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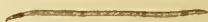

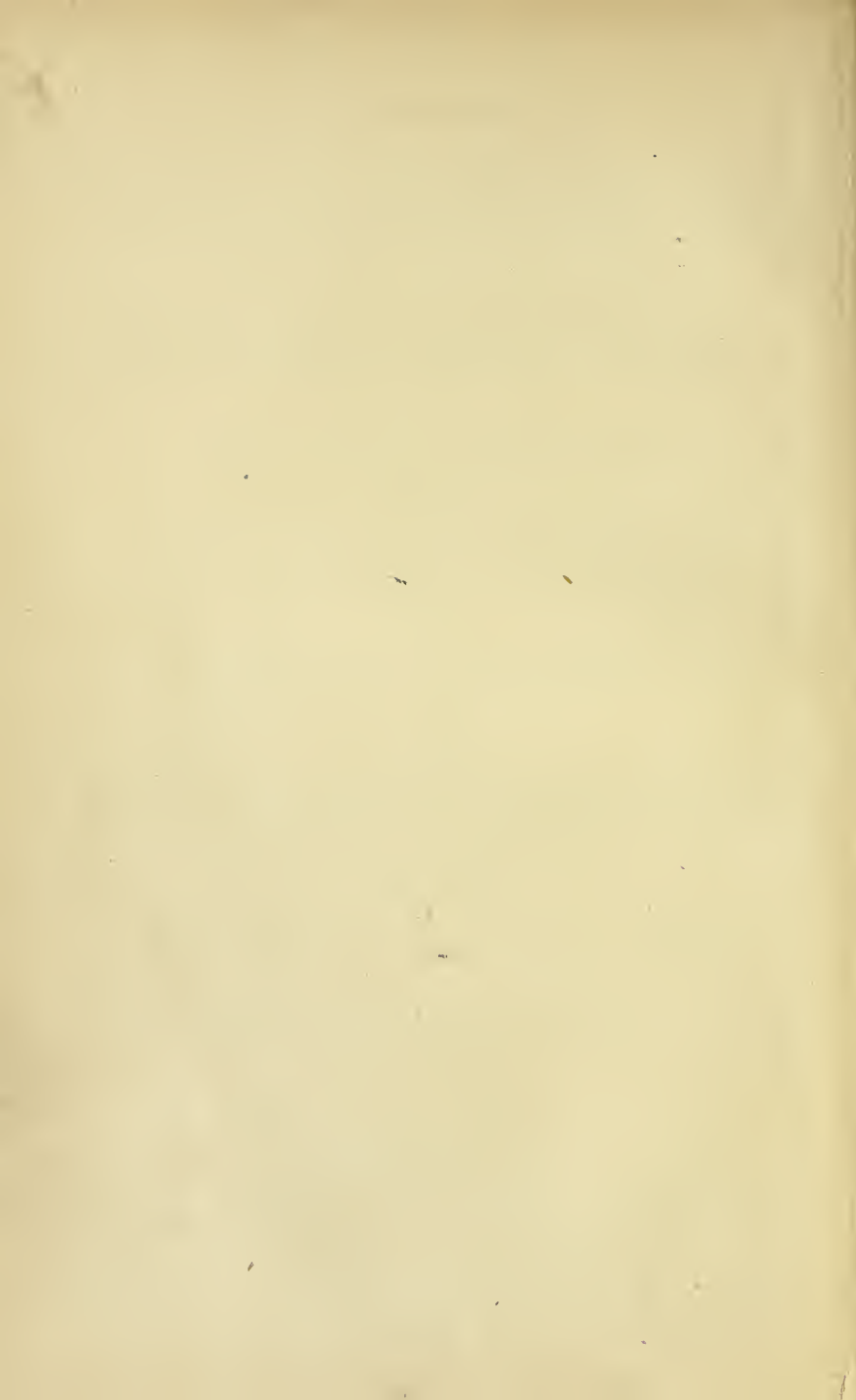

INTRODUCTORY.

THE republication of this little volume is purely accidental. Sometime ago, one of the Editors found the original among a collection of old pamphlets, and laid it aside as a thing to be looked to at leisure. At that time he was not aware that there had been a Glasgow Directory of so old a date. The preface seemed to indicate that it was the first ever published, but he afterwards discovered that it was really the second, the first having been printed two years before—in 1787. It is exactly like this, in size and appearance—containing nearly as many names, but nothing more than names, designations, and addresses. The second is in every way more curious and complete. It contains an extremely interesting Appendix of about 20 pages of “lists ;” which, coupled with the number of names that appear in it of persons connected in one way or another with the progress of the city,—names that suggest and explain the history of many a family, well-known or well remembered—dead or still existing, induced the idea of republication. The natural course would have been, to have reprinted the first edition, simply because it was the first; but the two being so much alike—the interval between them being only two years—preference has been given to the second, chiefly on account of its supplementary pages.

The whole book tells a story of what Glasgow was in 1789 better perhaps than any lengthened history could now do.

Any one who has the curiosity to go over the 84 pages of this little book, and then go over the Directory of 1866, with its 880 pages of small type, in double columns, will find the two works very different indeed; yet he will perceive in the former nearly all the elements that contribute to make the present Glasgow so great. The population of 1789 cannot be accurately ascertained; it is supposed to have been about 55,000. It was 45,889 in 1785, 66,578 in 1791, 83,000 in 1801. It is now 500,000. The city was then as it is still, the second in the Empire. It was then nearly as large as Aberdeen was in 1861; much larger than Paisley is to-day; nearly twice as large as Greenock.

Such a population nearly 80 years ago must have made Glasgow a place of great importance. It had, indeed, little political influence, for it possessed only a fourth part in the choice of a single representative to Parliament,—Renfrew, Rutherglen, and Dumbarton having precisely the same weight in an election,—but its social mercantile, and literary importance gave it then a position relatively as great as it possesses now. Its University was presided over by Adam Smith as its Lord Rector; John Miller was Professor of Law; John Anderson, the Founder of the Andersonian University, Professor of Natural Philosophy; Thomas Reid, of Moral Philosophy; John Young, of Greek; George Jardine, of Logic; William Richardson, of Latin; and Dr. Thomas Hope, of Chemistry. Men like these, associated

with other men of eminence, could not but exert much influence on any community.

There were also a Faculty of Procurators, and a Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons. The profession of the Law numbered 55 members, while now there are 209 on the roll of the Faculty. Medicine numbered 25, while now there are 149. From this it will be seen that Medicine has outstripped Law, if one may judge by the respective Faculties, but the Clergy, as far as numbers are concerned, have greatly eclipsed both. In 1789 there were only 16 Clergymen in Glasgow; 11 of these were of the Established Church, 1 the minister of "the English Chapel," the remaining 4 were Burgher, Anti-burgher, and Relief. Some people say that the former times were better than these: but if the number of Clergymen be any test of this, the olden times could not have been so good as the present, for there was then only one "minister" to every 5000 souls, while now there is one to every 2860. The Directory of 1866 contains the names of 235 Clergymen; who have thus increased during these 77 years about fifteen fold, while the Medical Faculty have increased six fold, the Legal about four fold, and the great body of the people eight fold.

As to trade and manufacture, it appears that out of a population of 55,000 people, nearly 1500 were engaged in business as employers, that is, they had shops, offices, warehouses, or "places of call." In 1866 the same class amounted to about 22,000, showing an increase in a fourteen fold ratio. There is now a larger number of *streets*, *squares*, and *terraces* in Glasgow, than there were of such

persons engaged in trade and professional life in 1789. The variety of occupations in 1789 amounted to 147, in 1865 they numbered about 500.

In these old lists, in the main the useful trades preponderate. There were 87 grocers, 51 bakers, 26 boot-makers, 18 fleshers, 22 hardwaremen, 120 manufacturers, 10 painters, 9 printers, 26 smiths, 33 teachers, 44 woollen drapers, 9 watchmakers, 26 wrights, 24 yarn merchants; but there were also occupations that indicated a large aristocratic element in the community, telling both of wealth and refinement; such as 2 coach builders, 14 saddlers, 14 booksellers, 3 perfumers, 26 hairdressers, besides 18 barbers! 4 architects, 1 carver and gilder, 3 jewellers, 23 cabinet-makers, 1 carpet warehouse, 3 engravers, 5 merchant tailors, 2 marble cutters, 1 optician, 26 wine merchants, and no less than 240 merchants. There were no shipbuilders in those days, no power-loom factories, iron founders, machine makers, or iron masters. There was one engineer and one coalmaster. There were then too, a type founder, a quill dresser, a card factory, 2 broad cloth manufacturers, 3 incle factories, and 7 rum merchants. None of these latter occupations seem to exist here now. The Editor, in his homely preface, confesses that “in collecting the names he found a great backwardness in receiving an explicit answer from a number of persons in trade, for reasons best known to themselves.”

In estimating the relative position of the term “merchant” then and now, it must be borne in mind that the term merchant in 1789 meant properly both a wholesale and retail dealer,—and generally applied to those

who dealt in miscellaneous articles brought from England as well as from abroad; while now it applies almost exclusively to those who are engaged in large transactions with Foreign countries. It must also be remembered that in many of the occupations of 1866 the same name, or firm may appear in the Directory twice, and sometimes thrice, as when it is classed both under "accountant" and "sharebroker," or under "bookseller" and "stationer." These businesses are as often conjoined as separated, and when conjoined, the same name appears under both the one and the other designation.

Banking establishments were as numerous in 1789 as in 1866—the number being in both cases eight—but the business now done by one of our large Banking houses probably far exceeds the business done by them all in those days. There were then as at present a "Chamber of Commerce," a "Merchants'" and a "Trades' House," a "Dean of Guild and his Court," a "Master of Police," and 6 Water Engines in case of Fire! "The Forth and Clyde Navigation Company," the "Monkland Canal Company," and the "West India Association." had all then been established. The latter was a very powerful interest. There was also a "Silver Golf Club," and a "Clyde Marine Society," neither of which any longer exist. In looking over the names of the members of these societies, especially the Golf Club and the West Indian Association, names will be recognised that gave origin to many of the county families now settled around Glasgow.

In glancing over the pages of the old Directory one is

rather surprised to find so many names of individuals or of firms in business still, whose fathers or grandfathers were engaged in nearly the same kind of business then—in some instances under precisely the same designations, thus—William Stirling and Sons, calico printers in West George Street, were then “calico and linen printers in High Street, by No. 42;” John Black and Co., calico printers, 64 Gordon Street, were then “calico and linen printers in 79 Trongate;” Austin and M’Auslin, nursery and seedsmen, of 16 Buchanan Street, were then “M’Auslin, Austin, and Co., seed shop, Trongate, No. 29;” Walter Crum and Co., calico printers, 4 West Regent Street, were “James and Alexander Crum and Co., muslin manufacturers, calico and linen printers, warehouse and shop, Gallowgate, No. 12.”—“James Lumsden, engraver and copperplate printer, 2d flat Craig’s land, head of the Old Wynd;” “Andrew Orr, bookseller and stationer, Saltmarket;” “John Smith, jun., bookseller and circulating library, Trongate, No. 14;” “William Mirrilees, saddletree maker, 1st cross west of Miller Street,” were the founders of houses still existing and widely known, not only for the extent, but for the respectability of their business connections.

It is curious to see where the great men lived:—Henry Monteith, then “muslin manufacturer,” had his “lodgings 3d flat Lightbody’s land, south side Bell’s Wynd;” “Andrew Buchanan (of Mount Vernon), merchant, Adam’s Court, south side Argyle Street;” “John Gordon, (latterly Aitkenhead), lived in 2d flat Gordon’s land, north side Argyle Street, near St. Enoch’s Burn;” Alexander Oswald, of Shieldhall, had his town

house in Maderia Court, while his brother George, of Scotston, lived in Virginia Street; Mr. Smith, the father of Mr. Smith of Jordan Hill, had his town residence in Dunlop Street. Many names well remembered, though now nearly extinct, appear in its pages—David Dale, for instance, who was then one of the cashiers of the Royal Bank, had his cotton twist wareroom in St. Andrew's Square, and his house in the west side of Charlotte Street, now a Nunnery.

There is something unusually simple and quaint about many of the descriptions of the businesses in which the people were engaged, as well as their addresses. For example, Richard Allan and Co. “keeps a callender,” and Mrs. Carmichael “letts lodgings,” while Alexander Campbell both “letts lodgings and boards gentlemen” at his house, 3d flat, Bell of the Brae, above No. 82. Mr. Brown is a “searcher of green hides and skins;” Mr. Cowan is a “wholesale merchant in victual;” Robert Cragie is a “chaise-setter;” Mr. Edgar is a “pantile and pot maker;” Mr. Forrester is a “women's silk, lasting, and leather shoemaker;” the Glasgow Tan Co. is “the first and oldest in Scotland for tanning ben leather;” Mr. Jeffrey is an “architect, cabinetmaker, and house wright!” Mathew Machen “makes and sells the oil of vitriol;” George M'Intosh has a “cudbear work” by the Craig's Park; John Rodger is “clerk and partner” at Mr. Bogle's; David Steel is a “horse setter;” Mrs. Stevenson, a “dealer in sundry vegetables;” while Mr. Wotherspoon is “barber, hairdresser, and painter.”

Then as to the addresses—Mr. Arthur is merchant

taylor in "Currie's foreland;" Mr. Bogle "has his lodgings in 1st flat Wide Close, south side Argyle Street;" the Sun Fire Office is "near the old Toll, south side Gallowgate;" Rowland Crawford, of Frisky, Esq., "has his lodgings in 2d flat Buchanan's back land, Trongate, by No. 120;" Richard Dick "is to be found at Mrs. Hamilton's, Bell of the Brae;" The Misses Dick live "at the downmost land in Dunlop Street;" Mr. Donaldson holds out at "the back the well east side of High Street;" Mr. Gillis of Dalnotter, "is occasionally to be found at the Black Bull Inn;" Mr. Houston of Aitkenhead's town house is in Argyle Street, "facing Queen Street;" and David Orr, from Newcastle, "is to be heard of at Joseph Robertson's warehouse."

Every place has its own peculiarity in the names of its inhabitants. There are names that abound here perhaps in greater abundance than they do anywhere else, such as Anderson, Bogle, Buchanan, Brown, Campbell, Coats, Dunlop, Ewing, Graham, Gardiner, Hamilton, Houstoun, Lang, Miller, Paterson, Reid, Robertson, Scott, Thompson, and Wilson. These names in the old Directory are more numerous than any others. Every one will recognise them as Glasgow names, or names that belong to old Scottish families. The Bogles and the Coats' were more numerous then than now, the Browns, Smiths, and Robertsons have, of course, multiplied so rapidly as to keep up their traditional reputation. The Smiths have increased fifteen fold, while the Langs, Ewings, and Houstouns only about four fold. The Macs have far outnumbered all the others, they have increased upwards of twenty fold.

Travelling in those days existed to a greater extent than one would have expected—22 coaches or stages on an average left Glasgow daily, affording accommodation to perhaps about 350 people. That accommodation no doubt was very different from what it is now—by rail, road, and river—still for 80 years ago it was large. Paisley seems to have monopolised nearly the half of this traffic. She had coaches or stages that started 13 times daily, besides 2 mail coaches that went on to Greenock, one of these “leaving about half-an-hour after the arrival of the London mail.” Four hours was the average time allowed for the journey to Greenock; while the eight coaches that started for Edinburgh took “about six or seven hours” to perform the journey, the one going round by Falkirk, ten hours. The obliging character of the proprietors of “The Edinburgh Diligence” goes beyond anything ever heard of in the present day, for they advertise that their famous stage “leaves the Saracen’s Head at 9 o’clock morning, or at any other hour agreed on by the first two passengers!”

There was a mail to Carlisle and London daily, also one to Ayr: Kilmarnock and Dumbarton had coaches only three days a week; Stirling only two a week; Hamilton had neither a coach nor a stage, but it had two “carrivans” which made about seven journies a week. There were no other stated conveyances; how the people got to Ireland, or the Highlands, the Directory says nothing.

The Directory itself—that is, pages 1 to 84 of this edition—is an exact facsimile of the edition of 1789, —type, size of page, the number of lines in a page,

everything, even to the errors, if there were errors in the old book, is an exact facsimile. The original binding was a simple paper wrapper. This edition is chiefly printed for private circulation,—only 50 copies being left for sale.

The Editors cannot conclude these introductory remarks without expressing their grateful thanks to John Buchanan, Esq., Banker, for most valuable assistance in the compilation of the few notes appended. There is no man living who knows better, or indeed so well, what Glasgow was in 1789, as well as what it is in 1866.

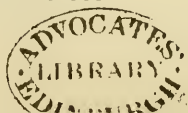

Adam, John, architect and mason, built a number of the antique looking buildings in Argyle-street and Jamaica-street. Adam's court is named after him. He was also contractor for building the first bridge across the Clyde at Jamaica-street in 1768. His daughter married the late Dr. James Monteath, whose nephew and partner was the celebrated oculist, Dr. George C. Monteath, who married Miss Cunningham of Craighends, now Duchess-Dowager of Argyll.

Aitken, Robert, manufacturer, was appointed agent in Glasgow for the Bank of Scotland in 1818. His son is Mr. Robert Aitken of Messrs. Aitken and Mackenzie.

Aitcheson, Walter, father of the late well-known Mr. William Aitcheson, writer, and of Mr. John Aitcheson, the latter of whom was trained in the old Ship Bank, under Mr. Carrick.

B.

Bain, Joseph, afterwards mail coach contractor, purchased the lands of Morriston, to which his son succeeded.

Bannatyne, Dougald, a manufacturer, in partnership with his brother, Mr. John Bannatyne. A partner likewise in several other concerns, more particularly in building Hutcheson, Wilson, Brunswick, John, and other streets, in connection with Mr. John Thomson, Mr. Robert Smith, and others. He was distinguished for great energy of character, and was appointed postmaster in 1806. He was the father of Andrew Bannatyne, Esq., the late Dean of Faculty.

Barry, James, came to Glasgow in 1734. Published a curious map of Glasgow and suburbs in 1781.

Barton, Benjamin, was admitted a Member of Faculty in 1772—of eccentric manners—wore powder in his hair, and had a short pig-tail—his dress consisting of buckskin breeches, top boots, a light grey coat with white metal buttons. His son, Lieut.-Col. Alexander Barton, K.H., was a distinguished cavalry officer, and served at Waterloo.

Blackburn, Peter, grandfather of Peter Blackburn, Esq., of Killearn.

Black, John, the senior partner of John Black and Co., had his town residence in the handsome mansion in Jamaica-street, removed a few years ago to make room for the buildings occupied by Arnott and Cannock. In the first edition of Dr. Strang's Glasgow and its Clubs, and also in Glasgow Past and Present, this house is erroneously stated to have been the residence of Provost James Black, who belonged to another family. John Black's country residence was Claremont, then named Clermont, and the grounds of which are now extensively built upon.

Bogle, William, was postmaster in 1806. Father-in-law to the late Archibald Hamilton, Esq.

Bowman, John, was Lord Provost in 1764, and died in 1797, aged 96. His father also held the same office in 1715 and 1719, and was an eminent merchant in Glasgow so far back as 1695.

Brown, Mrs., was an extensive and well-known dealer in cotton and cotton yarn. Her history is interesting. On the death of her husband, a respectable shoemaker, she consulted David Dale, Esq., whether to continue the business or sell off. He recommended her to wind up; but as there remained a large stock of leather on hand, and of boots and shoes, Mr. Dale suggested that she should work up the leather into shoes, and then export these to America on adventure. She was afraid of the risk, but Mr. Dale kindly said, if she liked, he

would "run halves." This was agreed to, and the whole stock of leather converted into shoes, and consigned to an American house. Mr. Dale further advised that the proceeds should be remitted home in cotton. When this cotton arrived Mary again applied to Mr. Dale for advice about its disposal. He recommended a cotton broker; but this thrifty woman replied, "Na, na; I'll sell it mysel', and save the commission." Accordingly, with a stout leather purse at her side filled with samples, she went through the cotton purchasers, and sold her stock to such advantage that she immediately commenced the business of a cotton broker, and soon became the first in the line. She passed more value through her hands than perhaps any woman in Scotland. But like many other speculators *at first*, she got into difficulties and was sequestered in 1794. Mary did not care a pin for the society of women, but delighted to meet with merchants who could talk to her about the long and short pile of cotton, of Pernams, Surats, Surinams, Brazils, Georgias, &c., eschewing all conversation of her sex about flounces, tucks, bowknots, and trimmings. The late Mr. Robert Henderson, and his brother, the present Mr. John Henderson of Park, were junior clerks in her employment.

Buchanan, Andrew, merchant, east side Jamaica-street, opened Buchanan-street *circa* 1778. He was a partner of Buchanan, Hastie, and Co., American merchants, which failed about that year. The street is named after him. He had four acres of ground reaching north as far as what is now Gordon-street, and bounded on the west by St. Enoch's burn. Buchanan-street was carried through the centre of these acres, commencing from Argyle-street.

Buchanan, William and John. The Sun was the first Insurance Company which had an office in Glasgow, and Messrs. Buchanan were the first agents.

C.

Campbell, John, of Clathick, was Lord Provost in 1784. Clathick is in Perthshire. He was also proprietor of Killermont, and a partner in the Thistle Bank. Died at an advanced age, 13th August, 1804.

Campbell, James, tanner, afterwards of Petershill, Shirva, and Bedlay. Campbell-street in Gallowgate was opened by and named after him in 1784. He died at Bedlay House, 13th June, 1829, aged 88. He left three sons—1. James, well known in his early days from his gaiety as “Claret Campbell.” Was an officer in the “Scotch Brigade,” and at the battle of Assaye in India, under Col. Wellesley. His father settled Petershill on him. He had a large family, every one of whom is dead. 2. Alexander, a writer, generally known as “Sandy Campbell,” of fascinating manners, and a great favourite. 3. David, a merchant. The whole family is now extinct.

Carrick, Robert (the well-known Robin), son of the Rev. Robert Carrick, minister of Houston. He entered the Ship Bank as a clerk, and rose step by step to be the chief partner. Died 20th June, 1821.

Colquhoun, Patrick, was Lord Provost in 1782. Instituted the Chamber of Commerce in Glasgow. Removed to London, where he became an active Police Magistrate. Author of an admirable treatise on the Wealth, Power, and Resources of the British Empire. Died 25th March, 1820, at 76.

Corbet, Cunningham, commanded a regiment of Glasgow Volunteers. Blind Alick sang of him and his Corps—

“Here’s a health to Cornal Corbet,
And likewise to his riflemen,
For when they do lay down the sword,
Every one takes up a pen.”

Cross, William, was the head of an old Glasgow family

frequently noticed in M'Ure's History of the City. He married Anne Buchanan, heiress of Moss and Auchintoshan, and was father of the late John Cross Buchanan, and the late William Cross of Dennistoun, Cross and Co., London, and other children. Moss, of the old family of Buchanan the poet and historian, and Auchintoshan representing the Hamiltons of Auchintoshan and Cochna,—the first of whom was Andrew Hamilton of Cochna, Provost of Glasgow and Governor of Dumbarton Castle for Mary Queen of Scots.

Cunningham, William, of Lainshaw, one of the four young men who laid the foundation of the commercial greatness of Glasgow, and made a princely fortune. His town residence occupied the site of the Royal Exchange. There was a garden behind, where the Royal Bank now stands. Purchased the estate of Lainshaw in 1779.

Cuters, Lawrence, supposed himself to be "the wisest man in Glasgow!" See his picture taking a walk in "Stuart's Views of Glasgow in former times." The correct surname is Coulter, but he was commonly called "Lowrie Cooters."

D.

Dale, David, born in 1739 at Stewarton, where his father was a small shopkeeper. Was sent out to herd cattle at an early age; thereafter apprenticed to a weaver in Paisley; wrought afterwards as a journeyman weaver at Hamilton. Came to Glasgow and served as clerk to a silk mercer. By steady perseverance and good conduct secured many friends, and commenced as a dealer in linen yarn, and importing yarns from Flanders. Founded the Lanark cotton mills. Was the first agent in Glasgow for the Royal Bank, in a small shop in Hopkirk's land, High-street. Died 17th March, 1806. See his picture in Stewart's Views, plate—"The Morning Walk."

Donald, John. Sir John Moore was born in 1761 in a back room of the tenement in which Mr. Donald's shop was, nearly opposite the Tron Steeple.

Douglass, John, father of Thomas D. Douglas, Esq., of Dunlop, Sir Neil Douglas, K.C.B., and Archibald Douglas, Esq., of Glenfinart.

Douglass, George. His son George, also a plumber, was the first who put plate glass into shop windows in his property in Argyle-street, about 1828. It was considered generally a "great risk and monstrous extravagance."

Dreghorn, Robert, the well-known "Bob Dragon," so often alluded to in Glasgow reminiscences.

F.

Forlong, William, father of William Forlong, Esq., of Erins. Was at one time a teller in the Merchants' Bank. He was generally known by the *sobriquet* of "the duke of importance."

G.

Geddes, John, better known as Colonel Geddes, having commanded a body of Volunteers. He rode a very fine black horse, and was a conspicuous figure. Blind Alick, the Glasgow Homer, tried his muse on the Colonel thus—

"Like the fiery god of war, Colonel Geddes doth advance
On a horse that belonged to the murdered king of France."

Glasfurd, Henry, son of John Glasfurd, Esq., who built the principal part of the fine old mansion of Whitehill. Glasford-street was opened through the garden behind his spacious town residence.

Grahame, Thomas, from his elegant manners commonly called Lord Chesterfield.

Grahame, Robert, afterwards of Whitehill, was the first Lord Provost of Glasgow after the passing of the Reform Bill.

Graham, Walter, one of the most famous makers of Glasgow punch in the olden time; a most inveterate Tory; a great favourite in Glasgow society; and for a short time Master of the Police.

Gray, Robert, and Co. Robert Gray, Esq., of Carntyne, was the head of this firm. His son, the Rev. John Hamilton Gray, married Miss Johnston of Alva, the accomplished authoress of a "Tour to the Sepulchres of Etruria," "A History of Etruria," "History of the Roman Emperors," and other interesting works.

H.

Hamilton, Gilbert, was the first Bill Collector of the Bank of Scotland before they appointed a regular branch agent. Lord Provost in 1792.

Hamilton, Archibald, formerly an American merchant. Was the proprietor of Overton, near Strathaven. Married Miss Syme, whose sister was the mother of Christopher North.

Henderson, James. Enoch Bank House stood where Moore Place now is, among beech hedges.

Hemmings, Henry, was an Englishman. Moved to M^rLehose's land, Post Office Court, south-west corner of Candleriggs and Trongate. He designated his premises "the Glasgow Hotel." In 1829, and some years thereafter, this old tavern was the first office of the Glasgow Union Bank. Hemmings removed in 1796 to the "Star Hotel," Ingram-street, on the site of which the office of the Bank of Scotland now is. Blind Alick was accustomed to sing his lively com-

positions in front of this hotel, accompanying his voice with the fiddle. He was frequently refreshed by a dram, which quickened him into these grateful lines, to a tune peculiarly his own—

“O first they gave me brandy,
And then they gave me gin,
Here’s a health to the gentlemen waiters
Of Mr. Hemmings’ hotel and inn.”

. Hopkirk, James. His town residence was the fine old mansion, long known as the “Buck’s Head Hotel.”

J.

Jones, Nathaniel, the compiler of the Directory. His father was Rice Jones, a Welshman, who was overseer of the Glasgow Tan Work Company. His son was many years officer to the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons, and his grandson librarian to Glasgow College.

M.

Mennons, John. The Advertiser was established in 1783, and merged into the Glasgow Herald in 1803.

Merchant Bank established in 1769; dissolved in 1798. Paid in full.

Monro, Alexander, father of Sir Thomas Monro.

Monteith, Henry, father of Robert Monteith, Esq., of Carstairs. Blind Alick commemorated him when Provost during the Radical uproar in 1819—

“Brave Provost Monteith,
Though he’s of stature plump,
He would have sliced the Radicals
Like a round of beef or rump.”

Murdoch, Robertson, and Co. This Bank failed in 1793. Paid in full. The amount ranked was £183,000. The trustee was Mr. Walter Ewing M'Lae, father of the late James Ewing of Strathleven.

M'Caull, Alexander, Dean of Guild in 1778-79, son of the Rev. John M'Caull, minister of Whithorn, and brother of the Rev. Dr. M'Caull of the Tron Church. Of a numerous family there is now no male representative in the direct line.

M'Credie, Archibald, was the first person who purchased a plot of ground for building in Miller-street, on 2d December, 1771. He paid for it £132 19s. 6d. It measured 591 yards, and the north wing of the Western Bank was built on the site.

M'Dowall, James, Lord Provost in 1790.

M'Goune's shop. Archibald M'Goune was the first who sold Pianofortes in Glasgow. These were introduced to London from the Continent in 1767

M'Ilhose, James, grandfather of James Hozier, Esq., of Mauldslic. The name was changed from M'Ilhose to Hozier.

M'Nair, James, coal master, afterwards of Greenfield.

N.

Neilson, Walter. In 1756 he was proprietor of the whole ground on the west side of what is now Queen-street between Argyle-street and the Exchange. It was then called the "Cow Lone," and the abode of a few cowfeeders and gardeners—unpaved and uncausewayed. Down till 1768 this now important street was full of holes, and cattle sunk in the mire. Mr. Neilson made arrangements with the proprietors on the east side to have "the Lone" widened, levelled, and causewayed. This was done in 1768: the new street laid off in building lots, and named "The Queen Street," in compliment to the then youthful grandmother of Her present Majesty.

O.

Orr, John. His grandfather, John Orr, was a wealthy Glasgow merchant, and in 1730 purchased Barrowfield and Camlachie for £10,000. These descended to his son, William, and on the death of the latter in 1755 he was succeeded by his eldest son, John, described in the text. Mr. Orr was elected Town Clerk 1781, held the appointment twenty-two years with great credit to himself and advantage to the community, till his death on 16th December, 1803, when he was succeeded by the late amiable and profound lawyer, James Reddie, Esq., Advocate.

Oswald, George, son of the Rev. Dr. James Oswald, minister of Methven, succeeded to Scotston by special destination of Richard and Alexander Oswald, merchants, Glasgow. His eldest son was R. A. Oswald, Esq., of Auchincruive.

P.

Paterson, John, commonly called "Lord George," in consequence of the active part he took when Lord George Gordon came to Glasgow in 1774 on his crusade through the country against Popery.

Paton, Captain Archibald, a once well-known old beau, son of Dr. David Paton, physician. Among the last of the old school who wore a queue and powder.

R.

Ritchie, James, son of John Ritchie of Craigton; born *circa* 1721. Made a princely fortune as an importer of tobacco. Died in 1799.

Riddell, John, Lord Provost in 1786.

S.

Smith, Archibald, jun., a partner of the firm of Leitch, Smith, and Co. He purchased the lands of Jordanhill, in which he was succeeded by his eldest son, Mr. James Smith, the eminent geologist and biblical critic.

Somervill, Gordon, and Co. Sir Thomas Monro was in early life a junior clerk with this firm.

Spiers, Archibald, eldest son of Alexander Spiers, merchant, Glasgow, who made a large fortune as an importer of tobacco. When the American war broke out tobacco rose 1000 per cent. Was great grandfather of the present M.P. for Renfrewshire.

Stirling, Walter, founder of Stirling's Library, son of William Stirling who had a dispensary in the High-street.

Stirling, William, and Sons. The firm retains the same appellation still. Stirling-street and square were carried through Mr. Stirling's back grounds, and are named after him. The first was opened in 1797, the latter in 1807.

Swanston, John. The Blind Asylum is built on the site of his country house.

T.

Tait, Peter. The Journal commenced in 1729. Published once a-week—on Friday. Merged in the Glasgow Herald.

W.

Wallace, John, was a West India merchant. Purchased Kelly in 1792. He wore a white night-cap under his cocked hat instead of a wig, and is so represented in the print—"the Morning Walk." Was father of the late Robert Wallace, Esq., M.P. for Greenock, the unflinching advocate of Post

Office and other reforms, and the lineal representative of Sir William Wallace.

Walker, Charles, many years agent in Glasgow for the old Falkirk Bank. Was Colonel of the Grocer Corps of Volunteers, and generally spoken of as "Kornel Walker." His regiment was known as "the Sugarallie Corps." Blind Alick, in one of his fits of military enthusiasm, describes him as—

"The gallant Charlie Walker
Makes Bonyparty tremble like a Quawker."

His old shop is still extant,—north side of Gallowgate, No. 89,—exactly as he left it.

Y.

Young, James, was a dealer in scarlet cloth at the Gallowgate bridge. Built a small villa east end of and facing Gallowgate, and named it after his business—"Scarlet Hall."



L I S T O F B A N K S .

Glasgow Arms Bank commenced in Bridgegate, 5th November, 1750; removed to King-street, and latterly to Miller-street. Failed 12th March, 1793. Paid in full.

Ship Bank commenced in the Bridgegate in January, 1750. Was the first Bank of issue in Glasgow. Removed to the west wing of the "Shawfield Mansion," facing Argyle-street, at the south-west corner of what is now Glassford-street. Amalgamated in 1836 with the Glasgow Bank, under the title of "The Glasgow and Ship Bank," which in its turn amalgamated with the Union Bank of Scotland in 1843.

Thistle Bank commenced in Bridgegate in 1761; removed to Virginia-street in 1765; amalgamated with the Union Bank of Scotland in 1836.

Merchant Bank commenced in Saltmarket in spring of 1769; removed in 1771 to a tenement, then newly built, at north-west corner of Maxwell-street. It was the first edifice built in that street. Dissolved partnership 23d February, 1798. Paid in full.

Royal Bank began in Edinburgh in January, 1728. Capital £111,000. The first office was in the floor of a house in Saint Mennan's Wynd, High street, Edinburgh, afterwards a Police Office. Their first Secretary was Mr. James Bogle, son of a Glasgow merchant. The first office of the Royal Bank in Glasgow was in "Hopkirk's land," High-street, a little way above the Cross. It was in a draper's shop,—the Bank on the one side and the drapery goods on the other. The Bank's share of the rent was £5. This was in 1783. Office moved from thence to south-east corner of St. Andrew's Square. Mr. John More, originally trained in a lawyer's office in Edinburgh, succeeded the two Glasgow agents mentioned in the text. He became bankrupt in 1816. Was succeeded by Mr. John Thomson, then agent for the Bank of Scotland at Aberdeen. In 1828 he was appointed chief cashier in Edinburgh, and on Mr. Thomson's recommendation was succeeded in the Glasgow agency by Mr. Laurence Robertson, originally an accountant in Perth. He again was translated to the chief cashiership in Edinburgh in 1857 on the resignation of Mr. Wilson, and was succeeded in Glasgow agency by the present agent, son of Mr. John Robertson, produce broker, and latterly of the Edinburgh and Glasgow Bank.

A. G. and A. Thomson's Bank commenced 4th October, 1785. First office west side of Virginia-street, near the bottom. Moved to west side of Queen-street, immediately north of the

National Bank buildings, where Mr. Lang now has his well-known premises as a *Restaurant*. Bank failed 5th November, 1793. The trustee was Mr. John M'Caul, merchant. Messrs. Thomsons' sequestration was recalled, and they were re-invested in their estate, on security to pay in full, which they did, by instalments.

Paisley Banking Company commenced at Paisley 1st October, 1783. The leading promoters were Messrs. Andrew Thomson of Faskin, and his son, George, bankers in Glasgow, above referred to. It was the first Bank started in Paisley. Placed a branch in Glasgow in 1784. Amalgamated with the British Linen Co., 20th November, 1837.

Union Bank Company of Paisley commenced in Paisley in May, 1788. Branch opened in Glasgow in 1789. Amalgamated with the Union Bank of Scotland, 30th June, 1838.
