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THE following pages have grown out of the author's search for the ancestry of his great grandfather, Thomas Barchay, of St. Mary's County, Maryland. The interesting matter that came to his notice during the course of that search invited frequent digressions from his own line, until his notes were charged with a variety of material which he felt should be preserved in some permanent form. He accordingly determined to print privately and at his own expense what appears in the following pages; but so many requests have come to him for copies of the book that he has recently decided to place it upon the market at somewhat less than cost, and thus make it readily accessible to all who care for it.

He is conscious that in a work of this kind, to which he has been able to give only his leisure hours, errors are bound to creep in,—particularly in tables of descent where it is sought to make a record of precise dates of birth, death and marriage; and he earnestly invites the correction of errors and the supplying of omitted names and dates.

He wishes, too, to express his thanks to the many who have aided him with the material used, and in particular to express his appreciation of the courtesy shown him by Mr. ROBERT H. Kelby, the librarian of the New York Historical Society, by Mr. Beale, the Register of the Friends Records in Eustace Street, Dublin, and by the Officials of the Record Office in Dublin.

### PART I.

A Mistaken Tradition.—Testimony of the Records of East New Jersey.

TRADITION has been seriously entertained by many of the descendants of Rev. Thomas Barclay, the first rector of St. Peter's at Albany, that they are of Ury stock. Their ancestor, the Rev. Thomas, they assert, was the son of John Barclay of Ury who settled in East New Jersey in 1684, married (according to the tradition) one "Cornelia Van Schaick," and died there in 1731,—the issue of such union being the same Thomas Barclay who in 1708 appeared as a catechist among the Indians on the upper Hudson, and subsequently became more widely known as the first rector of St. Peter's at Albany.

The public and private records, the old letters and the documents which have come to the notice of the writer in tracing his own line of descent, have borne such convincing testimony to the inaccuracy of the tradition that he has felt impelled to lay before those who may be interested the facts which in his judgment wholly disprove the claim that Rev. Thomas Barclay of St. Peter's was of the Ury family.

John Barclay, who settled in East New Jersey in 1684, was the second son of Col. David Barclay of Ury. The father had served with distinction in the Thirty Years War as a follower of Gustavus Adolphus, and had borne arms in the civil wars at home. On December 24th, 1647, he married Lady Katharine Gordon, known as the "White Rose of Scotland," and about a year later (in 1648) purchased from William, Earl of Mareschal, the estate of *Ury* in the County of Kincardine, Scotland. In 1679, under charter from the crown, this estate and some neighboring estates which were also owned by Col. David, were united into the "Barony of Ury." Until some time preceding the purchase of Ury and for a period of more than five hundred years, the family had owned and been identified with the estate of Mathers; but through financial stress Col. David Barclay's father had been forced to part with this ancient holding, and the family

later became more widely known as the "Barclays of Ury," although sometimes designated as "of Mathers and Ury."

In 1666 Col. David joined the Society of Friends and as a consequence was subjected to persecution, imprisonment and frequent indignities. He is described "as proper tall a person-"age of a man as could be seen among thousands. His hair "white as the flax, but quite bald upon the top of his head, which "obliged him to wear commonly a black satin cap under his hat." He died in 1686 and was buried near Ury on the 12th of October of that year.<sup>1</sup>

Three sons and two daughters were born to Col. David Barclay, and Lady Katharine Gordon, his wife:

ROBERT, born 1648, the "Apologist;"

Lucy, died 1686, unmarried;

JEAN, married Sir Ewen Cameron, of Lochiel;

JOHN, born 1659, who migrated to East New Jersey; and DAVID, his youngest son, who died at sea, unmarried.

The migration of John Barclay to America was doubtless due, in part at any rate, to the life appointment of his older brother, Robert, as governor of the then proprietary province of East New Jersey. Robert did not come out to America, nor did John come out as his deputy; but, in the earlier days of his residence in the province, John Barclay was prominent in its affairs and seems, so long as he remained an orthodox Quaker, to have stood in close relations with his family in Scotland. With the change of faith, however, which we read of within the few years following his settlement at Perth Amboy, an estrangement from his family followed (for religious tolerance was but little known in those days, and as little among the Quakers as among others), and John Barclay seems soon to have lost that influence and prestige which his birth and family connections would naturally have secured for him and for his descendants.

The part he played in the affairs of the province may perhaps be the better appreciated if the relation of the province to the mother country be made plain at the outset.

It was on August 27, 1664, that the English captured New Amsterdam from the Dutch; but even prior to such capture, and

in confident anticipation thereof, King Charles II had granted the entire province to his brother James, Duke of York, and he in turn had divided the territory so granted and had conveyed to Lord John Berkeley and to Sir George Carteret all that portion of the province which was bounded on the east by the Hudson River, on the west by the Delaware River, and on the north by a line drawn from river to river at about the 41st parallel of latitude. Both Lord John Berkeley (who was a brother of Sir William Berkeley, more widely known as the Governor of Virginia from 1660 to 1677), and Sir George Carteret had been distinguished and steadfast loyalists during the civil wars; and out of compliment to Carteret, who as Governor of the little island of Jersey in the British Channel had been the last commander during such wars to lower the royal flag, the tract so granted was named New Jersey.

In the year following the capture of New Amsterdam, Philip Carteret, a kinsman of Sir George, was granted a governor's commission and sailed for the province accompanied by a number of colonists. He landed at the spot soon afterwards called *Elizabethtown*, in honor of Lady Carteret, and there he established the seat of government.

The Dutch recaptured the province in 1673; but upon the conclusion of peace on February 9th, 1674, the English title to the soil was finally recognized and New Jersey reverted to its English proprietors. Lord John Berkeley, however, retained his share of the province for scarcely thirty days after the conclusion of peace. On March 18th, 1674, he sold his entire undivided interest in the province for the sum of £1,000, to one John Fenwick, a Quaker, who acquired such interest for himself and for another Ouaker, named Edward Billings. Two years later, in July, 1676, Carteret and Fenwick agreed upon a formal partition of their holding, and an imaginary line was thereupon drawn from the shore of the ocean at Little Egg Harbor to the northwestern corner of the province. The portion lying to the northerly and easterly of this line, thereafter known as East New Jersey, became the separate property of Carteret, while the remaining portion, subsequently known as West New Jersey, was divided between its Ouaker proprietors. Our interest in this sketch is centred in the first-mentioned portion.

Philip Carteret, on behalf of his kinsman, Sir George, resumed the administration of the government of East New Jersey, and such tract being regarded as a separate province, was divided into four counties, Bergen, Essex, Middlesex and Monmouth. Somerset County was the next created,—in 1688.

Sir George Carteret lived but a few years after the establishment of East New Jersey, and upon his death left the entire province to the trustees of his estate. They offered it for sale, and in 1682 it was purchased by a company of twelve Quakers, of whom William Penn is now the most widely known. These twelve purchasers associated with themselves twelve others, most of whom, but not all, were both Scotchmen and Quakers, and the twenty-four proprietors, for further assurance, obtained from the Duke of York on the 13th of March, 1683, a new patent of the province, issued directly to themselves. The early history of the province was marked with no little friction between those who administered its affairs on behalf of the proprietors and those who sought to do so on behalf of the Crown; and finally and in 1702 the government of the province was duly ccdcd by the proprietors to the Crown.

Among the twenty-four proprietors to whom the patent of March 13th, 1683, was issued as above mentioned, was Robert Barclay, the eldest son of Col. David Barclay and Lady Katharine Gordon. It is he who has added the greatest lustre to the Barclay name, through his famous "Apology for the True Christian Divinity" which he wrote, and in 1675, when but twenty-seven years of age, presented to King Charles II. Although chosen by the proprietors to be governor of the province for life, Robert Barclay never came to America, but entrusted the actual administration of its affairs to one Gawen Laurie, whom he appointed to the office of deputy governor. The younger brothers, however, John and David, both came to the province, unmarried. David died at sea on his second voyage out, while John, very shortly after his arrival, settled in Perth Amboy, where he died in 1731.

What has thus far been written is conceded by all. It is here that the tradition referred to, on the one hand, and the public and private records to be cited below, on the other hand, bear widely divergent testimony. The *tradition* is best told, perhaps,

in the words of Mr. George L. Rives, in his work entitled "Correspondence of Thomas Barclay" (New York: Harper & Brothers, 1894), wherein he has edited sundry letters of the first British Consul General in New York, who was a grandson of Rev. Thomas Barclay of Albany.

"About 1685," writes Mr. Rives, without, however, giving any authority for the selection of such year, "he (John Barclay) "married a lady whose name alone is sufficient evidence of her "descent. She was Cornelia Van Schaick" (citing Holgate's American Genealogies, published 1851, where not even the suggestion of an authority for such alleged marriage is given), "a "member, it would seem, of the extensive Van Schaick family of "Albany." Mr. Rives then refers to John Barclay's conversion to the Church of England as having occurred prior to 1702, and states that an English clergyman, Rev. Thorowgood Moore, had officiated in Perth Amboy sometime between 1702 and 1707, and that, prior to his appearance in Perth Amboy, Mr. Moore had been a missionary at Albany and among the Indians.

"We may well suppose," Mr. Rives thereupon argues, "that "he (Moore) did not fail when he found a likely young man "with a vocation for the ministry, to urge the noble work that "might be done on the wild frontier about the head waters of "the Hudson River. Whether Mr. Moore did indeed find such "a young man at Perth Amboy, and whether he did influence the "course of his career, must remain a conjecture; but certain it is," Mr. Rives asseverates, "that Thomas Barclay, a son of John Bar-"clay, went carly in the cighteenth century to England, took "orders, and was in due time sent, in his turn, by the Society as "Missionary at Albany and among the Indians. He seems to "have reached Albany in 1707 or 1708."

Mr. Rives next seems to think that the fact that the church at Albany bore the same name as the church at Perth Amboy, "St. Peters," is possessed of some significance in view of Rev. Thomas Barclay having been the first rector of the Albany parish. But Mr. Rives has evidently overlooked the fact that the patent was issued for St. Peter's at Albany in 1714, while St. Peter's at Perth Amboy was not chartered until 1718; and the name of the former church, consequently, could hardly have been selected out of any sentimental regard on the part of its rector for the Perth

Amboy parish, which was not even called into being until four years after the establishment of the Albany Church.

Quite apart from what is shown by the records, referred to below, the probabilities are all against the alleged marriage between John Barclay and Cornelia Van Schaick. The Van Schaicks of colonial days were well known. Two separate families of that name were early settlers on the upper Hudson, of one of which Goosen Gerritse Van Schaick was the head, and of the other, Claes Van Schaick.<sup>2</sup> The line of descent from each of these heads is well known, and is available to all who would consult it; yet no such marriage can be found in the records of either line. It is true that a Cornelia Van Schaick, born 1670, is mentioned in those records; but her marriage also is chronicled there as occurring in 1690 to Johannes Pluvier.<sup>3</sup> The only other Cornelia Van Schaick appearing in either line was a daughter of Claes Van Schaick; and she was not born until 1710.

It is hardly probable that if, as has been claimed, John Barclay ever married into this family, all knowledge of such fact would have escaped the students of the Van Schaick genealogy, when we consider not only the prominence of the family from which John Barclay came, but also the prominence of Rev. Thomas Barclay (who by the same tradition is claimed to have been his son), and the subsequent social distinction of many of Rev. Thomas Barclay's descendants.

Nor is it likely that such a marriage would have occurred unnoticed at a time when the feeling between those of differing religious views was as bitter as we know it to have been toward the close of the 17th century. The Van Schaicks were closely identified with the Dutch Church of the day, and John Barclay up to 1692, certainly, was a prominent and earnest Quaker. If any such marriage occurred, of which Rev. Thomas Barclay was (as is claimed) the issue, it could hardly have occurred later than 1687; for in 1708 Rev. Thomas Barclay had taken orders in the established church and was engaged in his mission at Albany. He must certainly have been at least twenty-one years of age when ordained; and even were he ordained at once upon attaining

his majority and during the very year in which he came out to Albany, his birth could not have occurred later than 1687. The supposed marriage, therefore, between John Barclay and Cornelia Van Schaick must have occurred, if at all, in or prior to the year 1687.

There is no record of such marriage in any Dutch Church of which the marriage records have been preserved; and neither mention of marriage nor reference to any wife or son of John Barclay can be found in the records of the Ouaker meeting which was inaugurated at Ambov on August 3rd, 1686. The original records of that meeting are preserved in Plainfield, New Jersey, the meeting having moved in 1689 from Amboy to Woodbridge, and later to Rahway and thence to Plainfield. Such records show that from 1686 to 1689 (when the records were discontinued until 1704), John Barclay was an active member of the meeting. The marriages of other Friends which occurred during those years were noted, as well as the birth of children to sundry members of the meeting; but no mention is made of John Barclay having married, or of any son having been born to him, nor is there any fact stated from which it could properly be inferred that he was a married man during any portion of those three years. In Appendix A, hereunto annexed, will be found sundry extracts from the records of the Amboy Monthly Meeting.

At some time during the fifteen years which intervened between 1689 and 1704, when, as has been stated, the keeping of the records of this meeting was discontinued, John Barclay seems to have left the Society of Friends and gone over to the Church of England. He was undoubtedly influenced to this course by George Keith, by whom, as we shall see below, he had been appointed deputy surveyor of the province in the year 1688. Nor is it at all unlikely that such departure from the testimonies of his father and brother served in some measure to estrange him from his family; for we find that in 1701 his nephew, Robert Barclay, then the head of the family at Ury, appointed others in the province to be his attorneys-in-fact, and that John Barclay from that time forward does not seem to have acted on behalf of any of his Scottish kinsmen.

George Keith was and for many years had been a most ardent preacher among the Quakers; but differing with many of the leaders, whom he publicly charged with deism, he gradually became the head of a sect or faction, and in 1692 was formally disowned by the main body of Friends. In 1694 he went to England and laid his case before the London Yearly Meeting, as a sort of an appeal from Philadelphia. It is said that this is the only instance of such an appeal having been taken. The London Meeting approved the disownment,<sup>4</sup> and shortly thereafter Keith took orders in the Established Church.<sup>5</sup>

John Barclay was undoubtedly a member of the Keithian party; for a careful search of the records of the Woodbridge Monthly Meeting from 1704 (when the keeping of records was resumed) until long subsequently to the year of his death, 1731, fails to disclose the mention of his name. Nor in the register of the births of the children of Friends, which seems to have been most carefully kept by this meeting from 1705 down, was there a single record of a Barclay born; nor in the register similarly kept of the decease of Friends, did the name Barclay occur until as late as 1862.

It is possible and even probable that those members of the Amboy-Woodbridge Meeting who followed Keith from 1689 to 1694, held a monthly meeting of their own and kept their separate records of marriages, births and deaths. In an undated letter to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel (written probably in England between 1694 and 1702) Keith stated that those of the Quakers in America who had joined him held their separate meetings, and that in 1694 when he sailed for England he left fourteen or fifteen different meetings of his adherents scattered through East and West Jersey and Pennsylvania. One writer states that on the present site of the old Topanemus burying ground (near Marlboro, New Jersey), there stood a Scotch and English Quaker Meeting House, which, through the labors of George Keith, later became the place of worship of the congregation now known as St. Peter's Protestant Episcopal Church of

Freehold, N. J.;<sup>7</sup> and it is stated that John Barclay was one of those interested and active in its erection. The rector of St. Peter's in 1897 informed the writer that no parish records were extant, antedating 1824, although the parish had been chartered as a part of the Colonial Anglican Church in 1731. If such a meeting were in fact held there, it yet remains for someone to locate the records of such meeting, if they still be extant, and to give them to the world. The most diligent inquiry on the part of the writer has failed to discover them.

With the conversion of their leader to the Church of England, the adherents of Keith soon lost their identity as a separate sect; and many of those who had been identified with him in the controversy, followed him into the Established Church. Among such, in all probability, was John Barclay.

In April, 1702, Keith came back to America on a mission tour for the church in which he had been ordained, and remained here until August, 1704. He made many converts and founded numerous societies which subsequently developed into church organizations.

It is believed that most of the meetings of the so-called "Christian Quakers," which he had organized between his disownment in Philadelphia in 1792 and his sailing for England in 1794, became, when not wholly disrupted by his subsequent change of faith, the kernels out of which sundry Baptist churches subsequently grew.

Shortly after his return to England he published, in 1706, a "Narrative" of his "Travels, Services and Successes," which may be found in several of the larger libraries. It has been republished in more readable form in the "Collections of the Protestant Episcopal Historical Society for the year 1851," above cited. Only two extracts from his Narrative, however, are of interest in this sketch. They are as follows:

"1702: Oct. 3, Sunday. I preached at Amboy in East Jersey; the Auditory was small; My text was Tit. 2, 11, 12. But such as were there were well affected; some of them, of my former Acquaintance, and others who had been formerly Quakers but were come over to the Church, particularly Miles Forster and John Barclay (Brother to Robert Barclay who published the Apology for the Quakers) the Place has very few Inhabi-

tants. We were several Days Kindly entertained by Miles Forster at his House there."

"April 26, 1704. I sailed down Maryland Bay to Virginia, in Captain Pulman's Ship, who very kindly entertained me and Mr. John Barclay, my good Friend with me; He, in true Love and Affection, travelled with me from his dwelling House at Amboy in East Jersey, to James River in Virginia and he staid with me until he saw me aboard the ship, June 8, where we took our Farewell."

The above are the only records that have come to the writer's notice that bear in any way upon John Barclay's change of faith. There is much to be wished for touching the details of that change; but records will doubtless be found hereafter which may establish more clearly his religious associations until the issuing of a charter to St. Pcter's Church in Amboy, on the 30th of July, 1718. In and by that charter, John Barclay was constituted junior warden; and, as the vestry records show, he was elected and re-elected warden at the meetings of March 31, 1719; April 18, 1720; April 11, 1721; and March 27, 1722. On September 23, 1728, he was chosen clerk to the corporation of St. Peter's, and on March 31, 1730, was elected vestryman. On April 20, 1731, he was re-elected vestryman; but no further mention of his name is found in the vestry minutes. His death occurred prior to December 31st of that year, as the records of "The General Proprietors of the Eastern Division of New Jersey" bear witness.9

While the vestry minutes of St. Peter's at Amboy are preserved, it is a matter of much regret that its earlier parish records have been lost; and yet as the church was not established until 1718, it is doubtful whether, even were these parish records extant, they would throw much if any light on the questions that interest us here, namely, the marriage and issue of John Barclay. The records at Perth Amboy of the General Proprietors permit, as it seems to the writer, but a single line of inferences, to wit, that John Barclay was not married until somewhere between 1696 and 1699; that his wife's name was not Cornelia, but Katharine;

that his wife died either in 1702 or in 1703; and that he had but one son whom he named John.

These inferences as to the year of his marriage, as to his wife's Christian name, and as to the time of her death, are drawn from the fact that in all the deeds which are on record as having been executed by John Barclay between 1686 and 1731,—and there are a number of them,—no wife joins with him in a single transfer except in those executed between September, 1696, and March, 1704. During that period three deeds were executed and recorded, the first on December 23rd, 1699, the second on September 12th, 1700, and the third on December 17th, 1701; and in each of them the grantors were "John Barclay, of Amboy, Gentleman, and Katharine, his wife." In a deed executed by him on September 15th, 1696, no wife had joined; and a decd executed on March 14th, 1704, was also, as were all subsequent deeds, executed by John Barclay alone. While the presumption arising from these facts is not conclusive, as proving that somewhere between September 15th, 1696, and December 23rd, 1699, John Barclay married a woman whose Christian name was Katharine, and that such wife died somewhere between December 17th, 1701 (the date of the last deed in which she joined), and March 14th, 1704 (the date of the next deed executed by him), the presumption is nevertheless warranted; and until stronger proof to the contrary is adduced, the evidence afforded by these records should be taken as establishing the three facts stated.<sup>10</sup>

The inference as to John Barclay's having a son John, is supported by the record of a deed executed in 1724 to John Barclay, Jr., of Freehold; by the direct statement contained in the record of administration on John Barclay's estate, that "John Barclay, his son and heir," requested that administration should be granted to William Bradford; and by the fact that nearly three years after the grant of such administration, a deed was recorded of a grant of land to "John Barclay of the County of Middlesex."

The following is a brief chronological summary of the records of the General Proprietors of the Eastern Division of

New Jersey, in which John Barclay appears either as grantor or as grantee, with a reference to the volumes and pages where such records may respectively be found. There is also noted the record of administration on his estate.

- 1684 July 10. Deed from ROBERT BARCLAY of Ury, to JOHN BARCLAY his brother, of 500 acres in East Jersey, called "Plainfield." (Referred to in Liber G., p. 97.)
- 1685 Jan. 18. Patent to John Barclay of lands in Plainfield. (Referred to in Liber D., p. 12.)
- 1686 Mch. 8. Deed from DAVID BARCLAY of Ury, and Robert his eldest son, to John Barclay of Amboy.

### PART II.

A Mistaken Tradition, Continued.—Testimony of the Records at Bury Hill, Surrey.

NOTHER circumstance that tends strongly to disprove the tradition of a descent of Rev. Thomas Barclay from the Barclays of Ury, is the fact that in the early part of the 19th century a search was made by the family at Bury Hill, Surrey, for the then living descendants of John Barclay who migrated to East New Jersey and died there in 1731; and correspondence was had with many of those descendants and they were recognized as such and their names were recorded in the family genealogy, whereas the descendants of Rev. Thomas, although occupying high social position in and about New York, and although in some instances personally known to those of the family at Bury Hill who were conducting the search, were not recognized as descendants of John of East New Jersey and were not recorded in the genealogical plan of the Barclays of Ury.

The search was made and the correspondence had under the following circumstances:

Robert Barclay, the apologist,—(the elder brother of John of East New Jersey),—died on October 3rd, 1690, and the estate of Ury thereupon passed to his eldest son, also named Robert, who was eighteen years of age at the time. This son, Robert, on October 9th, 1722, executed a "disposition and deed of entail,"— (recorded in the register of tailzies in Scotland on February 6th, 1723),—whereby he settled the entire estate, or Barony, of Ury on (1) Robert Barclay, his eldest son and the heirs male lawfully to be procreated of his body; failing which, then on (2) David Barclay, the entailer's second son, and the heirs male of his body; which failing, then on (3) the heirs male to be procreated of his own (the entailer's) body; which failing, then on (4) David Barclay, the entailer's brother, and the heirs male of his body; which failing, then on (5) John Barclay, the entailer's younger brother (who had settled in Dublin) and the heirs male of his body; which failing, then on (6) John Barclay, the entailer's uncle

(who had come out to East New Jersey in 1684), and the heirs male of his body; which failing, then on (7) the heirs and assignees of the entailer, generally.

Under such deed of entail the estate passed from Robert Barclay, the entailer, to his son Robert, born 1699, and then, and upon the death of such Robert, to his son Robert, born 1731. This son Robert had upon his (second) marriage to Sarah Ann Allardice, taken the name "Allardice" as a part of his own, and the surname of their male descendants, at any rate, thereupon became "Barclay-Allardice." When Robert Barclay-Allardice (born 1731) died, the estate passed under the entail to his oldest son, born 1779, who bore the same name; and it was during his ownership that an effort was made to alter the entail by securing to him, in fee simple absolute, a release therefrom of certain portions of the estate which were situated more remotely from the Mansion House of Ury, and substituting therefor certain other lands of a greater rental value and more nearly adjacent to the bulk of the estate, which other lands were already owned in fee by Robert Barclay-Allardice.

A step to be taken towards a release of any part of the entailed estate, was the securing of the consent thereto of Parliament; and accordingly and in 1805 a private bill was passed (indexed among the "Local and Personal Acts," but not officially printed), which will be found among the private bills of 45 George III. A copy of such act is printed in *Appendix B* hereunto annexed.

By this Act of Parliament, leave was granted Robert Barclay-Allardice to apply to the Court of Session in Scotland and under the direction and with the approbation of that Court to settle as a part of the entailed estate, and in all things subject to the terms of the deed of 1722, the lands then owned by him; and it was provided that when such deed of settlement,—or "Settlement of Tailzie," as it was known to the Scotch law,—was duly executed and recorded in the Register of Entails for Scotland, and also in the register of the Court of Session "for preservation," a Charter of resignation should pass and Infeftment be taken "by virtue of the precept of sasine therein contained." The act further provided that at once upon the recording of the deed, the passing of the Charter and the completing of the Infeftment, the specified

portion of the entailed estate should thenceforward stand forever released from the limitations contained in the deed of entail of 1722.

From the terms of this act it would seem probable that a reference to the Register of Entails, or to the record of the Court of Session, would disclose the "Settlement of Tailzie," and incidentally the names of the heirs whose contingent rights were cut off by the alteration of the entail. But a search of the Register of Entails from 1723 to 1897 failed to disclose mention of any such deed or settlement, as does a search from 1781 to 1830 of the Sasine Register for Kincardine (the county in which Ury is located) preserved at Stonehaven. So, too, the records of the Court of Session from 1805 to 1835 contain no reference to the matter of any kind whatsoever.

The Register of Deeds at Edinburgh, however, does contain the record of a "Consent and Commission" executed by Robert Barclay-Allardice under date of October 19th, 1805, in which he refers, among other things, to the lands "lately freed from the "fetters of the entail of Ury by an Act passed in the forty-fifth "year of his present Majesty's reign" (recorded Vol. 301, November 20, 1807), thus indicating probably the point of view of those most interested, namely, that where Parliament had once spoken, its authority could not be strengthened by a decree of the Court of Session.

Under date or December 20th, 1821, a Charter of Resignation issued under the great seal (sealed February 21st, 1822), wherein Robert Barclay-Allardice resigned in favor of himself and his heirs, as they existed on July 31st, 1821, certain specified lands, among which were those "erected into the Barony of Ury "by Charter under the Great Seal in favour of Colonel David "Barclay of Ury and his heirs therein mentioned" under date of August 13th, 1679. A resignation of an entailed estate in favor of any person named and his heirs, seems to have had the effect of vesting the fee in such person to the exclusion of those contingently interested in the entail; and when such resignation is confirmed by a charter from the Crown, the entail seems to be most effectively and permanently broken.

The records contain abundant evidence of the increasing financial embarrassment which overtook Robert Barclay-Allardice (or "Capt. Barclay-Allardice," as he was generally known) in the earlier half of the nineteenth century, and show that on June 21st, 1844, he at length made a transfer of his property in trust for his creditors.<sup>2</sup> Ten years later and after his death and under date of November 8th, 1854, his trustees sold his entire estate, including nearly all of the "Barony of Ury" as erected in 1679, to Alexander Baird, of Gartsherrie Ironworks, in whose family the title now stands. As this transfer was effected without the consent or even citation into Court of any of those who under the deed of entail of 1722 might have a contingent interest in the estate, it may be assumed that the entail was deemed of no effect,—certainly after the passing of the Charter of Resignation in 1821.<sup>3</sup>

#### MEMORIAL.

"The memorialist is proprietor of the Estate of Ury, which, by the title deeds thereof, stands destined to heirs male. His wife lately died, leaving two daughters on whom he is desirous of settling the above estate, the eldest to succeed without division. The Estate of Ury stands devised by the present titles to heirs male, under a Disposition and Deed of Tailzie (which is recorded in the Register of Entails), executed by his great grandfather, Robert Barclay of Ury, 9th October, 1722.

"If this destination can by no means whatever be defeated, that property, in the event of the memorialist dying without sons, would descend to his brother; and the memorialist is naturally desirous that it should not go out

of his own family.

"Has the memorialist power under the present investitures of the Estate of Ury, gratuitously to alter the course of succession thereby established, and will he be subject to any claim at the instance of the remote beirs of Tailzie for so doing, and of what nature and to what extent are such claims to be apprehended?

"A copy of the Deed of Tailzie is sent herewith."

<sup>\*</sup>Since making the searches above noted, the writer has been informed by Robert Barclay-Allardice, Esq., F. S. A., Scot., and Mayor of Lostwithiel, Cornwall,—(a grandson of the Robert Barclay-Allardice last mentioned in the text),—that in 1820 his grandfather took the opinion of counsel as to whether he was bound by the entail or could alter the succession at will; and that upon their advising that it was competent for him to change the succession at pleasure, he took steps which resulted in the issuing on December 20th, 1821, of the Charter of resignation under the great seal which is referred to in the text. The counsel whose opinions were thus acted upon were eminent lawyers of the day and both of them Judges of the Court of Session,—the one Lord Jeffrey (F. Jeffrey) and the other Lord Corehouse (George Cranstoun). Mr. Barclay-Allardice has courteously sent to the writer a copy of the original memorial and opinions, which he states have been compared by him personally with the originals in his custody and are accurate transcripts of the same. They are as follows:

The fact that this was so has proved something of a disappointment, for the writer had hoped to find on some court or other records the names of those whose consent to the breaking of the entail had been deemed essential, and in this way demonstrate still more conclusively that the descendants of Rev. Thomas Barclay were not also the descendants of John Barclay of East New Jersey.

That consents to the release of certain lands from the entail were, shortly prior to the passage of the Act of Parliament above mentioned, obtained from the then living heirs of John Barclay of East New Jersey, is abundantly established by letters which are still preserved at Bury Hill,—the male representation of the Barclays of Mather and Ury having passed after the death of Capt. Barclay-Allardice to the eldest male descendant, then living, of the apologist's second son, David, namely, Charles Barclay (b. 1780) of Bury Hill.

The following chart will serve to make these relationships more clear. It has been abbreviated for the purposes of convenience by the omission therefrom, with few exceptions, of younger sons and of daughters and of the dates of births, deaths and marriages:

#### Answers.

"I am of opinion that there is no effectual prohibition against altering the order of succession in the Tailzie referred to, and that there is no sufficient resolutive clause to protect even those prohibitions which it does contain. I think, therefore, that the memorialist may alter the order of succession and dispone in favour of his daughters without being liable in damages or otherwise to the heirs of entail.



"I am of opinion that the memorialist has power under the present investitures to alter the succession of the Estate of Ury and that he will be subject to no claim at the instance of the remote heirs of cutail for doing so. The succession may be altered by executing a Procuratory of Resignation in favour of himself and his heirs whatsoever, or such other heirs as he thinks proper to name, and on the Procuratory a Charter and Infeftment ought to be expeded.

The persons shown in the foregoing chart who took part in the correspondence to be noted below, were the venerable David Barclay of Walthamstow, Essex, a grandson of the apologist, and such David Barclay's nephew, Robert Barclay, the owner of the great brewery at Southwark which bore his name, and the founder of the Bury Hill line of Barclays. Robert's father, Alexander Barclay, (b. 1711), ran quickly through the moneys which were left him by his mother, and then procured an appointment as Comptroller of the Customs at Philadelphia, in which City his son Robert was born in 1751. Robert's life, however, was mainly spent in England where he amassed a considerable fortune, and among other investments purchased some 20,000 acres of coal land on the Susquehanna River in what is now Bradford County, Pennsylvania. This tract is referred to in some of the letters referred to below, photographic copies of the originals of which letters have been furnished me through the courtesy of Rev. Charles Wright Barclay of Little Amwell Vicarage, Hertford Heath, Herts, a brother of the present (1903) head of the house.

As early as 1761, it would seem, and long before any imagined occasion arose for the obtaining of the consents of the heirs of the entail to a modification of the terms thereof, David Barclay, the second son of the apologist, and consequently a nephew of the John Barclay who had settled in East New Jersey in 1684, recognized the John Barclay then living in South Amboy, New Jersey, as a son of his uncle John, and sent to him a gift of £100.

This incident is referred to in the following letter now at Bury Hill written by David Barclay of Walthamstow to his nephew Robert at Park Street, Southwark, London:

Endorsed: DAVID BARCLAY, Walthamstow.

Addressed: Robert Barclay, Park Street, Southwark.

W. 19/10. 1801 P. M.

Dr. Nephew-

Since mine sent this morning, I have found three letters from John Barclay viz.

Dated perth Amboy 2nd May 1761, in which he writes "I am in the 60th year of my age, I lost my wife 3 yrs. ago and have 5 sons (4 of them married) & 3 daughters" & acknowledged £100—present. To my Father:

To my Father: Dated Perth Amboy, 20 March 1763 about 440 acres of land of John Falconer's wch he wished to purchase.

To David, John & Robert; Dated South Amboy 20th July 1774 abt. do.

Now it appears that the above John was the son of John the Brother of the Apologist who went to Jersey, & died in 1731, & should be so marked in the plan. Thy affect

William Dillwyn wishes to see the likeness of Dr. Park, so pray bring it with thee. The Pork proved very fine."

Robert Barclay, the nephew, was in this country in 1774, and in that year, at Trenton, met John Barclay the son of the emigrant to East New Jersey, and his two sons John and Charles. In their presence, and presumably from information which was afforded by them, he made in his own handwriting a memorandum of the then living descendants of John Barclay, second of that name in New Jersey, with a statement of their respective ages "for mention in the genealogy of our family," as Robert Barclay himself put it. This memorandum, too, is still preserved at Bury Hill and reads as follows:

"John Barclay, New Jersey. Genealogy and letter to purchase 446 acres of ex'ors of D. Falconer".

The letter reads:

My Son Robert Barclay now lives on a tract of land at Matcheponix near Cranberry, in East Jersey containing Four Hundred & Forty Six Acres as by a Survey about the year 1762—the right & title is supposed to be invested in the heirs of David Falconer to whom David Barclay Senr. (Decd) was an Executor. I wish you would learn who they really are and then if their title is quite clear, endeavor to purchase it, giving from fifteen to twenty Shillings per acre—Exch. a 175. The following are the terms of payment I propose, Either to pay one half down & the remainder in a year from the date of the deed, or if that is not accepted, I will have the whole sum paid at the delivery of the deed & this I deem a sufficient Voucher for your proposing the above terms & for the execution of them.

Prior to the passage of the Act of Parliament above referred to, and manifestly in anticipation thereof, Robert Barclay of Bury Hill and his uncle David Barclay of Walthamstow, addressed the descendants of John Barclay (who came to East New Jersey in 1684) through Phineas Bond, Esq., the British Consul-General at Philadelphia, and requested the execution by them of a deed of consent to the proposed alteration of the entail. The proposed deed was forwarded, together with a genealogical account of the family and other papers which are referred to in the letters that follow. A request was evidently made for detailed information as to the family of each of the grandchildren of John Barclay, the immigrant, for in connection with the signing of the deed of consent separate letters were written by five of the then living grandchildren, of which letters, still preserved at Bury Hill, photographic copies have been furnished through the courtesy of Rev. Charles Wright Barclay, of Hertford Heath. These letters bear pathetic testimony to the rugged experiences which the descendants of this member of the house of Ury had doubtless endured. They are dated on the 8th and 9th of March, 1802, with the exception of the letter from John Barclay (third of that

name in New Jersey) which was written from New York under date of March 29th, 1802.

John Barclay's letter, dated March 29th, 1802, is as follows:

New York March the 29 1802

ROBERT BARCLAY,

Dear Kinsman

I Received your letter with pleasure and satisfaction and the other wrightings, the first day of March we met at Cranbery in Jersey as many of us could be colleced and sined the Deeds of Consent which was brought their by Phineas Bond Esqr. from Philadelphia, it is a long time since you was in the Jearses and I have not heard from you sence that time until now. I have inquired of the widdow Scott from London she gave me noe account of the family to be alive but your uncle David and that he had but one Daughter she informed me she was acquined with the famely she is sence dead. But now sence I have heard from you of your Existence wellfair and Prosperity we can keep up and renew our Past aquintence with pleasure and sadisfaction.

My father died February 16 1786 in the Eighty fourth year of his age, I am now 71 years of age and i am well and hearty thrugh Marcy I live with my son en law and Daughter in new York and my wife Likewise My daugther is in a Poor State of helth and has been all winter, My son is settled on a farm too hundred mile from New York and thirty five from Albany In the County of Montgomery and Township of Breadalbane his wifes name is Ruth Jolly of a scots decent they have sons the name of the first John Wesley 10 years old the second David 8 years the third Robert 6 years the forth William Asbary 3 years and a half the fifth Thomas Coke I year and a half these are all the Children of my son Richard Barclay he Possesses a Hundred and Twelve Acres of Land and is very induserous and mannages his bisness for the Best I expect he must Learn his Children Trades for the want of Land to settle Them Jean my Daughter has three Children the first a Daughter named Sarah of a dilicate Constitution 11 years old the second Samuel Lee 5 years the third David I year and fore months old, Thes are the ofspring of my two Children you saw at my Fathers, My son in law name is Richard Jaques and is of a Reputable famely from the Jearses and has good Naturl and Acquired Abilities and Understands Bisness he occupied a Grocery store these sevrel years past he is going in a nother line of Bisness after the first of May next And now I Conclude with my Respect and Best wishes to all my Relation in Ingleland and scotland and espesally with Respect to be remembered unto my Kinsman your uncle David Barclay that is in the Decline of Life and as I beleve he can look Back on a well spent Life with pleasure and sadisfaction soe may he continue in the Paths of Virtue that his Last days may be his Best days that when he is done with Time he may Receive the happy Approbation Well done Good and faithfull servant Enter thou into the Joy of thy Lord, Which may be all our happy Lots is the sencer Prayer of your affectionate Kins

P. S. I send this letter with my worthy friend Thomas Barclay Esqr Consol for the Brittish Nation at New York My Brother Robert is made a list of all the Famely and sent by friend Eirskins

Charles Barclay, the second grandson of the immigrant then living, wrote as follows:

Midlesex County New Jersey March 9 1802

Peter Barclay, the next younger grandson, wrote as follows:

I inform you that I am in health and all my family at Present thanks be given to God for all his mercies—hopeing these Lines may finde you and your aged uncle and all our connextion in fammily in health also I am the fourth son of John Barclay deceased—and am now in my 68th year of age. I have buryed my first wife—and married a second wife abought fourteen years agoe and have know Issue by her I have one Son John a Carpenter by Trade and one Son Charles a Farmer—they are gone from me and unnone to me where they be at this time I have agreed to sighn the Deed of Concent with the Rest of my brothers and there Sons I have Three Daughters Namely Catherine—Debory & Rachel all married I and all my Children finde it hard geeting a comfortable Living I met with considerable loss at the Time of our Revolution—when you dined with my father and Brothers at Trenton I did not Live near this place—I never hed the happyness to see you but am desires to hold up the family connextion as our forefathers hase don and would Request of you to write me whenever an opportunity offers and direct your letter to the Care of George Barclay merchant in Philadelphia which is my oldest Brother David Barclay Son— I Conclude with remembering my kind Love to you and your aged uncle and kind Kinsman to me

Robert Barclay, the fourth living grandson, wrote as follows:

March the 8th 1802.

State of New Jersey in the County of Middlesex & Township of South Amboy.

These lines is to inform thee and thy aged uncle—through the mercy of God I am in health and all by numerous family hoping these lines may find thee and all our family connections in health also. I am the youngest son of John Barclay aged now nearly sixty five I was with my father at Trenton at Joseph Whorrels when wee all dined together—Thy aged uncle hase desired to know the ocapations of my Sons my first son Lewis is a Cordwinder—my second son Charles is a farmer—my third son Robert is a cordwinder—my fourth son William is a Carpenter—John

my fifth son is a Carpenter—my sixth son Peter is a bricklayer and is singgle yet and lives at home with me—my only daughter Sarah that is living is singgle yet and lives at home with me—I have buryed four Daughters and one Son and I and all my Sons is but low in circumstance wee find it hard geeting a comfortable living I have married a Secon wife in the year 1787 She was brought up in the way of the friends principle—we Received thy letter and other writings in the last of February with great satisfaction to here of thy health and welfare in family and thine aged uncle health also—wee have all agreed to Sighn the Deed of Consent that thee hase requested hoping thee may obtain the estate thereby—wee Being a great Distance apart it is my Desire that thee would write to inform me if thee hase obtained the estate agreeable to thy wishes—it hase been a long time since wee have herd from any of our relations in England—which I expect the Revolution hase been the cause of it wee had a great Deal of Trouble and Losses at that time when thee writes to me direct thy letter to the care of George Barclay in Philadelphia I Conclude with remembering my kind love to thee and thy aged uncle and Kind Kinsman To me.

The next letter was written by a granddaughter, Katherine, who had married one David Stout. It reads as follows:

State of New Jersey, County of Middesex Township of South Amboy, March 8.

Dear Kinsman this is to inform you throue the Mercy of God I am now Living the Youngest Daughter of my father Your Kinsman John Barclay is now deceased aged 84 he Lived in township of South Amboy I now Live in the same place above men No dout my friend but you recollect me as I was with my father at Trenton to Tea at the house of Joseph Whorls. I have fore Sons and Seven Daughters now Living my first Son named John Barclay a Carpenter 2 Son David a hatter 3 Son Robert Davis a hatter 4 Son Charles Carpenter I have too Daughters that is not married the eldest of the Too is named Charlotte Sophia after the Queen of Grate Britain She Lives in the City of New York hir age is twenty one She is a Milener My husban and I being Loyalists we thought proper to name after the Queen. My youngest daughter named Hannah Lives with hir parants at home. My husband is Living he is aged 68 years I am 60 years old the 17th of this month Dear Kinsman we are all hastening to the World of Spirits I was hapy to hear from you and your aged uncel althrough I never expect that we shall agin meate in this world it allous me a greate deal of pleasure to think we can Correspond with our kind relations at so grate distance by Letter and althrough I have chaned my yet my affections are still the Same for the family as when with my kind father at home if you right to me direct your letter to the Reverend Abraha Beach of the Episcopal Church in New York or George Barclay philadelphia No more my kind Love and best wishes to your uncel and your self this from your affectionate friend kinswoman

The last in this series of letters which accompanied the signing of the deed of consent was written by Rev. David Barclay, of Bound Brook, a son of Charles Barclay above mentioned. Rev. David Barclay wrote as follows:

Very Dear Kinsman

It is with strange feelings & a heart filled with desire I employ my pen to communicate my thoughts to connextions & Dear kinsman in a distant Nation-Since my birth (tho small) you have visited our family in America, & made an affectionate & parting feast at Trenton March the 16th-1774 —Since that time we have heard no more of you untill the reception of your Letter dated London Oct 31—1801—which came to my fathers hand Jan 27—1802—Accompanied with a Deed of Consent and other papers—The expectations & conjectures on this occasion was big with anxiety, my fathers emotions were so great sleep left him for several nights, on hearing of his forefathers & present friends in Europe—On a visit to my father soon after I had the unexpected & satisfactory opportunity of perusing your letter the sd Deed & other papers, with a letter from Phineas Bond Esqr of Phila. Con Gen &c of the British Nation. The intention and design of all appears to be to procure against the next sitting of Parliament A Deed of Consent signed by all the descendants of my great grandfather John Barclay (or their legal representatives) who is said to have settled in East Jersey & died there in 1732—For the express purpose of enabling Robert Barclay Allardyce to obtain an Act of Parliament to exchange lands in the entail that lay more distant which you say meets the approbation of your excellent uncle David Barclay & all others concerned in your Nation. I doubt not to say that all the descendents of my great grandfather in this country will accede to it; yet permit to say that we do not understand from the writings how it will be our interest & advantage to the entailed estate, when according to the draft of the Deed of Consent the rent of that part of the entailed estate appears to exceed the rents of the lands desired £82:8:8, sterling per year Further I would add That we cannot trace the line of descent from Robert Barclay the entailer ( notwithstanding the care you have taken to exhibit the same) to the present day or when or from whom it may possibly deent to us, which you will please to shew in your next as soon as convenient—Yet allow me to affirm that with the greatest chearfulness & alacrity, we all agree in signing the deed of Consent without a dicenting voice, as we doubt not of your probity & friendship, yea it is with inexpressible pleasure we affix our signatures to comply with the desires & interests of our relations in Britain tho we may never reap any fruits. It appears from your letter that your aged uncle desires a true list of all our family with their ages occupation & situation in life this I am told to comply with & will be repeated; therefore I shall come to my own family. I am the youngest son as you know of my father Charles Barclay & great grandson of that John Barclay who settled in East Jersey—I am blessed with three living children my first child a daughter is no more Charles Ray Barclay my first son is six years old, Maria Day Barclay is four years old. William Day Barclay my last child is six months old my sons are named after their grandfathers-I am settled twenty-seven miles from my parents at Bound Brook in New Jersey as a Teacher or Embassador of Christ in the Thirty second year of my age. So far advanced in life & so engaged as puts it out of my power to visit Britain tho it hath often been a subject of conversation between me & my father before my marriage & settlement in life—But I think it possible yea probible that some one of our name here will go to Europe to see you all & none more likely than some one of my sons & for my own part I should have no objection if my circumstances should permit—as it would be fraught with improvement to him & I trust satisfaction to you in England-It further appears you desire to have & keep alive a family correspondence, this is very desirable & I shall deem it one of the first & greatest evidences of friendship and without doubt it will be truly agreeable to all our family here in America -I have been in Phia. to see your valued friend P. Bond on our business

& he has agreed to meet all our connextions tomorrow at Cranberry Town two miles distant from my fathers in order to sign the sd. Deed of Consent & although some of the friends seem to doubt of the propriety yet I presume that wh intention will be developed to their complet satisfaction—you also wish to know what mode of conveyance will be the most ready & safe I suppose you may enclose back all your letters & commit all your concerns respecting us to P. Bond of Phia. or to his successor—

Dear brethren I differ from you in religious principles (or shall I say in the mode of worship) but I hope and pray we may not in heart & practice—remember me to your worthy uncle David Barclay & to Robert Barclay of Allardyce & to all other unknown kinsmen—my companion joins with me in affectionate reguard to your nearest friend & all other female friends—commending you to God & to the word of his grace which I know is able to save your souls I bid you adieu for the present from your very unworthy friend & kinsman

The suggestion contained in this letter that it was not only possible but "probible" that some one of the sons of this divine might journey to Europe to see the kinsmen there, not unnaturally produced a degree of consternation in the mind of the venerable David Barclay in London. His letter to his nephew Robert Barclay of Bury Hill is ample evidence of such fact. It reads:

Walthamstow 7th of 6th mo. 1802

Dear Nephew

I am pleased to find thou art safely arrived at home, & hope we shall meet soon. By perusing the letters sent thee from our dear relations in America there is some reason to apprehend the communication with them will prove burthensome to thee in particular, as their countryman; from my name sake the parson's intimation, I think it would be prudent to embrace the first opportunity to inform him, by no means to send his son to London or to encourage any of our relations to come to a land where by the increased price of everything the heavy taxes & the difficulty of providing for young men, thou has had thoughts of sending some of thy sons to America, & even of coming with them.

I have thought of sending the dear Cousins a present, viz:

ROBERT CHAR 71 70 Gd. son of John. Gd. son of	68	ROBERT 65 Youngest son of John.
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CATHERINE STOUT
60
Youngest Daughter of John.

I think my name sake the parson must not be included because He is only one of the sons of Charles, who is only the gd. son of John. But I request

thou & Charles will examine all the letters & make more correct my list to bring with you, & as 6th day will be too late for the packet, I submit whether you could not conveniently come on 4th day wch let me know. I shall be willing to divide among them 500 Dollars properly. I have been informed by J. Hibbart that the Richmond, for Philada, will not sail for several weeks, but it will be proper to enquire whether any vessel is going to N York. I shall request thee to answer Charles B's letter to me, & say that I am infirm & that I desired thee to write to him. Mention in all thy letters the preference thou gives to America & the heavy taxes &c. paid in England.

By a memorandum of Br. Springalls it appears that My. Wagstaffe's will is in the Tin Box of 108 at ye Anchor, & when that box shall be opened I desire a search may be made in it for a bond of Hartford & Powells for £2000, also for a bond of Evan Barclay & Co. & if at the same time Gibson's letters from 1770 to 1775 could be found, I shall be

pleased.

By the copy of M. W.'s will it appears that Ann Sorton is now to have the interest of £1500, 4 per cents, & after her decease, that sum is to be divided among 9 Legatees. Br. S. writes that T. W. reced the dividends on the £500 & remitted to her half yearly.

The gifts which David Barclay thus purposed making were duly made, as appears from the following fulsome letter written by Phineas Bond, the British Consul at Philadelphia:

PHILADELPHIA 12 November 1802

My dear Sir:

In compliance with your Request communicated to me by my worthy Friend, my friend Mr. Robert Barclay, I have paid to the five following Persons One Hundred Dollars each, and now inclose their respective Receipts drawn in the Form presented.

Charles Barclay John Barclay Peter Barclay Robert Barclay

being the four surviving Sons of John Barclay who died in 1786.

also to Catherine Stout their Sister;—making together the Sum of Five Hundred Dollars—equal at 168 per cent to £111:12:2 sterling, for which sum I have drawn upon you of this days date at 60 days sight in favour

of my Bankers Messrs Child & Co.

From the knowledge I had acquired of these good People in the Intercourse I had had with them, respecting the Deed of Consent executed last Spring, I was satisfied they were so little conversant with matters of Business as to be liable to great Risque in transacting Money Matters, at a great Distance, I therefore made it a Point, out of Regard to their Interests, and from motives of personal Respect due to you, to combine this Payment with a Call I had into New Jersey and to see, myself, that your Bounty went into its proper Channel. Upon repairing to Cranberry I had some Expectation of meeting them all there; but I was disappointed, as Mr. John Barclay had gone some days before to New York, whither I was obliged to send his Receipt, which will account for the difference of the Dates.

Your kindred received this Mark of Munificence with all the right Feeling of Gratitude which is due to Acts of such uncommon Liberality; and it was a high Gratification to me to observe the Agitation of their Minds, while they wanted words to express their sense of your Goodness. I have great Satisfaction in assuring you that they are Persons of good moral Conduct who bear an excellent Reputation in their Neighborhood; two of them Peter & Robert Barclay are not in such good Plight as the others are; but by their Care, Industry and Oeconomy they

make out to live tolerably well.

I am happy in this Opportunity of acknowledging the obliging Presents of Books lately transmitted to me, at your Instance, which I consider as a Proof of your Friendship highly flattering to me; that in particular which relates to the humane Emancipation of your Slaves in Unity Valley Pen in Jamaica;—an Act which combined with the great Principles you have so long and so zealously endeavor'd to enforce, a practical Observance, by which a prodigious Sacrifice was made, a sacrifice which places the extreme Benevolence of your Heart, and the correct Uniformity of your Judgment, in a most distinguished and exemplary Station.

With Sentiments of the most perfect Respect, I am my dear Sir your very faithful and obedient Servant.

Although no mention is made in this letter of a gift of aught but money, yet the following memorandum (dated August 5th, 1802.) in Robert Barclay's handwriting, supported as it is by the acknowledgments contained in the letters from John, Charles and Robert of East New Jersey referred to below, would indicate that books as well as money were sent to the American kinsmen. The memorandum is as follows:

Three of the recipients of the gifts which were sent in August, 1802, acknowledged the same in letters to Robert Barclay of Bury Hill. The others may have done so, too; but if they did, their letters have not been preserved.

The first of these letters was from Charles Barclay, who wrote as follows:

New Jersey February the 29 1803 Middlesex County.

Dear and most Respected Kinsman

her love to you and to your Children I have Six Granchildren lives with me fatherless and motherles that I have the Care of in my old age.

The next letter was from the last writer's brother, Robert Barclay, and reads as follows:

State of New Jersey, Middlesex County, Middlesex, March the 14th, 1803 Kinde Kindsman

My Brothers John & Charles Barclay Received a letter from thee by the hand of Phenus Bond Esqr Bearing date the 2th of August 1802-Which Informed us all wee brothers of thy health and well fare which wee was happy to heare—and that wee and our famileyes are in health at Present, which wee are thankfull to Devine Provedence for all his Blessings to us for all his merceys—I am sorry to here of thy Loss of thy worthy Companyon—wee all Received the Money and Books—by the hand of Esqr. Bond that was ordered as a Preasent to us by thy worthy uncle which wee are thankfull to him for his Bennevolent Kindness to us—as wee have acknowledged to him by a family letter sent to him hopeing thee will keep up a Correspondence with thy Poor Kindsfolks here in America-my Two Sons and their familyes moved to the Lands that thee owns on the Suskahannah by Permission of Esqr. Bond and found it so Dissolate and but few Settlers on it they were discouraged and went one hundred miles further to the Lake Country and are settled there and I hope they will geet in a way of liveing in a while hence, but hase it hard times as yet—and so I Conclude—with Remember my love to thy antient uncle David Barclay and thy self and family

The third letter was from John Barclay and was written from New York some months after his brothers had written the letters above quoted. He wrote as follows:

NEW YORK June the 7th 1804

Dear Cousin

Gratitude inclines me to wright to you to inform you that I am in helth thrugh Mercy and now in the 74 year of my age my Bhrothers and Sisters are in helth at Present Each of us have Receved the Books sence I wrote to you last which we will retain in the Famely And the Money sent to each of us has been laid out to the best advantage by each of us for which Presents we Return our harty Thanks to you and your Worthy Uncle David Barclay I want to hear from you and your Worthy uncle ofner than I can Expect but Gratitude inclines me to keep us a Coraspondence and renew our Relationship I purpose to goe to my sons in a little time and live with him it is beyond Albany Thrty five miles Montgomery County Breadalbane Town I send my Respect and Best wishes to you and Worthy Uncle David My wife is well at Present

For Robert Barclay

It is not unreasonable to suppose that if Rev. Thomas Barclay, the first rector of St. Peter's at Albany, had been a son of John Barclay of East New Jersey as is claimed, some memorandum of that fact would have been preserved at Bury Hill, and the signatures of his descendants would have been secured to a deed of consent to the change in the entail at the same time that the deed was being executed by the other descendants of John Barclay as shown above. It is highly improbable that such a descent, had it existed, could have been overlooked. The descendants of Rev. Thomas Barclay, at the time it was thought necessary to obtain the consent of all contingent heirs to a change in the terms of the entail, were widely known and were influential, and had intermarried with members of the most prominent families in New York. The Barclays that were recognized, on the other hand, were obscure and for the most part unlettered; and it is practically impossible to imagine that any descent through Rev. Thomas Barclay, if in fact there were one, was unknown to the family at Bury Hill, or if known, would for a moment have been overlooked. The ascertaining of who were the descendants of the apologist's brother John had too important a bearing upon the legal matter then under consideration to permit a mere perfunctory investigation of the line of descent; and it seems to the writer that the unquestioned recognition of John Barclay, Jr., of South Amboy, as the son, and as the *only* son, of the apologist's brother John should be accepted as against an even widely accepted "tradition" to the contrary.

At the time the New Jersey family was engaged in the correspondence above quoted, Col. Thomas Barclay, a grandson of Rev. Thomas, was British Consul-General for the Eastern States of America, resident at New York. He seems to have been acquainted with the John Barclay of New York (third of that name in New Jersey), who wrote one of the foregoing letters, and at the same time was acquainted with the Robert Barclay of Bury Hill, who was so actively interested in securing the consents of the descendants of the apologist's brother John to a change in the terms of the entail. This latter fact is evidenced by the following letters which are still preserved at Bury Hill:

Duplicate My dear Sir, New York 6th. March 1805

You will perceive from a perusal of the inclosed papers, that on my arrival at this place in the year 1799, as His Majesty's Consul General for the Eastern States of America, I adopted the readiest and best means, by applying to Mr. Bond, His Majesty's Consul General at Philadelphia, of obtaining the necessary information of the general duties and forms of the office, and whether there were any and what fees attached to it. In consequence of Mr. Bond's answer that fees might be taken by general consent of the Consuls, or by an application to the Secretary of State and that it was customary elsewhere, I wrote to Lord Grenville, then Secretary of State on the great expence attending living in this country, and that I should presume to take fees of office from Americans and other Foreigners until I received his Lordship's order to the contrary. No countermand has ever been received, and from thence I have with reason concluded his Lordship did not disapprove of the measure.

By a letter which Mr. Merry His Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to these States wrote not long since to Mr. Coles, it appeared that he was of the opinion fees could not be taken. You will observe from the copy of my letter to him that I have made him acquainted with my conduct, and the principles on which it was founded. I have reason to believe Mr. Merry will make some representation to prevent the continuance of taking fees. Under this idea, I have by this conveyance written to Mr. Hammond, Under Secretary of State, detailing the particulars and requesting him to lay my letter before Lord Mulgrave for his direction.

I trust you will be of opinion on reading the inclosed that my con-

duct has been candid and proper, and that the reason urged for Consuls receiving Fees from Foreigners are founded on good grounds. What Mr. Merry's objections may be it is not in my power to anticipate. Americans and other Foreigners in amity with Great Britain have always paid these fees cheerfully, because they are not entitled to require any official act from me gratuitously, and all the other Consuls in this city receive These fees, almost without an exception, arise from certificates annexed to Notarial Acts. You will perceive they are simple, and relate only to the Notary Public, and not the Parties who have deposed before him who frequently I do not know, and never see. It is the Notary who applies to me for an attestation that he is duly commissioned, and so scrupulous have I been for some time past, as not to insert in my certificates even the ordinary words, "that faith was due to the notarial act." But it may be objected that in cases where an American citizen covers American property, a certificate of mine to the notarial act, may add some degree of weight to the oath of the exporter. Such an objection cannot require a serious reply.—The officers of His Majesty's Navy when they overhaul a ship and examine her papers, judge from general or particular circumstances independent of the oath of the shipper, the attestation of the notary, or the Consular certificate,—Besides if I am not to certify the notary, the Mayor of this city will do it—So that nothing can be effected by the interdiction.—Under these circumstances it appears to me wonderful that that there can be a shadow of objection to His Majesty's Consuls receiving fees from Foreigners, particularly as the foreign Consuls take fees in all cases from British Subjects.—You will notice what I have said to Mr. Merry on the subject of expenditures, over and above the allowance from Government.-Mr. Wallace His Majesty's Consul for Georgia, died last year, leaving a large family penni-

less—Mr. MacDonogh Consul for Massachusetts who died about a month since has left his family in so distressed a situation, that even the Americans at Boston Philadelpha and New York are making charitable collections for their support.—Is it not distressing to learn the fate of such old servants—My situation is not similar, but it is far from pleasant, with a large family, to reflect, that I am under the necessity to injure the paternal estate of my children to support myself decently, as His Majesty's

principal Servant in this city and State.

Will you my dear Sir, on the receipt of this letter wait on Mr. Hammond and converse with him on this subject.—I trust his good sense will point out that I have not acted amiss, and that he will advise His Majesty's Consul may be permitted to take the customary fees from Foreigners.—I once flattered myself that I stood well in the good opinion of Mr. Hammond, and have no reason to suppose he thinks otherwise of me at present—yet I am anxious to have my own interest strengthened by yours and one or two of your friends—To Lord Mulgrave I am wholly unknown.—I trust you will represent me, as you conceive consistent with truth, and add that any extention of Indulgence to my present allowances will be bestowed on a faithful Servant of His Majesty, and at the same time doing you a favor.—I intreat your pardon for soliciting this unpleasant service from you.

The pacquet having been detained for Mr. Merry's despatches, enables me to enclose you a copy of his letter in answer to mine of the 22nd. of February.—I much fear you will be tired of me and the subject, but as I have it much to heart, in vindication of my conduct, and from a conviction that it is sound policy, the Consuls in America should be allowed to take fees of office; permit me to intreat your patience to the following remarks.

Mr. Merry states that one of the reasons which operates against his

Mr. Merry states that one of the reasons which operates against his sanctioning the receiving of fees, is that the custom has not been adopted by Consul General Bond, Consul Hamilton, or any other Consul or Vice Consul in the southern States.—On my arrival in these States in 1799, Mr. Bond suggested to me the propriety and necessity of taking fees of office and it was agreed that a joint application should be made to Lord Grenville—On my return to New York from Philadelphia, Mr. Bond wrote me, that having been several years in office and not having taken fees, it would appear singular for him to apply; but as I had lately been appointed there could be no objection for me to do it.—This letter I cannot lay my hand on; but a copy of his letter marked A, whereof I have sent you a copy is fully expressive of his wishes and sentiments on this subject; and the only reason why Mr. Bond and the Consuls to the Southward have not taken fees, is owing to my not having received expressly an affirmative approbation from Lord Grenville; but which as far as respected myself, required no answer unless his Lordship disapproved. of what I had stated to him, I should do, until I received his wishes to the contrary—Thus stands the case for Mr. Bond and the Consuls to the Southward.

When Mr. Merry went to the north of Europe to establish a Consular System, and discovered that Certificates had been granted by a

British Consul for the purpose of showing the neutral quality of Vessels of Merchandize; he acted wisely in suppressing the usage and the fees; because such proceedings were highly improper and dangerous. In this case, was I to hazard an opinion on the person, I should pronounce that the Consul Mr. Merry speaks of, was not a subject of His Majesty, but of the very power in whose favor the certificates of neutral Property were granted—I feel hurt by his naming such a case, on an occasion in which I am personally concerned; because my character civil and military is too well established I should presume, to admit even the possibility of my

ever doing an improper act intentionally.

In my former letter I have stated that custom has established here as well as in Europe, Ministerial or Consular declarations necessary to notarial and acts of a similar nature. These are the only species of certificates ever granted by me, save such as are pointed out by Acts of Parliament. These in no wise touch on the merits, or even notice the affidavit or protest made before the notary.—You will perceive from a copy inclosed of a letter from Vice Admiral Sir Andrew Mitchell Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships of War in the American Station, that he and the Admirals in the West Indies, and I suspect now generally elsewhere, understand my certificates perfectly; and so far from their proving injurious, I am convinced they operate by my means to the benefit of the Service.

Mr. Merry is assuredly in an error in opposing the receiving of fees. -On general principles it must be admitted, the better an officer is paid, the less liable will he be to temptation—But recollect I disclaim the Idea that Consul of His Majesty on any occasion would knowingly act in

violation of his duty.

The style in which the foregoing letters from Col. Thomas Barclay were written, while not bearing with particular strength in either direction, seems rather less consistent with kinship than with mere friendship, and may be regarded simply as one of the many straws which point against the correctness of the tradition of a descent of the Rev. Thomas Barclay from Col. David Barclay of Ury or from Col. David's accomplished wife, Lady Katharine Gordon, "the white rose of Scotland."5

## PART III.

A Mistaken Tradition, Continued.—Testimony of the Records in London.

THE most convincing proof, however, of the error of the contention that Rev. Thomas Barclay of Albany was the son of John Barclay of East New Jersey, is found in the result of the investigations made by the late Dr. DeLancey H. Barclay of Baltimore, during the last few years of his life. Convinced that the tradition had no basis of fact, Dr. Barclay,—who at the time of his death was the head of the family descended from Rev. Thomas Barclay of Albany,1—made personal search in London for information concerning Rev. Thomas Barclay's early life and antecedents.

"The earliest positive and authentic knowledge which we "have of Rev. Thomas Barclay," he writes, "is given to us by the "appearance of his name in the list of students who entered St. "Salvator's College at the University of St. Andrews in Fife, in "the session of 1683-1684. He matriculated at the University "on February 25th, 1684, and was granted the degree M. A. on "June 14th, 1688. His regent's name was Mr. John Mengies, "and the degree was conferred by the Rev. Dr. Alexander Skene, "the Vice-Chancellor of the University. This is all the information which is afforded by the records of the University.

"From June 14th, 1688, until May, 1707, a period of nine"teen years, I have thus far been able to find no reference in any
"record I have examined either to his life or to his acts. In
"May, 1707, he appears as an applicant for Holy Orders from
"the Bishop of London, and in that month was successively or"dained deacon and priest, as the following extracts taken in
"the customary questionable Latin, which are from the Volume
"of Ordination,—1675 to 1809,—in St. Paul's Cathedral, London,
"will show:—

"'22 May 1707. THOMAS BARCLAY, Artimus Magister Coll. Salvetoriaus "'quod est Andreapolis in Scotorium, Diacconaliis Ordinem sint ad-

"'31 May 1707 Thomas Barclay, Art. Mag. Coll. St. Salvatoris nost"'ri quos est Andreapoli in sacrum presbyteratus Ordinum fuit.'

"The proximity of the dates of these two ordinations is evi"dence that he was ordained for the colonies, as it was only in
"such case that the rule was waived which required the lapse of
"a year between the taking of orders as deacon and the ordina"tion as priest.

"The lapse of nineteen years between his graduation at St. "Andrews and his ordination in London, it thus far seems impossible to fill. If he entered St. Salvator's in 1683-4 at the age of sixteen,—and it is hardly probable that he matriculated at a much earlier age,—he would have been twenty when he graduated and thirty-nine when he was ordained; and we would thus be able to fix the year 1667 or 1668 as the year of his birth. He would thus be less than ten years the junior of John Barclay, who was born in 1659 and came to East New Jersey in 1684.

"On May 31, 1707, the day he took his priestly orders, "Thomas Barclay signed the Act of Uniformity and was forth-"with appointed Chaplain of the garrison at Fort Orange, at "Albany, which had recently been acquired from the Dutch. It "is probable that he sailed for the colonies within a short time "after his appointment, for there is evidence of his being in "Boston in November of the same year. Rev. Thorowgood "Moore and Rev. John Brooke, two of the missionaries of the "Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, "sailed from Boston for the mother country in November or "December, 1707, and were lost at sea. Prior to their sailing "they made their wills. The will of Thorowgood Moore, which "was not dated beyond 'November 1707,' recited his in-"tended departure from America, and was witnessed by four "clergymen: Samuel Myles, minister of the Chapel at Borden-"town, N. J.; Thomas Barclay, minister at Albany; Rev. John "Brooke, of Elizabethtown, N. J.; and Rev. John Talbot, of "Burlington, N. J. The will of Rev. John Brooke, which was "undoubtedly made at about the same time, was dated November

"20th, 1707, and thus fixes the date of Rev. Thomas Barclay's "presence in Boston. $^2$ 

"The next we hear of Rev. Thomas Barclay is his arrival in "Albany on June 9th, 1708, a considerable part of the intervening "seven months having possibly been consumed in the journey from Boston. From here on for the next thirteen years we "have many records of his life and work and some indications of "his personal characteristics."

It was Dr. Barclay's intention to continue the investigations he had thus commenced, and had his life and health been spared we would doubtless have known with some degree of certainty ere this, of which of the many Barclay families of England and Scotland Rev. Thomas Barclay of Albany was a member. Without feeling at all committed to the point of view, Dr. Barclay inclined somewhat to the belief that Rev. Thomas was a son of Sir Robert Barclay of Pierston, Ayrshire, Knt., who was created baronet of Nova Scotia on October 22, 1668.3 While the fact that Rev. Thomas matriculated at St. Andrews in Fifeshire might seem to militate in some degree against this theory, yet the similarity (out of all the recorded Barclay arms) of the arms of the Barclays of Pierston to those which have come down to the descendants of Rev. Thomas Barclay of Albany, is the ground upon which Dr. DeLancey H. Barclay was inclined to rest his belief that Rev. Thomas was possibly, if not probably, of the Pierston family. The differing characteristics of the arms of the Barclays of Mather and Ury and those of the Barclays of Pierston, are pointed out in Appendix D hereunto annexed.

One or two letters written by Rev. Thomas Barclay, or by his wife, to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel and sundry extracts from the records of the Society in London,<sup>4</sup> serve to correct two other errors which are generally accepted as a part of the "family tradition,"—the one as to the date of Rev. Thomas Barclay's death and the other as to the number of his children.

It has been generally assumed, and published, that Rev. Thomas Barclay died in the year 1722 and had but three children,—Thomas, Henry and Andrew; but the letters quoted below make it clear that he had not only three but four children, and that he was living as late as 1725 and possibly in 1726. The fourth son was undoubtedly John Barclay, Mayor of Albany from 1777 to 1778, who, unlike the rest of his family, was a steadfast patriot throughout the Revolutionary struggle. Further reference will be made to him in Part V below.

The letters to be quoted hereafter show that the closing years of Rev. Thomas Barclay's life were darkened by a mental affliction so grave as to render necessary actual physical restraint, and further show, what is of particular interest in connection with the matters now under search, that as late as 1719 Rev. Thomas had a sister living in England who held his power of attorney for the collection of the yearly stipend due him from the Crown for his services as chaplain of the garrison at Albany. This sister's name, most unfortunately, was not mentioned in the letters, and an examination of the records<sup>5</sup> of the English War Department, through which the stipend was paid, has failed to disclose it; still the fact that he had a sister has played no part whatsoever in the tradition which has regarded Rev. Thomas as the son of John Barclay of East New Jersey, and affords some further proof in support of our charge that the tradition is a false one.

Another circumstance militating in some degree against the accuracy of the tradition, is the fact that Rev. Thomas Barclay's speech was strongly Scotch. In a letter written to the Bishop of London by W. Bennett (probably an officer of the garrison at Albany), dated at New York June 24th, 1726, wherein he asks that a missionary be sent to Albany, he suggests that the clergyman selected be an Englishman as "Mr. Barclay, the late minister, spoke so broad Scotch that it was difficult to understand him." 6

Until 1716, Mr. Barclay received from the Crown £50 yearly for his services as chaplain to the garrison at Albany, and from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel another £50 per annum for his services as missionary and catechist at Albany and

at Schenectady. For some now unknown reason,—possibly through the influence of those whose enmity Mr. Barclay had incurred,—the allowance by the Society was suddenly discontinued, as is shown by the following extract from the Society's records:

"5th March 1716

"Agreed to by the Society that Mr. Barclay at Albany his salary be withdrawn he having fifty pounds p. ann. allowed him by the Crown."

In an "Account of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel" published by Rev. Dr. Humphrey in 1730 in London,—an almost contemporaneous record,—it was said:

"It was represented to the Society, that since Mr. Barclay had a salary as chaplain to the garrison at Albany, that, with the voluntary contributions of the people who came to the new church, would be a sufficient maintenance; the Society therefore withdrew his salary." (\*)

The withdrawal of this stipend, with the consequent financial embarrassment, seems to have been the first of the troubles which overwhelmed Mr. Barclay and finally resulted in the loss of his mind.

In the Journal of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, the following entry appears under date of December 5th, 1718:

"It was reported from the Committee that they had read three Letters from Mr. Barclay dated Albany June 28th, and October the 29th 1717 and June the 2nd 1718. Importing that in August 1716 he received the Society's Resolve that his salary should be withdrawn after the 6th of March 1716/7. That as Chaplain to the Garrison of Albany he hath had a Pension of fifty pounds p. ann. from the 25th of March, 1707, which provision being so scanty in that dear Place the late Bishop of London did obtain from the Society an allowance of fifty pounds more yearly as their Missionary and Catechist at Albany and Schenectady which offices he hath discharged to the best of his Power by Catechising the youth and bringing up many hundreds of them in the Worship of the Church of England; that he formed the Congregation of the Mohawk Indians now the cure of Mr. Andrews, and since Mr. Andrews arrival has apply'd himself to the Instruction of the Slaves and has at present above 40 Catechumens, 23 of whom he hath baptized, that for two years and a half past he hath labour'd in building a Church which was opened on the 25th day of November last on which day he preached before a considerable audience who gave a handsome offering, and the day after the Soldiers of the two Independent Companies subscribed fifty pounds towards building a Gallery, that he is in debt for building the said Church 225 lbs. which lies heavy on him having a family of small children and not bread to eat. he humbly prays the Society to take his case into consideration and to continue his allowance since he has no manner of support there but the Pension of Fifty Pounds from the Crown, and so ill paid and Taxes

deducted that he cannot possibly subsist himself and family on so small and uncertain an Income. That one half of his allowance from the Government goes for house rent and firewood and the other part after Taxes deducted is not sufficient for clothing, so that nothing remains for food or the education of his children, for which reason and his past services he hopes the Society will not leave him to begg with his family of small children in his old age and declining years, (7) having spent his all in their service. That Mr. Andrews having come to an Estate by the death of his brother in Virginia talks frequently of leaving his Mohawk Indians, and if that should happen he offers to instruct those Indians for a far less allowance and take care of his flock at Albany too, which may be easily done since the Indians are very often from home: desire's some of the Society's Anniversary Sermons and a few Common Prayer Books, and that, while there is no fort nor Chapel among the Onondagas, the furniture sent over for that Nation (which is in the Governor's hands and which as he is informed is at the disposal of the Bishop of London) may be lent to the Church at Albany since it is (as it were) the Cathedral Church of the Five Nations, they dayly flocking into it, where he do's administer to their Spiritual necessities while at Albany, and has baptized several of their children-sometimes three on one day.

Whereupon the Comm'ee agreed to move the Society to take into consideration that part of his Letter which relates to the Instruction of the Mohawk and other Indians in case Mr. Andrews shall leave them."

Under date of May 25th, 1719, Mr. Barclay wrote to the Secretary of the Society as follows:

"Sir:

By severall Letters I have presumed to lay before the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, the hardships I lye under since that Illustrious Board has been pleased to withdraw their allowance of fifty pounds per ann. to me as missionary and Catechist at Albany, and to none of my Letters having the honour of any answer; Once more I beg leave with all due deference, to mention only my present circumstances which cry aloud for relief. If want of bread for self and Family (having had but 42 lbs. sterling in two years) in a remote corner of the World where I have no manner of Establishment or perquisite may plead for me: Besides a heavy load of Church Debt; I shall groan under being last Winter thrice arrested within the space of one month, obliged to give what little money I had by me (to pay for my winter provisions) to Lawyers for defending me from close Imprisonment (tho the debt was none of those I stood engaged for) add to this the want of money to pay my House Rent at that very time, though I was not indebted above two quarters Rent Yet my Landlord feed a Lawyer against me, and with Difficulty could I obtain a month's respite, and tho' on the 2nd day of February I paid the next Quarter's Rent, yet on the fifth day of May I had a fresh threatening, and that but for one quarter, and that at a time when I had not one sixpence to buy bread for my family, too little credit can a minister have from his Landlord here; Though the same person who was at that time my Church Warden and has had 97 pounds 10 shillings of house Rent from me from August, 1709: to May last. This is owing to the withdrawing of my salary from the

Society, and the bad payment of my salary from the Crown. I am post-poned a whole year's pension from Midsummer, 1713, till Midsummer 1714 as a Debt of the late Queen: and by my sisters last letters (who is my attorney) she acquaints me that she has received but till Christmas, 1717. Soe that at Midsummer next there will be two years and a half due to me from the Government; add to this a Loss I sustained of 62 lbs. 10 s. sterling of the same money from March 25th, 1709 to Midsummer, 1710 by the Fraud of my then attorney; I have had some other Losses besides these mentioned and what the Church is indebted to me which is to the value of 50 lbs. and upwards New York money, this is over and above my own Benefaction of which my wife's before: and all my Travelling charges and Voyages to New York on the Account of building the Church. I might further enlarge on this melancholy subject by telling of the sighs and tears of my poor wife, who while in her Mother's house neither saw nor felt want; the upbraiding of some of her Relations; The bitter sarcasms and bitter Taunts of others who want neither power nor money to supply my wants by themselves or others (especially as to the Church Debts) and tell me that prayer will not doe it: when, alas, I have no means left but tears: for I am not bred to any manual operation (tho' I often wish I had) that may help me to support my family, willingly would I labour three days a week rather than to owe any man one half penny. And tho' I groan under a Double Debt at present both for the Church and the support of my Family, yet I have this comfort I was led into both through necessity and no bad Husbandry. And it is a known truth at Albany that had the intire management of the Building your Church been in my hands, the Fund contributed had been more than enough for that work, but others being joyn'd with me, and I being obliged to Travel severall times to New York for removing the stop illegally put to that work, and that in the King's name by 4 Justices, as well as for gathering subscriptions; stones new wrought in my absence to the value of an hundred pounds for the Beautifying the Fabrick, tho' the guift of his Excellency our governor, out of the King's stores at Albany was sufficient for Finishing the Work. The payment of the workmen during the aforesaid stop for three week's time did likewise increase the charges, and lastly, the makeing of four thousand Bricks for the Beautifying the windows and the Gavel Ends, and after the work was little more than half finished I was left by the Undertakers when the Subscriptions at that time did amount to about six hundred pounds, and five hundred of the six expended and the Church in Debt to the Value of the whole and when I undertook the sole Burthen upon myself on the twelfth of June 1716 the most of the workmen voluntarily offered themselves, soe that though I suffer now a Fraud cannot be charged on me, Since it (is) well known that the Fund was exhausted and I did Build upon Providence and upon the expectation of assistance

and I did build upon Frovidence and upon the expectation of assistance from Commissary Vesey and Mr. Tenney, the Flower of the English Congregation at New York not having contributed thereto.

"The Reverend Mr. Vesey turned over that trouble on his then Reverend Assistant, and the Reverend Mr. Tenney excused himself first by the Loss he might sustain as to his own Yearly Subscription from the Congregation and since he had the Chaplainship of the Forces, he alledges want of leisure, and that it would ruin his school, the last gave a benefaction of 50 shillings, the first nothing, this I can make evident by both your Letters. I must own that Mr. Commissary did warmly urge Mr Tenney to collect for the payment of the Debts of our Church tho' in vain, but enough of this which I only mention in my own Defence, for I did conceal from our people at Albany as much as I could possible their coldness (I speak the Truth to my Grief) and if I have been too tedious on this ungrateful subject give me leave to say that nothing but the ex-

tremity of want could have extorted this from me. I shall not mention one word of my Labours during my Eleven years ministration at Albany only that to magure (8) all Difficulties I slacken not my Diligence, twentyonly that to haguise? An Difficulties I stacked not my Difficulty, weight slaves I have Baptized new; and am at present employed in catechising the Youth, and in Founding a Latin School, and near 30 white children have I Baptized the last half year, one Indian Child of ten years of age and one of a year old: I say I am at present employed in gathering of a Latin school for one Mr. Willson who arrived here last November from Ireland, a man of sober conversation and has a competent skill in the Latin and Greek Tongues. There are about Seventy Children that attend at the prayers of the Church and are Catechised. I hope the Venerable Society will not be offended at this Trouble which my pinching wants have forced me to. And whenever that Venerable Board shall be pleased to signifie to me by their Secretary to desist and forbear the giving any further Trouble, as in Duty bound I shall submit being well aware That the Society knows best what I doe deserve or what is proper to give to one in my circumstances. And whatever the Issue may be I hope I shall never while I breathe (cease) to have a thankful sense of former favours and heartily pray that God may prosper their Handy-work, and Bountifully Reward their good Works. And being they have been so Instrumentall in turning many unto Righteousness may they shine as bright Starrs for ever and ever.

"S'rs I earnestly beg an answer to this for I have had none to any of my Letters since the withdrawing of my Mission Nov. 6th.

"When I undertook to finish the Church, of the six hundred pounds subscription money five hundred pounds was laid out upon the work and a Debt to the Value of the hundred pounds not paid in.

"I am. S'rs

"Your most humble and most obedient servant, "Thos. Barclay."

So far as the records of the Society show, this letter, though received, was in no wise acted upon; and under date of June 13th, 1721, Mr. Barclay again wrote the Society as follows:

"Sirs

"I beg leave once more to lay the extremity of my case before ye. Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in foreign parts, which short is this. That by their withdrawing of my allowance of 50 pounds per ann. I am reduced to want of bread for ye pension 50 lbs. which I have from ye Crown when taxes and other dues are paid, does not amount to above 42 lbs. p. annu and that narrow allowance so ill paid that (including one year before the death of ye late Queen) the Government att Michaelmas next will be indebted to me four years salary and how then can I mantain eight in family having no manor of support here and without money or credit never was there any clergyman sent over to this part of ye World reduced to such straits and that did groun under such pressing want, having nothing to feed or cloth my family add to this ye prosecutione I suffer both for the Church Debts and my own, being now obliged to keep within doors not dareing to step abroad on week daies to perform Divine Service, and for a Minister to be confined to his house, being eight in family (as I hinted before) and not a morsel of bread to eat methinks this melancholy Story should stir

up Compassion in ye hardest heart far more in ye breasts of ye most Charitable Corporation in the world. Nay I hope their ears will be no longer shut to my sorrowful complaints But that that Venerable body will quickly send relief and restore me to my salary and so prevent my ruin I think I have said enough though I have not recounted the halfe of my sufferings to move compassion. I shall only add That nothing hath be'n wanting on my part, but that as I formerly did so shall I goe on (thro' God's assistance) in my duty both in converting slaves &c. since ye departure of Mr. Andrews, some Indians to the Knowledge of the truth, and I have baptized within a few years between thirty and forty slaves. The Mohock Indians have often desired me to come among y'm but, alas, my low estate will not admit of that expense nor am I able to be hospitable to them as formerly I have been and was my circumstances better I shou'd be capable of doing more good among all sorts of persons. God is my witness I endeavor what I can and wherein I come short God I hope will pardon since I want not ye will but the power—humbly supplicant for an answer from ye Venerable Society. I am Sir Your most humble and afflicted serv't

THOS. BARCLAY."

How this appeal was received may be gathered from the following extract from the Journal of the Society recorded under date of August 18th, 1721:

"Read a letter from the Rev. Mr. Barclay at Albany dated the 13th of June last setting forth his present hard circumstances and praying to be restored to his former salary. Agreed that Mr. Barclay remove either to Rye or Jamaica in New York Government which shall be vacant, with a salary of fifty pounds p. annum if he shall think fit: and in consideration of his very hard circumstances that Ten pounds be given him for his present Relief."

The letter of June 13th, 1721, was the last that Mr. Barclay wrote. Under date of May 22, 1722, his wife wrote the Society as follows:

#### "Hon'ble Gentlemen

"Whilst it pleaseth Almighty God to suffer my husband Mr. Thos. Barclay to be taken from his family, I his Espouse presume in his behalf to acknowledge the Receipt of your hon'es by a Letter from Mr. Secretary Umphreys dated ye 5th of Sept. last whereby your Honors signific your having received him to be your Missionary and have appointed him the Choice of removing either to Rye or Jamaica in New York Government which shall be vacant with an alowance of 50 lbs. for his salary a year from ye Hon'ble Society and that I further observe that your pious Consideracons be such as to order him 10 lbs, for his pres't Relief I think never bestowed on one of his function in foreign parts having a wife and four children better y'n on him Wherefore I return unfeigned thanks his laying out his all towards ye finishing of ye Church here (the arrears being considerable and no prospect how to be Refunded) the delay in paying w'h the Crown allows him, many oppositions he has met on account of ye Church and other misfortunes that have attended him whilst here has in my opinion and apprehension been ye occasion of his present calamity. I pray your honors consider my present circumstances and that you in compassion will continue that salary for his and family's

maintenance whilst so being and until ye Almighty God thro' his mercy shall bestow him to his family and able him to officiate on either place where you the Hon'ble Society have appointed him (wch offer was he well am assured he would gladly embrace) and his afflicted wife takes leave with all humility to subscribe herself gratefully to be

Your Honors most humble Serv't

Anna Dorotea Barclay."

This appeal dated May 22nd, 1722, was laid before a Committee of the Society at a meeting thereof held on February 13th, 1723, as the following extract from its records shows:

"Read a letter from Mrs. Barclay dated Albany, 22nd of May, 1722. And another from the clergy of New York &c. dated July 5th, 1722 setting forth the deplorable circumstances of the Rev. Mr. Barclay (formerly a Missionary from the Society at Albany) and his poor family: that he hath been all along diligent in his cure, and has taken great pains in catechising the Indian Infidels in a place where they are very numerous, but that of late the many misfortunes which have successively attended him have brought him to an outrageous distraction such as has obliged his friends to confine him to a dark room, and in the mean time the small salary which the Governm't in England allow'd him not being paid; his family (a wife and four children) are reduced to extreme Poverty; and praying the Society to consider the deplorable condition he and his family are reduced to, in such manner as shall seem most effectual for their relief. Whereupon the Committee agreed that his case be recommended to the Society as a matter of compassion, and that they be moved to make him such a Gratuity as they shall think proper. Agreed that this matter shall be considered at the next meeting of the Society."

The "relief" so urgently needed and prayed for was finally granted by the Society at its meetings of *March 21st, 1723*, and *April 26th, 1723*, as is shown by the following extracts from the Society's Journal:

"21st March 1723. The Society took into consideration the case of the Rev'd Mr. Barclay mentioned in the Minutes of the last Meeting and Agreed that Ten pounds be given him for his present relief.

"26th of April, 1723. Upon reading the Report of the Committee representing the case of the Rev. Mr. Barclay: Agreed by the Society that he be allow'd twenty pounds more."

The remaining entries touching this matter in the Society's Journal, which have come to the notice of the writer, are the following:

"17th July 1724: Read a letter from Mrs. Dorothea Barclay, wife of the Rev. Mr. Barclay thanking the Society for their charitable gratuity to her in consideration of the deplorable condition of her husband late the Society's Missionary, and praying for a further allowance during his continuing in his present state; and Agreed to referr the consideration thereof to the Society. Ordered that the Secretary make enquiry

whether the fifty pounds per annum formerly allow'd to the Rev. Mr. Barclay by the Crown be still continued and paid to him."

"21st August 1724: The Secretary acquainted the Board that in pursuance of the Order at last Meeting he has made enquiry and finds that the salary of Fifty pounds p. annum formerly allowed to the Rev. Mr. Barclay by the Crown is still continued and paid to him."

That Mr. Barclay was living as late as July 7, 1725, is evident from a letter written from New York under that date to the Bishop of London by W. Bennett, already referred to, in which he said:

"Mr. Barclay, the minister of the English Church at Albany in this Province, had the mistfortune to lose his senses about four years ago and continues yet in the same unhappy condition. His congregation have waited this long in hopes of his recovery but finding no reason to expect it they are now very desirous of a missionary."(6)

Whether or not Mr. Barclay was living as late as 1726 may or may not be inferred from the following extract from the Journal of the General Assembly of New York:

> "October 28, 1726 Afternoon Session

"The Deputy Clerk of the Council, laid before this House, the Petition of Anna Dorothy Barclay of the City of Albany, to His Excellency,

the Council, and the General Assembly setting forth,

"That by Order of the Lord Cornbury, the Commissioners of Indian Affairs placed Michael, the Son of Montour, an Indian (who was sent to fetch and bring far Indians to Albany) at Mr Barclay's house, where he was maintained and provided for from the 15th of August, 1708, until the 11th of March, 1712/13;

"Praying it may be taken into Consideration so as that she may be

satisfied for the same,

"Which, having been read in Council, was ordered to be carried to this House, and acquaint them that the Demand of the Petitioner appeared to His Excellency and Council to be just, and therefore was recommended by His Excellency, to make provision for satisfying the said Demand;

And the same being read, it was

ORDERED, That the said Petition lie on the Table."

Rev. Thomas Barclay had (subsequently to his arrival in Albany in 1708) married Anna Dorothea, daughter of Captain<sup>9</sup> Andries Drauyer (a Dane by birth, serving in the Navy of the Dutch), and Gerritje Van Schaick, his wife. It is here, possibly, that the name "Van Schaick" found its way into the family tradi-

PIn the Annals of Albany, Annals of Schenectady, etc., he is described as Captain Drauyer, although some publications have called him Admiral. The former rank seems the more probable.

tion. The grandmother of Rev. Thomas Barclay's children, on their *mother's* side, was a Van Schaick; and it is not difficult to imagine that in later years the Van Schaick connection might carelessly have come to be regarded as on the father's side instead of on the mother's. It would indeed have been odd had the mother of Rev. Thomas and the mother of his wife both been Van Schaicks, and yet no record of the coincidence have been noted through all these years.

Gerritje Van Schaick was the daughter of Capt. Goosen Gerritse Van Schaick by his second wife, Annatje Lievens. Gerritje was born in 1657 and married Andries Drauyer on January 17th, 1674.<sup>10</sup>

On March 2nd, 1699, Gerritje Van Schaick, wife of Andries Drauyer, joined the Dutch Church in New York on certificate from Copenhagen, and on the same day her husband, described on the Church records (if the English translation be correct) as "Rear Admiral of the King's fleet of Denmark and Norway," joined on a similar certificate. On February 28th, 1700, Johanna Dorothea Drauyer, presumably the future wife of Rev. Thomas Barclay of Albany, likewise joined the Dutch Church in New York, upon confession of faith and belief.<sup>11</sup>

## PART IV.

The Line of Descent from John Barclay of East New Jersey.

JOHN BARCLAY, second son of Col. David Barclay of Ury and brother of the apologist, died intestate, as we have seen, in 1731 at Perth Amboy, East New Jersey; and administration on his estate was granted to William Bradford,—"John "Barclay, his son and heir having requested administration should "be granted under his hand unto the said William Bradford."

The William Bradford here referred to was undoubtedly the well-known printer who was at that time a resident of Philadelphia.

The following notices of John Barclay's death appeared in The Boston Weekly News Letter of May 6, 1731, and in The Pennsylvania Gazette of April 29, 1731:<sup>b</sup>

### From The Boston Weekly News Letter.

"Philadelphia, April 29. Last week died at Amboy, John Barclay, Esq., in an advanced Age, a pious man, an excellent Neighbor, and of very great Service to the Publick, but more particularly where he lived, and is very much lamented by all that knew him. He was Brother to Robert Barclay, Laird of Ure in the Kingdom of Scotland, the famous Quaker, who wrote Barclay's Apology."

#### From THE PENNSYLVANIA GAZETTE.

"PHILADELPHIA April 29, From Amboy we hear that last Week died Mr. John Barclay, Post master there. He was Brother to the famous Robert Barclay."

John Barclay's wife, Katharine Barclay, had died and been buried at Perth Amboy on January 6, 1703, as appears from the following entry on the records of St. Mary's Church at Burlington, West New Jersey:

"Buried at Amboy N. J. by John Talbot Jan. 6, 1703—Catherine Barclay"

That she died on the same day is to be inferred, as it seems to the writer, from the following further entry on the same records:

"Baptized at Amboy N. J. by John Talbot Jan. 6, 1703—Catherine Barclay"

The probabilities, in the writer's judgment, are that the Catherine Barclay who was baptized by Mr. Talbot on January 6, 1703, was the same Catherine Barclay whose burial is recorded as above. The apparently unseemly haste of burying a convert on the very day of her baptism, militates somewhat against such view; yet it is not at all impossible that the rites of baptism were administered to Catherine Barclay just prior to death and that the funeral was arranged for the same day while Mr. Talbot was still in Amboy, for the probable reason that no other clergyman of the English Church was near at hand or likely soon to be after Mr. Talbot should have proceeded on his way. Moreover, John Barclay, the son, was anywheres from a day to twelve months old when his mother died,<sup>c</sup> and while it

For example the hurial of Katharine Barclay would more properly have heen recorded as having taken place on January 6th, 1702/3. And so it is possible that John Barclay, the son,—whose hirth is known to have occurred in "1702,"—may have heen horn even in the eleventh month of that year, according to the old system; and that would mean that he was horn in January, 1703, according to the new system.

The confusion out of which the Gregorian or present calendar was evolved, may he partially realized from the following brief historical summary which is taken almost wholly from the Encyclopedia Britannica.

The earliest known Roman year consisted of ten months, or 304 days in all. How the remaining days were disposed of is not known. The year commenced with March, and the present months of July and August were known as Quintilis and Sextiles. In the reign of Numa two months were added to the year,—January at the heginning and Fehruary at the end,—and this arrangement continued until 452 B. C., when the order of the months was changed and Fehruary was placed after January. The months now consisted of twenty-nine and thirty days alternately, so that the year, 354 days in all, corresponded with the synodic revolution of the moon. An odd number of days, however, were deemed more propitious than an even number, so an extra day was added and the number hrought up to 355 days.

Something more than ten days was still needed to make the calendar year coincident with the solar year, so the device was adopted of inserting, every second year, hetween the 23rd and 24th of February, a new month known as Mercedonius consisting, alternately, of twenty-two and twenty-three days. A period of four years would thus contain 1,465 days, making the mean length of the year 366¼ days. To rid the calendar of this extra day, various devices were resorted to which finally resulted in

is possible, it seems hardly probable that the birth of another child, of a daughter Catherine, should have followed his so closely and that she only and not both he and she should have

the intercalation of the necessary number of days heing left to the discretion of the pontiffs to whom the care of the calendar was committed; and they in turn quickly ahused the power for political ends. By giving to the intercalary month a greater or less number of days, according to their whim, the pontiffs were enabled to prolong the term of a magistracy or hasten the annual elections; and hy the time of Julius Caesar the calendar had heen thrown into such confusion that the civil equinox differed from the astronomical equinox hy fully three months, so that the winter months were carried hack into autumn and the autumnal months into summer.

To put an end to these disorders, Caesar abolished the use of the lunar year and of the intercalary months, and decreed that the civil year should he coincident with the solar year, and should consist of 365½ days, ordaining that every fourth year should have 366 days, and the others 365. The process of change from the one calendar to the other resulted in a year of 445 days known as "the last year of confusion" and the first Julian year commenced in 46 B. C.

The year under this system consisted of twelve months, the name Quintilis being changed to "July," out of compliment to Julius Caesar. The odd months,—first, third, fifth, etc.,—were given 31 days each, and the even months 30 days each, excepting Fehruary, which in common years was given 29 and in every fourth year 30 days.

But when the name of the month Sextiles was subsequently changed to "August," out of compliment to Caesar Augustus, the vanity of that monarch would not suffer such month to have a lesser number of days than the month named in honor of his predecessor Julius Caesar, and the calendar was accordingly changed once more so as to give August thirty-one instead of thirty days,—the day thus added heing taken from Fehruary. This, however, hrought into succession three months of thirty-one days each, a result so little to he desired that September and November were summarily reduced to thirty days each and October and December increased to thirty-one.

The calendar year was still too long by one one-hundred-and-twenty-eighth part of a day, so that by A. D. 1582 the vernal equinox had retrograded from the 25th of March to the 11th. Gregory XIII sought permanently to correct this error, and directed that ten days should be altogether suppressed in the then existing calendar, and that thenceforward each year of which the number was divisible by four without a remainder should be a leap year, excepting the centurial years; and that the centurial years should he leap years when divisible by four after omitting the two ciphers. Thus, 1600 was a leap year; but 1700, 1800 and 1900 were common years, while 2000, in turn, will he a leap year,—and so on.

The introduction into Great Britain of the Gregorian Calendar, or "New Style," as it was called, was for a long time successfully opposed by popular prejudice; but the inconvenience of using a different system from that already in use in the greater part of Europe gradually made itself felt, and in 1751 the "New Style" was adopted by Act of Parliament for all public and legal transactions. It was provided in the Act that the day following September 2, 1752, should be accounted the 14th of that month, and the commencement of the legal year was changed from the 25th of March to the 1st of January.

In Scotland the new style had heen in use since the heginning of 1600,—a fact to he remembered in connection with the Scottish records of events hetween that period and 1751.

Russia is the only country in which the Julian Calendar or "Old Style" is still employed. A letter addressed in Russia to a correspondent in another country should he dated in hoth styles, in order to he at once intelligible, as for example, August \( \frac{9}{20} \)

been baptized, and that, too, on the day of their mother's funeral. John Barclay, the husband, as we saw above, had identified himself with the Church of England somewhere between the year 1690 and the recorded visit to Amboy of George Keith in the year 1703; and it is not unreasonable to suppose that he sought baptism for his wife on her death-bed and the reading of the burial service by a clergyman of the established church, while there chanced to be one still in Amboy, for the English clergymen at that time were simply itinerant through the Jerseys, their missionary work calling them from place to place.

The son, John Barclay, lived in South Amboy throughout his life and died there the owner of considerable real estate. His death occurred on February 16th, 1786, when he was in the 84th year of his age.<sup>d</sup> This circumstance fixes 1702 as the year of his birth; besides which, that year is positively stated as the year of his birth in the memo. made by Robert Barclay of Bury Hill in 1774, for the purposes of the family genealogy, shown in Part II above.

Mr. Whitehead, in his "Contributions to East Jersey History" (published in 1856), says at page 43 that John Barclay, senior, left but one son John, "of whom nothing is known, excepting that he was alive in 1768 and poor." But the records at Trenton and at New Brunswick refute the charge of poverty, unless, indeed, he were "land-poor," as that term has of late years been understood.

The records of the Old Tennent Church in Monmouth County, make frequent reference to the son, John Barclay, as "Capt. John Barclay," and state that he was buried in the old Topanemus Burying Ground near the present village of Marlborough. He left a will dated May 26th, 1782, which, with a codicil thereto dated June 9th, 1782, was proved at New Brunswick on December 24th, 1790, and letters testamentary were on the last mentioned day duly issued to his two sons John and Robert. scope of the present writing to trace the widely diverging lines of descent from John Barclay, second of that name in East New Jersey; but, in the course of the writer's searches along his own line, many dates and circumstances have come to his notice which may be of use to those more directly interested in this particular line of descent from John Barclay of East New Jersey, and he has therefore chronicled them here in the following table of descent which he believes to be reasonably accurate, so far as it goes. The †, appearing after a name in this table, indicates that the writer has no further information at hand concerning such person, or of any possible descent therefrom.

## PART V.

## The Dublin Branch of the Barclays of Ury.

ROBERT BARCLAY of Ury, the famous apologist of the Quakers, was born December 23, 1648, died October 3, 1690, and on February 16, 1669, married Christian Mollison, who died February 14, 1725. They had nine children, of whom the youngest was John Barclay, b October (i. e., 8th mo.) 20th, 1687, who settled in Dublin, and became the head of the Dublin branch of the Barclays of Ury.

In another part of this work the writer has been enabled, through the courtesy of Robert Barclay Allardice, M.A., F.S.A. (Scot), Mayor of Lostwithiel, Cornwall, to show a considerable portion of the descent from Col. David Barclay of Ury and Lady Katharine Gordon, his wife (Part IX below).

The descent of the Dublin branch of the Ury family, as gathered from the public records in Dublin,—for the family records at Bury Hill afford scant information of those descendants of John Barclay who abjured the testimonies and faith of their fathers,—is as follows:

This marriage, because made outside of the faith, was evidently disapproved by both of the loyal Quaker families and may possibly account for the lack of interest which the Ury family thereafter manifested in the Dublin branch of the Barclays. The following extract from the "Testimonies of Denial," preserved at the Friends Meeting House in Eustace Street, Dublin (vol. II, p. 36, 1756-1789), is interesting in this connection:

"Whereas, John Barclay was educated in profession with us, the People called Quakers, and for some time frequented our Religious Meetings, but hath manifested too little regard for the tender desires and en-deavors of his Parents and Friends for his preservation in a demeanor suitable to his profession15, and of late hath wholly declined the attendance of our Meetings for Worship; and Moreover

'Whereas, He hath lately been married to Ann Cooper, a young woman likewise of our profession, without the consent of her mother16, and contrary to the known rules

of our Society,

"We are therefore concerned to signify our dis-unity with the said John Barclay and Ann, his wife,

and Anne Cooper, to daughter-in-law Sarah Clibborn, now Cooper, wife of eldest son Edward Cooper, and to grandson, William Cooper.

The sons Thomas and Edward qualified as executors, and indicated that they were Quakers.

and Do hereby disown them to be of our Society, untill they manifest a due sense of sorrow for their outrunning, which that they may, and obtain forgiveness of the Almighty, is our sincere desire for them.

"Signed in and on behalf of our Men's Meeting held

in Dublin the 22nd, 9 mo., 1761.

That John Barclay's apostasy was not of sudden growth, may be inferred from the following extract from the Friends Records, entered six years previously ("Dublin Meeting's Proceedings," vol. II, p. 64):

"At a Men's Meeting held in Dublin 22, 7 mo, 1755:
"The young man repeatedly mentioned in the Proceedings of this Meeting to have put off his hat in way of salutation, viz: John Barclay was frequently spoken to by the Friends appointed, who represented to him the inconsistency of this practice with our Profession, but hitherto without the desired effect.

"It was therefore thought necessary to make this Record of our care and concern to discourage this practice among us, contrary to the sentiments of Friends from the beginning, who have ever deemed the uncovering the head to be a mark of divine honour or worship paid to Almighty God, and not proper to be given to mortal men,

"And as our faithfull elders were conscienceously concerned to bear their Christian Testimony against this and other instances of the vain honours of this World,

"We being likeminded with them, do hereby signify our disunity with him and all such as deviate from their steps in these cases, as trampling upon that Christian Testimony we desire to maintain."

Formal report was made to the Meeting on the 5th, 5 mo., 1761, that John Barclay and Anne Cooper had been married "by a Priest" ("Dublin Meeting's Proceedings," vol. 12, p. 227), and on the 16th, 6 mo., 1761, the parties concerned made a formal admission of the report, and a testimony of disunity was ordered (*ibid*, p. 233); on the 30th, 6 mo., 1761, the testimony was ordered to be shown them (*ibid*, p. 241); and on the 22nd, 9 mo., 1761, the testimony was signed (*ibid*, p. 249).

Marriage "out of Meeting" was regarded as a serious lapse among the Quakers, as the Proceedings

of the Meeting frequently bear witness. A Testimony of Denial, for example, was entered against *Abigail Jaffray* (a cousin of John Barclay's), on 13th, 1 mo., 1784, because of her marriage "by a Priest to a Man not of our Society" (vol. 2, 1756-1789, p. 236); and on the 30th, 12 mo., 1784, a similar Denial was signed against *Catherine Jaffray*, sister of Abigail, "for being present at her sister's marriage," etc. (*ibid*, p. 236).<sup>17</sup>

This marriage, too, seems to have been the cause of religious disownment if not of family feeling. At a Men's Meeting held in Dublin 11th, 6 mo., 1754, it was reported that Elizabeth Barclay and Joanna Rooke (a niece of her mother's20) had lately been married "by a priest to men of another Society," etc. (Dublin Meeting's Proceedings, vol. 10, 1750-1754, p. 284), and on the 25th, 6 mo., 1754, "Elizabeth Scriven al. Barclay" owned to Friends that she had married without her mother's consent and intended to leave the Society (ibid. p. 289). On 6th, 8 mo., 1754, a paper "Concerning Elizabeth Scriven" was considered and directed to be laid before the Quarterly Meeting (ibid, p. 298), and on the 20th, 8 mo., 1754, the Quarterly Meeting's recommendation that such paper be publicly read was duly carried out (ibid, p. 303). The Testimony of Denial and Disownment is contained in vol. I of "Testimonies of Denials," page 525.

In the will of her aunt, Katherine Forbes, dated February 15, 1758,3 "Elizabeth Scriven al. Barclay" was given but five shillings, while substantial bequests were made to her brother John and to her sisters, the stated reason being that she had married without the consent of the testatrix.

On April 25, 1778, a Commission of Bankruptcy was issued against *Edward Scriven* under the Great Seal of Ireland, and from the papers in the proceedings had thereon and in an Equity suit growing out of the same, considerable of the above information has been derived.<sup>6</sup> Edward Scriven died May 14, 1794,<sup>19</sup> and by petition of his son, John Barclay Scriven, as administrator with the will annexed of his estate, sworn to June 28, 1799, it appears that the estate had realized suf-

ficient to pay 20 shillings in the pound, and leave a surplus for the bankrupt's family. John Barclay Scriven is described in a deed of 1787 as "Barrister at Law."<sup>21</sup>

The families of Barclay, Strettell, Cooper, Forbes and Jaffray seem so closely allied that the writer has undertaken, wholly from such information as the public records afford, to trace more clearly the relationships between them. The record he presents of children born may be incomplete; but he believes it to be reasonably accurate so far as it goes.

The four daughters of the apologist, and therefore the four sisters of John Barclay (senior) of Dublin, married as follows: Christian Barclay married Alexander Jaffray of King's Wells, in Aberdeenshire, Scotland; Katherine Barclay married James Forbes; Patience Barclay married Timothy Forbes; and Jean Barclay married Alexander Forbes. The three Forbes were brothers, being with Dr. Samuel Forbes the sons of one John Forbes, whose estate of Aquorthies lay not far from Ury in Kincardine, Scotland (Penn. Magazine, vol. XXII).

James Forbes, from "Meeting in North Britain," was admitted to the Dublin Meeting on 1st, 1 mo., 1726.26 He died in

1734,<sup>27</sup> leaving a will which was proved in 1735.<sup>28</sup> From a chancery bill filed in 1759 by his widow's executors, it would seem that there were no issue of the marriage.<sup>28</sup> His widow, *Katherine Forbes* al. Barclay, died November 9, 1758,<sup>28</sup> leaving a will in which she seemingly undertook to make a bequest to each of her then living relatives;<sup>29</sup> and yet a closer study of the will shows that some of her kinsfolk then living were *not* named in the will.

The bill then charges that Joseph Tomey falsified the books which were in his charge, and embezzled securities for dehts due to testatrix by Peter Tomey and by Thomas Constable, and asks for appropriate relief.

TIMOTHY FORBES and *Patience Barclay* were married in 1707.<sup>30</sup> The will of the former, dated in 1741, was proved July 15, 1743,<sup>31</sup> and that of the latter dated 1754 was proved in 1757.<sup>32</sup>

Will dated: April 30, 1741. Proved July 15, 1743.

Recites wife, Patience Forbes; eldest son, Alexander Forbes, to whom but 5 shillings are left "on account of bis disobedience," etc.; son, Timothy Forbes of London, who is forgiven all debts in addition to the £1,200 he bad already received; youngest son, James Forbes, who is named as executor and made residuary legatee; eldest daughter, Ann Handcock; daughter, Sara Handcock; daughter, Katherine Hoope; hrother-in-law, John Barclay of Dublin, merchant; the three daughters of bis brother Samuel Forbes, deceased, namely, Katherine Forbes, Isabella Forbes and Anna Forbes; and grandson, Timothy Handcock.

It would seem from these wills that Timothy Forbes had had issue by a prior wife, but none by his wife Patience Barclay.

ALEXANDER FORBES, who also remained a Quaker, was a merchant of St. Margrat Parish, Lothbury, London, and does not seem at any time to have resided in Dublin. He died May 25, 1740, leaving a widow, *Jean Forbes* al. Barclay, and a number of children surviving him.<sup>33</sup>

ALEXANDER JAFFRAY and Christian Barclay had three sons, Robert Jaffray, who settled in Dublin, Gilbert Jaffray and Thomas

Dublin, deceased, from the Registry of the Court of Canterbury Prerogative Wills, whereof a copy was filed in the record office in the Four Courts, Dublin.

Will dated: April 27, 1754. Proved in London: July 26, 1757. Proved in Dublin: August 17, 1757.

Recites Marriage settlement of June 2, 1707, above noted. Bequests to her brother, David Barclay of London; to her nephew, Rabert Barclay of Ury; to her great nephews, Rabert Barclay, junior, David Barclay and Evan Barclay, sons of said Robert Barclay of Ury; to her nephew, John Barclay (junior) of Dublin, merchant; to ber niece, Patience Barclay, sister of said John Barclay; to Christian Jaffray, daughter of Robert Jaffray of Kingswells, Aberdeen, now a merchant in Dublin; to Eilzabeth Farbes, wife of Timothy Forbes of London, merchant (Quaere: Was this the wife of the testatrix's son or stepson?); to her sister, Jean Farbes, widow of Alexander Forbes, sometime of Aquorthies and late of London, merchant; and makes reference to her son-in-law (step son?) James Farbes, as executor of ber husband's will.

Appoints as executors, her brother, David Barclay of London, merchant; her nephew, Robert Barclay of Ury; and her nephew, Jahn Barclay (junior) of Dublin, merchant.

The will was written and dated at Springhall, Kincardine, North Britain.

83Will of Alexander Farbes of London, merchant, filed in the Registry of Canterbury Prerogative Wills, London.

Will dated: 12th, 3rd mo. (May), 1729. Proved June 4, 1740.

Recites that under marriage settlement his wife Jane Farbes is entitled to an annuity out of the lands of Aquorthies and Colyhill, in Aberdeensbire, Scotland, which at the time of the settlement was in possession of the testator's father, Jahn Farbes, but now in his own (Was he the eldest son?) and managed by bis sister, Barbara Farbes, as his agent.

Refers to his two houses at Dowgate Hill, London, and York Place, Surrey.

Gives residue to bis seven children (all minors at the date of the Will), namely, Jahn Farbes, the eldest son; Alexander Farbes; Christian Farbes, the eldest daughter, who subsequently married William Penn, grandson of the founder; Barbara Farbes; Ann Farbes; Katherine Farbes; and Margrat Farbes.

No witnesses to the will, which, however, was proved by James Barclay of St. Dionis, Blackcburch Parisb, London (Quaere: Was this the son of David Barclay the linendraper?) and Alexander Farbes of St. Michael Woodstreet Parish, London, both bankers and both Quakers.

Administration was granted to a creditor. Barbara Farbes and Anne Farbes, spinsters, renounced their prior right as did Jane Forbes, widow, and as guardian of Jahn Farbes, Alexander Farbes and Katherine Farbes, minor children of the testator. The other children, if then living, do not seem to have renounced.

Jaffray.<sup>29</sup> The son Robert Jaffray in 1733<sup>34</sup> married *Abigail Strettell*, a daughter of Abel Strettell, of Dublin.<sup>35</sup> What the relationship was between this Abel Strettell and the Amos Strettell whose daughter, Anne Strettell, married John Barclay (senior) in 1713,<sup>1</sup> is not clear from the records. Abel Strettell's other children were: Mary Strettell;<sup>35</sup> Experience Strettell, who married William Cooper of Cooper's Hill;<sup>14, 16</sup> Abel Strettell<sup>36</sup> (junior); and Jonathan Strettell.<sup>14, 36</sup> Robert Jaffray died about September 20, 1773,<sup>37</sup> leaving a will which was proved a month later,<sup>37</sup> and his wife, Abigail Jaffray, died in 1788,<sup>38</sup> also leaving a will which was proved the same year.<sup>38</sup>

Between Robert Jaffray, of Dublin City, merchant, of the first part; Jonathan Strettell, of the same place, of the second part; Abigail Strettell, spinster, and a daughter of Abel Strettell of Dublin, merchant, deceased, of the third part. Refers to another daughter, Mary Strettell.

William Cooper of Shraugh, in county Queens, gentleman, and Experience Cooper al. Strettell, his wife, one of the daughters of Abel Strettell, late of Dublin City, merchant, deceased; Robert Jaffray of Dublin City, merchant, and Abigail Jaffray al. Strettell, his wife, another daughter of said Abel Strettell; Abel Strettell of Ballatore, county Kildare, gentleman, a son of said Abel Strettell; and Jonathan Strettell of Dublin City, merchant, also a son of said Abel Strettell.

Convey to John Barclay and Thomas Strettell, Jr., as directed in the will of said Abel Strettell, a piece of ground 21½ ft. by 19 ft. formerly in the possession of David Latouche behind the dwelling house of Thomas Strettell in Eustace Street, and another piece 20 ft. by 11 ft. 4 in. behind the dwelling of one Robert Belling.

Will dated: July 5, 1773. Proved: October 20, 1773. Testator "dead a month." Confirms marriage settlement with wife, Abigail Jaffray al. Strettell. Refers to his only son, Alexander Jaffray, to whom he leaves his lands and "Estate of Kingswells in the Freedom of Aberdeen," subject to the charges, &c., recited in the deed from Aberdeen City to the testator. Refers to his two unmarried daughters, Katherine Jaffray and Abigail Jaffray; to his daughter, Lydia Holmes, wife of John Holmes; to his daughter Christian Nicholson, wife of Thomas Nicholson, describing her as named for the testator's mother; to his grandchildren, children of his daughter Christian, John Nicholson, Abigail Nicholson, Mary Nicholson, Lydia Nicholson, Robert Nicholson, Christian Nicholson and Isabella Nicholson; to his nephew, Alexander Jaffray, son of testator's late brother, Gilbert Jaffray, deceased; to his nephew, Thomas Jaffray, son of testator's late brother, Thomas Jaffray, deceased, and to his nices, Elizabeth Jaffray and Christian Jaffray, daughters of said Thomas Jaffray, deceased.

The wife and son were appointed executors, the latter qualifying as a Quaker.

The Cooper connection appears from the records to have been as follows:

WILLIAM COOPER, of Cooper's Hill in Shraugh, county Queens, married Experience Strettell, daughter of Abel Strettell of Dublin. 12, 14 Their children were Edward Cooper, who married Sarah Clibborn, 12—(her relationship to the other Clibborns does not appear); Thomas Cooper, of Newton, county Carlow, who does not seem to have married up to the year 1770; 12, 17 Lydia Cooper, who married Joshua Clibborn, son of Robert Clibborn; 12, 14, 17 Anne Cooper, who married John Barclay, junior; 12, 13, 17 and Sarah Cooper, who married Barclay Clibborn (son of James Clibborn and Experience Barclay), a nephew of said John Barclay, junior. 6, 17

The records bear witness to the fact that John Barclay (senior) was a man of some degree of commercial importance in Dublin and was of prominence among the Quakers.

The Calendar of Petitions to the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, or, in his absence, to the Lords Justices of Ireland, which is preserved in the Record Office in Dublin, shows orders granted on the petition of John Barclay, merchant, on March 19, 1741, allowing the export of butter to Newfoundland; on October 16, 1741, allowing the shipment of wheat to Barbadoes; on April 2, 1742, allowing him to send provisions to the ship "Barclay Frigate;" on February 24, 1743, allowing the "Diana" of Dublin to sail with her cargo to Lisbon, etc., etc. On February 13, 1741, he was admitted to membership among the Free Brothers of the Holy Trinity Guild of Merchants.<sup>39</sup>

The records of the Proceedings of the Dublin Monthly Meeting (volumes 7 and 8, covering the years 1724-1742) show that on the 1st, 7 mo., 1724, John Barclay was appointed to act in the securing of more land for the Meeting; on 31st, 6 mo., 1725, he was appointed on a deputation to welcome the new Lord Chancellor, Richard West; on the 15th, 9 mo., 1726, he was on a deputation to the Lord Chancellor concerning rules of the Court of Chancery and the conditions upon which Quakers should be required to affirm; on the 21st, 9 mo., 1729, he was on a deputation from the Quakers to the Lord Lieutenant; on the 21st, 7 mo., 1731, he was on a deputation to present an address to the Duke of Dorset, the new Lord Lieutenant, upon his landing; on the 16th, 4 mo., 1731, he was on the School Committee; on the 13th, 7 mo., 1737, he was on a deputation to draw up an address and present it to the Duke of Devonshire, the new Lord Lieutenant; and he appears to have been on several other deputations and committees.

A number of entries found in volumes 8, 9 and 11 of the Proceedings of the Dublin Monthly Meeting, show that *Anne Barclay* (b 1719), daughter of John Barclay, senior, travelled considerably for an unmarried woman of those days. At a Men's Meeting held 21st, 9 mo., 1738, a certificate was received from the Frenchay Monthly Meeting "touching the orderly and agreeable conversation of Anne Barclay who resided there some time."

At a Men's Meeting held 24th, 5 mo., 1744, John Barclay consented, at the request of Elizabeth Shippy and Esther White, "two Public Friends from America," that his daughter Anne Barclay should accompany them in their intended visit to Friends in Scotland and in the North of England; and a "certificate of her orderly conversation" was accordingly granted. On the 28th, 2 mo., 1747, she obtained a certificate to enable her to visit the Meetings of Friends in Munster Province,—a suitable companion offering in the person of one Abigail Watson. On the 21st, 4 mo., 1748, John Barclay made application for a certificate for his daughter Anne Barclay to visit parts of England in company with Abigail Watson, and a certificate was granted accordingly.

At a Men's Meeting held 2nd, 9 mo., 1755, it appeared that Anne Barclay, being then in London, had desired a certificate from the Dublin Meeting, whereupon Robert Clibborn and John Rutty were "desired to make enquiry concerning her conversation "and clearness in relation to marriage" and to draw a certificate accordingly. There is nothing to show how they decided or whether she ever married.

From these same minutes it appears that in 1731 John Barclay requested of the Meeting a certificate concerning the conversation, etc., of his nephew, David Barclay, who had moved from Dublin to reside at London; and a certificate as to the nephew's conversation "and clearness in regard to marriage" was granted accordingly.

On May 21, 1712, one Benjamin Chetwood and his wife Ann Chetwood, al Ann Eustace, had leased to Amos Strettell for a term of three lives, renewable for ever,—the lives selected being those of Robert Strettell, son of Amos Strettell, Jonathan Strettell, son of Abel Strettell, and Joseph Maddock, son of Joseph Maddock—a plot of ground on the West side of Eustace Street, adjoining the Quaker Meeting House;40 and on the same day a similar lease of the next adjoining plot was made by the same parties to Abel Strettell, on the same lives. 41 Amos Strettell built a dwelling house on the parcel thus taken over by him and by instrument dated March 22, 1719, leased the property to John Barclay for the same term. 42 A year later, and by deed dated October 11 and 12, 1720, Amos Strettell conveyed the premises to his son-in-law, John Barclay, "in consideration of 5 s and of "his natural love and affection for his daughter Anne Barclay al. "Strettell, and in fulfillment of a solemn promise made on her "marriage;"43 and then went into bankruptcy.44 Prior to this, and by instrument dated June 18, 1718, John Barclay had taken from Benjamin Chetwood a lease of adjacent property on the west side of Eustace Street (whereon it seems that John Barclay built his warehouse), to hold for the lives of John Barclay, the lessee, Thomas Strettell, second son of Amos Strettell, and Robert

Jaffray, second son of Alexander Jaffray, of Kings Wells in Aberdeenshire, North Britain,—which Robert Jaffray is described in the record as "then apprentice to said John Barclay,"—with right of renewal forever within six months of the death of each life.<sup>45</sup> These two plots with dwelling house and warehouse seem to have constituted the Barclay homestead in Dublin, and was added to after his death by his son, John Barclay, the second.<sup>46</sup>

Immediately after John Barclay's death and in accordance with instructions contained in his will, his business was continued by his wife and son John under the name of "Ann Barclay & Son:" and it so appears in Wilson's Dublin Directory for the year 1752. The Directories show, however, that in 1762 and 1763, the business was conducted under the son's name, "John Barclay," and at Eustace Street, which was in St. Andrew's Parish. In 1764 the name did not appear in the directory; in 1765, its place of business was at Glasnevin, in Glasnevin Parish; and from 1766 to 1768, inclusive, it was conducted under the name of "John Barclay" in Dawson Street, which was in St. Anne's Parish. In the directories of 1784-5-6 the firm of "Ann Barclay & Sisters," Tea Merchants, were recorded as having their place of business at 18 French Street,—which is now Upper Mercer Street in St. Peter's Parish. The name Barclay does not appear in the directories of 1787-8-9, while in the directories of 1790-1-2, "Barclay & Co.," milliners, are recited as having their place of business at 31 Bolton Street,-in St. Mary's Parish. Whether or not this firm consisted of the daughters of John Barclay, the second, does not definitely appear.

The special interest of the writer in the Dublin branch of the Barclays of Ury, centres in the Robert Barclay (grandson of the Apologist, and eldest son of the John Barclay who settled in Dublin, and of Anne Stettrell, his wife), born 19th, 1st mo., 1717/18; for there are some slight circumstances which lean toward the possibility of this Robert having been the father of that Thomas Barclay who was born in St. Mary's County, Maryland, on March 18th, 1755. While Thomas Barclay at all times declined,—for

reasons best known and consistently kept to himself,—to give to his wife or children any information whatsoever concerning his father's family, yet an intimate friend of his earlier days informed his son, Judge Joseph Barclay of Monmouth County, New Jersey, many years after the father's death, that Thomas Barclay was a direct descendant from the Ury family; and he seemed to know whereof he spoke. The possession by Judge Barclay of an old copy of the famous Apology which had come down to him from his father, and the impossibility of a descent from Ury except through this Robert Barclay (b 1717/18), complete the very insufficient set of circumstances that make it even possible that the Robert Barclay, whose two sons, John and Thomas, were born in St. Mary's County, Maryland, in the sixth decade of the eighteenth century, was the same Robert Barclay as was born in Dublin on the 19th, 1st mo., 1717/18.

The mystery with which Thomas Barclay surrounded the antecedents of his father Robert, finds a possible counterpart in the complete disappearance from all records concerning the Dublin family,—which seem otherwise to have been very carefully kept (and the records at Bury Hill are much less complete),—of Robert, the Apologist's grandson. It is possible, of course, that Robert Barclay (b 1717/18) died young and that his death was not recorded at the Dublin Monthly Meeting; but it is equally possible, and as it seems to the writer more probable, that he did not die in childhood but was perhaps disowned in his young manhood because of some religious or moral lapse, or was perhaps believed by his family to have perished, and possibly did perish, in some distant land, so that no record of the fact was made.

The Minutes of Proceedings of the Dublin Monthly Meeting,—which have been carefully searched,—fail to show any testimony of denial or disownment of Robert Barclay, son of John, as they certainly would have done had his family abandoned him because of *religious* lapse; and the criminal records of Dublin County, which have also been searched from 1720 to 1750, contain no reference to his name. It is hardly probable, therefore, that he was disowned because of a *moral* lapse. Yet the fact that no entry of his death appears upon Eustace Street records, is cogent evidence, as it seems to the writer, that he did *not* die in childhood. His father, as we have seen above, was an influential

member of the Dublin Monthly Meeting, and the family deaths are carefully chronicled on its records both before and after the year 1750,—the date of the father's will, to be referred to below. In this connection, note the records of the burials of John Barclay's daughters Christian Barclay in 1719, Katherine Barclay in 1720, and the second Katherine Barclay in 1735; of John Barclay himself in 1751; and of his wife Anne Barclay in 1771. Surely if Robert had died in Dublin in childhood, some mention of his death or burial would have appeared on these records; and it is not a violent presumption from the records alone to presume that he left Dublin in his young manhood for other parts and was either known or believed by his parents to have died, or was so wholly lost sight of after a lapse of many years as to have been regarded as dead by his family.

Be the fact as it may, however, there can be no doubt that on March 6, 1750, when John Barclay, the father, made his will, Robert Barclay, his eldest son, was either known or believed by him to be dead,—or had possibly been disowned. The will was dated as above and together with two codicils was proved November 20, 1753. The testator mentions his wife Anne Barclay; his son John Barclay; his five unmarried daughters Anne Barclay, Patience Barclay, Elizabeth Barclay, Jane Barclay and Lydia Barclay; his daughter Experience Clibborn; his grandson Barclay Clibborn, son of Experience; and his wife's niece Joanna Rooke. He directs that his business in which his son John is a partner should be continued under the name of "Anne Barclay and Son," for the benefit of his wife, son and unmarried daughters; and he appoints, as his executors and trustees, his wife Anne Barclay, his son John Barclay, his son-in-law James Clibborn, and Robert Clibborn, the elder, of Meath Street, Dublin, a brother of said James Clibborn.

His son Robert Barclay is not mentioned in the will or in either of the codicils.<sup>48</sup>

And finally the following clause of the will seems wholly inconsistent with a belief on the testator's part that Robert, his son, was then living:

"..... To the intent and purpose that my said dear wife shall and may have, receive, take and enjoy to her own use, one full third part of the interest, benefit and produce thereof during her natural life, with full power for her to dispose of the said one-third part of my fortune, either in her lifetime or at her decease, to and amongst our dear children in such shares and proportions and at such times as my said dear wife, by deed or will, shall appoint; and for want of such appointment the same to go equally among all our dear children, share and share alike. . . . ."

So, too, in the will of John Barclay's sister, *Katherine Forbes* above noted,<sup>29</sup> dated February, 15, 1758, mention is made of all the then living children of John Barclay, *except* Robert; and the conclusion may be fairly drawn that the testatrix either knew or believed that Robert was dead, or possibly,—as seems to have been the fate of most of the kin who abjured the faith of the Friends,—had ceased to regard him as one of the family.

The circumstances thus noted in connection with the possibility of Robert Barclay of Dublin (b 1717/18) being the father of John Barclay and of Thomas Barclay of St. Mary's County, Maryland, are too slight and inconsequent to form the basis of a claim, or even of an opinion. They are here set forth in the hope that as time goes on further light may be shed upon both features of the problem.

## PART VI.

Line of Descent from Thomas Barclay of St. Mary's County, Maryland.

HE ancestry of Thomas Barchay (b St. Mary's County, Md., March 18 1755) is 1 Md., March 18, 1755), is by no means clear enough to warrant its being made the basis of a claim, even, much less of an assertion. From family tradition,—an unreliable source at best,—and from statements made by a life-long friend of Thomas Barclay to his son Judge Joseph Barclay (No. 6 below), it would seem that he were of the Ury family; and yet the only member of that family through which such descent could possibly be traced would be Robert Barclay of Dublin, son of John Barclay of the same place and grandson of the apologist. Whether this Robert Barclay ever attained manhood or married or had issue, is a matter of conjecture only, as was pointed out in Part V above. No record is preserved either at Dublin or elsewhere (so far as the writer has yet discovered), of anything more than the date and place of this Robert Barclay's birth; and if it be a fact that he came out to America and married and had issue, such fact was unknown to his family or else was ignored by them because of some moral or religious lapse on his part.

Of course it is possible that in his early manhood this Robert Barclay sailed abroad (for his father was interested in shipping and commerce), and was generally believed to have been lost at sea, when such was not the fact; and that for reasons best known to himself he was content that the misapprehension should continue. But be the conjecture what it may, the only facts established are that he was born in Dublin 19th, 1st mo., 1717/18, a son of John Barclay and a grandson of the Apologist, and that while records of the births, deaths and marriages (or disownments) of all other members of his family were carefully entered at the Monthly Meeting, no record of any kind was entered concerning this Robert Barclay beyond the record of his birth. The future, let it be hoped, will shed light upon the problem.

Thomas Barclay of St. Mary's County, Md., died in 1804 at Shrewsbury, N. J., and was buried in the graveyard there of Christ Church, of which he had formerly been a vestryman. For some thus far undiscovered reason, he persistently refused even to converse with his wife concerning his father's family, or to answer any queries she put to him with regard thereto; and he left her, as she subsequently told her children, in absolute ignorance of all except that his father's name was Robert, that his mother was an Overton, and that he had had an older brother John.

On July 12, 1776, Thomas Barclay enlisted from St. Mary's County, Md., as a member of the "Flying Camp," and he served throughout the war. In 1779 he was a member of Major Anderson's 3rd Maryland Regiment, which formed a part of Washington's command in New Jersey, and while there he met, and later married, Catherine Williams, the daughter of John Williams of Shrewsbury, whose lands had been confiscated and who was himself then a fugitive because of his adherence to the King. After the war Thomas Barclay made his home in Shrewsbury, and his children all were born there.

His mother,—an Overton,—was possibly *Margaret Overton*, the daughter of William Overton of Hanover County, Va., and Peggy Garland, his wife. There is, however, no certain record of his mother's Christian name or parentage.

The will of his brother John, who died in St. Mary's County, Md., bore date June 12, 1792, and was proved on August 10th of the same year. It would appear from such will that John Barclay never married.

## PART VII.

Line of Descent from Rev. Thomas Barclay, the first Rector of St. Peter's Church at Albany.

T SEEMS to have been generally assumed, although erroneously, that Rev. Thomas Barclay had but three sons,—Thomas, Henry and Andrew. Mr. George L. Rives, in his book already referred to,—"Correspondence of Thomas Barclay" (New York, Harper & Bros., 1894),—states that the sons were Thomas, Anthony and Henry, and that Anthony married Helena, daughter of Jacobus Roosevelt; but this was undoubtedly a mere clerical error on the part of Mr. Rives. There was no Anthony in the family until Rev. Henry Barclay so named his second son, in honor, doubtless, of the boy's maternal grandfather, Col. Anthony Rutgers.<sup>1</sup>

That Rev. Thomas Barclay had *four* children is certain from his wife's letter to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, under date of May 22, 1722, quoted in Part II above; and that the fourth child was also a son and bore the name *John*, are the only inferences which it seems to the writer the facts about to be considered will permit.

In the office of the Surrogate of New York County, in Liber 36 of Wills, at page 194, is recorded the will of "John Barclay, mayor of the City of Albany." This will was dated January 30th, 1779, and was proved before the Surrogate of Albany County on June 20th, 1783. It refers to a previous wife of the testator, without naming her; appoints his present wife, Margaret, an executrix, and gives to her a life interest in his residuary estate; makes specific bequests to "Charlotte, wife of Coenradt Ten Eyck" and to "Peter Ten Eyck, son of Andries Ten Eyck;" and then, and upon the death of his wife, gives one half of his residuary estate to "the children" (unfortunately not naming

them) "of my brother Andrew Barclay, lately deceased," and the other half to "the children" (also not naming them) "of my late "brother, Henry Barclay, deceased." The records just cited show that Andrew Barclay's will was proved May 25th, 1776, and that Rev. Henry Barclay's will had been proved many years before,—on October 1st, 1764.

It would indeed be a strange coincidence if there were two Barclay families of prominence at that time so closely identified with the City of Albany, in each of which there were three sons named, respectively, Henry, Andrew and John; and the coincidence would be still more marked if the Andrew and the Henry in each of these families had died at about the same time,—the Andrews within a comparatively short time before the month of January, 1779, and the Henrys some years before. The coincidence would be too extraordinary for acceptance without further circumstances to support it; and it seems to the writer that as Mrs. Barclay's letter of May 22, 1722, conclusively establishes that Rev. Thomas Barclay had four children instead of three, it may reasonably be assumed that the fourth child was a son named John, who subsequently became Mayor of the City of Albany.

The will of John Barclay, Mayor of Albany, makes no mention of any issue who might survive him, and the disposition of his residuary estate, in the manner above pointed out, permits the inference that he died without issue.

Furthermore, the records at Albany show that throughout the revolutionary struggle this John Barclay was an earnest patriot and zealously supported the cause of the colonies.<sup>2</sup> Col. Thomas Barclay (a son of Rev. Henry), on the other hand, and his brothers-in-law, Stephen de Lancey and Beverley Robinson, were ardent loyalists and fought for the King. Although John Barclay, of Albany, evidently did not choose that these differences should sunder the ties of blood, the fact that his name has wholly disappeared from the more or less plastic charts of the family that have come down to the Barclays of to-day, is probably trace-

able to the bitterness with which the loyalist descendents of Rev. Thomas regarded a "rebel," even of their own kith and kin.

John Barclay was a prominent member, and vestryman, of St. Peter's Church at Albany both before and during the exciting incumbency of Rev. Harry Munro,<sup>3</sup> and seems in all ways to have been a man of strength and of influence in the community. His first wife was *Gerritje Coeymans* (bap 21 October, 1722), daughter of Pieter Barentse Coeymans, who had married 5 October, 1713, Elizabeth Greveraad;<sup>4</sup> and his second wife was *Margaret Ten Eyck*. The list of marriage licenses issued out of the Provincial Secretary's office at Albany, shows that on August 28th, 1771, a marriage license was granted to *John Barclay* and *Margaret Ten Eyck*;<sup>5</sup> and the parish records of St. Peter's Church contain an entry that on September 8th, 1771, John Barclay was married "by license." Curiously enough, the parish records do not state to whom he was married.

That John Barclay died before the expiration of his term of office as mayor (it was his only term), is shown by the following extract from the Records of the City of Albany:

## "Albany Common Council Chamber 4 March 1779

It would appear from this that he died on February 18th, 1779,—or possibly on the preceding day; but none of the contemporary newspapers which the writer has been able to find, nor indeed any other record, gives definite information as to the date of his death.

Practically nothing is known of Rev. Thomas Barclay's oldest son, Thomas Barclay, beyond the fact that he died un-

married. At least the statement that he "died unmarried" appears on several of the charts which have come to the writer's notice, and nothing has thus far developed which suggests a doubt as to the accuracy of such statement. Neither the date of his birth nor the date of his death is recorded on any of the charts.

The line of descent from Rev. Thomas Barclay through his other sons, Henry and Andrew, is rather generally known. Yet in many surprising instances absolute ignorance exists of the dates of birth, death or marriage of even comparatively recent descendants of this well-known ancestor. The writer has undertaken,—and it has proved no easy task,—to compile a table, brought down to the present day, of all descendants of Rev. Thomas Barclay; and he believes that what follows is substantially correct. The dates, for the most part, have been furnished him from the private records of the various families in the line of descent, and he would be glad to give, upon request therefor, his authority for any name or date which appears in this table. At the same time he would welcome the correction of error and the supplying of any omitted name or date.

The appearance of a † after a name in the table indicates that the writer is without further information concerning such person or his or her possible issue.

He entered the British army in 1776, and in the following Fehruary was made Captain in the Loyal American Regiment of New Yorkers. In 1780 he hecame Major in a corps of light infantry, and served in Virginia and Carolina. While on his way from Charleston to the Chesapeake with despatches from Lord Rawdon to Earl Cornwallis, he was captured by the French fleet but was soon exchanged and rejoined his regiment, with which he remained until it was disbanded in 1783. In the fall of that year he took his family to Nova Scotia and engaged in farming at Wilmot. Among the hound pamphlets in the library of the New York Historical Society, is an extremely well written and unusually interesting one entitled Memoirs of Mrs. Coghlan, New York: T. & J. Swords, 1795. The writer, Margaret Coghlan, was the daughter of Major Moncrieffe by a former wife; and in these Memoirs, written at the age of but thirty-three, she tells of the life, crowded to overflowing with unusual incident even for the days of the Revolution, of a spirited girl who was forced by the iron wills of her father and hrother, when hut fourteen years of age, to marry a man, Lieut. John Coghlan, whom she abhorred and despised. The particular interest of the Memoirs in connection with the Barclay descent is the tribute paid by Mrs. Coghlan to her father's third wife, Helena Barclay.

The father's first marriage was to Margaret Heron, a daughter of the Governor of Annapolis Royal, who was a wife at fourteen and in her grave before she was twenty, leaving two children surviving her, Edward Cornwallis Moncrieffe and Margaret Moncrieffe, the writer of the Memoirs. In 1765, when the hrother was five and the sister hut three, they were sent by their father to Dublin to be educated, and there they remained until 1772. On Octoher 10, 1764, hardly a year after his first wife's death, Major Moncrieffe had married Polly Livingston, a daughter of Judge Livingston of New York; and in 1770 he came to Dublin with his regiment, the 55th, and hrought his wife with him. "The person of this lady," writes Mrs. Coghlan, "was uncommonly forhidding, but her purse was irresistible. Young as I was, I did not like my new mother. She had, as I ahove remarked, the most disagreeable countenance, and, what is worse, she was a stranger to every social virtue and a rigid Presbyterian."

In 1772, the hrother and sister returned to New York. The former entered Kings College, while the latter remained under the care of a governess. In January, 1774, their stepmother died childless, at the age of thirty-four, leaving her fortune to her hushand, "for in her marriage articles," writes Mrs. Coghlan, "she had reserved to herself the power of disposing of it."

Less than six months after his second wife's death, Mrs. Coghlan continues, her father took to himself another wife, "one of the lovliest of her sex" (Helena Barclay). "In her bosom virtue, honour and conjugal affection were blended; hut alas!

her fate destined her for an early grave. Ten months after her marriage she died in childbirth of her infant son, my youngest brother, leaving him and myself under the care of her brother-in-law, Mr. Frederick Jay, who was then member of Congress for the province of New York.

"At this time my father was with General Gage, at Boston. Thus I found myself in the midst of republicans in war against the crown of Great Britain,—persecuted on every side, because my father was fighting for the cause of a king! At the age of thirteen, I was sent to hoard at Elizaheth-Town, New Jersey, with the family of an American Colonel, where I was forced to hear my nearest and dearest relations continually traduced."

She states that at the commencement of the war Congress had repeatedly offered her father a command in the Northern army, which was subsequently given to his nephew, General Montgomery; but all such offers were rejected, "and thus," she writes, "we lost the glorious opportunity of adding the laurel of patriotism to a name high in the ranks of military valor, and perhaps unequalled in military science. No man ever served the British Monarch with more fidelity or fought for him with greater bravery."

Her marriage to Lieut. John Coghlan occurred on February 28th, 1777, and her father died (according to these Memoirs) on December 10th, 1791.

A possibly different conception of the character of Major Moncrieffe's second wife may be gathered from the following obituary notice which appeared in Rivington's New York Gazetteer of Thursday, January, 13, 1774:

"Last Tuesday night" (that is, January 11, 1774) "at 9 o'clock, Major Moncreffer met with the inexpressible loss of his Lady, Mrs. Moncrieffe, who died in the 34th year of her age, of a consumption; which, leaving her the free use of her reason, gave her the advantage of exhibiting a degree of patience that allowed not a repining word, and an example of such eminent heroism and affection, that it is difficult which most to admire, the undaunted fortitude of the one, or the ardour and tenderness of the other. Mrs. Moncrieffe was the youngest child of James Livingston, Esq., deceased, and has left an only daughter." (The panegyrist evidently thought, though erroneously, that Margaret Moncrieffe was a daughter of the second wife.) "The corpse will be interred on Friday evening in the old Presbyterian Church."

In Gaine's Gazette and Weekly Mercury of Monday, March 3, 1777, appears the following notice of Margaret Moncrieffe's marriage:

"Last Monday Evening" (that is, February 24, 1777) "Lieut. John Coghlan, of the 7th, or English Fuzileers, was married by the Rev'd Dr. Auchmuty, to Miss Margaret Moncrieffe, only Daughter to Thomas Moncrieffe, Esq."

years and aid-de-camp to H. R. H. the Duke of York, Commander-in-Chief. In 1825 he was appointed aid-de-camp to His present Majesty George IV, with the rank of Colonel, and for his gallant conduct at the hattle of Waterloo created a Companion of the Bath. His death was universally lamented. To his aged parents and friends his loss is irreparable."

A note by Walter Channing Barclay states that the issue of the marriage of DeLancey Barclay with the widow of Gurney Barclay, was one son, for whom George IV stood godfather and to whom he gave £5,000. The child died within a few days and his parents took over the royal gift. After the death of DeLancey Barclay his widow again married,—her third choice heing Dr. Stewart, Dean of Windsor.

<sup>1</sup>The Allardices, of Allardice, held the lands from which they took their name from the time of King William the Lion. The estate of Allardice lies in the parish of Arbuthnott, Kincardine, Scotland, and the burial aisle of the family is in the very ancient, but recently restored, church of Arbuthnott where a brass tablet inserted in the wall indicates the position of the Allardice aisle. Allardice Castle, the old family seat, dates back to 1540 or earlier. It is one of the most notable of the castles of Kincardineshire. It is still habitable, and stands on high ground overlooking the Bervie water, about two miles from the sea, where doubtless the older keep of the Allardices of that ilk had stood for centuries. When the Allardice estate was sold in 1872,—some eighteen years after the death of Capt. Robert Barclay-Allardice (No. 30 below),—it was acquired by Lord Arbuthnott and now forms part of the Arbuthnott estate.

SARAH ANN ALLARDICE was the undoubted representative of Prince David, Earl of Strathearn, son of King Robert II of Scotland, baving been served and "retoured" (that is, entered in the chancery records) heir-general to his descendant, William Graham, 8th Earl of Monteith and 2nd Earl of Airth. Her son, Capt. Robert Barelay-Allardice (No. 30 below) laid claim to these titles under the Letters Patent of 21 March 1633 (and was sometimes, therefore, known as "The Claimant"), which claim was revived by his daughter Margaret Barelay-Allardice (No. 36 below), and has again been revived by her oldest son Robert Barelay-Allardice (No. 38 below).

In New Jersey Gazette of Wednesday, 28 June, 1780, appears a notice dated at Trenton, June 26, 1780, signed by Thomas Barclay and Samuel Meredith, calling for wagons to convey provisions to the army under Washington's command. The subscribers agree to pay for the wagons, provide fodder and prevent impressment.

#### Delaware.

John Barclay of White Clay Creek Hundred, merchant (White Clay Creek was in the vicinity of Wilmington, Del.), in 1777 married *Eleanor Porter* of New Castle Hundred (Records of Baltimore Yearly Meeting, at Park Avenue Meeting House, Baltimore). For his second wife he married *Mary Searle*. See Part X above.

The original marriage bond given by him on the occasion of his marriage to Eleanor Porter, with David Finney, "of Mill "Creek Hundred," his surety, in the sum of six hundred pounds "good and lawful money of America" is on file at Wilmington, Del., dated June 24th, 1777. It reads, in part, as follows:

"The Condition of this Obligation is such that there shall not hereafter appear any Lawfull Let or Impediment by Reason of any Pre-Contracted Consanguinity, Affinity, or any other just excuse whatever, but that the above mentioned John Barclay and Eleanor Porter of New Castle Hundred in the County of New Castle County, May Lawfully Marry and that there is not any suit pending before the Judge Ecclesiastical or Civil for or against any such Pre-Conduct, and also if the said Parties, and each of them, are of the full age of Twenty-one, and are not under the Tuition of his or her Parents or Guardians respectively to the said marriage, and if they or either of them are not indentured servants, and do and shall save harmless and kept indemnified the above John McKinley Esq. (President and Commander in Chief of the Delaware State) and his successors, for and concerning the Premises, and that likewise the said parties in Matrimony for or by of so doing, that this obligation to be void, null and of none effect, or else to stand and remain in full Force and Virtue."

ELIZABETH BARCLAY of White Clay Creek in New Castle County, left a will dated II May, 1811, proved II November, 1811. Bequests were made to Nicholas Van Dyke and to the three children of the testatrix's sister Ann Cloud, namely, Alice Eliza Cloud, Mary Forrest Cloud and Jeremiah Cloud. Executor: Rev. Francis Hindman (New Castle County Wills, Book Q., p. 1).

The original order was sent to Philadelphia, 3rd mo., 20th, 1761.

Colerain and Little Britain townships were on the Octoraro Creek near the Susquehanna River, and not far from the border of Cecil County, Maryland.

In 1761 (day and month not stated) she filed her account in which she described herself as "widow and relict" of WILLIAM BARCLAY, deceased. WILLIAM BARCLAY and JOHN BARCLAY are mentioned in the account.

On April 2, 1764, was proved the will of Hugh Barclay of Colerain Township, dated March 9, 1754. Mentions son Hugh Barclay; son (sic) John McConnall; daughter Mary Barclay; son William Barclay; and wife Mary Barclay. The children seemed all to be under twenty-one. Executors: John McConnall and Joseph Miller. Witnesses: Daniel McConnall, Martha Barclay and Margaret Barclay, of Lancaster County.

On May 6, 1765, was proved the will of John Barclay of Colerain Township, Lancaster County, dated December 22, 1764. Mentions wife, Martha Barclay; also a "Miss Martha Barclay," without stating the relationship, if any; cousin, Mary Allison; nephew, Joseph Barclay; brother Hugh Barclay's son, Hugh Barclay; John Barclay and Hugh Barclay, sons of testator's brother, William Barclay; and makes bequests to John McConnall, Daniel McConnall and Alexander McConnall. Executors: wife Martha Barclay, Daniel McConnall and Hugh Barclay.

On June 8, 1765, were filed the accounts of John McConnall and Joseph Miller as executors of the last will and testament of HUGH BARCLAY late of Colerain Township, Lancaster County,

deceased. Recite that deceased was the guardian of one William Turner.

On March 3, 1769, James Barclay, of Lancaster County, Penn., filed his bond as administrator, etc., of Andrew Barclay, deceased, with James Marshall and James Porter of the same place, sureties.

On the same day WILLIAM BARCLAY filed a renunciation, dated February 27, 1769, of the right to administration on the estate of "my father" Andrew Barclay, in favor of "my brother" James Barclay.

On October 27, 1769, were filed the accounts of James Barclay as administrator, etc., of Andrew Barclay, late of the Township of Drewmore in Lancaster County, yeoman, deceased.

On December 2, 1769, were filed the accounts of Martha Barclay, Daniel McConnall and Hugh Barclay as executors of the last will and testament of John Barclay, late of Colerain Township, Lancaster County, deceased.

On April 21, 1778, was proved the will of John Barclay, yeoman, of Little Britain Township, Lancaster County, dated 1773 (day and month not stated). Mentions wife Jean Barclay, and two children (both seemingly under ten years of age) Mary Barclay and John Barclay, and brothers Hugh Barclay, Stephen Barclay and Joseph Barclay. Executor: brother Hugh Barclay. Witnesses: John Allison and Hugh Quigley.

On June 24, 1816, was proved the will of WILLIAM BARCLAY, yeoman, of Colerain Township, Lancaster County, dated May 11, 1816. Mentions wife ELIZABETH BARCLAY; son STEWART BARCLAY; daughters, ANN BARCLAY, ELIZABETH BARCLAY, MARY BARCLAY and MATILDA BARCLAY; and three grandchildren, "heirs" of his daughter Mary,—William S., Louisa and Henrietta Louise (last names not stated). Executor: wife ELIZABETH BARCLAY.

"To be Sold by Public Vendue, on Tuesday the 16th instant, at Summerset (where Thomas Barclay Esquire lately resided, near Trentonferry), Some Household Furniture and a Variety of farming Utensils. Attendance will be given and the terms made known by

John Barclay."

From New York Gazette of Thursday, 19 March, 1801:

"Married: Last Thursday evening" (that is, March 12, 1801) "by the Rev. Dr. Linn, Mr. James Barkley, Merchant of Philadelphia, to Miss Finlay."

Died at Philadelphia, June 9, 1806, James Barclay, Jr.

From Maryland Journal and Baltimore Advertiser of Friday, February 13, 1789:

John Barclay of Philadelphia, joins in a petition of upwards of 2,000 respectable citizens of Philadelphia, to the General Assembly, praying a repeal of any law or part of a law which prohibits the exhibition of Dramatic Entertainment.

From New York Gazette of Saturday, 13 January, 1819:

"Marricd, at Philadelphia" (date not stated) " $John\ Jarden$  to Miss Grace Barclay."

From New York Gazette of Thursday, 2 December, 1819:

"Died, at Philadelphia," (date not stated) "Mrs. Catharine Barclay, aged 28."

# Maryland.

REV. JOHN BARCLAY (d September 9, 1772), rector of St. Peter's Church in Talbot County, Maryland, son of David Barclay of Kincardine, Scotland, and Christian Barclay, his wife, m March 4, 1768, Rachel Goldsborough, dau. of Nicholas Goldsborough and Sarah Jolly Turbutt, his wife; b January, 1735, d September 18, 1796.

They had one child, Sarah Barclay, b August 1, 1771, m October 23, 1788, Joseph Haskins, for many years Cashier of the Farmers Bank of Maryland, at Easton, Talbot Co., b February 28, 1762 (Records of St. Peter's Parish, Talbot Co., Md., and "Old Kent," by George A. Hanson, M. A.)

The children of Joseph Haskins and Sarah Barclay Haskins, his wife, were (1) John Barclay Haskins, b October 3, 1789; d August 1790 (Records of St. Peter's Parish, p. 318); (2) Barclay Haskins m (1) 1842 Elizabeth Robins Hayward; m (2) Mary Trippe, dau. of Richard Trippe of Baylies Neck; and (3) Ann Haskins who m John Bowie and had children, John Haskins Bowie, Louisa Bowie, Emily Bowie, Isabella Bowie, Dallas Bowie, and Josephine Haskins Bowie ("Old Kent" by George A. Hanson, M. A., page 295).

The will of Rev. John Barclay, dated July 6, 1772, was proved November 22, 1772, and recorded at Annapolis, Md. He makes reference in his will to his two married sisters, *Elizabeth Walker* and *Anne Keth* (Book No. 38 of Wills, p. 983).

THOMAS BARCLAY, m March 26, 1763, Margaret Cole at St. Paul's Parish, Baltimore County, Md. The church now stands at the corner of North Charles and Saratoga Streets, Baltimore (Records of St. Paul's Parish, Baltimore).

John Barclay (or Barkley), late of Edinburgh, North Britain, but now of Annapolis, Anne Arundel County, Md., left a will dated October 13, 1732, proved November 28, 1732, and recorded at Annapolis. He appoints his wife, *Grace Hay Barclay*, his executrix and, in her absence from the province, appoints his friends Robert Gordon and William Tweedie of Annapolis, executors for the purpose of disposing of his property and turning the proceeds over to his wife. No children are mentioned and the testator describes himself as "being distant from my wife and family." *Witnesses:* William Cumming, George Stewart and Burgis Copner (Book No. 20 of Wills, p. 484).

Accounts were rendered by Robert Gordon and William Tweedie on May 16, 1735 (*Liber* 13 of Accounts, fol. 67).

Inventory was filed as of the Estate of "Capt. John Berkley," and recites "Kindred nine" (*Liber* 17, fol. 442).

John Barclay (or Barkley) of Somerset County, Md., left a will in the record of which his name and the name of his children are written "Barklett." The will was dated February 21, 1753, was proved November 18, 1756, and recorded at Annapolis. He gives all his real estate to his youngest son Alworth Barclay (or Barkley), and mentions two other sons John Barclay and Abraham Barclay, a daughter Alice Barclay, and wife Ann Barclay. Witnesses: John Wallace, Bloyce Harris and Joseph Dashiell (Book No. 30 of Wills, p. 215).

In the record of the inventory of his estate the name is written indifferently "Barkely" and "Berkley." Ailworth Barkley appears to have been the executor and the only next of kin mentioned are Abraham Barkley and Alice Barkley (Lib. 62, fol. 256).

JOHN BARCLAY (or Barkeley) of Somerset County, Md., left a will dated August 30, 1774, proved April 6, 1775, and recorded at Annapolis. In the record of this will the name of his son *Charles Barclay*, whom he appoints executor, is written "Charles Barklett," while the names of his sons *Henry Barclay* and *John Barclay* are written "Henry Berkley" and "John Berkley." He refers to a wife, without naming her, and to a friend Ephraim King. He also mentions a grandson *Elijah Bar-*

clay (recorded as "Elijah Barklett,") seemingly the son of Charles. Witnesses: Martha Kemp, Rachel Barkley and Sarah Barkley (Book No. 40 of Wills, p. 386).

In Testamentary Procedure Book No. 46, fol. 300, the filing of this will is noted, and *Henry Wallace Barkley* and *J. Joseph Barkley* are recorded as sureties on the executor's bond.

Sarah Barkley, dau. of Thomas Barkley and Margaret Barkley, his wife, b December 14, 1724 (Records of Stepney Parish, Somerset County, Md., p. 40).

JOHN BARKLEY b January 3, 1799 (Ibid, p. 183).

# From Land Records of Kent County.

THOMAS BARKLEY of Kent County, Merchant, is described, July 10, 1747, as being the owner of 275 acres in Kent County known as "Blays Range" and "Blays Addition" (J. S. No. 26, page 50).

On March 3, 1749, he takes from Peregrine Brown, of Kent County, gentleman, in consideration of £305, current money, a tract of six acres at the mouth of Turner's Creek called "Jarman Point" (J. S. No. 26, page 321).

("Turner's Creek" was in the vicinity of Galena P. O. in Kent County, and took its name from a family of Friends who lived in that vicinity until a comparatively recent time).

On June 9, 1749, he conveys the tract last mentioned to Thomas Crosby, of Philadelphia, merchant, for £408 (J. S. No. 26, page 323).

On April 7, 1750, for the consideration of £350, current money of Maryland, he takes from Samuel Milborn of Kent County, Planter, a parcel of 200 acres being part of a tract called "Suffolk" (J. S. No. 26, page 303).

On May 4, 1750, he conveys the tract last mentioned to James McLaughlin and Alexander Lunan of Cecil County, Maryland, for £450 (J. S. No. 26, page 316).

On Oetober 3, 1750, he eonveys to William Rasin, of Kent County, gentleman, all the real estate in Kent County which he held in right of his wife or of which she was possessed when he married her (J. S. No. 26, page 324).

From the Records of Shrewsbury Parish, Kent County.

(Shrewsbury Parish was near Turner's Creek,—a branch of the Sassafras River which divides Kent and Cecil Counties).

THOMAS BARKLEY and Mrs. Isabella Wethered were married January 23, 1746/7 (p. 264).

Mrs. Isabella Wethered's maiden name was Isabella Blay. She was the youngest daughter of Col. William Blay, of Blay's Range, the only son of Col. Edward Blay and Ann Blay, his wife, who was for many years a vestryman of Shrewsbury Parish and represented Kent in the Legislature of Maryland during the sessions of 1714 and 1715. Col. William Blay married Isabella Pearee, daughter of Judge William Pearee and Isabella Pearee, his wife. Their children were: John Tilden Edward Blay, b January 31, 1707; William Blay, b October 22, 1714; and Isabella Blay, who first married Richard Wethered, son of Samuel Wethered and Dolly Lewin, his wife (Old Kent, p. 316).

From the Records of St. John's or Piscataway Parish, Prince George County, Maryland.

MARY WELLING BARKLEY, dau. of Rodman Barkley and Virlinda Barkley, his wife, b October 13, 1791.

From the Statutes of the Province of Maryland.

A private act, passed at the October, 1753, Session of the Maryland Legislature, was entitled: "An Act for the relief of "Thomas Barkley, a languishing Prisoner in Kent County "Gaol."

Recites that for four years and upwards Thomas Barkley, of Kent County, had been closely confined for debt and that the sheriff as well as the principal and greatest number of his creditors were willing to release him, and then

Enacts that unless within thirty days some creditor should give security for the payment of the future imprisonment fees and for meat, drink and clothing during his future imprisonment, he be discharged from custody. An oath was required from the debtor that he owned absolutely nothing, real or personal, and he was granted three years immunity from prosecution by the sheriff for imprisonment fees.

FROM THE RECORDS OF HARFORD COUNTY.

(N. B. Harford County was established in 1773. Prior to that its limits were included in Baltimore County).

### Land Records.

JOHN BARCLAY, on December 28, 1788, was surety with one William Whiteford on the bond of Thomas Steel as administrator of Capt. James Steel of Harford County, Md. (Book 1, p. 274).

John Barclay petitioned the County Court for the issuing of a commission to mark and bound a tract that he was possessed of called the "Grove," which he apprehends from original location thereof. The prayer of the petition was granted and the commission met September 7, 1788, and again October 21, 1788. The principal witness was a man who testified that he had carried the Surveyor's chain on a survey 27 years before and the bounds seem largely to have been determined by his recollection. Final report of commission March 21, 1798.

1808, March 23, Joshua Barclay, legatee of *John Barclay*, deceased, conveys to Elizabeth R. Barclay all his interest in his father's estate.

1815, March 6, John Barclay and Mary Barclay, his wife, convey to John McCauseland a tract in Harford County called "Barclay's Slope" and another called "Barclay's Dream," and all the share of the grantor in lands of which his father John Barclay died seized.

1815, March 6, John Barclay, son of *John Barclay*, conveys to George McCauseland all his interest in his father's estate.

1820, September 15, ROBERT BARCLAY, of Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, conveys to George McCauseland, of Harford County, his undivided right in 392 acres called "Prospect," and a tract of 33 acres which his father *John Barclay*, deceased, had purchased from Joseph Miller.

## Wills and Administration.

Will of John Barclay of Harford County, Md., dated October 12, 1799; proved June 23, 1800. Mentions wife, Elizabeth Rogers Barclay, and his six sons, John Gill Barclay, James Barclay, William Barclay, Joshua Gill Barclay, Robert Barclay and George Washington Barclay, the last three of whom are described as his "three youngest sons." Witnesses: John Weeks, Robert M. Fadin and James Kilpatrick.

Will of John Barclay of Harford County, Md., dated May 14, 1833; proved June 4, 1833. Mentions mother, Mary Barclay, grandfather, Joseph Stokes, and sisters, Elizabeth Forwood and Hannah Barclay. Refers to land devised to him by his grandfather as being part of a tract called "Clark's Den, Merry in Antrim." Witnesses: Harvey Stokes, Isaac Pyle and John H. Stokes.

### FROM RECORDS OF CECIL COUNTY.

(N. B. Cecil County was organized in 1674).

#### Wills and Administration.

1750, April 2, Bond of Richard Price as administrator, etc., of George Barkley, late of Cecil County, deceased. John Holland and Isaac Hamm were sureties on the bond.

1781, December 10, Bond of WILLIAM BARKLEY, Gentleman, as executor of JAMES BARKLEY, late of Cecil County, deceased. Richard Hall and Andrew Work were sureties on the bond.

Executor's accounts filed February 11, 1782. Among the debtors to the estate were John Barkley and James Barkley.

#### Land Records.

1787, December 10, WILLIAM BARCLAY of Cecil County takes from Richard Hall of the same place, title to one negro boy as

security against liability on a bond to Archibald Job which William Barclay signed as surety at Richard Hall's request.

1790, January 12, WILLIAM BARCLAY, of West Nottingham Hundred, Cecil County, Md., and Sarah Barclay, his wife, convey to Joseph Barclay of the same place, 122 acres of grantor's tract known as "Barclay's Square."

1794, December 18, JOSEPH BARCLAY, of West Nottingham Hundred, Cecil County, Md., conveys the 122 acres last described to Abraham Trump of the same place.

From "Notes and Queries" by William Henry Egle, M. D., M. A.

WILLIAM BARCLAY died previously to 1761. At that time his widow Esther Barclay had married one McIntire. He had eight children: John Barclay, Hugh Barclay, Stephen Barclay, Joseph Barclay, Mary Barclay, Margaret Barclay, Martha Barclay and Esther Barclay (page 137).

FROM RENT ROLLS OF TALBOT COUNTY.

On March 12, 1662, NICHOLAS BARKLEY, together with one John Alley, caused a survey to be made by one Richard Neck of 300 acres on the North side of the Choptank River in the dividing creek, possessed by Robert Martin.

On December 28, 1665, NICHOLAS BARKLEY caused a survey to be made by one Petty French of 150 acres on the North side of Choptank River at the head of the Northeast branch of Treadavon (Trade Haven?) Creek, possessed by John Sherwood for the heirs of James Berry.

From Sundry Parish Records of Maryland.

Zion German Lutheran Christ Church of Baltimore.

MARRIED: "1788, Ausen Gemeinde 4," George D. Barkley and Sophia Warwick (p. 388).

Baptized: 1792, September 7, Mary Barkley, child of George Barkley and Sophia Barkley, b August 11, 1792 (p. 30).

First German Reformed Congregation of Baltimore.

Married: 1789, January 19, Jemima Barkley and James Gormley (p. 192).

First Presbyterian Church, Baltimore.

MARRIED: 1798, November 1, Thomas Barkley and Jane McCormick. (p. 3).

Born: 1816, November 2, Rebecca Barkley, dau. of John Barkley and Ann Barkley.

1817, December 3, SARAH JANE BARKLEY, dau. of John and Ann Barkley.

1819, February 19, James Barkley, son of John Barkley and Ann Barkley.

William & Mary Parish (Popular Hill Church), St. Mary's County.

In January, 1808, a Rev. Francis Barclay applied for the rectorship and was accepted and continued rector until March 7, 1810, when he resigned. His letter of resignation is spread at length upon the vestry minutes at page 20. He states therein that he has been called to "the church of Alexandria," and refers to his children as orphans and as "without relatives."

From the Military Records of Maryland Soldiers in the Revolutionary War.

(Maryland Archives, vol. XVIII).

JAMES BARCLAY (or Barkley) enlisted May 20, 1776, in the 6th Co. of Maryland Volunteers, commanded by Capt. Peter Adams; 1st Lieut. Nathaniel Ewing; 2nd Lieut. Alexander Murray; Ensign, John Jordan.

James Barclay is recorded in June, 1778, as a deserter from the 1st Reg't. Maryland Troops, commanded by Lieut. Peter Brown.

JOHN BARCLAY (or Barkley) appears in the Muster and Pay Roll of 1780 among the men "passed by Thomas Rutter, Baltimore County," on April 11th, 1780.

THOMAS BARCLAY (recorded "Bartcly") was enrolled from St. Mary's County by Capt. Uriah Forrest, and was received and passed as a member of the "Flying Camp," by John A. Briscoe, on July 12, 1776.

From the Muster rolls of Major Archibald Anderson's 3rd Maryland Regiment for December, 1779, it appears that Thomas Barclay (here recorded "Barkly") had enlisted for "during the war," but was at that time absent on furlough.

Among the certificates received from John White, Adjutant's Commissioner, it appears that Thomas Barclay (here recorded "Barckley") served from August 1, 1780, to November 15, 1783.

From the Rolls of Escaped and Exchanged prisoners, 1781-1782, it appears that Thomas Barclay (here recorded "Barkley") was on November 2, 1781, exchanged from Charles Town.

From the Muster Roll of Troops of the Maryland Line, it appears that Thomas Barclay (here recorded "Bartley") enlisted as corporal, March 17, 1777, joined the army in August, 1778, and was a prisoner on May 12, 1779.

From the same Muster roll it appears that Thomas S. Barchay (here recorded as "Bartley") enlisted April 25, 1778, and was discharged (or missing) August 16, 1780.

### MISCELLANEOUS.

From Maryland Journal and Baltimore Advertiser of Tuesdays, April 22 and 29, 1783, Hugh Barkley appears to have been Clerk to the Commissioners of the Tax, in Baltimore.

From Maryland Journal of January 19 and 23, and February 13, 1781:

"Notice is hereby given to all Persons, not to take an Assignment of a Bond I gave to a certain Jacob Coble in November last, for Forty Pounds payable in hard money or other money at the Exchange, as I am determined not to pay the same, for sufficient reasons which can be made appear, if the payment should be insisted on, from

MATHIAS BARCKLY."

From Maryland Gazette of Thursday, May 23, 1776:

"List of letters brought by the last Packet from Falmouth and now in the possession of Henricus Boel, in Crown Street, near the North River, New York:—

# Virginia.

FROM CALENDAR OF VIRGINIA STATE PAPERS, by Palmer.

THOMAS BARCLAY, with others, appointed "at a meeting of a number of respectable Inhabitants of the City of Philadelphia" held Friday, May 20th, 1774, a committee "to correspond with our Sister Colonies" (vol. VIII, p. 45).

He writes from Paris, under date of August 23rd, 1785, relative to a bust of Lafayette (vol. IV, p. 49).

On December 6, 1782, he acknowledges the receipt of his appointment as "Agent at the Court of France for the State of Virginia" (vol. III, p. 390).

He writes under date of January 5, 1783, of the unwillingness of France to make loans to the separate States, etc. (vol. III, p. 416).

He writes under date of January 27th, 1783, advising receipt of news from Benjamin Franklin that preliminary articles of peace had been signed between France, Spain and Great Britain (vol. III, p. 422).

He writes from Paris under date of May 17, 1784, enclosing a decree of his French Majesty's Council (vol. III, p. 583).

He writes from Paris under date of October 12, 1785, about the price of arms and advises that he will wait to see Lafayette before closing contract, etc. (vol. IV, p. 59).

He writes from Paris under date of January 16, 1786, concerning arms and ammunition, and adds that the first bust of Lafayette will be finished in about two months and the second in four (vol. IV, p. 81).

JOHN BARCLAY writes to Gov. Nelson under date of August 25, 1781, offering his services as agent for the State of Virginia, Congress having commissioned him to attend to certain commercial matters in France in which the country was about to embark (vol. II, p. 86).

A reward of \$500 offered November 3, 1859, for the apprehension of Barclay Copple for complicity in the Harper's Ferry raid. He is described as "about 20 years old, is about 5 ft.  $7\frac{1}{2}$ " "inches in height with hazel eyes and brown hair, wears a light "moustache and has a consumptive look" (vol. XI, p. 90).

FROM THE EPISCOPAL THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY AT ALEXANDRIA.

CAPT. EDMUND BARKLEY and Lucy Barkley, his wife, had the following children baptized:

RICK BARCLAY, of the County of King & Queen, Va., Merchant, of the first part, Col. John Martin, of the second part, and Elizabeth Martin, spinster, his daughter, of the third part.

Recites intended marriage between Patrick Barclay and Elizabeth Martin; that Col. Martin had settled on his daughter in fee-tail about 600 acres on the James River in Goochland County, Va., together with certain slaves; and that he had agreed to give to Patrick the sum of £400 sterling as a marriage portion with his daughter.

In consideration of which PATRICK BARCLAY conveys to Col. Martin about 900 acres in Hanover County, Va., which he had purchased of the executors of William Johnson, deceased, together with twenty slaves which he names.

Witnessed by Andrew Barclay, Mird. Throckmorton, Francis Jardine, Archibald Gordon and John Martin.

1795, October 3, PATRICK BARCLAY of Trinity Parish, Louisa County, Va., conveys to James Dickinson of St. Martin's Parish, about 300 acres at the head of Rocky Creek. No wife joins in the deed.

1795, October 3, PATRICK BARCLAY, of Louisa County, conveys to William Armstrong, 1313/4 acres on a branch of Elk Creek in Louisa County, Va. No wife joins.

1796, September 15, Patrick Barclay, of Louisa County, for an expressed consideration of one dollar, conveys to John Wells, of Fluvanna County, Va., all the land owned by the grantor in Louisa County, containing about 1312 acres and bounded by lands of William Cooke, Mrs. Hannah Tober, James Overton and James Dickinson. These lands are composed of three tracts formerly the property of George Barclay, the grantor's father, and inherited by the grantor as his heir at law.

The deed also recites that the grantor's mother was now Mrs. Mary R. Dickinson.

No wife joins in the deed.

GEORGE BARCLAY and Mary Barclay, his wife, by deed (with defeasance) dated March 26, 1764, convey about 414 acres with

house and outbuildings to Thomas Johnson, gentleman (sheriff) and John Marshall, to secure payment of £500.

GEORGE BARCLAY (written "Berkley") and Mary Barclay, his wife, of St. Martin's Parish, Louisa County, by deed dated March 10, 1768, convey to Griffith Dickinson about 96 acres on the North branch of Elk Creek, bounded by lands of James Overton, George Barclay (written "Berkley") and Griffith Dickinson, and formerly owned by William Sexton.

### Court Records.

1742, February Term, SAMUEL BARCLAY recovers judgment against one Sexton.

1770, May Term, George Barclay brings suit against John Fait.

James Barclay (written "Bartley") of Orange County makes a will dated September 23, 1756, and mentions his two daughters *Martha Barclay* and *Jane Barclay* (both written "Bartley").

#### Land Records.

WILLIAM BARCLAY and Samuel McKean, trading in Baltimore as "Barclay & McKean" make two deeds of land in Orange County, the one in 1811 and the other in 1812.

## From Henning's Statutes of Virginia.

On December 11, 1790, an act was passed authorizing the establishment of a ferry in the County of Harrison (now in West Virginia) across the West Fork of the Monongahela River to land of WILLIAM BARKLEY (vol. 13, p. 131).

By act passed November 25, 1791, WILLIAM BARKLEY was constituted a trustee of Randolph Academy (vol. 13, p. 293).

1758, September 23, paid for provisions furnished to the militia of the County of Augusta.

To George Barkley £1:3:0 (vol. VII, p. 198).

From Record of Patents, 1623-1774, at State House, Richmond.

On May 12, 1770, a patent was granted to Hugh Barkley of 95 acres in Augusta County (Book No. 39, p. 82).

From Records of Land Grants, 1779-1803, at State House, Richmond.

Married at London, December 12, 1820, T. B. BARCLAY to Sarah, daughter of Henry Peters, of Belchworth Castle, in the Co. of Surrey, England.

From Pennsylvania Gazette of Wednesday, March 5, 1788:

"On the 18th of December last" (that is, December 18, 1787), "died, at his house at Hackney, near London, in the 50th year of his age, John Barclay (son of David Barclay, late of that City, and grandson of Robert Barclay, who wrote the Apology for the Quakers). His loss will long be severely felt, not only by his immediate connections, but by numbers who have experienced the spirited efforts of his active friendship. His benevolence was so universal, his desire of doing good was so ardent and invariable, that, instead of making a long confinement to his house and a weak frame of body a plea for declining to promote the welfare and success of those who applied to him for his assistance, he cheerfully and zealously undertook their case, though often to the detriment of his health; and he cordially relieved the distresses of the necessitous, and those who were ready to perish. In an age when the property of the rich is wasted on the most contemptible trifles, and exhausted merely in selfish gratifications; when the number of those who seek occasion to do good is so confined; the death of such a man as John Barclay is and should be considered and lamented as a public loss."

# From New York Commercial Advertiser of Friday, 3 March, 1848.

"Died: In the City of Mexico, on the 9th of January last, Captain JAMES BARCLAY of Company C of the New York Volunteers.

"The subject of the above notice was a native of the city of Albany, the only child of William Barclay, deceased, formerly connected with the Bank of Albany. He was in service at the siege of Vera Cruz, and took part in all the great battles in which the American army, under General Scott, was engaged, from that of Vera Cruz to the storming of the City of Mexico. In the battle of Chepultepec he was second in command to Lieut. Col. Burnham, commanding officer of the U. S. Regiment of New York Volunteers, and won for himself a military distinction of no ordinary grade, as will appear from Col. Burnham's report of the part taken in these engagements by the New York Volunteers. He was slightly wounded in the arm during this engagement. Spared by a protecting Providence from an impending death during so many sanguinary battles, he has fallen a victim to the typhus fever now so prevalent, from the last accounts, among the troops in the City of Mexico."

# From New York Herald of Sunday, August 9, 1903:

"James Edward Barclay, a portrait artist, formerly well known in this city, Washington, D. C., and Boston, died of pulmonary disease in Edinburgh, Scotland, July 27 last. He was born in London fifty-seven years ago, studied in Italy and spent most of his later years in this country. For several years he had a studio in the Alpine Building, New York, but went from here to Washington, where he resided until two years ago. At the time of his death he was engaged on a portrait of the Lord Mayor of Edinburgh. He painted many well-known people in this city, Washington and Boston."

# PART XII.

# Sundry Records of the Barclays in Ireland, other than of the Ury Family.

In the Dublin searches recently made for the writer, a number of records were noted and returned which are here cited in the hope that they may prove of some use to those who are interested in tracing a descent from one or more of the many families of Barclay in Ireland. It is not claimed that these records are all that may be found in any of the localities named, for the search was not directed against the name of Barclay, generally; but it is believed that what is here given may be relied upon as acccurate, so far as it goes.

Among the original wills proved in Killaloe Diocese and preserved in the Record Office, Dublin, is that of "DAVID BARCLAY, Clerk." Will dated July 18, 1715; proved March 15, 1715/16. The probate of the will describes the testator as "late Incumbent of Killmurry McMahon,"—which was in County Clare, on the Shannon River. The will refers to testator's wife, without naming her, and to his sons David Barclay, Harey Barclay and Andrew Barclay.

In P. Dwyer's printed "Diocese of Killaloe, 1550-1700" this cleric is referred to a number of times and at page 401 is given a photograph of his portrait. It is also there stated that during the troubles of 1689-1691 he remained at home, and held a valuable farm under the See of Killaloe. His family in 1878 still held Ballyartney.

At page 326 of Dwyer's "Diocese of Killaloe" it is stated that a Mr. Barclay, son of Rev. Gawin Barclay, both before and after 1660 was tenant of Ballina, owned by Major Thompson after forfeiture by Sir T. O'Brien; and at page 395 Lady Barclay of County Clare is enumerated among the refugees in England in 1689.

The Subsidy Roll of County Down for the year 1663 recites among those who owned property of the yearly value of £3 or more.

### APPENDIX A.

EXTRACT FROM RECORDS OF THE MONTHLY MEETING OF FRIENDS AT AMBOY (now, 1897, kept at the Friends Meeting House at Plainfield, N. J.).

"The 3d of the 8th Month, 1686.

"Friends at Amboy agreed to have a monthly meeting \* \* \* the first to begin the second 4th day of the 9th month 1686.

"At the monthly meeting held in Amboy the 10 day of the 9th month 1686, agreed that all friends belonging to this monthly meeting bring minits of births & burials (since they first came into this place) that they may be recorded." (No such records are found prior to 1705.)

\* \* \* \* \* \* \*

"At the monthly meeting held in Amboy the 12th of the 11th month 1686/7 Miles Forster & Rebecca Lawry proposed to the meeting their intention of marriage. The meeting appoints John Mill & William Bethell to inquire into the matter and see if all things be clear with these persons in order to there marriage & to make report thereof against next monthly meeting."

"At the Monthly Meeting held in Amboy the 9th of the 12th month 1686/7 Miles Forster & Rebecca Lawry came the second tyme to the meeting expecting friends answer. The meeting being satisfied had nothing to object against there marriage & yrfore allowed them to appoint a meeting of friends, wherein to solemnize the same."

\* \* \* \* \* \* \*

"At the Monthly Meeting held at Amboy the 11th of the 3d month 1687, enquiry being made if any have to offer to the meeting. Its thought fit that John Barclay receave the contribution for the formes and pay for the same. \* \*

i. e., 6 formes for seats in the meeting house.

"Friends appoint Andrew Hanton & John Wrane to speak to widow Mitchell that she do not talk of Peter Sonmans as it seems shee doth, rather wish her to come to the meeting and if yr be difference lay it before friends according to the order of truth."

"At the Monthly Meeting held in Amboy the 8th of the 4th Month 1687, Peter Sonmans & Mary Mitchell refer'd the whole matter in difference betwixt them unto Miles Forster, John Barclay, Benjamin Griffith & Edward Grig to determine the same & docs promise to agree unto there decision."

"John Barclay gives an account that he has receaved the contribution for the formes & payed for them."

"Friends desire John Neill & Benjamine Griffith to speak to Benjamine Clerk about his absenting himself from friends meetings & to desire him to come to next Monthly Meeting."

"At the Monthly Meeting held in Amboy the 13th of the 5th month 1687, the friends appoynted to speak to *Benjamine Clerk*, brought his answer, which was, that he would not come because *Governor Lawry* called him a divil (as he sayes), wherewith friends not being satisfied, desires *George Keith* & JOHN BARCLAY to speak to him again."

"At the Monthly Meeting held in Amboy the 10th of the 6th month 1687 John Barclay brought Ben. Clerk's answer, being the same with what he sayd before."

"At the Monthly Meeting held in Amboy the 14th of the 7th month, 1687, William Bethell having a desyne to marry a woman who lives in Philadelphia, desr'd a certificat from this meeting which accordingly was granted."

"At the Monthly Meeting held in Amboy the 9th of the 9th month 1687, John Lufborrow and Gartrüd Holland proposed there Intention of marriage to the Meeting, who apoynts them to come next monthly meeting to receave there answer."

"At the Monthly Meeting held at Amboy the 14th of the 10th month 1687, John Reid who hitherto kept the book for this meeting being now removed with his family to another County, desir'd friends to order another in his stead, whereupon the Meeting apoynt'd Ben. Griffith to keep the book & receave the contributions."

"Mary Forster, Daughter of Miles Forster and Rebeckah Forster, was born the 18th of the 8th month, 1687."

"At a monthly meeting held in Amboy the 11th day of the 11th month 1687, It being proposed to bring Contributions towards the Rent of the Meeting House, John Barclay inform'd that the yearly rent was 3£ and that therof thirty shillings theroof paid. Ios by James Millow, Ios by John Reid and Ios by John Barclay. John Lufburry promised to contribute a bushell of wintow wheat—John Sim the like, John Barclay Dr for John Laing 48 Miles Forster Ios."

"At a Monthly Meeting held at Amboy the 11th day of the 4th month 1688,

"John Barclay informed the meeting he had discharged the money due to the Widdow Bunn for nursing Widdow Mills child viz £2:6:0- Towards which Miles Forster promised to pay Ios John Reid Ios John Barclay 6s John Laing 4s Ben Griffith 6s."

A monthly meeting was held in Amboy 14th day of 9th month, 1688.

The next Monthly Meeting was held in Woodbridge the 17th day of the 8th month, 1689, the entry being:

"It was agree'd that the monthly meeting should be kept, the third fifth day in every month, at *Benjamin Griffith's* in Woodbridge. That friends of the ministry coming to visit us should be taken care of."

Then, in another handwriting:

"The above said monthly meeting fell from ye year 1689 to ye year 1704 by reason of *George Keith's* separation which was 15 years, and then was appointed to be kept at Woodbridge first by a preparative meeting, and abt 2 years after kept a monthly meeting."

The next entry was of a quarterly meeting, following the yearly meeting in Shrewsbury, held at the meeting house 24th 8th month 1704.

WHEREAS by a Disposition and Deed of Entail bearing date the ninth day of October in the year one thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, and registered in the register of Tailzies in Scotland upon the sixth day of February, in the year one thousand seven hundred and twenty-three, and in the books of Council and Session upon the twenty-eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and one, ROBERT BARCLAY, of Urie, deceased, settled, conveyed, and disponed, heritably and irredeemably, to and in favour of ROBERT BARCLAY his eldest lawful Son, and the heirs male lawfully to be procreated of his body, which failing, to DAVID BARCLAY, his second lawful Son, and the heirs male of his body, which failing, to the heirs male to be procreated of his own body, which failing, to DAVID BARCLAY his Brother-german, and the heirs male of his body, which failing, to his Brother JOHN BARCLAY and the heirs male of his body, which failing, to his Uncle JOHN BARCLAY and the heirs male of his body, which failing, to his heirs and assignees whatsoever, without division, all and whole the Lands of Urie, the Mains thereof, with the Manor Place, the Salmon Fishing at the mouth of the Waters of Cowie and Carron, both in fresh and salt water,

betwixt the shore of Stonehaven and the shore of Cowie, and all and whole the Town and Lands of Megray, Woodhead, Powbear, Balnagight, Glethnoe, and Cairnton, Mill of Cowie, Mill Plough, Mill Lands, Multures, Sequels, and Knaveships of the same, including the Multures of the said Hail Lands, as also the Multures of the Town and Lands of Redcloak and Findlayston, and of those Lands which sometime belonged to the Earl of Errol, lying in and about the Town of Cowie, and the Multure of the Walkmill Lands of Urie, with the Pertinents for payment of the Multures and Knaveship used and wont, comprehending also the Multures of Easter and Wester Logies, with the Pertinents for the payment of Outsucken Duty; and all and whole those Parts and Pendicles of the Lands of Montquich called Trees, Burnhaugh, Rothnick, and Corseley, with the Mill of Montguich, Mill Lands, Multures, and Seguels of the same, comprehending the Multures of the whole twelve Ploughs of Montquich, with the Parts, Pendicles, and Pertinents of the same, with Houses, Biggings, Yards, Orchards, Outsets, Insets, Mosses, Muirs, Commonties, Common Pasturages, Dependencies, Tenantries, Service of Free Tenants, Tofts, Crofts, Parts, Pendicles, and Pertinents of the said whole Lands above mentioned, all lying within the Parish of Fetteresso and Sheriffdom of Kincardine, together with the Teinds of the said whole Lands, both Parsonage and Vicarage included; and that as principal and certain other Lands therein mentioned in special warrandice thereof, all annexed and united in one Free Barony called the Barony of Urie, but with and under the following Provisions and Declarations; that is to say, that it should not be lawful to the said ROBERT BARCLAY (the Son) or any of the heirs of tailzie above mentioned, to alienate or dispone either the Fee or the Life Rent of the said Estate so disponed, or any part thereof, to any Person or Persons, or to contract any Debt or do any Deed whereby the said tailzied Estate might be evicted or burdened further than it stood burdened by the said Disposition and Deed of Tailzie, excepting by granting Jointures to their Wives suitable and competent to the tailzied Estate, and Portions to their Children not exceeding twenty thousand pounds Scots, and that the said ROBERT BARCLAY (the Son) and his foresaids, nor any of the heirs of tailzie above mentioned, should not suffer diligence to

pass by adjudication or otherways upon the tailzied Estate, for any of the Debts or Deeds of the said ROBERT BARCLAY (the Grantor) so as that the property thereof might be carried off, declaring all Deeds by the said ROBERT BARCLAY (the Son) or his foresaids, or any of the heirs of tailzie, contrary or prejudicial thereto, to be in themselves void and null, and that the next heir of tailzie or provision might immediately upon contravention pursue Declarators thereof, and serve themselves heirs to him who died last infeft in the Fee, and did not contravene without necessity to represent the Contravener by fulfilling his deeds contrary to the true meaning of the said Deed of Entail:

AND WHEREAS the said Robert Barclay the Disponee in the said Deed did make up in his person a complete feudal Title to the said tailzied Lands and Estates under the said Deed, and having departed this life he was succeeded therein by Robert Barclay Allardice, late of Urie, Esquire, his eldest Son, who was duly served heir in special to his said Father and infeft in the said tailzied Lands and Estate, and he having also died was succeeded by Robert Barclay Allardice, now of Urie and of Allardice, his eldest Son, who stands duly infeft and seised in the said Lands and Estate as heir of tailzie and provision, subject to the conditions and provisions in the said Deed of Tailzie above mentioned:

AND WHEREAS the Lands after mentioned, part of the said Barony of Urie, and comprehended in the said Deed of Entail, lie disjoined from the bulk of the Estate, and at a greater distance from the Mansion House of Urie than those Lands which are proposed to be substituted in lieu of them, and are otherwise inconveniently situated for the Holder; that is to say, all and whole those Parts and Pendicles of the Lands of Montquich called Trees, Burnhaugh, Rothnick, and Corseley, with the Mill of Montquich, Mill Lands, Multures, and Sequels of the same, comprehending the Multures of the Hail, twelve Ploughs of Montquich, with the Parts, Pendicles, and Pertinents of the same, with Houses, Buildings, Yards, Orchards, Outsets, Insets, Mosses, Muirs, Commonties, Common Pasturage, Dependencies, Tenantries, and Service of Free Tenants, Tofts, Crofts, Parts, Pendicles,

and Pertinents of the said Hail Lands above mentioned, together with the Teinds of the said whole Lands, both Parsonage and Vicarage included, all lying within the Parish of Fetteresso and Sheriffdom of Kincardine, the present annual Rental of which Lands so lying disjointed amounts to the Sum of two hundred and sixty-five pounds eighteen shillings and one penny sterling, according to the Schedule hereunto annexed (marked A):

AND WHEREAS the said ROBERT BARCLAY ALLARDICE, now of Urie and of Allardice, stands seised and possessed in fee simple of the following Lands and Premises which lie adjacent to and intermixed with the said entailed Estate of Urie, and near the Mansion House thereof (that is to say) all and whole those Parts of the Lands of Redcloak and Findlayston, lying in the County of Kincardine and Parish of Fetteresso, bounded and described as follows: videlicet: Beginning upon the south at the junction of the Burn of Maxie with the Water of Cowie, and following up the channel of the said Burn in a westerly direction, until it is intersected by the Turnpike Road leading from Stonehaven to Bridge of Fough by the Slugmouth, from thence keeping the line of the said Turnpike Road in a northerly direction, until it is intersected by a straight line drawn from the point of junction of the Marches of the Estates of Findlayston and Urie at the stone wall inclosing the field called Balnagight, from the plantation thereof; from said point in said Turnpike Road, going in an easterly direction along said line, to the beforementioned point of junction of the Marches of the Estates of Findlayston and Urie, from thence keeping a southwesterly direction along the line of Marches between the said Estates of Findlayston and Urie, until it joins the Water of Cowie, and from thence holding down the course of said Water in a southeasterly direction to the mouth of the Burn of Maxie, at which this description commences, with Houses, Biggings, Yards, Orchards, Woods, Plantings, Fishings, Mosses, Muirs, Meadows, Commonty, Common Pasturage, Tofts, Crofts, Parts. Pendicles, and Hail Pertinents of the same whatsoever, together with the Teinds, both Parsonage and Vicarage, of the Lands and others above mentioned, and Hail Desks, Seats, Rooms, and Burial Places belonging to the said Lands, within the Church and Church Yard of Fetteresso,

the present annual Rental of which Lands amounts to the Sum of three hundred and fifty-one pounds seventeen shillings and tenpence sterling, according to the Schedule hereto annexed, marked (B):

AND WHEREAS it would be convenient, on account of the situation, for the said Robert Barclay Allardice, and the heirs of entail entitled to succeed to him in the said Barony and Estate of Urie, if the Lands and Hereditaments immediately before mentioned, parts of the Lands of Redcloak and Findlayston, so held by the said Robert Barclay Allardice in fee simple, were annexed to the said entailed Estate of Urie in lieu of and in exchange for the said parts thereof disjoined and inconveniently situated, and it would likewise be advantageous for the said heirs of entail because the said Lands so proposed to be annexed to the entailed Estate are of greater value than the said Lands proposed to be taken therefrom; But as such Exchange, by reason of the limitations and prohibitions of the said Deed of Entail, cannot be effectuated without the aid and authority of Parliament;

# MAY IT THEREFORE PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

Upon the Humble Petition of your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subject the said ROBERT BARCLAY ALLARDICE, now of Urie and of Allardice in the County of Kincardine, Esquire, That it may be Enacted;

AND BE IT ENACTED by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That from and immediately after the passing of this Act, the said Robert Barclay Allardice, and failing of him by decease, the heir for the time being, seised and in possession of the Lands and Hereditaments before mentioned, shall be at liberty to apply to the Court of Session in Scotland, and by and with the direction and approbation of that Court to make, grant, and execute a disposition and Deed of Settlement of the said Lands and Hereditaments particularly before described, parts of the Lands of Redcloak and Findlayston, and which at present belong to the said Robert

BARCLAY ALLARDICE in fee simple, in such form and manner as shall appear to the Judges of the said Court proper for effectually settling and securing the said Lands and Hereditaments, free of all Debts and Incumbrances, to and in favour of the said ROBERT BARCLAY ALLARDICE, and the other heirs entitled to take under the before recited Deed of Entail of the Estate of Urie, and with and under the conditions, limitations, and irritancies therein expressed; which settlement of Tailzie shall be so framed as to bind the Person executing the same, as well as the succeeding heirs of entail.

AND BE IT ENACTED by the authority aforesaid, That after the said Disposition or Deed of Settlement shall be so made and executed in manner and to the effect aforesaid, a Charter or Charters shall or may pass and be obtained thereupon, and Infeftment taken by virtue of the Precept of Sasine therein contained, agreeably to the forms of the Law of Scotland; and that the said Disposition or Deed of Settlement shall be recorded in the register of entails for Scotland, and of that of the Court of Session for preservation, for the benefit of all and every Person or Persons interested therein, to all which the said Judges of the Court of Session shall interpone their authority.

AND BE IT ENACTED. That from and immediately after the granting and executing the aforesaid Disposition and Deed of Settlement, the recording the same in manner above mentioned, the passing the Charter, and completing the Infeftments in the said Lands and Hereditaments above mentioned, and the authority of the Court of Session being interponed thereto, all and whole the said Parts and Pendicles of the said Lands of Montquich, called Trees, Burnhaugh, Rothnick and Corseley, with the Mill of Montguich, Mill Lands, Multures, and Sequels of the same, with the Parts and Pertinents before described; together with the Teinds of the said Lands, both Parsonage and Vicarage included, lying within the Parish of Fetteresso and Sheriffdom of Kincardine, and hereinbefore described as being parts of the entailed Estate of Urie, but lying at a distance from the Mansion House thereof, and proper to be exchanged for the said parts of the Lands of Redcloak and Findlayston before described; together with all Right, Title, and Interest, Claim of Right, Property, and Possession, which the said ROBERT BARCLAY ALLARDICE. his predecessors or authors, or heirs or successors, had, have, or anyways might pretend to the said Lands, or to the Teinds, Parsonage and Vicarage, in any manner or way comprized in Fee Tail by the aforesaid Deed of Entail of the ninth day of October one thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, and Investiture thereupon, shall be, and the same are hereby settled and vested in the said ROBERT BARCLAY ALLARDICE, his heirs and assignees, in fee simple; and the same shall from thenceforth be freed and absolutely acquitted, released, exonerated, and discharged of and from the conditions, provisions, declarations, limitations, and irritancies, in and by the said Deed of Entail limited, provided, expressed and declared, of and concerning the said Premises, or any of them, which from thenceforth shall be at the free disposal of the said ROBERT BARCLAY ALLARDICE, and his heirs and assigns.

SAVING AND RESERVING to the King's Most Excellent Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, and to all and every other Person and Persons, Bodies Politic and Corporate, his, her, and their Heirs, Executors, and Successors (other than and except the said Robert Barclay Allardice, and the Heirs under the aforesaid Entail of the said Barony or Estate of Urie) all such Estates, Rights, Titles, Interests, Claims, and Demands of, in, to or out of all or any of the Lands, Estate, and other Premises aforesaid, as they, every, or any of them, had before the passing of this Act, or could, should, or might have had, enjoyed, claimed, or demanded, in case this Act had never been made.



#### APPENDIX C.

THE ANCESTRY OF LADY KATHARINE GORDON.

In an article by the late Rev. Beverley Robinson Betts, entitled "The Heraldry of St. Paul's Chapel, New York," published in volume III of the NEW YORK GENEALOGICAL & BIO-GRAPHICAL RECORD, at page 21, a genealogical table is given which purports to show the descent of Col. Thomas Barclay,-first British Consul in New York,—from Henry III, King of England, and from Robert Bruce of Scotland. This table is certainly erroneous in three particulars, first, in that it recites Rev. Thomas Barclay of Albany as a son of John Barclay, brother of the apologist, and thus seeks to connect Col. Thomas with the Ury line, whereas he was not a descendant of the Ury family; secondly, in that it describes John Barclay, the apologist's brother, as "of New York," whereas he never was of New York, but always (in this country) of East New Jersey; and, thirdly, in that it names "Cornelia Van Schaick" as the wife of John Barclay, the apologist's brother, whereas John Barclay's wife was not named Cornelia, but Katharine, and probably was not a Van Schaick; and it may be erroneous in many more particulars.

As showing the probable ancestry of Lady Katharine Gordon, however, the table is entertaining, and is reproduced below (in abbreviated form) for what it may be worth. The writer has not deemed the matter of sufficient importance to check the accuracy of the table from Lady Katharine Gordon to Henry III and Robert Bruce, and assumes no responsibility for any inaccuracies which may appear therein. As a matter of amusement he has carried the table on beyond Henry III, and he gives Hume as his authority for the statements made in such further portion.

# APPENDIX D.

THE ARMS OF THE BARCLAYS OF PIERSTON AND OF THE BARCLAYS OF MATHER AND URIE.

In an article entitled "The Heraldry of St. Paul's Chapel, New York," by the late Rev. Beverley Robinson Betts, the tablet is described which was erected in St. Paul's to the memory of Col. Thomas Barclay, the first British Consul in New York (grandson of Rev. Thomas Barclay of Albany), and his arms are stated to be:

> "Gules a chevron or between three crosses patée argent. Crest: A sword erect argent, hilt and pomel or Motto: Crux Christi nostra Corona."

"By some oversight," wrote Mr. Betts, "doubtless of the engraver, the chevron is given or whereas it should be argent.

"The arms of the ancient family of Barclays of Urie," he goes on to say, "are

"Gules a chevron between three crosses patée argent, and they were so borne by Col. Barclay in his lifetime."

But the Rev. Mr. Betts was mistaken in his description of the arms of the Barclays of Ury, whatever may have been the arms borne by Col. Thomas Barclay in his lifetime. The crest and the motto above described have come down to Col. Barclay's descendants, beyond any doubt, for they are used by them to-day; but they are not the crest or motto of the Ury family, as we shall presently see, but *are* approximately the crest and motto of Sir Robert Barclay of Pierston. Nor, as we shall also see, were the arms described by Mr. Betts the arms of the Barclays of Mather and Ury.

The arms of Sir Robert Barclay of *Pierston*, were:

Azure a chevron betwixt three crosses patée or Crest: A sword in pale ppr hilt and pomel; Motto: Crux Christi nostra Corona;"2

while the arms of the Barclays of Mather and Ury originally were, as recorded in the Lyons Register:

Azure a chevron and in chief three crosses patée argent.<sup>3</sup>

In the appendix to the second volume of Nisbet's "System of Heraldry," page 241, the following appears as a part of the genealogical account of the Barclays of Mather and Urie, written in 1725, and apparently by one of the family:

"Their armorial bearing was formerly three crosses patées with a "cheveron, and a mitre for a crest. But the present Barclay of Urie, "anno 1725, after the example of Struan Robertson, threw out the "cheveron, as being by some thought a mark of cadency; though, as Sir "George Mackenzie observes in his Heraldry, it was anciently esteemed "an ornament; so their present bearing is

"Azure three crosses patée in chief argent with a dove and olive branch in its mouth for a crest. In an escrol above 'Cedant Arma' and below 'In hac vince,' as extracted from the Lyon's books 1725."

A steel plate showing the arms will be found on page 6 of the plates immediately following the appendix.

In Stodart's "Scottish Arms," the writer says:

"In 1725 Robert Barclay of Urie as representing Barclay of Mathers, "registered (in Lyons Court) Azure, three crosses patée in chief argent.

"Crest: A dove with an olive branch in its mouth, all ppr.

"Motto: Cedant Arma, and In hac vince. "The direct line having ended in an heiress, Mrs. Margaret Barclay "Allardice (Ritchie), the heir male, Arthur Kett Barclay of Bury Hill, "co. Surrey, in 1858 recorded arms with alterations, and was allowed supporters which had been previously borne by the Barclays of Urie, but "not registered:

"Azure a chevron and in chief three crosses patée argent.

"Crest: A bishop's mitre affrontee with tassels flottant upward or "Motto: In cruce spero.

"Supporters: Two old savage men, wreathed about the loins with oak leaves, holding in their exterior hands clubs erect, all

A System of Heraldry, by Alexander Nisbet, Gent., Edinburgh: William Blackwood, 1816.

In Burke's Landed Gentry, edition of 1852, the arms of the Barclays of Urie and of Bury Hill are given as above described in Stodart's Scottish Arms; and the same arms are given in the edition of 1871.

Whether Mr. Betts' description of the arms borne by Col. Thomas Barclay as being gules in the field, was an error of the sculptor, or is indicative of a descent of Col. Thomas from some family other than either the Pierston or Ury family, the writer is not in a position to form any opinion. Certain it is that the arms described by Mr. Betts are not the arms of either Pierston or Ury, although the crest and motto inscribed in St. Paul's are practically the same as those of Sir Robert Barclay of Pierston.

It is an interesting fact to note in this connection that most of the English Berkeleys, as a research will show, bore gules in their fields while most of the Scottish families had azure fields. And yet in 1247, according to Sir James Balfour in his MMS. of Blazons in Lyons Court, the surname of Berkeley carried "gules a chevron between ten crosses patée argent, six in chief and four in base." While this blazon was generally that used by the Berkeleys for a considerable period, several of the branches of the family found it more in accordance with the usages of heraldry and more agreeable to arms to reduce the number of crosses to three and have altered the tinctures in their several bearings.

Sir Robert Barclay of Pierston, Ayres, Knt., was created Baronet of Nova Scotia, October 22nd, 1668, with remainder to the heirs male of his body. He died in 1694-5, having married (1) August 4th, 1653, Catherine, dau. of Alexander Lochhart of Edinburgh, merchant (of the Carnwath family) by whom he had three sons and a daughter, and (2) September 28th, 1659, Barbara Deans, by whom he had eight sons and three daughters.<sup>4</sup>

#### APPENDIX E.

WILL AND CODICIL OF JOHN BARCLAY, second of that name in New Jersey, recorded in the office of the Secretary of State at Trenton in Liber 30 of Wills, at page 502.

"In the name of God, Amen:

I, John Barclay, of Perth Amboy in County of Middlesex, being of perfect mind and memory, thanks be given to Almighty God for the same, and calling to mind the mortality of my body do make and ordain this to be my last will and testament. And as tutching such wordly estate wharewith it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life, I give and bequeath and dispose of the same in manner and form following,

First, I give to my loveing wife Jane, the sum of teen pounds an addityon to a sum of money I did agree to give her by a Contract between my Wife and my selfe before we was married if I should dye before her which she did agree to except of in leu of her Dowry and quitt all my estate both real and personal I give to my wife my Negro gerl Esie so long as she remains my widow, I give to my wife wife (sic) any room in my dwelling house and one of my Milch Cows all which I give to my wife in leu of her Dowry agreeable to the above recited contract.

And whareas I have given a deed to my son John for one half of all my lands lying on Matcheponix Neck, I give and bequeath to my son Robert Barclay and to his heirs and assigns all the other half of my lands lying on said neack in consideration my son Robert delivers a bond which I gave him payable after my decease to my son John. If Robert refuses or neglects to deliver s'd bond, I do Ipower and athorise my sons John and Charles to sell as much of the land I have willed to Robert as will amount to the sums due on s'd bond and my will is that my son Robert must pay to Archable Craige, son of Samuel Craige, deceased, when he arrives to the age of twenty-one years and to no other person, the sum of teen pounds.

I give to my son Robert my great Armd Chair and one paire of hand Irons, and my chest which stands in my room.

I give to my son Charles my desk.

I give to my son Peter and to his heirs and assigns all my land lying at Cranbury meadows which was in partnership with Laurence Dey, but we have devided and given releases to each other the boundres of my part is in Laurence Dey's release to me. I give to my son Peter all my waring cloaths and opperl, and my saddles I give to my daughter Lydia.

My bead and furniture and half my puter I give to my daughter Katharine. The other half of my peuter, my bilsted Cubbart my looking Glass, my round table and stand, six chairs, my iron Kittel which I bought at Mrs. Tenent's Vendue, my small small (sic) tongues and tribet Iron and one iron trammell, I give to my granddaughter Jane Barclay, daughter of my son David deceased, the sum of twenty pounds and one Cow to be paid to her when she is married. If she dyes before she is married, I givn her legasay legasey (sic) to her three sisters, share and share alike.

My will is after my funeral charges and just debts are all paid and all the aforesaid leageses are all paid in currant money of this province or state, I give and bequeath to my son John, all the remainder of my moveable estate, if my executors should receive part of the money due to me by the bank of Notes, if it doth not amount to one hundred and fifty pounds they are to pay all they receive to Lydia and Katharine, share and share alike, their two sisters, according to this my will, but if they receive more than one hundred and fifty pounds the remainder after they have paid one hundred and fifty pounds to their two sisters, share and share alike, is to be devided amongst my three sons John, Charles and Robert and all the children of my son David deceased, share and share alike by my executors according to this my will.

And I do nominate constitute and appoint my three sons John, Charles and Robert my executors to execute this my last will and testament.

In witness whereof, I have sett my hand and seal and declared this to be my last will and testament this twenty-sixth day of May and in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred eighty and two 1782. I give to my aforesaid granddaughter four sheep to be delivered to her when she is married.

## CODICIL.

"There is several leigeses forgot to be mentioned in this my will for which reason I make this codesell.

I give to my grandson George Barclay, the son of my son David, deceased, the sum of five pounds, and whareas it has been said by the widow of my son David that I am indebted to his estate, if she receives any money of my executors my will is that so much as she receives must be reducted out of the leigesey I left to her daughter Jane, the leagisey left to my granddaughter Jean is to be paid to her when she is Married if she doth not marry till she arrives to the age of twenty-five years the sd legisey is to be paid to her then.

I give to my daughter Lydia my yallow and blew coverled, made in my first wife's time.

I give to my daughter Katharine my case and the bottles.

In witness whereof I have set my hand and seal this ninth day of June in the year 1782. I give to my Daughter Katharine one of my linnine wheels.

The foregoing will and codicil were proved at New Brunswick by William Vanderipe and Archibald Gordon, as witnesses, before Jona. Deare, Surrogate, on December 24th, 1790.

## APPENDIX F.

Memorandum on the State of Preservation of Sundry Records in Virginia and Maryland.<sup>1</sup>

I.

# County Records of Virginia.

FREDERICK COUNTY was established from Orange County in 1738, and from 1743 the records, including marriage licenses, for all Northern Virginia were kept in the court house at Winchester. The records are well cared for and are in good condition.

LOUDON COUNTY was taken from Fairfax County and was established in 1757. Its wills and deeds from 1757, and marriage licenses from 1793, are preserved in the court house at Leesburg.

FAIRFAX COUNTY was established in 1742 out of Prince William County, and its records are complete from that date with the exception of a few books that were lost during the civil war. The marriage licenses date back only to 1856. All records are preserved at Fairfax Court House, and among them the original will of George Washington. The record of this will covers twenty-two pages and includes his observations upon the value of his properties in Virginia, Maryland, New York, and other localities.

PRINCE WILLIAM COUNTY was established out of Stafford County in 1730. The county seat is at Manassas and the records are in good condition.

FAUQUIER COUNTY was taken from Prince William County and was established in 1759. Its wills, deeds and court records

from 1759, and its marriage licenses from 1798, are preserved in good order at the court house at Warrenton.

CULPEPPER COUNTY was established out of Orange County in 1778. The records are preserved in good condition at Culpepper Court House, and are well indexed.

Orange County was taken from Spottsylvania County and was established in 1734. Its records are preserved in good order at Orange Court House.

STAFFORD COUNTY was erected out of Westmoreland County in 1666. Its records at Stafford Court House are in poor condition and but little cared for, and many were lost or destroyed during the War of the Rebellion. Conveyances, wills, administrations, appraisals and other public papers are recorded promiscuously in the same volumes. Those that remain at the Court House, however, are indexed and include the years 1699-1709, 1748-1763, 1809-1813, and 1839 to date.

The old church records in Stafford County, with the exception of a portion of the records of Overwharton Parish, seem also to have been destroyed during the civil war. "Overwharton Parish Register, 1720 to 1760" is the title of a neat little volume of 195 pages by William F. Boogher.

KING GEORGE COUNTY. The records at King George Court House commence with 1721 and are complete,—with the exception of Will books, from 1721 to 1744, which are said to have been carried away by a soldier during the civil war and to be still in existence somewheres in the City of New York.

The records of Lambs Creek Parish, King George County, were destroyed during the war.

Spottsylvania County was established in 1720 out of King George, Essex and King William Counties. Its records date from 1722, with the exception of marriage licenses subsequently to 1750, which were destroyed during the civil war, and are in fair condition. They are preserved at Spottsylvania Court House. The records of the old church of Spottsylvania were destroyed

during the war, as were also the records of St. George's Parish, of Fredericksburg.

At Fredericksburg may be found the record of wills, administrations, conveyances, etc., from 1782, the year of the incorporation of the city.

Louisa County was set off from Hanover County in 1742, and the records, including marriage licenses from 1781, are preserved at Louisa Court House.

ALBERMARLE COUNTY was established in 1744. Its records, including orders and judgments, are preserved in good order at Charlottesville.

Augusta County was set up out of Orange County in 1738. Its records of wills and deeds from 1745 and of marriage licenses from 1785 are preserved in good condition in the court house at Staunton.

Hanover County was established out of New Kent County in 1720. Its records of wills, administrations, deeds and mortgages from 1733 to 1865,—with the exception of two old books of general entry,—were sent from Hanover Court House to Richmond for preservation during the War of the Rebellion, and were destroyed by fire when Richmond was burned. The two books preserved contain general entries from 1733 to 1792.

The records of St. Stephens Parish, Hanover County, were also destroyed during the war.

CAROLINE COUNTY records are kept at Bowling Green and date from 1727, when the County was established. During the civil war they were sent to Richmond for safe keeping, and a portion of them, including wills from 1727 to 1814 and land records from 1727 to 1836, were destroyed in the burning of Richmond.

The only old records at Bowling Green are some old Order and Judgment books from 1732 to 1740, which are in fair condition, and are indexed. Those from 1740 to 1759 are simply a mass of waste paper with indices gone, and are of little or no practical use to the genealogist. Those from 1759 to 1772 are

in hopeless confusion, and many of the indices are missing. It is impossible to gain any continuous knowledge of their contents. The books from 1781 to 1800 are indexed and are available for general use, as is also the record of marriage licenses from 1786 to 1846.

Westmoreland County was established in 1663 and its records date from that year. They are extremely interesting, and are preserved in fair condition in the court house at Montross.

KING AND QUEEN COUNTY was established in 1691 out of New Kent County. Its records were sent to Richmond for preservation during the civil war and were there destroyed by fire.

GLOUCESTER COUNTY was established out of York County in 1652. Its county seat is Gloucester Court House. All records were sent to Richmond for preservation during the civil war, and were there destroyed in the burning of Richmond.

ACCAMAC COUNTY records date from 1663 and are preserved in good condition at Accamac Court House. They are among the most interesting in Virginia.

YORK COUNTY was one of the original counties into which Virginia was divided in 1634. Its records are preserved at Yorktown. Wills from 1633 and deeds from 1645 are complete to date. They are, generally speaking, in good condition and are among the most reliable records in Virginia. They remained in the old court house at Yorktown through the Revolutionary struggle, the war of 1812 and the civil war.

James City County was also one of the original counties in Virginia. Its records, however, were sent to Richmond for safe keeping during the civil war and were there destroyed by fire. Its county seat is Williamsburg.

NEW KENT COUNTY was established out of York County in 1654. Its records were all destroyed in the burning of Richmond, to which city they had been sent for preservation during the war.

Henrico County was another of the original counties in Virginia, and dates from 1634. All county records prior to 1810 and all records of the city of Richmond were destroyed by fire when Richmond was burned, except that the general records of patents granted from 1623, may still be found in that city. A large number of these patents issued to soldiers of the Revolution by way of bounty, and were generally located in what are now the States of Ohio and West Virginia. They contain much genealogical information.

HAMPSHIRE COUNTY (West Virginia) was established in 1754 from Augusta and Frederick Counties, Virginia. Deeds from 1757 are in the court house at Romney; but all wills, excepting a few originals, were destroyed during the War of the Rebellion. There are no marriage licenses.

HARDY COUNTY (West Virginia) was taken from Hampshire County and was established in 1786. Its records, including some marriage licenses, are in good condition at the court house at Moorefield.

There are also a number of parish vestry books, not indexed, which contain but little genealogical information.

#### III.

# County Records of Maryland.

At Annapolis, in Anne Arundel County, are preserved the records (presumably for the entire State) from 1635 to 1777.

They include wills, administrations, deeds, patents, certificates, land warrants and similar records.

An abstract of each will, as recorded in the will books of the Prerogative Court of the Province, has been taken from those books now on deposit in the vault connected with the office of the Register of Wills of Anne Arundel County, by Mrs. Jane Baldwin Cotton, and is being printed under the title: "The Maryland Calendar of Wills: Wm. J. C. Dulany Co., Publishers, Baltimore, Md., 1901." This publication, if completed, will be an extremely valuable addition to the genealogical literature of Maryland.

While many wills of the provincial period are also recorded in the several counties of the State, the records at Annapolis are believed to be more complete and more accurate.

BALTIMORE COUNTY has its records of wills, administrations and deeds from 1664, and marriage licenses from 1776. They are all preserved at Baltimore and are in good condition.

CAROLINE COUNTY was established in 1773. Its county seat is Denton.

CALVERT COUNTY was established in 1654. Its county seat is Fredericktown.

Cecil County was established in 1674. Its records of wills, deeds and administrations date from 1773 and are preserved in good condition at Elkton, the county seat.

CHARLES COUNTY records are intact from 1655 and are carefully preserved in a modern well-arranged court house at the county seat, La Plata.

Dorchester County was established about 1669. Its county seat is Cambridge. All wills prior in date to 1854 and marriage licenses prior to 1780 have been destroyed by fire.

FREDERICK COUNTY was set off from Prince George County in 1748. Its records are preserved at Frederick, the county seat, and date from 1743 excepting the marriage licenses which date back only to 1782.

HARFORD COUNTY was set off from Baltimore County in 1773. Its records are kept at Bel Air, the county seat, and are in good condition. Wills, deeds, and administrations date from 1773, and marriage licenses from about that time.

Howard County was taken from Anne Arundel County in 1850. Wills, administrations and deeds date from that year. Ellicott City is its county seat.

Kent County originally included the whole of the Eastern shore and was under the government of an officer styled the "Commander of the Island of Kent." Its deeds date from 1749 and its wills from 1669. They are on record at Chestertown, which is the county seat.

Montgomery County was set off from Prince George and Frederick Counties in 1786. Its records date from that year. Its county seat is Rockville.

Prince George's County was established in 1695. Its county seat is Marlboro Station.

QUEEN ANNE'S COUNTY was established in 1706. Its county seat is Centerville.

Somerset County was established in 1666. Its records are preserved at the county seat, Princess Anne, and consist of wills from 1685, deeds from 1665, and one book of records from 1670 to 1700 containing births, deaths, marriages, cattle marks, and other interesting matter.

St. Mary's County, one of the oldest in the State, has its county seat at Leonardtown. All its records, excepting marriage licenses from September, 1794, and wills from 1658, were destroyed with the burning of the court house about 1832. The records of wills and marriage licenses had previously been saved when the court house was burned by the British in 1814.

TALBOT COUNTY was established in 1661. Its records are preserved at the county seat, Easton. The wills date back to 1667, deeds to 1721 and marriage licenses to 1774.

Worcester County was established in 1742. Its county seat is Snow Hill.

Christ Church, Queen Caroline Parish (now in Howard County, which was established in 1850), from 1736 to 1854. Births, deaths, marriages, baptisms and vestry proceedings.

Rock Creek Parish (now in Frederick County, which was established in 1748), from 1726 to 1854. Births, deaths, marriages, baptisms and vestry proceedings.

#### BALTIMORE COUNTY:

St. Paul's Parish, Baltimore, from 1715 to 1796. Births, deaths, marriages and baptisms.

St. James and St. Johns Parish, Baltimore from 1782 to 1815. Births, deaths, marriages and baptisms.

First Presbyterian Church, Baltimore, from 1768 to 1819. Births, marriages and deaths.

First German Reformed Congregation, Baltimore, from 1779 to 1851. Births, marriages and deaths.

Zion German Lutheran Christ's Church, Baltimore, from 1786 to 1834. Births, marriages and deaths.

## CALVERT COUNTY:

All Saints Parish, from 1707 to 1753. Vestry proceedings. Christ Church Parish, from 1707 to 1813. Births, deaths, marriages, baptisms and vestry proceedings.

# CAROLINE COUNTY:

St. Johns Parish, from 1752 to 1799. Births, baptisms, marriages, deaths and vestry proceedings.

## CARROLL COUNTY:

Jerusalem Lutheran Church, from 1783 to 1853. Births, marriages and deaths.

#### CECIL COUNTY:

- St. Mary Anne's Parish, from 1742 to 1799. Births, baptisms, marriages, deaths and vestry proceedings.
- St. Stephens Parish, from 1694 to 1837. Births, baptisms, marriages and deaths.

## CHARLES COUNTY:

Durham Parish. Vestry proceedings.

See also "Register of Births, Marriages and Deaths in Charles County from 1654 to 1726," transcribed by Philip D. Laird, Commissioner of the Land Office in 1895, and filed in the Land Office of Maryland at Annapolis.

#### DORCHESTER COUNTY:

Dorchester Parish, from 1743 to 1770. Births, baptisms, marriages and deaths.

# FREDERICK COUNTY:

All Saints Parish, from 1727 to 1862. Births, baptisms, marriages, deaths and vestry proceedings.

#### KENT COUNTY:

St. Pauls Parish, from 1693 to 1800. Births, baptisms, marriages, deaths and vestry proceedings.

Shrewsbury Parish, from 1745 to 1882. Births, baptisms, marriages, deaths and vestry proceedings.

# Montgomery County:

Prince George's Parish, from 1792 to 1845. Births, baptisms, marriages and deaths.

# PRINCE GEORGE COUNTY:

Queen Anne Parish, from 1705 to 1773. Births, deaths, marriages, baptisms and vestry proceedings.

St. John's or Piscataway Parish, from 1695 to 1774. Births, deaths, marriages and vestry proceedings.

# QUEEN ANNE COUNTY:

St. Paul's Parish, from 1693 to 1818. Vestry proceedings.

## SOMERSET COUNTY:

Stepney Parish, from 1724 to 1889. Births, baptisms, marriages, deaths and vestry proceedings.

Coventry Parish, from 1750 to 1866. Births, baptisms, marriages, deaths and vestry proceedings.

# ST. MARY'S COUNTY:

All Faith Parish, from 1693 to 1817. Vestry proceedings.

# TALBOT COUNTY:

St. Peter's Parish, from 1681 to 1805. Births, baptisms, marriages, deaths and vestry proceedings.

# V.

The Parish Records of St. Mary's County, Maryland.

The three original parishes of St. Mary's County were:

- 1. William and Mary Parish, in the South and East;
- 2. King and Queen Parish, in the West; and
- 3. All Faith Parish, in the North.

In 1750, a new parish was created out of William & Mary, known as *St. Andrew's* parish, which included the Easterly part of the County, and one hundred years later, 1850, a new parish was set off at the extreme South, called *St. Mary's* parish.

At a comparatively recent date, King & Queen parish has been divided into *Chaptico* and *All Saints* parishes.

William & Mary Parish was founded in 1650. The church was formerly called "St. George's" but for more than a hundred years has been known as "Poplar Hill." It is out in the country, about sixteen miles from Leonardtown. All parish records prior to November 10, 1798, have been destroyed, part with the burning of the Court House between 1826 and 1832, and part with the burning in 1829 of the house of a vestryman, Dr. Broome, in St. Mary's City.

St. Andrew's Parish. The church at Leonardtown is a chapel of this parish. The church had no incumbent in 1897 and the records were in the possession of the register of the parish, Mr. Walter H. Briscoe, whose house is on the Patuxent River, near Hollywood P. O. They include births, marriages, burials and vestry proceedings, and date from November 27, 1753.

King and Queen Parish. Prior to the division of this parish, the parish church was situated in the village of Chaptico. The rector (in 1897), Rev. James L. Smiley, and Mr. George R. Garner, one of the vestrymen, are authorities for the statement that all the parish records prior to 1832 disappeared during a controversy between the then rector and the vestry, and have never since been found. A single leaf, covering births, marriages and burials, 1772-1774, may be found in the Whittingham Episcopal Library at 1108 Madison Avenue, Baltimore.

All Faith Parish has its parish church at Mechanicsville. Its vestry minutes from 1692 to 1800 have been copied and may be found at the Historical Society in Baltimore. The rector's record of births, marriages, burials, etc., seems to have disappeared.

# VI.

Parish Records of Charles County, Maryland.

Trinity Parish has its parish church at Charlotte Hall. Its records had been lost for many years, but were recently found. The records of births, marriages and burials date from 1756.

Port Tobacco Parish was laid out in 1692. The (1897) rector, Rev. James E. Poindexter, of La Plata, is authority for the

statement that all records prior to 1869 have completely disappeared.

Durham Parish. The original records which still exist are at the Whittingham Library in Baltimore. They are chiefly vestry minutes, and contain no record of births, deaths, marriages or confirmations.

# VII.

Records of Early Quaker Meetings in Maryland and Virginia.

The early Meetings of Friends in Maryland were the West River Monthly Meeting, on the Western Shore of Chesapeake Bay, and the Third Haven Monthly Meeting on the Eastern Shore.

The former dates back to 2nd mo. (i. e. April O. S.), 1672, and was composed of (1) West River, (2) Herring Creek and (3) Indian Springs in Anne Arundel County, and The Cliffs in Calvert County.

The *Third Haven* (sometimes called "Trade Haven") Meeting, dates back to 8th mo. (i. e. October, O. S.) 3rd, 1672.

In the Northern part of the State was the *Nottingham* Monthly Meeting, dating from 1730, *Gunpowder*, dating from 1739, *Deer Creek* from 1765, *Pipe Creek* from about 1767, and *Baltimore* from 1793.

Hopewell Monthly Meeting was established in 1732 as a part of the Nottingham Monthly Meeting, and became a Meeting of Record in 1735. The first volume of records, 1735 to 1759, was destroyed by fire. The records from 1759 are preserved in the vault at the Park Avenue Meeting House, Baltimore.

Fairfax Monthly Meeting (Loudon County, Virginia), was established in 1745, and its records from that date are preserved at the Park Avenue Meeting House, Baltimore, as are also the records of the *Crooked Run* Monthly Meeting (of the same County) established 1783 and abandoned 1807. Goose Creek Monthly Meeting (Loudon County, Virginia), was established

in 1785 and its records, together with those of the *Alexandra* Monthly Meeting, near Washington (which date from 1805), are preserved in the same vault as are the records above mentioned.

Further information concerning these meetings may be had by consulting Janney's "History of Friends," or Weeks' "Southern Quakers and Slavery;" or by addressing Kirk Brown (Custodian of the Records, Park Avenue Meeting House, Baltimore), who has made a complete index of the contents of these records. Mr. Brown also has extensive notes compiled by him from the records of the South River Monthly Meeting in Bedford County, Virginia, 1757-1878; of the Henrico Monthly Meeting, in Henrico County, Virginia, formerly called Curls, 1698-1755; and of the White Oak Swamp Monthly Meeting in the same locality, 1792-1837.



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
