REPORT, &c.

THE COMMITTEE, appointed at a General Meeting of the Friends and Subscribers of the London Gäelic Chapel, held at the Freemasons' Tavern, on Wednesday, the 13th Day of September 1809, for managing the Affairs of the said Institution, have great Satisfaction in submitting to the Donors, Subscribers, and regularly paying Sitters, the following Report ;—

Y OUR COMMITTEE, in reporting upon the State of the London Gäelic Chapel, cannot help congratulating this Meeting on the present prosperous Appearance of its Affairs; and as the utility of this well intentioned Institution is demonstrated, by the landable and increasing interest clearly perceivable, not only amongst the Highlanders resident in and near this great Metropolis, but amongst many others, to benefit by the Religious Instruction afforded through this inedium, your Committee strongly recommend every possible exertion to remove the Obstacles presented to the completion of your undertaking, by the remôte situation and rather mean appearance of the present Chapel, which to a few have occasioned some degree of unwillingness to become permanent Sitters therein.

The continual Succession, however, of new faces, many of whom are from the most respectable class of Highlanders, affords the strongest proof, that when a proper Chapel is built in a central situation, the Congregation of the Loudon London Gäelic Chapel will be both respectable and numerous; and will, by their orderly Conduct, as Members of Society, and their virtuous conduct as Men, prove their sincerity and zeal in the professions and duties of our sacred Religion.

Satisfied as your Committee are, that it requires neither any argument nor inducement, which they can hold out, to create and stimulate your exertions in the cause of Religion, they will at once detail to you their proceedings in discharge of the important duty entrusted to them, reserving to themselves the privilege of a few concluding observations.

In proceeding with this detail, it will be necessary to state, that the Reverend DUNCAN ROBERTSON, in the month of *April* 1809, published, with the approbation and sanction of many respectable characters, and particularly of many of the Members of the London Highland Society, a Prospectus for opening a Chapel in this Metropolis, where Divine Service might be performed alternately in the Gäelic and English Languages, in which he proposed officiating for the first half year GRATIS; and with this view also hired a Chapel, in which Divine Service commenced on the 25th day of *June* following. The Congregation, however, soon became so numerous, that many of the Friends and Supporters of the Undertaking recommended a General Meeting, which was accordingly held at the *Freemasons' Tavern*, on the 13th of *Scytember* 1809.

The first object which engaged the attention of this highly respectable and mimerous Meeting, was the consideration of the Prospectus already alluded to, the preamble of which runs thus.—

"The *expediency* and *necessity* of opening a CHAPEL, in a central situation in the Metropolis, where Divine Service should be performed alternately in the *Güclic* and *English* languages, for the religious instruction of Highlanders, and especially the poorer classes of them residing therein and in its vicinity, have been long felt and acknowledged. It is believed that the number of Highlanders residing in London and its environs exceeds those who reside in Glasgow and Edinburgh in the proportion of three to one; yet in each of these Cities there are two Gäclic Chapels.

"There is also a great number of Highland Soldiers and Sailors constantly passing through London, many of whom have frequently occasion to remain in it a considerable time. Moreover the influx of Highlanders to the Metropolis is yearly increasing. From not sufficiently understanding English, from prejudice in favour of their native language, or from inability

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to pay for seats, a vast proportion of these seldem or never frequent any place of public worship". This was a matter deeply to be deplored. and loudly called for a speedy remedy. Independently of the spiritnal Benefits, which must result from establishing a Gäelic Chapel in London. there are obviously many others, though far inferior, which would neither be undesirable nor uncongenial to the feelings of Highlanders.

"Under these circumstances, therefore, and with a view to promote and establish an Institution, which has for its basis an Object so Benevoleut, so Charitable, and so Christian, as the religious instruction of a numerous and useful class of people, many of whom, for the reasons already mentioned, have been almost wholly deprived of so invaluable a blessing, a small Chapel was upwards of three months ago engaged in Dartmouth Street, Westminster, where Divine Service has been regularly performed in the Güelic and English alternately, by the Rev. DUNCAN ROBERTSON, a regularly ordained Minister of the Church of Scotland."

After duly weighing the strong arguments and cogent reasons held out in the Preamble, and sensible of the important advantages that would necessarily result from the permanent establishment of a Gäelic Chapel in London, the Meeting, in order to carry into effect this desirable object. unanimously adopted (Dr. MACKINNON in the chair) the following" Resolutions :---

" 1st .- That for the purpose of promoting and carrying into effect the objects of this Institution, a Committee of Management, to regulate the affairs of the Chapel, be now appointed, and afterwards annually chosen. and that the said Committee do consist of the following fifteen Gentlemen. of whom Five shall be a Quorum, viz.

* This remark has, since the opening of the present Chapel, been verified in the fullest extent. Several persons, who were not formerly connected with any place of public Worship, are now regular Sitters in the Chapel. Numbers of Soldiers and Sailors are also frequently in the Chapel, who, on these occasions, testify their Gratitude to Heaven for this Religious Establishment.

2d .- That

"2d.—That all Office-bearers be Members of the Committee, and that a certain number of Honorary Members, whom the Committee are hereby authorized to name, be added, whose attendance shall be required only on questions of importance.

"3d.—That the Committee be empowered to elect all necessary Officers; to audit the Treasurer's accompts; to direct the application and investment of monies in Public Securities; to order the payment of Salaries and Contingencies; and to regulate generally the Aflairs of the Institution.

6 4th.—That to provide against unforescen inconvenience, the following Gentlemen he appointed Treasurers for the time being, in order that, in the event of the death of one, the other two may hold control over the money in their, or either of their, hands, viz.—Dr. MACKINNON, of John Street, Adelphi; ALEXANDER LAMB, Esq. of Aldersgate Street; and Mr. DONALD CURRIE, of the Haymarket, (who is to be the Acting Treasurer).

" 5th.—That Mr. MALCOLM CURRIE, of the Haymarket, be appointed Secretary for the time being."

In respect that there are many Highlanders in London, who may be friendly to this Institution, but who, from not being sufficiently acquainted with the Gäelic, to enable them to enjoy the full benefit of Divine Worship performed in that language; and that there are others, to whom the Gäelic is perfectly intelligible, but whose Families are unacquainted with it; it is, therefore, desirable that an opportunity should be afforded to all such Persons to hear the Gospel preached in that language which they do understand, without being nuder the necessity of dividing their families, by attending different places of worship; the Meeting having duly considered this important Circumstance, resolved,

"6th.—That Divine Service be performed every Lord's Day in the Chapel, agreeably to the forms of the Church of Scotland; and that it be recommended to the Rev. DUNCAN ROBERTSON to deliver a Gäelic and an English Discourse in Succession on the same Morning; and that, in the place of an Afternoon Service as heretofore, he do substitute an Evening Lecture in the English Language. The whole of the service to be in strict conformity to the established Church of Scotland.

"7th.-That the Sacrament of the Supper be duly administered at least once every half year.

" Sth.—That there be a certain number of Pews in the Chapel allotted for the accommodation of poor People, and especially for Soldiers and Sailors, Sailors, who may occasionally reside in or transiently pass through the Metropolis.

"9th.—That in the event of a Vacancy in the office of the Ministry, the power of appointing a successor be vested in the Majority of the Subscribers and regularly paying Sitters actually present on the occasion; the Chapel having been kept open half a year, for the purpose of giving Candidates an Opportunity of preaching occasionally, and of proving their fitness for so important and so sacred an Office.

" 10th.—That the Clergyman of the Gäelic Chapel in London be a regularly ordained Minister of the Church of Scotland, who has been educated at one of the Scotlish Universities, and licensed and ordained by a Scotlish Presbytery.

"11th.—That, for the regular and permanent Support of this Establishment, a Book be opened for the Signatures of the Gentlemen now present as Donors, Life or Annual Subscribers, in which shall be specified the varions Donations and Rates paid for Seats, agreeably to the subjoined Schedule. And that the Secretary be authorized and directed to apply for the AID and ASSISTANCE of all Highlanders and benevolent Christians in general to this laudable and useful undertaking.

"12th.—That all Subscriptions to the Gäelic Chapel for the current half year be paid as soon as convenient, into the bands of the Treasurers; and that quarterly payments be hereafter made in advance, (as is usual) leaving it, however, to the option of such of the Members as shall be so disposed to pay at once for the current year.

" 13th.—That a Donation of One Hundred Guineas or upwards to this Institution do constitute a SUBSCRIBER for Life, who shall be entitled to Five Votes upon all general questions. That a Donation of Fifty Guineas do constitute a SUBSCRIBER also for Life, who shall be entitled to Three Votes. That a Donation of Twenty-five Guineas do constitute a SUB-SCRIBER likewise for Life, who shall be entitled to Two Votes. And that a Donation of Ten Guineas do constitute a SUBSCRIBER for Life, who shall be entitled to One Vote."

The Meeting, being fully sensible that it is highly essential to the success of an infant Institution, that its early progress should not be marked by any degree of Languor, but that every expedient Measure, should be embraced with Promptitude, and carried on with that ardent Zeal, and persevering Spirit, which so peculiarly distinguish Highlanders, resolved,

" 14th .- That

" 14th.—That it be recommended to the Gentlemen now assembled, and to all others friendly to this lastitution, not only to deliver to the Secretary the names and places of abode of all persons of both Sexes, whom they consider attached to, or interested in this national Undertaking (in order that they may be furnished with a Prospectus), but also to become active Canvassers in their respective Circles of Acquaintance, for the further Support of this inaportant and pions Caase.

"15th.—That it be competent for the Committee to add to these Regulations, such others as may appear to them to promote the Prosperity and Interest of the Chapel."

Your Committee have also received, with mingled sentiments of gratitude and admiration, from ADAM CAMERON, Esq. an account of the generous and liberal Subscriptions by the Deacons of Paramaribo, and of the different Divisions on the Rivers in the Colony of Surinam; and they cannot but gratefully admire that spirit of universal Love and Charity so eminently displayed by these benevolent Foreigners, which dictated this Christian and charitable act, which could not proceed from any cause or motive whatever, but from a sincere desire and ardent zeal for propagating and spreading our Heavenly Religion, the true end and design of which is to make men wiser and better, improve and evalt human nature, and to teach men to love and imitate GOD and the SAVIOUR of the World in their imitable perfections, and finally to make them partakers of Heaven, where there is neither care nor pain, but joy for ever more.

In noticing this unparalleled act of Benevolence, your Committee feel, that they would not do justice to the Piety of these truly good and virtuous Foreigners, if they did not communicate their Proceedings, so replete with religious decorum, in their own Language; your Committee, therefore, will state them as detailed in a Letter from the Reverend PETER JAN VAN ESCH to Mr. CAMERON, published in the Surinam Courant, of the 19th Man, as follows:-

" Sir, and much esteemed Friend,

" On the 16th March last, I laid before an Extraordinary Meeting of the Worshipful Consistory of the reformed Church of Surinam, purposely convened, the address I had the day before received from you; having for its object, as far as regards this Worshipful Assembly, to request their assistance in promoting, amongst their Community, the Christian Intentions of your, and our Brethren, the Highlanders of Scotland, in London, to build a Chapel in that Capital, where Divine Service will be performed in the Güelic and English Languages, and in general for virtuous and moral Instruction,

" The sentiments of Christian Brotherly Love, and the desire and eagerness to afford assistance, which you are pleased to say, the actions and decrees of the Members of this Worshipful Assembly have invariably manifested, and whose cordial support you, of course, had a right to expect, in the attainment of an Uudertaking so charitable in itself, and so honorable to your feelings, I am extremely happy to communicate, have had the desired success, of which I have the honor to transmit you the following particulars:" "Fridar

" Friday, March 16th 1810"

"An address from ADAM CAMERON, Esq. having been laid hefore this Worshipful Assembly, requesting, as far as regards this Worshipful Assembly, to lend our assistance, in promoting the collections of means vecessary for the purpose of building a Chapel in London, for the Religious Instructions of the Highlanders of Scotland, in the Gäelic and English Languages, &c.

"In consequence of which this Worshipful Assembly did unanimously resolve to petition His Excellency CHARLES BENTINCK, Esq. Governor and Commander in Chief of this Colony, &c. &c. &c. to be permitted, for the benefit of the said object, to make a general Collection throughout Paramaribo and the different Districts and Rivers of the Colony.

"The Worshipful Consistory of the reformed Community to Messrs. H. Y. BUUMA, of the Division Mattapica; — ALTONA, of the Upper Cottica and Perica; C. L. WEISENBRUCK, of the Para and Creeks thereunto belonging; J. J. BRUNDEL, of the Upper Commewyne; N. P. BOTHEMLY, of the Lower Cottica; R. L. WYCHEL, of the Lower Commewyne; H. C. VOETMAN, of Surinam; — WILSON, of Saramaeca;

" Sirs,

" One of the Attributes of a true Christian is a generous willingness to be useful to his Fellow Beings; and the most certain criterion of a true believer, is his actual observance of the Duties of a Christian, in promoting and extending the Kingdom of our blessed Saviour JESUS CHRIST, in this World.

"Impressed with these sentiments, Sirs, the Worshipful Consistory of the reformed Church of this Colony have resolved, at their Extraordinary Meeting, held on the 16th instant, for the express purpose of taking into consideration Mr. ADAM CAMERON'S requests, to support the undertaking, to build a Chapel for the benefit of the Highlanders of Scotland, in London, as far as lays in their power, and to which His Excellency Governor EENTINCK, has been pleased to grant his approbation, that on *Tuesday* next, the 20th March 1810, the Deacon of the reformed Church will go round

round to collect at the house of Christians; which is likewise to be done on all the Rivers of this Colony, and has accordingly been made known in a regular manner to the Congregation on *Sunday* last, from the Pulpit; and whereas the Worshipful Consistory is fully convinced of the readiness of the Christians on the Rivers to contribute to an object of such importance to their fellow Christians, the Highlanders of Scotland, in England, who, with them, although differing in Language, acknowledge and adore the ALMIGHTY in the same form.

"And being particularly inclined to believe in your willingness to take charge of the collection of Funds for that purpose, the Worshipful Consistory have requested me to beg your acceptance of this duty for the District of* under your superintendence, in consequence of which I beg leave to annex a Copy of Mr. CAMERON's address; as also a List of Subscribers, on which you will be pleased to state the Names and Sums of the Donors; and I request yon will have the goodness to transmit me the Money received, within six weeks after this date, for which a Receipt will be given, for your discharge.

To this Communication Mr. CAMERON returned the following appropriate Letter of Thanks, viz.

" Paramaribo, Surinam, 25th May, 1810.

" Reverend Sir,

"The distinguished sentiments of Approbation which accompanied you from *Curaçao*, and the joy which filled the Hearts of the good Inhabitants of *Surinam*, on your arrival among them, afforded a pleasant prospect of the advantages that would result to Religion in general from your residence in this Colony. Fully impressed with this idea, and being nominated by Lieutenant Colonel STEWART, of the Royal West India Rangers, a Member of the Committee appointed to receive all Subscriptions in this Part of the World, towards building a Chapel in London, for the Religious Instruction of the Highlanders of Scotland, as already communicated, I was induced to address you upon the subject by my Letter of the 12th *March* last, requesting your support towards so Christian-like and Benevolent an Institution.

" I have now the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter of the 19th instant; in answer thereto, with its inclosed, transmitting the Sum of three thousand nine hundred and four Guilders, subscribed under the direction of the Worshipful Consistory of your Church, in the Town of Paramaribo, and the different Rivers in this Colony, as specified. In addition to which, I beg leave to hand you the Subscription received from the principal Inhabitants of this Town, which, together, amounts to upwards of twenty-one thousand Guilders, in order that you may be acquainted with every individual who has subscribed to this Christian-like Institution, and request that you will return them Thanks in such a manner as may be agreeable to yourself, in behalf of your Christian Brothers, the Highlanders of Scotland.

Your Committee have here to observe that though a deficiency appears at present in the Fund arising from the seats, to meet the consequent expenditure attending the performance of Divine Service in the Chapel, yet this deficiency will be made good, and a small surplus created, when the arrears of rent for the seats now outstanding are paid; and as your Committee are persuaded that the accumulation of these arrears are not to be attributed to any want of either regularity or zeal in the Congregation, but entirely to a defective mode of collection, your Committee recommend, that a proper person be appointed to collect the rents of the seats, and that the Sitters be solicited to pay a quarter's rent in advance, agreeably to the usage adopted

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in other Chapels in the Metropolis; and this is the more necessary, in order to enable your Committee to judge of, and regulate the allowance to be made to the Minister, &c.

During the progress, which this Institution has made for the last year, nothing can prove its Utility more than the Readiness and Zeal, which have already been displayed in support of it. The Subscription Roll, with hardly a single exception, has been successful wherever it has been presented. And, when it is considered that it has not yet travelled but a short distance from the residence of the Secretary, your Committee will surely be permitted to believe, that the Subscriptions, that may be reasonably expected from various Quarters of the kingdom, and even from many places abroad, to which no opportunity has yet occurred of making any application, are merely in their infancy. Contemplating these pleasing prospects, your Committee will here take the liberty of suggesting, as soon as the objects of the Gäelic Chapel are finally accomplished, the propriety of establishing a School in Connection therewith, on a Scale proportionable to the Funds, that may at that period be either unappropriated, or expected.

Gratefully thankful as your Committee are for the unprecedented support, which this Institution has already met with from a generous Public, yet in the midst of this success, they cannot help, without, in the most remote degree, undervaluing the bounty of others, adverting to the particular conduct of Mr. ORDERSON, the Editor of the Barbadoes Mercury. This gentleman, wholly unconnected with the Highlands, and a Stranger to the Gäelic Language, has published *Gratis* in his extensively circulated Paper, the Original Prospectus, together with various other Advertisements connected therewith. Had he made a regular charge, the expences would have amounted to a very considerable Sum. Under these circumstances, your Committee would beg leave to recommend to this Meeting, to order a piece of Plate, with an appropriate Inscription in Gäelic, expressive of the high sense, the Meeting entertains of his disinterested Assistance to the Chapel, to be presented to Mr. ORDERSON.

In returning to the mention of the Benefits which this Institution has derived from the Services and Zeal of the Rev. DUNCAN ROBERTSON, your Committee have to request your particular Attention to the circumstance of this Gentleman's having served the Chapel Gratis, from the 25th Day of June 1809 to the Christmas following. In consideration of which your Committee recommend that a Vote of Thanks, and some other other* Token of their Respect be presented to him, expressive of their Sense of his pious and assiduous Discharge of the Duties of a Minister.

Your Committee, though they, as before observed, feel it unnecessary to urge to this Meeting any general arguments in favour of Religious Establishments, yet think it right, in addition to those already mentioned, in the introduction to the Resolutions, to recommend to Highlanders the diligent Cultivation of the Gäelic Language, under the Meridian Sun of the British Metropolis; and they do this from a thorough Conviction, that while a Knowledge of this Language, which once universally prevailed over the West of Europe, will tend to unravel and explain, in many important Instances, Topography and ancient Monuments, which have hitherto eluded the Researches of the Antiquarian, and the Man of Science; it will also forward the Cause of irue Religion : for whatever weakens or overthrows the ingenious but delusive Theories of the Atheist and Sceptic, on rational principles, cannot fail of being serviceable to Christianity.

When, therefore, the Language in which OSSIAN composed Poems, which, even in the Garb of a Translation, equalled, and, in some instances, excelled, according to the opinion of the best Critics, the immortal Works of *Homer, Virgil, Milton*, and *Tasso*, becomes more generally known among the Learned, it is not presumptuous to believe that important discoveries will be made, and that the World will see with astonishment, that the patriarchal *Hebrew* and the Language of the unlettered Inhabitants of the rude and barren Mountains of *Caledonia*, have one and the same Root, and that probably the early and uncorrupted druidical Religion of this Island was, with an exception in favor of the Jews, more nearly allied to the true Worship of GOD, as practised at the original dispersion of Mankind, than any other; and with this discovery will vanish the whole of those Fables, which are founded on our supposed Scythian and ideal Scandinavian Gods.

This Chapel will, necessarily, lead to a better understanding of this Language, and consequently to a more accurate examination of, and intimate acquaintance with, the ancient Relicts of our Island: hence too will succeed a more correct elucidation of our History, for a Period of many Hundred Years, which have been consigned by Historians to the examination of

Antiquaries,

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^{*} In the course of their Proceedings, the Committee resolved to present to him a Piece of Plate(to be defrayed by voluntary Subscriptions), with a suitable Inscription, commemorative of his meritorious Services,

Antiquaries, or the Fancy of Fabulists. A Philological Elucidation of this kind will assist to trace the course pursued by the various Colonists, at the original dispersion of Mankind, and, consequently, by fixing the priority of Nations, to unravel many of their Customs, and much of their Religion and Language, on Gronuds that may be considered Evidence, that speaks at this moment to the senses of the Polentick; and the Truth of one of the most important Events recorded by the sacred Historian being thus established, the wavering are relieved from their doubts, the weak are confirmed in the Belief of the Gospel, and the Sceptic and Casuist are overwhelmed in the mazes of their own sophistry.

If any of you, should think that your Committee have, in this instance, taken a too sanguine view of this Institution, your Committee still feel confident, they cannot err in supporting and promoting it, founded as it is on principles, which are calculated to promote the temporal and eternal Interests of Mankind; they, therefore, conclude their Labours by earnestly recommending to this Meeting and their Friends, to persevere in their Exertions to promote to the utmost of their power the Establishment of the London Gäelie Chapel.

The Meeting having expressed their highest Satisfaction at, and Approbation of, the foregoing Report, and having ordered the same to be printed for the general Benefit of the Institution, forthwith proceeded to the Election of the Committee of Management for the ensuing Year, when the following Gentlemen were unanimously chosen, viz.
