The Columbia Society of Fine Arts, of which he was a member, walked in procession before the hearse, and wore crape round their arms for thirty days. procession before the hearse, and wore crape round their arms for thirty days. His remains were deposited in the cemetery of the Swedish Church, in the district of Southwark, Philadelphia. While in the enjoyment of health, he had, in a conversation with a friend on the subject of death, expressed a wish to be buried in some rural spot, sacred to peace and solitude; whither the charms of nature might invite the steps of the votary of the muses and the lover of science, and where the birds might sing over his grave. It has been matter of regret to those of his friends to whom was confided the mournful duty of ordering his funeral, that this desire had not been made known to them, otherwise it should have been piously observed. A plain marble tomb marks where his dust reposes, on which appears the following inscription:—

This Monument covers the remains of ALEXANDER WILSON, author of the American Ornithology. He was born in Renfrewshire, Scotland, on the 6th July, 1766; emigrated to the United States in the year 1794; and died in Philadelphia, of the dysentery, on the 23d August, 1813, aged 47.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Stamps may be procured at the Post office, or Stamp office, 2 County place; Labels 1d. 2d. and 1s. each, and covers at $1\frac{1}{4}$ d. and $2\frac{1}{4}$ d. each. When the value of stamps on the letter is less than the amount of the postage to which it is liable, the letter will be charged double the amount of such difference on delivery. Stamps may be used for printed votes and proceedings in Parliament, and on Foreign, Colonial, and ship letters, &c. outwards. If any letter, however, addressed to places beyond the sea, bear an insufficient number of stamps, it will be sent to the Dead Letter office, to be returned, in all practicable cases to the writer. Stamps are not permitted to be used on letters arriving in the United Kingdom, from the Colonies or Foreign countries.

These Regulations are applicable to newspapers, in cases where they are liable to postage. If the stamps affixed to letters have been mutilated or defaced, the letter will be liable to the unpaid rate.

The Post office do not convey packages exceeding 16 ounces in weight inland, except in the case of Parliamentary papers, and other privileged documents. The above are the charges on all letters posted and delivered in the United Kingdom, without regard to distance; and there is no difference in the case of letters posted and delivered within the boundaries of the old penny Post offices in towns. The rate of postage is affected by the weight entirely, and not by the number of sheets or inclosures.

The postage is uniform, and applies, in whatever part of the United Kingdom the letter is posted, or to whatever colony it is directed to. In the case of East India letters, this rate applies only to those passing by the Falmouth packets, and thence overland, and not to those passing in the first place through France. There is no limitation to any particular weight.

SHIP LETTERS.

These include letters passing by private ships, between any place in the United Kingdom, and a place beyond seas, foreign or colonial, including Ceylon, the Mauritius, the Cape, and the East Indies. Owners, Consignees, or Charterers, (resident in the United Kingdom) and the Owner, Consignees, and Shippers of goods on board vessels, inward bound, are entitled to receive their letters from sea postage, to the extent of six ounces. A penalty of ten pounds is incurred by parties falsely superscribing a letter as Owner, Shipper, Charterer, or Consignee.

MONEY ORDERS.

The most secure mode of transmitting Bank Notes, Bank Post Bills or Drafts, is to divide each and send the halves by different posts, waiting the acknowledgment of the one half before forwarding the other.

Coin should not be sent by post, and persons having occasion to transmit small sums, will avoid all risk by sending the money through the medium of the Money Order Office, which is carried on by the Post Office on the public account. The charge for such orders will be threepence on sums of Two Pounds and under, and sixpence on sums between Two and Five Pounds. No order will be given for sums beyond this amount. REGULATIONS

Appointed by the Trustees of the River Cart, to be observed relative to the Truffic on the said River, and the use of the Harbours and Quays of the same, and the Navigable Cut or Canal at Inchinnan, 10th October, 1837.

I. On the arrival of any Vessel in the Harbour, the Harbour Master shall immediately ascertain her Name and Tonnage, the

kind and quantity of Goods on board, with the name of the Owner. and enter these particulars in a Book to be kept for the purpose; and he shall assign to each Vessel such station or berth as he may think proper; but no Vessel, except when loading or unloading. shall be allowed to retain an inside berth.

II. No Ballast, Sand, Lime, or Rubbish, shall be allowed to be put into or taken out of any Vessel, except under the superintendence or orders of the Harbour Master, who, if any such articles are to be laid upon the Quay, shall give directions for the place of deposit, which shall be at the distance of Three feet at least from the edge of the Quay; and such articles shall be removed from the Quay, immediately after being laid down by the Owners or others having charge of the same, or at their expense, by the Harbour Master, in case of undue delay. In the removal, canvas shall be used to prevent any of the said articles from falling into the Water.

III. All goods put on board or taken from Vessels at the Quay, shall be laid at the distance of Ten feet from the edge of the Quay, and shall be so laid as not to interfere with the loading or unloading of any other Vessels. All Goods to be removed from the Quay within Forty-eight Hours after being deposited; and if not removed within this period, the Harbour Master shall cause the removal to be made at the expense of the Owners.

IV. Vessels taking in or discharging Coals, shall use a Rone, or Canvas, to prevent the Coals from falling into the River.

V. Rafts of Wood are not to exceed Thirty feet in breadth, and Three Tire of Logs in depth, and shall not be allowed to lie at the Quay, or in the Canal, or at any narrow part of the River, longer than Twenty-four Hours.

VI. All persons contravening these Regulations, or interfering with the Harbour Master in the discharge of his duty, shall be subject to the Penalties provided by the Act, entituled, "An Act to amend an Act for improving the Navigation of the River Cart, and for deepening and extending the Harbour of Paisley in the County of Renfrew."

PARLIAMENTARY BOUNDARIES.

By the bill to regulate the boundaries of Scotch towns, returning, or joining to return members to Parliament, under the new regime, the following are the boundaries assigned to Paisley and Renfrew. They are certainly ample, and will not be complained of as cutting too closely on the outskirts.

PAISLEY.

From the summit of Byres Hill, on the north-east of the Town in a straight line to the point near Knockhill, at which the Renfrew road is joined by a road from Glasgow; thence in a straight line to the summit of Knockhill; thence in a straight line to the northern gable of the Moss toll house on the Greenock road; thence in a straight line in the direction of the chimney of Linwood cotton mill to the point at which such straight line cuts the Candren burn: thence up the Candren burn to the point at which the same is joined by the Braidiland burn at the bridge over the same on the Johnstone road; thence up the Braidiland burn to a point which is distant five hundred yards (measured along the Braidiland burn) above the said bridge; thence in a straight line to Meikleridge bridge over the Candren burn; thence in a straight line to the point at which the old Neilston road leaves the new Neilston road; thence in a straight line to the summit of Dykebar hill; thence in a straight line to a point which is one hundred yards due north-east of the summit of Bathgo hill; thence in a straight line to the first described.

RENFREW.

From the Milburn bridge over the Pudzeoch burn on the Glasgow road in a straight line to a point up the Pudzeoch burn, which is distant three hundred yards in a straight line from the said bridge; thence in a straight line to a point on the Greenock road, which is distant two hundred and fifty yards, (measured along the Greenock road) from the point at which the same leaves the Paisley road; thence in a straight line to a point in the river Clyde, which is distant three hundred yards (measured along the river Clyde) below the point at which the same is joined by the Canal; thence along the river Clyde to the point at which the same is joined by the Canal; thence along the Canal to the point at which the same is joined by the Pudzeoch burn; thence along the Pudzeoch burn to the bridge aforesaid.

HISTORICAL AND DESCRIPTIVE SKETCH

OF

JOHNSTONE.

FEW places in Britain exhibit so striking an illustration of the effect of manufactures in originating and increasing towns, in attracting, condensing, and augmenting population, as does this thriving seat of business. Sixty years ago, near that bridge over the Black Cart, which till lately gave to the place the popular appellation "Brig of Johnstone," merely a few cottages were to be seen, where now is a town, consisting of two large squares, many considerable streets, and numerous public works, with a population of about 7000 souls.

It is probable that the town of Johnstone never would have existted, or at most would have been confined to the few cottages that stuck upon the ground near to the *Brig*, had not the late publicspirited *Laird of Johnstone*, by his influence and example, excited a spirit of industry among its inhabitants, and cherished and supported it by his fatherly care and protection, and, we are happy to say, that the seed has been sown in good ground, as it continues to manifest itself by the increasing wealth and prosperity of the enlightened and enterprising merchants and traders belonging to the place.

Towards the end of October 1782, nine houses of the New Town of Johnstone had been built, two others were building, and ground on which forty-two more were to be built had been feued. In 1792, the inhabitants were 1434 in number; in 1811, 3,647; in 1818, by computation, 5,000. As the introduction of the manufacture of cotton yarn by mill-machinery led to the founding of Johnstone, so has the extension of the same manufacture caused its rapid increase and present prosperity. There are now within the precincts of the place 15 cotton mills of varied extent, some propelled by water, others by steam, besides a flax mill and a carpet factory; also, Elderslie and Linwood mills, in the neighbourhood of Johnstone, making in all 20 mills.

There are also in the town two brass foundries, and two exten-

sive iron foundries; five machine manufactories, and a public gas work.

Johnstone is very regularly laid out. Besides Houstoun square, in the centre of the town, which is now built on every side, there is to the southward a large area, meant for a second square, as well as a market place, and which is also now beginning to be built round with neat houses. High street, extending from the Bridge of Johnstone on the west, to Dick's Bridge (or Canal Bridge) on the east, is closely built; as are several other streets branching at right angles from both its sides. It is in length 3 furlongs, 36 poles. The houses are for the most part two stories high, substantially constructed, and roofed with slates, and all of them have gardens. The shops are numerous, and well stocked with cheap, various, and excellent commodities.

Besides the Chapel of Ease, (an octagonal fabric, to which, about 22 years ago, a neat spire, after a design of Sir Christopher Wren, was added,) Johnstone contains two places of worship belonging to the United Presbyterian Church, and a Methodist Chapel; also, one of the Free Churches of Scotland, and Sir William Wallace's Church

at Elderslie in connection with the Establishment.

In Johnstone are also two News Rooms, a Mechanics' Institution and Library, sundry Religious and Friendly Societies, various Sabbath Schools, &c. The Ardrossan Canal from Glasgow, terminates in a basin at the east end of the town, to the advantage of which it greatly contributes; and the Glasgow and Ayr Railway passes immediately to the south of the town, having a station immediately to

The names of the streets of Johnstone, and the numbers of the houses in each, were formerly distinctly marked; but at present, these are in a great measure obliterated, which is not to be wondered at, the original markings having been made so long ago as the year 1828. This was done at the suggestion and under the superintendence of the present compiler, as were also those of Pollockshaws, Port-Glasgow, Greenock, Gourock, and Largs; and even those of Paisley on its present improved plan. There can be little doubt that the spirited inhabitants of Johnstone will see the propriety, not to say the necessity, of having this defect speedily supplied—an arrangement so very useful, not only in guiding strangers to the different parts of the town, but also for enabling traders and correspondents to direct letters and parcels to their proper destinations. Indeed it would be well if every town and village in the kingdom had similar arrangements.

The southern neighbourhood of this place is greatly beautified by Johntone Castle, a stately mansion, after the antique, situated among extensive pleasure grounds and valuable plantations. A similarly ornamental effect is produced by the house and pleasure grounds of Milliken to the westward of the town. The former is the seat of Ludovic Houstoun, Esq. of Johnstone; the latter that of Sir William

Milliken Napier, Bart.

the east of it.

The appearance of the east end of the town is not a little enriched by the house of Thornhill and its appendages, lately built by Campbell Snodgrass, Esq., on a pleasant eminence which commands an advantageous view not only of the town and the surrounding country, but also of several distant counties.

At Elderslie, 2 miles, 4 furlongs, 17 poles distant from Paisley, and 1 mile, 1 furlong, 17 poles from Johnstone, stands Wallace's Tree, a venerable and scathed oak, which, by tradition, is said once

to have been the hiding place of our truly chivalrous Scottish patriot, when closely pursued by bands of Southrons. A short distance from the tree, upon an eminence, the house that gave birth to Sir William Wallace is affirmed by the same authority once to have stood; and various names still given to some circumjacent places certainly corroborate the tradition.

The Russians who are in the rear of European civilisation, have lately adopted New Style, and surely we will not allow ourselves to droop behind.
