





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
PREFACE.

In presenting the following pages to the public, the compiler is well aware, that there must be several inaccuracies and deficiencies; but he can assure them, that no exertion on his part has been omitted to procure correct copies of every list deemed of the least general utility; and he trusts, where mistakes have occurred, they will be found of minor importance.

Several alterations have occurred since the work was put to press; and these, as far as have come to his knowledge, he has noticed at the end under the proper head.

From the very short time allowed for the execution of the work, (almost the whole being collected since Martinmas last), it has not been in the power of the publisher to arrange the lists in the manner he wished to have done; but he trusts, from their number, their variety, and usefulness, the Dunder Directory for 1818 will meet the approbation of those gentlemen, who have so far honoured the compiler as to patronise the undertaking.

A SHORT

ACCOUNT OF DUNDEE.

DUNDEE is a royal borough in the county of Angus or Forfar, seated on the N. bank of the river Tay, about 12 miles from its mouth, in 56° 27' 23" N. latitude, and 3° 2' W. longitude from Greenwich. It is a large and well-built town, consisting of several streets, diverging in every direction from the market-place or highstreet, which is a spacious square 360 feet long by 100 feet broad. On the S. side of this square stands the Town-house, an elegant structure, with a handsome front, adorned with piazzas below, and overtopped by a neat spire 140 feet in height: this building, which was finished in 1734, contains the guild hall, the court room, townclerk's office, with vaulted repositories for the town records, and apartments for the Dundee Banking Company's office: the prison occupies the upper story. At the E. end of the square, the incorporated trades in 1776 erected an elegant 'Irades' hall, with a superb front of Ionic pilasters, and a neat cupola: the lower flat is occupied by shops, and the upper flat contains rooms for each incorporation, and a large hall for general meetings, which is now occupied as a subscription coffee-room, on the most liberal and extensive plan. Nearly opposite to the Trades' hall, in the W. end of the square, there is a neat Episcopal chapel. At the S. E. corner of the square, about 100 feet from the Trades' hall, stood the Castle-hill, so called from the ancient castle. It was composed entirely of a hard basaltic whinstone, which has lately been quarried away at a great expence,

and a fine spacious street, called Castle-street, has been opened to the harbour: on the east side of this street stands the Scots Episcopal chapel, a neat building, after the Gothic stile; and immediately opposite is the Theatre, erected by subscription, and fitted up in the most elegant manner. A small distance W. from the great square, is the Old Church, in which were originally four places of worship, and which when entire had been a very magnificent building, with a large square Gothic tower, or steeple, of 156 feet high, at the W. end of the church. It is said to have been erected by David Earl of Huntingdon, in 1180, and dedicated to the Virgin Mary, in gratitude for his deliverance from shipwreck, in which he had nearly perished within sight of the town, on his return from the third crusade. On an eminence near the street called the Cowgate, the incorporated trades, in conjunction with the kirk-session, built St. Andrew's church, with a fine spire 139 feet high, exhibiting one of the purest specimens of modern architecture: there is a neat entry to the church by a broad gravel walk, with grass plots and shrubberies, laid out in the most elegant style. About a mile from the town, on the rising ground towards the hill of Dundee, is Dudhope Castle, an ancient building, converted some years ago into barracks, for the accommodation of a complete regiment: the wards for the men occupy the old building, and a new and elegant building was at same time fitted up for the officers: there is an extensive parade in front of the officers' barracks, and a large field for exercise immediately behind. Dundee has also a Sailors' Hall, which is often used for public meetings; and there are many Friendly Societies, for the support of poor members. In 1798 an Infirmary was built, for the reception of indigent sick: many years ago a Dis-

pensary was established, under the patronage of Lord Douglas, one of the principal benefactors: which is now united to the infirmary, where the poor receive medicines gratuitously, by presenting a recipe from the attendant physician. A Lunatic Asylum also has lately been built, a little to the northward of the town: it is a very handsome building, and, it is expected, will be soon ready for the reception of patients. A spirit for literature and education manifests itself in Dundee; for, besides the public grammar school, and the English schools, which are well supplied with good teachers, there is established an Academy, or rather College, for mathematics, the French and Italian languages, and the polite arts; with proper professors in the different branches, and a large apparatus for natural and experimental philosophy. Most of the streets of Dundee are neat, and the houses well built, but the new streets are spacious and elegant. The town is well supplied with water, many families having drawwells on their own property, and every street having a public well of excellent water conveyed in leaden pipes. The harbour is advantageously situated for trade, admitting easily trading vessels of the greatest burden; and when finished according to the present plan, will be one of the first in Scotland. The Tay, opposite to Dundee, is about two and a half miles broad, and being sheltered by the high lands on each side, affords a safe road to vessels of any burden, where they may lie at anchor till the tide admits them into the harbour. Close by the quay, there are three large public warehouses, besides numerous warehouses belonging to individuals. The principal and staple manufacture is linen, of various kinds: osnaburghs and other coarse linens, for foreign markets, are manufactured, supposed to the

annual amount of 200,000l. and canvas or sail-cloth, which was lately the chief manufacture, the demand for that article being greatly increased in time of war: besides these, a considerable quantity of sack-cloth and cotton bagging is annually made for exportation. Several cotton works have been

attempted, but have not been successful.

The ancient name of Dundee was Alectum or Alec, but is said to have been changed at the time of the foundation of St. Mary's church by the Earl of Huntingdon, to Dondie, a contraction of donum Dei, expressive of his gratitude for his miraculous escape; others ascribe it to Dun Tay, " the hill of Tay;" but etymologies of names are at best unsatisfactory, and seldom useful. Though it was only erected into a royal borough by King William, it appears to have enjoyed many immunities and privileges previous to the reign of that prince: but, as all the records and evidences of its ancient rights were either destroyed, or carried off by Edward I. of England, application was made to Robert Bruce, after he had obtained free possession of his kingdom, that these rights should be recognised. In consequence of this application, Robert appointed two commissioners for recognising the rights of the burgesses of Dundee, by a charter dated at Aberbrothock the 22d day of June, in the 20th year of his reign. The commissioners accordingly repaired to Dundee, and having examined witnesses, found full and complete evidence, "that the burgesses of Dundee enjoyed in times of former kings the same privileges with those of any other most favoured and distinguished town in Scotland." On this recognition, King Robert gave to the town an infeftment and charter, granting " to the burgesses, their heirs and successors for ever, all the liberties and rights

of which they were possessed in the time of Lord William King of Scots, of blessed memory, before the same William conferred the said borough on his brother David." These rights appear to have been confirmed and enlarged by successive charters from many other princes; and finally confirmed by the Great Charter from Charles I. the articles of which were ratified by parliament, on September 14, 1641. The town is governed by a provost, four bailies, a dean of guild, a treasurer, and fifteen counsellors .-In ancient times Dundee was strongly fortified, and some remains of its ancient fortifications still remain at the Cowgate port. It had an old castle, which was demolished by the famous Sir William Wallace, who received his education in the town. The castle had proved very useful to Edward I. when he put a garrison into it to overawe the inhabitants; and Wallace getting possession, ordered it to be destroyed, lest it should fall again into the hands of the English. This treatment so exasperated Edward, that, taking the town by storm, he set fire to it; and many of the inhabitants, who had taken refuge in the churches, were burnt, along with their most valuable effects. It was thereafter taken and burnt by Richard II. and again by the English in the days of Edward VI. It suffered greatly during the troubles of Charles II. and the usurpation of Oliver Cromwell; being sometimes under one master, and sometimes at the mercy of another. It was taken by storm by the Marquis of Montrose; but in the last and most destructive siege, it was taken by assault, and completely pillaged by General Monk; at which time, so great were the riches of Dundee, that every private soldier in Monk's army had 60l. sterling of plunder to his share.

The parish of Dundee is extensive, being six miles

from east to west, along the banks of the Tay; its breadth varies from one to four. The soil is in general uneven, but many places are abundantly fertile, and the appearance is beautiful, particularly the south slope towards the Tay. The Law, or Hill, of Dundee is situated on the north side of the town, rising in a conical shape to the height of 525 feet above the level of the Tay; on its summit are the distinct vestiges of a fortification, which tradition ascribes to Edward I. On the lands of Balgay are large rocks of porphyry. There are several quarries of sandstone, of very hard texture, containing many quartoze nodules imbeded in it; but the principal stone used in building is brought from the Kingoodie quarry, in the parish of Longforgan. Along the shores of the Tay, Scots pebbles are found in great variety. Dundee has given birth to many great literary characters, of which we may mention Hector Boece, or Boethius, first principal of King's college of Aberdeen, the author of a good history of Scotland, and one of the chief restorers of learning in his time; Dr Kinloch, physician to James VI. and Mr Goldman, merchant: "some Latin poems by these two gentlemen, inserted in the second volume of the Poetæ Scotigenæ, are universally admired for their purity of language and elegance of composition. Fletcher of Saltoun, Dempster of Dunnichen, the gallant Lord Viscount Duncan, and the Earl of Rosslyn, (late Lord Loughborough), natives of Dundee, are characters which would attach celebrity to any place, and their names will always be gratefully remembered by every Scotsman.

In 1792, the number of inhabitants in Dundee was estimated at 24,000; in 1801, the number returned to government was 26,084; and at the pre-

sent, it may be fairly computed at 30,000.

Passage at the Ferries of Woodhaven, &c.

Regulations to be observed by the Boatmen, and others, plying the passage between the counties of Fife and Angus, by the ferries of Woodhaven, Newport, Balmerino, and Ferry-porton-Craigs, in Fifeshire, and Dundee and Broughty Castle, in the county of Angus; established and enacted by the Justices of his Majesty's Peace for the said counties of Fife and Angus.

1. The said Justices judging it necessary, for the service of the public, have enacted, and do hereby enact, that there must always be three stout boats, and three pinnaces, belonging both to the Dundee and Woodhaven ferry side; and two boats and three pinnaces at the east water, or Newport ferry; that one of the boats at each of the Dundee and Woodhaven ferries, must be at least 20 tons carpenters measurement; the remaining two, at each of these ferries, must not be under 14 tons burden. At the Newport ferry they shall not be under from 10 to 12 tons: each of the pinnaces not to be under 22 feet in length in the keel, and at least 7 feet broad.

2. That there must always be, at least, in these boats, two good ferrymen and a boy, and the same number in each of the pinnaces when they cross; and that on all occasions, night and day, Sundays, and holidays, these boats must cross, except when it is blowing so hard that the Superintendent gives it as his opinion, that it is impracticable; and such Superintendent must be appointed at each of the ferries for that purpose: the one for Dundee to be under the appointment of Mr Malcolm, Superin-

tendent at Dundee for the time; those for Woodhaven and Newport to be under the appointment of Mr Morrison of Naughton, Mr Wedderburn of Wedderburn, Mr Berry of Tayfield: the one for Ferryport-on-Craig to be under the appointment of Mr Dalgliesh of Scotscraig; and the one for Broughty Castle to be under the appointment of Mr Guthrie

of Craigie.

3. It is recommended by the Justices to Lord Douglas, who has the privilege of licensing the ferry boats, that no new boats or pinnaces be licensed, but those coming under the description mentioned in the first article; and that each of these boats and pinnaces, with the list of their crew, must be registrate in a book, kept under the appointment of the Magistrates of Dundee, before they can be allowed to ply at any of these ferries; and that the boats who have been already licensed, are also to comply with this injunction. And in order that the proper conditions of the said boats and pinnaces may be ascertained, the said Justices authorise and empower the said Superintendent at Dundee, at all times he may think necessary, to inspect, or cause to be inspected, the boats and pinnaces plying at the said passage; and in case he find any of them not in a proper and sufficient condition for that purpose, he is hereby authorised to stop the boatmen from plying the passage with the boat so found insufficient, until the proprietor of the said boat do procure to him a regular bred and respectable carpenter's certificate of its. sufficiency; and that the licenses of such boats be suspended, until they are put in proper order and repair, in terms of the report; and that none but those licensed and registrated as aforesaid, are allowed to serve on the passage, or interfere with the licensed and registrated ferrymen, in any respect.

4. That one of these boats and a pinnace must be constantly at each of the above-mentioned ferries, to serve the lieges, and obliged to cross instantly when ordered, at the present fares, as herein after expressed. And it is further enacted, that no double or additional freights be exigible by the boatmen for crossing under cloud of night, or although the boatmen, from stress of weather, and the wind being contrary, should be obliged to land at Ferry-port-on-Craig, or Balmerino, on the Fife side, or Broughty Castle on the Angus side, the hardships being the same to the passengers as the boat's crew: and it is likewise enacted, that a boat or pinnace must always be stationed at low-water mark.

5. It is enacted that the boats belonging to the respective ferries of Woodhaven, Newport, Ferryport-on-Craig, Dundee, and Broughty Castle, be the only boats which have a right to their turn at the said ferries; and all other boats and pinnaces must, in an hour and a half, set out, in order to return to their own ferries, except in the case of there being no boats at the ferry to which they belong, and then they are obliged to set out for the said ferry without loss of time: that if any boat take in passengers, or goods, at the ferry where they have no right to their turn, they are obliged to account for the freight of such passengers and goods to the birth-boat where such goods or passengers are taken in: that a boat is obliged to depart at high-water, and another at half tide, if the wind is westerly, and at half ebb, if the wind is easterly, and that in the event of a single passenger offering, at the ordinary fare of such passenger: that the birth-boat must, on no account, be hired, or freighted, but must wait the above periods, for the accommodation of passengers.

6. It is enacted, that the name of each boat, the master's name, and the tonuage of the boat, must be painted both in the inner and outer stern of each boat and pinnace, so that passengers may know whom to sue when they are not served in terms of the regulations: and that each night, one of the licensed ferrymen, or boys, must be on the watch, to attend the service of the public; and that each of the boats or pinnaces must have always a printed copy of the regulations to show, otherwise to forfeit their freight; and that pinnaces are excluded from taking on board carriers baggage, or luggage of any kind. Pinnaces are hereby restricted to take six passengers and no more; and all yawls are restricted to four passengers.

7. That the following rates and fares are to be exacted and levied at the said passage, and no other, on any account whatever:—

8. It is enacted, that every one of these regulations be punctually observed, under the penality of a sum not less than 20s. sterling, or more than L.2 2s. for each offence, by and attour the parties contravening to be suspended from any employment on. the said passage, during the pleasure of the Justices of the Peace of Angus and Fife, or Magistrates of Dundee, respectively: And that all persons who are not duly served at either of the said ferries, in term's of the above regulations, and wishing not to be at the trouble of prosecuting the offender, or offenders, that such person or persons must send to the clerk to the peace, or procurator-fiscal for either of the counties where such offence happens to be committed, the note of the offence, the offender or offenders name or names, and the names of two or more witnesses, and they will be prosecute by the fiscal before such courts, without putting the complainer to any trouble or expence.

9. It is enacted, that the Justices of the Peace for the counties of Angus and Fife, and the Magistrates of Dundee, respectively, do enforce the above regulations; and that they be printed and published, that

none may pretend ignorance.

REGULATIONS

FOR

THE CARTERS

PLYING WITHIN THE BURGH OF DUNDEE,
AND SUBURBS THEREOF.

Enacted by the Provost, Magistrates, and remanent Members of the Town Council, on the Second day of July, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Seven Years.

STATUTORY ENACTMENTS.

THE Stat. 27th, Geo. II. cap. xvi. sect. 7. enacts, that if the driver of any cart, car, dray, or waggon, shall ride upon any such carriage, not having some other person on foot or on horseback to guide the same, (carts drawn by one horse only, or by two horses a-breast, and conducted by some person holding the reins, excepted); or if the driver of any carriage on any street or highway shall, by negligence or wilful misbehaviour, cause any hurt or damage to any person passing; every such driver, being convicted either by his own confession, or by the oath of one witness, before any justice of the peace of the county, &c. where the offence is committed, shall, for every offence, forfeit any sum not exceeding Ten Shillings, or shall be committed to the house of correction for any time not exceeding a month; and every such driver offending in either of the said cases, may, without any warrant, be apprehended by any person who shall see such offence committed; and shall be immediately delivered to a peace-officer, in order to be conveyed before a justice of the peace, to be dealt with according to law.

The Stat. 12th, Geo. II., cap. xlv, s. ct. 1. enacts, that no person shall drive any cart, car, with or without ledges, or any waggon, sledge, or dray, upon the high-roads or streets in Scotland, unless the master or owner of such cart, &c. shall place upon some conspicuous part thereof, the name of the owner and his place of residence, or of the house or farm where the owners generally employ such carriage, in different colours from the body of such carriage; and also the numbers, where more carts, &c. than one belong to the same person, in order that the driver may the more easily be convicted of any misbehaviour committed by him.

Sect. 2. If any person shall drive such carriages upon any such roads or streets, not having the name, place, and number, as aforesaid, placed in some conspicuous part of the same, he shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Twenty Shillings, and not less than Five

Shillings sterling for each offence.

Sect. 3. If the property of such carriages shall be altered, the succeeding owners shall, within fourteen days after they shall become owners and shall have used the same, cause the name and residence of the former owners, and number to be taken off, and their own name and place of residence, and a new number to be placed, in manner foresaid, upon such carriage; and every person omitting to do the same shall forfeit Twenty Shillings, and not less than Five Shillings sterling.

Sect. 4. If any person shall place a false name or place of residence upon his carriage, he shall forfeit

a sum not exceeding Forty Shillings sterling.

Sect. 5. If any chaise-driver in Scotland shall be found sitting in his chaise, without another person on one of the horses driving the same, or if any carter, &c. or the driver of any other carriage, (coaches,

chaises, phaetons, curricles, chairs, and such other carriages, which are usually driven by a person sitting within or upon the carriage, and such as are drawn by one horse only, or by two horses a-breast, and are conducted by some person holding the reins of such horses, excepted), shall ride upon any such carriage (not having some person on foot or on horseback to guide the same), on any street of any city or town, or on any highway within six miles of Edinburgh, or four miles of Glasgow, or two miles of any other city, royal burgh, &c.; or if the driver of any carriage whatsoever, on any street or highway, shall, by negligence or misbehaviour, cause any hurt or damage to any person or carriage, or shall prevent or interrupt the free passage of any other carriage, or of persons, on the said highways; or if any driver of any cart, &c. on any highway, when riding on his carriage, shall not dismount (so as the better to guide his horse or carriage) when required by any person apprehending danger, every such driver, for every such offence, shall forfeit not exceeding Ten Shillings if he is not the owner, and if he is the owner, not exceeding Twenty Shillings sterling.

Sect. 6. No driver of carts or other carriages shall drive a-breast, so as to obstruct the free passage of streets and highways, but shall follow one after another, and shall have bridles or halters upon every horse, which bridles upon the foremost horse shall (in all carriages drawn by two horses) be tied with a rope to the halter or bridle of the horse behind, and which rope or bridle the driver shall have in his hand; and the offender in the premises shall forfeit not exceeding Twenty Shillings, and not less

than Five Shillings sterling

Sect. 7. No drivers of horses or other beasts shall drive them so as wilfully to obstruct the free passage

of his Majesty's subjects, or to put their persons in danger, but shall drive them in a line, having a bridle or halter affixed to the head of each horse or beast; and the driver or owner of any cart or other carriage shall not be permitted to leave the same on any street or highway after the horses have been unyoked, except during the time the same shall be loading or unloading; nor shall it be allowable to any person to leave stones, lime, timber, rubbish, dead horses, or other animals, or other nuisances, upon the streets and highways, so as to obstruct a free passage; and every person offending in the premises shall forfeit not exceeding Twenty Shillings, and not less than Five Shillings sterling, for each offence.

Sect. 8. The driver of every such loaded horse or other beast of burden, and the driver of every cart, &c. or the like carriage, and every coach, &c. and such like carriage, shall be obliged, on meeting another loaded horse or carriage, to make way, by holding to his own left hand, or to the near side; and every person offending in the premises shall forfeit not exceeding Twenty Shillings, and not less

than Five Shillings sterling.

REGULATIONS, &c:

At Dundee, the second day of July, Eighteen hundred and seven years; which day the Provost, Magistrates, and remanent Members of the Town Council of Dundee, being met and convened in Council, consulting about the ordinary affairs of the Burgh; when the Committee, to whom it was remitted to make out Regulations for the Carters employed within this Burgh, reported that they had accordingly met for that purpose, and they submitted the following Regulations to the Council.

I. Every person who is employed as a Carter, shall, before he is allowed to work within this Town and

Suburbs, apply to the Magistrates to be enrolled; who, upon finding him a proper person to be admitted, shall appoint him to be booked in a register to be kept by the Town-Clerks for that purpose; for which he shall pay the fees of One Shilling of admission-money, and Eighteen-pence for his Badge or Ticket; and which he shall constantly wear upon the breast of his upper coat when he is in employment, under the penalty of Two Shillings and Sixpence sterling for each time he shall be found not wearing his Badge or Ticket as aforesaid, or not having a copy of these Regulations to show to his employers when demanded.

II. All Carters so admitted as aforesaid, shall assemble at proper hours, with their Horses and Carts, in the public Fish-market of this Burgh, which is the Stand appointed by the Magistrates for that purpose. And whenever such Carter is desired to work, he shall be obliged to serve directly, at the ordinary Fares after-mentioned, under the penalty of being struck out of the roll, and dismissed from his employment, or suffer such other punishment as the

Magistrates shall be pleased to inflict.

III. The first Carter who appears at his Stand shall be the first employed, and the public shall take him in preference to any other.

All cattle, sheep, calves, swine, or other bestial, coming from the muir at the town's fair, or going to or coming from the markets, and passing through the town, shall not pay custom either at port or craig.

The goods before-mentioned, brought into the town, are to pay at port what comes in by land, and what comes in by water at the craig there, or where it lands; and the said custom to be doubled at the Lady Mary fair.

All victual exported by sea, to pay for each boll, by freemen 2 pennies, and by unfreemen 4 pennies.

That after the custom is exacted at the port, craig, or other places, the same pay no custom at the cross, or elsewhere.

That no corns whatsoever pay custom, except what are bought and sold.

That the customers be obliged to maintain and uphold all the weights and measures, and from year to year they be restored and delivered to the succeeding customers in as good case and condition as they received the same.

That all victual imported by sea to this burgh upon unfreemen's risk, shall pay the same dues as victual imported by unfreemen, with 8 pennies Scots for each boll thereof to the tacksman of the customs, besides the shore-dues. In case it shall be found that any person or persons shall bring in goods liable in payment of custom, by bye-ways, or at any other place than the ports or craig, the said goods

shall be liable in triple custom, and the inbringers thereof punished as the Magistrates shall think fit.

That the inhabitants of the Hill-town pay the ladles for what share they get of any bargain of victual any of the trades of Dundee buy, as well as the members of the trades in this burgh do.

All wood, barks, and limestone, coming down the river from Perth, or other places to the westward, and landing at the craig, or any other part of the shore, in open boats, the customs thereof shall belong to the tacksman of the craig customs: That any of the said goods, or any butter, cheese, or oil, coming up the river from the north country in open boats, and landing at the craig, or any other part of the shore, shall belong to the tacksman of the customs at the Cowgate and Seagate ports: And that the customs of any of the said goods coming either up or down the river in full-decked vessels, and landing at any part of the shore, shall belong to the tacksman of the shore-dues.

All articles coming into town, though not mentioned in the above table, to pay petty customs after the rate, and in proportion to the articles above stated.

POLICE,

TO BE

OBSERVED WITHIN THE BURGH OF DUNDEE.

- 1. THAT riddling of ashes shall be positively discharged, and the offender fined in 1s. sterling for each transgression, and their riddles taken from them.
- 2. That no person whatever, after the hour of six in the morning, from the first of March to the first of September; and after the hour of eight o'clock in the morning, from the first of September to the first of March, shall lay down, or carry out, foul water, ashes, or any filth whatever, under the penalty of 1s. sterling for the first transgression, and 2s. 6d. sterling for the second.
- 3. That the whole inhabitants shall be expressly debarred from laying down, or carrying out, any-filth or nastiness upon the Saturday nights, but are to carry out the same on the Friday night, or Saturday morning, under the penalty of 1s. sterling for the first transgression, and 2s. 6d. for the second.

- 4. That no nuisance shall be laid down in any strand, or water-run, or upon any part of the pavement, or plainstones, under the penalty of 2s. 6d. for each transgression; and the Council prohibit, at all times, the shaking of carpets, floor-cloths, bed-curtains, and cloths of every kind, over windows, doors, or stairs, and not on the street, after the hour of seven o'clock in the morning, from the first of March to the first of September, in summer; and after the hour of nine o'clock in the morning, from the first of September to the first of March, in winter: and emptying chaff-beds, or laying down soot, upon any part of the streets, lanes, or wynds, is expressly prohibited, under the like penalty.
- 5. As timber water-spouts for conveying nuisances from houses, have, by experience, been found to have been inconvenient to the neighbourhood, and extremely prejudicial to the walls and foundations of the houses, the whole water-spouts in the houses on the streets, lanes, and closses, are hereby, without exception, prohibited, and appointed to be taken away, under the penalty of 10s. sterling.
 - 6. Nuisances are discharged to be thrown from any window, or street-door, or any stair, under the penalties after mentioned, viz. For the first fault, 2s. 6d.; for the second fault, 5s.; for the third and every other offence, twenty-four hours imprisonment, and 10s. sterling, to be paid by the possessors of the houses, or the persons who actually throw over, without prejudice to any person who may be thereby aggrieved, to sue for indemnification as accords.
 - 7. That keeping dung in closses, or any part within the royalty, is strictly prohibited, and that under

the penalty of L.5 sterling for each offence. All dung thrown out upon the street, belonging to stablers or cow-feeders, must be carried off by seven o'clock in the morning in summer, and eight o'clock in the morning in winter, under the penalty of 10s. sterling for each transgression.

- 8. That no mason shall hew stones on the streets, without a special permission from a Magistrate in writing, under the penalty of 10s. sterling for each transgression. And every person who shall bring out into the street any rubbish or earth, dug out of the foundation of any house, shall be obliged to carry off the same directly, and the street be cleared of every incumbrance, under the like penalty of 10s. sterling for each transgression.
- 9. That no carts shall be allowed to stand upon the public streets, or lanes, unyoked, after sun-set, under the penalty of 2s. 6d. sterling for each transgression.
- of Dundee, shall not, on any consideration, take down any house in any street, close, or lane, in this burgh, before an application is first made by him to the Dean of Guild, stating the plan he means to adopt in his new building; and that this application be intimated to the immediate conterminous heritors, and a visitation of the Court take place, under the penalty of L.3 sterling for each transgression.
- 11. The Council prohibits proprietors, or landlords, from letting their houses to strangers, without a certificate of their former good behaviour, under a penalty of L. 1 sterling.

- of Dundee, often neglect to keep the vents of their houses properly cleaned, which may be attended with dangerous consequences, by their vents going on fire; that therefore the possessors of the houses whose vents shall go on fire, shall be fined in a penalty of 5s. for the first, and 1cs. sterling for every other transgression.
- 13. That no person shall be allowed to interrupt the street, or any part of the pavement, with goods before their shop-doors, under the penalty of 10s. sterling.
- 14. That proprietors of houses and shops within this burgh, shall, upon all occasions, have the pavement opposite to their property kept in proper repair, under a penalty of L.5 sterling; besides, that the Magistrates shall have it in their power to order such pavement to be immediately repaired, at the expence of such proprietor neglecting to do so, upon a summary complaint at the instance of the Procurator-fiscal.

Mr Gauld, Teacher of Arithmetic, Book-keeping, Geography, English Composition, History, Logic, and Moral Philosophy.

M. Legendre, Teacher of the French, Spanish, German, and Italian Languages.

Mr Mudie, Teacher of Writing and Drawing.

The whole course of education is finished in two Sessions of ten months each. The Session begins

in October, and ends in July.

During the first Session the pupils attend Mr Duncan for mathematics, in the various branches of theory and practice, viz. geometry, plane and solid; plane trigonometry, with its application to heights, distances, levelling, and navigation; mensuration of surfaces and solids, with the application to land surveying, guaging, &c.; the method of representing

solids by sections and projection; fortification; algebra, with its application to interest, annuities, and geometry. They likewise attend Mr Gauld for arithmetic and book-keeping in all the parts both of theory and practice, English composition, and geography. They are two hours a-day with Mr Dun-

can, and other two with Mr Gauld.

During the second Session they attend Mr Duncan chiefly for natural philosophy and chemistry.— In a few weeks they finish the remainder of mathe. matics, viz. conic sections and spherical trigonometry. They may have a course of fluxious if the class contain a sufficient number of young men of talent to render it advisable. They proceed to natural philosophy, which occupies them about seven months, and includes the various branches of-general laws of motion; statics; dynamics; laws of gravity near the surface of the earth; collision of bodies; mechanics, properly so called; hydrostatics; hydraulics; pneumatics; optics; electricity; magnetism; and astronomy, with its application to dialling and navigation. They employ the rest of the Session in chemistry. During the same year the pupils attend Mr Gauld for a revisal and extension of the branches of the former Session; and also for civil history, moral philosophy, and logic. This class is also two hours a-day with Mr Duncan, and other two with Mr Gauld.

During either, or each Session, the pupils may attend M. Legendre, for the French, German, Spanish, or Italian language; and Mr Mudie for writing

and drawing.

The various parts of mathematics, natural philosophy, and chemistry, are illustrated by experiments with a suitable apparatus.

DUNDEE DISTRICT;

Comprehending the parishes of Dundee, Mains and Strathmartine, Monikie, Monifieth, Murroes, Barry, Panbride, Auchterhouse, Tealing, Liff and Benvie,

Meets within the Town-Hall of Dundee, on Monday, once in the fortnight, at eleven o'clock forenoon.

The acting Justices of the Peace, Judges; any

WILLIAM CHALMERS, Esq. Principal Clerk. Mr Alex. Christie, Depute Clerk. The parties are heard viva voce, either by themselves or any one in the family; but no practitioner of the law is allowed to plead for them.

The Court cannot sustain actions for spirituous liquors; nor any debt for rent upon a tack or lease, or real contract, where the written titles can or may come to be brought in question; nor to any heritable or moveable question where there is a regular deed; nor for gambling debts.

Six days after sentence is pronounced, the decree can be put in force by poinding or imprisonment, when parties are present in Court; but in the case of a decree in absence, a charge of six free days must take place before putting the sentence in force.

The sentence is not subject to advocation, suspension, or any other stay of execution, except when the Justices exceed their powers—in which case the cause must be brought in the shape of a reduction before the Supreme Court; and the party bringing it must find sufficient caution for all expences that may be awarded in the event of his reduction being dismissed.

Where decree has passed in absence, the defender shall be re-heard on consigning the sums decerned for in the hands of the Clerk of Court, within the days of the charge, and giving intimation thereof to the complainer before the following Court day—And

In like manner where absolutor has passed in absence, the cause to be re-heard on the complainer consigning 25. 6d. and giving intimation to the defender.

Form of the Oath taken by a Justice of Peace, at his admission.

I A. B. swear, that as a Justice of Peace, within the County of Forfar, in all the articles of the King's Commission to me directed, I shall do equal right to poor and rich, after my cunning, wit and power, and after the Laws and Customs of this realm, and Statutes thereof made; I shall not be of council with any person, in any quarrel depending before me, and that I shall hold the Sessions after the form of the Statutes thereof made: and the issues, fines, and amerciaments, that happen to be made, and forfeitures that shall fall before me, I shall cause to be entered, without concealment, or embezzling, and truly send them to the King's Exchequer: I shall not let for gift, or other cause, but well and truly I shall do the office of a Justice of Peace in that behalf; and that I shall take nothing for my office of Justice of Peace to be done, but of the King, and fees accustomed, and costs limited by the Statute: I shall not direct, or cause to be directed, any warrant by me to be made, to the parties; but I shall direct them to Bailies of the said county, or other of the King's officers, or ministers, or other indifferent persons, to do execution thereof. So help me GoD.

The out-patients since the opening of the Infirmary, in the spring of 1798, amount to 14,530;

which, added to the number of patients in the Dispensary that preceded the Infirmary, makes a total of 22,696. The in-patients of the Infirmary, since its opening, amount to 1335.

The property belonging to the Governors of the Infirmary consists of the fabric itself, its furniture, and the contiguous enclosed ground; which, together with what the Infirmary is built on, makes about half an acre; and L.700 lent out at five percent.

For the benefit of those out-patients who are confined to their own houses, the town and suburbs have been divided into the following districts.

First District, under the charge of Mr Lyon Alexander—From Perth Road Toll to Tay Street, and southward of the Hawkhill Road.

Second District, under charge of Mr Alexander Bell—From Perth Road Toll to Tay Street, northward of the Hawkhill Road, including Scouringburn and all the adjacent buildings.

Third District, under charge of Mr P. Nimmo—From Tay Street to the Wellgate, including the Overgate, north side of the High Street, and north side of the Murraygate.

Fourth District, under charge of Mr John Crichton—From Tay Street to St. Andrew's Street, including the Nethergate, Shore, south side of the High Street, Seagate, and south side of the Murraygate.

Fifth District, under charge of Mr Andrew Willison-From St. Andrew's Street to Lilybank and Bottlework, including Dens, Bucklemaker Wynd, Forebank, and Blackscroft.

Sixth District, under charge of Dr Huie—From Murraygate to the top of the Bonnet Hill, east side only.

Seventh District, under charge of Mr William Dick—From Dudhope Wynd to Butterburn, on the west side of the Hill only.

Eighth District, under charge of Mr James Stewart and Mr William Hogg—From top of the Wellgate west to Culloden, the whole of the Chapelshade, Dalfield, and Rosebank.

The following extract from the Regulations of the Dundee Infirmary, shows the conditions upon which individuals and soeicties may be permanently or occasionally connected with it, as Governors, or as having a right to recommend out-patients.

- 1. Every person or society subscribing one guinea per annum, shall be a Governor, and entitled to have two out-patients constantly on the medical or chirurgical lists, and one in-patient in the year; and in case of a greater subscription, a proportionable number.
- 2. Every person or society subscribing half-aguinea per annum, shall be entitled to have one outpatient constantly on the medical or chirurgical list; but shall not be considered as a Governor, or be entitled to vote at any general meeting.

- 3. Every person subscribing ten guineas, or making up his contribution in any one year to that sum, shall be a Governor for life, and entitled to all the advantages of an annual subscriber of one guinea.
- 4. Every person subscribing twenty guineas at onetime, shall have the same privileges as an annual subscriber of one guinea, he and his heirs for ever; or, in his option, the same privileges during life as an annual subscriber of two guineas.
- entitled for life to the same privileges as an annual subscriber of half-a-guinea; and upon subscribing half-a-guinea per annum, shall be a Governor, and entitled to all the privileges of an annual subscriber of one guinea.
- 6. Every corporation, parish, or society, which shall contribute ten guineas to this charity at one-time, shall be entitled to all the privileges of an annual subscriber of one guinea during the life of the person who shall be deacon, minister, preses, or box-master, of such corporation, parish, or society; but the option must be made at the time the money is paid. And for all smaller sums, the same privileges shall be enjoyed for a proportional time.
- 7. Every corporation, parish, or society, which shall contribute twenty guineas at one time, shall be entitled in all time coming to the same privileges as an annual subscriber of one guinea.

It is to be observed, that notwithstanding these regulations, the Infirmary is open to receive all persons who may meet with dangerous accidents in the town or neighbourhood, making instant chirurgical aid necessary, although there be no recommendation from a Governor accompanying the patient.

ORPHAN INSTITUTION.

The Orphan Institution, established in 1815, (designed as an asylum for the destitute orphan, and likewise to afford a plain and suitable eduction to the children of such families as might be in truly needy circumstances), owes its origin, not to the influence of any individual, but to the benevolence of an enlightened and discerning population. The first traces of it are to be found in notices published in the local newspapers, and circulated in handbills:— a plan at the same time was submitted to the test of public opinion before an attempt should be made to procure subscription.—The general outline was so much approved, that a large subscription was procured with little difficulty.

Those more actively concerned then ventured to call a meeting of the subscribers on the 8th of June, 1815—when to them was submitted the plan of the Institution, which met their unanimous approbation, as the basis of the future operations of the Directors, who were also chosen at this meeting from among the subscribers.

The boys are taught English grammatically, writing, and the first rules of arithmetic.

The girls—English, writing, a little arithmetic, sewing and knitting. The orphan girls residing in the orphan house are also taught spinning, washing,

and other domestic operations as may tend to fit them for becoming expert and useful servants.

The funds of the institution are supported by voluntary subscriptions, donations, legacies, collections at the churches and chapels, &c.—And in the whole establishment the greatest economy is attempted to be combined with the greatest utility.
