, in playing at the leads with his complices, the time of the afternoon's fermon, the last Sabbath. He having used many speeches to cloke his fault, was at last brought to a simple confession. Being humbled on his knees therefore, he declared his repentance, and payed thirteen shillings of penalty; and acts him not to do the like hereafter, under the pain of ten pounds, toties quoties, he contravenes.

- Dec. 9. This day Mr Henry Adamson, and Katharine Buchannan, accomplished their marriage.
- Jan. 1. 1621. George Dickson verbally complained he was abused by Francie Scott, —— Thomson, alias Billiecald, and certain other their fociates, young profest knaves, by casting of their bonnets at him in the kirk this day. The session ordained them to be apprehended.
- Jan. 2. Thomson only was apprehended, and taken to the grammar school, and scourged with Saint Bartholomew's taws.
- Jan. 8. Compeared Robert Young, fkinner, who being accufed for profaning of the Sabbath day, in playing at the leads with his fociates, anfwered that John Lamb, fkinner, his mafter, caufed him bear his lead ftones, and play with him, and that the faid John having been drinking in James Myln's houfe, and playing at the dice with Alexander Gilbert, mafon, all night until three hours in the morning, at his furthcoming the faid John most shamefully abused, struck, and dung him down, and left him for dead. Having declared his repentance, he was forgiven, upon a promise not to do the like again, under the penalty of forty shilling, and to pay twenty shillings to the poor, for his penalty, between this and Whitsunday.
- Jan. 9. John Lamb appeared, and admitted the charge; admonished to amend, which he promifed to do.
- Jan. 25. John Hynde, webster, brought out of ward before the Session, and was accused for uttering of disdainful speech against Mr John Guthry, minister, in saying, "that he would be unlikely to

"come in the pulpit, and that he wanted the webster's handy work." He answered, that in his rough humour after drink, he spoke it, and that it was otherwise taken and trapped. On his knees he declared himself very forry for speaking such like speeches, and offered him in the Session's will, to underly such punishment as they should enjoin. He is committed to ward till they resolve theranent. [Nothing farther was done.]

May 18. The Session as yet suspends Mr Henry Adamsone from exercising his office of public reading till such time as they deliberated thereanent, and find fit time to re-enter him.*

June 18. Mr Patrick Rynd, minister at Dron, verbally complained upon Patrick Crie, that he had blassphemed and slandered him, and his daughter, in faying "You have lain with my wife, and would you now "break my head; gang over to Sandy Meassons daughters, and ask them what Currie Wachter had ado with your daughter." Crie denied, but the matter was proved against him; the Presbytery resulted to interfere until a regular bill of complaint was preferred.

July 19. Three pounds delivered to Patrick Pitcairns wife, in part payment of fix pounds for the price of a board cloath lent to the communion tables, the laft time of the celebration of the Lord's Supper, which was ftolen.

- —— So. David Sibbald declared he had caused John Jamieson and David Allan mend the tongue of the preaching bell, and that they craved therefor eight pounds, but he would not agree thereto; the Session gave ten merks.
- Mr Henry Adamson was very penitent, and had satisfied for his fault, which he had fallen into before marriage, but which of late had only become public. His aged father James Adamson had been called in the beginning to attend the Session, and declare what had become of his servant woman Maige Runsiman, and who it was that was reputed to be the father of the child. (Scott.) After a rebuke he was re-admitted upon the 1st of June 1621.

- Nov. 27. Adam Paterfon complained upon certain coddrochis in Dionyfius Conqueror, Notar, his clofs, who dwell in laigh cellars wanting chimneys; wherethro' he and his family are not only abufed with the finoke and reek afcending up thro' the loftings of the houses, but also are in perils, and put in hazard of the burning of their lands. He besides reports, that men at very suspicious times refort even in the night time, to certaine of the coddrochis, and that they are resetters of that, which unsaithful servants steal furth of their masters houses. Whereupon the council and session think it expedient the said coddrochis be removed, and that the said Dionysius be ordained to remove them, and not to set his houses to any that will kindle Ingle therein that want chimneis.*
- Dec. 3. Forafmeikle as dilatation being made, that Janet Watson holds an house by herself where she may give occasion of slander, therefore Patrick Pitcairn, elder, is ordained to admonish her in the session name, either to marry, or then pass to service, otherwise that she will not be suffered to dwell by herself.
- —— 10. Robert Allan fmith fined 13s. 4d. for fhocing horfes on a Sunday.
- Jan. 15. 1622. Three pounds given to Archibald Steidman for candle furnished to the lanthorn at the kirk door this winter quarter.
- 24. Violet Gardener compeared, accufed of profaning the Lord's fanctuary in flyting with Janet White immediately after their private prayers; fhe answered that the faid Janet had abused her with vile words, and that she forbore the faid Janet.†
- March 4. Compeared James Turnbull, accufed of relapfe in adultery with Violet Henderfon. He confessed, but alledged in excuse, that Bessie Pringle, with whom he was joined lawfully in marriage,

had, without any lawful cause, deserted from him by the space of twenty-two years.

The Seffion ordained letters to be directed to Mr Thomas Glass minister at Cappoch, to cause Bessie to confront her husband, in order that it might be ascertained whose fault it was that they did not cohabit together.

He afterwards fatiffied as an adulterer.

- —— 11. Margaret Melling apprehended for fliffning ruffs and overlays on a Sunday. She denied the charge, flating she was merely laying up some overlays. Being fickly and near the time of her birth, she was admonished on her knees to keep the Sabbath day.
- March 11. Compeared Doctor Patrick Hay, doctor of medicine, and confessed his fin of fornication with Helen Cathrow, who, on his knees, declared his repentance, and for his exemption from the ward and Cross Head, paid a double angell, and promised to compear on the stool for declaration of his public repentance when it shall be required.
- 25. John Thomfon and John Robertfon are enjoined, that on the Sabbath days, they remove the beggars that fland in the kirkgate, kirkwyndes, and at the kirk doors,—and if the beggars will not be removed for them, to give up their names to the Session, that they may take order with them.
- —— 26. Janet Brown, who had confessed she was with bairn to Alexander Chapman, having no money to redeem her from ward, or the Crofs Head, was committed to the Tower.
- April 1. Conform to a fupplication given in by James Gibson, ringer of the bells before the Session, craving a coat, breiks, shanks, and shoes, to his marriage day, and for the more decent discharge of his lervice on the days of the celebration of the Lord's supper; his suit was granted, and David Sibbald master of the hospital ordained to furnish the same to him.

- —— 9. Which day John Fleming, baillie, refolving with the Seffion what form of punishment shall be enjoined to John Keir's wife for putting violent hands on him, and for wounding him in the head with a pair of taings,—it is concluded that she, on the next mercat day, pass barefooted, holding up the same taings, in her right hand, above her head thro' the streets of the town.
- April 25. Compeared William Paterson, and on his knees declared his repentance for raikless swearing on the street "by the wounds of the body of our Saviour."
- June 13. Given for reparation of that part of the kirk, which was demolished by the down falling of stones of the pend beside the tower, four pounds four shillings.
- July 15. Various perfons punished for passing to Scoon on a Sunday.
- Aug. 19. Persons craving the benefit of marriage, are ordained to compear the night before the solemnization, and give their purgation if they have had carnal deall before the time or not.
- Sept. 3. Forafmeikle as of before the Seffion ordained John Thomfon to give hospitality to the young little one his oye, and he promised so to do; and that otherwise, if he did not, he was premonished, that an half merk of his weekly wage should be withdrawn from him, and given to them that would give his oye hospitality; and because that he has neglected to do as was enjoined, and contrary to natural pity, has suffered the young thing to be under stairs, and it has been seen lying objected to wind and weet; therefore the Session ordain that the said John be answered, but half an merk weekly of his wage in time coming, and the other half thereof to be given to Janet Gardner to sustain his oye.
 - Aug. 15. Upon fupplication made to the Seffion for the Lady

Craigie, the Soffion continues and overfees her abiding here, being great with child, and but lately come here for the space of eight days.

- Sept. 16. The Seflion ordains the Lady Craigie to obtain Mr William Black, minister at Dumbarny, his testimonial, that she has fatisfied the kirk for her fornication, otherwise that she have no longer residence within Perth.
- Nov. 11. Several wrights delated, as having made mort kifts for the dead on the Sabbath day. They promifed to have in time coming coffins by them ready made both for young and old.
- —— 12. A baker and his fervants are humbled on their knees, and fined for having baken on the Sabbath day, fome manfchots for my Lord Chancellors fupper, [altho at his Lordfhips fpecial request.]
- Jan. 27. 1623. Twelve shillings allowed as the price of a new key for the lock of the north kirk door.
- March 31. Sixteen shillings of weekly salary to James Gibson, ringer of the bells.
- April 15. Margaret Hormscleuch suspected of sorcery, being warned to compear this day before the Session, and not compearing, is ordained therefor to be warded.
- May 5. She compeared, accused, if Robert Chrysties daughter at the miln of Huntingtour came to her with meal and beef to seek help to their cow. She denied this. Being asked if she heard that certain years syne Patrick Patons wise her cows milk was taken from her by forcery? She also denied this. Asked if a poor woman that lodged with her a certain space, sought health to her sick bairn for Gods cause. She confessed that she answered, "Let them give her health that took it from her bairn." She was committed to ward in the tower till she be tried for forcery.
- June 2. Compeared Henry Balneaves, alledging that Margaret Hormfeleuch refts to him of bypaft maill, ten pounds, and offered the

cow to Mr Sibbald for payment thereof, which he refused to accept, and desires the said Henry, to satisfy him of the furnishing made by him to the said Margaret, and to surnish her in time coming, and to bruick the cow; which the said Henry refused to do, but is content to satisfy him for his bypast furnishing, and to meet thereupon after prayers this night.

The Seffion appoint Michael Baxter and Ifobell Lamb to the four fhillings which Ifabell Haldane has, equally betwixt them, and continue it with the faid Ifabell Haldane* during her warding.

July 3. Thomas Wilfon accused for dispersoning of Mr Henry Adamson, reader, "That if he were not in the place of a reader, he "would thraw his nose," with other contemptible speeches. The said Thomas replied, that the said Henry began first to blasspheme him, and to call him "deboished dyvour," which he would take in hand to prove by Walter Balneaves and John Blosson. The Session think it expedient the parties be reconciled, and because the said Thomas's offence is thought to be greatest, the Session ordain the said Thomas to crave the said Mr Henry's pardon, which he did, and they took each other by the hand.

—— 21. Thirty fhillings paid for a tow to the preaching bell.

— 24. Janet Barry accused for confultation with witches in fecking health at them, as at the devil and his inftruments, to her bairn. Denies, she knew the women to be witches of whom she fought means of health to her bairn. She acknowledges her offence against God and the congregation. She was afterwards ordained to stand in white sheets under the bell strings the next Sabbath before noon, there to confess her said offence, and declare her repentance, and to pay before Sunday twenty merks to the use of the poor. Six of these merks paid to Mr

Archibald, in part payment of what he delivered on account of Hormfcleuch. The reft put in the Thefaurey.

Aug. 11. Conform to citation, compeared Janet Jackson, and is accused for consulting with witches, and following their advice for health to her bairn, in that she employed umquhill Isabell Haldane, to go silent to the well of Ruthven, and filent back again with water to wash her bairn. The said Janet confesses that the said Isabell brought the water, and washed her bairn therewith, and that the said Isabell did it unemployed by her, and that she put her bairn thro' an cake made of nine curries [pickles] of meal gotten from women, married maidens, and that it is an common practice used for curing bairns of the cake mark. She is ordained to compear the next Thursday, to sustain centure anent the premises.

Compeared Duncan Tawis and his wife, and are accufed of passing to Black Ruthven to Janet, Witch, to seek help to their bairn. They confessed their going there; but that they knew not she was an witch, but that the bruit went that she could help bairns who had gotten an dint of ill wind. They are ordained to compear at the next warning.

Compeared Grizel Hefpline, and is accufed for feeking help at Margaret Hormfeleuch, for the remeid of her difeafe, which she could not deny. Continues her censure thereanent, till farther advertisement and compearance.

August 19. Conform to citation, compeared Peter Gardner, baxter, and is accused for profaning of the Lord's day, in holding of his booth open to fell bread, as namely the last Sabbath day aforenoon. Answered that it was without his knowledge, and that the like shall not be done by him, nor none of his hereafter. He is licentiate to take bread to his own house, to serve the necessities of neighbours, as they shall happen and require, but not openly in his booth; which he promises to do according to the Session's injunction. Farther, he is ordained to shew

the will of the Seffion to John Henderson, deacon, thereanent, which he promises to do.

Conform to citation, compeared John Bog, and is accused for not reforting to God's service on the Sabbath days. Answered thereto, that when he may come, he does it. But by occasion of his sickness, he is lettit therefrom divers times, as neighbours know.

Secondly, Is accufed for not communicating at the Lord's table with the rest of this congregation. Answered, that he did communicate yearly thereat, except the last time of the celebration thereof, that he in the meantime was deadly sick.

Thirdly, Is accufed upon great flander rifen of him, that his purfe being flolen from him, he used devilish means to get intelligence thereof, the time of the last tempessuous winds, which did great hurt to the fruits of the earth. Answering thereto, he sat down on his knees, and with shedding of tears, abundantly purged himself thereanent, saying, that it was true that he wanted his money, which was stolen furth of his kist by thieves; that he purged his wife, daughter, and son-in-law thereanent, and besought God to strike him dead instantly to death, if ever he used any such indirect methods to get knowledge of his money; but that he wants it as yet; whereupon the Session, till farther tryal anent the premisses, remits him.

September 8. Conform to citation, compeared Alexander Lockhart, and is first accused for profaning of the Lord's day, in kindling ingill to his furnace on Sunday was fourteen days, about five hours at even. Answered, that it was after eight hours, and that if he had known it been offensive either to God, or man, he would not have done it till Monday, and promises not to commit the like hereafter.

Secondly, Is accused for that he accompanied Isabell Haldane in going filent at midnight to the water, and in bringing thereof filent, to wash Andrew Duncan's bairn, which smells of forcery and witchcraft, and of

infidelity to the living Lord. Answered, that whatsoever he did therein was of ignorance, and of no ill pretence. Submitting him in the Session's will thereanent, he is convicted in an penalty of four pounds.

Sept. 29. John Skinner convicted in a penalty of five merks, for roaring, going through the fireet with great flouting, and crying; when the tokens of God's indignation were upon the city, by famine among the poor, and great mortality of the people. He was fined five merks, and ordained to fland up in the taylor's feat on a funday before noon, and there in prefence of the congregation declare his repentance.

Oct. 30. Compeared James Wilfon, Pyper, accufed for playing on the great pype under filence of night, the time of the infolency used by John Skinner and his complices, to the offence of God and terrifying of neighbours, as the either fire or fword had been within the town. He answered, that they compelled him to play to them, and he promised never to do the like hereafter. Being humbled on his knees, he declared his repentance.

Nov. 12. No convention of bretheren, nor excercife, through the vehemency and tempest of the weather.

Dec. 9. Compeared Andrew Gall in Muirtown, accused of profaning the Lord's day the time of the afore and afternoon's fermon, the day of the marriage of John Bennet, with dancing and minftrelfy, he and his colleagues. Being humbled on his knees, he declared his repentance therfor, and paid twenty shillings.

March 30. 1624. A woman flanderoufly reported of, endeavoured to excuse herself by saying, that men resorted to her house for washing and stiffing of their ruffs.

June 9. There is produced a fupplication to the Prefbytery from the burgh of Dumfermling, manifesting the lamentable ruin of that town by violence of fire, which happened on the twenty first day of May last, bypast, 1624, and desiring the brethren to move their people to help them. The Prefbytery ordains ilk brother to intimate the fame to their parishioners the next Sonday, and prepare them to gather a collection to help them, and to make the same ready, and bring it in, the first Wednesday of July next to come.

July 12. John Davidson, scribe to the Session, shewed that he had extraordinary pains anent the depositions of the witches the last year, having wrote divers copies thereof, besides the booking of the same. Whereupon the Session ordain the Masters of Hospital, to discharge him of the annuals adepted forth of the lands sometime pertaining to Oliver Makison of the two terms last bypast.*

* * * * * * *

March 3. 1631. Compeared Isabell Hunter, lamentably declaring, that upon the first day of March instant, at ten hours at even, David Duff came into their house, and passed with a lighted candle to the chamber where her hufband lies, and looked in his face, faying to him, "That the picture of death is in his face, and that if he lived three "Sundays hereafter, he would live three hundred years." Whereat the being offended that he should give her husband such dull comfort, faid to him, "David, are ye a witch, that ye can differn upon life and "death, and time thereof?" He most slanderously answered, "You "and your mother have witched him to lie pining in his bed till he "die," with fundry other speeches, most slanderous, both against her hufband, herfelf, and mother, and against John Conqueror and his fpouse; using great perturbation in the house, and would not pass forth thereof, until he was put forth by violence; and after he was put forth, and the yett steiked, he would not refrain from speaking most flanderous speeches, and so that the faid David had committed both oppression and the highest degree of flander against them.

He compeared and confessed part of the charge, but excused himself upon the ground of his being overcome with drink. The whole charge being proved against him by the evidence of Matthew Lamb, and John Conqueror, he was ordained to be put in ward, until he pay a penalty conformable to his offences, one half to be applied to the use of the Session and the other half to the baillies use.

— 7. Compeared William Gillefpie, adulterer, accufed for his mifbehaviour on the flool yesterday, in laughing, when he should rather have weeped. He excused himself, that a neighbour having nodded his head to him, moved him to smile only. He is admonished to behave himself in that place, as having an forrowful heart for the sin of adultery, as he would procure the mercy of God.

Compeared James Brown, and James Burnman, and are accufed for profaning the Lord's day on funday was twenty days, in playing, they and William Arnot, at dice and cards, the time of the afternoon's fermon. They denied the charge, and Brown promifed to pay the Session twenty pounds, if the charge were proved against him, and Burnman, that if it was, he would be contented to be scourged through the town.

April 25. The Seffion ordain Mr Patrick Johnston and Robert Burrell to pass to Mr John Dorward, master of the grammar school, and shew him that it is the Seffion's will, that he admit not Sir John Ogilvy's sons to come within his school. [Sir John was a papist.]

Ferafineikle as there is a great bruit and rumour passing through this burgh, that certain wives were seen douking, and walking on the water, beside the Lady Bow about midnight; therefore the Session exhorts every elder within his own quarter, to try the names of the said wives, and the persons that saw them, that they may bear witness against them.

26. Five honest men's wives having compeared, it was laid to

their charge, that in the time of the afternoon's fermon, they had drunk aquavytie very extraordinarily.*

- May 4. Gave to an poor woman, to buy a peck of aiken bark for scheiring of her child of a confirmed stone, fix shillings.
- —— 16. Forafmeikle as the Seffion being informed of the great profanities that customably are used at Lykwalkis, by certain profane perfons, that purposely refort thereto for that effect, and that they use to come at midnight to honeft men's houses, when they are upon rest, and knock at their yetts, declaring that certain special friends belonging to them have taken an fudden fickness tending to death, putting these perfons at whose yetts they report these things under great fear, and cauling them in an fuddentie to rife forth of their beds, to the vilitation of those reported to be in the faid fudden fickness, and find it but done in derifion and mockery, tending to the offence of God and honest neighbours:—for reftraining of fuch profanity in time coming, the Seffion have ordained that the council convene with them the next Sellion day, to fettle an ordinance anent fobriety and godly exercifes, to be used at Lykwalkis, and that profane persons be not admitted thereto in any time thereafter. [No act feems to have been made for this purpofe.]
- July 8. Fifteen shillings given by Andrew Bell, master of hospital, to an north land gentlewoman become frantic thro' tineing of her husband, burnt in the place of Frendraught.
- 26. Gilbert Henderson was convicted of calling the Session "false lownes, false knaves, a turd for you all," and punished by a fine of L. 100, (to repair the vaults of the kirk,) besides declaring his repentance on his knees, craving forgiveness of God, and asking pardon of the Session,—which sentence he complied with.
- * The greatest part of the above minute is much torn. It appears from this and other instances, that about this time the women of Perth frequently held gossiping clubs.

April 30. 1632. Forafmeikle as Dumie missehaved himself the last Sabbath day in the kirk, using profaneness, and thereby making tumult and commotion, making the people to have an unreverent behaviour in God's house; therefore he is ordained to be dispatched [out] of the burgh, like as he was for the like missehaviour, dispatched forth of the town of Edinburgh.

May 21. Compeared Laurence Boik, and Janet Black his fpoufe, accused for charming. They confessed that they would sometimes use some holy words for healing of shotts and sores, which words are these,—

Thir sairis are risen thro' God's work, And must be laid thro' God's help; The mother Mary, and her dear Son, Lay thir sairis that are begun.

Ordained to compear this day eight days. [Nothing further feems to have been done.]

Sept. 17. Difburfed at the command of the ministers, reported by Mr Archibald [Steedman, officer,] to an young man called Stewart, fon to umquhil the Earl of Orkney, feven shillings. *

• This son, (who, had he been a bastard, would have been described as such,) is not noticed by the peerage writers. Donglas, in particular, states, that Earl Patrick, who was beheaded in October 1613, left no issue. What a melancholy proof of the instability of human greatness! The son of an Earl of Orkney, a descendant of James V. receiving seven shillings Scots, of alms, as a pauper, from the Kirk Session of Perth.



EXAMINATION

OF THE

ALLEGED DESCENT OF JOHN EARL OF GOWRIE FROM MARGARET QUEEN OF SCOTLAND, WIDOW OF JAMES THE FOURTH.

There are probably few points in Scottish history involved in greater obscurity, than that mysterious event commonly denominated the Gowrie Conspiracy. Indebted as the public is to Mr Pitcairn, for his industry and research in collecting together all the particulars connected with that dreadful tragedy, I am by no means disposed to admit his assumption, that the result of his investigations has for ever put the question to rest. On the contrary, there are so many opposite statements to reconcile, so many improbabilities to remove, and so many apparent inconsistencies to explain, that whether the king or the subject was the conspirator, is, in my humble opinion, by no means clear.

It is not my intention to enter upon the merits of the controveriy; and the prefent enquiry has merely reference to an historical statement of Bishop Burnet, which has been recently adopted by the Rev. James Scott, as the foundation of a very ingenious theory, introduced by him in his valuable, though far from accurate account of the Gowrie family. *

Margaret Tudor, eldeft daughter of Henry VII. born in the year 1489, was married firft, 1503, to James IV. by whom fhe had James V. and next to Archibald the great Earl of Angus, by whom fhe had Lady Margaret Douglas, Countess of Lennox, and mother of Lord Darnley. Having divorced him, fhe afterwards married Henry Stewart, (fecond fon of Lord Evandale,) the first Lord Methven. She died in 1541. The present enquiry relates to the alleged issue of the third marriage.

Burnet, 12mo. vol. i. p. 24. Bishop Burnet, from the general value of whose works I by no means wish to detract, in consequence of the few inaccuracies which may be found in them, states, that "Queen Margaret, after her divorce from "the Earl of Angus, married one Francis Stewart, and had by him a "fon, who was made Lord Methven by King James V. In the patent, "he is called 'Frater noster uterinus.' He had only a daughter, who

" was mother or grandmother to the Earl of Gowrie; fo that by this,

" he might be glad to put the King out of the way, that he might fland

" nearest the fuccession to the crown of England."

Although the Bishop had been correct in his facts, his inference appears by no means warranted, as the Earl of Gowrie could have gained little by removing the King, so long as offspring of his Majesty existed; and it is well known, that besides Prince Henry, his daughter Elizabeth had been born, and that at the date of the conspiracy, the Queen was enceinte. The death of the King would consequently have been of little benefit, unless these insuperable bars to his Lordship's ambitious attempts could have been removed; and it is a remarkable sact connected with the controversy, that there is not the slightest evidence attempted to be adduced by the writers on the royal side of the question, that the Earl of Gowrie had taken measures to get possession of the Queen and her children; a step indispensibly necessary, if there had been any intention either to murder or confine the King.

On the other hand, Mr Scott arrives at a conclusion, quite opposed

to that of the Bishop. Assuming the descent from Queen Margaret, he very plaufibly argues that it was the King's object to deftroy the Earl, as from the favour his Lordship had found in the eyes of Queen Elizabeth, he might be a dangerous competitor for the English crown. This theory, however, is entirely fallacious; and a reference to the records, will at once flew the inaccuracy of Burnet, and the complete fallacy of the Earl's royal descent.

It is not disputed that Queen Margaret was the first wife of Henry Stewart, afterwards Lord Methyen. The precife date of the marriage does not appear. It is flated in the Peerage, that she was married in Wood's Peerage, March 1526. She had, however, previously cohabited with him for fome time.

Under the date of the 17th of July 1528, there is to be found a char- Register of the ter to Margaret Queen of Scotland, and Henry Stewart her spouse, and xxii. No. 126. to the furvivor of them, in conjunct fee, and to the heirs male lawfully procreated between them, or to be procreated, whom failing, to the King and his fucceffors, granting and disponing, "pro carnali amore et " favore quos erga prefatam carissimam matrem nostram habemus, et " gerimus, ac pro bono, fideli, et gratuito fervicio, nobis, per prefatum " Henricum fratrem germanum confanguinei nostri Andreæ Domini " Avondale impenso et impendendo, necnon pro nostri honoris exalta-"tione, totas et integras terras nostras, et dominium de Methyen, " cum castris molendinis, pifcarijs, ac etiam terras et dominium de " Balquhidder cum molendinis," in the county of Perth, united and incorporated into the barony of Methven. This charter is dated at Stirling in the 15th year of the reign of King James V. In favour of Lord Methven and the Queen, various other grants occur in the Register.

Of this marriage, there appears to have been at leaft one fon, whatever other children it may have produced; and although this fact

has been questioned by many writers, there does not feem to be any fufficient ground for the doubt. Bishop Lesley, in his History, in speak-Leslæi Hist. p. 487. ing of the battle of Pinkie, fays, "In eo prælio Scoti octo millia deli-

Rome, 1587. 4to. "derarunt, e quibus plurimi prime nobilitatis principes, ac in primis "Dominus Flemingus, Dominorum Levingstoni, Ogilvii, Aven-" dalii, Meffanii, Ruthveni, et Roffii, filii heredes, quos Magistros vo-" camus, Lochinvarius Baro," &c. As Lefley was a contemporary, he may fairly be confidered as the best possible authority; and as, on the one hand, it is admitted that the Queen was Lord Methven's first wife, and that she did not die until the year 1541, while it is proved, on the other hand, that a Master of Methven was killed at the battle of Pinkie upon the 16th of September 1547, the conclusion that he was the fon of the Queen and Lord Methyen, feems irrefiftible.

> Affuming that the Mafter of Methven was the fon of the Queen, Mr Scott contends, that the Dorothea Stewart, whom it is matter of notoriety Lord Ruthven married, was his daughter. If this could be proved, it is obvious that, failing King James the VI. and his iffue, John Earl of Gowrie would have been next heir to the English crown.

But the fupposition is altogether erroneous. Dorothea Stewart was

not the daughter of the mafter of Methven, but of his father: and it is a remarkable circumstance that this Lady was by birth illegitimate, in evidence of which affertion, reference may be made to the Privy Seal Lib. 24. folio 79. Record, where there is to be found, "Legitimatio Henrici Stewart. " Jonete Stewart, Margarete Stewart, et Dorothie Stewart, bastardo-" rum, filii et filiarum naturalium Henrici Domini Methven, inter " ipfum et Jonetam Stewart, comitiffam de Sutherland, procreatorum," dated at Edinburgh, 16 Sep. 1551.

> This document establishes, that Henry Lord Methven had by Janet Stewart four natural children, a fon, and three daughters, the youngest of whom was Dorothea; and that she was the Dorothea that married

William fourth Lord Ruthven, and afterwards the first Earl of Gowrie, is proved by certain proceedings in the Sheriff Court of Perthshire, for an abstract of which I am indebted to George Smythe, Esq. a member of this Club: - "4th June 1567. Removing at the inftance of " Dame Janet Stewart, Lady Methven, liferentrix of the lands of " Bachilton, against George Oliphant pretended occupier thereof.-" Objected for the defence, that my Lord Ruthven is not a judge com-" petent, because he married the pursuer's daughter, and therefore is " fuspect. The Sheriff principal declined himself, 7th June 1567." " Lady Methven, v. George Oliphant. The defender propones re-" cufative against John Murray (of Cluthybeg) that he may not cognosce " in this caufe, as judge incompetent; and that because he atting is in " affinitie and confanguinitie with my Lord Sheriff principal, who was " fon to Patrick Lord Ruthven, quhilk Patrick was fon to umquhill " William Lord Ruthven, quhais fifter Ifabel, married to John Murray " of Wallaceton, afterwards of Tibbermae, is the faid John Murray's " mother, and that William Lord Ruthven is now marriet to the pur-" fuer's dochter; and that my Lord Methven married the faid William " Lord Ruthven's fifter .- Answered for the pursuer, that the objection " thould be repelled, because there is no reckoning made juffly, or in " confanguinitie or affinitie betwixt Janet Stewart principal purfuer, " and the faid John Murray depute."

Dame Janet Stewart Lady Methven is thus proved to have been mother-in-law of Lord Ruthven; and as his wife was undoubtedly Dorothea Stewart, it may with perfect fafety be affirmed that she was the identical Dorothea legitimated 16th Sept. 1551; confequently that John Earl of Gowrie's alleged descent from Queen Margaret is altogether imaginary. This singular mistake is a convincing proof of the extreme caution with which all traditionary reports should be received; for excepting the old rhyme referred to by Scott, the date of which

does not appear, the report is to be traced to the comparatively modern authority of Burnet, and of a Viscount Strathallan, who, in certain Memoirs of the Drummond family compiled in the year 1681, commits the additional blunder of calling Dorothea the immediate daughter of the Queen.


It is only by the aid of records and other authentic muniments, that hiftory can ever be placed upon a folid foundation. It is, indeed, fingular how many miftakes have in modern days been corrected by this authentic mode of inveftigation, and how many accredited facts have been proved to be entirely fictitious. In verity, there is much truth in the diffich alleged by Calderwood to have been anciently painted on a chimney-piece in the caftle of Ruthven, now called Huntingtower,* and which may not unappropriately be introduced here as concluding my observations:—

Vera din latitant, sed longo temporis usu Emergunt tandem quæ latuere din.



RELATIVE TO ROBERT LORD SANQUHAR.*

The execution of Robert Crichton, Lord Sanquhar, for the murder of a fencing-mafter, named Turner, although an act of firict juftice, created a confiderable fenfation at a period when rank and fortune were deemed fufficient to cover all enormities. The cause of the murder, and the facts connected with its perpetration, are too well known to admit of repetition;† and I should not have deemed it necessary to trouble the reader with any commentary, had I not accidentally met with a very remarkable letter, which I thought might, without impropriety, be transferred from an old newspaper, where it reposes, to the present volume.

During the excitement produced by the trial of Earl Ferrers for the murder of his fleward, there was much fpeculation whether he would be convicted, and if convicted, whether he would be executed; and the public journals were filled with observations, principally, I am forry to fay, against him; for, so far as I can see from the evidence, he was clearly affected with infanity. As the execution of a nobleman for felony was a very unusual occurrence, people began to search for parallel cases, when the sentence against Lord Sanquhar was brought to recollection, and a comparison between the two instituted,—although they did not admit of comparison, as the one murder was of the most russianly description, while the other, if not committed by a confirmed madman, was perpetrated by an individual evidently at the time labouring under infanity.

Among other relative communications, the enfuing letter was addreffed to the author of the Edinburgh Chronicle; and as the principal facts were derived from a member of the Hyndford family, and prefent an appearance of truth, it will be read with much interest.

To the author of the Edinburgh Chronicle.

SIR,

UPON reading the flory of Robert Creichton, Lord Sanguhar, related in your paper, No. 145. a reflection naturally occurs to those who are acquainted with the hiftory and character of James VI. How he who in Scotland pardoned treafons, even against his liberty and his person, as often almost as they were committed by the powerful and factious nobility, and who afterwards pardoned Somerfet and his fiend-like wife for the murder of Sir Thomas Overbury, even after all the dreadful curses he had imprecated upon himself and his posterity, if he should ever forgive them; how he, I fay, should be altogether inexorable to this young Lord, is an anecdote not unworthy of the public attention. It is indeed true, that Lord Sanguhar had taken a bafe and unjustifiable revenge upon a fcoundrel who had infolently hurt him; but to this he had been fpurred on by his French education, and by that unlucky question put to him by Henry IV. if the man who had put out his eye was alive? Every body knows that a blow given to a gentleman in France, can only be expiated by the death of him who gave it; and how much more provoking is the lofs of an eye put out by a fencingmafter? it being against all the known rules of those schools, to push at any part above the shoulder. This indeed sometimes happens among young beginners, but could never happen to a mafter but by defign; and feems to have been done in revenge of my Lord's telling him that he pushed like a scholar. These circumstances feem no small allevia-

tions of his guilt. Add to this, that he was the lineal heir of the great Sir William Creighton, Chancellor to our lawgiver James I. and whofe authority and abilities, joined to an intrepid courage, upheld the crown during the minority of his fon James II. against the overgrown power of the family of Douglas. Him our elegant historian justly calls manu et ingenio strenuus; and though his cutting off the Earl of Douglas and his brother in Edinburgh caftle be equivocal, yet it is no more to than Cæfar's death in the fenate, and the Duke of Guife's at Blois. However that be, his merits to the royal family were, it must be allowed, very great; and that this young Lord had merit, appears by his enjoying (fatally indeed for him) the familiarity of the greatest, bravest prince, and the finest gentleman that reigned in that, or perhaps in any other age. All thefe things puzzled me a little, who have the honour to be descended of that noble race. And I was let into the secret by a person of quality, * who was himself related to that family, whose polite learning and curious knowledge of anecdotes of this nature were known to every body.

The ftory is this. When the Duke of Sully was fent over upon that famous embaffy, of which he has given us an account in his letters, King James gave him the most folemu promises, that he would support Henry with all that vigour and gallant magnanimity with which the glorious Elisabeth had done; and that he would enter into all the heroic schemes projected between them two, for breaking the power of the house of Austria, then so justly formidable to all Europe: but instead of all this, Sully was hardly out of England, when James made peace with Spain, and continued their dupe ever after. This entirely ruined his reputation in France. Numberless were the jokes, the farcasms, and epigrams that were made upon him; of which that samous one which begins, Quand Elisabeth fut Roy, was one. In the mean

time, at home, King James's flatterers called him the Solomon of the age. It happened, that one day Lord Sanguhar was in a merry company at Paris, when one of them faid, it was no wonder he was called Solomon, fince he was the fon of David, alluding to the flory of David Rizzio. This Lord Creighton did not refent, but joined in the laugh. James was told of this by fome malicious whilperer; and this was the true reason of his letting him suffer death. So that he was really punished, not for killing one man, but for not killing another; for hearing a dull pun, which one should be apt to think was not worth minding, especially as it came from a Frenchman, in his own country; and belides, if my Lord had challenged the punfter, he foon would have had the whole French court to have taken out, in the humour they were then in, and confidering the rage of duelling, which then prevailed; and even at this time we are confcious how indecent freedoms we take with foreign Kings, and what a fine time a Frenchman would have, who should take upon him to refent all the vile infolent fcurrilities that have been uttered against the King of France. But men of letters should remember that Memnon, the best of Darius's captains, hearing one day a foldier rail at Alexander, ftruck him with his pike, and told him, "You rafcal, I hired you to fight against Alexander, and not to defame him."
