INTRODUCTION.

IN compiling the **BON-ACCORD DIRECTORY**, the utmost care has been taken to render it complete in all its departments.

On comparison with the Directories of Aberdeen hitherto published, it will be found that it contains several new and important features, the principal of which are the Plan of the City, the amount and variety of Local Information, and the distinguishing of the Parliamentary and Municipal Electors.

The Plan of the City has been brought down to the latest improvements, and presents in contrast the proposed new Docks according to the plans of the respective parties by whom they have been designed. In describing the Streets, the plan of Birmingham has been followed, where open lines have been found to be much more useful, especially to strangers, than close columns, the system usually adopted for local plans.

The Local Lists have been carefully collated from the most authentic sources, and arranged in such a manner as would facilitate the readiest consultation. Nothing has been omitted which seemed necessary to afford information on every point of local interest and importance.

Considerable difficulty has been found in distinguishing the Parliamentary and Municipal Electors; but, under the circumstances, it is hoped that the errors will be comparatively few.

Upon the whole, it is presumed that the **BON-ACCORD DIRECTORY** will be found to be a great improvement on its predecessors. Whatever omissions may have inadvertently been made, the Compiler will do his best to remedy next year, and cheerfully give effect to any suggestions which may be considered of practical utility.

MUNICIPAL WARDS OF THE CITY.

Under the Burgh Reform Act, the Magistrates and Councillors are elected by the parliamentary electors within the burgh, which is, for the convenience of polling, divided into three Wards, each of which sends six representatives to the Town Council. Of these two retire every year, when their places are, of course, supplied by a new-election.

FIRST WARD.—To consist of that portion of the royalty which is included within the following boundary, viz. :—Beginning on the seashore, at the point where the north boundary of the royalty touches the shore, and following the said north boundary westward, till it touches the turnpike road leading from Inverury to Aberdeen; southward, along that road and the Gallowgate to Broad-street, and along Broad-street to Union-street; along Union-street; along Union-street to Castle-street and Justice-street, eastward to Park-lane, along Park-lane and the road or street leading along the foot of the Castlehill to James-street; along James-street, and continuing in a line due south from the termination of the same to the Dee; eastward, along the Dee to the mouth of that river, and thence northward along the seashore to the point where the north boundary of the royalty touches the shore.—Polling-place, in the Court-house.

SECOND WARD.—To consist of that portion of the royalty which is included within the following boundary, viz. :—Beginning at the centre of Union-street, opposite the Back-wynd, and keeping along the Back-wynd to Schoolhill; westward, along Schoolhill and Woolmanhill to the point where the Millburn crosses Spa-street, near the steps of Gilcomston; from that point northward by the boundary of the royalty, and following the said boundary eastward, till it meets the north-west point of the boundary of the First Ward; then southward by the Inverury road and Gallowgate to Broad-street, and along Broad-street to Union-street; along Castle-street and Justice-street eastward to Park-lane; along Park-lane and the road or street leading along the foot of Castlehill to Justice-street, and continued in a line due south from the termination of the same to the Dee; thence up the river to where the same is intersected by a line drawn south in continuation of the Shorebrae; thence up the said line, Shorebrae, and Shiprow, to Union-street, and along Union-street westward to the point opposite the Back-wynd, where the description of the Ward began.—Polling-place, Cruickshank's Hall, Schoolhill.

THIRD WARD.—To consist of that portion of the royalty which is included within the following boundary, viz.:—Beginning at the point where the Millburn crosses Spa-street, near the steps of Gilcomston; thence along Woolmanhill and Schoolhill to a point opposite the north end of Back-wynd; along Back-wynd southward to Union-street; along Union-street eastward to opposite the head of Shiprow, down Shiprow and Shorebrae, and in prolongation of the termination of the latter to the intersection with the river Dee; thence up the river Dee to the mouth of the burn of Ferryhill, and from the mouth of the burn of Ferryhill, following the boundary of the royalty, to the point on the Millburn, near the steps of Gilcomston, where the description of the Ward began.—Polling-place, at the Water Reservoir, Union Place.

The following Parishes are comprehended within the respective Wards.

WARD FIRST.—Comprehending North, Greyfriars, and St. Clement's Parishes, and a small part of Old Machar, at Causewayend.

WARD SECOND.—Comprehending East and West Parishes, and a small part of Old Machar, at Causewayend.

WARD THIRD.—Comprehending South Parish, and that part of Old Machar within the Ward.

PARLIAMENTARY BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY.

From the point on the north-west of the town, at which the Scatter Burn joins the river Don, down the river Don to the point at which the same joins the sea; thence along the seashore to the point at which the river Dee joins the sea; thence up the river Dee to a point which is distant a hundred yards (measured along the river Dee) above the Bridge of Dee; thence, in a straight line, to the point at which the march between the parishes of Old Machar and Banchory-Devenick crosses the old Deeside road; thence northward along the march between the parishes of Old Machar and Banchory-Devenick, and Old Machar and Newhills, to the point first described.—The Parliamentary Burgh has been divided for convenience of polling, into the following five Wards or Districts:—

FIRST WARD OR DISTRICT.—Comprehending East and St. Clement's Parishes.—Polling-place, at or near Weigh-house Square.

SECOND WARD OR DISTRICT.—Comprehending North and Greyfriars Parishes.—Polling-place, at or near north side of Castle-street.

THIRD WARD OR DISTRICT.—Comprehending west and South Parishes.—Polling-place, at or near the north Gate of Robert Gordon's Hospital.

FOURTH WARD OR DISTRICT.—Comprehending those parts of the Parish of Old Machar which are situated to south of the Denburn, and that part of the Parish of Banchory-Devenick, near the Bridge of Dee, comprehended within the boundary of the Burgh, as fixed by the said Act of Parliament—Polling-place, at or near the crossing of Rose-street and Thistle-street northward from Union-place.

FIFTH WARD OR DISTRICT.—Comprehending those parts of the Parish of Old Machar, which are situated between the Denburn on the south, and the river Don on the north.—Polling-place, at or near the Town-house of Old Aberdeen.

TABLE OF TETTY CUSTOMS.

Victual.

1. For each Chalder of Victual brought into this Burgh and Port thereof, by Sea, Bell Custom, 2½d, and for the Toll Measure thereof, 3½d, in all, 6d (Bear, Barley, Wheat, and Flour being exempted).

2. Each Boll of Malt coming to this Burgh for sale, whether ground at the Town's Mills or not, Bell Custom, 3½d, and for Toll, ½d, in all, 4d.

3. Each Load of Meal or Sids, containing 6 firlots, coming to this Burgh to be sold, Custom, 2½d, Housemaill, 1d, and for Weights, 1½d, in all, 6d; the peck of Sids being reckoned at the weight of 12 lbs, and larger quantities in proportion. (All to be paid at the Customers' Stations.)

4. All Meal, being Lairds' Farms, brought to Town and lodged in Cellars for sale, as follow:—By residing Burgesses, 8d the Chalder; by non-residing Burgesses, 1s the Chalder; and by all other persons, 1s 4d the Chalder. And for Farmers' Bolls, brought into Town and lodged for sale, 3d the Boll by persons of all descriptions.

5. Oats, Pease, Beans, and all other raw or unmanufactured Grain (excepting Bear, Wheat, and Rye), each Boll, 2½d; each cwt. of Split Pease and Hulled Barley, 2d.

Bark.

6. Each Boll of Bark, by Land or Fresh Water Carriage, 2½d; and all Bark coming by Sea, for each Chalder, 5½d.

Fruit.

7. Each Peck of Apples or Pears, coming by Land or Fresh Water Carriage, $\frac{3}{4}$ d.

8. Each Peck of Berries or Bush Fruit, of every kind, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

Muscles and Cockles.

9. Each Peck of Cockles or Muscles, $\frac{1}{4}$ d.

Fleshes and Skins.

10. For each Carcass of Beef, Toll Custom, $\frac{1}{2}$ d, Bell Custom, 1d, in all, $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.

11. Each Calf or Swine, 1d.

12. Each Sheep, Goat, or Lamb, $\frac{1}{2}$ d—over and above the usual Stand-room or Maill, which is 4d every Market day, payable by un-freemen Fleshers.

13. Each dozen of Sheep Skins, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

14. Each dozen of Lamb Skins, $\frac{1}{4}$ d.

All skins presented to the Market by Butchers, with the Mutton Bones, and also Hog Skins and Shearling, are exempted from Custom.

Fowls, Poultry, and Eggs.

15. Each Goose or Turkey, $\frac{1}{4}$ d.

16. Each dozen of Hens or other Poultry, 1d.

17. Each dozen of Chickens, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

18. Each four dozen of Eggs, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

Timber.

19. Each Horse-back Load of Timber, $\frac{1}{4}$ d.

20. Each Single Cart Load thereof, $1\frac{1}{4}$ d.

21. Each Double Cart Load thereof, 3d.

22. Five Cubic Feet of unmanufactured Timber is reckoned equal to a Horse-back Load, and pays accordingly $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

And all manufactured Timber or made Work is to pay $1\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. of the Value, when brought to Town.

Fish.

23. Each Back Burden of Dry and Salted Fish, $\frac{1}{4}$ d.

24. Each Horse-back Load thereof, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

25. Each Single Cart Load thereof, $1\frac{1}{4}$ d.

26. Each Double Cart Load thereof, 3d.

Butter and Cheese.

27. Each Stone of Butter, } besides Weighing Dues, { 1d.

Wool and Cloth.

29. Each Stone of Wool, besides Weighing Dues, $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.

31. Each 20 Ells of Green or Bleached Harden, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

Pigs, or Earthen Ware.

32. Each Horse-back Load thereof, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

33. Each Single Horse Cart Load thereof, $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.

34. Each Double Horse Cart Load thereof, 3d.

Besides the usual Standmaill or Rent.

Shoes.

35. Each un-free Cordiner or Shoemaker, with Shoes for sale, $\frac{1}{2}$ d, besides Standmaill, which is $1\frac{1}{2}$ d, in all, 2d.

Stands at the Cross.

36. Each Chapman's Stand, every Market day, 1d.

37. Each Huxter, Dealer in Old Clothes, or in Earthen Ware, 1d.

38. Each Auctioneer, every day he Auctions on the Street, 1s.

And all Freemen also pay the same Standmaill, when they are accommodated with Stands by the Town.

REGULATIONS OF THE PUBLIC STILLIARDS.

1. The Weighers must attend regularly every lawful day, at their respective Weighing Stations, and give ready service and dispatch on all occasions.

2. The Weighers must be careful and exact in their weighing, and a writing under their hand shall be held a sufficient evidence of the weight of any article so weighed; which writing they shall be obliged to give when demanded, on payment of the established weighing Dues.

3. The Weighers must be answerable for any neglect or mistake committed by them in the execution of their duty.

4. The Proprietor of any article which has been once weighed, suspecting a mistake in the weighing, shall be entitled to have the same reweighed, at the same, or any other of the Public Stilliards, on payment of half Dues; and if it shall be found that any error has been committed, the Weigher guilty thereof shall forfeit Ten Shillings sterling, to be disposed of as the Magistrates think proper.

5. Each Load of Hay, not exceeding Fifty Stone, exclusive of the carriage, shall pay, of Weighing Dues, 3d; above Fifty Stone, 4d; each Load of Merchandize, not exceeding Twelve cwt., exclusive of the carriage, 4d; above Twelve and not exceeding Twenty cwt., 6d; above Twenty cwt., 8d; Coals, at the rate of 1d per boll.

TABLE OF WEIGH-HOUSE AND PACK-HOUSE DUES.

1. All Pork and Beef sold in bulk by butchers or others, is liable in the payment of 1d sterling per cwt. for Weighing Dues; and to be weighed nowhere but in the public Weigh-house; and strangers or unfreemen to pay 2d per cwt.

2. All Rough Fat and Tallow, Butter and Cheese, brought to the market for sale, is liable in payment to the Tacksman of the Weigh-house of 2d sterling per stone of twenty-eight pounds avoirdupois.

3. Feathers and Downs weighed in the Weigh-house pay 2d sterling per stone of Weigh-house Dues, viz. —the Feathers at the rate of twenty-three pounds weight English per stone; and Downs at sixteen pounds English per stone.

4. Each sack of Meal, not exceeding six firlots, weighed in the Weigh-house, pays 4d sterling per sack.

5. All Coal Vessels are appointed to prove their Coal Metts in the public Weigh-house three times at unloading of each cargo, in order to prevent fraud and to do justice to the buyer and seller; and there is payable for proving each of the said Metts 3d sterling.

6. All Wool brought to the town's market for sale, is liable in payment to the Tacksman of the Weigh-house of Two Shillings and Eight Pennies Scots, for each stone of twenty-eight pounds English.

7. All Stockings, Plaidings, and other Goods, packed in the said Pack-house, are to pay 2d sterling for each barrel bulk belonging to freemen; and unfreemen to pay 4d per barrel for package of such Goods; and which are to be allowed to lie in the Warehouse for Twenty Days after Package, without being chargeable with any additional dues.

8. All Iron belonging to burghers or freemen to be allowed to lie in the Weigh-house, free of any warehouse rent or lyage dues; but is to be liable in payment of 1d sterling per cwt. for Weighing Dues; and unfreemen to pay 2d per cwt. for weighing of their Iron.

9. All Goods whatsoever (not particularly specified in this Table), weighed in the public Weigh-house, belonging to freemen or burghers, pay 1d sterling per cwt. British; and strangers or unfreemen to pay 2d per cwt. on such Goods. And each separate Weighing under a cwt. pays likewise 1d for Weighing Dues by freemen, and unfreemen, 2d.

10. All Goods and Merchandize (not particularly specified in this table), lodged in the Weigh-house or Store-house, to pay at the rate of d. sterling per barrel bulk, for each Night during Thirty Nights; and thereafter to pay ¼d per barrel bulk for each Night.

11. All the inhabitants are prohibited from weighing, or allowing to be weighed, in their houses, or anywhere else, to the prejudice of the public Weigh-house, any Pork, Beef, Rough Fat, Tallow, Butter, Cheese, Wool, or any other article, liable in Weigh-house Dues, under the penalty of 5s sterling for each transgression, to be paid to the Tacksman or Collector of Weigh-house dues. And the Tacksman of the Weigh-house only, but no other person, shall be entitled to receive and lodge in the Weigh-house, for payment of the usual dues, all such Goods and Merchandize as are not claimed by the owners, or where they have not authorized any person in Aberdeen to take charge of them.

12. All Rough Fat, Tallow, Butter, Cheese, and other articles brought to the market for sale, and liable in the payment of Weigh-house dues, having paid the said dues at coming into town, the owner thereof shall be entitled to have the same weighed *gratis*, by the Tacksman of the Weigh-house, providing no less quantity than a stone be weighed at once.

13. The Tacksman or Collector of Weigh-house dues is hereby ordered to have always a Copy of this Table at the Weigh-house for inspection of all concerned; and that the lieges may not be imposed upon, he shall be obliged, under the penalty of 20s. sterling, also to carry about with him a copy thereof, to be produced, if required, to any person from whom he collects.

The composition paid to the town and the fees of admission payable by entrant Burgesses are as under:—Extraneans, £35; Sons of Burgesses, £15; Apprentices and Sons-in-law of Burgesses, £30; Infant Burgesses, on passing the Council when of age, £6; Fees to Clerks and Officers, £1 15s 6d; Stamps for Extraneans, £3 1d; Stamps for Apprentices and Sons-in-law, £1 1d. The entry-moneys are appropriated to various public and charitable funds, under the Council's management. The following is a summary of the privileges of a Burgess of Guild:—

1. He enjoys freedom of trade within burgh in the fullest manner.
2. He pays but three-fourths of the shoredues chargeable to unfreemen.
3. He is exempt from all burgh custom on articles brought into town for his own use.
4. He and his widow and children are entitled to the benefit of the Guildry funds.
5. His children have a preference for admission into Gordon's Hospital, and to certain bursaries at the Grammar School and at Marischal College.
6. Singular successors and heirs of Burgesses (though not Burgesses themselves) entering to the town's fishings and freedom lands, pay only the same entry-money as Burgesses of Guild.

In 1839, there were paid to decayed Burgesses, and the widows and children of Burgesses, £1293; besides which there were paid to persons in decayed and indigent circumstances, chiefly widows and children of Burgesses, £573 5s. from other funds under the administration of the Magistrates and Council.

At what time the Crafts of Aberdeen formed themselves, or were formed, into a joint Society is not known. About 1632, Dr. Guild, afterwards Principal of King's College, whose memory is greatly and justly cherished by the trades as their patron, founded an hospital for poor and needy artificers, in the monastery belonging formerly to the Holy Trinity monks; and by a charter, dated 6th June, 1633, confirmed by Charles I. the 24th of same month, he gave to the crafts, for the use and benefit of the hospital, the monastery, church, and churchyard. By various other donations and bequests, by purchases of ground, and increase in its value, from its vicinity to the town, &c. the hospital funds have been vastly augmented; and last year (1839) £942 15s. 6d. was distributed to 131 annuitants belonging to the different trades, besides sons and daughters.

In 1771, a Widows' Fund was instituted, the stock of which, arising from small payments by entrants, and one bequest of a £1000 lately from Dr. Martin of London, whose father was a member of the bakers' incorporation, now yields a handsome revenue, which is distributed among 150 widows. In 1816, the Supplementary Widows' Fund was instituted by Convener John Leslie. It was opened in 1828, during the founder's lifetime, by whom the funds were distributed to the annuitants till his death in 1837; and the capital now amounts to about £2500.

Besides these, each Corporation possesses funds of its own, devoted to charitable and other purposes. These funds and the other affairs of the trade are managed by their own office-bearers, consisting of a Deacon and a Boxmaster, elected annually by the respective trades; and in general the funds are ample, the property belonging to them, and lying in the vicinity of the town, being annually increasing in value.

POLICE ESTABLISHMENT.

By the Act 10th, Geo. IV. (1829), "for better paving, cleansing, lighting, watching, and improving the streets, lanes, and other public places and passages within the city of Aberdeen, and certain grounds adjacent; for regulating the police thereof, and for supplying the inhabitants with water," the city and suburbs are divided into nine Wards, each of which returns two Commissioners, who, with four *ex officio* commissioners, are intrusted with the power of carrying the Act into effect. The qualification of electors is the occupation of premises, within the respective Wards, assessed under the Act, and valued at not less than £5 of yearly rent; and the

Commissioners are chosen from electors occupying premises in the Ward, assessed under the Act, of the yearly value of not less than £15, and being likewise resident in the Ward. The election takes place on the second Thursday of October biennially. The next election is in 1841.

HARBOUR.

The present Harbour Act is 10th Geo. IV. c. 24, and was passed 14th May, 1829. It takes the exclusive management out of the hands of the corporation, adding five Burgesses of Guild and one member of the Incorporated Trades, elected biennially by ballot, and limits the period of completing the work to twelve years after its passing.

Trustees' Qualifications.—1. *Burgesses of Guild* who stand rated in the Tax-roll of the city, upon trade or business, to the extent of £3000 annually, or are owners of 150 tons of shipping belonging to the port. 2. *Members of the Incorporated Trades* who stand rated in said Tax-roll, upon trade or business, to the extent of £1500, or are owners of 75 tons of shipping belonging to the port.

Electors' Qualifications.—1. *Burgesses of Guild* who stand rated in the Tax-roll of the city to the extent of £500, or are owners of 30 tons of shipping belonging to the port. 2. *Members of the Incorporated Trades* who stand rated in said Tax-roll to the extent of £400, or are owners of 25 tons of shipping belonging to the port.

Copartnerships.—The same rules apply to companies carrying on business either as Burgesses of Guild or members of the Incorporated Trades, one partner in every such company being qualified as a Trustee or an Elector, as the case may be, for every sum sufficient to confer the qualification on an individual, for which the company may stand rated in the Tax-roll.

DESCRIPTION OF THE QUOAD-SACRA PARISHES
IN ABERDEEN AND OLD MACHAR.

By an Act of Assembly, 1834, Presbyteries are empowered to assign districts from existing parishes to Chapels of Ease within their bounds, and to erect new districts into parishes *quoad sacra*, their ministers being, at the same time, elevated to the rank of parochial clergy. These divisions, however, not being recognized by the Court of Teinds, the boundaries of the *quoad sacra* parishes are necessarily not commensurate with those of the *quoad civilia* parishes. The following are the boundaries of the former :—

EAST PARISH.—To consist of the district comprehended within the following line, with the exception of the stance or area whereon the West Church stands, and the West Church itself, viz. :—Beginning at the centre of Union Street, opposite the Back Wynd, keeping along the Back Wynd to Schoolhill; along the Schoolhill to George Street; along George Street to John Street; along John Street and Innes Street eastward to Gallowgate; along Gallowgate and Broad Street southward to Long-Acre; along Long Acre to West North Street; along West North Street, Queen Street, and Lodge Walk southward to Castle Street; and along Castle Street and Union Street to the point of commencement, opposite the Back Wynd.

WEST PARISH.—To consist of that portion of the *quoad civilia* West Parish comprehended within the following line, viz. :—Beginning at the centre of George Street, opposite the Schoolhill, along Schoolhill westward to Harriot Street; along Harriot Street, Gordon's Hospital Garden Wall, Charlotte Street, and in a straight line, northward to the boundary of the Parish of Old Machar; along said boundary eastward to George Street, and along George

Street southward to the point of commencement, opposite the Schoolhill, which West Parish shall also comprehend the stance or area whereon the Church called West Church stands, and the Church itself, though not locally situated within the line before described.

NORTH PARISH—To comprehend the district within the following line, viz. :—Beginning at the north boundary thereof, at or near Love Lane; along King Street to Queen Street; along Queen Street to Lodge Walk; along Lodge Walk to Castle Street; along Castle Street to Justice Street; along Justice Street to Park Lane; along Park Lane to the Road leading to the Canal Bridge; along said Road to the Canal; along the West Bank of the Canal to Albion Street; from Albion Street, crossing the Links in a direct line, due east to the Sea-beach; and along the Sea-beach northward to the line of march between Old Machar and St. Nicholas parishes; and along that march westward to the point of commencement in King Street aforesaid.

SOUTH PARISH—To comprehend the district within the following line, with the exception of the stances or areas of the Gaelic Church and Session-house, and the Gaelic Church and Session-house themselves, viz. :—Beginning at the north end of Spa Street; along the said Street to Well of Spa; thence along the course of the Well of Spa Burn and the Denburn to the Bowbridge; from the Bowbridge along the Green to Putachieside; from Putachieside Bridge along Union Street to the Back Wynd; along Back Wynd to Harriot Street; along Harriot Street to the middle of Loch Street; along Loch Street, by the Wall of Gordon's Hospital, to the middle of St. Andrew Street; across St. Andrew Street to Charlotte Street; along Charlotte Street to John Street; across John Street, and thence, in a straight line northward, to the boundary of the Parish of Old Machar; and along this boundary westward to the point of commencement at Spa Street.

GREYFRIARS PARISH—To comprehend the district within the following line, viz. :—Beginning in King Street, opposite a proposed line through Roy's Nursery Grounds; along said road to West North Street; thence, in a straight line, to Porthill; from Porthill to the Gallowgate; along Gallowgate and Broad Street to Long-Acre; along Long-Acre to West North Street; thence, along West North Street and King Street, to the point of commencement.

ST. CLEMENT'S PARISH—To comprehend that portion of the *quoad civilia* parish of St. Clement's within the following line, viz. :—Beginning at the Sea-beach at a point due east from the east end of Bowl Road or Albion Street, keeping across the Links in a straight line due westward to Albion Street; along Albion Street to the Canal Bridge; along the Canal westward to the Bridge at the south end of Fish Street; from said Bridge along Summer Lane westward to Commerce Street; along Commerce Street to the Quay; along the Flood-mark west and southward to the Denburn, and then along the march between the parishes of Old Machar and St. Nicholas to the extremity of the parish of St. Nicholas, on the north bank of the river Dee, and then crossing that river and holding eastward along the boundary with the parish of Nigg to the mouth of the said river; and after crossing it, holding northward, along the Sea-beach, to the point of commencement, opposite Albion Street.

TRINITY PARISH—To comprehend that part of the *quoad civilia* South Parish within the following line, viz. :—Beginning at the centre of Union Street, opposite Putachieside Bridge, along Union Street eastward to Shiprow; along Shiprow to Shorebrae; along Shorebrae to the Quay; along the Quay westward to the Denburn; along said burn to Bowbridge; and from said bridge, by the Green, to Putachieside Bridge, to the point of commencement.

UNION PARISH—To comprehend the district within the following line, viz. :—Beginning at the Quay, opposite to Shorebrae; along

the Quay to Commerce Street; along Commerce Street, Park Lane, Park Street, and Justice Street, to Castle Street; along Castle Street to Shiprow; and along Shiprow and Shorebrae to the Quay, at the point of commencement.

SPRING-GARDEN PARISH—To comprehend that part of the *quoad civilia* West Parish within the following line, viz. :—Beginning at the centre of George Street, opposite to Gerard Street; along George Street southward to John Street; along John Street and Innes Street eastward to Gallowgate; along Gallowgate northward to Gerard Street; and along Gerard Street westward to George Street, the point of commencement; which Spring-garden Parish shall also comprehend the stances or areas whereon the Church and Session-house called the Gaelic Church and Session-house stand, and also the Gaelic Church and Session-house themselves, though not locally situated within the line described.

PARISH OF GILCOMSTON—To consist of the district comprehended within the following line, viz. :—Beginning at the centre of Alford Place, opposite to the new road from Alford Place to Westfield; along that road to the channel of the burn on the south side of the road from Westfield; along the channel of the burn eastward to the march between the parish of Old Machar and the parish of St. Nicholas; along that march to the bridge over the Denburn, at the east end of Skene Street; along Skene Street to Skene Terrace; along Skene Terrace to Silver Street; along Silver Street, through the centre of Golden Square, to Union Street; along Union Street, Union Place, and Alford Place to the point of commencement, opposite the new road from Alford Place to Westfield.

BON-ACCORD PARISH—To consist of the district comprehended within the following line, viz. :—Beginning at the bridge over the Denburn, at the east end of Skene Street; along Skene Street to Skene Terrace; along Skene Terrace to Silver Street; along Silver Street and through the centre of Golden Square to Union Street; along Union Street to Bon-Accord Street; along Bon-Accord Street, and from the termination thereof, in a straight line, to the Ferryhill Burn; along that burn southward to Dee Village; along the road which bounds that village, on the west and south, to the nearest point of the river Dee; along the brink of the river eastward to the Denburn; and thence along the Denburn to the bridge at the end of Skene Street, the point of commencement.

WOODSINE PARISH—To consist of the district comprehended within the following line, viz. :—Beginning at Kittybrewster Toll; thence along the roads which separate Ashgrove and Cornhill from Hilton and Cairnery to the Woodhill Road; along the Woodhill Road northward and westward to the boundary of the parish of Newhills; along that boundary northward to the river Don; along the river Don eastward to a point due north from the Boat-house; along the said line southward to the Boat-house on the Canal; and along the Canal bank to Kittybrewster Toll, the point of commencement.

JOHN KNOX'S PARISH—To comprehend the district within the following line, viz. :—To commence in Gallowgate, opposite Gerard Street; along Gerard Street to George Street; along George Street northward to the boundary between the *quoad civilia* parishes of Greyfriars and Old Machar; along said boundary eastward by Love Lane to King Street; along King Street to a point opposite a proposed road through Roy's Nursery Grounds; along said proposed road to West North Street; thence, in a straight line, to Porthill; from Porthill to Gallowgate; and thence to the point of commencement, opposite Gerard Street.

HOLBURN PARISH—To consist of the district comprehended within the following line, viz. :—Beginning at Union Street, opposite Bon-Accord Street; along Union Street, Union Place, and Alford Place, southward and westward to the New Street leading towards Westfield; along said street to the bridge across Gilcomston burn; thence, across said burn, westward to the march between

the parishes of Old Machar and Newhills; southward along said march and that between Old Machar; Banchory-Devenick to the bridge of Dee; thence eastward, along the bank of the river, to the road on the south and west of Dee Village; along said road to the Bridge; thence, in a straight line, to the foot of Bon-Accord Street; and along said street to the point of commencement in Union Street.

SECTION III.—LEGAL DEPARTMENT.

— COURTS OF LAW.

CIRCUIT COURT OF JUSTICIARY.

The Circuit Court of Justiciary, for the counties of Aberdeen, Banff, and Kincardine, meets at Aberdeen twice a-year, in the months of April and September, for the trial of criminal cases, by one or two of the Lords. Appeals, in certain civil cases, from the inferior courts, are also heard by this court.

SHERIFF COURT.

The Sheriff is Judge-Ordinary of his Sheriffdom or Shire, and, accordingly, judges at present in all actions and causes not specially, by law or usage, appropriated to other courts. Thus, all personal causes, actions of debt, of whatever amount, possessory actions, claims for aliment by paupers, and such like, belong to his court. Processes of cessio and admiralty causes are, by late Acts, made competent in this court.

The Sheriff's criminal jurisdiction formerly embraced even capital punishments, but it is now much limited. He holds a criminal court at least twice a-year, in April and September.

The Sheriff also exercises certain ministerial duties. He receives the royal revenues—returns the assize or jury to the Justiciary Court—presides at the election, and returns to Chancery the names of the persons elected to serve in parliament for the city and county—strikes the fiars of all grain, &c. within the county, &c.

The Court-days are Wednesdays and Fridays, at Ten o'clock, A.M., during the sessions, which extend from the first Court day (Wednesday or Friday) after 15th May, to the last Court day in July, and from the first after 15th October, to 4th April inclusive.

COMMISSARY COURT.

The Commissary Court came in place of the Bishop's or Consistorial Court, which formerly exercised extensive jurisdiction. It claimed jurisdiction in all ecclesiastical matters, which its judges extended very widely. Thus, actions of divorce, adultery, bastardy, tithes, patronage, scandal, breach of vows, confirming the testament of persons deceased, &c. came to be appropriated to this Court. By 4 Geo. IV. c. 97, the Sheriff is appointed Commissary, and the Commissariat and the Sheriffdom are made co-extensive. Actions of declarator of marriage, divorce, &c. are transferred to the Court of Session, and the chief business of the Commissariat is now to confirm testaments, &c.

SHERIFF SMALL-DEBT AND CIRCUIT COURT.

The Small-debt Court was formerly stationary like the Ordinary Court, but by the Act of Parliament 1 Victoria, cap. 41, Circuit Courts, for the trial of Small-debt cases (actions for sums under £8 6s. 8d.), are established in addition to the ordinary Small-debt Court; and the Sheriff is ordained to divide the county into districts, and hold a certain number of Courts in each annually.

Appeals against the Sheriff's judgments in these Courts are not competent, unless on the ground of corruption, malice, or oppression on the part of the Judge; and the decrees may be immediately put in execution by arrestment or pouding; imprisonment for small debts, being abolished. Written proceedings, or the assistance of professional men, are not allowed, unless with leave of the Court.

The Ordinary Small-debt Court at Aberdeen is held on Thursday, at Ten o'clock, A.M., *weekly*, during sessions of the Court, and once or twice during vacation.—George Leslie, *Clerk*.

The Circuit Small-debt Courts are held at Tarland, Inverury, Huntly, Turriff, and Old Deer, once every three months; and at Peterhead once every two months.

It is optional to creditors to cite their debtors either to the district court of their domicile, or to the head court at Aberdeen.

BURGH OR BAILLIE COURT.

The jurisdiction of the Magistrates (Provost and Baillies, though it is a Baillie that usually sits in Court) is equal to that of the Sheriff, within their territory—the royalty of the Burgh—but it is not *exclusive* of the Sheriff's authority, except, perhaps, in questions strictly belonging to the police of the burgh, which more properly pertain to the Magistrates.

JUSTICE OF PEACE COURT.

The office of Justice of the Peace was introduced into Scotland in 1609. As signified by their name, the Justices judge in riots and breaches of the peace—they enforce the laws against beggars and vagrants—the game laws—and, with the Commissioners of Supply, they regulate the highways, bridges, and ferries. The execution of various penal statutes, revenues, laws, and others, is also committed to them. The quarter sessions are held on the first Tuesday of the months of March, May, August, and last Tuesday of October. Special sessions are occasionally held.

POLICE COURT.

This is a Criminal Court, constituted under the Aberdeen Police Act (14th May, 1829), for the trial of offences against the Act, breaches of the peace, theft under the value of £10, reset, fraud, &c. &c. It sits daily in the Old or Baillie Court-house, at Eleven o'clock, A.M.

SOCIETY OF ADVOCATES.

The members of this Society are the practitioners before the Sheriff, Commissary, and City Courts of Aberdeen. It is probable the practitioners formed a distinct body from the very establishment of the Courts, but it is not till 1693 that we find authentic mention made of their admission as procurators by the judge. On 2d October of that year, the Sheriff called before him sixteen individuals, "the ordinar advocats and procurators of this judicatorie," and "understanding of their abilities, honestie, and judgment," admitted them procurators before his court, and discharged every person not duly admitted by him from practising therein. In 1685, at the instigation of Lord Whitehill, then Commissary Scougal, they formed themselves into a Society for affording pecuniary relief to decayed members, widows, &c., and enacted rules and regulations for their government which were sanctioned by the Sheriff. In 1774, a royal charter was obtained, incorporating the Society, and confirming the former rights and privileges of the members. In 1799, they procured to themselves a more extensive charter, under the title of *The President and Society of Advocates in Aberdeen*. They alone, of the procurators before the inferior courts in Scotland, are styled "Advocate," a designation given them from time immemorial—by what authority is not known. The Society flourishes. It possesses a moderately good library; and a large building, containing a hall, committee rooms, and every other accommodation, was built in 1837. The present entry-money is £120, with £5 5s. to the library. The number of members is one hundred and thirty-six, of which twenty-five do not reside in Aberdeen.

Money Orders, for transmitting small sums by post, under £5, granted and paid from 7, A.M. to 1, P.M., and from 3 to 8, P.M.

And so on, adding twopence for every ounce up to sixteen ounces, beyond which no packet, subject to postage, can be received.

NEW POSTAGE RATES.

On and after 10th January next, the single rate of Inland Postage on all letters, except those between the United Kingdom and the Colonies and foreign countries, will be the uniform single rate of One Penny.

The scale of weight at present in force for general post letters, will be applicable in future to local penny post letters, and those passing through the local posts of Dublin and London; the regulation, therefore, which restricts the weight of these letters to four

ounces is abolished, and they will be subject, in future, to the same rules and the same charges as general post letters. The postage, however, on all letters (whether local or general post letters) between places in the United Kingdom, must be paid in advance; should the postage not be paid in advance, they will be charged with double the rate to which they would otherwise be subject. Parliamentary proceedings are an exception to this regulation.

The uniform single rate on all letters conveyed by packet between the United Kingdom and the British Colonies and Possessions, will be One Shilling, with the exception of letters between the United Kingdom and Malta, the Ionian Islands and India, when passing through France, the rates on which remain unchanged. Letters, therefore, intended to pass at the reduced single rate of a Shilling between these three last mentioned places and the United Kingdom should be addressed *via* FALMOUTH.

Foreign letters, when transmitted by packet, will be liable to the single rates of packet postage from Falmouth, Dover, and London, as given in the table below, if posted or delivered at the port. If posted or delivered at any other place, in the United Kingdom, they will be subject to the additional rate of Twopence as Inland Postage.

Letters, however, between France and the United Kingdom, and also those in transit through France, will be an exception to this rule; the British charge on such letters will be the uniform single rate now taken from London, except in those cases where the letters are at present subject to a less charge than the sum specified. This last provision also applies to letters between the United Kingdom and Belgium, the rates on which, where lower than the sum specified, will not be increased.

Letters also between the United Kingdom and the United States of America, and between the United Kingdom and Spain *via* FALMOUTH, form a further exception to this rule. No Inland Postage, therefore, will be taken on letters between the United Kingdom and France, and those in transit through France, or upon those between the United Kingdom and the United States of America, or upon those between the United Kingdom and Spain *via* FALMOUTH.

The single rate on all foreign and colonial letters, except in those cases where a lower rate is now taken, when conveyed by packet, will, accordingly, be as follows:—

The single uniform rate on letters between the United Kingdom and places beyond sea when conveyed by *private ship* will be 8d. in whatever part of the United Kingdom they may be posted or delivered. This rate must be taken on letters between the United Kingdom and the East Indies, &c. &c. when conveyed by private ship, the distinction between these and other classes of ship letters having been abolished.

It is clearly to be understood that the single rate of postage given in the above instructions are applicable only to letters not exceeding *half an ounce* in weight. The charge for postage on letters exceeding half an ounce will advance in proportion to their weight, in accordance with the scale of weight and number of rates at present in operation, as laid down in the instructions of the 21st November last. It must, however, be borne in mind that this scale does not apply to *French rates* on letters to and from France and through France, as the present system of charging *French rates* on such letters must continue in force, viz. a single French rate for each quarter of an ounce exclusive.

No person will be permitted hereafter to send or receive letters free of Postage. Members, however, of either House of Parliament will be entitled to receive, free of charge, petitions, addressed to either House of Parliament, provided they are sent without covers, or in covers open at the sides, and do not exceed the weight of six ounces. Addresses to her Majesty will likewise go free.

Printed votes and proceedings in Parliament will be charged at the following rate between places in the United Kingdom and between the United Kingdom and the Colonies, when conveyed by Packet, but not through France nor to the East Indies:—

- For any weight not exceeding two ounces, 1d.
 - For any weight exceeding two ounces and not exceeding four ounces, 2d.
 - For any weight exceeding four ounces and not exceeding six ounces, 3d.
- and so on in proportion. No additional charge will be made upon them if the postage is not paid in advance.

* These rates do not apply to Letters intended to be paid to particular place of destination, which must be charged with the uniform British rate of 10d. in addition to the postage from Calais, stated in the printed lists with which the Postmaster is furnished, except in those cases where the present charge is less.

The rates on newspapers and letters of soldiers and sailors will remain unaltered, with the exception, however, that the privilege now given to soldiers' and sailors' letters will be restricted to the cases in which they shall not exceed half an ounce in weight.

Letters and packets exceeding sixteen ounces in weight, with the exception of those classes mentioned below, cannot be forwarded to their destination, but must be sent to the Dead Letter Office, according to the present regulations.

The following are the exceptions to this rule:—Parliamentary petitions, and addresses to her Majesty. Parliamentary proceedings. Letters and packets addressed to, or received from, places beyond sea. Letters and packets to and from public departments, and to and from public officers now franking by virtue of their office. Deeds, if transmitted under such regulations as the Postmaster-General may consider necessary.

SECT V.—COMMERCIAL ESTABLISHMENTS.

BANKS.

A Bank was first established at Aberdeen, about the year 1752, on a small scale, in an office on the south side of Castle Street. This establishment, however, did not thrive, and it was soon given up; but, not long after, the Thistle Bank of Glasgow opened an agency here, and its notes speedily got so wide a circulation, that specie was almost banished the place. In the course of 1766, a number of the gentlemen of the town and county formed themselves into a copartnery, for the purpose of establishing a native Banking Company, under the title of "The Banking Company in Aberdeen," and a capital stock of £72,000 was subscribed for, in shares of £500. On the 1st January, 1767, the Bank was opened for business. This Company is still in existence, and is one of the most flourishing and stable companies in Scotland. Its original paid up capital of £150 per share now sells for upwards of £3000. Two other native Banks (*viz.* the Town and County and the North of Scotland, both flourishing establishments), and four branches of Edinburgh Banks, now divide the business of the city with the Aberdeen Bank.

BILLETING OF SOLDIERS.

William Mackie, Queen Street, *Billet-master*.

Previous to 1837, the billeting of soldiers was extended to only six classes of the inhabitants, viz. bakers, brewers, butchers, gardeners, mealsellers, and spirit-dealers; but the Council, after corresponding with the public authorities in Edinburgh, Glasgow, and Dundee, and other towns, procuring various returns from the billet-masters, and examining the Acts of Parliament and the decisions of the supreme courts upon the subject, extended the billeting, by Act of Council, of date 27th March, 1837, over the whole inhabitants generally within the city, freedom, and liberties, who are rated in the Police books at £5 and upwards, with the exception of ministers, professors, schoolmasters, widows, and unmarried ladies not in business on their own account, and paupers; and the billeting in this city and suburbs proceeds in terms of the said Act of Council. The billeting is levied in the order of the Wards, and the whole city must be gone over in this way before those billeted on in the First Ward have to pay a second time. It frequently happens, however, that the same person may be billeted on twice before the whole of the Wards are exhausted, for there does not appear to be any provision made for exempting a person who has paid a billet in the First Ward in May, from paying another should he remove to the Second Ward in June.

A P P E N D I X.

NEW BUILDINGS IN PROGRESS.

OUR Plan contains several public buildings now in course of being erected. These we shall briefly notice here—

I.—MARISCHIAL COLLEGE.

The foundation-stone of these buildings was laid on the 18th of October, 1837, by his Grace the Duke of Richmond, Chancellor of the University. The contract price was £25,000, and the contractor, Mr. Al. Rainnie, must finish the buildings by the close of the year 1841. They are now far advanced ; and in our next we hope to be able to announce their completion, and perhaps give a view of the front elevation.

II.—PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

These are to be built on a property fronting Little Belmont street, at an estimated expense of about £2000. The want of suitable accommodation for the city schools has long been a subject of regret. The late Provost Blaikie, who was exceedingly anxious to promote the educational interests of the city, devoted much of his time and attention to the consideration of the best means of obtaining sufficient accommodation for the city schools ; and his brother, our present Provost, has given abundant reason to believe that he is actuated by the same laudable spirit ; for to his exertions chiefly are we indebted for the buildings now in progress. Connected with this subject, we have also the pleasure of recording the establishment of the West-end Academy, an institution suggested, we believe, by Mr. D. Stuart, Postmaster. This is after the model of the Circus-place School, Edinburgh, and is the property of a number of gentlemen, who hold shares to a limited extent. Altogether, the city of Aberdeen now promises to be highly privileged in respect of its educational institutions.

III.—NORTH OF SCOTLAND BANK.

This building is on the corner of King street, and unquestionably will be at once the most elegant and chaste structure which the city can boast of. It is after a plan by Mr. Simpson, and adds another to the many proofs he has already given, of his pure and refined taste in architectural design.

IV.—THE NEW MARKETS.

These are the property of a Joint-stock company—(*See adv.*)—originated by Messrs. Adam & Anderson, Advocates. We have thesea-

tisfaction of laying the ground-plan of this establishment before our readers, and also a view of the interior of the markets, from the level of the main street from Union street. The new street is to be carried down, as laid out in the plan, from Union street, over arches. The gradients in Marischal street being 1 in $12\frac{1}{2}$, render that street dangerous for general use ; the gradients in Commerce street are 1 in 16, which is a vast improvement on the other ; but the gradients on the new street being only 1 in 18, gives it a decided advantage in point of level over both ; and, situated as it is in the centre of the town, it cannot fail to become at once the great thoroughfare for all the traffic from the shore. Besides, being immediately on a line with St. Nicholas street and George street—the great north road—it opens up an access to trade from that district which has long been wanting. The length of the street is 573 feet, the breadth, 50 feet, inclusive of the pavements ; and the access to the pavements being through corridors on either side, no inconvenience will be felt by foot passengers. The Post-office is to be erected on a space between the south-east corner of the Royal Hotel and the road leading from the new street to the Adelphi, a site which will afford every facility to the public. The ground plan of the markets gives a very clear idea of their extent and accommodation. The extreme length of the market hall is 315 feet, the breadth 106 feet, thus affording ample accommodation for a large number of shops and stalls. It is divided into three alleys by colonnades, the roof being 45 feet in height. We regret that time did not permit our giving a perspective view of the new street, with the front elevation of the markets. The view given of the markets shows at once their extent and accommodation. The galleries, it will be seen, are on the principle of an arcade, and will form a tempting promenade for those of our citizens making purchases of “the good things of this life,” for which our city has been so long famed. It were superfluous to say a word on the advantages of these markets to a city like Aberdeen. Scattered as our markets are at present, it requires almost the labour of a day to go through them ; and few can afford the time and trouble necessary to make their purchases in anything like a satisfactory manner. By the new markets this great inconvenience will be fully remedied. The area of the whole is equal to one and a-half acres, which will afford accommodation for the largest public meeting that can well assemble. We cannot dismiss the subject without one word on the general question, viewed as another proof of the rapid improvement of the city. In a late number of *Chambers' Edinburgh Journal*, the improvements introduced into Newcastle by the erection of the new markets there by that public-spirited man, Richard Grainger, are thus noticed—“The public market consists of a quadrangular area of upwards of two acres, all under one roof, and surrounded by the houses of four new streets. It has entrance from the different sides, and, on visiting it, we perceive that it consists of four principal arcades, crossed at right angles by four equally spacious avenues, the whole lined with open shops or booths, and well lighted from the roof ; the length of the avenues is 338 feet. The entire length and breadth has a remarkably clean and neat appearance, expressive of a correct taste. In the long and broad

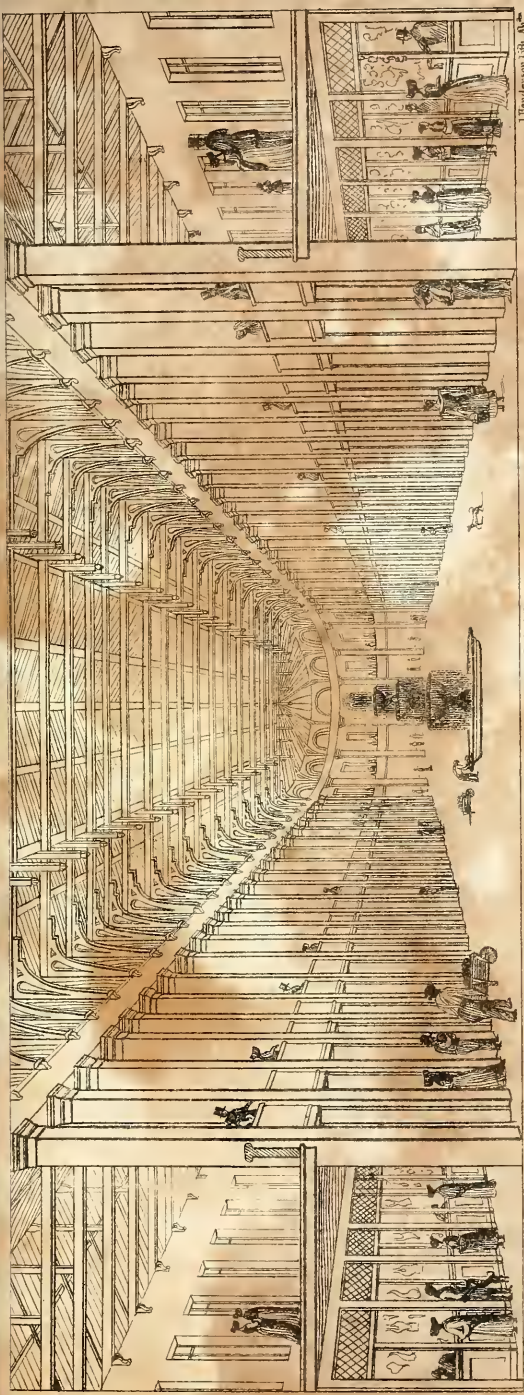

hall, or spacious arcade devoted to the sale of vegetables, butter &c., there are placed, opposite cross avenues, two handsome stone fountains or *jets d'eau*, with basins capable of holding three thousand gallons each. And in the new line of street there is a Corn Market and Central Exchange. "The main entrance to the Exchange (continues the same narrator) is undistinguishable in the line of houses, and it is only on going through a lobby that the grandeur of the place is apparent. The interior is a semicircular area, measuring 150 by 95 feet, with a corresponding height, and powerfully lighted by a great number of windows in the roof, supported on flying buttresses. We enter by the flat side of the semicircle, and are immediately struck with the great extent of floor of tassellated pavement—the lofty pilastered walls—the vast roof, with its numerous beams, pointed and ornamented—and, above all, by the bold design of a simicircular colonnade of fourteen pillars, painted to resemble yellow-veined marble. This colonnade is a main support to the roof, and encloses a space slightly raised and carpeted on the flat side of the structure, and laid out as a news-room, with handsome tables and chairs. Thus, there is an open walk, of great breadth, on the paved floor of the house, round the convex side of the colonnade. Opposite the colonnade, a double stair conveys the visiter to an elegantly fitted up tavern or coffee-room, to which there are other entrances from the adjoining streets. Altogether, this Central Exchange is an exceedingly grand structure, more like what one might expect to form a magnificent temple than a place for merchants congregating, and therefore strongly characteristic of that principle of advancement in society which connects elegance and refinement in architecture with other purposes besides the public offices of religion." And so it may be said prospectively with regard to the new markets of the city of Aberdeen—the locality on which they are building was anything but useful or ornamental to the city; and we hope the success which has attended this speculation will induce the spirited projectors to strike out some farther improvements of a like important character.

VIEW OF THE PRINCIPLES.

INSTITUTIONS FOR LIFE ASSURANCE are either PROPRIETARY or MUTUAL ASSURANCE. In PROPRIETARY COMPANIES, either the whole or a large proportion of the profits are taken by the Shareholders, in return for the alleged guarantee for a Capital, often merely nominal, but, at all events, unnecessary. Public opinion has declared strongly in favour of the other class. In a recent number of their Journal, Messrs. Chambers state:—"It has been found that, by the plan of Mutual Assurance, all desirable security is afforded, while the profits are divisible among the only parties who have any right to them—the Assurers. Mutual Assurance Soci-

ties are, therefore, rapidly supplanting Assurance Companies, most of which will probably, in a few years, cease to exist."

In MUTUAL ASSURANCE SOCIETIES, the whole Profits belong to the Members. But hitherto all of them have adopted a rate of Premium confessedly much higher than was necessary, or than was charged by Proprietary Companies, although it is evident that *lower* Premiums will suffice, no provision having to be made out of them for dividend on a capital.

Until the establishment of this Institution, an assurer was thus compelled either to forego altogether the prospect of gain from the profits of his assurance, or to pay a Premium confessedly exorbitant, and disproportionate to the risk.

To remedy these defects, and to afford to the Public all the benefit derivable from increased information and experience, the SCOTTISH PROVIDENT INSTITUTION was founded. It cannot for a moment be questioned that, instead of 'profit,' the Assurance Office must sustain a loss by every insurer who dies before the amount paid by him in premiums, with the accumulated interest, shall be equivalent to the amount of his policy; yet, in most of these offices, the representatives share in the *profits*, should the insured die immediately after seven payments. The equitable rule would be to assign the *bonus* to such only as had survived the expectation of life, according to the generally received law of mortality, or who had paid in premiums, with interest upon them, a sum equal to that for which the life was insured." It is manifest that the surplus, being divided among a comparatively small number, will thus afford a large bonus for those to whom it is so appropriated.

By the practice of other offices, the representatives of a person assured for £1000, and dying in his sixth year, will carry off not only the sum contracted for in his policy, but a further sum, in name of *profit* on his assurance; while the premiums which he has lived to pay will not amount to one-fourth of his original assurance; and, therefore, the common fund has already been loser by him to the extent of more than £750. These further additions are, consequently, just so much taken from what should, in equity, belong to the remaining members. In this office, the surplus is reserved and accumulated for the survivors—an arrangement at once safer, and more advantageous for good lives, than the mode usually adopted.

From the preceding brief statement of the leading principles of the Institution, it must be obvious that its Constitution affords to the Members every advantage of which Life Assurance is capable. By the *first* of these, namely, the diminution of the Premiums, the *greatest present benefit* is secured to all; while, by the *second*, the peculiar mode of division of the profits, those who survive the average duration of life, will derive the *greatest future contingent* advantages, a combination presented by no other office than the Scottish Provident.

LIFE DEPARTMENT.

TWO Forms of Constitution have, in general, been adopted in the formation of Life Assurance Companies. By the one, a Capital is subscribed by a body of Shareholders, who bear all the risk of loss that may arise, and divide all the profits. By the other, business is commenced without a Capital; the assurers mutually assuring one another, and bearing all the losses, or dividing all the profits which may arise in the progress of the undertaking. The objection made to the former class of companies is, that the assured do not participate in the profits, however large they may become. The objection to the latter class is that, as no subscribed and permanent capital exists; and as SECURITY is obviously the first object with the Public, in a contract which may remain in force for half a century, the safety of the assured is not sufficiently provided for.

The Constitution of this Company has been framed so as to neutralize both these objections. While the large Capital invested secures to the assured the ultimate payment of his Policy, the periodical divisions of the profits impart to his assurance an increased value, continually enlarging with the growing prosperity of the Institution.

This being the Constitution chosen by the Board, as that which affords the most solid and satisfactory basis to the Company, they have directed their anxious attention to the minor arrangements, with the view of affording every possible facility to the public in transacting business with the Office.

In furtherance of this object, they have directed:

- I. That assurances shall be undertaken for one year, seven years, the whole term of life, or any intermediate period that may suit the views of the assured; that the Premium may be received by annual payments, to be made to the termination of the risk—by one single payment at the commencement of the assurance—or, by annual payments to be made for five, ten, fifteen, or twenty years, or any other period, as the assured may determine; the payments in the last case absolutely to cease at the expiration of such period as may be chosen; while the assured shall continue to participate

in the profits, and fully to enjoy all the other advantages presented by the Company, up to the time, however distant, at which the assurance may terminate.

- II. They have directed the profits accruing to the Policy-holders to be declared at the expiration of every successive period of five years; and these are to be applied either to increase the sum assured under the Policy, or to diminish the future Premiums, as shall be most agreeable to the assured. So that the individual opening a Policy with the Company, possesses the assurance either that the sum assured will gradually increase, he continuing to pay the same Premium, or that the Premium which he at first pays will undergo periodical diminutions, while the sum originally assured remains untouched.
- III. Persons whose lives it is proposed to assure may appear any day of the week, except Sunday, at the Company's Office, No. 1, Bartholomew Lane, or at the offices of the various Agents of the Company throughout the country.
- IV. The lives of Naval and Military OFFICERS, not engaged in actual service, are accepted on peculiarly favourable terms, no extra premium being charged. The lives of FEMALES IN A STATE OF PREGNANCY are also excepted at the common premium, an additional premium being imposed only for the first year's assurance. The ordinary cases of GOUT, HERNIA, and several other diseases, may be covered under a small extra charge commensurate with the increased risk. Persons residing ABROAD, in any part of the Continent of Europe, do not lose the benefit of their assurance, provided they proceed thither and return in decked vessels, by any port between the Elbe and Brest. The lives of persons going beyond the limits of Europe are assured under an extra Premium, proportionate to the additional hazard incurred. There is no charge for entrance-money, nor for the Policy, beyond the value of the stamp.

Such is the Constitution of this Company; and the advantages and facilities which it affords to the public must be evident to all who will give the principles on which the Constitution rests a careful examination.

Agencies upon this basis have already been opened in many of the towns in Scotland; negociations are in progress for opening Agencies in others, and, by this means, the Company hope to foster the proper spirit of prudent accumulation, which has in many quarters sustained a fatal check from the disastrous results of the erroneous calculations or imprudent management of Benefit Societies, and does not receive adequate encouragement from the moderate return afforded by Savings Banks.

THE leading features of this Company are PARTICIPATION IN THE PROFITS, and LOWER RATES OF PREMIUM THAN THOSE OF MOST SOCIETIES WHICH DO NOT GIVE PROFITS TO THE ASSURED.

The Subscribed Capital of the Company, while it affords ample security to the Assured, will, by yielding a higher rate of interest than is paid to the Shareholders, contribute to the general profits; whereas, in the case of some of the English Companies, with Capitals unnecessarily large, the Premiums paid by the Assured are materially drawn upon to supply the difference between the interest paid to Shareholders and interest yielded by investments; thus diminishing, instead of increasing the security of the Policy-holder.


