



### MUNICIPAL WARDS OF THE CITY.

Under the Burgh Reform Act, the Magistrates and Councillors are elected by the parliamentary electors within the burgh, which is, for the convenience of polling, divided into three Wards, each of which sends six representatives to the Town Council. Of these two retire every year, when their places are, of course, supplied by a new election.

FIRST WARD.—To consist of that portion of the royalty which is included within the following boundary, viz. :—Beginning on the seashore, at the point where the north boundary of the royalty touches the shore, and following the said north boundary westward, till it touches the turnpike road leading from Invernry to Aberdeen; southward, along that road and the Gallowgate to Broad Street, and along Broad Street to Union Street; along Union Street to Castle Street and Justice Street, eastward to Park Lane, along Park Lane and the road or street leading along the foot of the Castlehill to James Street; along James Street, and continuing in a line south from the termination of the same to the Dee; eastward, along the Dee to the mouth of that river, and thence northward along the seashore to the point where the north boundary of the royalty touches the shore.—Pollingplace, in the Court-house.

Second Ward .- To consist of that portion of the royalty which is included within the following boundary, viz. :- Beginning at the centre of Union Street, opposite the Back Wynd, and keep.

ing along the Back Wynd to Schoolhill; westward, along Schoolhill and Woolmanhill to the point where the Millburn crosses Spa Street, near the Steps of Gilcomston; from that point northward by the boundary of the royalty, and following the said boundary eastward, till it meets the north-west point of the boundary of the First Ward; then southward by the Inverury road and Gallowgate to Broad Street, and along Broad Street to Union Street; along Castle Street and Justice Street eastward to Park Lane; along Park Lane and the road or street leading along the foot of Castlehill to Justice Street, and continued in a line due south from the termination of the same to the Dee; thence up the river to where the same is intersected by a line drawn south in continuation of the Shorebrae; thence up the said line, Shorebrae, and Shiprow, to Union Street, and along Uuion Street westward to the point opposite the Back Wynd, where the description of the Ward began .- Polling-place, Cruickshank's Hall, Schoolbill.

THIRD WARD.—To consist of that portion of the royalty which is included within the following boundary, viz.:—Beginning at the point where the Millburn crosses Spa Street, near the Steps of Gilcomston; thence along Woolmanhill and Schoolshill to a point onposite the porth and of Back Wynd; along Back Wynd southward to Union Street; along Union Street eastward to opposite the head of Shiprow, down Shiprow and Shorebrae, and in prolongation of the termination of the latter to the intersection with the river Dee; thence up the river Dee to the mouth of the burn of Ferryhill, and from the mouth of the burn of Ferryhill, following the boundary of the royalty, to the point on the Millburn, near the Steps of Gilcomston, where the description of the Ward began —Polling place, at the Water Reservoir, Union Place.

# POLICE ESTABLISHMENT.

By the Act 10th, Geo. IV. (1829), "for better paving, cleansing, lighting, watching, and improving the streets, lanes, and other public places and passages within the city of Aberdeen, and certain grounds adjacent; for regulating the police thereof, and for supplying the inhabitants with water," the city and suburhs are divided into nine Wards, each of which returns two Commissioners, who, with four ex officiis commissioners, are intrusted with the power of carrying the Act into effect. The qualification of electors is the occupation of premises, within the respective Wards, assessed under the Act, and valued at not less than £5 of yearly rent; and the Commissioners are chosen from electors occupying premises in the Ward, assessed under the Act, of the yearly value of not less than £15, and being likewise resident in the Ward. The election takes place on the second Thursday of October biennially. The next election is in 1843.

#### HARBOUR.

The present Harbour Act is 10th, Geo. IV. c 24, and was passed 14th May, 1829. It takes the exclusive management out of the hands of the corporation, adding five Burgesses of Guild and one member of the Incorporated Trades, elected biennially by ballot, and limited the period of completing the work according to a detailed prospectus, to twelve years after its passing. It expired last year, in as far as these works are concerned; the Board can now only keep the Harbour in a safe state, and must apply for a new Act.

Trustees' Qualifications .-- 1. Burgesses of Guild who stand rated in the Tax-roll of the city, upon trade or business, to the extent of £3000 annually, or are owners of 150 tons of shipping belonging to the port. 2. Members of the Incorporated Trades who stand rated in said Tax-roll, upon trade or business, to the extent of £1500, or are owners of 75 tons of shipping belonging to the port.

Electors' Qualifications.—1. Burgesses of Guild who stand rated in the Tax-roll of the city to the extent of £500, or are owners of 30 tons of shipping belonging to the port. 2. Members of the Incorporated Trades who stand rated in said Tax-roll to the extent of £400, or are owners of 25 tons of shipping belonging to the port.

Copartnerships .- The same rules apply to companies carrying on business either as Burgesses of Guild or members of the Incorporated Trades, one partner in every such company being qualified as a Trustee or an Elector, as the case may be, for every sum sufficient to confer the qualification on an individual, for which the company may stand rated in the Tax-roll.

There are also two Leading Lights on the Torry side of the river, recently erected. The following are the directions for taking the Harbour by them.

#### OBSERVE.

1st, These Lights have no reference whatever to the state of the

tides, as they are to be exhibited from sunset to sunrise.

2d, But, on certain occasions, when, on account of speats or floods in the river Dee, or from too much sea on the Bar, it is, in the opinion of the Captain Pilot, considered unsafe for vessels to attempt entering the Port, the Lights will not be exhibited.

#### DESCRIPTION OF THE LIGHTS.

The Lights will be of a brilliant red colour, visible in clear weather at a distance of five or six miles, the one above the other, and are elevated—the one, about 30 feet, and the other, 47 fect, respectively, above high water of spring-tides.

These Lights, when first distinctly visible in coming from the northward, bear W.SW., by compass—in coming from the southward, due West—and when seen in line, W. by S. ½ S. nearly; and, if the depth of water permit, vessels may run for the Harbour with safety.

Appeals, in certain civil cases, from the inferior courts, are also heard by this court.

#### SHERIFF SMALL-DEBT AND CIRCUIT COURT.

The Small-debt Court was formerly stationary like the Ordinary Court, but by the Act of Parliament 1, Victoria, cap. 41, Circuit Courts, for the trial of Small-debt cases (actions for sums under £8 6s 8d), are established in addition to the ordinary Small-debt Court; and the Sheriff is ordained to divide the county into districts, and hold a certain number of Courts in each annually.

Appeals against the Sheriff's judgments in these Courts are not competent, unless on the ground of corruption, malice, or oppression on the part of the Judge; and the decrees may be immediately put in execution by arrestment or poinding; imprisonment for small debts being abolished. Written proceedings, or the assistance of professional men are not allowed, unless with leave of the Court.

The Ordinary Small-debt Court at Aberdeen is held on Thursday, at Ten o'clock, A.M., weekly, during sessions of the Court, and once or twice during vacation.—John Grant Leslie, Clerk.

#### JUSTICE OF PEACE COURT.

The office of Justice of the Peace was introduced into Scotland in 1609. As signified by their name, the Justices judge in riots and breaches of the peace—they enforce the laws against beggars and vagrants—the game laws—and, with the Commissioners of Supply, they regulate the highways, bridges, and ferries. The execution of various penal statutes, revenues, laws, and others, is also committed to them. The quarter-sessions are held on the first Tuesday of the months of March, May, August, and last Tuesday of October. Special sessions are occasionally held.

In cases, however, where stamps of a less value than the rate exigible have been used, the letter is chargeable, on delivery, with double the amount of such difference. For instance, a letter posted exceeding half an ounce and under one ounce, upon which a penny label has been put, will, on delivery, be charged twopence, being double the difference betwixt the label used and the proper one for the weight of the letter, which ought to have been adopted-the public being, in this case, mulcted one penny extra.

Stamps may be used for printed votes, Parliamentary proceedings, and on Foreign, Colonial, and ship letters proceeding outwards; but their use is prohibited from the Colonies or Foreign

ports.

Letters for Foreign countries, and places beyond seas, having an insufficient number of stamps, will not be forwarded, but sent to the Dead-Letter Office to be returned to the writer. And the same principle is applied to letters for Foreign countries, prepayment of which is required, when left at any Post-office with less

than the full amount of such postage.

Members of each House of Parliament are allowed to receive, by the post, petitions and addresses to her Majesty, and petitions addressed to either House of Parliament, not exceeding thirty-two ounces in weight, exempt from postage, provided such petitions and addresses be sent without covers, or in covers open at the sides. Should they exceed that weight, they will not required to be pre-paid, but are charged according to their weight as unpaid letters with double the rates of postage to which, if prepaid, they would be subject.

Letters specially addressed, "via Marseilles, per French steam-packet," are forwarded by the French steam-boats which leave Marseilles on the 1st, 11th, and 21st of each month.

To and From West Indies, Mexico, &c., 57 days—America, 6 weeks—Brazils, 20—Gibraltar, 20 days. From August to January, inclusive, the Packet touches at Pernambuco and Bahia on her outward passage to Rio Janeiro, and the other six months on her homeward.

# REGISTRATION OF LETTERS.

Since January, 1841, a system of registration has been in opera-tion applicable to all descriptions of letters.

Letters intended for registration must either be stamped or prepaid, and presented at the Post-office at least 30 minutes before the closing of the letter-box for the particular mail by which it is to be despatched.

The British registration fee is 1s. and must always be paid in

money, and at the time of registration.

In the case of Foreign, Colonial, or Ship letters, registration extends to the port of despatch in the United Kingdom only.

Registration fee on such letters, Is. and, in addition, the rate of

postage to which they may be liable. Letters addressed to France may be registered to their destination; and those passing through France, so long as they may remain in the French territory-the former on payment of double the French rate to place of destination, in addition to the British rate and British registration fee, and the latter on payment of the usual postage rate, and 1s. registration fee. It must be observed, however, that such registration does not render the Postmaster-General, or the Post office revenue, in any manner liable for the loss of any such letter or contents thereof.

## NEWSPAPERS

Sent in covers, open at the sides, and which have no writing or marks of reference or communication upon them or on the covers, other than the address of the persons to whom sent, circulate throughout the United Kingdom free of postage. And, provided they be posted within seven days from the date of publication, they are sent to and received from, the undermentioned British Colonies and Foreign places without charge :-

It is required that parties in whose favour they are drawn present them personally at the Post-office for payment. In cases, how-ever, where the personal attendance of the party is really inconvenient, the money may be drawn by any person properly instructed, presenting the order, the receipt at the foot thereof being signed at full length with christian and surname of the payee.

THIS Association is established principally to enable persons whose incomes terminate with their lives, to secure Annuities to their survivors, viz.—Male Relatives to the age of 21, Widows and all Female Relatives while they remain unnarried. It likewise admits Ladies to be Members. To persons in trade, it holds out additional advantages, as the Annuity cannot be sold or lost, under any contingency, so long as the Rules of the Society are complied with.

Annuities may be secured to Male Relatives for life, if Idiots or Cripples, on payment of Additional Premiums. Fathers may also be nominated, without any additional Premiums, or charge for disparity.

No Member can take more than Six Annuities, of which only three

can be granted to one Nominee.

The Premiums of all Members must be paid for five years before their Nominees can receive any Annuities; but the Nominees of those Members who may die previous to the expiration of that time, will be relieved from farther payments on giving notice in writing to the Office of their inability to continue them; the arrears, with 5 per cent. interest thereon, will be deducted from the first Annuities when payable.




